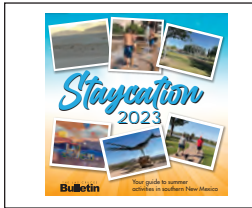


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Red, White and ...

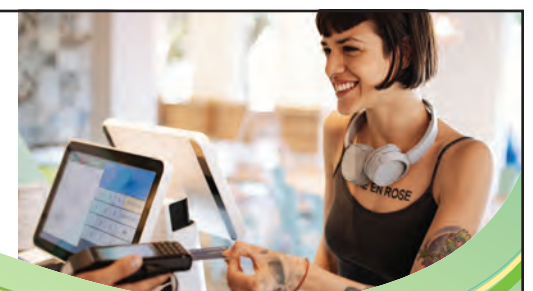

All July 4 events are at Pat and Lou Sisbarro Community Park, 3205 Arrowhead Drive on the NMSU campus. Gates open at 4 p.m. There will be a bag check, the city said. Food vendors will be on site. No grilling, personal fireworks, RVs or overnight parking will be allowed. Alcohol will be available for purchase and consumption in designated areas; no outside alcohol is allowed. Food and drinks are allowed, but no glass containers are permitted. The city recommends bringing chairs, blankets, umbrellas, sunscreen and hats.

Fireworks

Fireworks sales began June 20 in New Mexico, and the Las Cruces Fire Department (LCFD) is reminding consumers of general guidelines and safety tips for the upcoming Independence Day

holiday.

By state law, fireworks sales can continue through Thursday, July 6, LCFD said in a news release.

Fireworks allowed to be purchased and discharged within Las Cruces city limits are ground and hand-held sparking and smoking devices such as: cone fountains, crackling devices, cylindrical fountains, flitter sparklers, illuminating torches, smoke devices and wheels, the news release said.

Fireworks prohibited for possession, sale or use within city limits are aerial and ground audible devices such as: aerial spinners, helicopters, mines, missile-type rockets, Roman candles, shells, stick-type rockets, chasers and firecrackers.

Since fireworks purchased outside Las Cruces may be prohibited within the city it is advised to possess and discharge fireworks only in the jurisdiction where they were purchased, LCFD said. Rules and safety guidelines include:

- Purchase fireworks only from a licensed vendor within the municipality where they will be used.
- Fireworks may not be sold to anyone who is intoxicated or under age 16.
- Children should never use fireworks without close adult supervision.
- Keep in mind the hour of usage and be considerate of your neighbors.
- Limit use of fireworks to the outdoors, away from combustibles and only on paved or concrete surfaces or barren land. Fireworks are prohibited on land covered wholly or in part by timber, brush, grass, grain or other flammable vegetation.
- Light only one pyrotechnic at a time and move a safe distance away while it ignites.
- Follow all label directions carefully and use common sense.
- Do not manipulate or otherwise use fireworks in a way that is contrary to the manufacturer's labeling.
- Have a reliable water source,

such as a garden hose, available while discharging fireworks.

- Soak used fireworks in a bucket or tub of water and safely dispose of all spent casings and debris.
- Pet owners are encouraged to secure their dogs and cats indoors when fireworks are discharged.

LCFD said it will schedule increased patrols to target illegal use and possession of fireworks. Citations could be issued, and the confiscation of illegal fireworks is authorized. The penalty for use and/or possession of prohibited fireworks in Las Cruces can include a fine of up to \$500 and/or up to 90 days incarceration.

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'Urban heat' can raise temperatures significantly

"Heat is a health and safety risk," City of Las Cruces Sustainability Officer Lisa LaRocque told the Las Cruces City Council during its June 26 work session.

"Urban heat" – concrete and asphalt absorbing and radiating heat day and night – can increase outdoor temperatures significantly, Larocque said, "and machines and a lack of vegetation make it worse."

Asphalt temperatures can reach 140 degrees, she said, and vehicle exhausts can reach above 150 degrees, meaning some parts of the city may be experiencing significantly hotter temperatures than

others.

And because of climate change, Larocque said, maximum temperatures will continue to increase.

Currently, she said, Las Cruces experiences at least three weeks a year of temperatures higher than 100 degrees, and at least one of those weeks will see temperatures above 105 degrees. By mid-century, Larocque said, the city will have five weeks of 100-plus degree days and two weeks over 105 degrees. That will increase to 11 weeks of temperatures over 100 degrees by 2100, she said, and five weeks over 105 degrees.

Dealing with extreme heat is a particular burden for low- to moderate-income

(LMI) Las Cruces residents, she said. 50 percent of LMI homes have evaporative coolers (which, without humidity, can reduce temperatures by only about 15 degrees) or fans, 62 percent are energy burdened (spending more than six percent of total income on utilities) and 30 percent are house burdened (spending more than

30 percent of income on a mortgage or paying rent).

"A lot of people need to choose to reduce their use of utilities just to be able to make it affordable to them," Larocque said. "So, they put themselves in harm's way by not having an ambient temperature that is healthy for them."

The average age of residential buildings in Las Cruces is 46 years, she said, which means many have inefficient cooling equipment.

The city needs to take a more proactive approach to heat events, Larocque said, focusing on prevention instead of treating them as they occur. Changes could include requiring cooling reflective sealants on bike lanes and roads, highly reflective "cool roofs" and increasing the city's tree canopy.

Casa for a Cause breaks ground on house

On a hot June 21 morning in northeast Las Cruces, homebuilders, friends and dignitaries broke ground for the 6th Annual Casa for a Cause, formerly known as the Anniversary House, built this year by French Brothers.

The project began in 2014 to commemorate the Las Cruces Home Builders Association's 55th anniversary. The Hakes Brothers and members of the LCHBA built a home with as many reduced expenses as possible, as several vendors provided their goods and services at cost or donated them.

Once the house was sold, profits were divided and distributed to local charities and nonprofit groups. That first year,

the sale of the house was enough to put \$64,000 back into the community.

Following the Hakes Brothers' home, in 2015, Veloz Homes' Anniversary House gave back \$82,000. In 2017, the Anniversary House built by Arista Development gave back \$74,000; Desert View Homes in 2019, raised \$125,000; and last year in 2022, JMS Construction raised \$63,000. In total, members of the LCHBA have given back \$408,000 to the community and started an LCHBA Aggie Builder Endowed Scholarship at NMSU.

Jason Kipker of French Brothers was one of the speakers at the June 21 groundbreaking and said his organization has set goal of \$126,000, which would break Desert

View's previous record by \$1,000.

The official groundbreaking was presided by the LCHBA and the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce

and included Las Cruces Mayor Ken Miyagishima.

America at 247: Connect or divide?

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

— Preamble to the Constitution, 1787

In Mrs. Schlesinger's sixth-grade speech class at Francis Scott Key Elementary School in Tulsa, Oklahoma, we had to memorize and recite, on stage, the preamble. I nailed it, and was pretty proud, but looking at it now, seeing it's only 52 words, maybe it wasn't such a feat.

However, I definitely did better than Barney Fife on the old Andy Griffith Show. If you want a good chuckle, go look up Barney Fife Preamble and watch the 4-minute video. Don Knotts, who played

Barney, was a genius.

The preamble talks about union, and domestic tranquility, things our country is struggling with right now. I've debated with myself about the "common defense" part. I tend to think it means a world of things besides just military defense. And the "general welfare" — I don't think that refers only to economic factors. I like to think it includes what was discussed in the Declaration of Inde-

pendence, namely "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

Our framers were smart enough to realize nothing can guarantee happiness itself, but at least we should be able to try, they reasoned.

Periodically, in the years since sixth grade, I'll re-read the preamble, as well as different parts of the Constitution. It can be uplifting and encouraging. It can also be frustrating and confusing.

Our Constitution is a bit like

the Bible; people interpret it to fit their own purposes and desires. In the case of either document, people who are trained, lifelong scholars of their words will debate to the death on the meaning of those words.

My favorite words are the First Amendment: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

I like that it's Government saying what Government CAN'T do, and what the people CAN do. It seems a lot of governments right now in America are debating what people CAN'T do. Maybe they should go back to the preamble and review "secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity."

My house is about a mile from U.S. Hwy. 70, and from that distance, I occasionally hear the

whine of diesel engines, as semis groan eastward up the grade toward the San Augustin Pass.

Those bursts, as well as the murmur of other traffic on the highway give me comfort. These highways, to me, are the veins of America, coursing with life. They represent connectivity. They connect commerce. They connect family and friends. They connect needed help. They connect life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. They occasionally connect death.

In today's America, we have more and faster ways to connect than ever before. It's in our basic human instinct to want to connect with other human beings. Unfortunately, it's also in our basic instinct to divide and create conflict. That instinct is usually driven by our own fears.

It feels like America's at a crossroads in 2023, these 247 years after our great experiment.

Do we want division or do we want connection? That's for you, that's for us, to decide.

Let next council pick police chief

The retirement of Las Cruces Police Chief Miguel Dominguez will not end the effort to create a civilian police review board. A petition drive seeking to force that issue has already been started; it will undoubtedly be a topic candidates will be asked to address during the November municipal election, when the mayor and three council seats will be on the ballot.

But Dominguez' retirement today will give the City Council an opportunity to make changes from the top to address the concerns of those clamoring for a civilian review board.

Dominguez is rightfully credited for his efforts to increase the number of officers serving on the force. But actions by his officers

have resulted in the loss of life and cost the city millions of dollars in legal settlements.

The family of Antonio Valenzuela settled their case for \$6.5 million after he died in a police choke hold, allowed at the time. The family of Amelia Baca settled for \$2.75 million after a call for help in a mental health crisis was answered with fatal gunshots.

The local chapter of the NAACP has called for a federal investigation into what it alleges is a practice of excessive use of force against minorities.

To be clear, those concerned about police use of force won't be the only ones weighing in during

the municipal election. Others are equally concerned about a rise in property crimes that has made our city a more dangerous, less desirable place to live. They argue police need to be supported as they take the lead in addressing these problems.

The new police chief will need to be able to address both of those competing priorities.

The current City Council, mayor and city manager likely diverge on which priorities should come first. Which is why they should not make that decision.

The city should promote from within to appoint an interim chief who is well known and re-

spected and can ensure stability until a new chief is named. And, they should begin the process of seeking applications from leaders in law enforcement from throughout the country.

The final decision should be made by the new mayor and new City Council that takes office in January after the Nov. 7 election.

That would give voters the chance to weigh in by selecting candidates who are more aligned with their position. Just as important, it will give the new City Council the opportunity to select a police chief who reflects their values and is committed to achieving the same goals.

LCU Regulatory Compliance: Keeping Customers & Our Environment Safe

Balancing a career that touched on both federal and state agencies and private industry, Steven Perez is bringing his experience to Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) as its new Regulatory Compliance Analyst. However, he's already had a stint in Las Cruces, graduating from New Mexico State University with a degree in Environmental Science and minoring in soil science.

"I liked soil science and the place to be for soil sciences is the Department of Agriculture and the Natural Resource Conservation Service, where I started as an intern for two summers. My career evolved from there," said Perez.

Perez then went into private environmental consulting working on soil and groundwater remediation projects. "I helped clean up and reclaim contaminated sites in the Permian Basin with oil companies," he said. He explained that environmental consulting is a small

world, and when he and his wife had their first child and moved back to Las Cruces to be closer to family, he knew others who suggested LCU as his next opportunity.

"Working for Utilities gives you a unique opportunity for multi-disciplinary experiences. You get to work with people specializing in providing services that include natural gas, solid waste, drinking water, wastewater, and manage the environmental compliance aspects of the different programs," said Perez. "I am excited to bring my consulting background and integrate that with my public service background to really help out."

Perez explained also that he would be the contact for environmental consultants and subcontractors within LCU, reviewing current permits and assuring compliance deadlines are met.

"I can review work plans and make sense

of it all and see if there's something that we should not question the consultant for like an unnecessary charge," said Perez. "Or, even within our facilities if a wastewater treatment facility needs to shut down for repairs or something, we must notify the state. I'm the liaison that interfaces between our facilities and the regulatory

authorities." "We have a responsibility to the community to keep them safe, protect our environment, and stay in compliance with state and federal regulations," said Perez. "Overall, New Mexico makes a great effort to ensure the safety of their residents and that's part of my responsibility at LCU."

Spaceport Cup: Recruiters flock to rocketeers

The winners have been named, the students are home, dusty but happy with the experience of the 2023 Spaceport America Cup where whether they earned awards or not, they learned and made long-term connections.

It's all about teamwork, said Cliff Olmsted, president of the Experimental Sounding Rocket Association (ESRA), the organizing entity for the cup. Not only do the collegiate students need to have the engineering skills to assemble their rockets, they also must address a lot of other logistics just to arrive in New Mexico.

"They are learning all the disciplines," Olmsted

said. "To be able to travel here with a rocket, not only do you have to accomplish the engineering feat, you also have to understand the business, logistics, fundraising – all those kinds of things – so it all comes together because we only have one week."

Olmsted said with teams arriving from, Malaysia, Australia, Taiwan, Turkey, Egypt, India, Mexico, Canada and across the United States, the students gain new experience.

"With everybody together you get that passion and the energy around the excitement of what they are doing," Olmsted said, "and not just with one team but with over a hundred teams."

About 116 teams and approximately 1,550 students

— more than ever — came to Las Cruces and Spaceport America to participate in the event. Spaceport America Director Scott McLaughlin, said the total cost to put on the event is about \$400,000 and last year, when there were less than 100 teams participating, the economic impact was around \$1.5 million.

Not only do students flow into the community for the week, there are judges and recruiters for companies such as Blue Origin and Virgin Galactic who are also sponsors.

"We had 30 sponsors, and they are all recruiting," McLaughlin said. "I've heard some of these companies say this is their number one recruiting event of the year. Otherwise, they have to travel to

smaller events or just one school to recruit."

Bill Hanson with ESRA was the head of competitions operations this year. He was responsible for rules and judging. He said there were 50 judges from all over the country on the job this year.

"Los Alamos sent us 10 judges," he said. "We get them from sponsors – Sandia Labs, NASA, Virgin Galactic – also just regular local people."

There are detailed score rubrics in place to use for the judging.

"In the technical reports we are looking that the

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Remaking a 120-year-old home in Mesilla

DIY FYI: From demo to reno

Joe and Elaine Foster sold their 4,200-square-foot house in Talavera last fall and bought a 900-square-foot home in Mesilla which they have spent the last nine months renovating.

Built about 1900, it was originally part of the house next door, Joe Foster said. It was separated into its own property and has had three additions, all with different floors and ceilings. Joe and Elaine have lived there since they bought it, and the renovations are almost complete, as Joe has almost single-handedly converted an historic Mesilla home into a modern, comfortable living space while preserving its original look and feel as much as possible.

Joe tore out and replaced the kitchen, added a colorful tin-look ceiling in the dining room and rebuilt the fireplace, using river rock and clay pots. He removed the sheetrock ceilings throughout the house to expose the antique beams.

Joe took the floors “down to the dirt” in a couple of rooms, pouring cement foundations and preserving original wood floors. He replaced a dilapidated window in the dining room with French doors and installed a new bedroom window. Hardwood and granite kitchen cabinets were handmade in

Chihuahua, Mexico, from Joe’s design. He even made the mesquite tables and the cutting board that hangs on the kitchen wall.

Joe discovered wood trim around the tops of the walls when the ceiling came out, and kept that, using the trough it created to hide wiring for track lighting. He added old cedar beams rescued from a nearby yard and from C & D Southwest Lumber to maintain the house’s authentic look, including exposed adobe walls.

Some of the lumber comes from Oregon and was cut from trees that had died of fungus. The cedar kept the fungus from penetrating deep into the wood, but it still created a stylish pattern.

The bedroom set was

handmade in Sunland Park by the same furniture maker who supplied the home’s antique doors and front gate.

Most of the furniture and art Joe and Elaine have added to the house is antique or authentic to the décor. The kitchen contains a high-tech stove and microwave – “We wanted this place to be a cook’s delight,” Joe said – but you won’t find a television or a clock in the house.

As renovations to the house and property near completion, “We’re ecstatic,” Joe said. “It’s livable now.”

The key has been patience, he said, “not being rushed, taking your time and trying to be artistic.”

Elaine continues her psychology practice at her

nearby office and is an adjunct professor at New Mexico State University. Joe retired five years ago after a career as a rocket scientist at White Sands Missile Range, developing missile systems for special forces, including the United States Navy Seals and U.S. Army Rangers. Much of the work Foster did was top secret, he said.

Joe is the author of “The BiniSphere,” a techno thriller, and he and Elaine co-wrote “I Wish I Knew This Before My Divorce: Ending the Battle Between Holding On and Letting Go” and “In Movement There Is Peace: Stumbling Along the Way to the Spirit,” about their backpacking trip down the Camino de Santiago in Spain.

New state laws now in effect

BULLETIN REPORT

A number of bills passed by the 2023 New Mexico Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham went into effect June 16, the governor's office said in a news release.

New laws include:

Healthcare

- Rural Health Care Delivery (Senate Bill 7): Provides \$80 million to support rural healthcare delivery in areas of New Mexico often underserved by available health care options.

- Create Health Care Authority Department (SB 16): Establishes a single unified department responsible for healthcare purchasing, regulation and policy that provides a foundation for management and oversight of healthcare.

- Cost Sharing Contributions for Prescriptions (SB 51): A consumer protection bill that is the result of the Prescription Drug Taskforce who studied the increasing cost of prescription drugs.

- Medical Malpractice Changes (SB 521): Amends the Medical Malpractice Act to cap claims for

independent healthcare facilities such as urgent care, ambulatory surgical centers and free-standing emergency rooms that are not hospital controlled.

Public safety

- Purchase of Firearms for Another (House Bill 306): Makes it a felony to purchase a firearm for someone who is legally prohibited from possessing one or who intends to use the firearm to commit a crime. Bill sponsors included Rep. Raymundo Lara, D-Doña Ana.

- Robbery and Organized Retail Crime (HB 234): Creates the crime of organized retail crime, allowing for the aggregation of multiple retail theft crimes over a period of time to target repeat offenders.

- Catalytic Converter Sales Records (SB 133): Requires secondhand metal dealers who purchase or receive catalytic converters to keep records that include the seller's information and legal documentation that demonstrates their ownership of the catalytic converter.

Reproductive rights

- Reproductive Health Provider Protections (SB

13): Codifies the protections outlined in Lujan Grisham's August 2022 executive order, including prohibiting entities within the state from sharing patient information related to reproductive healthcare for New Mexico patients and providers. It also prohibits public bodies from restricting access to abortion and gender-affirming health care.

- The Reproductive and Gender-Affirming Health Care Act (HB 7): Prohibits public bodies, including local municipalities, from denying, restricting or discriminating against an individual's right to use or refuse reproductive healthcare or healthcare related to gender.

Voting rights

- Voting Rights Protections (HB 4): Enacts the first-in-the-nation Native American Voting Rights Act allowing Indian nations, tribes and pueblos to amend their request for voting locations and to apply for secured ballot drop boxes and allows electors to use government buildings as their mailing address. The legislation also automatically registers voters at a motor vehicle department or other local public office designated by the secretary of state, restores the right to vote of previously incarcerated individuals upon their release from custody, creates a voluntary permanent absentee voter list, prohibits the transfer or publication of voter data online, mandates same-day voter registration at all polling places and mandates at least two monitored secure ballot drop boxes per county. Lara was also a sponsor of this bill.

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Sierra County day trips

The Old West comes alive

Venture off Interstate 25 about an hour north of Las Cruces and you will truly take a step back in time.

The small communities and ghost towns that surround Truth or Consequences offer a gold mine of the Old West and make up some of the most amazing and historically significant day trips you will ever take.

To cover northern Sierra County, start in T or C and travel northwest to Placita (San Lorenzo Catholic Church, old schoolhouse) and Monticello (San Ignacio Catholic Church; historic plaza, with some of its original adobe walls still intact; cemetery), then on to Cuchillo (Old Cuchillo Bar and Hotel, an 1850s stage stop; San Jose Catholic Church) Winston (Winston General Store, old schoolhouse) and Chloride (Pioneer Store Museum, RV park, two historic cemeteries, the old hanging tree in the center of town).

For southern Sierra County, travel from T or C south to Hillsboro (restaurants and stores), Kingston (Black Range Lodge Bed and Breakfast; Percha Bank Museum; Kingston Cemetery; remnants of the oldest (1927) steel truss bridge in New Mexico) and Lake Valley (three-quarter mile walking tour of a real ghost town, old school house, Lake Valley Cemetery, St. Columba Episcopal Chap-

el), or you can go from Las Cruces north to Lake Valley, and then on to Hillsboro and Kingston.

Placita and Monticello were settled in the 1840s and '50s. Monticello was headquarters for the Southern Apache Agency at one time. The first postmaster, Aristide Bourguet, named the town for the home of Thomas Jefferson.

Cuchillo was established by ranchers and farmers in the 1850s and flourished as a stage stop and trade center. San Jose Catholic Church was rebuilt for the third time in 1907.

Winston, originally named Fairview, was settled by miners in 1880-81.

Englishman Harry Pye, a mule skinner and prospector, was delivering freight for the U.S. Army from Hillsboro to Camp Ojo Caliente in 1879 when he discovered silver in the canyon where Chloride is now located. He staked a claim in 1881 and the town was born. It would grow to more than 3,000 people, including eight saloons and three general stores.

Engle is 17 miles west of T or C via New Mexico Highway 51. It was built in 1879 as a station on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad, and several old buildings are still standing.



Hillsboro was founded in 1877 when two prospectors found gold on the east side of the Mimbres Mountains along Percha Creek. They staked out the Opportunity and the Ready Pay mines, with the Rattlesnake and the Bonanza coming soon after.

Kingston was founded in 1882 when miner Jack Sheddon discovered a rich load of silver ore at what would become one of the Southwest's most famous mines: The Solitaire. The population peaked at more than 7,000 in the mining boom of the 1880s and '90s, as some \$7 million in silver was extracted from the Black Range Mining District. One of the wildest towns in the Wild West, Kingston had 22 saloons, gambling halls and three newspapers. Visitors included Mark Twain, President Grover Cleveland and Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. Kingston is home to the Spit and Whittle Club, the country's

oldest social club.

Lake Valley was founded with the discovery of silver in 1878 and moved twice before settling in its current location in 1882. The Bridal Chamber Mine was discovered that year, a subterranean mine lined with silver so pure it was shipped unsmelted to the mint. Lake Valley grew to 4,000 people and included 12 saloons. The 1893 silver panic wiped it out, and a fire destroyed main street two years later.

You will also find placenames in the area that include Gold Dust, Chise, Grafton and Zapata, along with San Miguel, whose historic Catholic church is shaped like a coffin.

Hot springs abound in T or C

Bulletin report

Before Ralph Edwards changed its name in 1950, Truth or Consequences was Hot Springs, and for a good reason.

There were about 40 hot springs spas in the town before World War II. Today, there are about a dozen

Here is what the Sierra County New Mexico website has to say about T or C's hot springs:

"The hot thermal water flows out of a rift along the Rio Grande that appeared more than 50 million years ago. The rift uplifted Truth or Consequences' landmark hill, and faults along the rift allow deep groundwater to flow freely to the surface without losing heat or minerals, producing pristine waters with temperatures ranging from 98 to 115 degrees, with trace elements of 38 different minerals. The pH of the water is 7, or neutral.

"With almost 2,700 parts per million of assorted minerals, these thermal springs constitute some of the most heavily mineralized water in the United States. The continually flowing waters also have two important and unique features: 1) The water has no unpleasant odor; and 2) The

single largest ingredient in the water is chloride, a naturally occurring germ killer that sterilizes the skin and ensures the purity of the water.

"During the late 1800s, while neighboring areas like Kingston and Chloride were experiencing the gold and silver rush, the hot springs were visited by more and more people and the area became known as "Palomas Hot Springs." The first generation of bath houses were actually tents, and a soak entailed laying in the hot mud and slathering it all over oneself; doing so was thought to cure rheumatism.

"The event that changed the area forever was the construction of Elephant Butte Dam between 1911 and 1916. Liquor and gambling were outlawed at the construction site, but establishments in the hot springs settlement five miles away offered both - and in abundance. The population grew rapidly, and the town was incorporated in 1916.

"Once the dam was completed, the flow of the river was altered such that more land could be claimed from the flood plain, allowing for stick frame bathhouses to be built in what had been swamp. Wells were sunk into the aquifer, allowing clear spring water to flow."

Escape for the Day to the Zoo

Alamogordo boasts oldest zoo in state

W e often take for granted how Las Cruces is in close proximity to several great day trips. With summer here, the open road offers opportunity any day of the week to find enjoyment.

On a recent sunny Tuesday afternoon, we loaded up the car and headed on a cruise to the zoo. In just over 60 minutes from Las Cruces is the Alameda Park Zoo, located in Alamogordo. Alameda Park is the oldest zoo in the state and was founded in 1898.

Guests enter via the gift shop to pay admission and get a chance to view the stuffed-animal versions of some of the live residents of the park.

Walking through the 12-acre property, guests encounter several different animals that call Alameda Park Zoo home. On our walk, we saw lemurs, owls, bears, a camel and several confident peacocks.

Close to the turkey vultures and raven, was a sassy bobcat ready for her lunch. Near the bobcat was an exhibit for raccoons lounging among the trees. Neighbors to the raccoons were the river otters, who were having a joyful day swimming and playing what seemed to be a game of tag.

An exhibit that features a lot of character is the Walk-Through Aviary. Housed in an enclosed stand-alone building, the Walk-Through Aviary has 10 different animals, including eight species of birds, ducks, fish and turtles.

You enter the aviary through a secure double door. Trees provide shade and paint a backdrop of serene nature. There is a bridge over the pond that has koi fish.

Turtles take in the sun on the moist rocks and as ducks nest nearby.

Watching the white peacocks walk by and quails scurry is really a sight to see considering all of these different types of animals coexist.

“For any exhibit, we will research diets, climates, prey/predator, and compatibility of animals,” said Kate Rogers, zoo manager.

Rogers explained that she believed the aviary was completed in 2014; the Alamogordo Friends of the Zoo donated a project. “Alamogordo Friends of the Zoo started while Bud

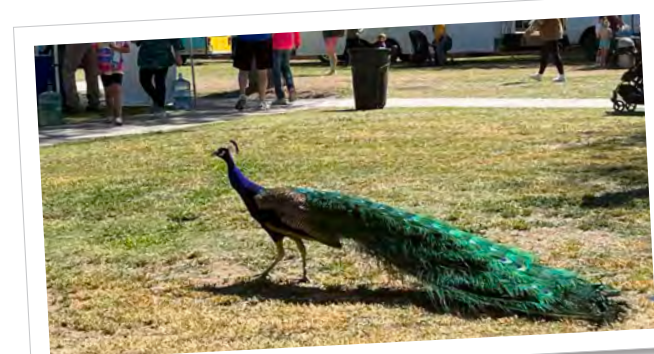

Wiser was the zoo manager back in the 1980s. The group has been active until 2023,” she said.

Observing the animals in the aviary was truly relaxing. Watching the small yellow Taveta Golden-weaver find twigs to weave its nest in the trees.

Rogers said the zoo has great support from the community and Alamogordo city management.

“This support is allowing us to provide better care to the animals, staff, and guest experience,” she said. “We are a small zoo providing the public the opportunity to see different animals in their natural environment. We are growing and improving the facility all the time.”

The Alameda Park Zoo is at 1021 N. White Sands Blvd. (U.S. 70) in Alamogordo. The zoo is open daily from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Last entry is at 4:30 p.m. Admission for children 4 and under is free, children 5-12 is \$2.50, guests 13-59 are \$4, seniors (60+) \$2.50 and active/retired military members are \$2.50. WSMR museum reopens after redesign

After more than two years of design and refurbishing work, the White Sands Missile Range Museum has reopened with a flourish. In May 2023, the doors of the completely renovated facility opened on a journey through time.

Beginning with the natural history at White Sands, through the early human residents, battles with Apache at the Hembrillo Basin and through to the Manhattan Project, early rocketry and the space program there is enough information and display for several hours of wandering through history.

Guests will also experience an interactive Science Technology Engineering Mathematics Center tailored to grade school educational standards. The exhibit has twice as much text than other larger museums due to the nature of the topics covered, such as how rockets work and nuclear fission.

Providing remarks and cutting the ribbon at the ceremony were U.S. Army White Sands Missile Range Garrison Commander Col. David A. Mitchell, Army Museum Enterprise Director Col. Bryan W. Hunt, and Frances F. Williams, President of the WSMR Foundation.

“As caretakers of the Tularosa Basin, we must tell the

story of the rich and diverse history, so it is preserved and shared,” Museum Curator Darren Court, said during the ceremony. “The Army has had a long and diverse history in New Mexico dating back to when it was part of the northern territories of New Spain, and we hope to spark an interest in that story.”

Later Court expanded on the concept of the museum saying they have the responsibility to tell the story, both good and bad.

“It’s not just walking through missiles, we have the responsibility to tell the story of the history that occurred in the Tularosa Basin,” he said. “If the Army did something stupid, we’re going to tell you they did something stupid, we don’t do apologetic history.”

While closed, the Museum continued to modify and adjust exhibits and content including migrating the archival holdings into a new Archival Research Center.

The museum is open to the public 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily except for Sundays.

These trails include the Mesilla Drain Trail between the Outfall Channel Trail and Burn Lake (2.5 miles), the Armijo Lateral Trail between the Outfall Channel Trail and Burn Lake (three miles) and the Las Cruces Lateral Trail between the Outfall Channel Trail and Spruce Avenue near the Las Cruces Police Station and Fire Station #1 (1.5 miles).

These trails are in addition to other trails managed by the City Parks and Recreation Department; Triviz Drive Multi-Use Trail (4.5 miles) between the NMSU main campus and Kohls, the Outfall Channel Trail (4.3 miles) between Kohls and the river and the La Llorona/Rio Grande Trail (4.6 miles) connecting the Outfall Channel Trail with the Town of Mesilla.

Other trails within the city trail system include Alameda Arroyo Trail (0.7 miles) near Camino Real Middle School, Legends West Trails (1.2 miles) throughout the Legends West neighborhoods and the Twin Parks

Trail (0.9 miles) on Engler Avenue between Mesa Drive and Jornada Drive.

The new trails in the city's system expand the recreational trail system within the city limits from over 19 miles in length to over 26 miles in length.

Upcoming city recreational trail projects include more Las Cruces lateral trails between NMSU main campus and Las Cruces High School and also connecting NMSU main campus to the Village of Tortugas.

Additional trails programming in the planning stages includes mountain bike trails in the vicinity of the East Mesa Public Recreation Complex. Also, the city is completing a park and trail wayfinding plan that will guide the placement and visual appeal of a comprehensive wayfinding sign system that will help guide park and trail users to destinations and routes that are accessible to pedestrians and bicyclists.

The Parks and Recreation Department trail system de-

velopment is guided by the master plan which outlines our community's goal to provide a system of multi-use trails that support residents' and visitors' fitness, recreation and transportation needs while linking community destinations such as parks, open space, schools and other community activity centers. This goal is consistent with the city's Active Transportation Plan.

Fort Selden was spark for historical society

The Doña Ana County Historical Society (DACHS) was formed in 1963 to help preserve historic Fort Selden. That preservation effort consumed the first 10 years of DACHS' existence, culminating in Fort Selden becoming a state historic site in 1973.

This year, DACHS and Fort Selden are again joining forces, to celebrate DACHS' 60th anniversary and Fort Selden's 50th at "Celebrating the Past, Looking to the Future," Saturday, July 1, at Fort Selden Historic Site.

DACHS began Sept. 26, 1963, as a group of local history buffs met with Victor Westphall, president of the Historical Society of New Mexico, to establish a chapter of the society in Doña Ana County, accord-

ing to "Doña Ana County Historical Society 1963-1994," by Madeleine Vessel.

The local group had two goals: an urgent one "to save Fort Selden ... which was suffering from the effects of vandalism and decay," Vessel said, and in the longer term, "to preserve the history and culture of Doña Ana County."

Louis E. Freudenthal became the society's first president; George Adlai Feather was vice president; J. Paul Taylor was recording secretary; Thomas Branigan Memorial Library Director Helen Caffey was secretary; and former NMSU President, U.S.

Army Gen. and undersecretary of the Army Hugh Milton II was treasurer.

Fort Selden closed in 1890 and the post reverted to the public domain. It was acquired by Harry H. Bailey in 1926, and de-

terioration was evident. Harry Bailey's son, Harry N. Bailey, donated the fort to the state in 1963. A bill introduced by state Sen. Frank Papen of Las Cruces in 1963 created Fort Selden State Park, but the site was not officially transferred to state ownership until 1969.

Ground was broken for the Fort Selden visitors center July 4, 1973, with DACHS President Louise Garrett opening the program. The visitors center opened Aug. 25, 1974, and Fort Selden was formally dedicated as a state monument Feb. 21, 1976.

DACHS was also involved in preserving Fort Fillmore, built near Mesilla in 1854. The fort was placed on the national register of historic places in 1974. DACHS has also been involved in saving and preserving many historic buildings in Las Cruces, including the Nestor Armijo house, now the home of the Greater Las Cruces Chamber of Commerce, and the Amador Hotel.

DACHS began its historical collection in 1963. Its first artifacts were 100-year-old cannon balls

from Fort Selden, and post office boxes from the original Las Cruces Post Office. It also acquired a historic farm wagon, doctor's buggy and a stagecoach from 1881.

DACHS has been involved in marking historic sites throughout the county, including the site of former county sheriff Pat Garrett's murder, which took place Feb. 29, 1908, east of Las Cruces.

The society has published county history in a variety of documents and created the Southern New Mexico Historical Review.

In addition to Freudenthal and Garrett, DACHS presidents have included J. Paul Taylor, Opal Lee Priestley, Austin Hoover, Donna Eichstaedt and George Helfrich.

"I have enormous respect and admiration for the vision and efforts of the founders of the society," Helfrich told the Bulletin. "In particular, I value the friendship and advice of Paul Taylor over the years in his long support of DACHS and its goal of retaining our region's history and culture."

DACHS has led field trips and conducted programs on local history at its monthly meetings. The first field trip, in 1964, was to Fort Selden, Rodey and Rincon. Other field trips included Santa Fe, Lincoln, Columbus and Hillsboro.

DACHS has honored individuals, organizations and properties during its annual banquet awards. It created a hall of fame to recognize "exceptional contribution to preservation of the history and culture of the Mesilla Valley," Vessel said. Milton, Caffey, Taylor, Freudenthal and Priestley have been joined in the DACHS Hall of Fame by internationally recognized agriculture pioneer Fabian Garcia, the Cox family, Pat Beckett (founder of COAS Books), NMSU professor and historian Ray Sadler and others.

"For 60 years, DACHS has played an important role in this community

by fostering interest in our region's history," said DACHS President Dennis Daily, head of the NMSU Archives and Special Collections Department. "The society has worked to recognize and preserve physical sites and structures of cultural significance, such as the Armijo home, the Amador Hotel, and Fort Selden, but just as importantly, has disseminated the stories of the people and events that have shaped this area through our programs and publications."

"It is nice to belong to an organization with a history of saving the area's heritage but also discouraging that, in today's world, so few people are willing to step forward and help," said DACHS Secretary Jim Eckles, a local historian who worked in the White Sands Missile Range public affairs office for more than 30 years.

125 years of NM film history

- The first film made in New Mexico was shot 15 years before statehood, according to the New Mexico Film Office (NMFO). The 38-second film, “Indian Day School,” was filmed at Isleta Pueblo in 1897, NMFO said. It was produced by Thomas Edison and released the next year. See footage and a still from the movie at dev.newmexicohistory.org/filedetails.php?fileID=324.
- The first film shot in Las Cruces may have been “Mexican Border Defenders,” which dates to 1911 and was produced by Powers Motion Picture Company of New York City, according to NMFO. The film was also shot in Alamogordo and on the Cox Ranch near Organ. That same company also filmed “The Dude” in 1911 on the Cox Ranch, NMFO’s website said.

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Review: Falling out of the box with 'RAW' exhibit

"For all those who been through hell and back, but have no means to express themselves, they will look at my work and breathe a sigh of relief." – Sonya Fe artist statement

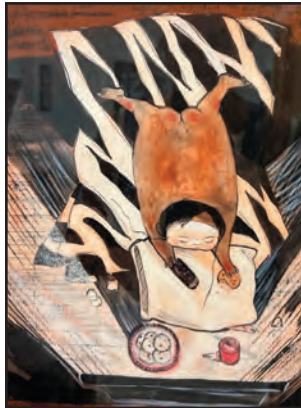

At the Doña Ana Arts Council Gallery, international artist and Las Cruces resident Sonya Fe has literally put her whole self into her paintings in a daring exhibit of art she has never shown before.

Because of its graphic content, this exhibit is not for the faint of heart, and parents should be aware before taking their children. Fe addresses issues relating to abuse, aging, child trafficking, depres-

sion and more in graphic and beautiful drawings.

The show, entitled "RAW," reflects some hard truths in the world. Each piece deserves to be gazed at and dissected for its layers. Pieces like "My

Broken Heart" and "We Should Learn to Like Our Periods, Dogs Do," encompass both beauty and pain in a way that can cause a gut reaction.

Questions come to mind easily, and answers do not. Why do so many of Fe's figures wear masks? What kind of masks do they wear? Why are the women sometimes falling apart like mannequins? Why are many of the men depicted as skeletons?

More than one of the drawings have dogs in them, and more than one includes Fe's own son. Some are simple in nature and, to me, some of these are the most heart-wrenching. "Don't Leave Me," has two children side by side, clinging to one another, pressing into one another and it's easy

to see them as siblings who will be torn apart in the next moment. "My Baby Sitter Was Bigger Than the Moon," depicts a woman, naked and round as the moon, standing in a cemetery with the moon behind her and a child's hands reaching for her.

Gallery Manager Penny Peace curated the show and said there have not been a lot of negative reactions, rather people have been disturbed by the work but respectful of it as well.

"Honestly, as long as I get a reaction, I'm OK," she said. "We have had people that have been bothered by some of the visuals because it's such a dark ugly underbelly here. Domestic violence exists and child abuse ex-

ists, and we just can't hide from them."

Peace said one woman was so distressed she said, "This is so dark I can't even look at it anymore." It turned out the visitor was a former social worker with children's protective services.

"To me, good art does bring up emotions," Peace said.

The exhibit is the creation of a master storyteller working on paper with drawing materials. The story Fe tells is drawn from her own heart and experience.

and storytelling with writings and songs, from the 1600s to the 2000s," Jarden said.

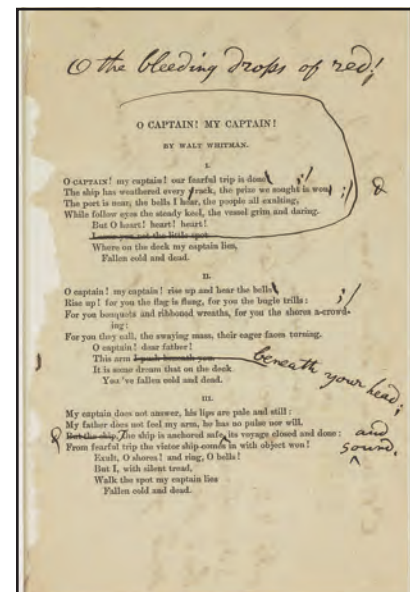

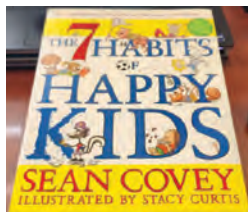

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Be mindful of heat-related health risks

As Las Cruces and much of the rest of the country endure extreme summer temperatures, it is important to be aware of the potential for heat illnesses and how they can be avoided, said a Las Cruces doctor.

"I have seen more heat-related illnesses here in the high desert than any place I've practiced," said Dr. Kristopher Crawford, director of emergency services at Mountain View Regional Medical Center (MVRMC).

Those illnesses can include heat rash, generally followed by heat cramps – a warning sign of heat exhaustion, which can lead to heat stroke, "which can be

life threatening," said Crawford, who came to Las Cruces from South Carolina three years ago.

The symptoms of heat exhaustion and heat stroke are cool skin, breaking out in a cold sweat and heavy sweating, dizziness, weakness, rapid pulse, nausea and headache, he said.

The best way to treat these conditions is to get out of the heat if you can, "certainly out of direct sunlight," Crawford said, stay hydrated and "cover up," using a hat and loose-fitting clothes to block the sun.

If you must work outside during extremely hot weather, "make sure you do that activity at a pace

you can maintain in the heat," Crawford said. "Work slowly," he said, and take frequent breaks.

People taking medications should also take precautions, he said, because some medications may predispose them to heat exhaustion and heat stroke, Crawford said. Talk to your provider.

When it's hot, it is also extremely important to avoid using alcohol and stimulants, even if they are prescribed, he said.

In addition to pre-existing medical conditions, age can contribute to the risk of developing a heat illness, along with activity level and dehydration, Crawford said.

People who are used to exercising outside – running, walking, hiking, biking, etc. – "Just don't do that," Crawford said. "Find yourself a treatment indoors or schedule your physical activity

early in the morning," he said.

"If you're visiting from a very moist environment ... and you come to high desert, you are going to be at higher risk of suffering heat exhaustion because you will be producing higher amounts of sweat," Crawford said.

The human body was designed to operate "within temperate ranges" of temperature, he said. When it is "particularly hot or particularly cold, our physical adaptability begins to fail us. The body's ability to compensate just can't keep up. When we start getting into the upper 90s for a large portion of the day – hours and hours in the high 90s or 100s – that becomes a significant concern," he said.

"Heat stroke can kill you," Crawford said. "It can be a deadly condition. We do have people die from heat stroke here."

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Keeping cool

Here are some tips from MVRMC to avoid heat illness:

- **Cover up:** When outside, wear lightweight and loose-fitting clothing, hats, sunglasses and broad-spectrum sunscreen of at least 15 to protect against sunburn.
- **Keep cool:** Take cool showers, swim or apply wet towels on the neck or forehead to help lower body temperature.
- **Hydrate:** Drink fluids, especially water, throughout the day to stay hydrated. Avoid excessive consumption of alcohol and caffeine, which contribute to dehydration.
- **Stay in the shade:** Stay in shaded areas during the hottest parts of the day, usually between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- **Rest often:** If working outside or participating in outdoor activities, make it a point to take regular breaks to cool down in a shaded area where you can rest and rehydrate.

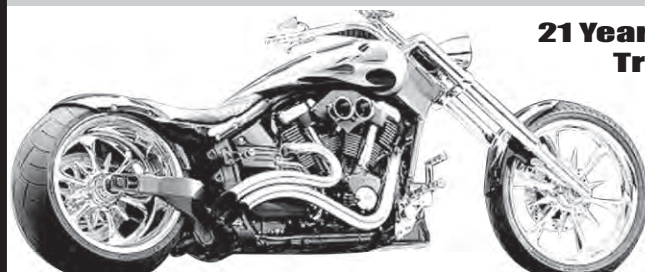

In our great country we have laws for everything: taxes, violent crimes and illicit drugs, although those laws have been modified lately. Many fine books haven't been written that consider laws of _____ (you fill in the blank). In this edition of my golf column I present Dr. Golf's 20 Laws of Golf.

1. Know and follow the rules. That means the USGA Rules of Golf, proper etiquette, sportsmanship and proper attire for golf.

2. Behave like gentlemen and ladies on the golf course. No club throwing or stupid antics.

3. Golf instruction is a necessity, especially if one is a novice player.

4. Putting represents half your strokes if you are mid-to-low handicapper, so

spend half your practice time on putting, and take some lessons.

5. Suitable equipment is a must. If you play regularly, your equipment needs to be up to date.

6. Controlling your mind and emotions is required.

Once a person knows how to swing a golf club with some skill, the game of golf then becomes an exercise in mental toughness and emotional self-control.

7. Practicing correctly and often will lead to improvement. As I say, "the more I practice the luckier I get."

8. Over-trying doesn't work in golf. To play your best you need to attend to the process of your play,

rather than the outcome. If you are committed to the process, the result will take care of itself.

In that way you will stay focused on the shot at hand.

9. Some good putts don't go in; some others happen to go in. Just watch the pros.

Some days they make everything; some days they

can't buy a putt. It's a "game within a game."

10. Luck – good and bad – is a part of the game. It's part of life. Look at where you are today – successes and failure, good breaks and bad – and notice how much chance plays in the outcome. Golf is a mirror of that.

14. Mistakes are guaranteed I golf. That's why the short game is so important. In my case, I seem to make too many mistakes, but my short game – chipping and putting – saves an awful lot of shots.

15. When you believe you've unlocked the secret and mastered golf you're dead wrong. Look at my column from a few weeks ago. Golf involves lifelong learning. We're never done improving.

16. In the end, despite the ups and downs, bad bounces, bad breaks, the golfer is solely responsible for his or her shots, play and score. Some golfers are chronic complainers and they don't get that.

17. Bouncing back from mistakes, adversity and set-backs is the sure way to

save your score.

18. One of my personal laws when I play is "never give up on a hole." Recently I hit my tee shot into a pond on a par 5, then hit my forth shot ten feet from the hole and made the putt, for money.

19. Three of the earliest commandments are do not lie, cheat and steal. I do not know how golfers justify stealing nice looking range balls marked with Titleist or TaylorMade, but it is still stealing.

20. And remember, putts left short hardly ever go in the hole, trees are not 90 percent air, nervous tension escalates exponentially the more people that are watching.
