Our schools need strong advocacy and support to fulfill their critical mission, and I'm prepared for the ...

2. Our strengths are many. The one I often point to is the staff in our schools that are performing small and big accomplishments every day. It's our staff and leadership that

drives the work happening in our schools. While funding continues to be a challenge, we are looking at unprecedented funding levels in our state. We have great community partners who are enhancing student experiences.

Also, the lack of continuity at the superintendent level has inhibited our ability to set and maintain long-term goals, and to improve as a district.

3. Ideally, all graduates of LCPS should be bilingual. For non-English speaking students, bilingual education is vital for their success. I believe multicultural education improves outcomes for underperforming students.

4. We can improve reading skills with consistent assessment and remediation; this can be done informally in the classroom without the use of standardized tests. Math skills can be improved with the use of hands-on activities that promote concepts. Increasing student confidence will also improve their outcomes. This is all enhanced with parental involvement.

Supervisors are elected on a nonpartisan basis to 4-year staggered terms and serve without salaries. The supervisors work with the rest of the governing body to conserve the natural resources of the state, provide for flood control, preserve wildlife, and protect the tax base. They coordinate assistance from all available sources – public, private, local, state and federal – to develop locally driven solutions to natural resource concerns.
