NMSU fueling cyber security, grid innovations



"We are preparing for the grid of the future," New Mexico State University computer science professor Satyajayant "Jay" Misra said about the research he and 11 Ph.D. students are doing on the Las Cruces campus to modernize and secure the electric grid.

The grid is an interconnected network of producers and consumers that provides electricity to thousands of homes and businesses in Las Cruces and to billions of people worldwide. NMSU is engaged in wide-ranging research to make the grid



"NMSU has an electric power program with researchers across campus contributing to building the resilient and sustainable grid of the future," he said.

New Mexico State is helping to create self-sustaining, customerdriven microgrids across the



state, Misra said; it is studying the use of brackish water widely available in southern New Mexico to generate hydrogen as a source of renewable energy for the grid; and building grid resilience during weather extremes.

Misra leads the Cybersecurity Resilience Research Group at NMSU, which "is exploring the different dimensions from which malicious actors can adversely impact our critical infrastructure," he said. The goal is to prevent phishing and other online attacks on the grid – and on NMSU in general, which is subject to myriad cyber probes every day, Misra said. By studying attacks that have really happened and creating even more serious potential attack scenarios, Misra and his students hope to stay a step ahead of cybercriminals.

"We're trying to think like them," Misra said. "You close all the doors and lock them," he said, create firewalls and "several levels of failsafe," and keep a close watch for any signs of danger or potential danger.

Misra, his students and other power grid researchers on cam-

pus are also working to make the grid more autonomous.

"Many things on the grid still require a human's intervention," he said. That makes a power outage more likely if, for example, a transformer goes down and there is no human to deal with it and no automatic backup in place.

It's also important to build the grid's reserve capacity, Misa said, so the electricity is there no matter how large the demand or what the weather is like.

This past July, for example, El Paso Electric (a key NMSU partner in grid modernization) experienced its highest single-

Garcia has spent a lifetime living Hispanic heritage

Once upon a time, J.F. Apodaca built a ballpark.

The park was – still is
– in La Mesa, in southern
Doña Ana County just
a couple of blocks from
everyone's favorite landmark,
Chope's bar and restaurant.

In the late 1950s, when the ballpark was still young, a young pitcher named George Garcia often took the mound for the La Mesa Blue Jays.

Apodaca's daughter, Mary Helen, was around the ballpark enough to know some players but, for her, George stood out.

"I was 23," says Mary Helen

today. "There was an attraction there."

Enough of an attraction they married

a year or so later, at the old St. Genevieve's Church in Las Cruces. The attraction lasted lasted 49 years, until George died less than a year before their 50th anniversary.

Many in Las Cruces know Mary Helen Garcia from her work as a representative in the New Mexico Legislature, where she served from 1997-2014. Her first foray into politics, however, was behind the scenes, about a decade before, as campaign manager for J. Paul Taylor.

"Paul was very reluctant," Garcia said. "But I ran his campaign. I said, 'You run and I promise you I'll run when I'm able to."

The campaign was successful, to say the least, as Taylor served his Mesilla district in the New Mexico House of Representatives from 1987-2005.

She and Taylor, both educators, were motivated to run for office because they didn't like what was going on at the state level in terms of education.

Garcia, whose first work, be-

fore raising family, was teaching third great at Mesilla Elementary, returned to education when her children grew up, working at Las Cruces Public Schools coordinating bilingual education, and then serving as an assistant principal at Booker T. Washington Elementary, where she was very hands-on.

"When a student was absent, I'd drive to their neighborhood," Garcia said. "Sometimes I'd see them looking through the window. So I'd go to the door and say, 'Get dressed. We're going to school."

True to her word to Taylor, when she finally did retire, she ran for office, to join him in Santa Fe. Garcia took pride in giving voice to her constituents in the southern part of the county.

"Nobody ever recognized Sunland Park as part of Doña Ana County until I got there," she said.

She is proud of her role in helping bring Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad through Santa Teresa, and ensuring bilingual ballots for Spanish-speaking citizens in District 34.

Having grown up in a society where speaking Spanish was shunned, Garcia and Taylor wanted English Second Language learners to have a place in New Mexico's education system.

'Project Clothesline' honors domestic violence survivors

A bright yellow T-shirt hung silently at last year's "Project Clothesline" event at New Mexico State University. The tiny words "I wasn't heard," written in marker, spoke loudly not only for one survivor of domestic violence, but for all those who read her message.

Hundreds of people saw those words and other messages written by abuse survivors on more than 100 other tee shirts at 2022's "Project Clothesline" display at NMSU. This year, the event is among many activities across Las Cruces recognizing Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October.

NMSU's Department of Criminal Justice is hosting "Project Clothesline" again. More than 100 T-shirts with personal messages written by survivors will hang on clothesline strung across the room for visitors to view from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 17 in the Aggie Lounge on the first floor of the Corbett Center. Twelve local agencies and campus organizations will have tables to answer questions and provide resources for those who visit.

"This is a unique platform to share their survival stories and understand the prevalence of violence and abuse," said Ahram Cho, criminal justice professor and organizer of the event. "One of the most common pieces of feedback I received from last year's event was that students thought they were the only ones. The event serves to create a sense of solidarity and a safe environment for students to raise their voices."

The Office of Health Promotion (OHP) under the Aggie Health and Wellness Center at NMSU is cohosting the "Clothesline Project" this year. OHP is a risk-reduction and prevention program that educates on issues of personal safety and wellbeing.

The "Clothesline Project" is an interactive exhibit, displaying anonymous stories of many forms of interpersonal violence. The displayed tee shirts are color coded with 11 different colors: yellow representing domestic violence and assault; red, pink and orange represent survivors of rape and sexual assault; blue and green represent survivors of incest and sexual abuse; and white represents someone who died because of violence.

"We also wanted to make sure students weren't being promoted until they could fully pass the assessments at third-grade level," Garcia said.

As a way of recognizing his work, and his life beyond the legislature, Garcia at the 2013 session, introduced House Memorial 79, "celebrating the adventurous life of former State Representative J. Paul Taylor."

Garcia was asked recently, What does being Latina mean to you?

"It's a whole culture," she said. "The family."

Then she added, with a tequila glass in hand, "The parties!"

She remembers specifically the harvest celebrations her mother and father would host for the

field workers and everyone involved with the farm.

"They would kill three or four hogs, and put them in the ground," Garcia said. "And cook them all night long. There would be chile, green and red, and fresh made tortillas."

She also loved the music. "The songs sound much more romantic when they're sung in Spanish," Garcia said. "Much more so than in English."

She also found a taste for a certain Mexican delicacy.

"I never really drank," Garcia said. "I didn't care for beer. And then I had some tequila, and that was it. I like the silver, blanco tequila. I don't like it sweet."

demand day in history because of the recordbreaking heat.

NMSU wants to help prevent rolling blackouts like the huge one in 2003 that affected an estimated 50 million people in the U.S. and Canada, and the two-day outage earlier this summer that affected more than 40,000 people during 110-degree heat in Phoenix.

That's where micro-grid technology comes into play, Misra said.

"With smaller, independently operable microgrids, and the integration of renewable energy, there is greater energy availability for everybody and greater resilience," he said.

Greener technology is an important part of improving the grid, Misra said,

including more energy-efficient residential and commercial construction and continuing the move toward all-electric or hybrid vehicles. It also means transitioning the grid from traditional power sources like coal and diesel fuel to wind and solar power, which can be more distributed.

"We do a lot of cool stuff," Misra said. "We could do more."

For Misra, "This is a calling. As a teacher and a researcher, I can make a significant difference in somebody's life," he said. "My job is to make the world a better place. What drives me is the opportunity to learn about and help fix problems, preparing the next generation to take over while I am doing so. I don't think it gets any better than that."

NMSU faculty typically

produce more results based on the resources they have available than other universities, he said. "That's something that makes me proud."

Misra has a master's of science degree in information systems and physics from Birla Institute of Technology and Sciences in Rajasthan, India, and a Ph.D. in computer science from Arizona State University. He is a professor in computer science and electrical and computer engineering, the associate dean of research in the NMSU College of Engineering and an affiliated scientist/faculty with Los Alamos National Laboratory. Misra, who joined NMSU in 2009, holds two patents and is the author or co-author of more than 100 papers and book chapters and has been cited more than 8,000 times by his peers.

Tents to Rents surpasses \$110,000

Mesilla Valley Community of Hope's (MVCH)
Tents to Rents campaign has raised more than \$500,000 since MVCH Executive Director Nicole Martinez began the campaign in 2016.

This year, Tents to Rents raised a record-setting \$110,000, and it is still collecting donations.

The money will be used to move residents of MVCH's Camp Hope tent city into their own apartments, and to pay other Camp Hope operating expenses.


"It's absolutely outstanding that we have such a giving community," said state Sen. Carrie Hamblen of Las Cruces, who was the emcee for the Tents to Rents thank you celebration held Oct. 4 at Salud! de Mesilla. Hamblen is the former MVCH board chair and long-time MVCH supporter. She raised more than \$1,500 and was this year's top individual fundraiser for Tents to Rents.

Hamblen and other fundraising partners and sponsors – including the Las Cruces Bulletin – were recognized at the celebration.

Good Sam's Housing Helpers was recognized as 2023's top fundraiser for Tents to Rents at more than \$21,100. Marci Dickerson and Friends raised more than \$6,200, Of the Same Ilk: more than \$5,100, Unitarian Universalist Church: more than \$5,000, St. Andrews Episcopal Church: more than \$4,000, Hearts for Hope: more than \$1,900, Temple Beth El: almost \$1,700, Doña Ana Community College President Monica Torres: \$1,350 and Nigel Holman: almost \$1,300.

New Mexico State University's Office of Experiential Learning raised almost \$4,500 with its Color Run 5K fundraiser for the campaign, and the Hops for Hope pub crawl raised almost \$1,500, with support from The Game, Little Toad Creek, Ice Box Brewing Company and Spotted Dog Brewery.

Martinez has tripled the \$700,000 budget she had when she became executive director 10 years ago, Hamblen said.

Gov. mandates buy-backs

On Oct. 6, Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham renewed executive orders on gun violence and substance misuse as the New Mexico Department of Health (NMDOH) issued a revised public health order.

The new public health order includes an additional provision:

"The New Mexico Department of Public Safety shall organize safe surrender events (also known as "gun buybacks") in the cities of Albuquerque, Española and Las Cruces within 30 days."

"The fact of the matter is that New Mexicans are still being threatened, injured and killed by firearms," the NMDOH order said. "Just yesterday, two guns were found in the possession of students at an Albuquerque high school, and while thankfully no one was hurt, these incidents have profound psychological effects on our children.

"The last four weeks have clearly demonstrated the impact we can have on violent crime when we work in better coordination, but the situation remains dire. We're not letting up, and I'm continuing to make investments that drive down violence in our communities and protect our children."

"Gun violence is a leading cause of death among young people in New Mexico. That should horrify all of us," DOH Secretary Patrick Allen said.

"It's vital that we all

Unique dean steers unique college

There may not be another college anywhere quite like New Mexico State University's College of Health, Education and Social Transformation (HEST).

"It's very unique," said HEST inaugural Dean Yoshitaka "Yoshi" Iwasaki, Ph.D., who came to NMSU a year ago after living and working in 10 cities in three countries.

HEST formed in 2021, bringing together nine academic departments: borderlands and ethnic studies; counseling and educational psychology; communications disorders; kinesiology; public health sciences; sociology; and NMSU's schools of nursing; social work; and teacher preparation, administration and leadership.

The college also includes a diagnostic center that provides autism evaluations to southern New Mexico families at no cost, a speech and hearing center, exercise physiology and behavior sports psychology labs, Doña Ana County Head Start and a STEM outreach center.

"Learn. Engage. Transform." was chosen as the HEST slogan after Iwasaki solicited suggestions from students, faculty, staff and alumni.

"This slogan nicely captures the centerpiece of who we are, what we do and why we matter to highlight the signature strength of our college," Iwasaki said in an NMSU news release.

"We are producing transformative champions who are making a difference in our community," Iwasaki told the Bulletin.

Focused on NMSU's mission as a Hispanic- and minority-serving university, HEST faculty and the students they teach "are as diverse as possible," the dean said.

"We are creating the pathways," Iwasaki said, for public school students to flourish at NMSU and for

New Mexico State graduates to excel in the workforce.

"We think big," said HEST Communications Specialist Amanda Adame. "We are creating the people who are going to transform systems. We're putting the boots on the ground."

And even though it's new, HEST is "always searching for ways to grow," the dean said, "trying to catch up with the demand" for teachers, counselors, social workers, nurses, psychologists, communications disorders specialists, sociologists and experts in human movement the college is producing.

"Overall, HEST itself is a community of learning and engagement, as a catalyst for social change and transformation to uplift our people and communities we serve," Iwasaki said in the news release.

Mental health is a college focus of particular importance to Iwasaki because his brother not only suffered from depression, he was also subjected to the stigma of a mental illness that had no effective treatment, Iwasaki said. That compelled Iwasaki to research mental health issues, including effective treatment. Iwasaki's curriculum vitae includes multiple references to mental health and mental illness and to suicide loss and survival.

HEST students and faculty have connected with the Mesilla Valley Community of Hope to "help us find solutions besides medication" for people with mental health issues, and to address homelessness in the community, Iwasaki said.

It's about "how we build the relationships and create the environment so those people feel welcome, safe and appreciated," he said. "They have been abandoned; they give up."

Pathways to recovery can include saying hello and making eye contact with someone who is struggling with homelessness, reaching out to that person and building a relation-

ship, Iwasaki said, as he invited the community to join HEST students, faculty and partners "to help us in creating transformation."

In the community and on the NMSU campus, that means addressing basic needs like housing, food and transportation, the dean said.

"It's about making a difference," Iwasaki said. "I'm proud of being an Aggie. I'm very grateful for the opportunity. I'm very blessed."

"This is the most welcoming place," he said. "I call Las Cruces home."

Iwasaki came to NMSU from San Jose State University, where he served as a full professor and chair of the Department of Public Health and Recreation. Before that, Iwasaki was associate dean for research and director of the Community-University Partnership for the Study of Children, Youth and Families at the University of Alberta, Canada. He was previously a professor in the Department of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences at Temple University in Philadelphia, and was a professional tennis instructor in both Tokyo, Japan, and Hilton Head Island, South Carolina.

Iwasaki has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in applied health sciences from the University of Waterloo in Ontario, Canada. Candidates address builders at mayoral forum

Six of the seven candidates running for mayor of Las Cruces participated in an Oct. 5 forum hosted by the Las Cruces Home Builders Association.

Present were Mike Tellez, Eric Enriquez, Alexander Paige Baca Fresquez, Kasandra Gandara, Isabella Solis and Gina Ortega. The one candidate absent was Mariah Hernandez.

The questions presented to the candidates were based in topics relevant to home builders and construction professionals, such as building costs, affordable housing and economic development.

Here are some of the candidates' comments on building costs and how city policies might affect them.

Enriquez: In Hobbs, I oversaw codes enforcement. What we need to do is look at the valuation of builders and what we can do about time, we need to expedite our procedures on permitting. Time is money.

Tellez: We need to look at places like Phoenix, that work with contractors. Here, we run off contractors. Our high minimum wage is also driving up costs for contractors.

Gandara: There are lots of different factors. I'll get involved with schools, The city has purchased very costly software that should be making it easier to reduce time frames. We have a one-stop shop and I know there are still some issues with that and the city needs to work on that. We have to build consensus to ensure we have good policy for you.

Solis: We need to make sure when a policy is implemented, if it is inhibiting to what we are doing in our community, we need to review it.

Ortega: We know it's an issue. We need to review the policy. Why is the policy hindering them from doing what they have to do. Can that policy be changed? What can we do in order to help?

Here are some of the candidates' comments regarding affordable housing, and what a mayor might be able to do to address it:

Solis: We need to create

incentives and work on the policies we have in place right now as far as the delays. I think affordable housing has its purposes and as a mayor I think I could help in that process to be able to change some of those things.

Fresquez: Let the open market, the free market, solve the problem by building more houses that are the size and cost that meet the needs.

Gandara: I think we need a variety of housing stock, and that means looking at our continuum, ensuring that we have the proper transitional housing, permanent housing, missing middle, those are the things that are really important to all of us.

Enriquez: In Hobbs, we kept it simple. We got rid of a lot of regulation that

hinders us here. Above all, mindset of people in the city needs to be that it's more important to us. We've got to show that what you're doing for us is so important that we need to get it out and we need to get it done quickly.

Tellez: I'm amazed at

how we keep on lowering everything to meet people who do not want to go out and work hard and do what we all did to go out and buy a home. So what is an affordable house? Is it a government house or is it just a house that anyone can buy?

Got triskaidekaphobia?

Friday the 13th... Eek! It is such a powerful phenomenon, this combination of date and day of the week that occurs at least once a year (including this Friday) has its own designated phobia, slashermovie franchise and a Wikipedia page of more than 4,000 words.

The fear of the unluckiness of 13 is called triskaidekaphobia. The aforementioned Wikipedia says the origin may have come about from an ancient Norse myth "about 12 gods having a dinner party in Valhalla. The trickster god Loki, who was not invited, arrived as the 13th guest. He tricked one god into killing another god at the party, and "the whole

earth mourned."

In Christian mythology, the superstition around the number 13 may to relate to "the story of Jesus' last supper and crucifixion in which there were 13 individuals present in the Upper Room on the 13th of Nisan (the first month of the Jewish New Year) Maundy Thursday, the night before his death on Good Friday," again quoting Wikipedia.

Another theory suggests the 13 heebie-jeebies has to do with the destruction of the legendary Knights Templar.

The story goes that on Friday, Oct. 13, 1307, more than 600 Templars were arrested on the orders of King Phillip of France, who had accused them of black magic, scandalous sex practices and corruption, because he owed them money.

"Credit for popularizing the Friday the 13th myth often goes to Capt. William Fowler, a noted soldier who rubbed elbows with former presidents and other highprofile people of the late 1800s," according to a story in livescience.com. "Fowler noticed that the number 13 was woven throughout his life (he went to Public School No. 13 in New York City, for example, and fought in 13 Civil War battles), so he decided to combat the "popular superstition against 13," according to his obituary.

Fowler started a society called the Thirteen Club, which held its first meeting on Sept. 13, 1881. Guests walked under crossed ladders to a 13-seat table festooned with spilled salt.

The other day, as I was driving since I was 16. through traffic, something very jarring caught my eye.

A few days later, I saw the same guy and my bike at a homeless encampment. It had become a primary mode of transportation for him.

when that bicycle hung upside down from my ceiling in my garage.

The guy had strapped a milk crate to the rear bike rack I had mounted shortly after buying the bicycle many years ago.

It may not have looked very cool, but very practical for the new owner.

A little over a year ago, I put my 1987 Panasonic Mountain Cat 4500 up for sale. I was the original owner of this unique mountain bike. Despite how much I liked it, though, it was out of date. With no front shocks, and a heavy frame, the cat was inferior to today's more updated mountain bikes.

Just as cars and trucks have improved in the last 35 years, so have bicycles.

I advertised the bike as a collector's item in good condition for \$265, and identified myself as its original owner. Panasonic didn't make mountain bikes for a very long period, but as it did with stereos before, it tried to do some cool things, such as a "Biopace" sprocket. Rather than the traditional round sprocket, Panasonic flirted with a sort of kidney-bean shaped sprocket with supposed ergonomic efficiencies.

I got a call right away and was excited at the prospect of a quick sale.

But a sale never happened. Instead, it was an elaborate scam attempt, and I narrowly avoided

getting ripped off for \$1,250. (Thank you, Pioneer Bank for helping me dodge that fleecing).

So after hearing a presentation from Velo Cruces about the Hub, I thought maybe I could donate the old Mountain Cat.

When I took the bike to the Hub one Saturday, several of the people working there got excited, like I'd just brought in proof of Bigfoot.

I wondered who might wind up with my longtime prized possession, and had sort of resigned myself to never knowing.

But when that unmistakable red and pearl bicycle toodled along beside me that day, it was a bit of an out-of-body experience.

And I'm grateful it's being used by someone for whom it can make a difference.

Voters need to pick more than the winner

Early voting started Tuesday, Oct. 10, in a municipal election that will result in Las Cruces electing a new mayor for the first time since 2007 and Mesilla electing a new mayor for the first time since 2009.

Voters in Las Cruces will have several candidates to choose from in the race to replace Ken Miyagishima. Unfortunately, that's not the case in Mesilla, where Russell Hernandez will run uncontested to replace Nora Barraza.

That's not a criticism of Hernandez, a small business owner with deep roots in the community. He's an outstanding candidate, but voters should have a choice.

They will in Las Cruces, where seven candidates are running for mayor, and more than two candidates are running in most of the City Council and school board races. In those races, rankedchoice voting will determine the winner.

That means instead of just picking the winner, voters need to evaluate all the candidates to get the full value from their ballot. Those ranked last will be the first eliminated.

That's just one way municipal elections, held in odd-numbered years, are different from state and local elections. Candidates in local elections run on their own, without party affiliation. There is no "R" or "D" after each name on the ballot.

That opens the door for Independents to run, as well as those who have no use for the state and local political machines. And it removes the crutch for voters who lazily make all choices based on party affiliation.

Beyond the mayor's race, there are also City Council races in District 1 (west of Interstate-25 between Spruce and Engler) Dis-

trict 2 (south of Boutz/Missouri) and District 4 (east of Main Street and south of El Camino Real). Council members Becki Graham and Becky Corran are

> not up for re-election until 2025.

Mayor Ken Miyagishima is the only member not seeking re-election this year, although Kasandra Gandara is vacating her District 1 seat to run for mayor. Ranked-choice voting could potentially

come into play in every race except in District 2, where incumbent Tessa Abeyta is being challenged by only one opponent, former Mayor Bill Mattiace.

All three incumbents will also be running for re-election to the Las Cruces Board of Education, where seats in Districts 1, 4 and 5 are on the ballot this year. Ranked-choice voting will be used in both Districts 4 and 5.

A layman's introduction to the Las Cruces City Charter


In 28 pages, the City Charter (2019) embodies the structure of self-governance agreed upon by the voters of Las Cruces. First codified in 1985, the Charter has been amended five times to remain a living document. As a city councilor in 2019, my fellow councilors and I approved the changes being recommended for revision authorizing the amended charter to go before the voters of Las Cruces for approval.

The Charter is divided into 10 sections. Section 1 states Las Cruces is organized as a Municipal Corporation to maximize local self-government. The city declares certain powers for governance, lays out its geographical borders, and imposes limits on powers as required by federal and state statutes and constitutions.

Section 2 covers the establishment and maintenance of a seven-member city council. Divided into six distinct districts (subject to change after each national census), voters in each district choose their individual City Councilor. The seventh member, the mayor, is elected by voters of all six districts. The mayor chairs all meetings of the council and is recognized as head of the city

The powers and duties of the city manager are clearly stated; "appoint, suspend or remove all administrative officers and employees, subject to the limitations and procedures established in the Charter and in any personnel rules adopted by the council." Meeting attendance requirements, budget, and capital improvements responsibilities, annually reporting a complete summary of finances and activities, keeping the council fully advised, and other duties as specified or required by the council.

Section 4 discusses the administration of the city and describes how the council controls policy, and the city manager

"The administration of the affairs of the City of Las Cruces shall be divided into organizational units established by the council. All organizations units shall be under the direction and supervision of the city manager," is an example of that separation of powers and duties. A personnel system is to be maintained by administration respecting the required council ordinance. A city attorney licensed to practice in New Mexico is to be appointed by the city manager and serve as legal advisor to council, the city manager, and all organizational units of the city. A city clerk is to be appointed by the city manager. Also, "the coun-

Section 6 covers the duty of city council to plan for the "coordinated and harmonious" development of the city. A comprehensive plan must be adopted by resolution to guide such development.

Section 7 discusses city elections, how they are to be planned and executed. Much of this section was revised by the 2019 amended version of the Charter which includes election management by the city to administration by the county.

Section 8 details the authority to institute initiatives, referendums and the recall of elected officials. Petitions, referendum petitions, and actions on them are discussed in detail.

Section 9 describes the municipal court. Section 1 of the City Charter states that the city is limited to administering penalties of misdemeanor charges only. Section 9 then prescribes how those determinations are to be handled. In this section, the city council's responsibility is to authorize additional judges if it decides there is such a need, and to appoint a municipal judge to fill a vacancy. A municipal judge is to be elected for a four-year term by voters of the city.

Section 10 outlines general provisions which tell how all by-laws, ordinances, and resolutions in force when the amended charter takes effect "are repealed and superseded to the extent that the same are inconsistent with the provisions of this Charter. All other resolutions and ordinances remain in full forces and effect." It then discusses existing ordinances and resolutions, the duration of same, and that "all rights and property which were vested in the city shall remain so vested under this Charter. No existing right or liability and no pending litigation of any kind shall be affected by the adoption of this Charter."

I encourage you to read and understand the city charter for yourselves. Since municipal elections are just days away, informed voters will better understand the importance of their choices.

Will city listen to Veterans?

In a recent City Council vote, a contentious issue emerged that has stirred the passions of the community, particularly its Veteran members. The topic at hand is the proposal for a civilian memorial in one of our city's cherished parks, a move that has sparked a fiery debate among residents and Veterans alike. Tragically, an unattended child lost her life at Veterans Memorial Park last year, and a proposal to erect a memorial for this child at the park was introduced to the City Council. The Veterans Advisory Board has met many times with unanimous opposition to this proposal. We, the Veterans, offered our condolences and alternate options, including a memorial erected in the median across from, or even adjacent to the bus stop at the entrance of the park.

As a resident and an engaged member of the Veteran community, I, like many others, have concerns about this proposition. The proposal for a non-Veteran memorial has raised questions about the allocation of resources and the true purpose and intent behind this decision, including both its construction and inevitable lifelong maintenance. As per city ordinance and Las Cruces Parks and Recreation policy, Veterans Memorial Park is a special-use park, reserved exclusively for the remembrance of those who made the ultimate sacrifice. However, the City Council voted in support of this proposal, despite city ordinance, Parks and Rec policy, and against

the advice from the Veterans Advisory Board.
The near-unanimous opposition from the Veteran community brings to light the need for a more comprehensive discussion and reconsideration of this proposition.

Having served in both Iraq and Afghanistan, I understand the importance of commemorating those who have sacrificed their lives for our nation. When I walk through Veterans Memorial Park, I feel honored to be surrounded by family. As brothers and sisters in arms, all Veterans are united in this feeling. Erecting this memorial is no different than erecting a memorial for non-relatives at a family member's resting place. It is disrespectful to both our Las Cruces family and to our family across the United States of America.

What adds to the controversy is the exception made to previously established rules, which has raised eyebrows and created an air of inconsistency. The City Council's decision to deviate from established procedures has fueled skepticism and added to the confusion surrounding this issue. One of the more alarming concerns raised by this is the establishment of a new precedent. If one local civilian has a memorial erected on hallowed Veteran grounds, what is to stop it from happening again? This erodes honor and decimates the sacrifice these men and women made for our country. Las Cruces has designated itself a Purple Heart City, which is a designation meant for a municipality that expresses gratitude toward and honors those who have been wounded

or killed in defense of this nation. Ironically, the City Council's actions are opposite of those to be expected of a Purple Heart City.

The Veteran com-

munity, which is deeply

rooted in the spirit of unity and collective decision-making, feels a sense of disconnection and frustration over the lack of consultation in this matter. The nearunanimous opposition emphasizes the need for transparent communication and an inclusive approach when making decisions that impact the community. Our City Council must recognize the concerns raised by the Veteran community and engage in open dialogue to better understand the perspectives and values that unite us. We must work together to find a solution that honors the sacrifice of Veterans while ensuring the interests of the community at large are represented. If the City Council is unwilling to listen to and embrace advice from Veterans about Veterans, then perhaps it is time to elect new leadership in our city. I encourage all Veterans and locals alike to reach out to your council members and ask city leadership, "Why?", when they come knocking at your door for votes.

In the spirit of collaboration and understanding, let us hope that the City Council reevaluates this decision and explores alternative ways to address this issue while respecting the sacrifice of our servicemembers and maintaining the unity that defines our community.



Republicans to appeal decision on CD 2 maps

After a two-day bench trial in Lovington, New Mexico Fifth Judicial District Court Judge Fred T. Van Soelen of Clovis ruled Oct. 6 that while Democrats succeeded in "substantially diluting their opponents votes" in the state's Second Congressional District, the congressional redistricting map adopted by the state legislature in

2021 "does not violate the (New Mexico Republican Party's) equal protection rights" under the state constitution."

The Republican Party of New Mexico (RPNM) said it will appeal the ruling.

The legislature, with Democrats in control of both the state Senate and House of Representatives, approved Senate Bill 1 in a special session, redrawing the state's three congressional districts based on the 2020 census. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, a Democrat, signed the bill into law.

The new map "altered the previous congressional districts," Van Soelen said in his ruling, "adding all of Lincoln and De Baca counties and part of Otero County to CD (congressional district)

1. It added part of Eddy and Lea counties to CD

3. It split Chaves County, previously exclusively

in CD 2, into all three (3) congressional districts. It also made changes in and around Albuquerque in Bernalillo County, and parts of Valencia, Sandoval and Santa Fe counties.

With those changes, the state Republican Party said in its lawsuit, the redistricting map "deeply fractures" the state's southeast region by splitting it among all three congressional districts.

In his ruling, Van

Soelen, a Republican, agreed that the "predominant purpose in redrawing CD 2 ... was to entrench the Democratic in Party in power by diluting the votes of citizens favoring Republicans (and) "the resulting dilution of the (Republican) vote was substantial."

However, the judge said the way the map was drawn does not rise "to the level of an egregious gerrymander." As stated by the New Mexico Supreme Court in a previous ruling, "some degree of a partisan Gerrymander is permissible," Van Soelen wrote. "It is only when partisan gerrymanders are 'egregious' that constitutional protections are indicated."

"Given the variables that go into predicting future election outcomes, coupled with the competitive outcomes of the only

Estrada makes second quest for city council

"I'm a very concerned citizen, that's the only reason I'm running," Las Cruces City Council district one candidate Jason Estrada said at a Sept. 28 Coalition of Conservatives in Action forum.

Estrada, a Las Cruces native and small business owner, is making his second bid for city council. He received 5.4 percent of the vote among four candidates and was eliminated after the first round of ranked choice voting in the 2019 district two council race. He withdrew from the 2021 mayor's race.

In this year's district one race, Estrada is running against Cassie McClure, Daniel Buck, Patrick Potter and Mark O'Neill. Incumbent Kasandra Gandara is giving up the seat to run for mayor. The election is Nov. 7. Early voting began Oct. 10.

Any of the five would do a good job if elected, Estrada said.

"Everybody's in this together," he said. "Red or blue doesn't matter. They're focused on change."

Estrada said change means

electing a mayor and city councilors who represent their constituents rather than a personal or political agenda, doing a better job of fighting crime and supporting small businesses. Estrada

owns Everything Las Cruces, which he said has the largest social media outreach in southern New Mexico.

Estrada said he learned a lot from his first bid for public office in 2019 and is more knowledgeable about city government and more frustrated, but also more passionate, than four years ago.

"It all ties in together," Estrada said about the issues facing city government.

Poverty creates homelessness and contributes to drug addiction and mental health issues, he said, and "that breeds crime." Overcoming poverty means supporting small business to strengthen the city's economy.

"Small businesses are the backbone of our community," Estrada said.

One way the city could assist small businesses is helping pay

for damage caused by vandalism, including the broken windows that business owners, including Estrada, have experienced across the city, he said.

For some, the choice comes down to replacing the window or paying the rent, Estrada said.

Another way the city could help is doing more to stop theft in retail businesses, he said.

The city also needs to do a better job of allocating resources to help people in poverty who don't have access to health care, Estrada said, and helping parents by paying for their children's school supplies.

"The economy touches everything," Estrada said.

In addition to providing better support to existing small business, the city should do more to attract businesses to Las Cruces, he said, including "businesses that relate to children" and appeal to the city's young population to give them something to do and a place to go.

And, the city should provide more resources to make new and existing businesses successful and to encourage entrepreneurs, Estrada said, including asking local business professionals to lead free workshops on how to balance a checkbook, file taxes, write a business plan and more.

"Everybody wants to make a million dollars, but they don't know how to make their first dollar," he said.

The workshops should also be offered to high school students and college graduates.

"It seems like such a simple thing," he said, "but it doesn't get done."

Reducing the city's crime rate would also be a valuable recruitment tool, Estrada said.

For example, he said, a doctor or other medical professionals considering moving to Las Cruces and adding to the quality of Las Cruces health care, likely would change his or her mind after seeing the low grades the city receives for its crime rate in a Google search.

The city needs to enforce existing laws and city ordinances to reduce crime, he said, and it needs to adopt a panhandling ordinance.

"We've got to stop handcuffing

the people who should be doing the handcuffing," Estrada said.

If he had a conversation with whomever the city council choses as the next Las Cruces police chief, Estrada said he would tell the chief, "My door is open and I expect you to walk through it and tell me everything you need to do your job ... and then let me know what we need to do.

"Nobody is in this alone," he said. "We need every gear to be turning."

Estrada also suggested moving city council meetings from 1 p.m. Mondays at city hall to 7 p.m. at different locations around the city so more people will attend. Every city councilor should also be required to hold a district meeting at least once a month, he said.

Las Cruces is "on the brink of giving up," Estrada said, and that can't be allowed to happen.

"You've got to give people hope," he said. Let this city do better. Let's make this the greatest city on earth."

Estrada and his wife, Kayla Martinez, have four children, ages 4-17. Martinez is an assistant principal at Centennial High School.



actual outcome held so far under the ... map, the court finds that the (state Republican Party) have not provided sufficient evidence that the (Democrats) were successful in their attempt to entrench their party in CD 2," the judge said.

State Sen. Joseph Cervantes, D-Doña Ana, told the Bulletin in September the legislature's redistricting map "is strictly within the boundaries of the law."

Cervantes, a Las Cruces lawyer and chair of the state Senate Judiciary Committee, predicted whichever side Van Soelen ruled against would appeal the judge's decision to the state Supreme Court.

If that happens, Cervantes, who was one of the sponsors of the bill

that proposed the map, said he is confident the map will be upheld.

The map makes all three congressional districts more competitive, Cervantes said. It more closely aligns congressional representatives with average New Mexicans in their districts and reduces the control of political parties in congressional races.

"The Republican Party of New Mexico believes the fight is too important to accept this setback without contest, a RPNM news release said. "On behalf of all disenfranchised voters in the state of New Mexico, RPNM will be appealing our case to the New Mexico Supreme Court.

"Today's decision was bigger than Republican or Democrat," RPNM chair and former Dist. 2 U.S. Congressmen Steve Pearce said. "It struck at the heart of our Republic,

the form of government that allows all beliefs to have a voice. Judge Van Soelen agreed that there was partisan gerrymandering in the district map for CD2, but we disagree with his ruling that it was not an egregious gerrymander. Our legal team presented a clear case that the legislature intended to and, in fact, did egregiously gerrymander the congressional maps to shift the second district by 18 points in favor of Democrats.

"It is no surprise that the New Mexico Republican Party lost its bogus lawsuit attempting to throw out competitive, fairly-drawn maps," the Democratic Party of New Mexico said in a news release. "RPNM Chair Steve Pearce's defunct Republican Party of New Mexico is merely looking to place blame somewhere for their recent election losses."

A: No, but he still played a major part in the NBC series from the start, since he created it. (He also has been an executive producer of the show from the beginning.) Piers Morgan, Brandy Norwood and David Hasselhoff made up the judging panel for the first season in 2006, with Regis Philbin as the host.

At the time, Cowell was intending to make a similar contest for British television, but some complications ultimately held that up and he turned his attention to making a U.S. version. The result was a summer hit for NBC, and it also jump-started the originally planned British edition, which premiered in 2007 and also continues. From there, the concept expanded even more, with versions still being done in Canada, Cambodia, France, India and Spain (among other locations).

A judge on the British version from the start, Cowell became an on-air "America's Got Talent" presence beginning with the 11th season – this year has marked its 18th round

– but he wasn't present for the live episodes during Season 15, due to a back injury. Substitute judges were enlisted initially, but the number of judges then was reduced from four to three in Cowell's absence, with Howie Mandel (who has been with the show since Season 5), Heidi Klum and Sofia Vergara holding forth with those duties. Actually, Klum also missed some of Season 15 due to illness, with Vergara's fellow "Modern Family" alum Eric Stonestreet filling in for her.

"I just cranked out critters," she said.

As she walks around her gallery showroom space at 2424 Calle de Parian, her energy is palpable. She talks about her

> critters like they are alive and this brings them to life in the eyes of the viewer.

"I swear they get around," she said. "And these are a little different. I started doing little nasties – if you walk by, they will grab you. And the other ones are these shrubs and bushes."

She imagined her critters moving through the shrubs and bushes, then moving right up into the drawings hung above them.

In direct contrast to her active, busy critter creations, her artwork is stacked against some of the walls ready to show and these paintings are minimal and striking. There are glowing orb landscapes and stark, naked trees. Her paintings are glowy and calm – "landscapey," she said.

Gallery Page Coleman, is officially opening with

an open house from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 14. After that she is taking visitors to the gallery by appointment. The work on display features her artwork spanning 40-plus years including new charcoal drawings and lots of wire critters.

Born and raised in Greeneville, Tennessee, Coleman earned her art degrees in Virginia and Wisconsin, eventually ending up in Albuquerque in 1982. She worked in the arts there until moving to Mesilla.

"I had never heard of Mesilla and a friend of mine was living here so I drove down," she said. "I thought it was great." Having gone from managing small to bigger and bigger gallery spaces with many artists in Albuquerque, Coleman finally said enough was enough, and downsized, moving to Mesilla. She just wasn't enjoying the business anymore.

"I really just wanted to quit from that and move down to this little town," she said. "I thought it was just charming."

So now she has her space, with adobe shapes, a rock wall and art creatures hanging around corners to be discovered next to fences and hanging in windows. Her little studio is full of found items with which she



REVIEW: 'True West' a true gem Border Jazz Orchestra hits stage

The late great actor and playwright Sam Shepard (1943-2017) would have liked and appreciated Las Cruces Community Theatre's production of his Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award nominated masterpiece "True West."

The play premiered more than 40 years ago, but its story is more meaningful today than ever: a broken family, the struggle to survive and the hope not only to overcome but to win the game of life.

Luckily for Las Cruces audiences, the tale is told by a cast of four gifted actors and one of the best directors Las Cruces has ever produced.

Lee (Benjamin Ramsey), a thief, drifter and ne'er-do-well, meets up with his estranged younger brother, Austin (Nick Check), a welleducated family man and successful screenwriter. at their mother's home near Los Angeles.

They settle into the sibling rivalry that has characterized their entire relationship. They drink, they fight, they steal toasters and a TV. But it

is the screenplay Austin is writing and the idea Lee has for a screenplay that cause a remarkable role reversal.

Which one is really the success and which the failure?

These are the words of director Mike Wise, who knows and loves Shepard's work: "In rehearsal I kept referring to this play as 'Cain and Abel in Hollywood.' It offers many insights and questions into what might or might not be the authentic soul harboring within each of us ... and what (if any) is the authentic soul of this country, this west, this nation."

If you have the privi-

lege of acting in a play directed by Wise, you get to ask all the questions and explore all the nuances waiting to be discovered in a great script. And when you have a script, a cast, a crew and a director this good, the result is like a flashlight in a diamond mine - it sparkles and it takes your breath away.

The chemistry between Check and Ramsey - the playfulness of two boys who never quite grew up and the rage of two careworn men who "inhabit completely opposite personalities of the same soul," to again quote



These are not big roles, but they are great performances.

The incomparable Doug Roby has designed another amazing set for "True West," Lennie Brown designed costumes that fit each character perfectly, Alecks Rundell designed the lights, Darin Cabot was the fight choreographer and Charley Davis is the stage manager.

I also loved the music.



'Buffalo' features music by Las Crucen

The first part of filmmaker Ken Burns' newest documentary, "The American Buffalo," premieres on PBS stations in Las Cruces and nationwide Monday, Oct. 16, including six songs written by Las Cruces musician Randy Granger.

"His contribution was very valuable to the film," the film's editor, Craig Mellish, said of Granger's music, which Mellish discovered while surfing the internet. "It's essential to our storytelling."

Part one of the two-part documentary begins at 7 p.m., and re-broadcast at 9 p.m., Monday, Oct. 16 on KRWG-TV, the PBS station based at New Mexico State University. Part two will follow Tuesday, Oct. 17, on PBS, also at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Mellish said he began an online search for music for the film because nothing he had access to "had the weight I thought it should. The film is about the murder of 30,000 animals. It's about everything that went with it," Mellish said.

"They really speak to me," Mellish said about Granger's songs. "Some of Randy's stuff had tension to it."

He found "a wealth of

music that I could dip into."

"Whatever song I'm going to use, I have to love it," Mellish said.

Mellish said "The Dog Star" was the first piece of Granger's music he found online. He also chose Granger's "Apache Tears," "Crane Dance Song," "Ghost Dancers," "Comanche Riding Song" and "Full Moon Insomnia."

"My own Native American ancestry and my music in this film means I am honoring their sacrifices and perseverance and only hope I make them all proud," Granger said. "I remember driving from Hobbs to Carlsbad weekends to visit relatives. We would see herds of buffalo along the way. I never knew what happened to them. What an amazing story of despair and hope is 'American Buffalo.' Maybe our descendants will again see these majestic creatures who have been in North America over 200,000 years roaming free."





Alamogordo native discusses navigating for federal jobs

Selina Carr-McEwen is a 2000 graduate of Alamogordo High School with a BA (2005) and an MBA (2008) from New Mexico State University. Today, Carr-McEwen is a senior budget analyst for the U.S. Defense Health Agency (DHA), responsible for reporting nearly \$15 billion in salaries paid to more than 135,000 civilian and military employees of the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD).

With a top-secret security clearance, Carr-McEwen also provides financial advice to military leadership and other federal agencies and programs; she earned a second master's degree in military operational art and science from Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, in 2016.

Her previous jobs have included senior financial specialist for foreign military sales and lead budget analyst with oversight of electronic warfare investment and modernization, both with DOD, and senior financial analyst in the Office of Air Force Surgeon General.

"I'm on an incredible journey," Carr-

McEwen said. A former military spouse, now divorced with an 11-year-old daughter, Carr-McEwen, 41, is a "military brat." She was born in England during her father's military service.

Working on the civilian side "is my way of serving without putting on the uniform," she said. "I still wanted to serve our country."

Carr-McEwen is planning to continue her career with Uncle Sam until retirement and is looking for the next step up with a move to Colorado in the near future.

Her message to high school and college students thinking about joining the workforce who might want to follow her career path is, "Reach for the stars."

You can also reach out to her.

"I'll mentor anyone any time," Carr-McEwen said.

That means helping others learn how to navigate the system, look for federal jobs and build a resume that gets results.

"Be an advocate, be an opportunity spotter, learn the buzz words," said Carr-McEwen, who began her career as an office automation assistant at Holloman Air Force Base and later worked at White Sands Missile Range before moving to Washington, D.C.

Decide on your area of interest and start looking at jobs (www.usajobs.gov is a good place to begin), she said. And don't forget about internships that may be available in your field of interest.

"Definitely don't give up and don't be discouraged," Carr-McEwen said, noting that she applied for about 40 jobs before she started getting calls for interviews.

"There are jobs out learning and there," Carr-McEwen said, but "not a lot of people know how to get into the government. It's a very stable career," she said. "Just apply. There are careers doing absolutely everything you can imagine."

Carr-McEwen said she would "love to go back to Alamogordo" to mentor high school students and return to Las Cruces to help NMSU set up a mentorship program.

The competition was the day after Slaughter's 14th and final cleft palate and lip surgery, so he showed up with a broken nose, a swollen face and not feeling very well.

Slaughter grew up in Las Cruces plans to attend New Mexico State University and study film production. He'd like to pursue being as sports or concert videographer as a career.

Slaughter's tenure in the clerk's office will continue at least until after the election in November.

Aggie-Miner I-10 rivalry: Now with C-USA stakes

You could say the Wednesday, Oct. 18, NM State game against Texas-El Paso is special because it's the 100th meeting of the longtime rivals.

You could say the game is special because it's the teams' first meeting since they are both members of Conference USA, and the results now have even more implications.

Or you could just say two words: Aggies, Miners.

Because the Bulletin went to press before both teams' Oct. 11 games, we don't know the outcomes of those. NM State played Sam Houston and El Paso played Florida International, who the Aggies beat Oct. 434-17.

Before those games, NM State was 3-3 and UTEP 1-5, and they had played no common opponents.

UTEP's lone victory had come against Incarnate Word Sept. 2, 28-14.

This marks the second straight season the Aggies face the Miners in El Paso. In last year's contest, UTEP won 20-13, giving the Miners a 59-38-2 edge in the series that began in 1914.

And while this is the first year the two teams are playing in Conference USA, they squared off as conference foes in the Border Conference from 1932-1961, when the Aggies were known as New Mexico A&M and UTEP was the Texas College of Mines.

The last time NM State defeated UTEP was 44-35 in 2019, one of only two victories the Aggies had that season.

This year's Miners have a fairly balanced attack, with 1,099 yards gained on the ground through the first six games, and 1,126 in the air.

The Aggies have gained 1,276 yards rushing and 1,428 passing.



NM State will travel down Interstate 10 for a Wednesday, Oct. 18, matchup against longtime rival UTEP, only this time, the victory will impact the Conference-USA standings since both teams are now members. Kickoff is at 7 p.m. in the Sun Bowl in El Paso.

Aggie volleyball: The NM State women's volleyball team this weekend hosts Western Kentucky in a pair of matches between the top two teams in Conference-USA. The matches are 6 p.m. Friday, Oct. 13, and noon Saturday, Oct. 14, in the Pan Am Center.

NM State is 13-6 on the season and 6-2 in Conference-USA play after splitting a pair of matches at Liberty in Virginia last weekend. The Aggies lost the first match 3-1 Oct. 7 and came back the next day to win 3-1. Western Kentucky is 16-4 overall and 6-0 in conference. In fact, the Hilltoppers have not lost a regular-season C-USA match since October 2018, a streak of 64

Aggie women's soccer: NM State remains in first place in Conference-USA with a 5-0 league record. They're 8-5-1 overall.

The Aggies faced Florida International in a home game scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 12, after the Bulletin's press time. The Aggies' next home game is against Sam Houston 1 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 22, at the NM State Soccer Complex. The C-USA conference tournament is Nov. 1-5 in Ruston, Lousiana.



Proper aim, sharp vision essential to good putting

Recreational golfers underestimate the critical importance of aim - especially when it comes to putting. If you're wondering about your aim, have your club pro look at your set-up and give feedback. Very often, faulty aim is a matter of faulty vision. It's a bit like the warning on rear view mirrors: "Objects in mirror are closer than they appear." Most off-line golf shots are due to poor aiming and alignment; disturbed vision and eye angle create an optical illusion resulting in bad alignment 99 percent of the time. Even if you have a perfect swing or putting stroke, but are still missing putts, it's because your eyes are deceiving you.


There are a number of visual skills essential for success in golf. One is depth perception, which helps assess yardage and

green conditions.
Another is eye-hand coordination that allows you to react to incoming visual information with accurate control and timing of body movements. Eye-tracking and eye-focusing allow you

to keep your eye on the ball and change focus between distances. Peripheral vision helps you see everything in your environment without turning your head. Each of these factors may depend on corrective vision such as glasses, contacts or laser.

Everyone has a dominant eye that causes the brain to take more input from one eye. Folks who spend time at the shooting

or archery range know all about that. The brain

Still, most golfers are same-side dominant. To determine your dominant eye, hold your hands at arm's length and make a baseball-sized circle with your fingers. Then focus at your target, like a golf ball on the green at a short distance with both eyes open. Now, close one eye and then the other. When you close one eye the ball will remain in your hand circle; when you close the

other eye it will disappear. The ball didn't move - only your dominant eye kept it in sight. In putting, your non-dominant eye can create an alignment illusion or distortion. For the righthand, right-eye dominant golfer, the hole usually appears slightly to the left of its actual location, resulting in more missed putts. Some people can unconsciously compensate for this phenomenon but it is very difficult.

Golfers 40 and older frequently have a condition known as "presbyopia." Literally translated as "old eyes," presbyopia is inevitable for virtually all people, whether nearsighted or farsighted, and requires some type of "fix." Many find regular glasses a problem, especially bifocals. Personally, I have benefit-

ted greatly from intra-ocular lens implants, in which the eye's natural lens is removed, and replaced by a new, more appropriately powered and clearer lens. It did correct cataracts in both eyes. They changed my previously blurred and troubled vision to virtually 20-20 for distance. Reading glasses are necessary. But, on the golf course, the freedom from corrective eye wear is in most circumstances indescribable.

Implants helped my clarity of vision but didn't change my dominant right eye that caused me to miss putts. But the "spotputting" method did. For spot-putting, stand directly behind your ball, close your non-dominant eye and see your target. This is especially important for short game and putting,

where depth perception is needed. Find a spot a few inches in front of your ball on your target line (factoring in the break) to start; it may be an offcolored blade of grass, but clearly identifiable with your dominant eye. Then identify another spot halfway to the hole, and that's where to align the face of your putter. That process shouldn't distract you from sensing the right speed of the putt. And the eyes need to look straight forward out of your head, not tilted downward, as that creates distortion of the line. A Sharpie pen marker line on the ball along the logo will definitely help the alignment.
