Four Democrats and one Republican are asking voters to elect them as Doña Ana County's district attorney. Incumbent Gerald Byers, a Democrat, faces three challengers in the June 4 primary election. The winner will face Republican Michael Cain, running unopposed in the GOP primary.

Anxiety around crime, con-

cerns about dismissals, releases and repeat offenders, combined with questions about the fair execution of justice, make this race the most competitive of the local 2024 primary season.

The DA's office has experienced turnover at a high rate for several years. Byers has said the office cannot compete with salary of large private firms and fishes from the same pool of lawyers as other district attorneys' offices in New Mexico. But the challengers have also criticized Byers' leadership.

In today's Bulletin, the competing Democratic candidates answer questions shaped by Bulletin readers who responded to our call for input on what you wanted local election candidates

to talk about: How the DA's office can address societal issues; how the candidates would recruit and retain prosecutors; what changes they would seek in New Mexico law; and more. The questions are a synthesis of 100 responses we received.

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Police call for panhandling, shopping cart laws

The Las Cruces Police Department on April 29 proposed changes to the city code that would create new restrictions on panhandling and the use of shopping carts.

A divided council gave the green light to bring the proposed ordinances forward for a future meeting. Councilors Becki Graham and Cassie McClure joined Mayor Eric Enriquez and Councilor Bill Mattiace in requesting the ordinances appear on the agenda.

Councilors Yvonne Flores said she did not want to see the ordinances move forward. Councilors Johana Bencomo and Becky Corran did not indicate their support for bringing the changes forward, but did not speak against them either.

Police Chief Jeremy Story presented the changes. He described them as part of a holistic response. However, several people spoke out against the changes, including a representative from a civil rights group, an advocate for the rights of the unhoused and a homeless man who spoke to the Bulletin during the meeting.

It's unclear when the ordinance changes could be brought to a vote. Enriquez said factors such as the summer special

legislative session could delay the matter.

Proposed ordinances

First, Story presented potential changes to the city's existing ordinance on solicitation. The current order is unenforceable after a federal court found a similar ordinance unconstitutional in 2018. As Story characterized it, the update would narrow the focus and remove unconstitutional language.

On public property, Story said instances of physical contact, intimidation, threats, blocking a vehicle, verbal barrages or not vielding when someone declines a solicitation would be illegal. Story noted that many of these instances already qualify as forms of assault or battery. On private property, Story said if the owner, tenant or other lawful occupant asks the person not to

solicit, then they can't solicit.

Additionally, the new ordinance would make solicitation in the roadway and solicitation that prevents someone from using the road illegal. Soliciting from the sidewalk—so long as the person isn't in the road or blocking traffic—would still be legal, Story said.

The council would have to pass changes to two city codes to change this.

The shopping cart ordinance would enforce restrictions on businesses that provide customers with carts, such as compelling them to submit plans for how they plan to keep their carts, efforts to recover them and steps they'll take to inform customers they can't take them.

"Abandoned shopping carts in the city can potentially hazard the

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Meet the primary candidates for district attorney

Shaharazad Booth, a defense attorney in Las Cruces and former Deming prosecutor, wants to be the next district attorney to restore a sense of safety in Doña Ana County.

"It's a real love and desire to be in this community that drives me to run," Booth said. "I want to get back to that idea that your kids can go to the park where people feel happy, healthy and safe, while not trying to villainize those who didn't do anything wrong."

Booth, a University of Arkansas law school graduate, made the case for why she deserved the job above her colleagues during an interview with the Las Cruces Bulletin. Booth said her driving force, not just for the election but life in general, is family.

"There's nothing I love more than them. And dealing in situations where children are getting hurt, and families are being wrong wronged, and finding no justice in the system is heartbreaking," Booth said.

Does the district attorney's office have

the power to affect societal issues?

Unequivocally, Booth said the DA's office is uniquely suited to affecting societal issues like climate change, homelessness and immigration.

For Booth, this power comes in two forms – the decisions of how and when to prosecute cases and the array of resources given to DA's offices by the state.

For the former, she used an experience as a prosecutor in Deming's 6th Judicial District as an example. Before cannabis had been legalized in New Mexico. Booth said the 6th Judicial District stopped prosecuting low-level marijuana offenses.

"We're not talking. you know, cars full of or barrels of marijuana," Booth said. "We found that personal use possession wasn't worth our resources, it was against the public demands."

Instead, the Deming prosecutor's office used the saved resources to push domestic violence cases. It was all at the will of the community, Booth

But it works both ways. Booth added that, when trying to affect something like climate change, the DA's office can prioritize prosecutions of illegal dumping, for example.

"By prosecuting them and taking them seriously, you can start to show that these are things we care about. Then you get into federal issues like immigration, we have no

state crime for immigration, we have no business bothering with it," Booth said. "But what we can do, though, is help with marginalized communities."

"It's about educating people on their visas, and all kinds of immigration statuses that we can earn for people that will help them feel comfortable coming in (to report a crime.) But also, you know, they're victims first, and making sure that we're punishing those who are victimizing people in our community, regardless of their status."

The district attorney's office has struggled to retain attorneys in recent years. How would you address this problem?

After recent years of high turnover at the DA's office. Booth said there is a pool of qualified attorneys in the community willing to fill the prosecutor's office if change at the top occurs.

Booth said creating peer support in the office plays a major role in recruitment and retention. Whether that's in a high profile murder case or a low-level DWI case, Booth said that she or another prosecutor would play a pivotal role as mentor.

"I come from the mentality that leadership is showing support, comfort and showing up," Booth said. "It's not, 'I haven't paid attention to a thing

Gerald Byers paused for nearly a minute to contemplate when asked what was the one thing he wanted voters to know about him.

The incumbent 3rd Judicial District Attorney faces five challengers. Each seek to unseat him. Each has made it clear that they're running because they feel Byers fumbled his first term in the office. There's a reason, they have said, nearly half a dozen local attorneys want Byers out.

Then, finally, he answered.

"A sacrificial commitment to justice," Byers said. "Honesty, integrity, honor, truth, all that other kind of stuff. ... That's what all lawyers are supposed to be. But there's a difference whenever it comes to who has done it, and who would talk about it. I've done it. I could have been doing something else for the last 26 years of my life."

Byers, a University of New Mexico law school graduate and Navy veteran, won an unopposed election in 2020 to become the first Black man to be a district attorney in New Mexico. Now he is making SEE **BOOTH,** PAGE **6** | his case for a second term.

"I chose to do this," he said in a recent interview. "And that's because of a fundamental respect for humanity. And that's why, when I hear about migrants and stash houses, I think back to that image of the slave ship, and people stuck in there like matchsticks. And how wonderful this country is that it focuses on the dignity of human beings. That's why I served my nation in the military. That's why I'm serving as a public servant now."

Does the district attorney's office have the power to affect societal issues?

Byers said some issues, such as climate change, were beyond the scope of the DA's office.

"Since we're government officials, we're limited to exercising any authority to that which has been given through the Constitution or by the statutory law," Byers said.

Certain situations can arise, Byers said. But for the most part, the scope of the office should limit the officeholder's power. But Byers also noted that, in issues around homelessness, it was important to appreciate the root causes and treat people with dignity and respect regardless of social position.

"Part of that is our victim advocate services ... trying to facilitate means for them to participate in the process in a meaningful way," Byers said. "So that might be one aspect where we could be involved to some degree."

The district attorney's office has struggled to retain attorneys in recent years. How would you address this problem?

The district attornev's office has experienced rapid turnover among staff prosecutors in recent years. Byers has pointed to competitive salaries offered by large private firms, but challengers have also maligned Byers' leadership. They say that he's driven people out.

"First, let me start off by saying that the DA's office is the best place in the state for new and experienced attorneys to do their best work and to support the public," Byers said.

He pointed to factors that make the 3rd Judicial District unique. Its proximity to the border, presence of New Mexico State University, military bases and interstate travel create unique circumstances for the practice of law, he said.

As for recruitment and retention. Byers said his office advertises in multiple mediums and visits the University of New Mexico law school. The office also has paid internships. Byers said the office allows hires outside the state and hires attorneys on a contract

"And we do all of these things that are innovative in order to maintain the staffing level. That's essential to be able to get the work done. And we haven't

Fernando Macias has held over a dozen government leadership positions during his career.

Most recently, he ended his second stint as Doña Ana County Manager. Before that, he was a judge. He's also been a district public defender, executive director of the Mesilla Valley Economic Development Alliance and manager of a North American Free Trade Agreement institution. He's also been a state senator and chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

In high school, I was even student council president." Macias said. "At NMSU, where I graduated from, I was President of the Associated Students."

Now, Macias is looking to add the 3rd Judicial District Attorney to that long resume.

"It isn't that often that vou see someo ne who's actually been a judge come back and be a district attorney," he said.

Macias, a University of New Mexico law school graduate, argued his long resume elevates him above his competitors.

"I want them to feel comfortable that I understand and have the experience to go into this setting

and change the culture of the office and make it far more effective than it has been functioning over the course of the last decade or so," Macias said.

Does the district attorney's office have the power to affect societal issues?

Macias said the focus of the office should be on prosecuting criminal cases. That said, Macias acknowledged that the office can also be a forum for change in criminal iustice.

"The office can have a very strong voice in terms of how to improve the operations of the criminal justice system," Macias said. "To try to go outside of that framework would be very difficult."

The district attorney's office has struggled to retain attorneys in recent years. How would you address this problem?

Macias said he would first look to ensure attorneys were being well compensated. Then he would turn his attention to the atmosphere in the office.

"The office, for several district attorneys, has struggled internally. There's been quite a bit of conflict within the office." Macias said. "Conflict among the attorneys, conflict among the staff."

Macias said the office culture should facilitate an environment where people feel safe, understand the mission of the office, and feel that their work is appreciated.

Other candidates have said they would pursue

attornevs who have left the DA's office but stayed in the community. Macias has called this strategy folly.

"Many times, they come back with a chip on their shoulder, with a bad attitude. And so, a leader has to be able to say, how am I going to integrate people who left with a negative attitude about the office?" Macias said.

To fill the ranks, Macias said he'd recruit aggressively. He'd immediately target lawyers with experience – not those fresh out of law school.

"I would be looking to recruit individuals who are seasoned prosecutors in order to have the greatest immediate impact." he said. "I think that we have a number of young attorneys that are working in the office now who need more mentorship, who need greater guidance, who need good examples of effective prosecutors."

He said his experience as county manager would help him build a team of experienced and younger prosecutors to bear.

Would you advocate for changes in the law at the state Legislature?

Macias again reiterated his experience—this time as a state senator. That knowledge would be useful, particularly when it came to securing funding. But Macias also said that the role of the DA is not to influence other legislators from other parts of the state.

"I think that anybody

Ramona Martinez, a defense attorney and former staffer for Gov. Bill Richardson, said the driving force of her campaign is a shared experience and belief that she can fix things.

"I genuinely believe I can make a difference because I care. It's as simple as that," Martinez said.

Martinez, a University of New Mexico law school graduate, said, "I'm on the frontlines of what is happening right now. And I've seen both sides and I am hearing that people are not being heard. And as district attorney I will listen," Martinez said.

Does the district attorney's office have the power to affect societal issues?

For Martinez, the district attorney's office is more than just the area's top prosecutor. The officeholder is a leader of the community.

"The root causes of crime have to do with homelessness, drug addiction and those sorts of issues. And so the district attorney has the power and ability to affect those types of policy on the state level and in the local level." Martinez said. "As SEE MACIAS, PAGE 7 | a criminal defense at-

torney. I can sit here and beg for services for my clients. But ultimately, it's the DA who's going to say yes or no to those types of services, especially if I'm asking to divert them to alternative programs."

Martinez also highlighted the position's role as an advocate to legisla-

"They have influential power in making policy and laws in Santa Fe. And all of these things - to bring diversion programs and behavioral health services – can be advocated through the power of the district attorney," she said.

The district attorney's office has struggled to retain attorneys in recent years. How would you address this problem?

Martinez said she looks at the issue in two parts. First, she wondered if there wasn't a budget issue preventing the office from retaining or hiring more staff. Second, she moved on to questions of leadership.

"The problem is nobody wants to work for the current leadership," Martinez said.

Martinez said she'd fix the issue through aggressive recruitment and restructuring the office's hierarchy.

"You have to be present. You can't just post jobs. You have to actively go recruit these attorneys." Martinez said. "But then, when you actually have your attorneys, and you have a full staff, well, number one, vou value them, you treat them as

professionals, because we all graduated with law degrees; and you want your attorneys to be independent thinkers and be able to handle their caseloads. but also feel supported," she said.

To support staff, Martinez said she'd structure the office with three chief deputy district attorneys.

"I need those chiefs to be able to fill the holes that maybe I'm lacking, because as a leader, you can't be the one person that can run the entire organization. That's just not the reality," Martinez

Would you advocate for changes in the law at the state Legislature?

"Out of all the candidates, I'm the only one who's actually been up there in Santa Fe," Martinez said.

She added, "It's extremely important that you have your district attorney up there representing your constituents, because who else is going to lobby or advocate for the behavioral health services that we desperately need in this county?"

The lack of public services – particularly around behavior heath and drug treatment - necessitates a district attorney willing to advocate for change at the legislature, she said, adding that advocacy should also occur locally. She said she'd gather community stakeholders, such as the university, to better address issues that lay at the root

that's gone on,' and then when something goes wrong. You get fired because you had no clue what you were doing was wrong."

Would you advocate for changes in the law at the state Legislature?

New Mexico state law enshrines that fundamental role of the District Attorney is to lead an office in prosecuting criminal cases in a specified area. But the experience of doing so provides the officeholder with unique experiences. A district attorney, in theory, could use that experience and the office's resources to push for change in Santa Fe.

Booth said this was not only possible, but a task on which she would embark.

"If I believe very deeply in an area of law that is driven by my political ideologies, then I can affect change by showing what that means," Booth said.

One place booth mentioned she'd want to see changes is the state's animal abuse statutes.

"Animal abuse is probably one of the earliest precursors that we have that somebody is going to be violent and violent against family members, children, things of that nature," Booth said.

What role would your office play in addressing homelessness in Las Cruces?

Booth answered the question by drawing a line between the oftenconflated groups of people without shelter and people committing nuisance crimes like vandalism or trespassing.

"Being homeless is not illegal. So, the way that the question reads are where I get concerned. because I have no intention of making homelessness illegal," Booth said. Referring to "a significant population of repeat release offenders," she stressed: "I'm not saying a significant population of homeless people. I'm saying that there (are) five or six that are committing a lot of our crimes that are happening in our community."

She added that it was important for the DA's office to focus its prosecutorial efforts on them – not the larger population of unhoused people.

"When we're dealing with (a group) so small, to me, it feels like a breakdown in cooperation, that we're not together trying to figure out how we fix those people," Booth said.

To support people without shelter, Booth said the DA's office should support the organizations in Las Cruces better suited to addressing those needs.

Would you appear in court to personally prosecute cases? Why or why not?

Appearing in court is one of the best parts of being a lawyer, Booth said. Moreover, she said appearing in court and sharing in the caseload was key to showing support to the rank-and-file attorneys in the office.

But Booth also said that she didn't foresee being able to do that until year three of the job.

"Will I be prosecuting cases day one? No, but I'll be in court, we'll go and help and be part of and mentor and be there," she said

How would you maintain contact with your constituents during your term?

Booth said she'd run the DA's office with an open door. That would be in contrast to how Booth described the current office.

"I believe in creating a system where people feel comfortable being part of the system," she said.

She acknowledged that codes of ethics prevent prosecutors from speaking publicly about on going cases or from criticizing certain aspects of the judicial systems. But that doesn't mean the office can't be public with results of cases and statistics around case dismissals and convictions.

Additionally, Booth said her office would communicate to the public why they chose – or chose not to – prosecute certain cases.

"Being accessible to people allowing for that level of access, I think will truly start opening up the office," Booth said.

skipped a beat on that at all," he said.

Would you advocate for changes in the law at the state Legislature?

"The answer is, of course. And even better than that, we're doing it already," he said.

New Mexico state law enshrines that fundamental role of the District Attorney is to lead an office in prosecuting criminal cases in a specified area. But the experience of doing so provides the officeholder with unique experiences. A district attorney, in theory, could use that experience and the office's resources to push for change in Santa Fe.

Byers touted two examples of that work. First, he said he aided the legislature in amending a state law regarding organized crime. He said change includes fixing a loophole in the law.

Second, Byers touted a recent partnership with U.S. Customs and Border Protection. If federal prosecutors declined to prosecute someone who crossed the border illegally or someone involved in smuggling people, a federal prosecutor will pass the case to the DA's office. Byers said his office will investigate whether any state laws have been violated.

"The idea is to communicate to those people who would be smugglers that this area is not a good place to try to cross, for a number of reasons," Byers said. "It's paramount to

get that message across, so that people don't get stranded in the desert and die."

What role would your district attorney's office play in addressing homelessness in Las Cruces?

"As we mentioned before, that's an area that we cannot directly affect," Byers said. "However, there is the opportunity to have a voice on issues of public importance."

Byers said he was supportive of local permanent supportive housing efforts that helped people get off the streets. But Byers also wanted to draw a line between homelessness and criminality.

"One thing that I don't want to do is create the impression that just because a person is homeless that they are, therefore, a criminal. That's apples and oranges. Homelessness is a status, criminal conduct is behavior," Byers said.

Would you appear in court to personally prosecute cases? Why or why not?

Byers said he's no stranger to prosecuting cases. He noted his two decades in the role as proof. Still, he said he sees the job of district attorney as more of manager than an operator.

"The issue is providing leadership and guidance at the executive level, ensuring that the office as a whole has the tools and the resources and the mechanism and, most importantly, the ability to see the ultimate objective

and transmit that to the attorneys and secure that objective," Byers said.

Byers said he's come to that point of view observing and learning from other prosecutors he's worked under.

"Otherwise, I could turn it into a showboat situation where the spotlight is on me, and what good is that? The spotlight should be on justice," he said.

Byers was the only candidate who did not commit to personally prosecuting cases.

How would you maintain contact with your constituents during your term?

Byers said that, if reelected, he'd work to maintain a website and social media presence to communicate with the public. He also said his office would be represented at events like National Night Out, a first responder appreciation event.

Otherwise, Byers answered the questions by espousing the role of prosecutors as unsung heroes.

"When it comes to the criminal justice system, there's a prosecutor who goes into the court and secures that victory, vindicating justice for victims," he said.

During his term, his office has relied on news releases to inform the media of convictions. The news releases almost exclusively tout either plea deals or jury convictions but are often absent in cases with less favorable outcomes. However, the office does employ a spokesperson who responds to media inquiries.

who thinks that they'll do that is a little bit of an overstatement," he said.

Instead, Macias said he'd focus on lobbying local legislators.

"I wouldn't even have to go to Santa Fe. They're here in the community," he said.

Macias also said he'd be willing to use the office to educate legislators who aren't well-versed in criminal justice.

"There are fewer and fewer attorneys in the legislature. So you're really working with people that come out of non-legal environments, about difficulties in the legal process," he said.

What role would your district attorney's office play in addressing homelessness in Las Cruces?

Macias said his office would play a critical role.

He outlined two proposals. First, he said he'd work closely with judges who oversee release decisions. His office would prepare robust arguments and information regarding repeat offenders.

As Macias outlined, the process is not as easy as some suspect. To detain someone before trial, prosecutors have to convince a judge of two things. First, the person must be found dangerous to the public. Second, prosecutors must prove that no conditions of release — such as an ankle monitor or cash bond — can ensure their compliance with court

orders.

The vast majority of defendants are not held in jail.

"Most of these individuals, once they're out of jail, there is no one place they're at. So, the whole system has to get bogged down with trying to find these individuals and bring them back to court," Macias said. "And it's almost inadvertent. You just kind of run across them. Law enforcement runs across them, checks their background and sees that there was an outstanding warrant because they didn't show up in court."

Macias said that keeping these people in jail longer would positively impact the system. The jail, which Macias oversaw as county manager, could provide them with services.

"I don't think the community really understands the detention center has a full-time psychiatrist working there. It has a full-time psychiatric nurse practitioner. It has staff that is trained in mental health issues. There are medications involved," he said.

While many advocates argue that keeping people in jail hurts someone's mental health, Macias countered by saying he believes repeated arrests are worse.

Would you appear in court to personally prosecute cases? Why or why not?

Macias said he enjoys being in the courtroom and would take on some caseloads as DA. He said many district attorneys spend their day handling administrative tasks, which prevents them from prosecuting cases.

"But because of my background, I'm not going to have to spend a lot of time on the administrative issues because I know how to address them," he said.

He said it was important to be involved in every aspect and to lead by example.

How would you maintain contact with your constituents during your term?

Macias said he'd attend public meetings regularly to ensure the office's presence at community gatherings. But he also said that community engagement is inherent in the process of holding the office.

"My role has been find the opportunities that you can go out there and engage with the broader community through all its social organizations," he said.

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causes of crime.

"It just takes a person to bring everybody together. And I understand that because that is what I've been doing my entire career," Martinez said.

What role would your office play in addressing homelessness in Las Cruces?

Martinez argued that often, when community members talk about "homeless people," many are referring to people committing low-level crimes. A package taken from someone's porch or an unwanted guest in someone's business were examples she gave.

"Your first instinct, anybody's instinct, is to want to punish these people, because they did you wrong," she said.

But the problem is that these crimes – however disruptive they are to a local business – are minor crimes. They're not life sentences, Martinez said. So what should happen when they leave jail?

"What I'm telling people is we have to have the infrastructure to be able to help these people," Martinez said. "It's called wraparound services. You connect them to Social Security, you connect them to housing, you connect them to mental health services."

Jail, Martinez argued, was not the place for this help to occur, as some other candidates have argued.

"If you saw what I saw,

you would know that jail is not equipped ... to handle mental health crisis. They're not equipped to be a mental health hospital. They're jails," she said.

Martinez said creating support for people was the only solution.

"We can't lock up our problems. The 1990s already tried doing that. And look where that's gotten us," Martinez said.

Would you appear in court to personally prosecute cases? Why or why not?

Martinez said she would prosecute cases in court. Doing so would grant her valuable insight into her staff's experiences, she said.

"It can be mentally taxing on you, because of everything that you have to see," Martinez said.

Maintaining a human connection to her staff would be critical when ensuring everyone was working toward the same goal.

"I think it's extremely important for your staff and attorneys to see you willing to do the same work that they're doing, because it means to them, 'I'm valued and my boss is willing to be boots on the ground with me'," she said.

How would you maintain contact with your constituents during your term?

This was another area where Martinez said she felt she had an advantage over the other candidates. Her first job in the governor's office was as a constituent service representative, a liaison between the office and the public.

"I think that's what's shaped my vision on everything going forward, because I understand how important it is to maintain that contact with your constituents," she said.

As district attorney,
Martinez said she'd host
town halls at least twice
a year. The community
gathering would allow her
office to collect feedback
from the community. She
said she'd also block time
off for constituents to visit
the office and speak to her
about issues they deem
important. She said she'd
also ensure that her staff
would work to follow up
with people.

Lastly, Martinez said she'd attend local meetings.

"It sounds pretty simplistic, but you be present. You attend community events, you seek to maintain relationships," she said. "We have so many resources here, whether it's the domestic violence crisis center, whether it's the universities, whether it's the city or the county. It's not hard at all. You've just got to be present and wanting to do it."

health and safety of the public, interfere with pedestrian and vehicular traffic, and create a public nuisance," Story said, adding that the visible carts create warped perceptions about crime and homelessness. "They ultimately make our current problems seem much worse."

Businesses could become exempt by ensuring carts can't be removed from store grounds. Failure to comply with the ordinance could threaten the business's ability to legally operate in city limits.

The ordinance would also levy fines between \$100 and \$500 against people found using the carts. Story said a judge could order the person into mental health treatment instead of setting a fine, but could not make the crime an arrestable offense.

"If the goal was enforcement, we could do that right now," Story said. "But that's not the goal. The goal is to have a holistic approach to try to make Las Cruces better."

Council and public response

Flores, representing District 6, asked questions of Story establishing that when a municipal court fine goes unpaid, a bench warrant is issued. If someone has a bench warrant, a police officer is legally obliged to arrest that person.

Bencomo, District 4,

pointed out research that shows people who have been incarcerated are more likely to end up homeless. And, the research continues, homeless people are more likely to be incarcerated. Those two things create a negative reciprocation that over-punishes people without a place to live, she said.

Graham, District 3, said the proposal was complex. However, she said she would consider it since it was trying something new. Mattiace, District 2, described the approach as "very balanced."

Mayor Enriquez raised questions about whether there were enough drug and mental health treatment opportunities for people caught up in these law changes.

A limited public comment section then followed the presentation. Most of the commenters supported the changes. Many of the supporters were members of "Businesses for a Safer Las Cruces," an interest group comprised of business owners that sprung up following the killing of Jonah Hernandez in February.

Vic Villalobos, a business owner and organizer of Businesses for a Safer Las Cruces, said the council should support the changes because Story was supporting them.

"I believe this is about trust. I can tell you I trust Chief Story. And that's really what it comes down to," Villalobos said. Daniel Williams, a policy advocate for the New Mexico chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, said the proposed solutions were not what was needed.

"While we appreciate the chief's attempt to take a holistic approach and his comment that these ordinances are not intended to criminalize homelessness, it is our deep conviction and concern that that will be the precise effect," Williams said.

Keith Cunningham, a homeless man who said he preferred to use the last name Triantos, said he saw the issue differently from many speakers at the meeting.

"The homeless are getting a bad reputation," he said.

Triantos, who said he became homeless in 2020 when he was evicted following his mother and stepfather's deaths, said most carts are not taken from stores but found on the street. He said he feared that these changes would create more instances of police encounters that ended with a homeless person injured and arrested, something he said he has experienced and was more acute in Las Cruces compared to surrounding areas like Mesilla or Doña Ana.

When asked what he thought the council should do, Triantos said he wanted leniency regarding enforcement. He also suggested allowing people to keep their carts or for businesses to donate old carts to people in need.



Luna County deputy charged in fatal crash

A civil suit was filed last month against a Luna County Sheriff's deputy involved in the November 2023 death of 14-month-old Wyatt Franzoy of Deming.

Wyatt's parents, Isabella Hernandez and William Franzoy, filed a civil suit against Corporal Paul Garcia and the Board of County Commissioners of Luna County on April 10 for wrongful death, personal injury damages, civil ing. Hernandez was drivrights violations and loss of consortium.

Criminal charges were also filed against Garcia on April 23 with one count of homicide by vehicle and one count of great bodily injury by vehicle. Both counts are third-degree felonies and are claimed to be caused by reckless driving.

According to court documents filed in the criminal case, the crash occurred on Nov. 11, 2023 in Dem-

ing southbound on New Mexico Highway 11, also known as Columbus Road, with her son and preparing to make a left turn when Garcia and Deputy Clinton Garner, an officer in training, collided with her vehicle at 99 miles per hour in a 55-mph zone.

Records note that New Mexico State Police investigator Antoinette Calderon found there is no dash cam or body cam footage of the crash itself, for rea-

sons that remain unclear.

Garcia was reportedly attempting to pass Hernandez en route to respond first appearance in Luna to a burglary in progress. Data from Garcia's dash cam reported speeds exceeding 130 miles per hour, far above the posted speed limits.

Calderon said in the court documents that, according to the sheriff's department's policy for the operation of department vehicles, "while responding to calls by lights and sirens, deputies may not exceed 20 miles per hour over the posted speed limit."

Hernandez's vehicle was totaled and she lost consciousness. She sustained fractures to her collarbone, pelvis, rib cage and wrists as well as bleeding in her liver, nerve damage and ongoing mental fog. Wyatt was restrained in a backward-facing car seat in the backseat of the vehicle and required CPR. He was transferred to Mimbres Memorial Hospital, where he was pronounced deceased.

The cause of death was reported as blunt trauma.

Garcia will make a County Magistrate Court in Deming on May 16. It is unclear at this time whether Garcia remains on active duty with the sheriff's department. The Bulletin has reached out to Luna County Sheriff Mike

Hernandez and Franzov spoke at a press conference at their attorney's office in El Paso Wednesday, April 24, recounting what they remembered from the day of the crash. They were joined by family.

"Wyatt and I were headed home the morning of the crash," Hernandez said. "I became unconscious when he hit us. I came to at some point – in pain, crying for help because I couldn't breathe. And asking for my son where was my son? My car was in the dirt and turned in the wrong direction. I saw a group of men in front of my car pushing on the ground. It felt surreal. like a dream."


Hernandez struggled to get through her statement, holding her son's teddy

"My first and only son was taken from our familv because of a reckless and dangerous driver, only two months after his first birthday." Franzov, said. "He didn't even make it to his second Christmas. I pray that no parent ever has to know the pain of returning Christmas gifts that were never put under the Christmas tree or folding new clothes that were never worn. It's the worst feeling in the world when you hug your child for the last time and they're ice cold."

The parents are asking for a jury trial in the civil suit and that they find Garcia liable for wrongful death of their son, personal injury damages, loss of consortium and civil rights violations. They are also asking the court to find the Board of **County Commissioners** of Luna County liable for negligent hiring, training, supervision and retention of Garcia.

Garcia previously pleaded guilty to aggravated DWI, a seconddegree felony, in 2016. He received a suspended sentence and was placed under supervised probation for about 11 months. Charges of careless driving and abuse of a child in that case were dismissed by the prosecution.

No hearings have been scheduled as vet in the criminal or civil cases.



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New pantry boosts food access in Hatch

Client numbers soar after brick-and-mortar facility opens

HATCH - Situated in a desert valley next to the Rio Grande, Hatch is a hub for agriculture, especially its world-famous red and green chile. But its role in farming doesn't insulate the community from hun-

Indeed, Casa de Peregrinos emergency food pantry, the largest in Doña Ana County, had operated a mobile food pantry in the community for about a decade. This meant that, once a month, workers would show up to the parking lot of a local Catholic church with a truckload of free groceries to be distributed to residents.

But it also meant people would have to be available - not at work, school or another obligation - and able to visit the mobile site at the designated time and day. If not, they weren't able to get food assistance that month. It's a problem that's been on the mind of community leaders

and nonprofits for quite a while.

Old building becomes new pantry

Hatch Public Schools Superintendent Michael Chavez, who started his role in 2019, quickly noticed that students and families often had a lot of needs that extended beyond the classroom. He noted the area experiences high poverty.

"We always had families that seemed to be going through crisis," he said. "We started looking at some of the issues families were dealing with."

Chavez hired a districtwide social worker to help address the non-classroom support students needed. Food insecurity quickly popped up on the radar.

As the district looked into ways to help, school officials connected with the late Hatch Mayor Slim Whitlock and Casa de Peregrinos Executive Director Lorenzo Alba Jr., who also were concerned about hunger in the community and looking for ways to ad-

dress it.

Alba was already involved in supplying food to Hatch through the mobile food pantry. But Casa de Peregrinos lacked a building that could serve as a permanent hub for food storage and distribution. Raising money for, planning and building a new facility can take years – a challenge the city of Sunland Park is facing in trying to build a new pantry in southern Doña Ana

County.

However, Chavez had an idea: The school system had been trying, unsuccessfully, to sell a cinderblock building across the street from the district headquarters.

"It was an old rec room at one time," he said. "Why don't we re-purpose it? So that's what got the ball rolling."

Chavez took the idea of turning the building into a food pantry to the school

board and got approval. It's leased to Casa de Peregrinos for free, in exchange for the organization running the pantry. Doña Ana County government, meanwhile, helps pay for the food that's given out.

Alba said residents of Hatch and surrounding areas showed up to community meetings about the food pantry and filled out surveys. Among things they wanted were access to milk, eggs and produce.

"We had easily 100 to 150 people show up," he said.

Client numbers soar after pantry opens

The permanent food pantry opened its doors Jan. 12. The roughly 1,200-square-foot facility at 321 N. Main St. is open two days a week: 3 to 6 p.m. on Wednesdays and Fridays. It's open in the late afternoon to accommodate people leaving school and work.

The impact of the new pantry has been immediate, said Leticia Garcia, rural initiatives supervisor for Casa de Peregrinos.

The mobile pantry served about 85 clients per month. But in March, the new facility served 430 individuals and families.

The second number likely includes about 100 or so clients from mobile pantries in Garfield and Rincon, distribution sites that have now been consolidated to the Hatch facility. Still, the increase in clients is substantial.

"We've already closed the hunger gap quite a bit." Garcia said.

Food pantry officials expect the numbers to continue to grow. The pantry could be serving about 700 to 800 people per month by the end of the year, roughly double its initial projections, Garcia said.

Countywide, nearly 14 percent of people face food insecurity, according to Feeding America's Map the Gap hunger index. As far as the food insecurity rate in Hatch more specifically, Alba believes it's high, although likely not as high as in Sunland

Park.

Nearly 28 percent of Hatch residents live in poverty, about 10 percentage points higher than the state as a whole, according to U.S. Census Bureau numbers.

'This cart is more than \$100'

On a recent tour, food pantry personnel busily packed baskets with oranges, tortillas, milk, eggs and a variety of other groceries. Residents waited in a short line to get their allotted food.

Margarita Santoyo, a Hatch resident, said the food assistance is very helpful to her family, given the high cost of groceries nowadays. She estimates she doesn't have to buy food for about a week or so each month because of the pantry.

"I have two children, and they give us fruits, eggs, milk," she said. "This cart is more than \$100."

As for the new permanent facility, Santoyo said she thinks it's an improvement over the mobile pantry because food won't have to sit in the sun like it did in the past, when staff prepared it for distribution in a parking lot.

"When they used to be at the church, it's in the sun," she said, adding that the expanded hours are also helpful.

The old building poses some challenges. For instance, residents had to maneuver their baskets across an uneven sidewalk and some dirt to reach their cars.

Boosting capacity

Alba said renovations to the building are in the planning stages, thanks to a \$375,000 federal allocation by U.S. Rep. Gabe Vasquez and about \$175,000 in state appropriations from state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, Sen. Crystal Brantley and Rep. Tara Jaramillo. The upgrades will include HVAC, pavement and sidewalks and walk-in refrigerated storage. Alba said it was more important to open the facility as soon as possible, rather than wait for the renovations.

In Sunland Park, city and food pantry officials have argued that a lack of infrastructure is a missing link in the hunger safetynet of southern Doña Ana County. A building with

refrigerators and storage space allows food pantry operators to store food safely and manage the dayto-day operations of distributing it. It also presents a dedicated, permanent site that people can easily recognize as a go-to spot for food assistance. Plus, it allows for operating hours to be established throughout the week, as opposed to operating for a few hours once a month from a mobile pantry site. These added hours give residents flexibility to coordinate food pick-up within their own schedules.

Pantry staff say these benefits could be behind the sharp increase in clients at the new Hatch pantry. It's growing evidence that infrastructure, as boring as it might sound to some, makes a real difference.

"We can now tell people: 'Look what happens when you have a brick-and-mortar facility," Alba said.

Internationally, infrastructure is a recognized component of reducing food insecurity and hunger, especially in developing nations and regions. At issue is that food, of course, is perishable, and even non-perishable items have a shelf life. Storage facilities, including cold storage, play a key role in reducing food loss and waste and boosting access, especially in rural areas, according to the International Institute for Sustainable Development.

In Las Cruces, about a 45-minute drive south of Hatch, Casa de Peregrinos celebrated the opening of a new, 13,000-square-foot storage and distribution facility last August. Alba said that facility is already adding to the food storage capacity of the county because it serves as a hub for distributing to smaller towns, like Hatch.

'This is even better than what I envisioned

In Hatch, a collaborative effort among the village, a key nonprofit and the local school district also was a driving factor to improving food access for local residents. And it's been supported by funding from county, state and federal sources. Down the street, the school district has also launched a clothing closet where families can go to

get free clothes.

Chavez said the food pantry is part of an attempt to meet "the most basic needs for our kids so they can go to school and learn."

"We're trying to remove barriers to learning for kids," he said, during an interview at the new pantry. "We're really excited about what the future holds. This is even better than what I envisioned."

Chavez and Alba both acknowledged Whitlock, the former village mayor who died suddenly in March. He was passionate about helping residents in the community, including by supporting the new pantry.

"His passing – it's created a big void," Chavez said. "I'm hoping we can continue his legacy. That's something I can aspire to."

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LCPD looking for man in fatal shooting

The Las Cruces Police Department asked for the public's aid in finding a man they suspect killed another man near Princess Jeanne Drive on April 29.

Steven Sanchez, 34, died in a shooting on the 1900 block of Princess Jeanne Drive around 3:30 a.m. Police confirmed in a news release on April 30 that Sanchez was found dead when police arrived. In the same news release, police said Isaiah Joseph Rea, 25, was wanted for the killing

"Rea is believed to still be armed with a firearm

and should be considered dangerous," police said.

Court records show that Rea has been charged with first-degree murder and that a warrant for his arrest has been issued.

"Anyone with information on the whereabouts of Isaiah Joseph Rea is asked to immediately call police at 575-526-0795. Anyone who knowingly harbors a wanted person can also be charged with a felony," police said.

According to an affidavit, police believe that Rea and Sanchez knew each other before the shooting. The two men, along with two different people, were together in a house the morning of the shooting, police believe.

Multiple witnesses told police they heard Rea say something to the effect of "I thought he wanted me to do it," with "he" referring to another man in the group. One witness said the man refuted that.

There are no fees to participate though some restrictions apply.



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National prayer day tugs at our sleeve

When President Joe Biden signed the proclamation marking the first Thursday of May as our national day of prayer, know that it was not for tradition and had nothing to do with his own Catholic faith: It is a legal requirement, mandated by Congress since 1952, that the president formally proclaim a day "on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer and meditation at churches, in groups, and as individuals."

It is, undeniably, a religious law, however minor. It has been challenged in court, to little effect, because small civic observances of theism

are considered ceremonial and anodyne by courts. Our Constitution may forbid religious tests as a qualification for office, but few elected leaders will question references to

religion in public settings. lest they be punished by voters.

For someone who practices a non-theistic, minority religion (me) or those with no religious

practice whatsoever, these are small tugs at one's sleeve, easy to ig-

> nore politely – vet tugs at the sleeve they are.

It is a demonstration of cultural power that questioning the ubiquity of references to a literal god, the invitations to

acknowledge Him out loud, is more likely to be considered rude or controversial than the solicitations themselves. Yet it is also a demonstration of the power of perspective,

as it is likely those raised Christian in America are not disposed to notice these references in the same way a Buddhist, Hindu or contentedly secular person does.

The way I have explained this to members of my extended family who are devout Christians is to imagine they were attending a public ceremony, town council meeting or something similar. They are handed a book with syllables written on it and asked to recite a few lines of the Heart Sutra, or invited to recite a pledge that

included a petition to Quanyin (which might, in fact, violate their own religion's rules).

Some laugh and say they would go along to get along, and I believe them; but that isn't my point. It would make me uncomfortable. I don't wish to tug on their sleeve.



FTC ruling gives workers freedom

Here's to the deep state - or what we used to refer to as the federal government.

With little fanfare, the Federal Trade Commission has leveled the playing field for millions of workers.

The FTC freed an estimated 30 million employees who are now bound to their current employers through non-compete clauses. On a 3-2 vote, the commission found that the clauses are an unfair method of competition and therefore a violation of Section 5 of the FTC Act, which prohibits "unfair or deceptive acts or practices in or affecting commerce."

There's an exemption for senior executives in

policy-making positions earning more than \$151,164 a year, but those represent fewer than 1 percent of all workers now bound by a noncompete clause.

and will phase out once current employees leave their jobs.

In a press release announcing the rule change, the FTC notes that employees with inside knowledge of company secrets are already bound by trade secret laws and non-disclosure agreements. And they repreworkers now under noncompete clauses.

> The FTC argues the noncompete clauses are not only bad for workers, who are forced to stay in jobs they don't want or risk costly litigation.

they also stifle competition and inhibit the creation of new businesses, leading to increased market concentration and, ultimately, higher prices for consumers.

"The FTC's final rule that bans non-competes will ensure Americans have the freedom to pursue a new job, start a new

sent a small fraction of all business or bring a new idea to market," FTC Chair Lina M. Khan said in a prepared statement.

> According to a 2019 report by the Economic Policy Institute, a national survey of privatesector businesses showed that 49.4 percent had at least some employees who were subject to noncompete clauses and 31.8 percent said all employees were required to enter into the agreement.

That number had grown significantly since their previous survey in 2014. The survey also found that non-compete clauses were not restricted to white-collar workers.

The U.S. Chamber of Commerce has filed a lawsuit attempting to prevent the FTC ban from taking effect. A federal court in the buzzing financial hub of Tyler, Texas will be first to hear the case.

They argue that it should be up to Congress to impose a rule change so vast and impacting so many businesses and their workers. And on that point, they're not wrong. Anything done by rulemaking in this administration can be undone by rulemaking in the next administration.

This absolutely should be taken up by Congress.

A sober anniversary in campus protest

On May 4, 1970, I watched as soldiers of the Ohio National Guard, which had occupied the campus of Kent State University, fired 67 rounds into a group of unarmed, peacefully protesting students, killing four and wounding nine.

More than 3.000 students had gathered on the grassy commons in the center of campus to call for an end to the invasion of Cambodia announced on April 30 by President Richard Nixon, and in overall opposition to the war in Vietnam. Students gathered in downtown Kent had been attacked by police with tear gas on the night of May 1; a large march of students on May 2 ended with the burning of the ROTC building on campus, long viewed as a symbol of the military presence on campus; and on May 3 National Guard troops had bayoneted

several students while dispersing a peaceful march. The soldiers who shot 13 students on Monday May 4 were on top of a ridge that runs across part of the campus, and fired down into a group of students in a parking lot more than half a football field away. No one from the National Guard or the government of Ohio was ever held legally responsible for the killing and wounding of these students.

Today, 54 years later, we are seeing images of police, often with clearly excessive force, arresting students peaceably assembling on campuses around the country to protest American support for the destructive war being waged by Israel against the Palestinian people in Gaza and the occupied territories. Some members of Congress have called for sending National Guard forces onto campuses to repress

student activism. This is a sad reminder that the problems of war, racism and other injustices, which students and many other ordinary people rose up against in the late 1960s and early '70s, remain with us today. The American government could end the killing in Gaza tomorrow if it simply cut off all funding to Israel and the IDF, but the Biden administration and both parties in Congress instead are pumping more and more of our tax dollars into the genocide. This must stop.

Young people setting up tents on their college campuses are taking action to bring these issues to the foreground of public awareness. They should be honored and praised, not beaten and arrested.

Environmental activist comes to town playing his tunes

When Bill Oliver was a kid, he couldn't decide between Smokev Bear and Chuck Berry so instead of trying to choose, he just did a little of both.

"They were my heroes early on," he said. "Still are."

Bill Oliver is on his "Never Say You're from Texas" tour of New Mexico and Arizona and will be passing through Las Cruces. stopping to perform at 6 p.m. on Wednesday, May 8 at Downtown Blues Coffee.

Oliver is an environmental activist musician who has come down the years, most recently with the Otter Space Band. He has shared rallies, campfires and concerts with the likes of Katie Lee. David Brower and Ed Abbev.

"As the musician part me developed, I got to play songs and be around folks in biology, naturalists and park rangers quite a bit."

He went to community college in biology for years as he "stretched out" his GI bill. You could catch him writing songs in the margins of field biology notes.

"I got activated," he said. "I've always been kind of in the Woody Guthrie, Pete Seeger school of folk music and I got into the east Texas wilderness and forest issues. We were trying to save mixed forests, wildernesses from overzealous forest service policies of the 70s and 80s back where we are taking so many wonderful forests out of action."

Oliver and whoever he was working with at the time were able to earn a living playing their music for schools and parks, keeping topics neutral enough for the audience.

"I'm playing a lot of solid waste songs and recycling and general natural appreciation songs which paid the bills," he said. "So we played protest songs by night and the schools by the day. Our day job supported the activism."

They supported groups that were trying hard to fight through the court system and street theater and lots of other ways, demonstrations.

have a good time at campfires and keep some kind of levity going," Oliver said.

For the past several years, Oli-

ver's Otter Space Band has been active. Coming to Las Cruces, it will be his sweetie, Virginia Palmer, who "brings a lot of energy and fun to it - singing and playing with tambourines and percussion."


Palmer, too, has been an activist for most of her life, he said, in Texas and in California. She does a lot of organizing and helping with the band.



Al Pacino



A: Not as of the time this column was written, but the Academy Award and Primetime Emmy winner certainly has made his mark in projects for the home screen. Seen on the most recent Oscar telecast presenting the honor for best picture at the end of the ceremony, Pacino had his earliest known role on film in a 1968 episode of the ABC police drama "N.Y.P.D.," a series on which many New York-based performers found work in the course of establishing their careers.

It was a long time after that until Pacino did TV projects again, since his 1972 success in "The Godfather" set him on a course of work that kept him in feature films and theater. It was the HBO version of an iconic play that brought Pacino back to the home screen, as he played attorney Roy Cohn in the Mike Nichols-directed 2003 film of "Angels in America." His Emmy win for that performance was part of a huge victory for the piece at those awards, which also honored the acting of Meryl Streep, Jeffrey Wright and Mary-Louise Parker in it.

Next, Pacino returned to HBO as controversial pathologist Jack Kevorkian in director Barry Levinson's 2010 film "You Don't Know Jack," earning his second Emmy for his acting. He was back on HBO in 2013 in the title role of "Phil Spector," writer-director David Mamet's 2013 profile of the polarizing music-industry figure, for which Pacino picked up his third Emmy.
In 2018, Pacino visited HBO again by reuniting with director Levinson for "Paterno," about former Penn State football coach Joe Paterno

and a scandal that ultimately cost him his career at the school. Most recently in TV-oriented terms, Pacino starred in the 2020-23 Prime Video series "Hunters," playing a disguised-through-surgery Nazi who led a group of Nazi hunters decades after World War II.

observes May the Fourth with a double-header from the Skywalker saga.



Prevent fraud by knowing exactly how to spot it before it happens! If an offer looks too good to be true — quick, easy money offers, unsolicited job offers on social media, impersonators requesting a money transfer, or voice calls and text messages asking for login credentials — it's probably a scam. Follow these simple steps to stay safe from fraud.

HOW TO PREVENT FRAUD

1. Stop and analyze the situation

Is the seller, company, charity, organization or person credible? Contact the local or state consumer agencies to verify the legitimacy of the company. Verify the phone number on the company's website or the person's identity before giving out any of your personal information or clicking any links.

2. Never give out your personal information

Scammers can email or call asking you to verify your personal information. Do NOT give them any information, including one-time passcodes. Most reputable companies will not initiate contact to ask for your information.

3. Contact your financial institution immediately

If you've given out your personal information or a one-time passcode, time is of the essence. The sooner you contact your financial institution, the better.

How is it that the fifth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars got its name? One common explanation is May was named for Maia, a goddess of growth and springtime, and the mother of Hermes (or Mercury).

In the tradition of birth stones, for May it is the emerald, as a symbol of renewal or rebirth, youth or fortune (the latter, at least, for those who sell emeralds).

May 3 is also observed as Roodmas, a traditional feast day commemorating St. Helena's discovery of the true cross in Christian tradition. Record settlement reached in gas flare case

A state agency reached a settlement agreement with an oil and gas company as New Mexico continues to crack down on air pollution from that sector.

The New Mexico Environment Department announced the \$24.5 million settlement with Ameredev II, LLC on Monday. This is the largest settlement that NMED has ever reached for violations of regulations governing oil and gas and the majority of that money will go to the state's general fund.

The state alleges that Ameredev flared off natural gas at five facilities between October 2018 and April 2020 because it did not have the ability to transport that gas to downstream processing facilities.

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham praised the settlement as holding bad actors accountable for emissions. The governor, who has tried to present herself as a leader in addressing climate change, vowed to address emission from the oil and gas industry in 2019 after taking office.

"This settlement makes one thing crystal clear - companies that pollute our air will pay for circumventing New Mexico's rules," Lujan Grisham said in a press release. "Today's settle-

ment is about penalizing the bad actors in an effort to protect communities from breathing harmful pollution."

A company spokesman said that Ameredev is taking the issue seriously and has not had any excess flaring-related emissions over the last four years. This is in part because of Ameredev's significant and

ongoing investments in advanced technologies and operational enhancements, he said.

"We are pleased to resolve this legacy issue, and look forward to continuing to responsibly work with the State of New Mexico and regional stakeholders to support the state's economic development as well as American energy security," Ameredev said in the statement emailed to NM Political Report.

While the settlement is the largest that NMED has reached for oil and gas emissions violations. it is much less than the company could have paid had it not agreed to the settlement and taken actions to address the pollution. NMED's Environmental Protection Division fined Ameredev \$40.3 million through an administrative compliance order in June.

"Let this serve as a wake-up call to the oil and gas industry - the

ment is using remote sensing technology, on-the-ground inspections, and responding to citizen complaints," Environment Department Cabinet Secretary James Kenney said in a press release. "The only option to avoid enforcement is to comply with state rules and permits."

NMED's inspection of Ameredev facilities in 2019 came after Lea County residents who were concerned about the flaring contacted the state agency.

During a year and a half of operations, Ameredev allegedly flared off more than 3.2 million thousand cubic feet of natural gas. That gas released emissions equivalent to heating 16.640 homes for an entire year. In addition, the flaring also resulted in more than 7.6 million pounds of excess hydrogen sulfide, sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide and volatile organic compounds being released into the atmo-

able for failing to follow the terms of their permit and improperly releasing a substantial amount of natural gas into the environment," General Counsel Zachary Ogaz said in a press release. "We will continue to strictly enforce NMED permits and New Mexico air regulations and show companies that cutting corners and violating the law won't save you any money in the long run."

Nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compounds react with sunlight to form ozone, or smog, which can lead to unhealthy air quality. Areas of New Mexico where oil and gas production is common tend to have higher levels of ozone and some of them are facing what is known as noncompliance. Noncompliance occurs when ozone levels exceed federal air quality standards. This can lead to sanctions from the federal government, including loss of funding for transportation projects.

NMED states that the pollutants can also lead to impaired cognition and convulsions among those exposed and also contributing to climate change.

Prior to NMED issuing the administrative compliance order. Ameredev hired a third-party contractor to review how the company was complying with state requirements. The company also provided those results to NMED's Air Quality Bureau.

According to NMED, Ameredev is now in compliance with the state rules and regulations.

As part of the settlement agreement, the company will hire a third-party contractor to perform an independent audit of its operations

at all of the facilities it operates or owns in the state. It will also submit monthly reports that include calculations of actual emissions rates from facilities in New Mexico.

It will also propose a mitigation project that NMED may approve that will lead to weekly optical gas imaging inspections at facilities or the implementation of leak and repair monitoring technology.

Finally, Ameredev agreed to remove equipment from the Azalea Central Tank Battery.

The settlement comes amid a crackdown on pollution that has led to various agreements, including settlements with Apache Corporation, Matador Production Company and Mewborne Oil Company. The settle-

ments stem from alleged emissions that occurred prior to the ozone precursor rule that went into effect in 2022.

Should Ameredev fail to fulfill its obligations under the settlement agreement, the company could face fines of \$2,000 per day.

"I am grateful to our dedicated and hardworking compliance and enforcement staff who worked diligently to bring this case to fruition," NMED Compliance and Enforcement Section Chief Cindy Hollenberg said in a press release. "The Air Quality Bureau is committed to deterring noncompliance such as this and leveling the playing field for those companies that prioritize protecting the environment."



1 dead, 14 injured in crash at Savers

Shortly before 10 a.m. Tuesday, Las Cruces police and EMTs responded to the Savers thrift store at 2340 N. Main Street after an SUV reportedly crashed through the front glass wall near the entrance and injured 13 customers and two employees.

Authorities reported that a 2015 Ford Explorer crashed through the façade close to self-checkout stations, veering right as it passed through the store and came to rest near the southeast corner. The driver and sole occupant of the vehicle was an unidentified 69-year-old woman who transported herself to a local hospital.

The incident took place on "Senior Tuesday," when shoppers age 55 and over are eligible for a discount.

In the afternoon, police said Pamela Kaye Nelson, 67, died of her injuries, while 10 had been trasported to area medical facilities while five others, who were assessed at the scene, declined transportation to hospitals. The injured ranged in age from approximately 30 to 90, police said.

According to a news release, the investigation initially shows that the driver mistakenly pressed on the accelerator instead of the brake while pulling into a parking space in front of the store, jumping the curb and crashing into the building.

The Las Cruces Fire Department was assisted by Doña Ana County Fire Rescue, the Mesilla Fire Department and American Medical Response, who treated people at the location and assisted with transportation to MountainView Regional Medical Center, Memorial Medical Center, Three Crosses Regional Hospital and the Mountain-View Emergency Center.

The New Mexico Department of Transportation
Traffic Safety Division and
Safer New Mexico Now are
jointly hosting an in-person
car seat fitting station from
3 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Thursday,
May 2, at the Sisbarro BuickGMC dealer, 425 West Boutz
Road in Las Cruces.

The free educational event offers instruction for parents and caregivers on the proper selection, installation and use of car seats by nationally certified child passenger safety technicians.

The technicians will spend approximately 30 minutes per seat educating parents and caregivers on the proper selection, installation and use of their car and booster seats. Parents and caregivers will also learn important information regarding common errors in car seat safety

and be able to ask questions. If a technician finds that a car seat has been recalled, is out of date or is otherwise unsafe, replacement seats will be available. A \$35 replacement fee may apply.

To participate in the car seat inspection clinic, the department said in a news release that parents and caregivers should bring their car seat, car seat manual, vehicle manual. The child should also be present, if possible. The child must be present for a seat replacement, according to a news release. Car seat inspections are on a first-come-first-served basis and appointments are not necessary.

Car seat inspection clinics are a free public service funded by the NMDOT Traffic Safety Division and are available to everyone. More information is available at 800-231-6145 or 505-856-6143.

Coach Trujillo takes over Mayfield basketball program

Perennial basketball coach Ben Trujillo was named the new head coach of the Mayfield Boys Basketball program after spending 11 seasons at Hatch Valley High School as the girls' basketball head coach.

Trujillo takes over the historic array after previous head coach Keith Roberts stepped down at the end of the 2023-24 season. He will be Mayfield's fifth head basketball coach since 2014 – the previous coaches being Roberts,

Juan Rocky Gonzales, Brad Bailey and William Kevs.

With Mayfield looking for some consistency, Trujillo said he's in it for the long haul but knows that type of journey only comes with success.

"I have no plans of doing anything else," Trujillo said. "My plan is to be here as long as they'll have me and I think, if we can start winning, they'll have me."

The man at the helm said leaving Hatch was a tough decision – his late wife, former Las Cruces Public Schools Superin-

tendent Karen Trujillo, used to announce games and give tremendous support while her husband coached the Bears. Truiillo said he was ready for a change, even making the hard choice of deciding not to coach at all before the Trojans' head coach position opened up.

"I originally said 'No, I'm not going to do it,' and I missed the deadline and then they reopened it and I was like 'You know what, that's a sign', somehow God got that in front of me." Trujillo said.

The Trojans' boys' team hasn't had a winning sea-

son since the Covid-19 season of 2020-21 where they went 7-5. Before that, they hadn't been above .500 since the 2013-14 season, finishing the year at 16-12 and were then coached by Tommy Morrow.

Trujillo has 37 years of being a basketball coach under his belt. He started coaching right out of high school at the age of 18, starting at Cobre High School as an assistant coach. Since then, he's left his mark at various programs in New Mexico. both girls' and boys' teams. totaling 17 years as a head coach and the rest of the 37 years as an assistant.

In his 17 years of being a head coach, Trujillo has only missed the state playoffs three times:

"My first year and then the last two at Hatch, where we were super young," Trujillo said.

All of that experience

amounts to 267 wins as a head coach, with Truillo aiming to get his 300th win during his time at Mavfield.

In terms of X's and O's, Trujillo wants his team's offense to run the "Lovola Marymount Break," a fast-paced type of offense where players push the ball and take quick openlook shots. On the defensive side. Truiillo's teams run a base defense of a one-three-one zone. He said they will adjust their defense to whoever they play, but for the most part they will be in that zone defense.

"Overall number one, we've got to be solid defensively, we don't want to give up easy baskets," Trujillo said. "Secondly, I think my teams over the years have shot the ball really, really well. I think you'll see a lot of three-pointers. It should

be a fun, exciting style of basketball."

Mayfield is ready for the Trojan winning tradition to return. Trujillo believes he will bring that tradition back in due time but said it's not about him, it's about the student athletes' iourney — wanting to help them have fun and have a special joy for the game while developing life skills that will help outside of the basketball world.

"I say this to my players all the time: If somebody walks into the gym in the fourth quarter and it's a 20-point spread in the game, they should not be able to tell by looking at you whether you're up or down," Trujillo said. "I think that's a great life skill too ... stuff happens in life, but if you let it get vou down — the cool thing is we get to control our emotions."

Trujillo is still planning out his staff, with one assistant coach from last season staying on board. He said his full staff most likely will not be filled up until the beginning of the next school year.

Trujillo has a tough job on his hands, with District 3-5A being highly competitive, including teams like Las Cruces, Organ Mountain and Alamogordo.

"I hope they (the community) ... come out and support the kids. We're going to compete," Trujillo said.



Recreational golf grows during 'vibecession'

Men's professional golf is broken. It's difficult to foresee a cure on the horizon anytime soon.

Even though the PGA
Tour locked up a \$3 billion
infusion of capital from
Strategic Sports Group,
a private equity fund, the
negotiations between the
Tour and the Saudi Public
Investment Fund remain
ongoing. Meanwhile the
LIV tour keeps shoveling
money into its 54-hole exhibition type tournaments.
LIV is hurting, not growing, the game.

As a disturbing example of how broken men's pro golf really is, the Masters' TV ratings just a few weeks ago took a plunge to the third lowest in their history. "Golf simply isn't

an overly compelling TV product right now," says

James Cogan of
Golf.com. There are
too few stars capturing eyeballs, too
many controversies
and viewer fatigue,
Colgan notes. More
and more people
are streaming and
watching away
from home, which
can negatively skew the
ratings. Still, "without TV

the time that the pandemic took hold and people began

working from home. Ben Cohen of the Wall Street Journal notes that the pandemic was "the best thing for golf since Tiger himself." The uptick in golf includes young golfers, people of color

and mostly women golfers. And it includes more ways to play golf, like "screen golf" and Topgolf. America has more off-course golfers than on-course golfers. Imagine that!

The National Golf Foundation, the industry group that keeps stats on golf as a whole, recently released figures for 2023 in which

123 million Americans consumed golf in some fashion last year, a jump that is up 14 percent over the past five years. Surveys of "core" golfers, who play eight or more rounds per year, indicate that 95 percent say they intend to play about the same or more in 2024, while 40 percent say they expect to play "more or much more" in the current year. The NGF reports that "the sentiment to play more is even higher among core female golfers than it is among their male counterparts. Further, the total U.S. on-course (greengrass) golfers, age 6 and up, increased from 25.6 million in 2022 to 26.6 in 2023, a growth of 1 million or 4

percent, which is the larg-

est single-year jump since 2001, when Tiger Woods' succession of championships spurred interest, reports the Wall Street Journal.

Back to professional golf: Who could not be overwhelmed by Nelly Korda winning five LPGA tournaments in a row and Scottie Scheffler winning four out of five PGA Tour tournaments in the last two months? It seems today's viewers must need more exhilaration, excitement and winning wagers to get more interested in the phenomenal golf now being played on both tours.

The National Golf Course Owners Association, in partnership with the Sports and Leisure

Research Group, publishes a "Golf Business Pulse" report. The 2024 annual report cited a "bullish environment" for golf and other discretionary leisure categories. However, there is overall "high concern about inflation," with consumer outlook remaining negative, but consumer behavior doesn't reflect that. Hence, we find a new emerging description for discretionary leisure purchases like golf: "vibecession." Despite prices still rising, the demand for heightened golf experiences is expected to grow even more. As the view of golf expands for a more welcoming game, we will see significant growth in golf participation.
