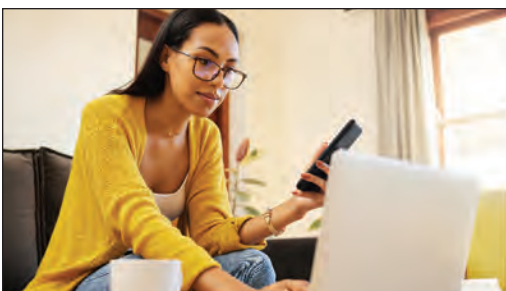

COUNTY SEEKS PUBLIC COMMENTS ON ZONING PROJECT PROPOSAL FOR CAMINO REAL REGIONAL UTILITY AUTHORITY EXTRA-TERRITORIAL ZONING AREA

Doña Ana County staff will host a series of meetings regarding the adoption of the Unified Development Code, UDC, Plan 2040: The Comprehensive Plan and to create a Zoning Map for the area, known as the Camino Real Regional Utility Authority Extra-Territorial Zoning, CRRUA-ETZ.

The public is invited to attend meetings hosted by County staff to provide input regarding the proposed Ordinance and zoning map changes for adoption, starting Tuesday, Feb. 6.

Public input meetings will be followed by the Planning and Zoning Commission public hearings Thursday, Feb. 22 and Thursday, Mar. 14 to consider further input and their recommendation. Approval by the Board of County Commissioners will be considered Tuesday, Apr. 9.

Crisis Triage Center's future in question after provider withdraws

The future of the county's Crisis Triage Center is in question after a private firm providing behavioral health treatment and crisis intervention said they'd vacate operations by Jan. 31.

The announcement followed the Doña Ana County Board of Commissioners' vote Jan. 9, by 3-2, to deny RI International – the Arizona-based firm that operates the CTC and similar centers across the U.S. – a \$561,902 grant from the New Mexico Behavioral Health Services

Department.

The grant would have covered a gap between RI's expenses and revenue and allowed the CTC to remain open through July 2024.

"As you know, we have worked to increase the number of guests we serve and have seen slow improvement over time; however, the volume of guests is not sufficient to sustain the operations of a 24/7 CTC," RI's letter to the county reads. "Additionally, with the outcome of the County Commissioners' meeting on Jan. 9,

2024, there is not enough gap funding to continue CTC operations."

While RI suggested that the Board's rejection of the grant motivated their vacancy, a letter obtained by the Las Cruces Bulletin via public records request shows the company had contemplated leaving the CTC by Dec. 1. They sent the letter to the county on Sept. 29, 2023.

Some of the language in the September letter was identical to that of the January letter: "As you know, we have worked to increase the number of guests we serve and have

seen slow improvement over time; however, the volume of guests is not sufficient to sustain the

operations of a 24/7 CTC." The \$561,902 grant from the New Mexico Behavioral Health Services De-

partment was the county administration's solution to prevent RI's departure.

But conflict between the board and administration surfaced when the grant was brought up for approval at the Jan. 9 meeting. The ever-growing cost of operating the CTC alongside stagnating referrals stemming from lackluster police participation was the board's significant concern.

"Unless there are some significant changes, we're just going to be throwing

money at the same thing with the same results, and we're going to continue to put this down a money pit," District 5 Commissioner Manuel Sanchez said.

Sanchez joined District 3's Shannon Reynolds and District 1's Christopher Schaljo-Hernandez in voting against the grant. District 2's Diana Murillo and District 4's Susana Chaparro voted to approve the grant. All five commissioners expressed support for the CTC conceptually, but differences occurred in how the CTC should be operated.

"We're just not getting the results we need," Reynolds said. "We're not getting what we paid for."

The potential closure comes after the CTC – built in 2013 but having no permanent provider until 2021 – saw 171 referrals in 2021, 1,150 referrals in 2022, and

1,267 referrals in 2023, according to data provided to commissioners.

Growing costs, stagnant referrals

When the CTC began operations in 2021, the county agreed to pay RI about \$261,000 per year. The contract amendment proposed at the Jan. 9 meeting would have increased the yearly costs to \$1,561,279.84, a nearly 500 percent increase. It would have been the eighth amendment to RI's contract.

RI collects money on a per-person basis, meaning the more people who use the CTC, the more money RI receives. They do this by billing Medicaid when applicable. RI's primary expense for CTC operation is personnel costs. Like an ambulance service, RI keeps the center staffed 24 hours to be capable of emergency crisis care. When fewer people use the CTC, RI goes to the county to cover the difference between expense

and revenue.

Who uses the CTC, when they use CTC and why they use CTC has been a constant issue since the center's opening in 2021.

According to statistics from the county's Health and Human Services Department, the Las Cruces Police Department is the CTC's biggest user.

LCPD officers brought an average of 15 people per month to the CTC in 2023. They stand alone as a police agency utilizing the CTC at a high rate. Other area police – New Mexico State Police, university police, the Mesilla Marshals, but most notably the Doña Ana County Sheriff's office – use the CTC significantly less than LCPD.

That's a problem for RI's revenue since police dropping people off was meant to be a substantial source of referrals, according to RI's business plan for the CTC.

"More than 80 percent of all admissions are referred by law enforcement," RI's business

plan states, referring to similar centers in Arizona. "It's estimated that Doña Ana County will come to experience similar rates."

That hasn't happened. Instead, data shows that just 20 percent of referrals come from law enforcement.

Referral issues

Since its inception, LCPD has utilized the center 397 times, according to the county.

Jeremy Story, the LCPD

Chief, said the CTC had benefited the city and its officers but that changes to the CTC building and state laws regarding involuntary commitment prevented them from taking more people to the CTC. Story said that if those changes were made, LCPD would take more people to the CTC.

DASO – a department with about as many officers as LCPD – has used the CTC just 15 times, per county data.

Kim Stewart, the sheriff of Doña Ana County, told the Las Cruces Bulletin that bringing people to the CTC is easier for LCPD. Deputies don't encounter people in public spaces as often as Las Cruces police officers do, Stewart said. Instead, deputies interface with people in homes located miles away from the CTC.

"They have to want to go voluntarily if we don't have the probable cause to take them in-

voluntarily. And a lot of times when we're called to these, they are truly involuntary situations," Stewart said.

Jamie Michael, the county Health and Human Services Department director, told the county commission at their next meeting on Jan. 23 that a new provider was being sought.

She told the Bulletin: "The top priority is that we have access to crisis care in our communities. And then secondly, it's trying to retain the staff there because they've been drained; they've been doing this good work for two and a half years. And so we don't want to lose the traction and the momentum that we've built."

If no immediate solution is found, the CTC will stop admitting people on Jan. 30.

"We're trying to find some good solutions," Michael said.

"I do think the commissioners will support some good solutions because I think everybody knows that crisis services are needed. It's just a question of how do we get there."

Looking ahead

No solution was found at the Jan. 23 meeting, but the meeting did feature an hour-long conversation during public comment. Commissioners, CTC staff, public defenders and a few CTC clients spoke about the need for a fully operational center. Some suggested that a new facility like this one, with a new provider, should be advertised better. Others suggested that the CTC should focus on more groups in the community.

But most of the meeting was attended by speakers discussing their experiences working or using the CTC.

One such speaker was 24-year-old Libby Cattey, a current user of the CTC. For Cattey, the center has been

nothing short of life-changing since she moved to Las Cruces from the Albuquerque area.

"I don't even really know how I got here," Cattey said. "I was just really lost and kind of drowning."

Cattey currently faces pending criminal charges stemming from an incident on Jan. 9. The case remains ongoing, but her arrest led her to the CTC.

"Just in a couple of weeks, I've been able to find light and direction," she told the commissioners during public comment. The center offered Cattey a place to sleep for a night or two, a place to stay warm, a place to be safe and a place to use a phone and stay in contact with her lawyer.

"I'm going to work to find a new provider and make sure that it (CTC) is reopened as soon as possible," Michael said, adding that the county was trying to work with other area mental health providers to meet some of the needs.

Chavez takes plea deal in death of Mitchell Russell

A Las Cruces man accused of killing another in 2021 accepted a plea deal to avert a trial at the eleventh hour.

David Chavez, 20, pleaded guilty to one count of aggravated battery and one count of tampering with evidence. He had previously been charged with voluntary manslaughter after police said he killed 30-year-old Mitchell Russell on Jan. 6, 2022.

Third Judicial District Judge Douglas Driggers sentenced Chavez to just under two years in prison. Driggers also granted Chavez "time served" since Chavez has been in jail since January 2022. According to the plea agreement, Chavez will remain in the Doña Ana County Detention Center until August 2024. Chavez will also serve four

years of probation and two years of parole.

Chavez pleaded guilty on Jan. 12 to allegations that he killed Russell after Russell chased him from the Walmart near Lohman Avenue to Lees Drive near Young Park. Police said a Walmart employee told Russell that Chavez burglarized a car in the Walmart parking lot. Chavez shot Russell at the outset of fight, police said.

The case initially mired in questionable court proceedings after Driggers declared a mistrial and suggested a Las Cruces police detective misled the court about two knives found near Russell's body. It was later revealed that one knife belonged to an LCPD officer and was used to cut open the victim's shirt. The second belonged to Russell but was not used in the altercation.

Bomb blast rattles Deming corrections office

Deming residents were awakened Monday morning by a loud boom that shook windows, rattled pets and was followed by a cloud of smoke.

Deming police confirmed that a bomb detonated at about 7:30 a.m. at the New Mexico Probation and Corrections building.

Deming interim Police Chief Pepe Montoya said a call came in just before 8 a.m. reporting an explosion in the 900 block of S. Silver.

“Officers were dispatched to the probation and corrections build-

ing, and they found that a bomb had indeed gone off,” Montoya told the Headlight.

No injuries were reported as a result of the blast.

Deming police and New Mexico State Police set up a safety perimeter and blocked off all traffic in the area. Curious motorists were detoured away while the investigation was underway Monday morning.

All county offices were closed for the day as a safety measure, as were district court facilities in Deming and Lordsburg. Montoya said state police took over the lead on

this investigation when reports surfaced of suspicious packages being found in Las Cruces and Albuquerque. The case was then handed off later Monday to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

During the state police preliminary investigation, video surveillance showed a vehicle in the vicinity before the bomb exploded.

A vehicle fitting that description was spotted in Deming around midday Monday by state police, and they initiated a traffic stop.

The Ford pickup truck

failed to stop and a pursuit ensued, halting near Exit 82-A off of Interstate 10, near the Chevron station.

State police took a female suspect — the driver

of the pickup — into custody, but the woman’s name was not yet released midafternoon Monday.

As a result of the pursuit, Interstate 10 in Deming was closed in both

directions for much of the day Monday, and all traffic was diverted onto Pine Street through the city until just after 4 p.m. An afternoon press release from the Deming Police Department attributed the road closure to efforts by the state police bomb squad to “safely clear the vehicle of any possible dangers.”

It was a busy day for bomb squads around the state. An explosive device mailed to the Albuquerque offices of the U.S. Attorney’s Office for the District of New Mexico was received Monday as

Suspicious item in Las Cruces was empty box

A bomb scare shut down a portion of one of Las Cruces’ busiest streets this week as police investigated a suspicious package discovered at the Adult Probation and Parole Office on West Picacho Avenue on Jan. 22.

No bomb was discovered in Las Cruces. However, the scare occurred alongside “explosive devices” found

in Deming and another false alarm in Albuquerque the same day. No one was hurt in any of the three incidents.

According to LCPD, the incident in Las Cruces began when a suspicious package was discovered near the Adult Probation and Parole Office around 8:40 a.m.

“Out of an abundance of caution, police temporarily closed a portion of west Picacho Avenue while investigators from

the Dona Ana County Sheriff’s Office Bomb Squad and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives studied the package,” LCPD said.

Police cleared the area around 11:40 a.m. after discovering the box was empty. They reopened the area between 17th Street and Motel Boulevard shortly after.

Deming Police announced on Facebook they’d discovered “an explosive

device” at the Probation Office on 920 South Silver Avenue. An article published in the Deming Headlight stated that police first responded to a call at 8 p.m. before discovering that a bomb had gone off.

The Luna County Magistrate Court and the 6th Judicial District Court in Deming closed for the day as Deming

Low income LCU customers may be eligible for help

Low income Las Cruces Utilities customers could be eligible for bill payment assistance through a federally funded program offered by the New Mexico Human Services Department.

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) can help some LCU customers stay warm in the winter and cool in the summer. By applying for, and gaining acceptance into the LIHEAP program, low-income customers could be eligible for protection from possible winter natural gas shut-offs from November 15, 2023, to March 15, 2024.

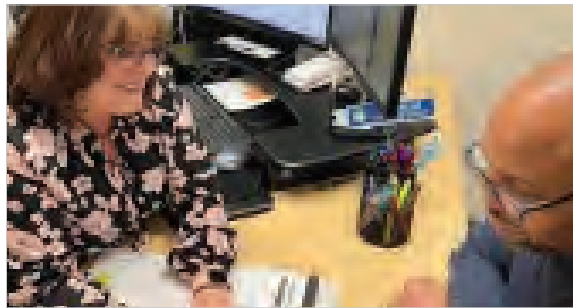
Applications are available online through the New Mexico Human Services Department – Income Support Division at <https://www.hsd.state.nm.us/wp-content/uploads/LHP-602-English-LIHEAP-Application.pdf>.

In Las Cruces, offices for the New Mexico Human Services Department –

Income Support Division, are at 2121 Summit Court, and are open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. LIHEAP can help reduce health and safety risks such as illness, fire, or eviction, especially if a household member is elderly, disabled, or if a child younger than six years old. These persons are especially at risk for life-threatening illness or possibly death if their residence is too cold in the winter.

Safety risks could increase if home energy bills can't be paid. Some people facing those circumstances could resort to unsafe methods to keep their residence warm, such as improperly using stoves, fireplaces, portable heaters, and barbecue grills, or overloading electrical circuits.

By submitting a LIHEAP application, the New Mexico Income Support Division will determine if the household income qualifies for the program.



Applicants will need to provide the following information:

- Recent copies of utility bills.
- A recent payroll stub or other proof showing an applicant's gross income.
- Documentation showing income from Social Security, unemployment insurance, pension funds, or any disability benefits.
- A final utility termination notice if the applicant has received a shut-off notice.
- Proof of address, such as a rent receipt, lease, deed, or property tax bill.

- Proof of the total number of residents living with an applicant, such as birth certificates or school records.
- Social Security cards or numbers for all persons living with an applicant.
- Proof of U.S. citizenship or permanent residence.

There is no cost or deadline to apply for LIHEAP assistance. However, an LCU customer can only apply once in a federal fiscal year, which is from October 1 to September 30.

discovering a suspicious package in the kitchen area of a restaurant in the 300 block of Third Street Northwest. No bomb or explosive device was discovered in this incident, similar to what transpired in Las Cruces.

Remembering DeSantis in New Mexico

The closest I ever got to Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis was at an event hall in Carlsbad covering one of the weirder political events of my career.

It was Aug. 14, 2022, shortly before DeSantis' landslide reelection victory, beating Charlie Crist by 19 percent and raising his profile as a presidential prospect. DeSantis was an undisputed star of the Republican Party that summer. Polls, those fascinating crystal balls for political journalists, suggested he was at least the second choice of his party behind Donald Trump and might even be a favorite in some states.

DeSantis came to Carlsbad to stump for Republican candidates Mark Ronchetti (for governor) and Yvette Herrell (for Congress), and presumably also to say hello to New Mexico Republi-

can voters.

Reporters were shown to a platform in the back of the room. Naturally, we wanted to talk to folks who showed up for the event, to hear how they were thinking about the midterm elections, the presidential field or simply how they felt about government and the economy. When we attempted to strike up those conversations, however, event staffers hissed at us to stay by our island in back: No talking to people. Meanwhile, a Ronchetti campaign staffer peeked over my shoulder to see what I was typing on my laptop.

This was also the event where Shaun Griswold, a reporter who had registered to attend after

being denied a press credential, was prevented even from entering the hall. Security guards

identified him by a photograph stored on their mobile phones. Brilliantly, he improvised a sign introducing himself as a journalist and asking, "Why are you here? What can the news do better?" Outside the event, he was able to do what reporters inside could not: talk to people.

Inside, a young woman repping DeSantis told us the governor would not be speaking to any reporters that day. At the time, he was establishing hostility to mainstream news organizations as part of his brand, favoring ideologically conservative media that may have been friendlier

to his presentations but also reached a narrower portion of the electorate than he would need, if he was serious about wresting the nomination from Trump and then being elected president.

By the time he stepped out of the echo chamber and consented to talk to more press (even CNN!) it was too late to re-introduce himself and may have looked to his followers like selling out.

It turned out he wasn't very good at talking to people after all, despite giving Iowa everything he had as a candidate. There were a lot of other reasons, good ones and stupid ones, that his candidacy sank, as well. It is the way of rising stars: They fall when they run out of fuel, and the most massive ones use it up most quickly.

Did you hear the one about – crash

guidelines stating signs with "pop culture references ... or that are intended to be humorous should not be used," because not everybody will get the joke and even those who do will require more time

to process the message. Ironically, many of the signs diverting our attention have messages warning us to focus on the road and not be distracted.

The new guidelines call for traffic signs to be "simple, direct, brief, legible and clear."

Cars are much safer and more reliable today. There were 26.42 traffic deaths per every 100,000

people in 1969, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. That number was down to 10.28 in 2014, but it has been on the rise since then.

Despite those improvements, driving is still the

most dangerous thing most of us do on a daily basis. That's especially true when driving at highway speed.

It's a task that requires focus and concentration, not levity.

Public blind to cash flowing to lawmakers

As the New Mexico legislative session kicked off Tuesday, the public was blind in one very important respect.

In the next four weeks, lawmakers will create a state budget worth at least \$10 billion dollars, pass another quite large capital outlay budget and pass influential tax and policy bills.

But who gave money to those lawmakers in the last quarter of the year – in the form of campaign contributions – will largely be a mystery.

That's because lawmakers aren't required to file a public report in January about campaign contributions they received in the run-up to the legislative session, if they didn't run for office the year before.

Since no lawmakers ran for office in 2023, we do not have a comprehensive data set showing the money that flowed into campaign accounts at the end of 2023. Their last reports reflected contributions through Oct. 7, 2023, and we won't have an update until April, when their next reports are due.

I've been looking at campaign filings for many years. I promise you that among year-end contributors will be corporations and, often, their owners and employees. There will be executives and public relations specialists for trade associations, labor unions and public policy organizations.

Some of those contributors will be registered as official lobbyists for their organizations, and in those cases we can see what they gave because lobbyists

must file a January report.

But while the reports of 100 or so lobbyists, or of their employers, are highly consequential, they are just a slice of the money flowing into the campaign accounts of lawmakers.

A fuller picture would allow the public to comb through reports by address, employers and occupation, and better understand how much money lawmakers are getting from a particular industry, special interest group or simply from a handful of big donors.

Last year, lawmakers were poised to pass a bill with several transparency measures, including one that would have shifted the reporting schedule to capture donations at the end of the year in a January report, showing how much money was given to lawmakers in the

run-up to the legislative session. See New Mexico In Depth's reporting last year on campaign finance transparency bills here and here, and on how they were merged in the House. And then, when the bill got to the House floor, how eleven Democrats joined all Republicans to kill the bill.

It was a blow for transparency. And this year, we muddle along, almost blind.

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham and her Democratic allies in the New Mexico legislature are proposing the largest and most comprehensive public antigun package in our state's history. Prosecuting all law-breakers, especially ex-convicts in possession of a gun and addressing mental issues that often lead to violent acts, might be a start.

Those between 18 and 21 years of age in our military can be handed fully automatic rifles and

pistols and be sent off to war. But Democrats believe their constitutional right to own firearms should be taken away from them at home. Last month, a federal court in West Virginia was the latest to reject laws banning adults between the ages of 18 and 20 from buying handguns. A New Mexico

ban of these guns and semiautomatic rifles to this group will likely be overturned when it gets to the Supreme Court.

Gov. Lujan Grisham should stop wasting time on frivolous issues and address rising crime.



El Paso man charged with killing, carjacking Las Cruces man

BULLETIN REPORT

An El Paso man faces federal charges after the FBI said he carjacked and killed a Las Cruces man in on Dec. 3.

The FBI believes that Brayden Alvarado carjacked Abel Tarin, 43, after meeting him at Sam's Club on Telshor Drive, and drove him to a deserted area near Fort Bliss in Texas, before fatally shooting him. Alvarado stands charged with one count of kidnapping resulting in death and carjacking resulting in death. According to an affidavit filed in U.S. District Court, Alvarado confessed to the killing and carjacking in an interview with the FBI. The affidavit said blood, a gunshot hole and fingerprints were found in the truck.

Conviction reinstated over 2017 murder in Hachita

BULLETIN REPORT

The New Mexico Supreme Court on Monday reinstated a second-degree murder conviction for a man convicted of strangling a Florida woman to death by a roadside in Hachita in 2017.

Isaias Lobato-Rodriguez, 60, was charged with first-degree murder in the death of Connie Lopez, but a Grant County jury convicted him of second-degree murder instead in 2020. He was sentenced by District Judge Jarod Hofacket to the maximum prison sentence of 15 years, with credit for more than three and a half years Lobato-Rodriguez had been incarcerated before trial.

The defendant appealed his conviction and in 2022, the New Mexico Court of Appeals found that a comment by prosecutor Matthew Bradburn, at the opening of the trial, that the defendant had as-

serted his right to remain silent after being arrested. The appeals court found that the comment may have, in the words of the appeal motion, "tainted the jury's view of the evidence from the very outset of trial in a way that could not be undone." Lobato-Rodriguez's defense attorney, George Harrison, moved for a mistrial at the time but was denied. The appeals court vacated the conviction and ordered a new trial.

The Supreme Court, however, found in a unanimous decision that, while the prosecutor's comment was in error, it did not call for a reversal of Lobato-Rodriguez's conviction.

In an opinion authored by Justice Briana Zamora, the panel ruled: "While we agree that the prosecutor's comment violated

Defendant's constitutional rights, we conclude that the error was harmless in the context of the trial as a whole."

Lobato-Rodriguez was a Mexican national and agricultural worker in Florida who was traveling with Lopez, a paralegal from Lake Placid, Fla., across the southern U.S. headed to live with a relative in the Mexican state of Sonora. She was found by Border Patrol agents at the



side of Highway 9 east of Hachita, inside the minivan in which they had been traveling, in the driver's seat with a belt wrapped around her neck. Lobato-Rodriguez reportedly approached the agents and admitted to strangling Lopez, who was 57 years old, claiming she was planning to kill him

and his daughter. At issue in the case was whether he had been provoked to a degree that he would be guilty of voluntary manslaughter rather than second-degree murder. The appeal argued that the comment by Bradburn had prejudiced the jury, but the Supreme Court rejected that argument, concluding that Lobato-Rodriguez's defense "could not establish sufficient provocation as a matter of law," regardless of the comment.

The panel also noted that the defendant had spoken to police before invoking his Fifth Amendment right to remain silent, and that the initial statements he made "were consistent with his trial testimony."

The decision returns the case to the Court of Appeals, as Lobato-Rodriguez had also appealed his conviction on other grounds.

well, but was detected and detonated by law enforcement, according to a Monday evening press release from the U.S. Attorney's Office. Also on Monday

morning, the Las Cruces Police Department closed a portion of Picacho Avenue after a suspicious package was discovered at the Adult Probation and Parole Office there. The street was reopened for traffic shortly before noon

after a bomb squad determined that the package was an empty box.

Montoya said it is unknown whether the Deming explosion was related to any other suspicious packages in the state, or if it was an isolated incident.

"This was a prime example of agencies working together," Montoya said. "New Mexico State Police, [Homeland Security Investigations], Luna County Sheriff's Office and our Deming PD all did a great job of working on this."

Once upon a time, there was a little independent film that took the world by storm, racking up critical accolades and winning a plethora of international awards, including a little trinket called an Oscar. Featuring a terrific ensemble of local musicians, the music takes center stage in the story of a talented Irish songwriter who has given up on love and music, only to be rescued by a girl who inspires him to dream again. Timothy Wilbur gives a winning performance as the likeable but spirited Dubliner whose strength lies in the honesty of his lyrics and the music he wraps them in. As the quirky Czech immigrant who turns his life around by believing in his gift of song, Natalie McGuire is a likeable muse, though her barely audible delivery can be hard to follow, despite being miked.

Accents can be hard to pull off at the best of times, but when every single actor is required to do so, the result can be babel soup. However, because the music is the most important part of this particular show (the main characters aren't even given names), the language issues are not serious impediments. Instead, they lend a charming note of authenticity to what is, at its core, an irresistible story of friendship and inspiration between outsiders. The key to understanding not only the dialog, but also the theme of the story is passion. It is clear from the very first note that every member of this ensemble is fully invested in telling that story, and the result is magical.



With bare bones staging, made up of a series of platforms that make good use of the vaulting stage, the only distraction is the murkiness of the lighting. There are times when the main characters are reduced to shadows, while at other times the flashing colors only serve to emphasize the movements of the ever-present musicians. It isn't until one of the actors begins to speak that we find our focus, and in a way that adds to the everyday allure of these characters, by making them blend in, but it can also be frustrating to the viewer trying to follow the story.

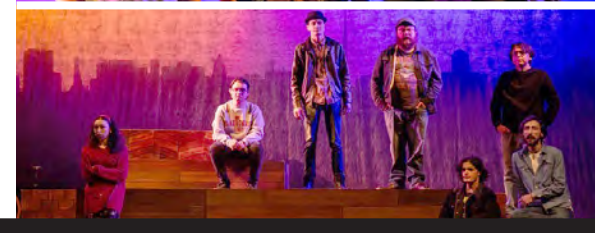
Even so, the story itself will win audiences over. In the end, Once serves the purpose of illustrating a new phase of regional theatre being presented by young, passionate performers injecting much-needed enthusiasm into the mix. Longtime theatergoers take note. If you haven't experienced Blank Conversations Theatre Company yet, you're missing out on a revolution in the making.

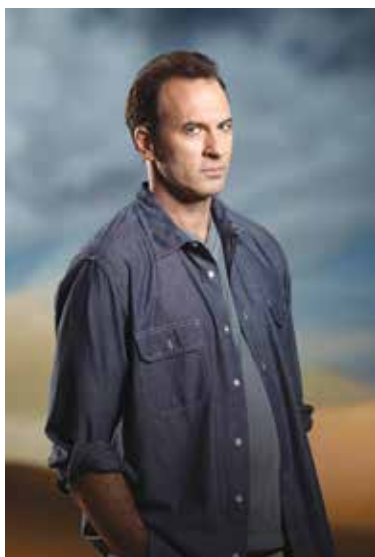

Q: Did Scott Patterson do any other series between "Gilmore Girls" and "Sullivan's Crossing"?

A: Yes. He was a star of "Aliens in America," a 2007-08 CW sitcom about a foreign student trying to assimilate into a Wisconsin community. Patterson played the patriarch of the youth's host family, and he also had a recurring part spanning several episodes in The CW's 2008-13 "90210" update. And technically, though, one could consider the Netflix-originated 2016 "Gilmore Girls: A Year in the Life" sequel — in which the actor reprised his role as Luke — a series, since it consisted of four episodes.

Patterson also was in NBC's 2010-11 drama series "The Event," about aliens who came to Earth as World War II was ending. He had a 2011 guest shot on CBS' "CSI: Miami," and he made several cable movies including the Lifetime projects "Love at the Christmas Table" (2012) and "Kidnapped: The Hannah Anderson Story" (2015).

Based on novels by Robyn Carr, "Sullivan's Crossing" ended its first season on The CW in December, and much earlier than that (last May) on its originating Canadian network CTV ... but it will be back for Season 2 on both outlets (with the dates for that to be specified once production of the episodes is completed in Nova Scotia). The renewal is a good thing, because the show's first-year cliffhanger made it seem that central character Maggie Sullivan (played by Morgan Kohan) was leaving her father (Patterson) and the title campground behind to return to Boston for good.

Influenza, RSV and SARS-CoV-2 (which causes Covid-19) are driving higher rates of hospitalization and pressure on hospitals this winter.

During a recent visit to MountainView Regional Medical Center in Las Cruces, most of the hospital's ICU beds were full and nearly all of the patients were presenting with respiratory distress, said Dr. Vinay Shet, a physician at the hospital.

"Most of the patients that come in (this winter) are

flu patients," he said, "and some have been really sick, especially our elderly population, have been really sick with flu and getting pneumonia."

But it's not only the elderly: Shet said middle aged and younger patients are passing through as well, while patients with underlying conditions such as lung or heart disease, or prescriptions that suppress immunity, struggle to recover.

"Fall and winter are a time when viruses that cause respiratory disease usually circulate more heavily in the community,"

Blanca Scott, director of infection prevention at Memorial Medical Center in Las Cruces, wrote. "Some seasons are more severe than others based on strains of the virus' circulation and our immunity to these viruses. One of the measures of the severity of a season is how many people are sick enough to be hospitalized."

Flu sickened at least 14 million Americans this season as of Jan. 6, accounting for 150,000 hospitalizations and 9,400 deaths, per data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Influenza-like activity in New Mexico was among the highest in the U.S. According to Scott, influenza-like illnesses in the state stand "around 7 to 10 percent above the national base line and at a higher rate than

surrounding states."

She said respiratory illness currently accounted for 10 to 15 percent of visits to the emergency room.

Covid-19 hospitalizations also ramped up between Nov. 4 and Jan. 6, with 35,801 during the latter week, although the season's volume remained below last winter's peak.

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) results in up to 80,000 hospitalizations among young children and up to 160,000 for adults over 65, annually, and causes thousands of deaths.

Enhancing the risk are low rates of updated vaccine uptake for flu and SARS-CoV-2. In

December, the

CDC issued a health advisory urging providers to deliver more immunizations for all three viruses to eligible patients, after flu hospitalizations increased 200 percent over a four-week period, along with increases in Covid hospitalizations (51 percent) and RSV (60 percent).

"Low vaccination rates, coupled with ongoing increases in national and international respiratory disease activity caused by multiple pathogens ... could lead to more severe disease and increased healthcare capacity strain in the coming weeks," the agency stated in the advisory.

Vaccination data as of Jan. 12 showed just over 21 percent of adults were up to date on Covid vaccinations, while less than 47 percent had received a recent flu shot and 20 percent of citizens 60 years old and up had taken the recently introduced RSV vaccine.

While vaccines and

boosters do not necessarily prevent infection, Shet explained, “it’s going to be a milder form of infection ... you may have some mild to moderate symptoms which last, give or take, about three to four days, but it’s nowhere near as severe as when you get sick without the vaccine.”

Scott also pointed to lagging vaccinations in the state: “This year, fewer New Mexicans received an annual flu shot, with only around 25 percent of eligible people (receiving) the vaccine. There is still plenty of vaccine available in our community.”

Prevention and slowing spread

Shet reviewed common strategies for preventing infection and slowing the spread of respiratory viruses:

“If you’re sick, stay home. If someone is sick, stay away from them. If you can’t, at least wear a mask,” he said, “and if you are sick, yes, wear a mask, stay in the house away from family and friends while you’re sick. Wash your hands — the best advice is to wash your hands, multiple times.”

Although the trio are often referred to as “winter viruses,” the reason for increases in airborne illness in the colder months, Shet explained, was reduced ventilation in homes and offices as windows are kept shut for warmth.

If one must go out while having symptoms, he urged masking and avoiding establishments that prohibit masking. “It’s like wildfire. If you don’t take care, it will just keep on spreading. ... People who are really at that high-risk population can get sick, and we do see them, getting sick to the point where they have to be in the ICU, stay in the hospital for a prolonged period of time, sometimes have a breathing tube down their throats.”

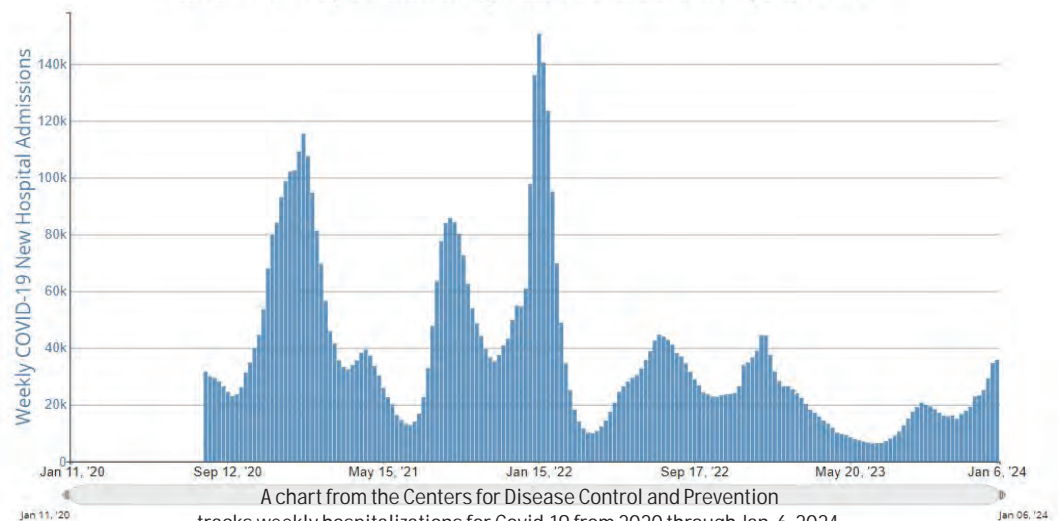
When is it time to seek medical attention outside the home? First and foremost, Shet pointed to problems breathing, coughing until one is short of breath, losing the ability to carry out daily activity because one is short of breath or too fatigued to get up, or continuous fevers requiring round-the-

clock medication.

Frequently, dehydration results in home patients with upset stomachs who forego eating and drinking even though, according to Shet, nutrition and fluids are exactly what they need.

“Dehydration causes more complications and issues with kidneys and liver than anything else,” he said. “The virus will run its course. If you’re not in that high-risk population group, your body will fight it out most of the time. But then if you don’t eat or drink and you keep on taking the Tylenol or Ibuprofen or Naproxen, that causes more issues with your stomach, so it’s a vicious cycle.”

MOBILE CRISIS UNIT LOOKS TO FUTURE AFTER DEBUT YEAR

Project LIGHT wears its mission in its name.

The acronym LIGHT stands for “Lessen the Incidence of Grief, Harm and Trauma.” The title belongs to a unique Las Cruces Fire Department team of paramedics and licensed social workers who respond to people in a mental health crisis.

The project launched on March 6, 2023, to reduce the frequency of grief, harm and trauma in Las Cruces. In year one, city officials feel it has achieved that goal.

“We’re pretty happy with the way it’s going,” City Manager Ifo Pili said in an interview with the Las Cruces Bulletin. “But we’re going to have to wait to see how we can improve over the next few months.”

The year saw Project LIGHT receive news coverage, much of it local, but some extending all the way to the United Kingdom in an article published in The

Guardian and written by Searchlight New Mexico. The team also responded to 940 calls in its first year – an average of about three calls per day.

According to data from the LCFD, about half the calls were strictly mental health related. About 40 percent required multiple interventions such as mental health and medical. Most calls ended with transportation to a mental health provider or the patient receiving treatment on-scene.

“The LIGHT teams have been a resounding success,” Las Cruces Police Department Chief Jeremy Story said during a city council presentation in August 2023. “They’ve enabled the police department to focus on safety while the mental health professionals focus on providing the best care possible and plugging people into resources they need.”

Now, Project LIGHT looks to the future.

Matthew Hiles, a battalion chief with LCFD who oversees Project LIGHT and the department's Mobile Integrated Healthcare Program, said Project LIGHT has two goals for the future.

First, build a place for Project LIGHT to call home. The Project

LIGHT teams operate out of Fire Station 1, the main headquarters on Picacho Avenue across from the Thomas Brannigan Memorial Library.

“To be honest, we’re housed over here at station one and things are actually they’re just really

tight,” Hiles said.

As of now, Hiles said, the plan is to demolish the old Fire Station 3 located on Valley Drive near the W. Hadley Avenue intersection. The building was made obsolete after the city

completed the new Fire Station 3 right next door as part of a 2018 GO Bond project.

Hiles said a new building for Project LIGHT and the Mobile Integrated Healthcare Program would improve outcomes.

“It’s also going to give some space for our teams to have a moment and decompress,” Hiles said. “Right now, there’s really nowhere to do that.”

The second goal involves filling that new space with more employees.

Under its current setup, Project LIGHT has five employees. The team members include licensed masters’ in social work Allison Stoner and Mendy Fowler, paramedics Myke Torres and Korina Jimenez and case manager Wes Smith. The group breaks into two

teams covering different parts of the day.

But that means if the team is out and a second call comes in, there's currently no way to respond to it. It also means that the absence of a team member stifles Project LIGHT: "When one person is out, the whole team is out," Hiles said.

Growing the team will require more money. Currently, Project LIGHT is funded by the city of Las Cruces through the LCFD's budget, although the program has been the subject of federal grants. Project LIGHT has been awarded about \$1 million, Hiles said, but Project LIGHT hasn't received that money.

"So definitely adding personnel down the road is going to be beneficial for the public," Hiles said.

But one thing Hiles said will stay the same in the future is the use of the model.

Las Cruces is one of many cities in America to implement a non-police crisis intervention team. But some other cities rely on a "crisis now" model of care.

The Crisis Now model works like this: A person experiencing a crisis or a person adjacent to a crisis will call the crisis team directly, or their call will be routed via 988. Then a team like Project LIGHT will arrive on the scene and treat or transport the person. Typically, there are no police or other traditional first responders at the scene.

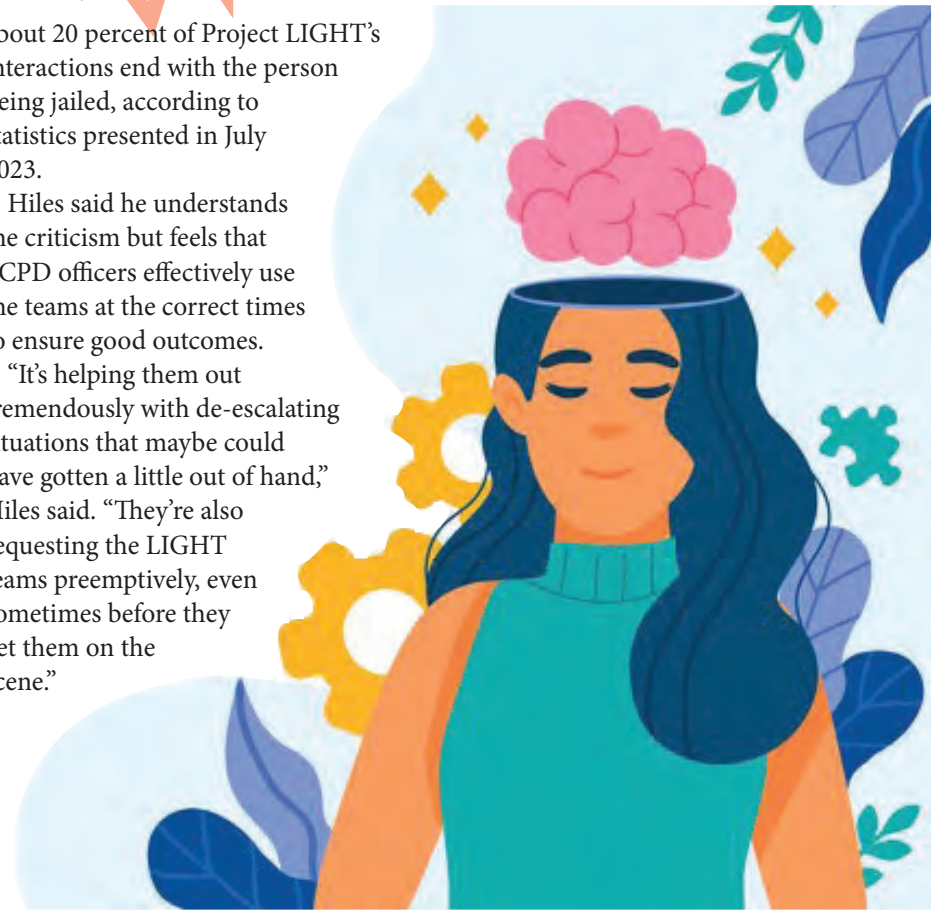
That's not how Las Cruces' Project LIGHT works. Instead, Project LIGHT operates alongside a cadre of first responders. When someone calls 911 with a crisis, it's up to the 911 dispatcher to call on Project LIGHT or the police officer responsible for securing the scene to request Project LIGHT's presence. This practice falls under the category of the co-responder model.

The major criticism of the co-responder model involves incarceration. Because police officers participate in the response, many outcomes can lead to someone experiencing a crisis ending up in jail. In Las Cruces' case,

about 20 percent of Project LIGHT's interactions end with the person being jailed, according to statistics presented in July 2023.

Hiles said he understands the criticism but feels that LCPD officers effectively use the teams at the correct times to ensure good outcomes.

"It's helping them out tremendously with de-escalating situations that maybe could have gotten a little out of hand," Hiles said. "They're also requesting the LIGHT teams preemptively, even sometimes before they get them on the scene."

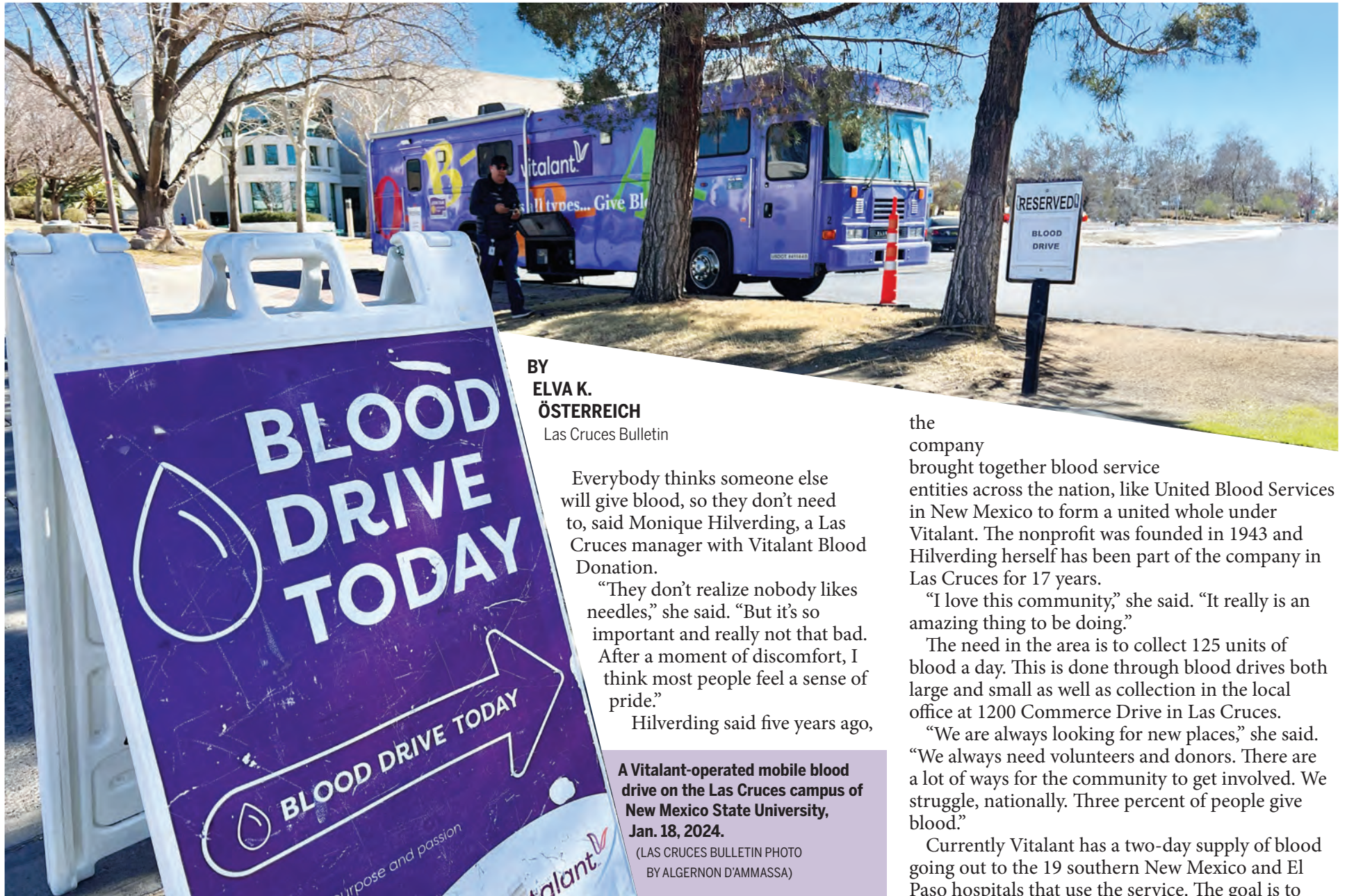

Giving blood, a matter of life

Everybody thinks someone else will give blood, so they don't need to, said Monique Hilverding, a Las Cruces manager with Vitalant Blood Donation.

"They don't realize nobody likes needles," she said. "But it's so important and really not that bad. After a moment of discomfort, I think most people feel a sense of pride."

Hilverding said five years ago,

the company brought together blood service entities across the nation, like United Blood Services in New Mexico to form a united whole under Vitalant. The nonprofit was founded in 1943 and Hilverding herself has been part of the company in Las Cruces for 17 years.

"I love this community," she said. "It really is an amazing thing to be doing."

The need in the area is to collect 125 units of blood a day. This is done through blood drives both large and small as well as collection in the local office at 1200 Commerce Drive in Las Cruces.

"We are always looking for new places," she said. "We always need volunteers and donors. There are a lot of ways for the community to get involved. We struggle, nationally. Three percent of people give blood."

Currently Vitalant has a two-day supply of blood going out to the 19 southern New Mexico and El Paso hospitals that use the service. The goal is to have a five-day supply, she said.

The number one reason people don't choose to give is fear of blood or needles and the fear of passing out, she said.

Hilverding said many people think blood is mostly needed when major events occur, but everyday personal things happen all the time.

"Everyday someone is dealing with something – car accidents, cancer, premature babies, surgeries," she said. "I do it as often as my body will let me, three times a year. If everyone who donates did three times a year, we wouldn't have a shortage."

To give blood, she said, you need to feel well

and healthy. Take your ID and eat something; prepare to receive a mini-physical. You can take a short questionnaire on the vitalant.org website or just go in and they will ask you the questions. Rules over donor eligibility are constantly changing: For example, for a long time you had to wait a year after getting a tattoo before giving blood, but now you don't have to wait at all.

Jennifer Jimenez, director of laboratory services at Mountain View Regional Medical Center, described the process.

"You go through a screening process," she said. "They ask several questions to ensure you are capable of giving blood that is safe. There is a reclining chair, a needle stick, and they start dispensing

blood in a machine that cleans out the blood and puts some fluids back in the body – filling bags. Afterward the individual sits for a while to make sure they are OK and gets a snack and juice to build up sugars."

Nationally blood product supplies are extremely low because people have become afraid of donating, Jimenez said. She would especially like to see people with rare blood types go and give blood.

"It's a safe process, a lifesaving process," she said. "That is why we host a lot of these blood draws so we can help in area. I highly recommend people come in. It helps with trauma – big car wrecks, falls."

Bringing medical rigor to looking good

At Face It Hydrate Med Spa, luxury spa treatments and quality medical care are two sides of the same coin. Sonda Boulware — who holds a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree and is a board-certified acute care nurse practitioner — and her staff at Face It offer IV hydration, health-supporting injections, cosmetic treatments, laser tattoo removal and a guided weight loss program.

Though New Mexico has lax legal standards around many spa, cosmetic and aesthetic procedures, Boulware and her staff hold Face It to the standard of clinical medicine, including in selection and maintenance of equipment and furniture. Treatments that would be extremely simple at other spas receive a medical-class upgrade at Face It. Where other spas might offer a skin treatment with over-the-counter lotions, a basic skincare routine at Face It might include the use of a skinwave machine that uses a four-step chemical process to repair and rejuvenate skin.

The union of cosmetic treatment and medical responsibility at Face It is exemplified by their weight-loss program. In fact, the inspiration for Face It was

Boulware's desire to offer effective and affordable semaglutide treatments to patients, which she was unable to do as part of her cardiology practice.

Face It's weight loss program starts with semaglutide compound injections. Semaglutide, better known by its brand names Ozempic and Wegovy, slows down the digestive system, giving the patient a full stomach feeling faster and for longer than normal. However, the injections are only one step in Face It's weight loss program.

The staff work with patients' primary care physicians to make sure that semaglutide compound injections are the right choice. The team also monitors patients' progress. "That's what makes our program very different," Boulware said. "We're in contact with [our patients] usually at least once a week."

The Face It team works with patients to create a treatment plan that includes lifestyle and diet changes to promote lasting results. The team addresses possible side effects of semaglutide as well. By walking patients through every step of the process, Face It's weight loss program has seen many successes, Boulware said, adding that for most patients, "their biggest complaint is that they have to go and buy a new wardrobe."

The luxury cosmetic treatments at Face It work hand in hand with the more medically intensive procedures like the weight-loss program. In Boulware's experience, combining weight-loss treatments with cosmetic and self-care procedures can help patients stay on a healthy path. She says if patients "look in the mirror and like what they see, they'll exercise, they will eat better, they will take their medications, they will do the things that they're asked to do."

Many of these cosmetic treatments are spearheaded by esthetician Arlie Borde. Borde maintains an entire double cabinet full of creams, salves, chemical peels, sunscreens, lotions and more. 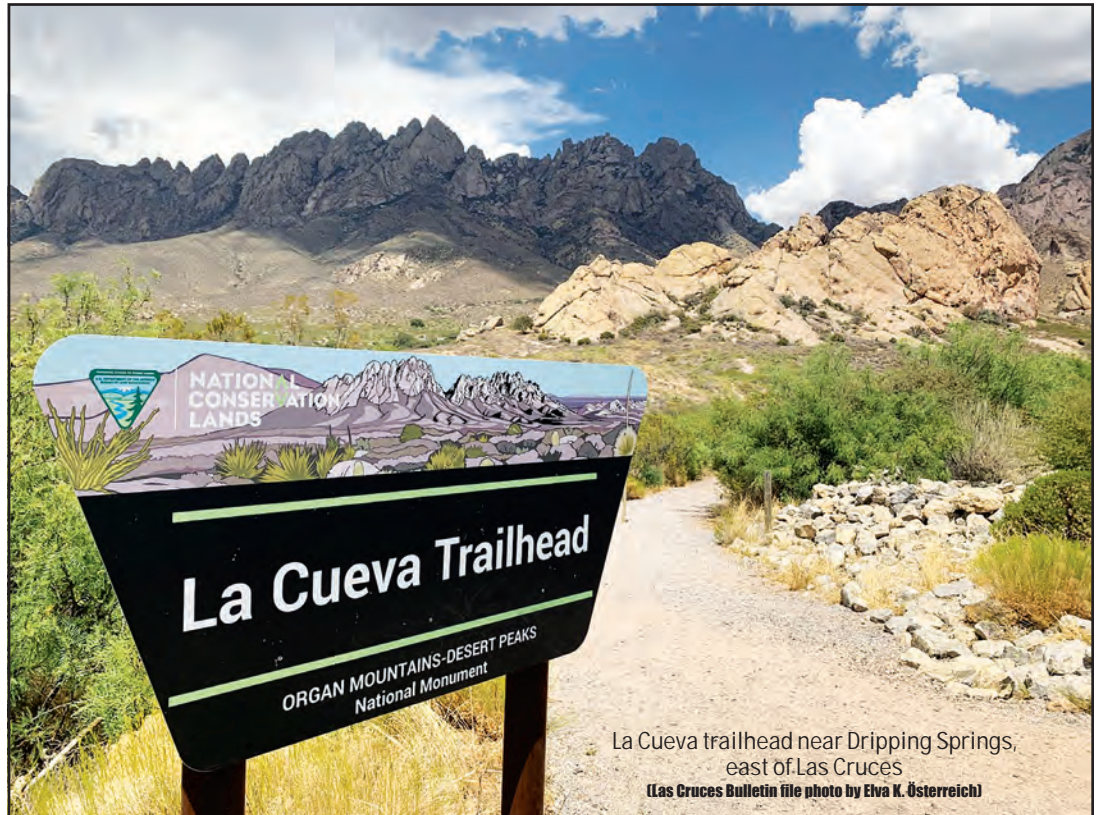

The organization describes the hike as easy or

Although the informational hike is free, there is a \$5 day use fee to park at the La Cueva lot, off the east end of Dripping Springs Road at the La Cueva Picnic Area. From Interstate 25, take exit 1 (University Avenue/Dripping Springs Road) and drive eastbound to the end.

Medical cannabis program continues to shrink

The number of patients enrolled in New Mexico's medical cannabis program peaked in May 2022 at 135,388. Since then, the number of enrolled patients has sloped downward, hitting 83,663 in December, according to data from the New Mexico Department of Health — a 38.2 percent drop from the peak.

In Doña Ana County, 12,641 patients were enrolled in the program, administered by the health department. That's the third-highest patient count by county in the state, behind Santa Fe (14,329) and Bernalillo (45,025).

New Mexico legalized cannabis for medical use in 2007 under the Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act.

The health department and state cannabis regulators attribute the downturn to the legalization of cannabis for non-medical use by adults, a law passed in 2021 that created a regulated commercial marketplace in April 2022, just as the medical cannabis program was at its highest enrollment.

The state's largest cannabis retailer, Ultra Health, has blamed the decline on "high prices and a lack of available medicine, pushing patients out of the existing medical model into the illicit market," in a written statement in November.

This, despite enrolled patients being able to access cannabis free of taxes, whereas purchases for adult or "recreational" use are subject to gross receipts tax in addition the state's cannabis excise tax.

The most common qualifying condition for enrolled patients in New Mexico is Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (74,006), followed by severe chronic pain (40,519) and cancer (6,801). Nearly 30 primary conditions are documented in the December patient report. A new condition, insomnia, became the 30th qualifying condition was added on June 1 of last year, but no enrolled patients had it listed as their qualifying condition in December.

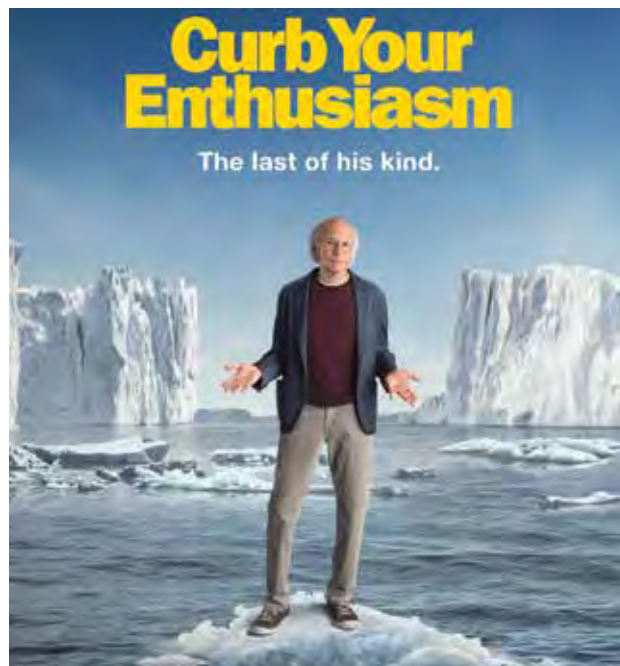

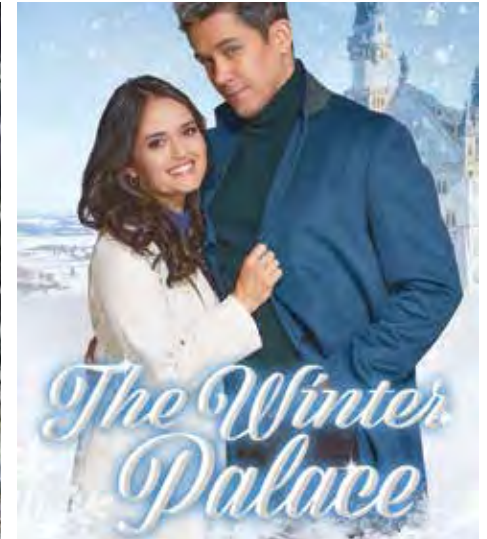

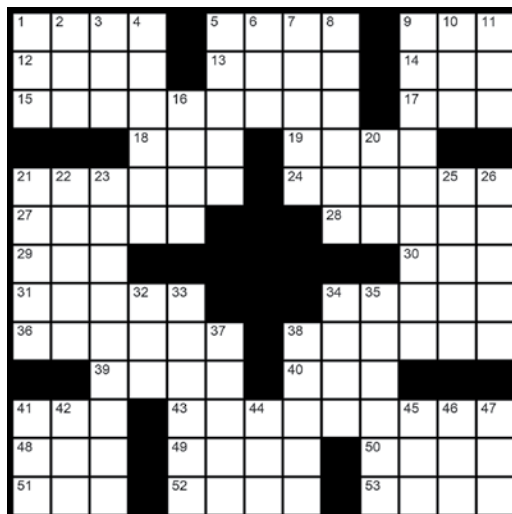

All for the love of art

Once a year, Las Cruces artists come together and flow apart to show their love of their craft by celebrating for a whole month, For the Love of Art Month. February became a month of activity and studio tours about 25 years ago, ArtForms president Karen Conley said.

“The original ArtForms people started by picking a month and celebrating art all across the city with open studio tours and more,” she said. “At the beginning there were events like flamenco dancers. Covid squeezed the life out of a lot of groups and now we are back in full. I think we have 39 studio tours and it’s pretty spread out across the city.”

Today there are new artists and those who have done it before, she said. The ArtForms Member’s show kicks of the event every year. This year it begins in two galleries in the Mesquite Historic District, Gallery 925 and Duende Gallery, with the exhibition opening reception 4 - 8 p.m., Friday, Feb. 2. There will be live music by Blues 101 and refreshments.

There is a comprehensive guide of month-long events and studio tour guide available, which can be picked up at locations across the county.

“We highlight a lot of other art events,” Conley said. “We will be adding all the events we can to webpage. This is a celebration – an organized month-long event highlighting our local artists that live and work here.”

Conley, an artist herself, said art brings a lot to each person’s life.

“Art is enrichment,” she said. “I be-

lieve art is another language that can help people in their life. It helps us understand things that are going on in the world.”

Having been a special education teacher with autistic students, Conley knows first-hand art can be a key to communication.

When she was a child, her aunt was a regional artist and her grandmother always had pencils and paper. She said she learned to appreciate nature and beauty and the fine things and those rubbed off on her. After retiring from Army, Conley felt compelled to go to art school. She went to New Mexico State University and started painting.

“The education did open up my world,” she said. “It really helped me a lot. I felt drawn to create after 28 years in a left-brained environment.”

This year, instead of choosing an artist of the year, ArtForms determined to remember some of the beloved area artists who have passed away in the past year. These include Ruth Drayer, Les Fairchild, Linda Lundeen, John Northcutt and Jan Thune.

“We just thought it would be better to recognize the people that we lost,” Conley said. “There is a page in the brochure and plaque for the show.”

The mission of ArtForms is to support the Las Cruces creative community and partner with other organizations to promote the region as an arts and cultural destination, the organization said in a press release.

“For the Love of Art Month is a vital community celebration of the arts,” said Rebecca Courtney, a longtime member and participating artist. “Artists, gal-

leries, local businesses, schools and citizens of all ages come together in February to embrace the power of creativity. Art provides income to families, attracts tourists, builds community pride and establishes our identity as a community. This annual endeavor is truly for the love of art and for the pride we have in the Mesilla Valley.”

There are 39 studio tours scheduled this year. The tour lets patrons talk to the artists and see their creative spaces. Some of the artists will be working or doing demos. The studio listing, QR code and specific dates for each are listed in the Artforms’ guide and on the Web page ArtFormsNM.org. 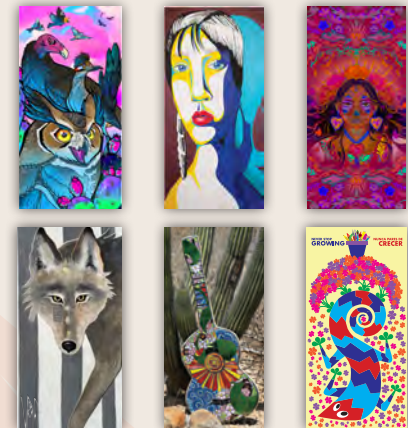

The two-edged sword of religious ritual

I've been in ecclesiastical ministry more than fifty years. A sense of sobriety comes with serving that long. Nary a week goes by that I don't contemplate the possibility that religious institutions – all of them – may be counter-productive, encouraging people to take refuge in ritual when righteous and compas-

ionate behavior would and should be the proper response to proclamations of faith. It is frustrating to think that your work may be a contradiction to your message, that the rituals at the heart of your work may offer a dodge to

people, a way to “feel” religious without doing righteousness on the ground.

Judaism and Christianity were born of a flaming insight into the heart of reality.

They proclaim a message initially grasped by a handful of people

who in turn shared that with others, and they grew to be sizeable movements.

Three hundred years ago, German philosopher Gotthold Lessing taught that historical events cannot reveal eternal truths. Lessing called this the “ugly ditch” separating faith from history. Many people argued against Lessing since that time,

but his idea informs contemporary thinking. To Gotthold Lessing, the Exodus, central to Jewish consciousness and faith, or the Cross and Resurrection, central to Christian consciousness and faith, cannot be drafted to reveal eternal truths. Historical moments fade into the past, like the volcano that consumed

Pompeii or the Norman Conquest. What meaning they have remains time bound. Yet both Judaism and Christianity continue to live out of ephemeral events, laden as they are with mythical content, as if they revealed eternal truth. We continue to believe that Lessing was

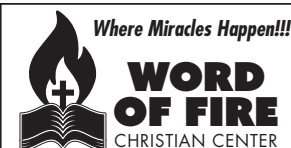

Las Cruces businesses win job training grants

Electronic Caregiver and Higher Cultures, LLC, both based in Las Cruces, were awarded job training grants through the New Mexico Economic Development Department.

Electronic Caregiver received an award of \$101,500 for 37 trainees under the Step Up program, to provide "upskill" training for current employees, according to a news release. Electronic Caregiver designs and delivers telehealth services and products.

Higher Cultures, a cannabis processing and cultivation company also involved in retail and wholesale sales, was awarded \$33,656.40, according to the EDD, for five trainees under the Job Training Incentive Program, which reimburses employers on the completion of training. The company employs 60 workers year-round with seasonal jobs for over 40 more workers, the EDD stated.

The businesses were among five statewide awarded in a \$1.3 million tranche of grants announced on Jan. 18. Last year, EDD Secretary Mark Roper said the JTIP program assisted 67 business in 16 of New Mexico's 33 counties, for more than 1,200 jobs aiming to boost positions and wages.

Two gun bills move forward in statehouse

The House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee on Tuesday afternoon voted in favor of two pieces of legislation that support Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham's gun control reform plans.

House Bill 27 and House Bill 114 were each passed by the committee on a 4-2 vote.

Both bills are included in Lujan Grisham's list of proposals she is prioritizing this legislative session. She signed executive messages on Jan. 17, the first day lawmakers convened in Santa Fe, to allow the proposals to be debated during the short 30-day session.

House Bill 27 would expand the use of Extreme Risk Protection Orders. These orders come from a 2020 law and are meant to temporarily take guns away from people who could be dangerous toward themselves or others.

This proposal is sponsored by Reps. Christine Chandler (D-Los Alamos), Joy Garratt (D-Albuquerque) and Cristina Parajón (D-Albuquerque). The legisla-

tion would allow police and health care workers to request an order if they believe there is a risk with someone having a gun.

Chandler said some confusion has come up in the courts, with at least one district court judge concluding that police may not be the ones who file a petition for an extreme risk protection order.

HB 27 would allow any local police department, sheriff's office, the New Mexico State Police or attorneys working for local prosecutors or the New Mexico Department of Justice to take the gun away immediately whenever a judge issues an order. The law today requires them to wait 48 hours, Chandler said.

"This, frankly, poses a threat to law enforcement and possibly others, because it gives opportunity for that individual who may be a threat to himself or others to act on those impulses," Chandler said.

The bill would also create an expedited process for an on-call judge to issue orders 24-7.

Reps. John Block (R-Alamogordo) and Stefani Lord (R-Sandia Park) questioned the bill's sponsors and their experts for

two hours.

Block said HB 27 would erode due process rights for people accused, and said he is murky about which health care workers would be allowed to ask for an order to remove a firearm from an individual.

"I have huge concerns regarding constitutional rights of this bill," Block said. "On behalf of my constituents, it's going to be a very hard pill to swallow to vote for this legislation."

Block and Lord voted against the two bills.

Despite that opposition, the committee also voted 4-2 to pass House Bill 114, sponsored by Chandler, which would require



gun manufacturers to take reasonable precautions against allowing guns to fall into the wrong hands.

Those precautions would include preventing loss or theft, not promoting unlawful use of guns, and preventing the sale of guns to anyone who can't own one or who might use it to harm themselves or others, according to the legislation.

Chandler said the New Mexico Attorney General would have the authority to enforce adequate controls and recover damages if controls aren't in place, and private individuals who may be harmed by the gun industry could sue and recover attorney's fees and damages for the same reason.

Lord said the bill would tie up law-abiding gun sellers in court.

"That's what I don't want to happen," Lord said. "I've seen most of them going above and beyond to make sure they're not getting firearms in the wrong hands, and locking up their firearms."

wrong, that memory can salvage the meaning.

For these timebound events to retain relevance, however, they had to be packaged in exercises that constantly recall and rehearse the historic event. In ritual they are re-membered, literally brought back into the visceral experience of the

participant.

The problem, as we observed above, is that rituals can be a substitute for experience. They are double-sided or, to use another word, ambivalent. One side leads you into the heart of the experience; one side leads away from it. It is hard to maintain the effort to stay on the side that leads into the experience.

The Zen proverb says

that all ritual actions are but a finger pointing at the moon when people need to experience the moon itself. You can focus your attention on the finger, but by so doing you miss the experience. Hence the thought that comes to every minister or priest or rabbi at some point: Am I simply getting people to focus on the finger when the moon is the important thing? At its best, ritual

sinks the experience into our hearts and minds and bodies and makes us forget the finger. At its worst, ritual drives us away from the experience and makes us focus on the finger.

I take refuge in Scholar Jan Assmann's distinction between "collective" and "cultural" memory. The former lasts a few generations. The significance of Jack Kennedy's assassination will fade

into the mists of history. Cultural memory, however, lasts millennia. The stuff of Judaism and Christianity is the stuff of cultural memory. With this insight, Assmann offers us hope that Lessing was wrong, that some historical events are so momentous that they can bear meaning over the centuries. That's the hope and the wager made by the great religions, even those

that eschew a god, like Buddhism or Taoism. The hope is that the deep and true meaning they have known can be experienced anew in each generation.

And so, I soldier on for a little while longer.

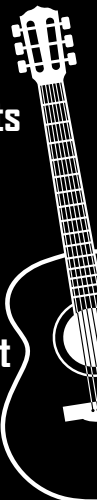

New super nostrums, remedies for afflicted golfers

I have always been puzzled by the crazy names of drugs and medications, especially those advertised on television – and there are plenty. Who comes up with these seemingly randomly lettered names? Here are a few: OPZELURA, SOTYKTY, MOUNJARO and many more.

I thought I would share my proposed names for yet-to-be developed substances aimed at clearing up a few of the most difficult conditions plaguing golfers.

YIPNOMORE: The “yips” are basically an uncontrolled body movement whereby the hands and wrists (mostly) react to nervous tension in a jerky, clumsy manner, causing the putter to awkwardly stab at the ball

with no guidance whatsoever. It’s a matter of involuntary wrist spasms that usually seems beyond the player’s brain function to control. With **YIPNOMORE** you will remain calm and serene as you putt, seeing and hearing the ball drop into the cup. This remedy supports healthy brain and neuromuscular function, offering you the confidence to perform to your true potential. SLICEBEGONE: The bane of almost all higher-handicapped recreational golfers is the slice. For right-handed golfers this is a banana-shaped ball flight produced from a swipe (outside-in)

of the clubface hitting the ball. Thousands of articles have been written about how to “cure” your slice. Either casual golfers don’t read them or none of them work. **SLICEBEGONE** worked in clinical trials with quite a few awful golfers, so it will work for you. **SLICEBEGONE** will support your effort to prevent “coming

over the top” with your driver, and help keeping you from “casting” – i.e. swinging your club like a fishing rod. Also it will help dampen your tendency to angrily throw your club after a wild slice out of bounds. at Carnoustie, made a triple-bogey and lost in a playoff. Greg Norman led by 6 strokes going into the final round at the 1996 Masters and lost by four to Nick Faldo. But take heart – now there’s **CHOKENOT**, a revolutionary solution which supports mental toughness. There are no generics and no side effects. It’s worth the exorbitant cost.
