Blazin' Brewfest Returns

Las Cruces celebrates beer in New Mexico

After a three-year hiatus, 18 New Mexico breweries ignite Downtown Las Cruces as the Blazin' Brewfest returns on June 3.

With admission, guests receive a commemorative pint glass and can sample craft beer from the around the state. The feeling of community from not only the breweries, but from the beer drinkers was palpable in the previous seven years of the Brewfest.

"In 2023 we are finally getting back to a sense of normal because of the pandemic. What a better reason than to come to togeth-

er over the mutual love of craft New Mexican beer? I would really like to get people involved and excited about beer," said New Mexico Brewers Guild (NMBG) Executive Director Ebbie Edmonston.

Breweries from all over the state will be at the festival, but priority was given to Las Cruces breweries with a lottery to determine the remaining spots. Edmonston said with this festival and future events, the NMBG wants to highlight breweries of the hosting city and give them the opportunity to shine.

Likewise, visiting breweries that attend give guests a way to sample beer they may

not be able to get traditionally in Las Cruces. Edmonston said four breweries will be coming to this Brewfest for the first time: Ex Novo, Unhinged Brewing, Downshift Brewing Co. and Public House 28 Brewery.

Eddie Gutierrez and his wife Shelby coown Downshift Brewing Co. in Ruidoso. They opened in 2022 and in just over a year, opened two other taprooms in Alto and Albuquerque. Eddie said they focus on the good in life and celebrate the things that make it great. A mindset applied across the board to the atmosphere, beer and food they create.

Downshift Brewing will have a nitro beer

on draft with their Irish Dry Stout to bring something different to the brewfest.

"You only get so many beers to drink in life, you might as well make them as good as you can," Eddie said.

Susan and Jerry Grandle opened Spotted Dog Brewery in 2014 in Mesilla. Jerry was a home brewer for 15 years and his passion for craft beer has created a friendly neighborhood feel to the brewery. Having been

involved in Blazin' Brewfests in the past, Susan said getting back into festival mode is what she is looking forward to and seeing people and letting them taste their beer. Spotted Dog will have a pale ale on tap among other favorites for the brewfest.

Icebox Brewing Company just celebrated its fourth anniversary in 2023. With three locations in Las Cruces and one in Hatch, the brewery has created a unique experience at each taproom.

Since the Brewfest is in June, Brian Weidauer, co-founder and general manager, said Icebox Brewing will serve beers that will be refreshing like their Mexican Lager, a new Strawberry Watermelon Shandy (that will raise money for the Community Foundation of Southern NM) and their All Dogs Go to Hefen.

Public House 28 has been open for about 18 months, but has quickly become a destination in Anthony, N.M. The

Blessing of the Fields Growing season welcomed with water

The New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum in Las Cruces celebrates an old tradition with the annual Blessing of the Fields procession on Friday, May 12.

At 10 a.m., the colorful procession around the museum grounds begins with the blessing the animals, plants, and acequia. Visitors who participate in the procession from 10 to 11 a.m. will not be charged admission.

The event begins with the Prayer of the Four Directions, led by Patrick Narvaez, and Cacique of Corporacion de los Indigines de Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe de Tortugas and Tortugas Pueblo.

Leading the procession will be Most Reverend Peter Baldacchino, Bishop of the Las Cruces Diocese. Students from Las Cruces Catholic Schools will be among the participants.

The bulto carried during the procession was created by Las Cruces artist Virginia Maria Romero.

The Museum holds a plant sale as part of the festivities. Vegetables, flowers and desert plants grown in the Museum's greenhouse are featured in the sale.

This marks the 23rd year the museum has held this program, which focuses on a long and rich history. San Ysidro, the patron saint of farmers, lived from 1070 to 1130. He worked in the fields for a wealthy landowner and was known for his devotion to God, his humility, and his generosity to those less fortunate.

The story of San Ysidro has been passed down through the generations and still inspires many farmers and their families in the Mesilla Valley. For many years, workers in San Miguel would make a pilgrimage each May, stopping at all the villages along the valley.

Chris Sanders offers music camps, new CD

"It's about music and it's about people," area singer/ songwriter/musician Chris Sanders said about the Desert Night Acoustic Music Camps coming up in May, August and October.

The camps' 10th anniversary in 2023 is also completing a circle for Sanders, who wrote about her wish to create music and build relationships in an essay she wrote for a philosophy 101 class she took in Minnesota more than 50 years ago.

"What sets our camps apart

are the faculty, the Black Range Lodge and the people," said Sanders, who is coordinating the camps.

The meals and hospitality at the lodge, its isolation Kingston, west of Silver City and its history – one of its lodge walls was part of Pretty Sam's Casino in 1881 when Kingston was a silver-mining boom town.

"What we do is impossible without our partnership with the lodge," Sanders said.

Attendees at the camps have come from throughout New Mexico and Texas, and from as far away as Colorado, California, Arkansas, Maryland, Minnesota and even Canada, she said. And some of them have been there since the very first camp in 2013.


Sanders also has a new CD, "When the Day Comes." She wrote all the songs on the album, including two in collaboration with Steve Smith - his poetry and her melody and chords creating "the height of wonderful collaboration." Sanders said.

Smith was "important and essential to this project." Sanders said. The CD features "his most exquisite playing ever."

Sanders and Smith, from

Fort Sumner, comprise the nationally acclaimed bluegrass group Hard Road Trio.

"We love to play with each other, and we love playing for other people," Sanders said.

More than 80 percent of the music they perform they also write. The trio has toured across the country and has recorded three albums and two music videos: "Whiskey in a Glass" and "Mamma Spin Me Round."

Other musicians featured on the CD include King Ibu, who flew in from Las Vegas, Nevada to provide drums, vocals and guitar; master musician Derrick Lee of Las Cruces on drums; Luna; El Paso bass player Brun Avitia; violinist Amalia Zeitlin; and the Bumpettes (Bree Gordon,

Andrea Miologos and Kim Johnson).

All the songs on the CD were recorded in Smith's studio in Las Cruces, with Smith engineering the album, Sanders said. It was mixed and mastered by Rick Delellis. The photo of Sanders on the CD cover was taken in her backyard by Sterling Trantham, and her new brand (she even has a tattoo!) was created by her son, Curtis Sanders.

"It's all about the partnerships," Sanders said. "Live music, theatre and dance remind us that we're human in a way that nothing else does," she said. "In this very divisive, very troubling time, it's good to be reminded of our human nobility."

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


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The 28th Annual Silver City Blues Festival, May 27, Memorial Day weekend, at Gough Park in Silver City, continues to be free for all to enjoy. It is supported by local businesses and individual blues lovers, and especially by donations from attendees.

The festival features five performing acts:

• Famous Raymos, 11 a.m., a group active since 1903 when the founder got swindled on a fake silver mine and decided to try his hand at honest labor. When that didn't work Raymos took to drink and playing music on the side of the road.

- Dirty Red & the Soul Shakers, 1 p.m., from Oklahoma, with a lone weeping guitar, blues harmonica and soul-filled vocals.
- Blues Dawg, 3 p.m., High-energy electric blues. Founded in Los Angeles

in 1998, now hanging out in southwest New Mexico playing rockin' blues and classic rock.

- Tyron Benoit Band, 5 p.m., from New Orleans, is a band as diverse as Cajun culture with a dash of Zydeco, a pinch of rock, and a sprinkle of Americana.
- Ghost Town Blues Band, 7 p.m., from Tennessee, a band that captivates its audience with cigar box gui-

tars, electric push brooms, and a hip-hop trombone player.

The 2023 Blues Festival will have something for everyone, according to a press release - out of state and local performers, unique vendors from Silver City's very own Makers Market, beer gardens provided by Little Toad Creek Brewery & Distillery and Q's Bistro, and food/beverage vendors.

"The goal of the festival is to bring amazing entertainment to Silver City while supporting the local economy," the release said. "While the Blues Festival is fun and exciting, there are many businesses that neighbor Gough Park that will still be open for business."

Once the Blues Festival closes for the evening, more entertainment and music continues in downtown Silver City.

'With Hearts of Honor'

Book reflects Grant County families facing World War II

athy Howell embarked on a journey because of a photo. At the edge of her consciousness, at the home of her husband, Jack, she absorbed the image of a photo that she passed numerous times until, one day she asked about it.

Two young men stand with huge grins, ready to face the world, ready to take on a journey of their own. One of them, it turned out, was her husband's uncle, Jack Daniel Sprunk. This boy had signed up for the National Guard, talked his parents into signing off for him even though he was just 16. He had dreams of working with horses and, although they had stopped using horses to get around in wars, they promised him Las Vegas and the rodeo. It was 1941.

There was a war happening and President Roosevelt promptly put the National Guard on active duty. Jack ended up in the Philippines, Pearl Harbor was bombed, and the boy found himself and his companions fleeing the Japanese on the Bataan Peninsula, eating lizards and red rice and living in fear.

The American boys were ordered to surrender and were marched back along the length of Bataan. Jack survived that infamous "death march." After 2 ½ years in captivity, he was put on a "Hellship" and died, before he was 21, when

a torpedo hit the ship and 1,800 men drowned in that melee.

It was a story that gripped Kathy, mesmerized

her and fascinated her. She started asking questions, looking at the war, the people, the families affected.

I just started studying World War II and I thought 'wow we've got quite a jewel of a story in our family," Kathy said. "It made me realize the resilience families have when their loved ones are overseas,

how those people had to just give up their kids. It just must have been so hard for them."

The seed began in her mind for a book. Now, after years of rumination and study "With Hearts of Honor: A Family's Story of WWII" is out and on the shelves. It is a work of "reimagined history," a novel. Kathy took all she learned and created a story about families of the Grant County mining district facing war and loss, loosely based on Jack's story.

Framed through the eyes of young Gwen MacKenzie who becomes a reporter sent across the world for stories, the book explores aspects of World War II, how it happened and many of the issues families faced at the time.


"Hearts of Honor is a love letter to all the heroes and her-



oines of World War II," Kathy said. "Especially the brave folk of Grant County. Included are their courageous families who waited behind patiently, suffered silently, and made innumerable sacrifices."

This is the story of children who grew up too fast and takes the reader from the Philippines to London, North Africa, Paris and beyond. The reader is transported back to the 1940's through adventure, romance and tragedy thorough the hearts and minds of the time.

The event starts at 1 p.m. with presentations from the Fort Bayard Historic Preservation Society on the history of Fort Bayard and from Friends of Bataan Park about the soldiers from Grant County and New Mexico who were taken prisoners during World War II and held captive as part of the Bataan Death March.

The event is to honor active military personnel, Gold Star Families, veterans and all the veterans service organizations in Grant County. Following the presentations, the 1st Armored Division Band from Ft. Bliss will perform a concert entitled "As Time Goes By" starting at 2 p.m.

The 1st Armored Division Band is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. "Old Ironsides" traces its heritage from 1943, when it was activated in the early days of World War II. To this band, however, music was often a sideline as division bands were used as infantry units during World War II. Most of the band's time was not spent in rehearsing and performing, but in guarding supplies or headquarters installations.

Armed Forces Day was created in August 1949 by Defense Sec. Louis Johnson to celebrate the unification of the Armed Forces under the Defense Dept and to replace the separate Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force days. It was established as a national holiday in 1962 by President John F. Kennedy.



Old Home Gets New Love

Couple renovates 120-year-old house in Mesilla

Joe and Elaine Foster sold their 4,200-square-foot house in Talavera area of Las Cruces last fall and bought a 900-square-foot home in Mesilla which they have spent the last nine months renovating.

Built about 1900, it was originally part of the house next door, Joe Foster said. It was separated into its own property and has had three additions, all with different floors and ceilings.

Joe and Elaine have lived there since they bought it, and the renovations are almost complete, as Joe has almost single-handedly converted an historic Mesilla home into a modern, comfortable living space while preserving its original

look and feel as much as possible.

Joe tore out and replaced the kitchen, added a colorful tin-look ceiling in the dining room and rebuilt the fireplace, using river rock and clay pots. He removed the sheetrock ceilings throughout the house to expose the antique beams.

Joe took the floors "down to the dirt" in a couple of rooms, pouring cement foundations and preserving original wood floors. He replaced a dilapidated window in the dining room with French doors and installed a new bedroom window. Hardwood and granite kitchen cabinets were handmade by a cabinet maker in Chihuahua, Mexico, from Joe's design. He even made the mesquite tables and the cutting

board that hangs on the kitchen wall.

Joe discovered wood trim around the tops of the walls when the ceiling came out, and kept that, using the trough it created to hide wiring for track lighting. He added old cedar beams rescued from a nearby yard and from C & D Southwest Lumber to maintain the house's authentic look, which includes exposed adobe walls.

Some of the lumber comes from Oregon and was cut from trees that had died of fungus. The cedar kept the fungus from penetrating deep into the wood, but it still created a stylish pattern.

The bedroom set was handmade in Sunland Park by the same fur-











niture maker who supplied the home's antique doors and front gate. Most of the furniture and art Joe and Elaine have added to the house is antique or authentic to the décor. The kitchen contains a high-tech stove and microwave – "We wanted this place to be a cook's delight," Joe said – but you won't find a television or a clock in the house.

Joe and Elaine have lived in the house since they bought it.

As renovations to the house and prop-

erty near completion, "We're ecstatic," Joe said. "It's livable now."

The key has been patience, he said, "not being rushed, taking your time and trying to be artistic."

Elaine continues her psychology practice at her nearby office and is an adjunct professor at New Mexico State University. Joe retired five years ago after a career as a rocket scientist at White Sands Missile Range, developing missile systems for special forces, including the United States Navy Seals and U.S. Army Rangers. Much of the work Foster did was top secret, he said.

Joe is the author of "The BiniSphere," a techno thriller, and he and Elaine cowrote "I Wish I Knew This Before My Divorce: Ending the Battle Between Holding On and Letting Go" and "In Movement There Is Peace: Stumbling Along the Way to the Spirit," about their backpacking trip down the Camino de Santiago in Spain.







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

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Talking HorsesThe Power of Play

Like most people when they're first introduced to horses, my early years were mostly about how much fun it was riding out on the trails, chatting with other riders and seeing some beautiful scenery. Riding school horses and well-broke ranch horses, usually surrounded by their equine buddies, meant there was not a whole lot to worry about so you could relax and enjoy the

ride.

Even when I started taking more serious lessons and studying the concepts of natural horsemanship, the focus was primarily on how to get the horse to do the things we wanted to do during our time with them. The one thing you almost never heard was what does the horse think about all this. It seemed this was an activity where the bottom line was about how much fun can a person have with a horse, as if the horse wasn't really part of the equation.

When I bought my first horse, it was pretty clear I had my hands full with this particular animal. Our first ride after the check had cleared lasted about a mile before he started bucking and spinning. Not being skilled enough at the time to know how to handle this, I managed to get off without injury, but even walking back to the barn from the safety of the ground proved to be challenging.

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ened mood in each piece. His professional background in painting and advanced photography are equally evident in this colorful triptych of subjects, including Unique Rock Forms, a Magnificent Tree and Rose Portraits, each printed in vivid metallic ink on 20" x 36" archival canvases.

In 2018, 50 years after receiving a dual degree in painting and advanced photography from the San Francisco Art Institute, Stone completed a graduate level digital photography course at Western New Mexico University in Silver City, NM. Abandoning his beloved Nikon cameras, he embraced emerging technology and embarked on a new photographic journey.

With a Samsung cellphone and a photo editing app, Roses become pools of lava, barren sandstone blooms with psychedelic lichen, and a black solar flare halos an enormous lapis monolith.

Rock Formations, a Red Cedar Tree, and Portraits of Roses represent three locations that are close to the artist's home and heart. Rock Formations captures the massive stone structures scattered in the high desert land-scape of the City of Rocks State Park in southern New Mexico. Stone's backyard in Silver City, NM is home to the sprawling Red Cedar that looms over his kitchen window. The luscious Red, Yellow and Green Roses, posing so patiently for their portraits, fill the flowerbeds at his home on the Rio Grande in Truth or Consequences.

Since relocating to New Mexico in 2010, Stone quickly became a respected contributor to the local art scene in Truth or Consequences, NM. A well-received solo exhibition at the Rio Bravo Fine Arts Gallery took place in December 2018 through January 2019.

The artist is a member and frequent exhibitor at Grapes Gallery, 407 Main Street in downtown Truth or Consequences, where pieces from "Dancing Colors - A Celebration in Three Parts" are on display.
