

Burrell College graduates 134 new doctors

Friday, May 5, 134 students in the Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine officially became doctors. The commencement ceremony, where students received their Doctorates of Osteopathic Medicine, took place at the Pan-American Center.

John Hummer, president of the College, delivered welcome remarks, and said, "I cannot help but recall the amazing fact that as a Class, you came into your studies just months before the arrival of a global pandemic,

where the world was filled with uncertainty and the healthcare industry was stretched beyond its limit. Medical school is an immense challenge. Tutti Bambini's mission is to help children who are challenged by poverty and/or special needs. The store provides clothing vouchers to the Welcome Baby and Day One home visiting programs and supports Community-Action-Thriving Kids and Head Start, among other organizations and programs.

Tutti Bambini also supports Asombro Institute science programs, Children's Reading Alliance, La Mesa Lions Club Dress-A-Child and a "Christmas Wish" program to provide gifts, clothes and food to needy children, the news release said. It also provides a lunch program that feeds about 110 children each day, SAR said.

Tutti Bambini welcomes donations of children's clothing and new and gently used toys. Cash donations are also welcome.

The nonprofit Tutti Bambini opened its doors in 2013. Its founder, Sister Beth, also helped found Jardin de los Niños, the Las Cruces daycare and education program for homeless and near homeless children.



Las Cruces woman on VG spaceflight

Jamila Gilbert, mission specialist for Virgin Galactic, will be included on the nest Virgin Galactic flight. Unity 25, out of Spaceport America scheduled for late Mav.

Gilbert is an artistic, multilingual graduate of New Mexico State University who studied linguistics, anthropology and studio art.

She joined the Virgin Galactic team in 2019, according to a Virgin Galactic press release. She

will be one of the first 100 women astronauts in history.

"If there's anything that equals her passion for reaching space, it's promoting her home state of New Mexico," the release said. "No one represents better than Jamila."

The mission specialists, all Virgin Galactic employees, were all selected for their diverse expertise, each bringing a different skillset to validating the VG astronaut training program and the flight experience itself, the release said.

In addition to Gilbert, mission specialists on this flight **GILBERT** include

Huie, flight sciences engineer, son of Jamaican immigrants, hailing from Florida, set to become the 19th Black astronaut in the world; Luke Mays, Virgin Galactic astronaut instructor, joined from NASA; and Beth Moses, chief astronaut instructor.

"Returning to space is

what we have all worked towards," said Mike Moses, president of Spaceline Missions and Safety for VG.

"Our mission specialists were selected for their diverse expertise. After this flight we will begin flying our customers to space."

The four specialists will be assessing the total customer experience and providing ground-based training for commercial flights.

An April 26 glide flight, Unity 24, provided data collected preparing for the Unity 25 mission.

WSMR reopens museum

After more than two years of design and refurbishing, the White Sands Missile Range Museum reopened with a flourish Thursday, May 4, as the doors of the facility opened on a journey through time.

Beginning with the natural history at White Sands, through the early human residents, battles with Apache at the Hembrillo Basin and to the Manhattan Project, early rocketry and the space program, there is enough display for several hours of wandering through history.

Guests will experience an interactive Science Technology Engineering Mathematics Center tailored to grade school educational standards. The exhibit explains complicated topics, such as how rockets work and nuclear fission.

Providing remarks and cutting the ribbon at the ceremony were U.S. Army White Sands Missile Range Garrison Commander Col. David A. Mitchell, Army Museum Enterprise Director Col. Bryan W. Hunt, and Frances F. Williams, President of the WSMR Foundation.

"As caretakers of the Tularosa Basin, we must tell the story of the rich and diverse history, so it is preserved and shared," Museum Curator Darren Court, said during the ceremony. "The Army has had a long and diverse history in New Mexico dating back to when it was part

of the northern territories of New Spain, and we hope to spark an interest in that story." Later Court expanded on the concept of the museum saying they have the responsibility to tell the story, both good and bad.

"It's not just walking through missiles, we have the responsibility to tell the story of the history that occurred in the Tularosa Basin," he said. "If the Army did something stupid, we're going to tell you they did something stupid, we don't do apologetic history."

While closed, the museum continued to modify and adjust exhibits and content including migrating the archival holdings into a new Archival Research Center.

The museum is open to the public 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily except Sundays. For more information visit wsmrmuseum.com

It started when she was at home one evening in February, and got a message from Mike Moses, president of Spaceline Missions and Safety for VG. "Can I give you a quick call?" Moses asked. "It's confidential."

As she stepped into her home office, Gilbert told

her husband, "I'm going to take a quick call from the president.

"It started like a normal conversation," she said. "Then he said, 'Jamila, are you sitting down?' I said, well I can be. Then he said, 'On behalf of Virgin Galactic I'd like to formally extend to you the role of mission specialist on our next space flight.""

Various screaming and incoherent comments ensued before Gilbert ended the call.

"Let me guess," her husband said, after hearing the yells and seeing the look on his wife's face. "You're going to space."

Now they had a big secret to keep, one VG asked to share only with immediate family, if at all. A few weeks later, at her in-laws for dinner. Gilbert's mother-in-law asked, "So, Jamila, do you have any fun trips coming up?"

She and her husband just looked at each other and smiled.

"There could not have been a better set-up," she said.

"More than anything it's just been overwhelming support from Virgin team members," Gilbert said. "Folks from across all of our locations congratulating me

and other members of our crew. It's been nothing but positivity and excitement.

"I am excited and very much looking forward to entire experience," said the former Las Cruces High School Bulldawg. "I wouldn't consider myself a thrill seeker, I'm more introspective. But I'm looking forward to every portion of the flight profile. It's going to be impactful, and I'm very much looking forward to looking at earth from above, including seeing White Sands."

Gilbert plans to put a few mementos and items in her multizippered uniform, including some New Mexico turquoise.

Gilbert expects the excitement to build each day.

"I'm just outside myself!" And soon she'll be outside the planet.

Grads: Move slow and fix things

My unsolicited advice for this year's graduates is simple: Move slow and fix things.

In 2014, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg coined the phrase, "move fast and break things" to describe the mentality of our new 20-something techsector corporate leaders who believed all human knowledge gained over the centuries had been made obsolete by quantum computing.

"The idea is that if you never break anything, you're probably not moving fast enough," Zuckerberg explained.

He expounded on the idea during a college lecture. "A lot of times people are just, like, too careful," he said. "I think it's more useful to, like, make things happen and then, like, apologize later."

Zuckerberg set out to create a website where people could share baby photos and pictures from their vacations. In moving fast to accomplish that goal, he helped to break the traditional news media in our country.

Before Facebook, the process for reporting the news had been slow and careful. Sources had

to be named and the information they provided had to be verified. Reporters would turn their stories in to editors, who would often turn them right back, demanding another source or more thorough documentation.

Facebook did away with all of that. They created a media alternative where the only thing that matters is speed. And, they made it easy for people to find stories that would confirm, and never challenge, their belief system. That has accelerated the political divide in our country that grows deeper by the day.

Facebook and other online news sites don't face the same consequences for sloppy or biased reporting as traditional media. The Communications Decency Act of 1996 includes a provision that shields them from

libel laws, as long as the inaccurate content they post came from someplace else.

Facebook is just one example of how our lives have been turned upside down by technology. Face-to-face interactions have been replaced

by Zoom meetings. Instead of meeting their potential spouse at work or social gatherings, young adults scroll through photos and make their choices based solely on physical appearance.

We are just beginning to understand the mental health consequences of teens who are addicted to social media. A study by the Journal of the American Medical Association found that teens who use social media more than three hours a day are at greater risk for mental health problems.

I recognize that advances in science and technology are helping us live longer and healthier lives. But the changes have come too fast in the last 40 years to sort out the good from the bad.

We must continue learning and advancing. But we should stop breaking things.

Afterschool learning benefits children LCPD: 'Slow down'

Amid the flurry of legislative accomplishments during the 2023 session, one piece of good news for youngsters and families that slipped under the radar was the legislature's historic appropriation of \$20 million to support new learning opportunities for youth through afterschool, summer learning, and tutoring programs. Previous years' funding was \$10 million for the 21st Century Learning Centers.

This dedicated, recurring state support for out-of-school-time education is a game-changer. It promises 20,000 New Mexico children access to learning at afterschool programs in public schools, charter schools, libraries, universities and at trusted community-based locations such as Boys & Girls Clubs. These are learning opportunities that can be life-changing, and peace of mind for hard-working families in need of support.

The new funding comes at a critical time. Too many of our children and youth are struggling today with serious issues impacting their mental health, learning, and futures. Young people are experiencing high rates of anxiety and depression. Despite heroic efforts of educators, many students are still struggling after the pandemic, and continue to be chronically absent from school.

With strong support from afterschool and summer learning, we can deliver innovative solutions that engage students in powerful and new ways.

Using this moment of fiscal strength to build a stronger, sustainable system of support for children and families will benefit generations to come.

The new investment will serve more children and youth in afterschool programs at public schools, charter schools, libraries, universities and at community-based locations such as local museums, 4-H clubs and YMCA. Children and youth in programs are exposed to perspectives and experiences they may not otherwise encounter, be it music, art and dance, coding, growing food, or building robots, which help them gain confidence and realize their potential. They have time to socialize, build relationships with peers and mentors, have a tutor, explore careers, and

gain workforce skills like teamwork, communication, and problem-solving.

The positive outcomes of quality afterschool and summer learning programs are undeniable. New Mexico State University's SOAR Evaluation and Policy Center partnered with the state Public Education Department (PED) 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) recently to conduct a statewide evaluation of nearly 8,000 students in programs. In math and English/ reading, average grades of students increased. The data also shows 89 percent of students like their program, and 90 percent of K-12 students agree afterschool teachers care about them. Participants also appreciated the opportunities for engagement in a safe

environment.

An independent report in 2019 supported by the Wallace Foundation showed afterschool and summer learning programs across the country improved a range of student outcomes, including attendance, achievement in math and English, grades, graduation rates, and overall health and fitness.

Still, too many children, especially in rural in New Mexico, have been left out for too long. Thanks to the work done during this year's legislative session, that's going to change. A stable, consistent investment in our children who are the future, and the caring out-of-school-time educators who help these children attain that future, means moving New Mexico in the right direction.

The Las Cruces Police Department is increasing the number of traffic enforcement projects that target speeding and other driving infractions, LCPD said in a news release.

Las Cruces police conducted 43 traffic enforcement projects in 2022 and saw a 67 percent increase in citations for speeding from the previous year, the news release said. Through February 2023, LCPD has conducted 17 traffic enforcement projects.

"Our officers are doing an excellent job helping to curtail speeding, and they are issuing citations when drivers are caught exceeding the posted limits," said Police Chief Miguel Dominguez. "That being said, we really need drivers to slow down, obey the posted signs and be more mindful of the consequences of speeding."

A Feb. 21 fatal crash on Lohman Avenue was believed to have been caused by teenage drivers racing each other and operating vehicles in excess of the posted speed limits, LCPD said. Police have since charged both 17-year-old drivers with vehicular homicide. Two other teens, a 17-year-old and a 19-year-old, were charged with leaving the scene of a crash that resulted in death.

In 2022, Las Cruces police issued 1,918 citations for speeding, a 67 percent increase over 2021, when 1,146 citations were issued. Through Feb. 28, LCPD had issued 384 citations in 2023.

Sonoma Elementary teacher wins national award, \$25,000 prize

Sonoma Elementary School fourth-grade teacher Christopher Nuñez has won a \$25,000 cash prize as the 2022 Milken Family Foundation Educator Award for New Mexico.

He received the award in California from Lowell Milken, awards founder and co-founder of the foundation and Michael Milken, co-founder and president of the foundation.

Nuñez was one of 35 teachers from across the United States honored with the 2022 award.

The gala celebration culminated a professional development experience for Milken Educators to "Celebrate, Elevate and Activate" K-12 teaching, the foundation said in a news release.

The first Milken Educator Awards were presented in 1987. The awards "provide public recognition and individual financial rewards to elementary and secondary school teachers, principals and specialists from around the country who are furthering excellence in education," the foundation said. "From the original cadre of 12 outstanding educators in California, the Milken Educator Network has grown to a nationwide force of more than 2,900 educators."

Here, in part, is what the Milken Family Foundation said about Nuñez:

"At the end of each day, Nuñez has students

answer exit ticket questions based on the day's learning targets and assess their own understanding of the concepts with green, yellow and red stickers. In the afterschool programs he leads, students conduct interviews and write human interest stories for Sonoma's broadcast channel. In "Reader's Theater," they read a play, rework the characters or ending, then act it out for their peers. Nuñez's students excel, growing from 70 percent to 100 percent proficient on the iReady Math assessment and ending the year with 92 percent on the Star Reading test.

"A member of Sonoma's leadership team, Nuñez championed the idea of dividing the school into six 'houses' to strengthen connections among students in different grades. Each house has a focus; Team Vision brainstorms new ideas and encourages collaboration, while Team Atlas centers on love and kindness. Nuñez leads professional development in technology and math, and he helps new staff members navigate classroom issues, content area questions and technology. He has shepherded the adoption of new textbooks as Sonoma's social studies lead and works with colleagues on data analysis and backwards planning. Nuñez participated in Harvard University's Partnership for Enhancing Mathematics, recording his lessons and working with coaches to refine his teaching practice.

During the pandemic, Nuñez went above and beyond to make sure learning was accessible for all, providing extra Zoom help for English language arts and math intervention groups and creating highly interactive lessons using breakout rooms, annotation, Jamboard, Nearpod and Canvas.

"Nuñez understands students' social-emotional needs and fosters an environment of respect and trust. He is a leader in implementing Sonoma's restorative practices, working with students to talk about and find resolutions to conflicts. Student-driven and committed to the community, Nuñez hails from a family of educators; both parents teach in Las Cruces Public Schools."

Nunez earned a bachelor's in elementary education in 2009 from New Mexico State University.

When South Central Solid Waste Authority came out to the 9th Annual Children's Water Festival, the staff explained the connection between recycling and water conservation to over one thousand fourth graders at Young Park.

"Recycling can save water through the larger process we call, Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle,' said SCSWA Recycle Education Coordinator Brandi Misquez. "The more we make an effort to reuse items, the less new things are made, and the less water is used to make those new

items."
She explained that people wonder if rinsing out items for the recycle bin, like a milk container, doesn't work against the effort of recycling.

"It's a minimal amount that we ask them to rinse to guard against contamination," she said.
"However, if residents want to focus on items that can be recycled without contamination, like corrugated

cardboard boxes

or office paper, there is no water waste associated with that."

Corrugated cardboard is an excellent source of fiber for recycling since the material is sturdier, can be easily compacted and baled for cost effective transport to processors, and once pulped can be used to make a wide variety of other end products. "There's always

the question about cereal boxes, tissue boxes, toilet paper rolls; should I recycle those?" said Misquez. "The short answer is yes, but these boxes are not corrugated cardboard, and although we

cardboard, and although we accept them for recycling, they are very low-value items because they cannot be easily remade into new items."

SCSWA staff asks residents to rinse containers that hold food, like tin and aluminum cans, to reduce contamination when the recyclables are sorted for sale. When materials are recycled, they are first separated and rinsed to remove labels, bugs, and remaining food waste. Lingering food waste can attract rodents to the recycling facility, which can be a hazard for staff and the entire recycling load.

"Las Cruces kids learned our main motto, 'When in Doubt, Throw it Out," said Misquez. "It's a lesson they can share with their parents as well."

Community members comment on NMSU chancellor selection

Bulletin reporter Mike Cook asked various community leaders, educators, NMSU faculty, elected officials and others for their thoughts about the selection of the next New Mexico State University chancellor.

Two key questions were asked, with the opportunity for follow-up:

- 1. What, in your opinion, is the single most important issue in the selection of the next NMSU chancellor?
- 2. What are the most important attributes for the next chancellor to have to successfully lead NMSU?

Here is what we received.

· Mayor Ken Miyagishima, who teaches a business class at NMSU: "Stability. We need to let the next Chancellor run the University as they were hired to do. I grew up in the area, and I have often credited former UTEP President Diana Natalicio's 25-year tenure as the reason why UTEP has developed into the great university that they are. I don't believe the Texas governor interfered with her mission to run the university. It is all about stability and providing an excellent educational experience to the students.

"Most, if not all, of our past presidents/chancellors, had the experience of leading NMSU successfully. When the governor appoints a regent; the executive must let them do their job and not interfere with their vision and ideas. We have great regents, both present and former, who, in turn, hire the president/chancellor. We need to let them guide the university and not the executive.

"I have great confidence in the selection process; I am incredibly pleased with the recent hires of the provost and deans."

• Former Las Cruces City

Councilor and author Jack Eakman: "The next chancellor of NMSU must be a BUILDER of people, programs, revenues, research, reputation, infrastructure, relationships, development, and, yes, sports. A rare combination of scholarship, high energy, communication skills, and total appreciation of the contributions of others. A proven leader at, perhaps, a Division 2 university that envisions an attainable transformation to a magnet institution. This person is probably very happy right where they are; after learning about the opportunities that NMSU, would be focused and able to enlist the community, the faculty, the student body, the staff, and potential generous donors to a collaborative, redefined mis-

think the most urgent issue facing the university right now is the failure to have prioritized academics by the previous administration. You may recall that even though they were searching for one chief executive, the previous board of regents ended up with two. They tripled the amount of money paid to NMSU's chief executive, but they did not get triple the value. Instead, the administration proceeded to hire a series of underling administrators, all of them paid six-figure salaries. At the same time, academic programs have had to go begging for new hires, tenure track faculty have been lured away by other universities that can actually pay them reasonable salaries, and NMSU faculty have workloads that are way more onerous than the standard for a research 2 university, never mind the research 1 university that we are trying to be. Moreover, the athletic programs have been a source of reputational harm that is actually ongoing, and the gutting of the OIE office has led to a proliferation of lawsuits.

"The most important attribute that the new chancellor should have is a real background in

higher ed, and a firm commitment to the research, service, and teaching missions of the university, the only reasons this university is supposed to exist. Unfortunately, however, the way that the regents seek input is weighted toward voices that have nothing to do with the actual mission of the university. I'm not sanguine about the process."

• Las Cruces icon Heather Pollard: "The single most important issue in the selection of the next NMSU chancellor is that she or he have complete communication with the faculty and a huge presence in this community. The most important attributes are honesty, fairness and transparency. It is important that community leaders have a voice in the selection process."

• State Senator and Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce CEO and President Carrie Hamblen: "I believe the next chancellor for NMSU needs to have an inherent knowledge of the relationship NMSU has with the community, the importance of prioritizing the faculty, staff, and students, as well as the ability to bring thoughtful and realistic solutions to the problems the university faces.

"NMSU has some significant issues to address and reach long standing solutions that represent the values and priorities of the university as a whole. The next chancellor needs to have the dedication to listen to the university community, work with the faculty, staff, and students, and be genuine in finding solutions that are representative of the needs of the NMSU population and the Las Cruces community.

"I would hope the selection process will be transparent, genuine in incorporating community feedback and suggestions, and realistic for what is best for NMSU, and for building positive relationships with all who are impacted and benefit from the university."

Mesilla Valley Community of Hope (MVCH) Executive Director Nicole Martinez:

"I'd be interested to hear the incoming Chancellor's thoughts on how NMSU can partner with local nonprofits on issues that affect their students and faculty as it relates to homelessness, lack of affordable housing and food insecurity."

• Former LCPS Board of Education of New Mexico Public Education Commission member Gene Gant: "The

next chancellor needs to have the innate and learned ability to be able to listen, really listen and hear, what people work at the university at all levels, the students, and the local community. These are the basic two skills that the great leaders of the past have had or have today. If the skills are not truly a part of the individual's portfolio then, in my view, that person is nothing more than an empty sounding box.

"The person needs to be able to communicate with the all the staff at all levels, students. and the local community. Poor communications between individuals and groups tends to lead to bigger and harder problems to solve. All the other skills, financial management. physical plant management, knowledge of academic requirements, etc., etc.; are of little use if the person does not have (that). The skill that should not be overlooked is the ability to work with the board of regents, listen/understand their directives within the law, and execute the directives that provides the leadership for ALL employees and students at the NMSU."

· State Rep. Angelica Rubio:

"Overall, I would hope that the chancellor will build trust with students and faculty, and that they will allow for some true relationship building moving forward. That the overall needs of the students are prioritized, and not just looking at returns on investment.

"Graduate students, especially, are in dire need of a partner

in the administration who can fight alongside them for equitable opportunities—including free tuition, at one of the best research institutions in the country, made up of our best and brightest.

"NMSU deserves a chancellor that is going to prioritize education over athletics, and whose overall goal is to become a beacon for the rest of the nation on how to properly address and eradicate abuse, assault, and harassment, (which many, including the governor, have minimized to "hazing") that has become institutionalized and cultural behavior in our athletic systems, and has absolutely no place at New Mexico State. no matter how normalized it is around the country, even if it means a period in which we halt all athletic programming until issues are properly resolved and accountability is held up accordingly."

• Business owner Ron Cavill:

"The university system is an old and cherished institution designed first and foremost to increase the quality of life for all. As NMSU steps into a new era I would hope they will be able to honor the past but also provide education that participates in and shapes the future. In short, develop useful and fulfilled citizens."

Doña Ana County Commissioner Shannon Reynolds:

"Understanding the strategic plan and direction for the school. How to grow programs and public support. Land grant colleges sometimes don't feel they need to compete with the lvy League schools and others. How do we compete?

"Energy, empathy, decreasing costs and increasing funding for students. Reach out more to the community to integrate with local organizations and government entities. There are not enough partnerships with industry. Two reasons: 1) NMSU has never understood the value of corporate partnerships with intellectual property (patents are an example). Tenured professors are happy to apply for

grants, but not as interested in finding common ground with Industries. Many complaints about universities are that they do not prepare the students at a level that Industry needs. Working closer with them can change that. The 'Capstone Project' lacks teeth and does not meet industry standards."

• Community activist Irene Oliver-Lewis: "Include all the voices of the publics that experience and are affected by the leadership decisions of the chancellor – the students, faculty/staff, community, alumni and donors – in the hiring process of.

"Creativity in problem solving and leading collaborations and partnerships; Accessibility – remember that the university leadership should practice its innovations, research, educational strategies to benefit people and not just be theory; inclusivity in hiring, decision making, long-range planning, who has a say in decisions; humor and appreciation of the joy that all things are attainable.

"The athletic scandal has to be addressed. To think that a repressive and humiliating environment was allowed to exist is saddening and criminal. Greed, arrogance and hatefulness destroyed many lives and the respect of the community."

• Las Cruces Bulletin editor and publisher Richard Coltharp: "Everything should pivot around one question: 'How do we better educate students and prepare them for life after university?'

"The next chancellor should have the ability to listen to the many important, but often competing, constituencies and sort priorities based on that vital question: 'Does this help us better educate students and prepare them for life after university?'

"The research and extension that are also part of NMSU's mission improve as well if we are led by that one question: 'How do we better educate students?'"


The logo should be simple, memorable and visually appealing, the county said, and should demonstrate "Doña Ana County's identity as a community."

State education secretary: 'Pieces are in place'

New Mexico "is poised to do some great things" in

public education, the new secretary of the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) told the Bulletin.



Grisham, replacing Kurt Steinhaus, who retired. "With his broad range of

experience as a teacher, a principal, and superintendent in districts across the state, I have full confidence that (Romero) will continue to build innovation and access for New Mexico students," Lujan Grisham said. "Dr. Romero has the vision and expertise to implement the changes our public education system needs."

"He was my first choice" (to succeed Steinhaus), said state Sen. Bill Soules, chair of the Senate Education Committee.

The legislature overwhelmingly passed House Bill 130 less than a week after Romero became NMPED secretary, increasing instructional time for most New Mexico school districts. Lujan Grisham signed it into law March 16, the day after Romero was confirmed as NMPED secretary by the state Senate.

During the session, the legislature and governor approved an average six percent raise for educators, and doubled the salary for educational assistants.

With that kind of support from the governor and legislature and "a great team" at NMPED, "All the pieces are in place,"

Romero said. "We are going to have results."

In addition to increased instruction time, Romero said he wants NMPED to base its

decisions on "accurate, reliable data," and said an upgraded data system and website will soon be in place.

He said the department also must continue to focus on the 2018 Yazzie/Martinez court ruling that mandates New Mexico provide students with a sufficient public education, including at-risk students.

Another priority,
Romero said, is addressing
the high turnover among
teachers, principals and
superintendents in New
Mexico schools. Through
better recruitment and
retention efforts, the state
can "build pipelines" to fill
teacher shortages that also
train future principals and
superintendents, he said.

The state should focus on each student's educational career from age 3-4 until he or she is ready to enter the workforce, Romero said. That means seeing the state Early Childhood Education and Care Department, NMPED and the state Higher Education Department "as an aligned entity," he said.

"It's about building relationships" among educators, administrators and legislators and the governor to "do what's best for kids," Romero said.

A parent (Romero and his wife, Amber, have four children enrolled in LCPS schools, including one who is autistic), former elementary school teacher and principal, superintendent and university regent, "now I have the opportunity to bring it all together," Romero said.

Romero, who turns 49 this month, has a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a Ph.D. in educational management and development, both from NMSU. He has a master's degree in educational leadership from the University of New Mexico. Romero maintains a home in Las Cruces.

A native of Belen (his mother taught first grade there for 25 years), Romero began his career in education as an elementary school teacher and principal in Las Cruces. He served as assistant superintendent for instruction and transformation for Roswell Independent School District before being named superintendent and CEO of Deming Public Schools. He became superintendent in Los Lunas in January 2021.

Romero was named national superintendent of the year by the Association of Latino Superintendents and Administrations in 2019 and was named 2021 administrator of the year by the New Mexico Association of Elementary Principals.

NMPED receives about 47 percent of New Mexico's annual budget and oversees the education of nearly 325,000 K-12 students in 89 school districts across the state that range in size from about 75,000 students in Albuquerque Public Schools and 25,000 in LCPS to fewer than 100 in some rural districts.

Bill increases instructional hours

House Bill 130 creates the New Mexico K-12 Plus Program, raising the minimum number of instructional hours required for elementary and secondary schools statewide. It will add an average of about 10 days of instruction in about three-quarters of New Mexico school districts and more than one-quarter of charter schools, according to an analysis by the New Mexico Legislative Education Study Committee (LESC).

HB 130 raises New Mexico to second place among six states in the region for minimum instructional hours, the LESC said. At 1,140 hours, New Mexico is behind only Texas (1,260) and ahead of Colorado (990 elementary hours/1,080 secondary hours), Oklahoma (1,080), Utah (990) and Arizona (890/720).

"Increasing the minimum hour requirement to 1,140 hours would place New Mexico among the highest hour requirements in the 50 states," the LESC said.

Las Cruces Public Schools will add 10 minutes to elementary school instructional hours to comply with HB 130, the school district said in a news release. When the 2023-24 school year begins, elementary school classes will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 2:40 p.m. Middle school classes will continue at the same length but will start and end 10 minutes later than before: 8:55 a.m. and 3:55 p.m. High school classes will continue at the same length but will start and end five minutes earlier than last school year - 8:25 a.m. and 3:25 p.m. The schedule for Rio Grande Preparatory Institute and Arrowhead Park Early College High School will remain unchanged.

"No one in New Mexico is pleased with our state's education rankings," said state Sen. Bill Soules, D-Doña Ana, chair of the Senate Education Committee and LESC. "This bill gives our educators the time to prepare great lessons and gives our students the time to learn."

Celestis Memorial looking forward to launching again

A moment of silence Monday, May 1, was unintentional as family members watched a spacebound rocket take off only to fizzle in a fiery flash and return to the ground almost immediately at the Spaceport America vertical launch area.

The people sitting on the stations at the spaceport were there to watch the ashes of their loved ones blast into space as part of the Celestis Memorial Spaceflights' Earth Rise Service. The Aurora Flight, contracted with UP Aerospace's NASA flight, would have blasted the 120 capsules holding ashes of each person into space and returned to earth, onto

the White Sands Missile Range, to be collected and returned to the families.

Those watching had invested to send husbands, fathers and friends to space including everything from physicists to science fiction lovers and fantasy gamers.

"This is our 10th mission

here at the spaceport and the 20th overall mission," said Celestis Co-Founder and CEO, Charles "Charlie" M. Chafer before the failed takeoff. "You are at the very tip of the rocket so your loved ones will get to space before anybody else."

But the May 1 glitch at takeoff was a rare one. UP

Aerospace has conducted more than 15 successful missions from Spaceport America since 2006. The remains of the deceased will be launching on the next available Earth Rise Mission, named Perseverance.

"We have full confidence that UP Aerospace will find and fix the problem and we look forward to flying again with them when they are ready," Chafer said.

The UP Aerospace flight was also carrying 13 payloads from NASA's Tech-Rise Student Challenge, according to a NASA press release. The flight "had an issue during an attempted launch out of Spaceport America in New Mexico, confirmed by launch provider UP Aerospace," the release said.

NASA's TechRise Student Challenge invites teams of sixth to 12thgrade students to design, build, and launch science and technology experiments on commercial suborbital vehicles. Thirteen of 117 total payloads selected as part of TechRise challenges were aboard this flight. NASA will work with TechRise Challenge administrator Future Engineers, UP Aerospace, and the affected student payloads to determine potential paths forward.

"NASA has been a strong supporter of commercial suborbital spaceflight for over a decade," said Christopher Baker, program executive for the Flight Opportunities program in NASA's Space Technology Mission Directorate at the agency's headquarters in Washington in the release. "Despite the collective experience of the industry, today is another reminder of the many things that must go right on any spaceflight.

"While this is obviously a disappointing outcome for today's flight, that should not diminish the work it took to get here. Each of these TechRise student teams should be proud of their accomplishment in delivering an experiment for launch and we will be working on future opportunities for them to see their experiments in space."

Four future flights carrying the remaining Tech-Rise student payloads are not impacted by this event and will fly as expected.

Every member of the team has a "strong, intentional state of mind on both sides of the ball,"


Gianna said. "I'm feeling very confident."

JOSEPH MAURICE MARLIN. 94

Joseph Maurice Marlin, 94, passed away April 30, 2023, at Memorial Medical Center, in Las Cruces, New Mexico. He made his passage from this Earth with his trademark grace and humor, surrounded by a loving family.

A man with a profoundly brilliant mind and enormous heart, Joe leaves behind a legacy that includes a love of family, jokes, and a never-ending quest for knowledge.

Joe was born January 8, 1929, in Louisville, Kentucky. He was the youngest of three children of Hattie Henrietta (Goldstein) and Nathan Harold Marlin. The family

Nathan Harold Marlin. The family moved to Birmingham, Alabama, in 1940 where Joe's father first took a job as a material control supervisor at E.I. Dupont de Nemours & Co. Nathan, a 1917 graduate of Syracuse University, would later support the family with various construction and defense-related positions.

Joe graduated from Ramsey High School in Birmingham in January 1947. A listing of high school accomplishments by his yearbook photograph quotes his ambition as "to be respectful and respected" - an intention which personified his long life.

After high school. He earned some 60 hours of credit at Birmingham Southern College before moving to Los Angeles in 1948 to attend UCLA on a full-ride Pepsi scholarship. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in physics in June 1951. A Western Union telegram delivered to him on July 6 of that year instructed him to report immediately to White Sands Proving Ground, New Mexico, (now White Sands Missile Range) for a position as a

GS-5 physicist. This would be the beginning of a 26-year career as a missile scientist at the expansive defense test range and the place where he would meet his bride and soulmate, Lorena Lee Magee.

Joe and Lorie, originally from Jacks-

boro, Texas, and later of Las Cruces, were married on Dec. 19, 1953, in a courthouse ceremony in Las Cruces. The couple would become parents to Carol Elaine, David Hattis, and Linda Ellen.

An early highlight of Joe's missile range career came in 1952 when he won the Ernie Pyle news

photo award for capturing the April 14 Nike Ajax missile intercept of a droned B-17 bomber. The citation noted his "outstanding contribution towards national defense in the field of still photography."

The photos were taken while he was an operator of an Intercept Ground Optical Recorder (IGOR), an early generation piece of instrumentation used to capture film images of missiles and rockets. He worked alongside and for other brilliant missile range pioneers including Pluto discoverer Clyde Tombaugh, optics chief Joe Gold, mathematician Harold Shoppach and manager and engineer Austin Vick. IGORs may now be seen at the White Sands Missile Range Museum and the International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo, New Mexico.

Throughout his years at the missile range, he assumed positions of increasing responsibility to include working in optical instrumentation, specializing in long focal length cameras (1951-1957), weapons system analysis and evaluation (1957-1975), reliability, availability and main-

tainability test and evaluation of weapons systems (1973-74) and culminating as Division Chief of the Test Information Systems Analysis Branch of the Army Materiel Test and Evaluation Directorate.

While working at the missile range, Joe also found time to earn a master's degree in computer science at New Mexico State University, graduating in 1975.

Following retirement from federal service in 1977, Joe assumed the role as Director of the Geothermal Operations and Research Program for the New Mexico Energy Institute and Physical Sciences Laboratory in Las Cruces. From 1982 to the early 1990s, Joe was vice president and later owner and president of Mathematical Services Incorporated. His company developed customized software for banks and credit unions, later branching out to include agricultural research applications.

More than his career, Joe was a jokester and family man. When he and Lorie were raising their children, he was an active supporter of the Boy Scouts of America, leading his son's troop on numerous outings and hikes. Joe and Lorie enjoyed square dancing for many years and were part of the local Circle 8 Club. Joe served on the board of the Community Concert program as he and Lorie enjoyed their love of music through the annual series.

In his latter retirement years, Joe was an active member of the New Horizons Orchestra, playing french horn. He was a longtime volunteer for the White Sands Historical Foundation and a member of the Doña Ana Historical Association and the Oral History Club. He enjoyed regular get-togethers with his missile range cronies and Trivial Pursuit games with

friends.

In recent years, as his physical health began to decline, but his mind remained razor sharp, his children, family and friends played hours of dominos, card, and board games almost daily with him, enjoying his cunning plays and endless stories, puns, and jokes. He annually organized the extended family's NFL football pool and was an avid Dallas Cowboys fan.

Joe is preceded in death by his wife, Lorena; parents Hattie and Nathan Marlin as well as siblings Betty (Salmanson) and Alfred Marlin.

He is survived by his children Carol McClure (Don), David Marlin, Linda Christian (Monty), 15 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

Services for Joe will be conducted May 19 at La Paz Graham's Funeral Home, 555 W. Amador Ave. in Las Cruces. The chapel will open at 9 a.m. for meditation. The memorial will start at 10 a.m. Interment follows at 11:30 a.m. at Hillcrest Memorial Gardens Cemetery, 5140 W. Picacho Ave., Las Cruces. The memorial will be streamed for those who cannot attend.

The pallbearers will be grandsons Joseph Grace, James Grace, Stephen Grace, Timothy McClure, Matthew McClure, Nathan Marlin, Cody Hill, and Brian Gunthorpe.

A lunch buffet/wake will take place immediately following at 390 E. Farney, Las Cruces. For, as Joe would want, it's all about family, friends, food and laughter.

Las Cruces artist exhibits work in Stockholm

An exhibition of the work of Las Cruces artist Virginia Maria Romero will open Saturday, May 20 at Galleri ArtSight in Stockholm, Sweden. The exhibit continues until June 4.

"Akrylmålningar, förenar traditionella tekniker och motiv från New Mexico med modern estetik," is the gallery's description of the exhibit. Translation: "Acrylic paintings, combining traditional techniques and motifs from New Mexico with modern aesthetics."

"It is a privilege to have continued international exposure with an exhibit of my work at Galleri ArtSight, located in the middle of Stockholm "gallery road," a stretch of road called Hornsgatspuckeln," Romero said." I thank Galleri ArtSight, and am honored by their invitation, support, and exhibition of my work. I am so excited for this exhibit, as it also provides an opportunity to share my paintings, which symbolize my love of wildlife, to a broader audience. This exhibit includes several of my Crossing Boundaries works that

demonstrate a universal language, which, although spoken in silence, can be heard by all who care to listen..."

"Virginia Maria Romero, a masterful artist, has left her mark on public and museum collections, as well as in numerous private collections in the United States and abroad," the gallery said. "Her art is primarily centered around New Mexico and Southwestern culture, incorporating religious iconography, Native-American imagery, and animals. To create her paintings and mixed-media work, Virginia uses traditional materials and methods.

The theme of the concert is "Migrations, A Celebration of Cultural Diversity in Music," said Frank "Pancho" Romero, emeritus professor of music at NMSU and president of the Mesilla Valley Jazz and Blues Society (MVJBS).

Music for the concert was written by Fred Sturm, former professor at the Eastman School of Music and Lawrence University, for jazz vocalist Bobby McFerrin, Romero said

"Migration, in this case, (means) bringing culture in music together from throughout the world, written in a jazz ensemble setting," Romero said.

The program includes "Didjeridu," which derives from the indigenous Aboriginal music of northern Australia; "Highlands," which is Irish fiddle music of the 1800s and bagpipe music from Scotland; "Rhythm of the Rainforest," which

incorporates a beautiful, ritualized dance melody created by the Mbuti Pygmy tribe of the Democratic Republic of the Congo; and "Rajasthan," which is an example of Gypsy (Romani) folk music from Rajasthan, India's largest state, Romero said.

Featured musicians include Jessika Brust, violin; Allan Kaplan, trombone; James Shearer, tuba; Chantal Camus, bass; and Miguel Torres, piano.

BJO is a professional jazz ensemble comprised of the region's finest jazz musicians, said Romero, who founded the orchestra in 1991.

BJO has performed with many internationally recognized jazz musicians, including Chris Vadala, John Fedchock, Hilary Smith, Bobby Shew, Clay Jenkins, Dana Landry and Pete McGuinness, he said, and members of the ensemble, mostly jazz educators, have toured

with jazz greats The Glen Miller Band, Woody Herman, Airmen of Note, Wayne Newton and Elvis Presley.

They have performed on stage with Richie Cole, Bill Watrous, Tia Fuller, The Supremes, The Temptations, The Four Tops and Sandy Hackett's Rat Pack, along with decades of jazz performances at jazz festivals and regional concerts, Romero said.

Buckinghams' horn-driven rock comes to Amador

"Kind of a Drag" was No. 1 on the Billboard chart in February 1967 and became a gold record for the Buckinghams, followed by top 10 hits "Don't You Care," "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy," "Hey Baby, They're Playing Our Song" and "Susan." 1967's "Lawdy Miss Claudy" reached No. 12.

The Buckinghams, including original band members Carl Giammarese and Nick Fortuna, will be in Las Cruces Thursday, June 8, performing those classics and more than a dozen other songs, accompanied by a 35-piece orchestra led by former Las Cruces symphony conductor Lonnie Klein.

The show begins at 8:30 p.m. at The Amador Live. 302 S. Main St.

Tickets are \$35 and are available at thebuckinghams.com and amadorlive.com.

"Everybody knows the songs," said Klein, who retired in 2021 after 21 years as director of the Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra.

"I love performing," Giammarese told the Bulletin from his Chicago home. "I am so grateful that we have such great audiences that still come out to shows. The big thing is the memories it brings to people. There's nothing more fun than concerts where you go out afterwards and sign autographs and everybody's got a story: 'You know, when you guys recorded this song, I had just met

my girlfriend,' or 'she just broke up with me.' To know you were a part of the fabric of their lives; it's a great feeling. That's what our concerts are all about. We do our hits. We do a lot of pop songs from that era."

Giammarese said The **Buckinghams** concerts also attract a lot of younger people "that can appreciate your music, music buffs or know about it from their parents or grandparents. I think we can relate to them. We're a five-piece rock band with horns. The kids today can appreciate it," he said.

"We were known for creating the pop rock horn sound - a trombonedriven horn sound," Giammarese said. "That sound pretty much con-

tinued with the group Chicago. We were friends with those guys when they were a house band in Chicago (called) The Big Thing."

Giammarese said his favorite Buckinghams song is "Don't You Care."

"That's great with an orchestra," he said.

"It's exceptional to have the opportunity to play with a full orchestra like this," he said.

Klein worked with arranger/promoter Mariano Longo of Las Vegas, Nevada to bring The Buckinghams to Las Cruces. He met with Longo earlier this year while attending a Wayne Newton concert in Las Vegas. Longo will be a part of The Amador performance, as he runs the sound board for the show. Longo was also part of the

show when Serpentine Fire performed the music of Earth, Wind and Fire with Klein conducting the orchestra that backed them up at The Amador last year.

The Amador show brings back the music of the '60s as it was originally recorded, with full symphonic backing,

Longo said.

"An orchestra was very much a part of the records," Longo said. "We're very glad to be able to recreate that as it was intended for the performances."

"It's all about having a good time; bringing back memories," Giammarese said.

Longtime NMSU stage manager, director retires

'With Mike, it was a joyous experience'

"Godspell" is the first play Mike Wise ever directed. It was 1973, and Wise was a college student pursuing a bachelor of arts degree in theatre at the University of California Santa Barbara. Ironically, "Godspell" will be the last show Wise stage manages for the New Mexico State University Theatre Arts Department. The show ends its run in May and Wise retires July 1 after more than 30 years at NMSU and with a legacy not only as an

outstanding stage manager and theatre teacher, but also as one of the best and most beloved directors in the history of local theatre.

"With Mike, it was always a joyous experience. Through his example and love of the work, it drove me to his level and (hopefully) to become a better actor," said Eric Young. Young starred in several shows Wise directed in Las Cruces, and also acted with him.

"As a director, I trust Mike implicitly," said actor David Edwards. "He is also a fine actor and El King Supremo as a stage manager and trainer of students in that important field."

Wise was born in San Jose, California, in 1952 and grew up in the Bay Area. After graduating from UCSB, Wise got his first full-time theater job as production manager for a theater company in Idaho.

When that job ended after a few months, Wise jumped in his 1964 Ford Fairlane and began "city shopping." He visited Detroit, Chicago, Minneapolis, Denver and San Diego. They were all too cold, too rainy or too big. He wound up in Seattle, where he stage managed for a number of theater companies and did a little acting.

After a decade in the Emerald City, Wise wanted "someplace a little smaller" and sunnier. He decided on Las Cruces and its 300-plus days a year of sunshine, taking a job as production stage manager in the NMSU Theatre Department in 1991.

The department "was slightly understaffed," he remembers, and he was offered a part-time teaching job. He taught theatre 101 classes and trained student stage managers, became the department photographer and did some directing and acting.

Wise is a longtime baseball fan and was an umpire for softball and for high school and AA semi-pro baseball, which he found had a lot in common with theatre. As Wise told his stage manager students: "It's 60 percent what you learn in class/ the rules of the game and 40 percent "(stuff) that just happens (on) that particular show, with that particular director, that particular cast, that particular day."


Wise left NMSU for Portland, Oregon, in 1997 for a non-theater job that lasted two years.

"I discovered that I really missed doing this," Wise said, so he returned to NMSU theatre in 1999, where he has remained for the past 24 years.

Among his favorite theatre memories are NMSU's production of "Buried Child," written by Sam Shepard. Jim Billings, "the best artistic director we ever had," Wise said, built the huge set for the production, including a 24-foot staircase.

That show "had the chops," Wise said, which is his highest compliment to a theater production.

He directed "Equivo-

cation" for NMSU in 2018, for which Billings again did the set and Deb Brunson did the costumes. The show had an outstanding cast of NMSU students and community members. It also had "a fabulous script" by Bill Cain, Wise said, which he found a little daunting.

"A script should scare you a little," he said.

Wise also has fond memories of NMSU's productions of "Holy Ghosts" and Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night," and the smaller production of "Venus and Fur," which Wise directed for lo-fi productions of Las Cruces in 2013. It starred Eric Young and Nicole (Bartlett) Conklin.

"Matilda, the Musical," which Wise directed earlier this year at Las Cruces Community Theatre, is another favorite.

"Eighty percent of directing is making up for your mistakes in casting," Wise said. "Pick the right play, the right people, the right space, show up on time – "that's theater," he said. "It's here. It's gone. It's like an instant family – intricate, intense, communal for a short period of time."

The 2004 production "Of Mice and Men" was particularly memorable because of the dog Wise rescued from the local animal shelter to be part of the cast in the play based on John Steinbeck's 1937 novella.

"Macy" was a one-yearold mongrel who had clearly been abused by a previous owner, Wise said. On stage opening night, she slipped her rope collar and wandered into the audience. Actor Eric Young looked at his fellow cast members and adlibbed the line, "Let's go get her," Wise remembers. They did, and continued on with the show. Macy continued to be Wise's companion for the next 15 years, until she died of old age in 2019.

Wise plans to remain in Las Cruces and to continue being active in local theater.

New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum (NMFRHM) will celebrate an historic tradition with the annual Blessing of the Fields procession, 10-11 a.m., Friday, May 12.

Visitors who come to the museum to participate in the procession will not be charged admission, NMFRHM said in a news release.

The procession around the museum grounds begins with the blessing of the animals, plants and acequia, the museum said. The Prayer of the Four Directions will be led by Patrick Narvaez, cacique of Corporacion de los Indigines de Nuestra Senora de Guadalupe de Tortugas and Tortugas Pueblo. Leading the procession will be Most Reverend Peter Baldacchino, bishop of the Las Cruces Diocese. Students from Las Cruces Catholic Schools will be among the participants.

The bulto carried during the procession was created by Las Cruces artist Virginia Maria Romero. It is now part of the museum's permanent collection. (Visit www.virginiamariaromero.com, scroll down and click on "Public Art"

and "San Ysidro.")

The museum will also have a plant sale as part of the festivities, including vegetables, flowers and desert plants grown in the museum's greenhouse.

This is the 23rd year the museum has hosted the procession, which focuses on a long and rich history, the news release said.

San Ysidro, patron saint of farmers, lived 1070-1130. San Ysidro was a farmworker in Spain, working in the fields for a wealthy landowner. Known as Isidore the Laborer and Isadore the Farmer, he was renowned for his devotion to God, his humility and his generosity to the less fortunate.

The story of San Ysidro has been passed down through the generations and still inspires many farmers and their families in the Mesilla Valley, the museum said. For many years, workers in San Miguel would make a pilgrimage each May, stopping at all the villages along the valley.

LCUAdministrative Assistant Jose Briones watches as people fill out the annual survey and receive their insulated swag bag as a thank you. If you missed LCU at the Farmer's Market, keep an eye out for a copy in your monthly bill.

Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) kicked off its annual effort to get feedback from customers with a morning at the Las Cruces Downtown Farmer's Market on Saturday, May 6.

"The weather was nice, so it was a busy morning with lots of people stopping by. We're thankful for those who gave up a few minutes to give us feedback. We had 163 surveys filled out," said LCU Administrative Assistant Isabel Garcia.

With only 11 questions, the survey

is a valuable tool for LCU to discover if customers know about the basic services that are provided to customers, such as safe natural gas, clean drinking water, sanitary trash and wastewater removal.

"It's also a way to get some information out to customers that lets them think about what they would do if they smelled a gas leak or if they wanted to dig a new project and hadn't considered underground utility lines," said LCU Director Adrienne L. Widmer, P.E. "We want them to also know

about ways to measure their usage with our free online service called UtilityHawk."
Quick to sign up if a customer already has an LCU account, UtilityHawk allows customers to monitor natural gas and water

natural gas and water usage along with setting alerts for their accounts. It's also a way to pay their bill. If customers prefer to fill out the survey at home, they should keep an eye out for their next bill. Those surveys can be mailed

their next bill. Those surveys can be mailed in or dropped off at one of the two Customer Central locations at City Hall or the East Mesa Customer Central location at 5195 Bataan Memorial West. For those who would like to do the survey online, in either English or Spanish, please visit:

In addition to the "typewriter petting zoo," "public acts of typing" and typewriter repairs and sales, the event


includes discovering the joys of typaos and an opportunity to show a child how to type on a vintage typewriter.

NMSU theatre students, faculty learn from choreographer

Professional intimacy coordinator Chelsea Pace returned to New Mexico State University in April to conduct workshops with Theatre Department students and faculty and help cast members prepare for roles in an upcoming production.

Pace conducted a "Consent in the Classroom" workshop for theatre faculty, worked with the cast of "Godspell" during two rehearsals and presented "Introduction to Intimacy" to theatre students at the ASNMSU Center for the Arts.

Working with directors and actors at NMSU and at theatres and with movie and television productions across the country, Pace's goal is to find and choreograph a script's intimate moments to help actors and directors tell a better story. She also guides actors to recognize their personal boundaries when it comes to portraying intimacy on stage or screen and to respect

the boundaries of other actors.

"Think about what the characters need, why they're doing what they're doing," Pace tells actors and directors. "Love, lust, joy – why is it valid to the story?"

And storytelling is important to every audience, she said.

"Humans are meaning-making creatures," Pace said. "We look for meaning."

But, in staging intimacy, Pace said, "There are no universal rules. It's really different every time."

The first step for her is to become familiar with the script she is working on – finding intimate moments that might include nudity, kissing, hugging, sexual contact, even sexual violence, and other deep connections between characters and between the actors who are portraying them.

She also gets to know the actors and director she is working with and their audience.

For example, an intimate moment might be choreographed differently on Broadway than at NMSU or at North Dakota State University in Fargo, where Pace served as assistant professor of movement and fight choreographer. And, a student actor might feel differently about how he performs an intimate scene if his parents are in the audience.

"Chelsea Pace is the preeminent authority in her field of staging intimacy, having worked on Broadway, regional theatres and on film and TV productions," said NMSU Theatre Department Head Wil Kilroy, who is directing "Godspell." "Our students were able to benefit from Chelsea's vast knowledge and skill as she taught classes and coached actors," he said.

"I am very grateful for what Chelsea Pace gave me – a language and structure to protect myself and others while making me a more reliable and dynamic actress," said Jenna Ivey, part of the cast of NMSU's 2019 production of "Silent Sky," for which Pace also provided intimacy coaching.

"I had never heard of inti-

macy education before," Ivey said, and when I learned what it was, I thought, 'This is brilliant. We need more of it.' I got to see first-hand how effective it was through the performance of my fellow actors in 'Silent Sky.' I use the concepts and language of theatrical intimacy in every film and stage performance I do to ensure a safer environment for me and my colleagues, and a better performance."

Pace's work has included studio and independent films, working with directors Ethan Cohen and George Clooney, television productions that include "The Equalizer" and "A League of Their Own" and academic and regional theatre and Broadway productions, including the Tony award-winning musical "Strange Loop."

Pace is co-founder and head faculty of Theatre Intimacy Education, "a consulting group specializing in researching, developing and teaching best practices for staging theatrical intimacy," according to chelseapace.com.



Hawks undefeated going into state quarterfinals

Mesilla Valley Christian School, competing in the A/2A division, played Jal 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 10, in a game that ended after the Bulletin's press time.

The blue coats (USGA execs) believe golf is a difficult test - really an "examination" - meant to challenge our psyche and reveal what we're made of. To some of us, all due respect, golf is a game, meant for our recreation, enjoying the outdoors and have some fun with our friends.

"Bifurcation" in golf is basically establishing dif-

ferent rules, procedures and equipment specifications for professional versus everyday recreational golfers. Then some clubs hire tennis instructors and expensive executive chefs. Tradition doesn't seem to matter anymore.

When Herb Wimberly and I were doing weekend golf schools we would invite students to share their golf goals. One guy said he would like to get better if it wouldn't lower his handicap.
