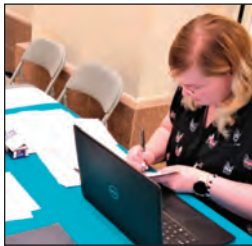

Cruces mayor's race: And then there were seven

A total of 63 candidates filed Tuesday, Aug. 29, to run in nearly 40 local races across Doña Ana County, including the mayors, city and town councilors and trustees, school board members and conservation district supervisors and board members.

The Las Cruces mayor's race drew seven candidates, as incumbent Ken Miyagishima decided not to seek a fifth four-year term. The incumbent

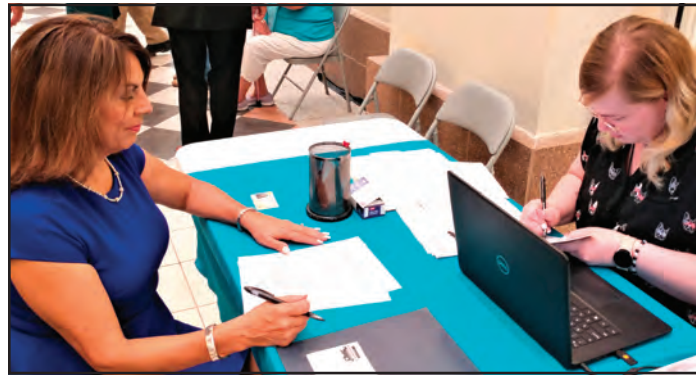
mayor of Sunland Park, Javier Perea, did not draw an opponent in his re-election bid. Neither did Russell Hernandez, the only candidate for mayor of Mesilla, as incumbent Mayor Nora Barraza did not run for re-election.

Group works to protect cemetery

A new gate has been installed inside an historic Las Cruces cemetery to protect graves that in some cases are more than 160 years old.

St. Genevieve's Catholic Church Facility and Cemetery Manager Albert Carrasco and volunteer José Tapia and finished installing the red metal gate Monday morning, Aug. 21, inside San Jose Cemetery, 100 N. Espina St., next door to the church. The new gate, which will be kept locked, was installed to keep visitors from driving into the historic portion of the cemetery, on its west side, said long-time church volunteer Rosemary Leyva.

"We're trying to protect it from further damage," said Leyva, who, with Tapia, is leading a project now in its eighth year to map all the graves in the eight-acre cemetery. The Doña Ana County Historical Society (DACHS) is partnering with St. Genevieve's on the project and paid for the new gate and the materials to install them, said DACHS member Sally Kading.

The gate will keep

vehicles from damaging marked and unmarked graves, some of which are sinking, Leyva said.

Grave subsidence (sinking) is a natural process that occurs in all cemeteries as time, weather and other factors cause soil to settle, and as very old coffins collapse.

There are almost 3,400 graves in the western half of San Jose Cemetery, Leyva said. The earliest recorded burial dates to July 4, 1859, as Magdalena Cordero, age 12, was interred.

Because of vagrants, the cemetery is kept locked, Leyva said. Anyone who wants to visit a grave is asked to park in the parking lot on Espina Street, immediately to the east of the cemetery and walk into the cemetery through

its main gate on the Espina Street side, she said. Accommodations will be made for people in wheelchairs and have other special needs, Leyva said.

To arrange a visit to a grave, call St. Genevieve's at 575-524-9649, and someone will unlock the cemetery gates. Church office hours are 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Monday-Friday and 9 a.m.-noon on Saturday.

Cemetery history

The cemetery is the final resting place of many of Las Cruces' earliest family members, along with members of the Territorial militia, the California Column and soldiers who fought in the Civil War, the Indian Wars of the late 19th century, the Spanish-American War (one of Theodore Roosevelt's Rough Riders), World War I, World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

In the older section of the cemetery, you will find the Amador family tomb, including the grave of Martín Amador, who built the historic Amador Hotel in the 1870s and was one of Las Cruces' earliest settlers. Near the original entrance to the cemetery on Organ Avenue and Manzanita Street are the graves of the Nestor Armijo

family. Nestor and his wife, Josefa, moved to Las Cruces in the late 1850s. He became a successful businessman and built the building that is today the Armijo House.

Also buried in San Jose Cemetery are colorful figures from Las Cruces' past, such as soldier, justice of the peace and Desert Springs resort developer Eugene Van Patten (1839-1926); Adolph Lea (1825-1903), whose homestead at Fort Selden became Leasburg; former priest, businessman and politician Theodore Rouault (1851-1940); and St. Genevieve Church pastor from 1878-80 and again in 1902 Reverend Father Andres Eschallier (1844-1922).

Other prominent locals buried in the cemetery include landowner and freighter Barbaro Lucero, French settler Francisco Carbonniere, and spiritual leaders of the Piro-Mansotiwa tribe Vicente Roybal Jr and Edward Roybal, according to Las Esperanzas, Inc., the Mesquite Street and Original Town Site Historic District.

There is also at least one Jewish grave in the cemetery, which is inscribed in Hebrew and includes the Star of David.

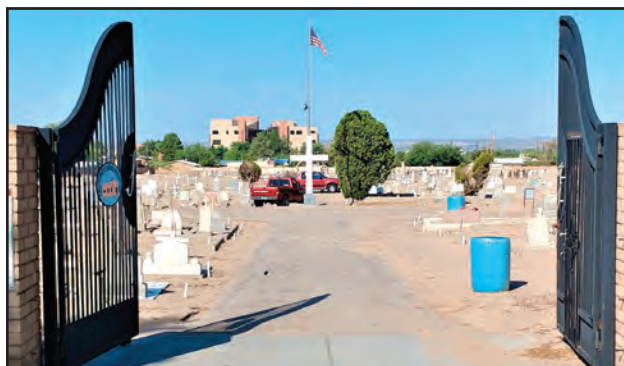

Dress the Child returns to Amador Live Oct. 8

The theme of the 2023 Dress the Child fundraising dinner is “Yacht Party 2: Mexican Riviera.”

It will begin at 5 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 8, at Amador Live, 302 S. Main St. Tickets are \$100.

The event follows last year’s successful fundraiser for Dress the Child, which works with local schools to provide new clothing and shoes for hundreds of children in need. Last year’s dinner raised about \$25,000 and helped the program buy new clothes and shoes for 419 children in the Las Cruces and Gadsden school districts, said long-time co-

ordinator Doug Boberg.

“The dinner fundraiser has been a critical source of funding for the Dress the Child program for over 30 years and last year’s Yacht Party event was one of the most successful,” Boberg said. “Attendees told us they enjoyed the casual format, loved the incredible food, and getting to meet and visit with the chefs was an added benefit.”

“We’re taking the yachts out to different ports,” said Dress the Child long-time co-coordinator Matt Holt. “This year we are sailing to the Mexican Riviera.”

“The chefs liked last year’s dinner format of the food stations and interacting with dinner guests,”

said chef Vince Campbell, who has helped organized the fundraising dinner for 30 years.

The 2022 Yacht Party fundraiser was “the best ever,” Campbell said.

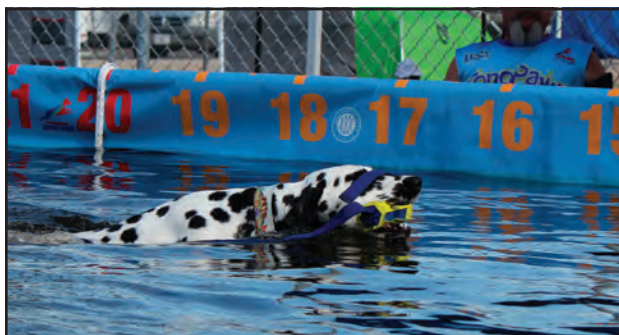

Iris show, rhizome sale boost scholarship

The Mesilla Valley Iris Society has been hosting an iris show and a rhizome sale in Las Cruces more than 50 years. The community has supported the MVIS through the sales of iris in the fall and the iris show in the spring - where potted iris are available for sale.

The idea of giving back to the community for its support came over the last 10 years as sales became more profitable. The board of directors became aware of the endowment scholarship at NMSU, and as annual profits began to accumulate, created a small fund which could be used for this purpose. The NMSU Foundation, which directs scholarship activities, requires an initial contribution of at least \$25,000 to initiate a new scholarship.

The Mesilla Valley Iris Society hosted a 2022 American Iris Society

Convention, with the help of four other iris societies in Region 23. The profit from this convention propelled a horticulture endowment scholarship into reality.

Dale Ellis, treasurer of MVIS, took the lead to initiate talks with NMSU. He reported back to Wes Wilson, president of MVIS, that an endowment scholarship was a possibility. The idea was taken to a meeting early this year in which all members present voted unanimously to support the scholarship. This endowed scholarship will give an agriculture student \$1,000 each year.

This year's Iris Rhizome Sale will be Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 9 and 10, at the Mesilla Valley Mall (theater entrance) during mall hours or until products are sold.

Support of the rhizome sale provides additional contributions to the scholarship fund.

Restaurant closing a dark Day for Las Cruces

Since people heard about the today's closing of Day's Hamburgers everyone, it seems, has a story about the restaurant that's been a fixture in Las Cruces since 1932.

"It's been great hearing all the stories," said Denny-Rae Evans, the fourth-generation owner of Day's. Her great-grandmother Mary-Ann Day started the burger-and-burrito operation 91 years ago.

There are lots of pieces to Evans' own story, and why she's closing the downtown restaurant. Many are financial, some are practical, and one is physical: She's simply burned out.

I recently heard Max Bower, owner of the Amador restau-

rants downtown, refer to the pandemic as "the war." We've all gone through the war, but few earned as many battle scars as restaurant owners.

Evans is no exception. We all know the struggles of finding dependable employees since Covid. Online employment apps, such as Indeed, can help, but they can be pricey. Evans said as much as \$500 a month which, on her budget, can break a month.

Rents, road construction, parking lot issues, rising interest rates, high and fluctuating food costs. All of these have been hurdles over and above staffing for Evans.

Those are the bad things. Then there are the good

things.

The day I visited Evans and her team, I met Rosie Armendariz, who has worked at Day's for more than 40 years. She was making patties -- just as Mary-Ann Day did back in the day -- from fresh ground beef. Armendariz worked from a 10-pound package of beef, rounding it into future Great Day burgers.

"How do you know how big to make them?" I asked.

"Well, you do something for 40 years, you get the hang of it," Armendariz said. "Just like meatballs for spaghetti."

I looked and, indeed, they all looked exactly the same size. She knocked out that bag in just a few minutes.

Next up the line was Verina Matruino, who took Armendariz's perfect meatballs,

popped them on the griddle, and mashed them flat with a spatula. Matruino also gave me the secret of the green sauce that adorns a proper Great Day burger. I won't divulge the recipe because, like many Las Cruces, I'm hoping there's a back door, and Evans might re-open.

"Right now, I'm really burned out," Evans said. "But I haven't ruled anything out as far as the future."

The most likely scenario, she said, would be re-surfacing in the form of a food truck. With that, she could work the hours she wanted, not have to worry about rent, capitalize on the growing number of events in Las Cruces, and not be tied down to a specific location.

And my Day's story?

Going Downtown

Miyagishima made lasting impact on city

When he steps down following the municipal election in November, Mayor Ken Miyagishima will have been the most consequential local government leader of the past two decades.

Miyagishima was just 28 in 1992 when he was elected to the first of two terms he would serve on the Doña Ana County Commission. He moved to the City Council in 2001, first as the representative for District 6. Then, after losing to Bill Mattiace in the mayoral race of 2003, Miyagishima came back in 2007 to win the first of four straight terms as mayor.

His 16 years in office make Miyagishima our longest-serving mayor since Martin Lohman was elected our city's first mayor in 1907. It remains to be seen what major thoroughfare will be named in Ken's honor.

Las Cruces has a city manager

form of government, meaning our mayor has less control over day-to-day operations than mayors in other cities, such as Albuquerque. Still, Miyagishima has been a powerful force in leading the city government.

That's probably best seen in his leadership on clean-energy initiatives, dating back to the construction of City Hall in 2009. It received LEED Silver certification and includes solar panels

atop the parking garage.

The city has a Sustainability Office devoted to helping not just city government, but also businesses and residents reduce impact on climate change. The city received \$7.8 million from the federal government last year to convert its fleet of diesel buses to electric. We're expected to have 12 electric buses in service by next summer.

Miyagishima also runs the district office for a well-known insurance company. He was one of many small-business owners serving

on the City Council and County Commission back when he was first elected. That's changed. Today, he is the only male sitting on the City Council

And, while he has been progressive on climate change, Miyagishima fought fiercely against efforts to raise the minimum wage. Fortunately, he was not successful.

As I write this Sunday, only two candidates have announced their intention to run for mayor: City Councilwoman Kassandra Gandara and former Fire Chief Eric Enriquez. If nobody else stepped forward on filing day Tuesday, that would be a big

change from the 2019 race, when Miyagishima defeated nine challengers. Three other City Council seats will also be up for re-election, and the election will again be conducted under ranked-choice voting.

Miyagishima should be remembered fondly once he's left office. He clearly has a deep love and respect for the city and its residents, and that showed in all of his public appearances. But I'm glad he's not seeking a fifth term. It's time for new leadership.

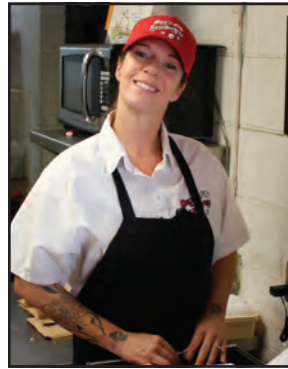

Butterfly monitoring expands to Las Cruces

The New Mexico Butterfly Monitoring Network (NMBMN) was created in 2020 to help monitor and track the conservation needs of butterflies throughout the state. In March, the network added a survey route in Las Cruces, monitored by the non-profit Asombro Institute

for Science Education (AISE) at their outdoor classroom, the Chihuahuan Desert Nature Park (CDNP).

"To understand the health of butterfly populations across the state, we have slowly been expanding the reach of NMBMN," said Anna Walker, species survival officer for invertebrate pollinators at the New

Mexico BioPark Society, which runs NMBMN.

"The route at CDNP is the first in the Chihuahuan Desert basins and Playas ecoregion, so it will pick up many butterfly species that are unique to this region."

The survey route covers 1.17 miles along the trails at CDNP, the release said. It passes through four habitat types with more than 1,500 feet in elevation gain. AISE educators Natalie Wells and Marissa Bowler walk the survey route every 2-3 weeks to count and identify butterflies within six meters of the trail, AISE said. They have documented 14 butterfly species despite this summer's hot and dry weather.

"As beautiful as they

are to look at and observe, butterflies also serve as an important indicator for invertebrate populations and the overall health of the habitats in which they live," AISE said.

"There are a massive number of invertebrate species in the state of New Mexico and for a lot of species, we don't

even have the basic information that we need to ensure populations are stable," Walker said. "With the help of community scientists, through the NMBMN network, we are beginning to fill data gaps, and in the future, we will be in a much bet-

ter place to address the conservation needs of butterflies and other invertebrates."

Through the butterfly monitoring project, AISE and NMBMN hope to gather more data to share with the public, inspire others to take an interest in butterflies and help stakeholders to make informed decisions about the health of butterflies and their habitats, AISE said.

CDNP trails and picnic pavilions are open to the public free of charge 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesday-Sunday. At 56501 N. Jornada Road, CDNP is about 15 miles northwest of downtown via U.S. Highway 70 and north Jornada Road.

Harris is a man who lives with pain. Three spinal surgeries and cardiac bypass left this veteran unable to work, as his

jobs in construction and as a truck driver became too physically difficult. Eventually he lost his home, receiving very little from the sale, but he used his limited money to get bus tickets to travel across the country from his home in Florida. Over the past year he has camped at bus stops and in wooded city parks, sleeping outside in rain and cold without any shelter.

But the new year brought positive changes for Harris, who arrived at Camp Hope in January. As a veteran, he had priority for placement in stable housing, and within two months was helped to move into his own apartment at the complex for veterans. Camp Hope caseworkers helped him set up a safety net, ensuring he had security, food and shelter. He is finding a renewed sense of community with his fellow veterans and enjoying his independence.

Horses, outdoors: the Younker family tradition

Competing against others twice her age in the 2023 American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA) Youth World Championship Show in July and August, 10-year-old Kaycee Younker of Las Cruces placed in three events, including two top-10 finishes: eighth in the stake race, ninth in pole bending and 16th in barrel racing. It was her first ever national competition.

"I was super excited," said Kaycee's father, Jack Younker, who owns Younker Performance Horses in Mesilla and has been a horse trainer for more than 20 years. "This is a big step," he said.

With her strong finishes, Kaycee "achieved more than her goal" for the competition, Younker said, and "created memories for a lifetime."

"It's pretty awesome," said Kaycee's mother, Shasta Younker, who grew up on a ranch in northern New Mexico and has been around horses and cattle all her life.

"I just like how you can go really fast," Kaycee said about bar-

rel racing, which is her favorite event.

A fifth grader at Explore Academy Las Cruces charter school, Kaycee was among more than 5,000 competitors from 38 states and five countries in the youth championship, held July 28-Aug. 6 in Oklahoma City.

Kaycee is a born competitor, her mother said.

"I can see the change the second she steps in the arena," Shasta Younker said. "She knows what she's doing."

Kaycee is already training for next year's AQHA youth championship and plans to compete in even more events.

"I'm learning to rope," she said. "I like that."

Kaycee's younger brother, Cooper, 7, is also an avid horseman. Like Kaycee, he competes in 4H and rodeo association events in New Mexico and Texas, and is looking forward to his first AQHA youth championship in a couple of years.

His favorite event?

"Poles for me," said Cooper, who is a second grader at Picocho Elementary School. "I like how you have to weave in and out."

Cooper is "a little more laid

back" than Kaycee, their father said. He isn't quite as competitive as his sister, who can be hard on herself when she makes a mistake during a competition.

Both Younker children ride horses every day after school and on weekends at Younker Performance Horses.

"I help them saddle up and get ready," Shasta Younker said. "Daddy teaches them the technique."

"They got into it because my dad was a horse trainer," Jack Younker said.

Jack's father, the late Jack Younker Sr., started training horses when he was in college in Las Vegas, New Mexico, in the 1960s, his son said. He owned a facility in Santa Fe and trained racehorses for more than 20 years.

Jack Sr. had picked out Kaycee's first quarter horse, Basic San Tango, before she was even born. Tango died four years ago, and Kaycee now rides Grade A Vision (nicknamed Arnold), a gelding born in 2009. Cooper's quarter horse is Ruby's Classic Drop.

"He was a huge horse person," Younker said of his dad, who served as president of the Southwest Quarter Horse Association and received a lifetime achievement award from AQHA.

Kaycee and Cooper are also award-winning archers, and so are Jack and

Shasta.

Kaycee joined 4H at age 9, and told her parents, "I want to do something different every year."

She got a bow for her last birthday and signed up for archery lessons. Naturally right-handed, Kaycee's parents had to find her a left-handed bow after discovering she was left-eye dominant. It wasn't a difficult transition for Kaycee, because rodeo cowboys/girls make extensive use of their left hands in controlling the reins of their horses.

Kaycee and Cooper regularly compete in archery competitions in Las Cruces, Deming and Cloudcroft.

Cooper actually prefers archery to rodeo. He also likes boating and fishing and anything outdoors.

Cooper finished second in his age group in a recent archery competition in Cloudcroft that had more than 400 participants, his dad said. Cooper is the top-rated archer in the 8-and-under age group of the High Desert Archery Club the whole family belongs to.

Going forward, Kaycee wants "to be a horse trainer like my dad," she said, and continue

performing in horse shows.

"I want to be a scientist," Cooper said. He has been interested in genetics and geology "since he started school," Jack Younker said.

Kaycee's events

In a stake race, horse and rider must complete a figure-eight pattern, according to the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA). Kaycee finished her stake race in eighth place with a time of 9.498 seconds, less than 7/10 of a second behind the winner.

In pole bending, horse and rider weave through a course of six poles spaced 21 feet apart. Kaycee finished ninth in her pole bending event with a time of 24.037 seconds, less than three seconds behind the winner.

In barrel racing, horse and rider follow a course consisting of three barrels in a cloverleaf pattern. Kaycee finished 16th in her barrel racing competition with a time of 18.897 seconds, a little more than three seconds behind the winner.

All three are timed events. Knocking over a pole or a barrel carries a five-second penalty.

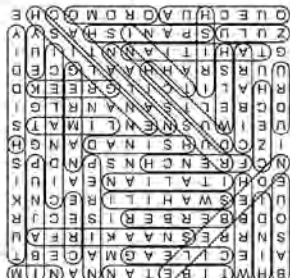

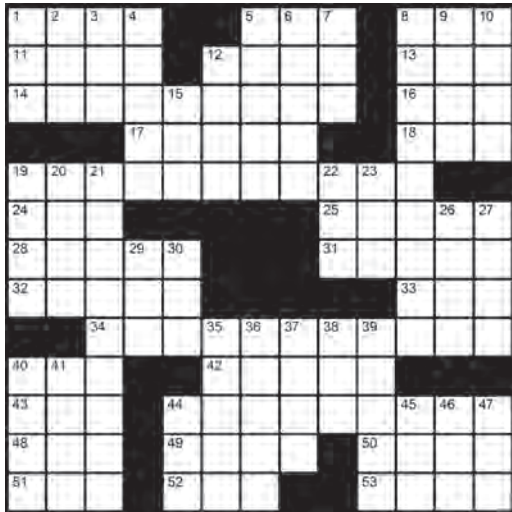

Author, artist creates graphic novel

Using the pen name Epoch Sonder, Las Cruces author Simone Jimerson wrote the text and created the artwork for her first graphic novel, “Maven Chapter 1,” which she will promote in London this month.

Inspired by the television show “Heroes,” Jimerson conceived of the graphic novel in 2018 and began creating her characters two years ago, deciding, “I could really do something with this.”

Jimerson describes her book as “Alice in Wonderland meets Avatar, the Airbender, and Beauty and the Beast.”

Her lead character, Eleanor, is a self-insert Jimerson created because of her experience growing up mixed-race in Temecula, California (between San Diego and Los Angeles).

“I didn’t see a lot of people like me” in cartoons, on television and in the movies, she said.

“It’s for all the other girls out there who look like me,” said Jimerson, who moved to Las Cruces in 2021 from North Richland Hills, Texas, where she had been a firefighter and paramedic. She is now working full-time as an author and animator.

“I wrote this book for me,” Jimerson said. “It’s a gift to my younger self. She would have loved it.”

Jimerson finalized the story for “Maven” and its character design earlier this year using her iPad and the art program Procreate, and “settled on a script that I thought was really powerful,” she said.

Jimerson was invited to participate in Procreate’s “Playgrounds in Motion” event Sept. 8 in London, during which the digital painting app will unveil new technology. A featured speaker will be British animator James Baxter, who created characters for Disney’s “Who Framed Roger

Rabbit,” “Beauty and the Beast,” “The Lion King” and “The Hunchback of Notre Dame.”

In “Maven,” Eleanor, “the chosen one,” wakes up in a new world, “Elade,” where she must collect the magic of water, wind, fire, earth and spirit to guide her personal growth. Helping her navigate this new realm is a human-animal hybrid knight named Aleq.

less than 10 minutes to read, and, although it was written for young adults, is “interesting enough” to appeal to children and adults of all ages, Jimerson said.

For her appearance at Las Cruces Comicon in August, Jimerson made a nine-foot replica of Aleq – even making his clothes and shoes – which brought a lot of attention to her book, she said. She has participated in El Paso Comicon and will attend El Paso Horrorfest Oct. 7-8; Pagan Pride Day, Oct.

14, in Las Cruces; Anime Mundo, Oct. 20-22 in El Paso; RenFaire, Nov. 4-5, in Las Cruces; and Fan Expo, June 7-9, 2024, in Dallas. Jimerson also has a book signing scheduled Saturday, Sept. 30, at Zia Comics, 125 N. Main St. in Las Cruces.

Jimerson is at work on “Maven, Chapter Two,” due in November. Her end game for the books is an animated series.

“I am passionate about animation,” said Jimerson, who created a six-minute animated Maven short (www.youtube.com/c/epochsonder).

Storyboard artist and character designer Radford Sechrist, who has animated for DreamWorks, Disney TV and Cartoon Network, saw Jimerson’s video on YouTube and invited her to teach an online animation class in 2022.

“I felt so honored,” said Jimerson, who is hoping to teach other classes on animation and graphic novels, and comics.

“Wherever this goes,” I’ll

REVIEW: 'Nice People' works on multiple levels

Waiting for Black Box Theatre's (BBT) production of "Nice People Dancing to Good Country Music" to begin on opening night, I reflected on the past 22 years, since BBT opened in September 2001 with a brilliant production of "Seascape." In BBT's second season, I was lucky enough to be cast by director Bradd Howard in Christopher Durang's "Beyond Therapy." I was also in the casts of "Epic Proportions," "Prelude to a Kiss," "Big Love," "The Complete History of Las Cruces (Abridged)," "The Hothouse," "On Golden Pond" and "The Explorers Club."

That's a lot of great

memories, and some of the best moments of my life.

I know the members of director Ceil Herman's "Nice People" cast and crew and its audience will create their own very special moments and very personal memories as the show continues through Sept. 10 at BBT, 430 N. Main St.

There are many new and young faces in this delightful cast that features four members of the Bever family. Laura, Charlie and Jamin Bever are all performing at BBT for the first time; Laura, is, in fact, making her theatre debut in "Nice People." Penny is only a 10th grader, but she is already a main-stage veteran, having recently performed in the casts of "Gypsy" at Las Cruces Commu-

nity Theatre (LCCT) and "The Revolutionists" at BBT. Charlie was also in the cast of "Gypsy" and worked backstage for "The Revolutionists." Jamin, who was terrific as "Tulsa" in "Gypsy" and worked backstage for "The Revolutionists" and BBT's "Radium Girls," does the off-stage voices for "Nice People."

We move to the patio space above the bar for much of the second act, with real-life mother and daughter Laura and Penny creating entertaining dialogue

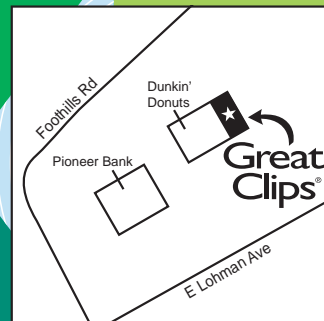

NMSU profs publish books

Elizabeth Horodowich, Jamie Bronstein and Kenneth Hammond, three history professors at New Mexico State University, have published books this year on a range of topics.

Horodowich, NMSU history professor and department head, is a historian of early modern Italy and global history. In her newest book, "Amerasia" Horodowich focuses on the historical thought that "America" and Asia were the same continent.

"I became interested in the idea of an imagined Amerasian continent when I was doing research for another book," Horodowich said, "and I kept seeing the same pattern in the sources, which was European explorers and cartographers regularly "confused" the lands in the Western Atlantic with China and India."

Starting in 1492, Horodowich's book tells how a mistaken idea became an understanding of geography for hundreds of years.

"I concluded that these observers weren't confused at all," Horodowich continued, "but that instead, they had their different but logical way of seeing the world. My book demonstrates how historical actors understood the continents and global geography in ways that were radically different from the way we do today." "Amerasia" is co-authored by art historian Alexander Nagel and is published with Princeton University Press/Zone Books.

Bronstein is a scholar of both British history and modern U.S. history. In "The Happiness of the

British Working Class," she addresses the lack of studies on the historical emotions of working people, especially during the period of industrial transformation.

"I have read more than 340 autobiographies of working-class Britons before 1870," Bronstein said. "The sheer size of my dataset has given me great insight into what it felt like to be a person living through a time of massive economic transformation. Those stories animate my teaching as well."

Published with Stanford University Press, her book looks closer at the gaps left by the lack of studies that bridge time and space within human emotion.

Hammond published his new book "China's Revolution and the Quest for a Socialist Future" with 1804 Books. It reflects his research and teaching, focusing on early modern China, with a brief history of China from the early 19th century forward.

"Having lived and worked in China many times over the last 40 years," Hammond said, "I have witnessed its emergence from a period of struggle and poverty and its phenomenal economic development. I have watched the lives of its people be transformed, with the dramatic extension of life expectancy, the elimination of absolute

poverty, and the expansion of the social provision of housing, health care and education."

Focusing on a period that has seen the country go from a prosperous, powerful and a leading economy, to a weakened state dominated by the forces of Western imperialism, Hammond shows how the country has re-emerged through a process of revolutionary transformation.

"China today is a technological powerhouse," Hammond continued, "yet it remains little understood by most people in the West. My book is an effort to introduce China to Americans and other westerners and present it in its own terms."

The college hijinks factual novel "The Quantum Jump Machine," by Las Cruces author **Frank Thayer**, is his seventh book since 2015 and a departure for the NMSU professor emeritus who usually writes fiction revolving around supernatural horror and non-fiction about flying saucers. The story is a thinly disguised account of a young college teacher's idealism and humor during the tumultuous 1960s in Canada. The book shows administrations can be comical and venal in every era.

Add to that the pranks, and there is a book that is just funny. Thayer's recent books include "The Aztec

UFO Incident," "Magic in the Desert," "Cobston Trilogy," "Terror Tales of the Southwest," "The Whispering Darkness" and "The Vampire of San Vicente." Thayer continues to write and dream about the unlikely and the magical beneath the realities of this world.

Alice Davenport wrote "The Adventures of a Squirrel Named 'Frisky'" in the mid-1960s for her young son as they watched the antics of gray squirrels playing in the trees and the old vacant house next door. "Frisky," has been illustrated and published by Beth Miller, iGs Designs, and printed by Ingram Sparks, available in September 2023.

Davenport, the coordinator of Celebrate Authors, has a master's degree from NMSU and is a certified family life educator. She owns and operates MOONBOW Alterations and Moonbow's Book Nook, featuring books by published authors from Las Cruces and neighboring areas.

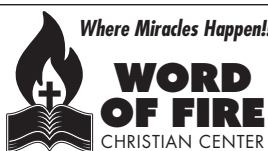

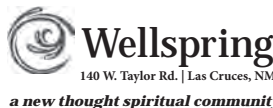

Beat the heat! Tips and tricks to keep you and your wallet cool.

With Las Cruces temperatures consistently exceeding the 100-degree mark, this summer's record-breaking heat wave has everyone asking how they can keep cool while keeping a tight budget.

During the summer months, Las Cruces residents often grapple with how to strike the right balance between keeping their home cool and managing their energy bills. Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Gas System Operations Supervisor Jaime Medina and LCU Interim Deputy Director of Natural Gas and Energy Ramiro Pereya Jr. offer some straightforward yet effective tips that can help curtail your energy expenses.

“Basic maintenance of your AC unit, along with utilizing a smart thermostat are the most effective ways to reduce your energy costs,” Medina explains. “This allows residents to have

an efficient cooling system in the most cost-effective way.”

Medina's first tip is a simple yet overlooked solution. Clean AC coils are necessary for your AC unit's performance. If your coils are not clean, your AC unit will take longer to cool and may cause your unit to overheat. Cleaning your AC coils can take less than an hour, but if you want to leave it to the professionals, you'll spend no more than a couple hundred dollars.

Smart thermostats save residents money by automatically regulating the temperature of the home. Although these thermostats can cost up to \$400, the Environmental Protection Agency states that smart thermostats can save you 8% on your energy bill.

In addition to AC unit maintenance and utilizing a smart thermostat, investing in shades is

another cost-effective way to reduce your energy costs. Medina suggests window canopies, window tinting, and window shades for those who do not have ample shade in their yard. While these tips require an investment on your part, Medina and Pereya stress that some of the most effective strategies are cost-free.

For example, residents can adjust their daily routines during a heat wave. Cooking and laundry should be done later in the evening and preferably not

at the same time. Other tips include using the stovetop or microwave instead of the oven, as they can produce significantly less heat. When boiling water, keep a lid on your pots, and if you must use the oven, reduce your preheat time and keep the oven door shut after use.

Lastly, it's important to be mindful of your thermostat settings. As tempting as it may be to set your house to a constant 60 degrees, this could end up costing you more than just a high energy bill. Residents should never set the thermostat to below 69 degrees, as doing so will freeze your coils and ruin your AC system.

It all comes down to using your system efficiently. Basic maintenance and smart scheduling will go a long way toward keeping your home cool in the most cost-effective way.

Aggies to host Western Illinois

In a 7 p.m. start at Aggie Memorial Stadium Saturday, Sept. 2, NM State hosts Western Illinois.

After the Aggies' 41-30 loss to UMass last week, NM State Head Coach Jerry Kill said, "Sometimes you've got to play the first game to see where you're at."

Where the Aggies are at in the turnover department is minus-three.

NM State gave up a fumble and two interceptions - one returned for a touchdown - against UMass, and forced no turnovers on defense.

In most of the phases of the game, the Aggies came out on top, besting the Minutemen in first downs (20-17), rushing yards (210-197) and passing yards (458-389), NM State stayed competitive.

Without many sustained drives, both teams relied on big plays.

There were five plays in the game for 40 years or more, and four of them resulted in touchdowns.

The Aggies's Ahmonte Watkins had an 80-yard touchdown run in the first half. In the second half, Aggie quarterback Diego Pavia threw touchdown passes of 42 yards (to Trent Hudson) and 40

Pavia also threw an interception that was returned by UMass for a

55-yard touchdown. The Minutemen also had a non-scoring pass play of 68 yards.

3.06.

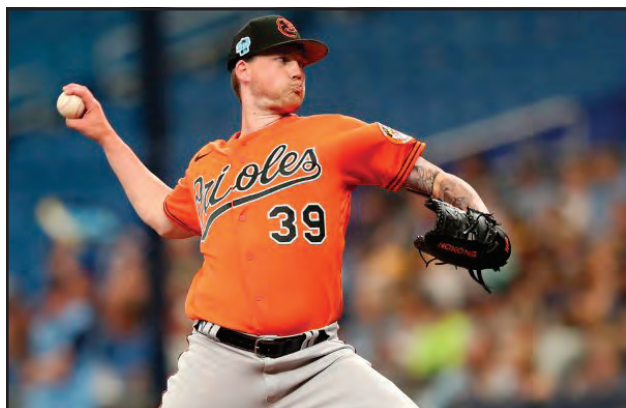
As of Aug. 27, Bradish was 9-6 on the season, with 130 strikeouts for the Orioles, who had the best record in the American League at 81-49, and holding a 2.5-game lead over Tampa Bay for first place in the AL East.

Bradish, from Good-year, Arizona, pitched for the Aggies for three seasons from 2016-2018.

As a junior in 2018, Bradish led the Aggies with a 9-3 record and 140 strikeouts in 101 innings and a 2.67 ERA. He was drafted in 2018 in the fourth round by the Los Angeles Angels.

Do's and don't's: Be the best golfer you can be

I like articles that are straight forward, easy to read and provide helpful hints which are short and sweet. Items that have a "do's and don'ts" style are nice. So, today you'll find a number of, hopefully, helpful tips in that style from your Doctor of Golf.

- Do let your key swing thoughts be positive. Don't let any swing thought begin with "don't." If you say to yourself "don't hit it in the water," your brain strangely can't process "don't" that quickly and, sure enough, you hit it into the water.

- Do hit a "lay-up" shot short of hazards. Don't try to hit a shot over water that you can hit only two out of 10 times. Be smart about the probabilities of your own game.

- Do dress with the proper attire, like a real golfer. Don't wear a T-shirt, sandals and blue jeans.

- Do try to play your best shots no matter what. Don't give up on a hole.

- Do take personal responsibility on where you hit your ball and how you play. Don't be a whiner.

- Do keep your head still and eyes on the ball through the shot. Don't lift your head up too soon while hitting or putting, with a likely nervous attempt to see where it goes.

Bonus: Golf Joke of the Day. After the worst round ever, a depressed golfer told everyone he was going to throw his clubs into the pond, jump in the

water and drown himself. When they told the club

pro he said, "He won't drown himself." They asked "why?" The pro said, "he can't hold his head down that long."

- Do play your own golf balls even if you pull them out of the

pond. Don't steal balls from the range.

- Do take practice swings and start your warm-up on the range with short irons. Don't pull your driver to start hitting practice balls. Work up from wedges, longer irons and woods.

- Don't sabotage yourself by self-talk like, "this is a must-make putt." Do go through your routine just like any other putt. That's

a tried-and-true anti-choking strategy.

- Do establish a friendly, trusting relationship with your playing partners. Don't be a jerk.

- Do play at a brisk pace. Don't rush. As the great basketball coach John Wooden said, "Be quick but don't hurry."

- Don't try to hit the long drive by flailing your arms and flipping your wrists. Do shift your hips and weight forward while pulling your arms and shoulders down.

- Do spend at least half of your practice time chipping and putting. Don't ignore your short game.

- Don't show up late for your tee time. Do allow enough time to get there on time.

- Don't mess up the cup

by replacing the flagstick in sloppy manner. Do respect the golf course.

- Don't try to fix big swing problems on your own. Do get some much needed lessons from a pro.

- Don't hit random areas (targets) on the range and think you have the shots dialed in. Do hit specific shots at highly specific targets; hit the same ones at the same distances you hit on the course.

- Do get fitted by a professional club-fitter for new clubs. Don't buy used or off the shelf stuff.

- Don't convince yourself you're a bad putter. Even if you fail to make what you think are your share of putts, it probably is aim or technique or even eyesight. Do have a pro take a look and diagnose.

- Don't get down on yourself following a serious meltdown in a previous round. Do review the mistakes and mishaps and try to isolate the lapses. If it's a rare episode in your game, forget about it.

- Don't get caught up in the latest golf fad of "analytics" as prized by men and women tour players, who have the latest pricey launch monitors and teams of specialty coaches.

- Do create your own analytics in the form of recording your fairways, greens, putts and bad mistakes for your round. Then review the data to determine what to work on.
