








# NMSU OFFICIALLY PART OF C-USA

#### **NMSU REPORT**

he New Mexico State University Aggies embark on a new chapter as they officially began their affiliation with Conference USA July 1.

This move comes after the initial announcement was made nearly two years ago, signifying the end of their nearly 20-year association with the Western Athletic Conference. Along with NM State, Jacksonville State, Liberty and Sam Houston have traded in their league affiliations for the C-USA flag. The four new institutions will join current conference members Florida International, Louisiana Tech, Middle Tennessee, UTEP and Western Kentucky to make up a nine-member conference entering the 2023-24 seasons.


This transition has extra significance for the Aggie football program. Formerly one of seven FBS independent programs, the Aggies will be affiliated with a conference for the first time since being a part of the Sun Belt from 2014-17. Additionally, the majority of NM State's NCAA Division I men's and women's athletic programs have become full members of Conference USA. The exception is the swimming and diving program, which will remain an affiliate member of the WAC due to the absence of women's swimming and diving sponsorship in C-USA.

In total, NM State spent 18 years as a member of the WAC – beginning its membership in 2005. C-USA now becomes the fifth conference affiliation for the Aggies after representing the Border Conference (1931-62), Missouri Valley Conference (1971-83), the Pacific Coast Athletic Association/Big West Conference (1983-2001), the Sun Belt Conference (2001-05) and the WAC (2005-23).

Over the course of 18 years in the WAC, NM State secured 85 conference titles, second only to Brigham Young University's 193 championships during its 36-year membership. Since 2005, the Aggies claimed 26 more titles than the next closest institution. The Aggies' legacy extends through their previous affiliations with the Border Conference (1931-62), Missouri Valley Conference (1971-83), Pacific Coast Athletic Association/Big West Conference (1983-2001), Sun Belt Conference (2001-05), and the Western Athletic Conference (2005-23).

Conference USA is an NCAA Division I athletic conference based in Dallas.

# AGGIE STOMPING STOMPING

ou may have lived in Las Cruces your whole life, or you might just be arriving from somewhere far away. Either way, the city has lots to offer. The weather, and recreational opportunities provide outside activities almost year round in Las Cruces.

The vibrant Downtown Las Cruces still has a small-town feel, and new bars, coffee shops and restaurants keep popping up all over. There's also a great bookstore, a comic shop, theaters, museums, galleries and apparel stores along Main Street. It is also a prime spot for festivals, and the stage on the Plaza de Las Cruces hosts many live music and dance events.

Explore the Mesquite Street and Alameda Depot Historic Districts near downtown and walk the Plaza at Old Mesilla, enjoying its shops and entertainment. And if you're the type of person who enjoys the outdoors, you're in the right place. Explore the many peaks and trails of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument or float down the Rio Grande on a kayak or inflatable tube.

Here are some more ideas to help you get started planning your next outing:

#### LAS CRUCES FARMERS & CRAFTS MARKET

The sights, sounds and people watching at the Las Cruces Farmers & Crafts Market bring a thousand smiles. Food trucks with all kinds of fare gather on Main Street along with artisans offering beard creams and CBD salves, jewelry, art and a wild variety of other crafts. This is the place to find locally sourced meat, a great cup of coffee, music or a card featuring the Organ Mountains to send back home. Local farmers offer the freshest produce from tomatoes, pecans, honey and greens to fresh flowers to brighten your dorm room. The market takes place near the Downtown Plaza every Wednesday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Info: farmersandcraftsmarketoflascruces.com, 575-201-3853.



#### **MESQUITE STREET HISTORIC DISTRICT**

For a sense of the town's history without the touristy feel, take a walk through the Mesquite Street Historic District, a colorful neighborhood filled with character. Along these historic streets you'll stumble upon Klein Park and shops, as well as restaurants like La Nueva Casita, Nopalito and some of Las Cruces' oldest buildings.

#### **WATCH THE DRAMA**

If your schedule allows for a little drama in your life, Las Cruces is home to numerous theatres where you can test your audition skills or take in a show.

Las Cruces Community Theatre, 311 N. Main St., is located Downtown, and offers a student discount on tickets. Visit lcctnm.org to view the full schedule of perfomances. Black Box Theatre, 430 N. Main St., gives a platform to overlooked and little-known works, as well as a space for local writers to develop their projects. There's also the American Southwest Theatre Company, which hosts productions at the ASNMSU Center for Fine Arts,1000 E. University Ave.

#### FII M

The Rio Grande Theatre, 211 N. Main St., is located Downtown. It shows a variety of classic films and hosts national musicians and regional acts. Call 575-541-2290 or visit riograndetheatre.org for more information. Located at 2469 Calle de Guadalupe, in Mesilla, The Fountain Theatre has entertained residents of Mesilla since 1905. Visit this landmark, enjoy the best popcorn in town and take in an Oscar winner or foreign film. Visit mesillavalleyfilm.org for a list of current showings.

Catch popular current films at Allen Theatres' Telshor 12 or the Cineport 10 at Mesilla Valley Mall. See what's playing at allentheatresinc.com/city/las\_cruces.

#### **MUSEUMS**

Visit Las Cruces' museums for a day of cultural enrichment. Downtown, you will find the Branigan Cultural Center, Museum of Art and the Museum of Nature & Science. Nearby, in the Alameda Depot Historic District, you'll find the Railroad Museum. And closer to campus is the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum, which serves as a venue for several events, ongoing exhibits and some special breeds of livestock. Visit las-cruces.org/1523/Museums or nmfarmandranchmuseum.org for more information.

#### **ART OBSCURA**

Part gallery, part gift shop, this quirky two-story building at 3206 Harrelson St., in Mesilla Park, provides intriguing diversions and gift ideas. Featuring local artists and historic ephemera and oddities, this is a place to get lost in for a little while. Open weekends only Saturday and Sunday 12 p.m.- 4 p.m., learn more at artobscuragallery.com.

#### TAKE A HIKE OR A MOUNTAIN BIKE RIDE

Las Cruces is near several hiking trails and mountains. Try the simple hike of Tortugas (or "A" mountain) near University Avenue and work your way up to Dripping Springs Natural Area or Soledad Canyon. Hike Baylor Pass and end up at Aguirre Spring Campground. For a day trip, cruise south to the beautiful Franklin Mountains of nearby El Paso.

There are 82 miles of mountain-biking trails in and around Las Cruces for both beginners and experts. Many are incorporated into Bureau of Land Management lands or national monument locations that offer riders breathtaking vistas. Some bike trails on BLM land in Doña Ana County include; All-Trails-Lead-to-Gnome, Chutes-n-Ladders, Doña Ana Trail, Greenrock Trail and the Rock Garden. Bike trails in the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument include: La Maria Trail, various Sierra Vista Trails and the Monumental Loop

# **DAYTRIPPIN'**

he getaway you need is just a short drive away when you live in Las Cruces. Explore neighboring El Paso or head north to Hatch, the Green Chile Capital of the World.

Looking for an outdoor adventure? Visit the area's nearby caverns, hot springs or gypsum sands. Check out the Outdoor Center in the Activity Center on campus to rent any camping equipment you might need.

#### WHITE SANDS NATIONAL PARK

Situated 40 minutes east of Las Cruces, 10 acres of white gypsum shine with haunting beauty under a full moon, a setting sun or a rising sun. Tours are available November through April, and the park regularly has concerts, full-moon hikes, sunset hikes and educational



programming. Bring your plastic disc and slide down the tallest dunes. The entry fee is \$25 per vehicle, and annual passes are available. Info: nps.gov/whsa

#### **CARLSBAD CAVERNS, NEW MEXICO**

Located in the Chihuahuan Desert, Carlsbad Caverns National Park is only a three-hour drive from Las Cruces if you take U.S. 180. Hike in the underground caves by day and watch the flight of bats at night. The \$15-per-person cavern entrance fee is good for three days and reservations are required. Info: nps.gov/cave

#### **CLOUDCROFT, NEW MEXICO**

480,000 acres of open forest make for great hiking, mountain biking, camping, horseback riding and much more! Cloudcroft has wonderful shops, restaurants and unique businesses to visit and a museum filled with the logging and railroad history. Enjoy cool summer temperatures

# HOT SPRINGS IN TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES

Truth or Consequences is known for its hot springs. Journey out with your friends for a relaxing, therapeutic soak. You can reserve a time slot to soak in a private pool at most places, or you may choose to take a dip in a community/ shared pool. There are more than a dozen different springs resorts of all styles and formats, including some that look right onto the Rio Grande. Search hot springs properties at sierracountynewmexico.info.

#### **ELEPHANT BUTTE LAKE STATE PARK**

Located an hour and a half north of Las Cruces along I-25 is the largest lake in the state. If you enjoy camping, fishing, boating, or just being outdoors, Elephant Butte is for you. There is plenty of water and plenty of beach room and Elephant Butte Lake can accommodate watercraft of many styles and sizes. Remember to wear your life jacket. Boat safe and boat smart. Besides sandy beaches, the state park offers restrooms, picnic areas, playgrounds, and developed sites with electric and water hook-ups for RVs.

#### **GILA NATIONAL FOREST**

If you enjoy camping, hiking and fishing, visit the Gila National Forest. Located two and a half hours north east of Las Cruces, the Gila National Forest covers 3.3 million acres, making it the largest National Forest in New Mexico. Within the forest resides the Aldo Leopold, Blue Range, and Gila Wilderness Areas. In 1924, the Gila became the world's first designated wilderness, preserved as a primitive area by prohibiting motorized vehicles and other strict regulations. This forest offers hundreds of miles of streams, more than 20 campgrounds, and more than 1,500 miles of trails. Please be sure to follow all outdoor safety and ethics and leave no trace. Info: fs.usda.gov/recmain/gila/recreation For fire restriction and closures: fs.usda.gov/gila

#### **EL PASO, TEXAS**

Less than an hour drive away, take a day to visit the El Paso Zoo or the impressive (and free) El Paso Museum of Art. Stop by the family-friendly Rubiks Arcade Bar for walls of classic and new games. 

# EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE **GET OUT AND VOTE!**



ere's what you need to know to register to vote, learn about candidates and cast your ballot.

#### **QUALIFICATIONS**

You must be a resident to register to vote in New Mexico. If you're not, check your state of residency for guidelines on how to cast an absentee ballot.

#### REGISTRATION

You must be registered in order to vote. To learn more about voting registration and deadlines in New Mexico visit **vote.gov/register/nm** or visit **NMVote.org**. To find more information on online and in-person registration in Doña Ana County visit **donaanacountyelections.com/voter-information**.

You must submit your application at

least 28 days before an election. You will need a New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico identification card issued through a motor vehicle division of the taxation and revenue department; any document that contains an address in the county together with a photo ID card; or a current valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary education institution in New Mexico accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

#### STOP SEXUAL ASSUALT

# RECOGNIZE AND INTERVENE

ampus sexual assault is an uncomfortable topic, but one that must be talked about. One in six women have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in her lifetime and 3 percent of men have been a victim of attempted or completed rape in their lifetime. While in college, a young woman's risk increases to one in four chances of being sexually assaulted.

Sexual assault may consist of sexual harassment, sexual coercion, sexual contact (unwanted fondling/groping), attempted rape and rape.

It is never the victim's fault. Ever. Rape and sexual assault are not crimes of passion and love. Rape and sexual assault is about power and control.

The following are some tips to how you can help intervene and help respond to sexual assault in a safe way.

#### How to recognize the signs of a potentially harmful situation

- Body language: Is a potential victim leaning or pushing the other party away or just appears uncomfortable?
- · Raised voices: Do you hear yelling, screaming or other alarming sounds?
- Intoxication: Is the person stumbling, unable to communicate or unable to consent to what is happening?
- The golden rule: Trust your instincts. If you notice something that doesn't feel right, it probably isn't.



o qualify for subsidized loans (where you don't acquire interest and don't have to repay until after you graduate), unsubsidized loans (where you do) or work-study employment with the university, students should fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) available at fa.nmsu.edu/fafsa/ or studentaid. gov. The Financial Aid Office can help students complete the application and find scholarships.





he NMSU Police Department is a full-service, 24-hours a day police agency that has its own 911 emergency dispatch center. The department handles routine patrols, criminal investigations, victim assistance and special events.

Other services offered by the NMSU Police Department include crisis intervention and parking enforcement. Also follow NMSU Police Department on it's social media platforms for useful information and safety tips.

#### **ON-CAMPUS SAFETY TIPS**

- Use high-quality "U" locks on all bicycles, locking both the frame and front tire to the rack.
- Roll up windows and lock doors on vehicles and campus residences. Do

- not leave property in plain sight from windows, or unattended on campus.
- Be aware of potential scams via phone calls or email. Don't give out personal information over the phone unless you are sure of the source of the request.
- When in an interpersonal relationship, remember that "no" means "no!" If the other person is incapable of giving consent, any sexual contact without consent is a crime. If you are someone you know is the victim of sexual assault, call 575-646-3311 or 575-646-3424 NMSU Police-Victim Services.
- If you see someone else in danger, say something or do something and call 575-646-3311 for help. If you see an unsafe condition like a fallen tree limb or power line and other safety hazards, report it promptly. For emergencies call 911.






