COUNTY BUILDS SIDEWALK IN LA UNION

Doña Ana County's Engineering/Roads Department is constructing a new 1,400-foot sidewalk on Mercantile Avenue in La Union, expected to be completed in June.

The new sidewalk will connect La Union Elementary School, Our Lady of Refuge Catholic Church, and the Union Mercantile Convenience Store, making it more accessible to pedestrian traffic throughout the year. The project is being funded by \$150,000 in capital outlay funding from the state's legislature.

Fiesta gets riders ready for Bike to School Day

Las Cruces Public Schools already has the most successful Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS) program in New Mexico, and one of the best in the United States. Started in 2005, the program is still growing.

Long-time SRTS Coordinator Ashleigh Curry works with teachers, principals, parents, students and volunteers and community partners to grow walk and bike to school programs at every LCPS elementary school – in Las Cruces, Mesilla and Doña Ana and on White Sands Missile Range.

SRTS has several events coming up:

- Family Bike Fiesta (Fiesta de Bicicleta): 9 a.m.-noon, Saturday, April 29, at Lynn Middle School, 950 S. Walnut St. It will feature bike repair, a bike rodeo that includes Las Cruces Police Department Codes Enforcement Officers, bike spa (bike wash), a learn-to-ride-a-bike clinic (training wheels included) staffed by high school students, a bicycle skills course, bike races, games and bike art. And, “every child who needs a helmet gets a free helmet” at the event, Curry said. There will also be a community bike ride at Young Park.

The event is free and open to the public

and is designed to get bike riders ready for National Bike to School Day (see below).

LCPS and SRTS Fiesta partners include the nonprofit Velo Cruces and its Hub bicycle shop and Everybody Rides with Grace adaptive bike program, along with the Las Cruces Optimist Club.

- National Bike to School Day: Twenty-three LCPS elementary schools will participate:

- Tuesday, May 2: Alameda, Highland and Mesilla;
- Wednesday, May 3: Cesar Chavez, East Picacho, Sonoma, Sunrise and University Hills;
- Thursday, May 4: Conlee, Desert Hills, Hermosa Heights and Mesilla Park;
- Friday, May 5: Booker T. Washington, Central, Hillrise, Loma Heights (tentative), MacArthur, Monte Vista and Valley View;

- Tuesday, May 9: Doña Ana;
- Friday, May 12: White Sands;
- Thursday, May 18: Tombaugh.

Students, school staff, parents and volunteers meet at locations near their schools between 7:15 and 7:30 the mornings of their event and bike together to school.

East Picacho participants, for example, will meet the southeast corner of North-

wind and Westwind roads, for a bike ride down Westwind Road to north Valley Drive and then to the school. MacArthur participants will meet at Valley Verde Park for the nearly one-mile bike ride to MacArthur, 1751 W. Hadley Ave.

Working with The Hub bicycle shop, SRTS can help kids fix tires and other repairs and even get bicycles for kids who don't have them or want to trade for a better bike, Curry said.

SRTS began in 2006 at Hillrise as a program of the Mesilla Valley Metropolitan Planning Organization. Mesilla Elementary School signed on in 2008, with Curry joining Dawn Sanchez and others as parent volunteers. Curry became LCPS' Safe Routes coordinator in 2010.

Thanks to more than \$530,000 in NMDOT grant funds – including \$350,000 new money, Curry's SRTS coordinator position moved this year from half- to full-time.

“We believe in what you do,” was NMDOT's message to the Las Cruces SRTS, Curry said.

The additional funding will allow SRTS to do more programming, provide more education in the classroom and organize bike clubs at more LCPS elementaries, she said.

Two LCPS elementaries, Mesilla and Mesilla Park, already have bike clubs, with Mesilla Elementary students meeting every Tuesday morning to bike to school and Mesilla Park Elementary hosting an after-school bike club, Curry said.

As they did in 2022, MacArthur Elementary students will bike to the Doña Ana County Government Building to attend a county commission meeting on April 25 in celebration of National Bike to School day.

LC Film Festival finds its theme for 2023: 'Unity'

As the Las Cruces International Film Festival wrapped on Sunday, April 16, a feeling of satisfaction and togetherness filled participants and watchers.

"Each day was about living your dream and believing in yourself," said organizer Ross Marks. "It was really an amazing exciting inspirational and uplifting time, from the opening night filmmakers ('Land of Dreams') speaking; Giancarlo (Es-

posito) was a motivational speaker (Thursday) as were Kevin Reynolds and the 'Unity' couple."

The theme of the week revealed itself to be unity, he said, "...we saw that with the opening night film about a divided America."

"Every year the theme evolves organically and what a wonderful theme we ended up with in this year's festival," Ross said. "This year's was very clearly about unity and togetherness."

The movie "State of the Unity" created by Nathan-

iel Paul Hoff and Jillian Ann Speece (who make up the band, The Bergamot) follows the couple on a journey of discovery as they travel all 50 states in an old car specifically to explore the concept of unity.

"My original idea was unity means everybody coming together, thinking the same thing, oneness of thought," Speece said. "That changed when we started meeting Americans where they are at and I started listening. I asked them 'what does unity mean to you?' and I

would give them a Sharpie and they would write on the car. I started reading the messages and listening to the people and realizing unity is not oneness of thought, it is actually in diversity that a democracy can peacefully exist."

She said the film festival is an excellent example of the concept.

"Through art, music, community building activities we can move forward," she said. "This film festival is bringing everyone together."

Hoff said the thing that propelled the couple was coming from middle-class Indiana. The heart of the tour was learning about other cultures, other people.

"We had a long way to go from the start," he said. "But I just want to learn to be open and understanding. So many times we were flipped with a perspective we didn't know. By the end, we had experienced a lot of things we couldn't put the right words to."

Then they went on a seven-year journey of editing, revising, understanding and interpreting

to put together a movie of the tour experience.

"It's not about everybody coming together and saying we have to agree," Hoff said. "This country has never been about that. We have to work together regardless of our differences."

As the film festival's special guest, Esposito spoke to New Mexico State University students at the ASNMSU Center for the Arts on Thursday, some of his words echoed the theme.

"We have to open our minds to understand that we are all in this together," Esposito said. "I don't pretend to understand all of those who are different than me, but some of us are shutting down the conversation before the conversation can be had. That to me is crazy. We are thinking there is no room to agree to disagree, so we are losing the respect we have for each other as human beings.

"I am going to lower my tone, open my ears, open my heart and say 'I hear you.' I may not agree with you but I respect that that may be your point

of view. I am not going to hold that against you."

Hoff and Speece took home the Grand Jury and Best Documentary Feature awards for the film festival. Esposito received this year's Outstanding Achievement in Entertainment Award for his many years of meticulous work in the film industry.

But all that did was set up a dramatic bottom-of-the-ninth walkoff home run by NMSU's Preston Godfrey, a junior from Glendale, Arizona, for an 11-9 victory. The crowd, and the Aggie players, went nuts. And there were jazz and chamber music concerts Saturday and Sunday at NMSU.

So, it dawned on me.

Hey, the pandemic is over.

From 2000-2019, Las Cruces grew enough that, many nights, if you wanted to go out and do

something, you had to make a choice. All kinds of activities were going on all the time. Of course, Covid changed all that.

But after all the false starts of the pandemic years, it feels like – and I don't want to jinx it – things are back to normal.

Free speech will survive Fox lawsuit

In 1981, Sally Field won a Golden Globe for her portrayal of an ambitious and reckless newspaper reporter in the film "Absence of Malice."

The reporter uses information leaked by a federal prosecutor for a front-page story wrongfully accusing the character played by Paul Newman of the murder of a union boss. The evil newspaper gets away with it because of a 1964 Supreme Court ruling.

The film's title comes from the standard set in the case of New York Times Co. v. Sullivan. Former Public Safety Commissioner L.B. Sullivan successfully sued the Times when it refused to retract an advertisement that criticized his department, and contained some inaccuracies.

The Supreme Court ruled that the libel standard for public officials like Sullivan is higher

than for everyone else. The new standard required "actual malice," which the court defined as either knowledge that the statement was false, or a reckless disregard for the truth. It was later expanded to include anybody who was in the public eye, not just government officials.

That ruling has provided certainty that did not exist when libel and slander were governed by various state laws. Now, some free-speech advocates are concerned that the 1964 ruling could be weakened by the \$1.6 billion lawsuit against Fox News by Dominion Voting Systems, which began this week.

The pretrial hearings and rulings have not gone well for Fox. Judge Eric Davis has already ruled that the claims made by

Fox about the voting machines were not true. All the jury has to decide is the issue of malice, and there is ample evidence that the network made an intentional decision to stick with the lie rather than risk further angering viewers who were already outraged that Fox was the first network to correctly call Arizona for Joe Biden on election night 2020.

We don't have to look far to see the damage done by those lies. Last year, our neighbors to the east in Otero County refused to certify their 2022 election results because the county used Dominion voting machines. Those same machines had been in use for years without a peep of protest. We all know what changed.

I should add here that far

more outrageous lies have been, and continue to be, spread on social media, without any accountability whatsoever. That's because of a 1996 federal law commonly known as Section 230, which says Internet providers can post anything they want, as long as they didn't create it.

While I cherish free speech, I don't think our nation has been well served by government protection of calculated lies intended to cause real damage.

New Mexico's Bilingual Multicultural Education Act

The nonpartisan League of Women Voters studies many issues. After a comprehensive study, a position is established and advocacy can occur. The education position of the League of Women Voters of New Mexico is, *As a multicultural and multilingual state, New Mexico must incorporate the principle of educational equity in its practices and policies to ensure the highest level of academic achievement for all students.*

March 14 was the 50th anniversary of the New Mexico Bilingual Multicultural Education Act (BMEA) of 1973. New Mexicans can be proud, as the Act was the first of its

kind in the United States. This anniversary is an appropriate occasion to reflect on the meaning of the legislation and efforts to support the cultures and languages of the region. The BMEA requires research-based bilingual and multicultural education programs to be fully implemented, including professional development for teachers and learning experiences for students. To receive state financial support that comes with the Act, programs must address students' cultural and linguistic needs, use two languages for learning, employ teachers licensed in bilingual education, and emphasize the history and

cultures of the students' home language, and establish a parent advisory committee. With these practices, students learn to value their culture and history. Bilingualism strengthens abilities to manage complex tasks and solve problems. Learning another language exercises brains in diverse ways.

During the 2023 New Mexico legislative session, House Joint Memorial 3, requesting the governor to proclaim 2023 as "the year of bilingual multicultural education," received a "do pass" from committees and passed the House. Time ran out before it was considered by the Senate. That should not stop the Public

Education Department and public schools from proclaiming 2023 the year of bilingual multicultural education, to celebrate the Act, as well as review ways to improve bilingual multicultural education.

New Mexico's commitment to bilingual multicultural education started prior to 1912 when the state constitution was being developed. Article 12, Section 8, calls attention to training all teachers to be bilingual. The first bilingual policy statement originated in 1967. It outlined advantages and led to the State Board of Education establishing the Division of Bilingual Education. Then in 1969 the Bilingual Policy

Statement authorized school boards to implement bilingual programs and approved instruction in languages other than English. In 1971 the Bilingual Instruction Act established that bilingual programs must instruct in two languages, as well as include the history and culture of the students.

While the Bilingual Multicultural Education Act has advanced learning opportunities for students, there is more to be done. The Act is intended for all students, but local districts decide to have BME programs or not. The programs encourage students to appreciate the value and beauty of dif-

ferent languages and cultures. 2023 is a good year for public schools to review and reaffirm the value and importance of bilingual multicultural education, finding more ways to move equity forward for future generations.

The term of office for our co-presidency of the League of Women Voters of Southern New Mexico ends April 30. We have enjoyed writing monthly opinion pieces and will probably write periodically in the future.

All vulnerable New Mexicans must be protected

The New Mexico Family Guardianship Conservatorship Coalition is extremely pleased Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham took swift and decisive action regarding recent incidents of abuse of developmentally disabled adults under the state's DD Waiver.

The Governor stated in her March 20 press release, "My message is this: If you are in a position of caring for a developmentally disabled adult and you abuse that responsibility, take note, because we are coming for you. We are using every tool at our disposal to protect these vulnerable individuals and to make sure that incidents of abuse, neglect and exploitation do not happen ever again in our state."

We implore Gov. Grisham to take action to investigate and address predatory guardians, conservators, GALs, attorneys

and judges who violate the individual's human, civil and financial rights. Incidents of neglect and exploitation are occurring in court-appointed guardianships with elderly and disabled individuals. These populations are already susceptible to exploitation because of their vulnerability and the subsequent isolation after a court-ordered guardianship is put in place. All New Mexicans deserve to be protected from abusive perpetrators.

The Department of Health rewrote its rules and regulations policy to include boarding homes to be licensed and monitored by this agency; however, we found through an IPRA Request that only three boarding homes in the entire state have been licensed by the DOH. What happens to those individuals living in unlicensed boarding homes? Who is

protecting these individuals who may live in horrific conditions such as bed-bug infestations, lack of nourishing food or being physically or sexually assaulted?

In some cases, guardians use their power to keep families and friends away from the person. Nursing home rules may welcome and encourage visits, but a bad guardian can make the situation difficult.

How are elderly individuals being treated in nursing homes? Do they have any activity to stimulate body and brain? Do they have opportunities to socialize with residents, family and friends? Or, are they being drugged so they are easier to manage and be compliant with staff?

These are horrible incidents to discuss; however, they are happening daily to many vulnerable New Mexicans. Everyone will experience getting older-

it's a fact of life. Mental illness is not a character flaw -- it's a disease. Developmentally disabled people exist. All people deserve to be treated with respect, empathy and a sense of protection. Families are critical partners in the lives of the most vulnerable; however, the guardianship system rarely allows families to be involved.

It's time for all three branches of state government (executive, legislative and the judiciary) to work together to ensure ALL vulnerable New Mexicans retain human and civil rights along with their financial status. Accountability and oversight could provide preventive measures by state agencies involved with guardianships. The state could begin by exposing current guardianship practices that disregard the individual's documented wishes,

promote isolation from families, friends and established communities, and squandering of resources when the individual and family members are at their most vulnerable.

The NM Family Guardianship Conservatorship Coalition is willing to work with Gov. Grisham and any state agency on this important issue to ensure ALL vulnerable New Mexicans receive the needed services and protection from

corrupt and exploitative predators. In the words of Gandhi, "A nation's greatness is measured by how it treats its weakest members."

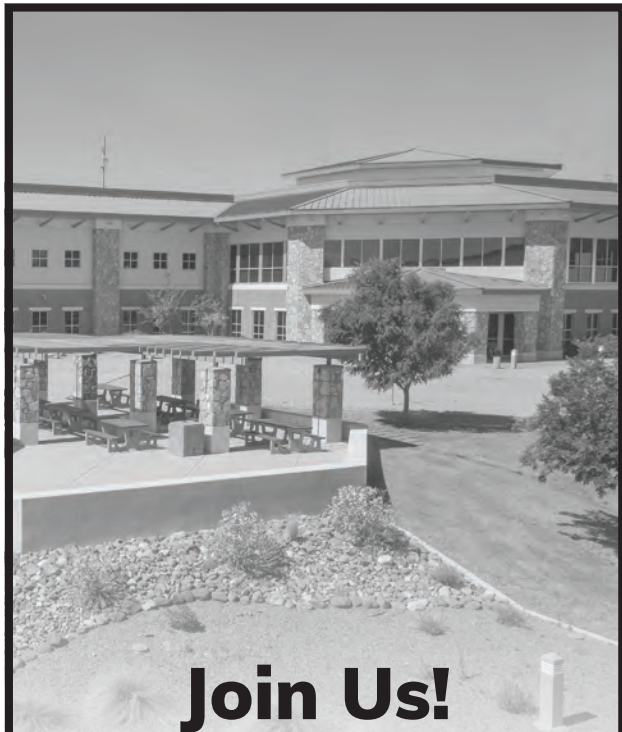

The first female licensed embalmer in New Mexico, who paid special attention to the babies. The blind musician who composed New Mexico's state song. New Mexico State University's first Black graduate who attended class in hallways. A restaurateur who hauled 2,100 pounds of red and green chile to Washington, D.C., and served it to Congress.

These are a few examples of the Las Cruces women being celebrated by Alma d'arte Charter High School and the Doña Ana Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR).

Alma and DAR have teamed up to celebrate, remember and thank the women of Doña Ana County who helped shape Las Cruces into the city it is today.

Dubbed "New Mexico Heroines of the Past, Present and Future," the collaboration culminated April 15, 1-4 p.m., when Alma students and staff and DAR members invite the public to celebrate the

DAR Women in American History.

Alma culinary students will serve baked goods they made using Maggie Gamboa's cookbook. A Women in American History quilt created by DAR and Alma students and staff will adorn the space for viewing. Five of this year's Women in American History spoke at the event, including Alma founder Irene Oliver Lewis, nationally renowned author Denise Chavez, Doña Ana County Historical Society member Sally Kading, longtime Las Cruces business owner Wanda Bowman and Barbara Hubbard, 95, and an icon of Las Cruces music and entertainment.

When DAR members approached her to collaborate on making their Women in American History legacies live on, she was intrigued, said Alma arts integration specialist Stephanie Preciado-Shelton.

"I read the stories about the women," she said, "and I thought it was an interesting idea to connect visual art and the accomplishments of these innovative citizens. We don't see storytelling very often at Alma, and stories are important teaching tools.

DAR members read Women in American History stories aloud to Alma students as part of the partnership. As a result, Preciado-Shelton suggested making a quilt, with students and DAR members choosing 26 Doña Ana

Regents president: Now is right time new leader

It is “the right time for us to make the change,” New Mexico State University Board of Regents Ammu Devasthali said as the university continues its search for a new chancellor.

Dan Arvizu’s five-year contract as chancellor expires in June, and there was “no discussion of renewal” by the board of regents, Devasthali said. Arvizu left the university in April in a move that was agreed to by Arvizu and the board of regents. Former NMSU President Jay Gogue was hired as interim chancellor effective April 7 until a permanent chancellor is named.

Arvizu is “a very good man and has done a lot,” Devasthali said, especially regarding NMSU student enrollment and retention. He also has brought

additional grant funding to the university.

But, she said, “We need somebody new with the vision to move us forward. We need someone to take us to the next level.”

An important goal for NMSU going forward must include increasing faculty salaries, Devasthali said.

“Our faculty are underpaid,” she said. “We have to bring our salaries up in order to attract and retain quality faculty.”

NMSU also needs to reach R1 status, Devasthali said.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Higher Education has developed a classification system that identifies Research 1 (R1) universities as the most research-intensive based on funding for research,

staffing levels and the number of doctorates they award. An R1 rating makes a university more appealing to faculty and students and brings in more research grants and partners.

Devasthali said she spent three to four days a week in Santa Fe during the 60-day legislative session that ended March 18 because NMSU “needed to have a presence there. (Legislators) get used to seeing your face there and what you represent.”

Although Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has not acted on all the bills the legislature passed, “It looks really good for us,” Devasthali said about state funding for NMSU.

The General Appropriations Act of 2023 passed both houses of the legislature and was sent to the governor. It includes full funding for the New Mexico Opportunity Scholarship program to pay for New Mexico residents

who graduate from high school and attend an in-state university. The governor signed the bill April 7.

An NMSU spokesperson said more than 6,500 Opportunity Scholarships have been awarded this academic year to NMSU students. “That amounts to about 60 percent of undergraduate students who’ve been supported in part by this scholarship. For many students, the Opportunity Scholarship may not be their only source of funding.”

But, scholarships “don’t help with operations,” Devasthali said, and the board of regents may have to consider a tuition increase to provide additional funding.

Devasthali said she has had “lots of conversations” with Lujan Grisham about higher education. The governor, she said, “is very vested in K-12.” For undergraduate and graduate

education and for research, “we have to carry through,” Devasthali said.

“You can’t stop with a high school diploma,” she said. “We need more investment in higher education.”

Additional funding for graduate assistants’ and teaching assistants’ salaries and basic healthcare is also important, Devasthali said. The pay they receive is “not enough to live on,” she said, and the small increase that likely will come to NMSU from the legislature won’t be enough to make a meaningful difference.

Devasthali said she hopes the new chancellor is chosen from academia rather than industry so he or she “understands the process the faculty goes through” and recognizes they “put their heart and soul into teaching young people every

In the classroom, the lab and under a microscope, students in New Mexico State University professor Soum Sanogo's fungal biology class are learning about the structures of fungi, how fungi survive, spread and reproduce, and their role in the environment, including as a food source.

An April 4 visit to a mushroom farm in La Mesa, New Mexico, "allowed the students to experience how fungi go from the growth on petri plates to producing mushrooms in a commercial production facility," Sanogo said.

"It is a full circle," said founder/grower Ximena Zamacona, as she welcomed Sanogo and his students to the first ever public tour of Full Circle Mushrooms (FCM), the

mushroom farm she started in 2019 on New Mexico Highway 28, about six miles south of Mesilla.

"We're very excited to have you here," FCM Production Supervisor Nathan Sanchez told the students.

Sanchez said FCM grows a dozen varieties of mushrooms, with names like blue oyster, black

pearl, lion's mane and shiitake. The farm grows about 500 pounds of mushrooms a week, Zamacona said. The mushrooms are sold in grocery stores and at farmers markets and are part of restaurant menus in Las Cruces, El Paso, Albuquerque and Santa Fe. Zamacona has also provided mushrooms for

person on top reflects what the students look like," she said, noting that NMSU is a minority-serving institution. "Everyone is looking at diversity."

"We should be really focused on growing our own faculty leadership so we have that pool of diverse candidates. This is an amazing community. (There are) well-qualified rock stars – people of color in this community. They have to find them."

Part of the reason Devasthali Hall, the NMSU art building, is located on the northern edge of campus is to help connect NMSU with the community, she said. Devasthali led efforts to raise private funds to help build Devasthali Hall, which houses the NMSU Department of Art and

University Art Museum and opened in 2020. She also led fundraising for the ASNMSU Center for the Arts.

"There has to be constant outreach," Devasthali said.

"I love this university," she said. "We're on the cusp of doing great things. There is such fantastic work being done. Fantastic things are happening at NMSU."

Devasthali was appointed to the board of regents by Lujan Grisham in 2019 and recently re-appointed to a six-year term that ends Dec. 31, 2028. She is in her third year as board president and, along with student regent Garrett Mosley, is the only regent who lives in Las Cruces.

NMSU mushroom cooking demonstrations, Sanogo said, has hired NMSU students (including Sanchez, who earned a degree in biology in 2019), and has visited NMSU "to explore the use of byproducts from mushroom production as soil amendments."

"Ximena Zamacona and Nathan Sanchez are great cooperators to NMSU in our educational effort to provide experiential learning and workforce development," said Sanogo, who is a professor in fungal plant pathology in NMSU's Department of Entomology, Plant Pathology and Weed Science. The mushroom farm tour "exemplifies cooperation of entities within our community in regard to educational and workforce development," said Sanogo, who has a Ph.D. in plant pathology from Pennsylvania State University.

"I really enjoyed the visit to Full Circle Mushrooms," said NMSU biology student Emily Embury. "As a graduate student who is studying fungal ecology, it was fascinating to see another side of fungi. Additionally, as someone who is considering a career in

agricultural science, it was inspiring to see a place where my fungal knowledge could be applied and help improve mushroom farming."

"The tour at Full Circle Mushrooms was surely a great experience for me as I was able to gain a firsthand sight of the behind scenes that occurs at a mushroom farm," said Lavesh Gamez. "It is quite interesting to see a company working in a transition phase of expanding their operations of growing specialty mushrooms. Being able to see this operation really brings a different perspective to the (class) since we now observe and learn about the actual fruiting bodies of these fungal organisms."

"I loved visiting Full Circle Mushrooms to see how what we're learning in class applies to industry," Plant and Environmental Sciences graduate assistant McKenzie Stock said. "In my master's research, I'm working on a study about mushrooms in pecan orchards, and I loved getting to see so many mushroom species at different stages of development, like what we've been learning

in Dr. Sanogo's class. Meeting with Ximena and Nathan gave me more insight about how my in-class and research learning could look in a consumer-facing career. I appreciated their thoughtfulness about the environmental and community impact of the systems at Full Circle, such as sharing compost with local farmers and organizations. Plus, mushrooms are just awesome!"

Fungal biology students also got to reflect on their FCM visit with a recent exam question: "What do you consider to be the most challenging issues facing mushroom growers?"

"This is one strategy I use to create opportunities for students to reflect on their own learning in terms of facilitating factors and challenges," Sanogo said.

Zamacona has a bachelor's degree in chemistry with a minor in agriculture, a career in controlled-environment crop cultivation, a natural green thumb and a love for sustainability and making nature and science work together. She also conducts mushroom research experimentation at FCM.

day," she said. "They don't get paid the big bucks. They're passionate about what they do. They are committed to their students. They work really, really hard.

"What would the university be without students and without faculty? We wouldn't have a university," she said.

Making sure the new chancellor connects with NMSU faculty and students and does "whatever needs to be done to become part of community" is "a conversation I will definitely have," Devasthali said.

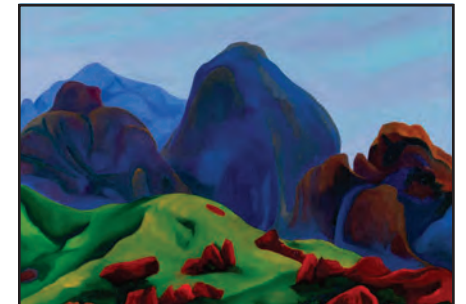
A showing of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument (OMDPNM) artwork and a wrap-up of the “Weaving for Justice” exhibition round out April events at the New Mexico State University Museum this month.

The University Museum hosted an April 14 panel of Zuni elders discussing the “Humanhood in the Organ Mountains: Prehistory” exhibit. For the development of the exhibition, Director and anthropology professor Fumi Arakawa, museum staff and the Anthropology Department at NMSU invited the Zuni Cultural Resources Advisory Team to visit two cave sites within OMDPNM and to review hundreds of artifacts from one of the cave sites – Chavez Cave.

The result of the conversations led to showcase narratives by six Zuni elders pertaining to the cultural landscape and artifacts of Chavez Cave in the “Humanhood” exhibit.

The Friends of the Organ Mountains Artist in Residence program hosts artists in OMDPNM each May and September. The program provides the artists and the public with an opportunity to interact and better enhance the understanding of our public lands.

The University Museum also will host a closing celebration for a weaving exhibition that has been on display in the East Gallery since August 2021.

“When a Woman Rises: Maya Weavers Creating Relationships Through Textiles” was co-curated by the Weaving for Justice organization, which explores the practice of Maya weaving in Chiapas, Mexico, and the many-layered relationships created as textiles circulate around the world.

The celebration from noon to 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 20, will include a sale of weavings in the University Museum lobby. All proceeds go back to the nine collectives in Chiapas that Weaving for Justice serves. Unique collaboration brings music archives to life

“We’ve created a very special collaboration between NMSU Archives and the Music Department,” said NMSU Regents Professor and tubist Jim Shearer.

NMSU’s Wind Symphony and Choir Concert will be 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 25, in Atkinson Recital Hall, NMSU Music Building, 1075 N. Horse-shoe St. on campus.

Tickets are \$10 at the NMSU ticket office and \$15.70 if purchased online at www.ticketmaster.com. Enter “Wind Symphony & Masterworks Choir” in the search box.

The concert is “a celebration of NMSU artists,” featuring wind and choral music by Warner Hutchison (1930-2019) and Sam Holloman (1958-2016) and the poetry of former Las Cruces poet laureate Keith Wilson (1927-2009).

Hutchison “was com-

poser-in-residence at NMSU and professor in the music department 1967-96,” said NMSU Archives and Special Collections Department Head

Dennis Daily. “He also headed NMSU’s Experimental Music Laboratory during the 1970s and was music department head 1979-84. Hutchison’s collection in University Archives contains original handwritten manuscripts and scores, as well as printed and published music, from throughout his musical life – more than 150 works in all.

“Jim Shearer came in to take a look at the archive a little more than a year ago,” Daily said. “We spent a couple hours going through the boxes of Hutchison’s original musical manuscripts. We both got pretty excited seeing

these original scores, many of which Jim concluded had only been performed once, and some not at all.

“We found the music for Warner’s big orchestral and choral work ‘Paso Por Aqui,’ a collaboration with poet Keith Wilson, who taught in the NMSU English Department at the time,” Daily said. “We have Keith Wilson’s papers in our collection as well.

We loved the idea of these two NMSU artists collaborating on a work with a decidedly New Mexico theme. Jim was incredibly enthusiastic about the idea of putting a concert together of this work and he has really made this

project happen. It’s been exciting to see this concert move from an idea to reality and to see new life breathed into this very local

musical work, by two of this university’s great artists,” Daily said.

In addition to holding the music and papers of Hutchison and Wilson, the archive is about to take in the entire catalog and papers of Holloman, who taught in the NMSU Music Department in the 1990s and early 2000s and composed for middle and high school and college bands, Shearer said. Some of Holloman’s works were premiered by Mesilla Valley Community Band, of which he was a member.

The concert will feature Hutchison’s choral works “Three Sacred Anthems: Sing a New Song, Alle-

luia and So In All Things,” along with the Hutchison/Wilson collaboration “Paso por Aqui” and Holloman’s “Tuba Concerto,” performed by Shearer. NMSU music professor Jacob Dalager will play trumpet on “Sing a New Song.”

During his time as head of the Music Department, Hutchison “was the driving force behind the design and construction of the NMSU Music Center,” Shearer said. “He collaborated closely with the Wenger Corporation, which provided all the music stands, chairs, stage shell, practice room modules, right down to the doors on every room,

which are special, sound-proof designs. The building was used by Wenger as a model for music center construction for many years.”

“It’s a big night and the first of a number of planned collaborations with NMSU Archives,” Shearer said.

Sanders’ music camps and new CD: ‘It’s about music, people’

“It’s about music and it’s about people,” Las Cruces singer/songwriter/musician Chris Sanders said about the Desert Night Acoustic Music Camps coming up in May, August and October.

The camps’ 10th anniversary in 2023 is also completing a circle for Sanders, who wrote about her wish to create music and build relationships in an essay she wrote for a philosophy 101 class she took in Minnesota more than 50 years ago.

“What sets our camps apart are the faculty, the Black Range Lodge and the people,” said Sanders, who is coordinating the camps.

The meals and hospitality at the lodge, its isolation in Kingston, New Mexico, west of Silver City and its history – one of its lodge walls was part of Pretty Sam’s Casino in 1881 when Kingston was a sil-

ver-mining boom town.

“What we do is impossible without our partnership with the lodge,” Sanders said.

Attendees at the camps have come from New Mexico and Texas, and as far away as Colorado, California, Arkansas, Maryland, Minnesota and even Canada, she said.

And some of them have been there since the very first camp in 2013.

Sanders also has scheduled four album release shows in April for her new CD, “When the Day Comes.”

Sanders wrote all the songs on the album, including two in collaboration with Steve Smith – his poetry and her melody and chords creating “the height of wonderful collaboration,” Sanders said.

Sanders, Smith - also from Las Cruces - and Anne Luna of Fort Sumner, comprise the nationally acclaimed blue grass group Hard Road Trio.

“We love to play with each other, and we love playing for other people,” Sanders said. Most of the music they perform they also write.

The trio has toured across the country and recorded three albums and two music videos.

Other musicians featured on the CD include King Ibu, who flew in from Las Vegas, Nevada to provide drums, vocals and guitar; Derrick Lee of Las Cruces on drums; Luna; El Paso bass player Brun Avitia; violinist Amalia Zeitlin; and the Bumpettes (Bree Gordon, Andrea Miologos and Kim Johnson).

All the songs on the CD were recorded

in Smith’s studio in Las Cruces, with Smith engineering the album, Sanders said. It was mixed and mastered by Rick Delellis. The photo of Sanders on the CD cover was taken in her backyard by Sterling Trantham, and her new brand (she even has a tattoo!) was created by her son, Curtis Sanders.

Sanders thanked Black Range Lodge, Black Box Theatre owners Ceil and Peter Herman (who are hosting two of her CD-release shows), Smith and Luna, and “the world-class musicians” featured on the CD and coming up in the music camps.

“It’s all about the partnerships,” Sanders said. “Live music, theatre and dance remind us that we’re human in a way that nothing else does,” she said. “In this very divisive, very troubling time, it’s good to

Don't Flush your Pills: National Prescription Drug Take Back Day

You're spring cleaning and coming across some old pills that you didn't end up using. The trash can or even the toilet seems pretty tempting, but flushing pills doesn't make them just go away. What you put into wastewater is something that needs to be removed from the water at one of the City of Las Cruces (City's) Wastewater Treatment Facilities.

"The improper disposal of unused medications not only increases the concentration of pharmaceutical compounds in wastewater systems but also contributes to the inefficiency of sewage treatment processes," said Las Cruces Utilities Interim Industrial Pollution Prevention Manager James Woods. "The presence of these substances can interfere with the biological treatment of wastewater, potentially reducing the overall effectiveness of the treatment process."

Proper disposal is also a matter of caring for the environment. Once LCU treats the wastewater, the discharge, called the

effluent, heads into the Rio Grande River. That treated effluent becomes home to fish, wild birds, and other wildlife, serves as irrigation water for farmers, and is used by downstream communities.

LCU offers these practical tips to dispose at home:

- The safest, easiest at-home disposal is to mix your pills with used coffee grounds or used cat litter and put it into your trash. This makes it undesirable to anyone who might rummage through garbage; it's recommended to add a few drops of hot sauce to deter pets.
- Your trash goes to Corralitos Regional Landfill, which is permitted and sited far from groundwater and

lined with multiple liners to contain potentially hazardous materials and protect our environment from contamination.

Another option for pharmaceutical disposal: The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) sponsors two Drug Take Back Days every year. On Saturday, April 22, the DEA's National Prescription Drug Take Back Day will be held from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at six sites in Doña Ana County.

Residents can dispose of tablets, capsules, patches, and other solid forms of medications – both prescription and over the counter – are accepted. Liquids (including intravenous solutions), illicit drugs, syringes and sharps are not accepted. DEA will accept vaping devices and cartridges, provided lithium batteries are removed. Last October, Drug Take Back Day collected more than 647,000 pounds of prescription drugs at 4,902 sites across the United States, with 2,710 pounds collected in New Mexico.

What if I Smell Gas?

If you smell a strong odor of sulfur – or rotten eggs – call LCU Dispatch at 575-526-0500. They will come out to check and ensure your meter is not leaking. LCU is on-call 24/7, and, before you dig and accidentally hit a gas, sewer, or water line, call 811 to get a location for those lines. The service is

Where Does Our Wastewater Go?

LCU processes our wastewater back into the Rio Grande River and stays in compliance with regulatory compliance through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the New Mexico Environment Department. The Jacob A. Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility treats approximately 3.3 billion gallons of sewage per year. For

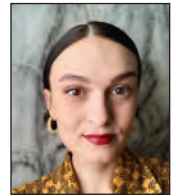
How is LCU funded?

New lab expands MMC's cardiovascular services

Memorial Medical Center (MMC) has opened its first cardiac electrophysiology (EP) lab.

"Heart disease is the leading cause of death for both men and women in the United States, and EP studies help doctors understand why patients' hearts are beating too fast or too slowly," MMC said in a news release. "An irregular heartbeat

(arrhythmia) can lead to heart complications, fatigue, congestive heart failure or stroke. An EP study helps clinicians determine the best treatment plan for patients – whether that is medication, a pacemaker, a defibrillator, cardiac ablation or procedure."

The EP lab was made possible through a \$973,000 investment for equipment and installation at MMC, the news

release said.

"This is truly an exciting time for Memorial, Las Cruces and southern New Mexico," said MMC CEO John Harris. "The expansion of our heart and vascular service line to include cardiac electrophysiology is part of our commitment to invest in our community and provide high-end cardiovascular services that one only sees in large metropolitan areas. We want our community to have access to top quality care by experienced physicians, so our patients do not have to travel out of Las Cruces for care."

The lab addition comes in conjunction with the recruitment of cardiac electrophysiologist Dr. Steven Hamilton to the MMC medical team, the news release said.

An electrophysiologist is a cardiologist with extensive training in the diagnosis, management and treatment of heart arrhythmias and the electrical activities of the

heart, including atrial fibrillation (AFib). EPs work with patients' general practitioners and cardiologists to help address AFib, generally when treatment with medications fails or when AFib persists after initial treatment, MMC said.

AFib is the most common cardiac arrhythmia, currently affecting up to six million Americans, the news release said. Stroke is the most common complication of AFib, and AFib-related strokes are also more frequently fatal and disabling.

EP studies test the heart's electrical system and look for any short circuits that could cause arrhythmias, MMC said. If a short circuit is found, an ablation may be performed to burn out the abnormality. Catheter ablation targets the areas of the heart that generate faulty electrical pulses that cause rapid heartbeat or AFib. By neutralizing and blocking these areas, the pulses are controlled,

and a normal heartbeat returns.

UNM Study: New Mexicans need more sleep

Getting a good night's sleep often depends on where you live, and also can include your race, age and gender.

In New Mexico, the United Health Foundation reports about 30 percent of people do not get adequate sleep, compared with 32 percent nationwide.

Vince Clark, professor and director of the Psychology Clinical Neuroscience Center at

the University of New Mexico, said too little sleep leads to poor health outcomes.

"Pretty much every organ system suffers, partly because one of the things you do during sleep is rebuild your body," Clark pointed out. "It takes a lot of energy to rebuild muscle, bones – washing out toxins – a lot of that happens at night."

Clark is heading up new memory research designed to uncover how a simple 50-millisecond speck of sound will

impact memory storage and retrieval and offer a better night's sleep. He is currently working with college students but hopes to expand his research to seniors and older people at risk for dementia and Alzheimer's.

Dr. Ravi Johar, chief medical officer for UnitedHealthcare, said there are many tips for sleeping well, including a consistent bedtime routine, and there also are things you should not do.

"Avoid eating large meals

before bedtime," Johar advised. "Those can cause a lot of restless sleep and problems."

Experts say 7 to 8 hours of sleep is recommended for most people. It's well known our ancestors, who had no access to electricity, went to sleep when it was dark and got up at the crack of dawn. If you follow a similar pattern, Clark acknowledged less sleep might be fine.

"People living the kind of lifestyle that all our ancestors had, not that long ago, don't sleep

8 hours," Clark noted. "They sleep six-and-a-half, on the average. So it's really not clear what natural, normal, healthy sleep really is."

To get to sleep, Clark said he occasionally takes a natural hormone such as melatonin, but warned people can develop a dependence on such products or experience side effects. Instead, he recommended getting some exercise during the day to help you fall asleep more easily at night.

Santa Teresa industrial park breaks ground on phase 3

Dallas-based Blue Road Investments has broken ground on phase three of Westpark Logistics Center, a master-planned industrial park in Santa Teresa. The latest phase includes the construction of buildings 3 and 4, which will total 646,263 square feet, CBRE Group, Inc., a real estate services and investment firm, said in a news release.

At the southeast corner of the Strauss Road

and Industrial Avenue intersection, building 3 will be a 425,368-square foot cross-dock facility and building 4 will be a 220,895-square foot rear-load facility, CRCE said. The buildings will be marketed for sale or lease.

Construction on the buildings is expected to be completed in January 2024 and will bring Westpark's total square footage to more than 1.3 million square feet, CBRE said.

"Driven by an in-

creased focus on bringing supply chains back to North America, we continue to see a growing number of companies establishing a presence in the Borderplex region," said Blue Road Investments co-Managing Partner Jeff Hackmeyer said. "This project should continue to help supply the much-needed Class A product to the market."

Situated just west of Highway 136, the logistics center is minutes from the Santa Teresa Point of Entry,

Doña Ana County International Jetport and Union Pacific's Intermodal Rail Hub, the news release said.

"Blue Road has a proven track record in Westpark," said Christian Perez Giese, who is senior vice president/director with CBRE in El Paso. "They have delivered two best-in-class warehouses already, and this phase is designed to accommodate users with requirements ranging from 50,000-420,000 square feet."

NMSU hosts cutting-edge transportation conference

The New Mexico Legislature approved a \$9.6 billion state budget earlier this year that includes "more than \$1 billion in direct spending on needed local infrastructure projects of all kinds," Lt. Gov. Howie Morales told the 2023 New Mexico Transportation and Construction Conference (NM

TransCon) April 12 at the Las Cruces Convention Center.

The legislative session was a productive one, Morales said, but "as a nation and as a region, we still need a lot more focus and resources on all our infrastructure – roads, rails and bridges included – and we should start now."

Morales, a former Silver City state sena-

tor and NMSU graduate, said it was "an honor to join (with) so many distinguished leaders in transportation, construction, engineering, education and aerospace in our state. You work on some of the most complex issues imaginable, that are incredibly important to the future and to the fabric of our communities."

New Mexico Sec. of Transportation Ricky Serna also spoke at the conference, along with Allie Kelly, executive director of The Ray, a non-profit that has built "the nation's only publicly accessible, living laboratory for transportation innovation," NMSU said in a news release.

NM TransCon was hosted by the NMSU College of Engineering in collaboration with the New Mexico Depart-

ment of Transportation (NMDOT), American Planning Association, New Mexico, American Society of Civil Engineers, New Mexico Section, Associated Contractors of New Mexico, American Council of Engineering Companies, New Mexico and the Federal Highway Administration' New Mexico Division.

The conference "included a technical program with four plenary sessions and 13 concurrent sessions, organized by leaders of the industry for industry professionals to stay up to date with trends and cutting-edge technologies in civil infrastructure," NMSU said. around 500 attendees and 37 sponsorships and vendors attended and participated, NMSU said.

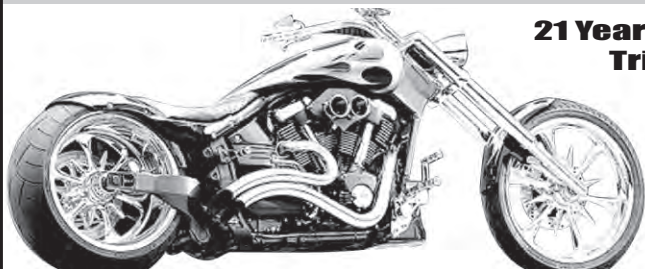

Love for horses motivates young barrel racer

Morgan Parra is only 11 years old, but she is already shaking things up in the world of rodeo.

In February, Morgan was featured in the National High School Rodeo Association Times magazine as the “professional’s choice student-athlete of the month” for barrel racing, Las Cruces Public Schools said in a news release.

The love for horses and rodeo has been a staple in Morgan’s family for many generations, LCPS said. Born and raised in Las Cruces, her love for horses came from riding with her father at an early age. Morgan’s father grew up team roping in rodeos.

“My dad got me into rid-

ing horses and has always wanted me to compete in rodeos with him,”

Morgan Parra said. “I’ve been riding horses since before I could walk. My dad would ride with me, I always loved it.”

Each day, Morgan dedicates time for riding. But growing up, her parents instilled the importance of putting education first, the news release said.

Morgan said her teachers motivate her daily to work hard in the classroom. Her parents and friend, Peyton Shelley, encourage her to do her best in rodeo and offer support and guidance as men-

tors, allowing Morgan to improve her time in barrel racing, LCPS said. Morgan enjoys riding doubles with her younger sister, Madison, keeping the love for riding in the family.

Morgan believes horses need good exercise and it takes time for them to get into shape to run and perform at a high level. She adds it takes a lot of effort to feed, care, and train a horse for competition.

For barrel racing, the rider takes off as fast as she can around three barrels in a cloverleaf pattern and out the alley again. The rider must be skilled to make tight turns around barrels without knocking them over. If a barrel is knocked over, time is added to the rider’s final race time.

During the pandemic, Morgan discovered how much riding helped her focus, allowing her to feel calm, the news release said. She used riding as an escape during a time when

social gatherings were limited and found solace riding her horses, Zeus and Bucket.

“I work hard every time I compete and work to become better than I was the

last time,” Morgan said. “When I give my horses my best efforts, they give their best to me, too.”

Earlier this year, Morgan set a goal to qualify for the YETI Junior World Finals in Las Vegas, Nevada. To help get her there, she babysits, does farm work and takes time to help her grandparents at their restaurant, LCPS said.

To qualify for Las Vegas, Morgan entered a qualifier race in Clovis, New Mexico. She took second and third place in two separate events during the competition, which landed her a spot in the barrel racing competition at the YETI Junior World Finals Dec. 1-10. The finals will host more than 800 contestants within the Wrangler Rodeo Arena.

Honing these skill sets will help your golf game

A “skill set” is a distinct combination of abilities for one particular aspect of the game that enables a golfer to perform in a masterful way.

It's like picking the right target or knowing when to take a risk. Professional golfers demonstrate proficiency in almost all skill sets, but still they have certain strengths and opportunities to improve. For recreational golfers, there are 10 skill sets essential for playing one's best golf.

1. The first skill set is hitting your driver or three wood so your tee ball is in position for a quality follow shot to the green. It may not be absolutely necessary to get the ball in the closely mown area (the “fairway”), but it is important it be of proper dis-

tance for an approach shot and sitting in the rough or a spot that is hittable.

2. Next is the critical ability for pitching and chipping close to the hole from 30 yards or less to the green, leaving a putt for par. That means becoming adept using all your wedges, and being able to make a quality shot from all angles and types of lies. This is a skill set that creates good scores, but few high handicap golfers practice. It's “scrambling.”

3. There is the mental strength to bounce back from an awful hole (double bogey or worse) by recovering to play the next few holes well. That requires you don't beat yourself up

after several poor shots in succession, but simply put mistakes behind you.

4. Likewise, having the skill to hit a super shot following a terrible previous shot. Maintaining your confidence, despite a few lapses, is crucial for scoring well.

5. As far as swing skill sets go, a big one is being able to “work” the ball left-to-right and right-to-left; meaning hitting a fade or a draw on command. This comes into play especially with your woods and your long irons. It also means having control of your swing through hours and hours of practice. Being able to swing your clubs with deftness

under unusual conditions is a challenge, and it takes a mindset to stay patient and stay alert, while having the right clothing and equipment.

6. Do you wish you had several extra clubs in your bag for certain “in-between” shots? Well, you can add those clubs just by manipulating your swing, your grip and your take-away. Let's say you have a shot from 115 yards, and is in-between a pitching wedge and a 9 iron for you. If you know your 9 iron is 120 yards, you can just grip down on the handle, or take a shorter backswing.

7. Back to the mental side, maintaining your focus and concentration for a 4- to 5-hour round of golf, paying attention to every shot and putt, is a

skill set unlike any other. You need acute thinking at all times and emotional balance. The pros work hard on this with their coaches.

8. Playing golf in nasty conditions, like strong winds, cold air, steady rain and blistering heat, can test a golfer's tolerance. Players at this year's Masters were sorely tested by truly miserable weather for Friday and Saturday rounds. Temps dipped to 46 degrees. Fortunately, they had caddies.

9. Now, we need to add putting to the skill set list. Some golfers are good at long lag putting; some are better at short putts, inside of 10 feet; some are excellent putters from any distance and angle; some are better on fast greens;

some favor slower greens. And some simply are not very good putters at all. Putting is a skill set like no other. It's a game within a game. But that can change quickly with instruction, practice, enhanced confidence and more practice.

10. Lastly, there's the combination of awareness and adjustment together with steadiness and vision. Since course, weather and social conditions are always changing, even from minute to minute, we need to be alert to everything, without being distracted, like a hunter who has a family to feed. Being aware is one thing, but it's more important to adjust to what's changing.
