City to receive nearly \$10 million in opioid settlement

In payments to be made through 2037, the City of Las Cruces will receive more than \$9.8 million as part of opioid litigation settlement with a dozen companies that made, sold or distributed opioid painkillers, the city council learned at its Sept. 11 work session.

The money is Las Cruces' share of the \$1 billion the state of New Mexico will receive, according to a City of Las Cruces news release. Doña Ana County will receive almost \$14.5 million and Sunland Park, also a participant in the litigation, will receive almost \$711,000.

Settlement funds must only be used for opioid remediation, which includes treatment and prevention strategies for opioid use disorder. Settlement funds can be used on related costs such as Narcan, to educate first responders, for media campaigns, addiction recovery, and research into Opioid Use Disorder.

An Opioid Settlement Advisory Council has been formed to offer recommendations for the use of the settlement funds. Recommendations to the city council and City Council and Doña Ana County Commission are expected in April 2024.

was presented with an overview of Las Cruces' cannabis business environment, an excise tax update and research on uses of cannabis funds by other public entities.

The city is receiving a state excise tax on the sale of cannabis due to New Mexico's legalization of recreational sales in 2021. Since legalization of recreational cannabis sales began in Las Cruces in April 2022, the city received nearly \$88,000 in cannabis excise tax revenues FY2022 and more than \$847,000 in FY23.

Piñata stamps debut in Southern New Mexico

The U.S. Postal Service kicked off Hispanic Heritage Month and made the national introduction of its new piñata stamps at the 36th Annual Piñata Festival in Roswell, New Mexico, Sept. 8.

The Forever stamps come in four designs — two donkeys and two seven-pointed stars — celebrating the traditional Mexican fiesta favorite.

This is the third consecutive year the Postal Service has issued a Hispanic-themed stamp.

In September 2021, USPS issued Day of the Dead stamps, and in July 2022, Mariachi stamps.

Background

Scholars believe piñatas might have their origins in China, where medieval European explorers described a New Year's custom that sounds familiar to us today. A brightly decorated animal figurine was beaten with a stick until it broke open, releasing seeds contained in the hollow interior.

By the 14th century in Italy, a similar prac-



tice — possibly imported from China by Marco Polo — became part of festivities during the season of Lent. The Italians used an undecorated clay vessel

called the pignatta (“fragile pot”), which was filled with sweets rather than seeds. As the custom migrated to Spain, breaking the pignatta — piñata in Spanish — evolved into a form of celebration on the first Sunday in Lent. The piñata came to the New World with Christian missionaries in the 16th century.

At the time of the Spanish arrival in what is now Mexico, the Indigenous people had their own traditions. The Aztecs, for example, decorated clay pots with feathers and filled them with small

gifts. After hanging clay pots in front of statues of their gods, they struck the pots with sticks until the vessels broke and the treasures inside fell to the ground as offerings.

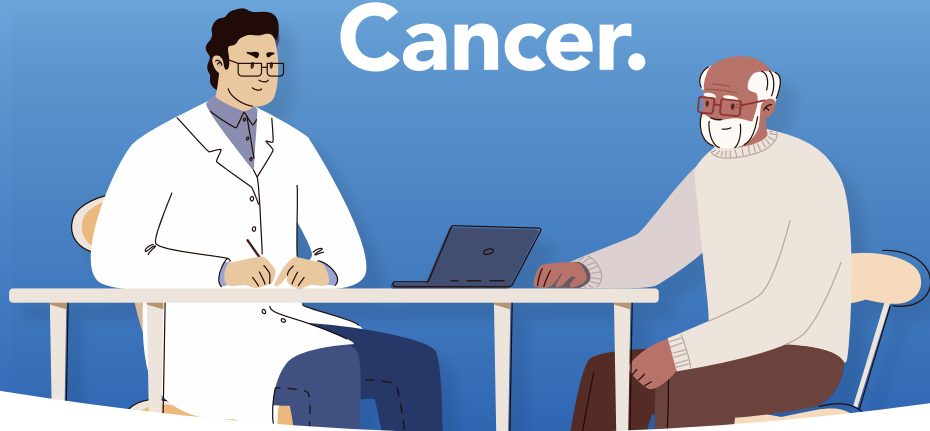
Spanish missionaries combined these ceremonies with their own Lenten tradition to attract Christian converts. Used as religious instruction, the piñata represented the devil and temptation. The blindfolded “player” symbolized blind faith armed with the stick of goodness; breaking open the piñata showed the triumph of

good over evil.

Today, the piñata is still an important part of many celebrations in Mexico and the United States. Piñatas feature in all manner of festivities: holidays, birthdays, anniversaries and weddings. They are a traditional part of the posadas, a nine-day festival held in early December that commemorates Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem before the birth of Jesus.

Though the meaning of breaking the piñata has evolved, the result is still the same: bounty for all.

Hispanic Heritage Month started by a New Mexican

“National Hispanic Heritage Month (Mes nacional de la herencia hispana) celebrates and recognizes the contributions Hispanic Americans have made to American society and culture and honors five of our Central American neighbors who celebrate their independence in September,” according to the Library of Congress.

“National Hispanic Heritage Month had its origins in 1968, when Congress passed a law that authorized the president to issue an annual proclamation designating the week that included Sept. 15 and 16 as National Hispanic Heritage Week, according to [hispanic-heritage-month. The bill creating the month was sponsored by U.S. Rep. Edward Roybal \(1916-2005\), D-California, who was born in Albuquerque, one of 10 children. The family moved to Los Angeles when Roybal was 6.](https://guides.loc.gov/national-</p>

He was the first Latino from California elected to Congress, serving 1963-93. He was awarded a posthumous Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Barack Obama in 2014.

In 1976, Roybal founded the Congressional Hispanic Caucus and the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials, creating a national forum for La-

tino issues and opening doors for a new generation of Latino leaders, according to roybal.usc.edu/news/congressman-roybal-presidential-medal-of-freedom.

“By directing that this week should include Sept. 15 and 16, the law celebrated Hispanic Americans and the anniversaries of independence of the Latin American countries of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, as well as Mexico’s independence on Sept. 16,” according to the Library of Congress. “President Lyndon Johnson issued the first such proclamation,



which stated in part:

“Wishing to pay special tribute to the Hispanic tradition, and having in mind the fact that our five Central American neighbors celebrate their Independence Day on the fifteenth of September and the Republic of Mexico on the sixteenth, the Congress, by House Joint Resolution 1299, has requested the President to issue annually a proclamation designating the week including September 15 and 16 as National Hispanic Heritage Week.

From Wikipedia: “Sept. 15 was chosen as the start-

ing point for the commemoration because it is the anniversary of the Cry of Dolores (early morning, Sept. 16, 1810), which

marked the start of the Mexican War of Independence (it ended Sept. 27, 1821) and thus resulted in independence for the New Spain Colony (now Mexico) and the Central American nations of Guatemala, El Salvador, Costa Rica, Honduras, and Nicaragua) which became the Federal Republic of Central America.

“The 30-day period also includes many dates of importance in the Hispanic community: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua celebrate their anniversary of in-

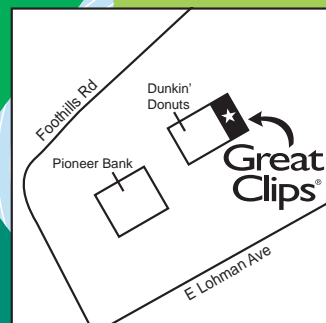
dependence on Sept. 15; Mexico commemorates its independence on Sept. 16; Chile commemorates its independence on Sept. 18; and the celebration Columbus Day or Día de la Raza.”

State senator critical of ban

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's Sept. 8 public health emergency order banning the open or concealed carry of firearms in public in Bernalillo County is "clearly unconstitutional," state Sen.

Joseph Cervantes of Las Cruces told the Bulletin.

Cervantes is a long-time Las Cruces attorney, chair of the New Mexico Senate Judiciary Committee and the senior member of the Doña Ana County legislative delegation. Like Lujan Grisham, he is a Democrat.

Cervantes said the governor's order violates both the U.S. Constitution that guarantees the right to bear arms and the New Mexico Constitution, which he said is even broader in its guarantee of a citizen's right to openly carry firearms.

Cervantes also said he "does not

find it credible" that Grisham's order falls under the definition of a public health emergency.

Albuquerque and Bernalillo County law enforcement officials have said they will not enforce the order, leading Cervantes to question the value of the order if no one

follows it.

"That's not good," he said. New Mexico "needs an effective governor who has the confidence of the public and the trust of law enforcement."

Cervantes said he expects the order, which was issued for 30 days, to be overturned in either state or federal court.

Cervantes said the governor issued the order "in response to a tragedy" that has come about because leaders in Albuquerque "have accepted a level of violence that shouldn't be tolerable. They should embrace the challenge and solve it," he said.

AG 'will not defend' governor

Tuesday, Sept. 12, New Mexico Attorney General Raul Torrez issued a letter to Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham stating his office would not defend her administration against multiple legal challenges to her Sept. 8 Emergency Public Health Order for a 30-day suspension of firearm carry laws in Bernalillo County.

"Simply put, I do not believe that the Emergency Order will have any meaningful impact on public safety but, more importantly, I do not believe it passes constitutional muster," Torrez wrote in the letter.

Lujan said she issued the order in part due to a spate of gun deaths in the Albuquerque area, specifically against young children. In his letter, Torrez acknowledged those tragedies, describing them as a "wake up call."

Torrez continued, "However, I encourage you to engage in a more thoughtful and delibera-

tive process with members of the New Mexico Legislature rather than taking unilateral action that infringes on the constitutional rights of law-abiding citizens while having little if any discernible impact on the underlying dynamics driving gun violence in our community."

In the letter, the attorney general said the attempted reach of the order, in regard to lawful firearm possession, is inconsistent with both the federal and state constitutions.

Torrez said he agreed there needs to be a statewide debate about gun violence and its "devastating impact" on New Mexicans, "especially our children," but said Grisham's order "and its flawed legal foundation is likely to obscure, rather than highlight, meaning-

ful solutions."

Later in the letter, Torrez called it "unwise" to use the definition of "public health emergency" for something he described as "fundamentally a public safety issue."

He said there is no single solution to the public safety challenges, and New Mexicans must address "multiple issues simultaneously and comprehensively to make meaningful impact. ...

"Our collective efforts should thus be engaged in a robust dialogue around each of these issues, building consensus that challenges the status quo and harnessing our once-in-a-generation budget surplus to bring about transformative change."

He closed saying he was ready to commit his office's resources to assist the governor in building a safer community "without sacrificing the constitutional rights which we have sworn an oath to preserve, protect and defend."

Sobriety checkpoints continue

The Las Cruces Police Department (LCPD) and the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Office (DASO) will continue conducting sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols throughout the month of September in an effort to reduce the number of crashes, injuries and deaths related to driving while intoxicated (DWI), the City of Las Cruces

and Doña Ana County said in separate news releases.

DASO checkpoints will be in undisclosed locations and areas within the county between the hours of 12 p.m. and 2 a.m., the county said. Deputies will look for all types of violations, with an emphasis on intoxicated drivers.

"Sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols are intended to reduce and eliminate the number

of motorists who drive while intoxicated," the city said. LCPD "officers will also be on the lookout for other traffic safety violations such as drivers using cell phones, and those who fail to properly utilize seatbelts and child safety seats."

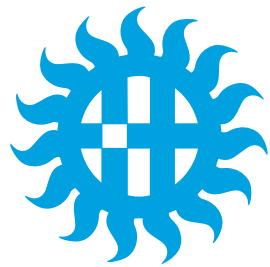

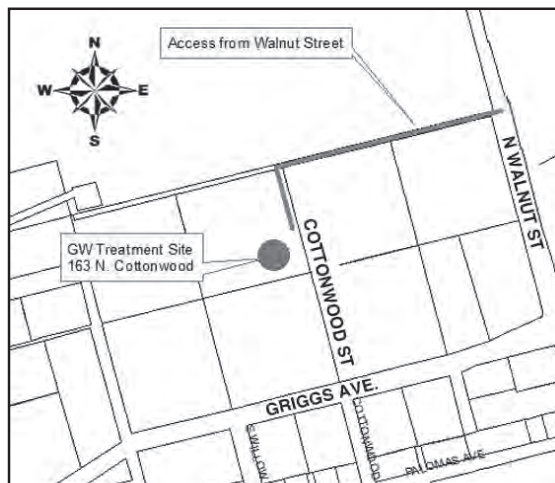

NMSU libraries hold open house Sept. 19

NMSU Library will host an open house 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 19, at Zuhl and Branson libraries at the main campus. Students, faculty and community members are invited to join and enjoy refreshments throughout the day.

The centerpiece of the open house will be the introduction of the library's new Emerging Technologies Learning Lab (ETL), a new space in Branson Library where members of the NMSU community can experience technology in a collaborative space.

"The mission of ETL is to help students understand the relationship between technology, information and knowledge," said NMSU Library Dean Kevin Comerford. "ETL is an open lab space that any NMSU student may use to develop or enhance their digital fluency skills and apply them to their own

particular field of study."

Digital fluency is a step beyond information literacy, Comerford said, and helps remove social, cultural, employment and advancement barriers.

The lab currently has 12 Alienware computers with 38-inch curved ultrawide monitors, a Meta Quest 2 VR headset, a 3D printer, Arduino kits and more."

NMSU Archives and Special Collections will exhibit historic papers and photographs from the Amador family project.

Zuhl library has a new family workstation that provides desk space for studying attached to a playpen where student parents can attend to small children, Comerford said. Another new feature is the student meditation and prayer space, and library staff will show examples of other remodeling projects that will go on later this semester.

NMSU turf specialist wins national crop science award

New Mexico State University Regents professor and turfgrass Extension specialist Bernd Leinauer has received an award from the Crop Science Society of America (CSSA) for outstanding contributions to crop science through education, national and international service and research, NMSU said in a news release.

A professor in the NMSU College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences, Leinauer was recognized for significant career contributions in turfgrass science during the last 15 years.

"I consider this award as the highlight of my academic career," Leinauer said. "The award is the highest national research award given by our society. It rewards the efforts our team has put in

over 20 years and recognizes the standing we have received nationally and internationally on the topic of turfgrass water conservation."

The award, which Leinauer will accept at a ceremony in November, includes a \$2,000 prize.

Some of the contributions that were evaluated by CSSA for this award include significance and originality of basic and/or applied research; planning and implementation of extension programs; administrative ability and effectiveness; and total impact of contributions of turfgrass science, nationally and internationally.

Leinauer added that the award recognizes the work of his team and is not just the result of his accomplishments.

"While awards are usually given to individuals, it takes a team of graduate students, post-docs, and collaborators to work on projects which lead to publications, presentations, Extension activities, all of which ultimately result in such an award," he said.

"Our research efforts have the overarching goal to find approaches that conserve water in an arid/semi-arid environment without losing aesthetic appeal, functionality or quality of the turfgrass areas," Leinauer told the Bulletin. "We are addressing the problem by adjusting or changing maintenance practices and not the turfgrass plant itself. Our investigations have shown that water use can be reduced significantly by changing/maintaining a poorly functioning and/or improperly installed irrigation system. Moreover, people growing turfgrass have very little understanding as to how much or how little water is required to grow grass. Most turfgrass areas are completely overwatered and

the perception exists that this is the amount of water turfgrass needs."

Leinauer has a Ph.D. in crop production and grassland science from Hohenheim University in Stuttgart, Germany. He has been with NMSU since March 2000, and holds a 2009 patent for a sub-surface drip installer.

Leinauer has spoken at international meetings in the Netherlands, Germany, Holland, Austria, the United Kingdom, the Czech Republic, Russia, China, Italy, Denmark, Portugal, France, South Korea, Greece, Spain, Switzerland, Canada and the United States. His topics have included "Water Management on Golf Courses," "Integrated Pest Management," "Turfgrass Selection to Minimize Water Use

Efficiency," "Managing Turf Stress," "Irrigation Technologies and Water Management," "The Future of Putting Green Construction" and "A New Species for Turf."

NMSU enrollment up

Unofficial enrollment numbers for the New Mexico State University system show an increase of nearly 3 percent systemwide over last fall, with enrollment at the Las Cruces campus surpassing pre-pandemic levels.

While enrollment data is still being finalized and is subject to change, preliminary data from the university's fall census date of Sept. 1 shows a systemwide headcount for fall 2023 of 21,829 – a 2.9 percent increase over fall 2022.

That unduplicated headcount includes 14,794 undergraduate and graduate students at NMSU's Las Cruces campus, an increase of 3.7 percent over fall 2022. First-time freshman class enrollment is up 3.4 percent over fall 2022, with 2,410 students. Undergraduate continuing student enrollment is 7,915, which is 5.4 percent higher than fall 2022. Las Cruces campus enrollment surpassed its pre-pandemic fall 2019 level of 14,296 by nearly 3.5 percent.

NMSU Global, the university's fully online campus, has more than 2,100 students – a 32.8 percent increase over fall 2022.

NMSU's community colleges also saw enrollment increases this fall. NMSU Alamogordo has 1,091 students enrolled, up 5.5 percent over fall 2022, while NMSU Grants has 837 students enrolled, an increase of 4.5 percent – which also puts the Grants campus enrollment above its pre-pandemic level. The largest community college campus, Doña Ana Community College, has 6,871 students enrolled, up 2.9

percent over last fall.

“There was severe enrollment loss at the NMSU community colleges during the pandemic,” DACC President Monica Torres said. “It was heartbreaking to see so many community college students lose valuable educational opportunities to the circumstances COVID dropped in our collective laps. As students and families experience recovered – and continue to recover – from those very challenging conditions, the NMSU community colleges are now experiencing enrollment gains. That is good news for our students and our communities.”

“The Opportunity Scholarship has improved retention, because it makes financing college predictable,” NMSU Vice President for Student Success Renay Scott said. “We’ve seen fewer students with outstanding balances and our students have less loan debt. Going to college is a full-time job for most students, and the Opportunity Scholarship has taken the pressure off for a lot of students who would otherwise have to take time off to save for tuition costs.”

Scott said the university has been working hard to

ensure students have the support they need to make it through to graduation. Programs like the Aggie Launch Pad are helping to remove some of the barriers to success that students experience. The initiative provides a laptop and additional digital literacy training and workshops to make the most of the technology.

Programs offered through NMSU's Student Success Center provide tutoring and mentoring services, financial literacy programming, career development, graduate school planning, and support for first-generation college students – all with a goal of getting students to the finish line in earning their degrees.

Currently, about 8,472 of NMSU's students systemwide will benefit from the Opportunity Scholarship during the fall 2023 term, according to Melissa Magnusson, director of Financial Aid. Since its expansion in fall 2022, the scholarship has been awarded to 10,330 NMSU students.

Once fall enrollment data has been fully verified and finalized, it will be available online at oia.nmsu.edu.

Bencomo seeks reelection

“Johana Bencomo is a leader on the city council,” fellow Las Cruces City Councilor Becky Corran said at the Aug. 26 campaign event during which Bencomo formally announced her candidacy for a second four-year term on the council.

Bencomo was elected to the city council in November 2019, winning almost 63 percent of the vote after two rounds of

ranked choice voting in the District 4 race. In the Nov. 7, 2023, election, Bencomo faces three opponents: Gabriel Duran Jr., Lorenzo M. Medina and Ramon O. Ortega. District 4 includes west Las Cruces, Las Cruces International Airport and Las Cruces Industrial and Innovation Park. (Visit www.lascruces.gov/1487/City-Council and click on “Council District Map” under Quick Links.)

Despite “an internalized need to be humble, to be quiet about our wins,” Bencomo said at the event, “quite frankly, I’ve been very good at my job. I care about people,” she said, adding that the city council has been “passing good policy” throughout her term.

Critics of Bencomo and the other five female members of the council – “women in power,” she said – “are saying awful things about us, calling us everything under the sun. This is all they can do when you’re doing a good job.”

Bencomo took office in January 2020, two months

before the onset of Covid-19.

The city council was very responsive to the pandemic, Bencomo said, quickly allocating millions of dollars that went directly to businesses and organizations partnering with the city to help those in most in need, she said.

Bencomo said other accomplishments during her first term include banning the commercial use of plastic bags; enacting zero-fare transit for the city’s public bus system;

joining with Mayor Pro Tempore Kasandra Gandara to create Project LIGHT, a crisis intervention team the Las Cruces Fire Department launched in March; the creation of two metropolitan development areas to re-develop neglected areas of the city and “be intentional about how we reinvest in these communities”; getting a \$6 million general obligation bond passed to pay for affordable housing; prohibiting landlords from discriminating against tenants based on their source of income; promoting entrepreneurship throughout the city by ensuring that new cannabis businesses are fair for all; investing millions of dollars of additional funding in the city’s pavement management program; and using federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to create a guaranteed basic income program that is providing \$500 a month for 18 months to about 450 single-care-giver homes in Las Cruces to help lift families out of poverty.

The council hired Ifo Pili as city manager in September 2020, and last month it voted to extend his contract through September 2026.

“He is an incredible human being,” Bencomo said of Pili. “He can be bold because his city council is bold.”

An early initiative for Pili was raising the minimum wage for city employees, Bencomo said, and increasing the city’s share of their healthcare benefits so there is “more pay to their families.”

“We have done incredible work at the City of Las Cruces, and we have to continue,” Bencomo said.

The city has reached “a critical moment,” she said, and must focus on its housing, mental health resources and fentanyl crises as major initiatives going forward.

New Mexico is enjoying historic levels of revenue, Bencomo said, and the city must collaborate with state legislators to bring the city the state revenue it needs to “create more housing for all income levels,” continue the transition to renewable energy; provide adequate mental health resources and substance abuse treatment; and improve bicycle and pedestrian safety, she said.

Bencomo said she also wants the city to work more closely with New Mexico State University on “how we can improve quality of life for students.”

“I’m ready to take on the challenges,” Bencomo said. “We can do this together.”

New Mexico Governor Grisham has announced an unconstitutional 30-day ban on open and concealed carry of firearms in Bernalillo County's public spaces. The Governor is attempting to accomplish this through an arbitrary public health emergency.

There are mountains of evidence and studies provided by the Crime Prevention Research Center about the ineffectiveness of gun control and cases where civilians have stopped crime. Instead of the 4.6 percent put out by the FBI, the correct number is at least 35.7 percent where armed law abiding citizens stopped attacks. In 2022, it is at least 41.3 percent. Excluding gun-free zones, it averaged over 63.5 percent.

Banning gun carry in Bernalillo County will only embolden the criminals who will continue to be armed.

The governor says her emergency mandate will probably lose if challenged in court. But no one, especially the Republicans in the legislature, will challenge this in court.

I doubt many conservative Republicans will contact their representatives or the governor. We allowed the governor to break the law during Covid. I think this proves the saying: If you allow the government to break the law during an emergency, then the government will create emergencies to break the law.

Ban distracts from possible solutions

We're all familiar with the saying "desperate times call for desperate measures."

That's apparently the motivation for Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's suspension of the state's open and conceal carry gun laws in Bernalillo County for 30 days. Recent gun deaths of a 5-year-old, an 11-year-old and a 13-year-old (shot by a 14-year-old) drove Grisham to do something, anything.

What she did, though, will essentially serve no purpose.

These children's deaths are horrific incidents, and part of a long-running nationwide epidemic of gun violence America has proved time and time again it is unwilling to do anything about.

Picture the majority of New Mexicans licensed for conceal and/or open carry of a firearm.

They are typically trained well beyond the required courses needed for the license. They are fastidious and careful about their weapons and probably spent more than \$100 on the perfect holster after extensive research.

They are typically not the drug-dealing criminals you see roaming Albuquerque on "Breaking Bad," with a pistol shoved in the front of their pants. For certain, those types do exist in New Mexico, albeit most likely without the license.

Both of those extremes illustrate how Grisham's suspension is unenforceable.

The criminal, obviously, doesn't care about any law, regardless of its origin.

In the case of the licensed carrier, most of them won't change either but, especially in the case of the concealed carry, what is law enforcement supposed to do? Hang out at the grocery store and public events and pat everyone down? I can't see that happening, and neither can Bernalillo County Sheriff John Allen.

"While I understand and appreciate the urgency, the temporary ban challenges the foundation of our constitution, which I swore an oath to uphold," Allen told the Associated Press. "I am wary of placing my deputies in positions that could lead to civil liability conflicts, as well as the potential risks posed by prohibiting law-abiding citizens

from their constitutional right to self-defense."

Grisham announced the suspension Sept. 8, and said she understood law enforcement's concerns. There's a possibility by the time you read this, a judge will have enjoined the ban.

Surely Grisham knew the backlash she would receive, and the state and federal constitutional scrutiny her order would draw.

It is important to bring attention to these tragedies, the ones in Albuquerque, as well as the ones that happen all across America with too much frequency and too often involving children.

But it seems to me the attention is now all on the ban, and we're distracted from efforts toward possible real solutions.

Wrong way to do the right thing

Three years of absolute power under an emergency order issued during the Covid-19 pandemic have apparently convinced Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham that democracy is overrated.

Last week the governor bypassed the state Legislature and acted unilaterally to pass a 30-day gun ban in Bernalillo County. The ban will outlaw both open and concealed carry in all public places, even by those with a state-issued concealed carry license.

The governor said she was spurred to action following the shooting deaths of three children, on July 28, Aug. 14 and Sept. 6. That's three deaths over a 39-day period. The city of Memphis had nearly as many fatal shootings (306) as days on the calendar in 2021.

Lujan Grisham acknowledged law enforcement has reservations about her ban. A spokesman for

the Albuquerque Police Department said they are in contact with federal authorities as to how and if they can enforce it.

"I welcome the debate and fight about how to make New Mexicans safer," Lujan Grisham said. Unfortunately, that fight will come in a courtroom and not on the floor of the state Senate and House of Representatives.

To be clear, I support what the governor is trying to do. I'm as outraged as she is at the senseless gun violence that takes place every day in our nation. The notion that the solution to gun violence is more guns makes as much sense as saying the solution to a plague of locusts is more locusts.

And, I've followed the Legislature for long enough to know

how frustrating it can be when it comes to guns. Two meaningful gun safety bills have been passed under Lujan Grisham.

One requires background checks on all sales, the other allows a court order to temporarily remove guns in a crisis situation. Passing both was like pulling teeth ... with chopsticks.

But that's how the process has to work.

Sen. Joseph Cervantes had a bill this year that would have imposed a 14-day waiting period on gun sales. But it wasn't a top priority for the governor, and it never made it to the Senate floor.

Democrats may be grateful that this governor is taking action where the Legislature has failed, but they should be mindful of recent history showing New

Mexico voters are much more likely to elect a Republican governor than a Republican majority in the House or Senate.

Ultimately, this will be decided at the ballot box. In the past, those opposed to any changes to gun laws have always been the loudest voices in the room. That needs to change, starting next November.

Voters who want common-sense gun laws need to fix this ourselves.

In the last five years, Valerie has made huge steps toward regaining her

The New Mexico climate is good for Valerie's her asthma, and her renewed health has allowed her to help the other women in her house, including ensuring the safety of her friend with a seizure disorder. Valerie has an upbeat outlook on life, and said she tries to live her life as best she can and is grateful for her friends that root her on.

Roach is a United States Marine Corps veteran who earned a Ph.D. in Russian history from Ohio

State University in 1968.

Roach's first trip to Russia and Ukraine was in 1967 while doing research for his Ph.D., ALR said.

He traveled to the region almost every year throughout the 1970s and '80s. As a professor of history during the 1990s, Roach served as consultant for Caterpillar Inc.'s joint venture efforts in Russia and Siberia and for the Samara Oblast on the Volga River.

Roach is an emeritus professor at Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois, where he taught 1968-2005 and served as director of international programs. He was among the first Americans to enter several formerly closed Soviet

cities in the 1990s, when he led delegations as often as three or four times a year to Russia and Siberia.

Roach administered numerous Eurasia Foundation grants for advanced Russian and East European students to study in the U.S., ALR said. His highest distinction was being inducted as a foreign member of the Russian Academy of Natural Sciences in Moscow in 1994.

ALR's October sessions will focus on "Nuclear New Mexico." The November topic is "Life on the Wing." December sessions will discuss "The Art of China."

ALR is a nonprofit started in 1992 by former NMSU President Gerald Thomas, along with retired deans Thomas Gale, Virginia Higbie, Flavia McCormick and others, including former professor and teacher Clarence Fielder.

ALR offers presentations from September through May each year. The presentations are often given by current or retired NMSU faculty and staff members, along with other experts.

The journey of natural gas into your home or business can be a bit of a mystery, as almost all of its path takes place in pipelines beneath the ground. However, Las Cruces Utilities (LCU) Gas Measurement Technician Justin Hise explains how natural gas travels throughout the city to the correct location and at the proper pressure.

This journey begins at Kinder Morgan's Compressor stations for the Las Cruces distribution pipeline, which dispatch high-pressure gas through gate stations. Gas pressure is stepped down from high pressure to lower pressures via Pressure Regulator Stations that feed the densely populated areas. We have many low pressure regulator stations that deliver 55 pounds per square inch (PSI) in commercial, industrial parks and 15-30 PSI for single homes and businesses.

If gas is sent from the pressure stations at over 320 PSI, how does the gas decrease to the appropriate pressure for end consumer? Various regulator stations located downstream from main gate stations flow gas to single homes and businesses at a much lower pressure. High-pressure gas lines loop natural gas around the entire city. Still, most regulator stations are low-pressure stations. These stations ensure that natural gas pressure is consistent with seasonal demand changes. Additionally, these pressure regulator stations are readily accessible to LCU gas pressure technicians to ensure that LCU customers do not experience a gas shortage during maintenance.

"Our gas system has different loops and tie-ins, so if we need to perform maintenance at a station, we have other stations in that loop that allow us to maintain and monitor

gas pressure while we conduct our overhaul," Hise explains. "This occurs at one of the several locations where you can see the pipeline. You may have seen them; the areas where the pipe emerges from the ground are regulator stations, (the points) that enable us access and resolve problematic areas."

Hise is referring to the relief valves at these locations that enable maintenance technicians to monitor safe working pressures. Pipeline maintenance is facilitated by the RANGER wireless gas pressure monitoring device,

LCU's latest addition to its gas monitoring system. The RANGER device integrates with the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system to work in tandem, monitoring gas pressure remotely, and was recently featured in the September 1st edition of the Las Cruces Bulletin.

"The RANGER monitoring devices are a lifesaver. This is all part of the ongoing evolution and development we want to bring to LCU customers. Enhancing our system with the latest technology is important because, ultimately, we want our customers to experience reliable and prompt service," Hise explains.

With over twenty years of service in LCU's Natural Gas and Energy division, Hise continues to dedicate the city's residents his knowledge and expertise. He is confident that the implemented improvements will continue to benefit LCU while keeping safety at the highest standard.

French Brothers on track for Casa for a Cause

Construction on the 2023 Casa for a Cause house, 7322 Bedford Ave. in the Metro Arcadia Phase 1 area of Metro Verde near Red Hawk Golf Course, is about a month from completion, but builders French Brothers are already looking to break the re-

cord for Casa for a Cause donations to local nonprofits.

French Brothers, a New Mexico builder that opened in Las Cruces in 2015 and currently has about 80 homes under construction on the East Mesa, had watched other Cause for a Cause builders since the project began in 2014, and decided this year was

the opportune time to take the lead on a Casa for a Cause house, said French Brothers Director of Sales and Marketing Jason Kipker.

“We want to be good stewards to the communities we’re part of,” Kipker said. “What better way to be able to do what we do and give back to the community?”

Kipker said he expects

the sale of the house – the price tag is \$413,015, and it’s still on the market – to bring in \$130,000-\$140,000 “that will be available to give back to nonprofits and charities in Las Cruces.”

That would break the record of Casa for a Cause donations by \$5,000-\$15,000, he said. And, it would push the total donated from the

sale of six Casa for a Cause houses to more than \$500,000 since the project – originally called Anniversary House – began nearly a decade ago.

Following French Brothers’ Caballo floor plan, the 2,039 square-foot home has four bedrooms, two baths and a two-car garage. It also has an incredible view of the Organ Mountains.

Kipker said 60-75 sub-contractors and vendors have joined French Brothers in this year’s Casa for a Cause, contributing labor, materials at cost or “some sort of donation,” he said.

“I haven’t had a single vendor that’s said no to us,” he said.

In fact, three different vendors offered to donate a hot-water heater for the house. French Brothers accepted one of the donations and asked the other two vendors to “pay it forward” and make their donations to future Casa for a Cause projects, Kipker said.

Ground was broken on

the 2023 Casa for a Cause house June 21.

The history

Casa for a Cause began in 2014 to commemorate Las Cruces Home Builders Association’s (LCHBA) 55th anniversary. The Hakes Brothers led the project that first year.

Once the house was sold, \$64,000 in profit was divided among local nonprofits. Veloz Homes’ Anniversary House gave back \$82,000 in 2015. In 2017, the Anniversary House built by Arista Development gave back \$74,000; Desert View Homes raised a record \$125,000 in 2019; and in 2022, JMS Construction raised \$63,000. In total, members of the LCHBA have donated \$408,000 to nonprofits to date through Casa for a Cause, and started an LCHBA Aggie Builder Endowed Scholarship at NMSU.

The Early Childhood Education Coalition of the Success Partnership will host a conference for early childhood professionals 8:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 16, in the ballroom at Corbett Center Student Union on the International Mall at New Mexico State University.

The Foundations For Success Conference (F4S) will include educators, aspiring educators, parents/guardians and interested parties from Doña Ana County and surrounding areas "to dive deeply into educator wellness, trauma-informed care, fostering healthy classroom environments, family empowerment, social-emotional learning, STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) in the classroom and more, the partnership said in a news release.

Tickets are \$10 and include breakfast and lunch. Admission is free for students, the news release said.

"The need for community-based, culturally, and linguistically responsive professional development for the professionals who

care for our children is dire, especially in a language other than English," the news release said, adding that 69 percent of the county's population is Hispanic and 49.4 percent speaks a language other than English, and about 14,000 children in the county are under 5 years of age.

"The people we trust to keep our children safe and provide them with loving care and early education are among the lowest-paid professionals in our community," the partnership said. "High-quality professional development opportunities are scarce in southern New Mexico. Typically, ECE professionals have to travel to the northern part of the state or out of state for high-quality training, often with a high price tag beyond the cost of the conference ticket."

Q: Didn't Anne Hathaway have a weekly series role some time ago?

A: She did. The Oscar winner (for "Les Miserables") got her big break in "Get Real," a Fox series that aired during the 1999-2000 season. The serio-comic show about a dysfunctional family also was the first major credit for Jesse Eisenberg ("The Social Network"), who played Hathaway's younger brother; Eric Christian Olsen, later of "NCIS: Los Angeles," also portrayed one of the show's three siblings. Though the series lasted only that one season, it didn't take long for Hathaway's movie career to get going. "The Princess Diaries" was a big hit in 2001, and though its filming meant Hathaway had to miss her first semester of college, she said later that she didn't mind. Director Garry Marshall had thought of Liv Tyler for the part, but his granddaughters weighed in and convinced him to opt for Hathaway instead, and the picture earned her an MTV Movie Award.

Returns were mixed on her movies that followed immediately, including "Nicholas Nickleby" and "Ella Enchanted," but she sampled another medium by putting her singing talents to work in a 2002 New York staging of "Carnival." She eventually got back on the box-office track with the 2004 sequel "The Princess Diaries 2: Royal Engagement" and moved from that into a variety of screen projects encompassing "Brokeback Mountain" and "The Devil Wears Prada." Hathaway has returned to TV on occasion, as a host of "Saturday Night Live" and the Oscars, and she also appeared in the streaming projects "Modern Love" and "WeCrashed" (serving as an executive producer of the latter as well). Additionally, her voice has been heard in episodes of "The Simpsons" and "Family Guy."

Dr. Imran Raza is a respected Las Cruces physician by day, and a world-class illusionist by night.

He is the founder and master illusionist at Raze Studio Illusions and Magic, with a magic shop and performance space next to his clinic, at 3320 Rinconada Blvd.

Step inside and “prepare to be amazed,” is the promise Dr. Raze – that’s his stage name, pronounced “rays” – makes to his visitors.

With seating for 50-60 people, the studio – including a stage with custom-made fireproof curtains and carpeting – is home to more than \$100,000 in the tools of illusion and magic, including a giant motorized buzz saw; the Table of Death, a bed of spikes that applies hundreds of pounds of pressure when it slams shut; a box full of spikes; the sword box, which includes 10 Samurai swords; and a world-class sound system.

And there is so much more, including disappearing from the stage and reappearing in the middle of the audience, which is one of the illu-

sions Dr. Raze has performed for full houses at the Rio Grande Theatre, Atkinson Recital Hall, the Plaza Theatre and other large venues in Las Cruces and El Paso.

In his Las Cruces studio, Dr. Raze’s magic includes card tricks, a heavy-duty staple gun illusion and illusions with his pet ball python and a magic eight ball.

As you might expect from a licensed medical practitioner, Dr. Raze’s bag of tricks includes what he calls “med-illusions ... the only heart-stopping show that can restart your heart.”

Dressed in appropriate medical costumes, Dr. Raze’s assistants vanish and reappear, and participate in “psychic surgery.” Nurses Autry and Hayden are locked in a glass box to be sawn in half by Dr. Raze, who also makes a full-sized Harley-

Davidson motorcycle disappear, and makes an even larger helicopter appear from nowhere.

“I love when I see people’s faces,” Raza said. “They are awe and in shock.”

That interaction with audience members “re-charges me,” he said. “This is my passion. You only live once.

“It’s all about practice,” Raza said, noting that it took him a solid month to perfect just three card tricks.

“Give me a pack of cards and I can drive people nuts,” he said. “It’s all about timing.”

Concentration and focus are also extremely important to making timely escapes from deadly devices and avoiding injuries that can result from spikes, sword blades

and staplers.

In addition to his med-illusions, Dr. Raze’s special performances include Halloween vampire shows, Valentine’s shows, large stage shows and charity events. He recently performed for the Paws and Pearls for Patriots fundraiser in Las Cruces.

A native of Pakistan who came to the United States in 2000, Raza has logged thousands of hours of practice and performance as an illusionist – beginning at age 6 or 7.

An A+ student, he received a magic kit as a school prize for academic performance.

“That gave me a passion for it,” Raza said.

He began practicing magic at every opportunity and spending the money he earned tutoring students on magic tricks. He was performing publicly by the eighth or ninth grade.

The only stumbling block for Raza was his father, who thought magic was a waste of time.

With the money he earned performing magic while he was still in public school in the 1990s, Raza bought a cell phone to schedule magic shows so his

clients wouldn’t call his home, where his father might answer the phone.

There were so many calls for magic

shows that Raza had to hire staff to help answer them all, and he relied on friends for rides to his performances.

The money he earned helped Raza pay his way through medical school.

He came to Las Cruces to do his medical residency at Memorial Medical Center, then opened his clinic. Raza opened the magic studio in 2019 with the slogan, “There is a touch of magic in all of us ... Stay magical.”

Studio and magic shop

Dr. Raze’s magic shop features kits for performing street magic and card magic, and there is also a deluxe magic kit. The entire studio is like a museum, with glass cases and shelves holding posters and photographs from Dr. Raze’s shows and those of his heroes, including Harry Houdini and David Copperfield, along with the memorabilia Raze has collected over the years from around the world.



A tale of 'magic realism'

'Carmela Full of Wishes' plays for only one night

The cast includes Karen Shaw as Carmela, Carlos Huereca as Big Brother, Dominick Zimmerman as Papi and Eva Cullen as Mami.

"I feel lucky to play this role," said Carlos Huereca, who plays Big Brother. Mojica "has trust in us and we have trust in her," said Huereca, who is performing in his first play at NMSU. The part of Big Brother, he said, is "like playing a younger version of myself. I understand what he went through. I see why he is the way he is."

"it's been very eye-opening to play a carefree kid," Shaw said. "Her innocence is tainted by the real world. I feel for her."

The play has an important message for children, who can "see they are not alone," she said. "It's a good play for kids, and also good for the adults."

Mami is "a feisty and sassy young mom," Cullen said. She is struggling to support her children financially and emotionally after their father is taken away, and "puts a lot of pressure on herself.

"It's a children's show," she said, but will also appeal to adults.

"Hopefully, people will laugh and cry," she said.

"It's been so fun" being a part of the production, said Cullen, who has performed in multiple plays at NMSU and other Las Cruces theatre venues.

NMSU retablo collection honors Hispanic Heritage

Many Las Cruces may be unaware of a treasure of Hispanic Heritage housed at New Mexico State University.

The NMSU Art Museum (UAM) is home to more than 2,000 Mexican retablos, religious images painted on tin plates. Housed in UAM's Margie and Bobby Rankin Retablo Gallery, it is the largest collection in the United States, according to the museum's website.

"The retablo art form flourished in Mexico during the second half of the 19th century and the early 20th century. Precedents for tin retablos can be traced to religious images placed in church altars and paintings on wood, copper, and canvas by European and Mexican artists created between the fifteenth and eighteenth centuries. Also affecting this distinctly Mexican devotion are pre-Columbian

precedents of small household gods and mold-made clay votive figurines. The 19th century Mexican tin retablo combines Mexican and European influences to create a vital and unique art form," the museum said.

"From 1963 to 1973, an important art collection started with generous donations of several Mexican retablos and objects related to sacred art by Dr. and Mrs. Andrew Babey, Pamela Babey, Dr. Reginald Fisher, Dr. and Mrs. Ezra K. Neidich, C. Andrew Sutherland, Fran E. Tolland, Helen McClure and Victor E. Clarence, along with a 2019 donation by renown retablo scholar Gloria Giffords. "Precedents for these retablos can be traced to paintings on wood, copper, and canvas by European and Mexican artists between

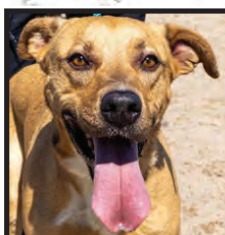

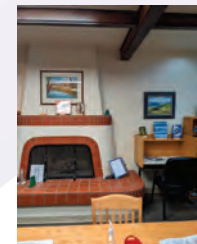

The City of Las Cruces Quality of Life Department and the City Art Board (CAB) have launched "Art Stop," a rotating art program that puts art in public places.

The goal is to make it more accessible to community members, specifically along city bus routes, the city said on its website.

For the pilot phase of Art Stop, CAB will select six original artworks, submitted in a digital format, that can be printed and placed on pre-selected bus shelters throughout the city. The artwork will be displayed for a year. If the pilot program is successful, new artwork will be installed on an annual basis.

Artists must submit artwork proposed for Art Stop via CaFE (artist.callforentry.org/festivals_unique_info.php?ID=12372), following

these specifications:

- The artwork must be original. Artwork can be a previous or a new work, digital or traditional (photographed in high-resolution, printable format).
- The format must be high-resolution photo or pdf, portrait orientation (36 inches by 74 inches), at least 300 DPI with bleed; print size is six feet, two inches by 3 feet.
- Submit one image or a collage of images.
- No mass-produced work or signage will be accepted.
- The artist should submit a short bio/artist statement and contact information with the artwork.

• The artwork must be appropriate for public display. Artwork that includes the apparent representation of violence, nudity, denigration of individuals and cultures or desecration of significant cultural symbols will be reviewed for it appropri-

ateness to be displayed, the city said. Artwork that includes religious subject matter or symbols may be placed in a public space where it cannot be revered or used in religious service and is solely for the purpose of exhibiting cultural or historical traditions.

• The artist must be 18 years old or older to participate.

• Selected artists must register as vendors with the city.

• Participating artists must sign an artist release to use their work with compensation.

• The deadline to submit art is Saturday, Sept. 30. Selected artists will receive a \$500 stipend.

Simply Fresh emerges stronger from pandemic

An injury, a chance meeting and a vision led to the formation of Simply Fresh, at 125 S. Campo St. Now, five years into their partnership, Chris Baca and Mike Gray have developed a strong team of chefs who pride themselves on their mission of making healthy food accessible and delicious.

Gray, co-owner of Simply Fresh, suffered a pectoral injury while powerlifting. After taking time to heal, he was ready to begin again and get healthy. He found himself in Nutrishop after deciding to get his life together. Gray went in to get protein and pre-workout supplements when he noticed Baca stocking BTC Fitness meals. Baca and his then business partner co-owned BTC Fitness and operated it from Nutrishop.

“Eating healthy is something I always wanted,” Gray said.

Since Gray was involved in sports and powerlifting, he thought a lot about eating healthy, but didn’t really live it. He took a couple of meals from BTC Fitness home and thought they were great. Since Gray was on medical leave from his job, he went back to see Baca and asked if he needed any help with his business. Baca agreed and Gray began talking to family, friends and anyone who would listen about food.

After a while, Baca’s business partner left, and

Gray and Baca took over the business together and rebrand it as AIM Fit Meals. Baca had prior restaurant experience with his restaurant Don Felix in Mesilla and had a food truck.

Gray said he and Baca would cook as much as they could and deliver meals the next day to customers. In 2019, their business continued to grow and Gray worked on AIM Fit Meals as he went back to work. Gray began to think he took on too much and with resistance from family members, he questioned his all-in approach to the business.

Together, Baca and Gray came to an agreement that if Gray could sell 500 meals for one day, Gray could discuss leaving his full time job. At the time, they were selling 200-300 meals. Gray recalled he went out and sold 700 meals for one day. He then put in his two-week notice at his full-time job.

At the start of 2020, AIM Fit Meals locked in a location on Campo Street. After renovations were complete in April 2020, they were ready to open their doors. However, the Covid-19 pandemic began affecting businesses. Luckily, they were able to secure a temporary license from the health inspector.

An unseen benefit from lockdown was the way AIM Fit Meals were available. Customers were able to order online for curbside pickup and delivery. As restrictions slowly lifted, they began

allow their customers to come inside their building and grab a meal to go.

All options that are still utilized today. Customers can pre-order meals on-

line Wednesday-Sunday. On Monday, customers can pick up their bag in the store, have their food delivered or pick it up curbside.

“Since people started to become more familiar with health and needing to become healthier because of the pandemic, they started to come in, ask questions and order more food,” Gray said.

Gray went on to say, “There weren’t a lot of healthy options. Gyms were shut down due to the pandemic, people were putting on weight. They did not feel good about themselves. We gave them

an out by eating our food.”

From 2019 to when they got their location, Gray said business tripled for AIM Fit Meals and has continued to grow each year.

Following a re-brand in 2022, Baca and Gray renamed their business Simply Fresh. They noticed with the name change, it made the business friendlier to all types of customer: the gym shark, police officers, the elderly, college students, healthcare workers and first responders.

“We started out because

we wanted to try to create an experience for everybody whenever you first walk in," Gray said. "I absolutely love hearing transformation stories, like, 'Hey, I've been coming here for two months and I've lost like 15 pounds or whatever. We get that all the time. It's a big thing to hear.'"

In June, Simply Fresh entered the 15th Annual Taste of Las Cruces, as more than 20 eateries in Las Cruces brought their best dishes to the competition. Simply Fresh took home the title of "Best Taste of Las Cruces."

They brought four dishes: crepes, powerball protein balls, a buffalo chicken wrap and their green chile chicken enchiladas. It was the enchiladas that won the title for

Simply Fresh.

Gray said the enchiladas are a customer favorite and they hear often that people don't believe they are healthy. Gray explained the enchiladas, like all their dishes, are made from scratch.

The enchiladas are three low-carb tortillas covered in creamy green chile sauce, shredded cheese and shredded chicken. The green chile is flavorful and spicy. Served with fluffy white rice and pinto beans, this meal is very filling.

In the future, Simply Fresh hopes to make an impact in the community by expanding their menu into kids' meals, participate in more competitions, and continue to sponsor local athletes and schools.

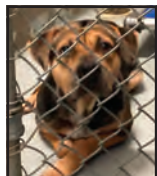
Animal Services Center has reduced adoption fees for pets

New Mexico ranks in top half of U.S. in vaccination categories

New Mexico ranks 24th among all states and the District of Columbia in vaccinations, the personal finance website WalletHub said in a September news release.

New Mexico was 22nd in children and teenager immunization rates, 25th in adult and elderly vaccination rates and 31st in immunization uptake disparities and influencing factors, WalletHub said. Disparities included children and adults living in poverty and in areas with shortages of primary-care physicians.



The top five states in vaccination rates were Massachusetts, first, followed by Rhode Island, Iowa, Vermont and Connecticut. The bottom five, 47-51, were Wyoming, Georgia, Arizona, Alaska and Mississippi. Texas was ranked 45th and Oklahoma ranked 46th.

The survey rated 14 "routine" vaccina-

tions, including polio, tetanus, measles, chickenpox, smallpox, hepatitis A and B, mumps, rubella, whooping cough, diphtheria and Covid-19.

"The World Health Organization estimates that vaccines prevent around 4 to 5 million deaths per year," the news release said.

In a July report, WalletHub said New Mexico was 34th among all states and D.C. for the best health care systems, ranking the state 25th in cost, 36th in access and 41st in outcomes.

Last week against Liberty, the Aggies took the first possession of the game, marched down the field and scored on a 10-yard touchdown from Jamoni Jones to lead 7-0. Then, after going ahead of Liberty 17-13, with 5 minutes left in the first half, the Aggies gave up

20 unanswered points the rest of the way.

"Their quarterback didn't make any mistakes," Aggie Coach Jerry Kill said after the Liberty game. "He was something. No doubt, they're one of the better teams in the conference. That being said, you can't turn the ball over three times and win the game. When you don't block, you don't tackle, you

don't do the fundamentals, eventually it's going to catch you."

The Liberty game also marked NMSU's first in its new league, Conference-USA.

Saturday's Aggie-Lobo game is on television through the Mountain West Network, and on Las Cruces radio, FM 99.5, with Jack Nixon on play-by-play and Cory Lucas as analyst.

Duran, who started his medical clinic, Southwest Center on Aging, several years ago in Las Cruces.

In the past, this tournament has provided funding for the Alzheimer's Association and Casa de Peregrinos. The partnership with local charities

has been fruitful and made a huge impact.

This tournament is all about supporting the SSSNM Charity Fund. SSSNM was founded in 2023 by Dr. Duran based on the need of his patients for support services and equipment, while recognizing the lack of affordability and resources in our community.

Due to the limitations of federal health insurance and state assistance, our older adults (often) have nowhere to turn for support. Dr. Duran's goal was to make sure no older adult nor caregiver in need would have to suffer

the limitations of losing independency. SSSNM was created to be a resource for older adults and their families in their time of need. SSSNM operates through the Community Foundation of Southern New Mexico (CFSNM), which provides support and assistance to older adults, as well as connecting them with resources in their area no matter where in New Mexico they live. CFSNM serves as a community resource, connects donors to needs, and supports charitable organizations in their work.

To help individuals take a proactive approach to their overall health, SSSNM has educational programs which provide free lectures and information at sites across the southern region of New

Mexico to promote healthy aging. The commitment of the SSSNM Charity Fund derived from the collaboration of their leadership, seasoned staff, strategic partners and loyal supporters. What began as an idea a few years ago with a charity golf tournament has now grown into a full charity fund with the goal to assist as many older adults as possible in our community and improve their quality of life.

In case you're wondering about my keen interest in supporting this worthy cause, it goes further than being an "older adult" myself.

During my work as a clinical psychologist, specializing in geriatric assessments and diagnoses, I traveled throughout southern New Mexico,

interviewing and testing patients in long term care facilities and rural hospitals. I quickly became acutely aware the difficulties, failing abilities and lack of resources that these individuals were challenged with.

In 2011, part of my work was assisting Dr. Duran in his offices by interviewing and diagnosing his patients, which sometimes meant that families needed to be informed of the lack of decisional making competency of their loved one. In knowing and working with Dr. Duran for the better part of 16 years I have realized how much of a treasure he is here in Las Cruces.
