‘The food comes from the earth’

The drums are first — thump thump-thump thump! — as members of Tortugas Pueblo lead the 24th annual Blessing of the Fields at New Mexico Farm and Ranch Heritage Museum on May 17.

The voices of the pueblo join their drums with resonant sing-chanting. The sound of many feet moving out onto the bridge to cross to the animal enclosures follows. People are chatting as they walk, children are laughing. Birds talk back from the arroyo under the bridge.

The voice of Bishop Peter Baldacchino of the Diocese of Las Cruces can be heard telling the Las Cruces Catholic School students accompanying him, “If somebody feels a little bit weak, look for shade. Ask for water before you get dizzy.”

The drums get a little more distant, then stop

for a minute as Baldacchino pauses to talk about San Isidro Labrador, also known as San Ysidro, and his wife, Maria Torribia (known as Santa Maria de la Cabeza), who were farm workers known for their piety toward the poor and

animals. “God loves them as he loves each and every one of us and they loved the land they worked on and loved the animals that were part of the land, so let us pray,” the bishop intones. “Help us to love

and care for all you have created.” We follow this procession, which includes a wooden statue of San Ysidro, around the grounds of the museum as Baldacchino pauses at various pens to bless the

different animals there, the cows and bulls, the sheep, horses and burros.

The first communion girls in their white dresses and the first communion boys, who accompany the girls holding umbrellas against the sun over them, are closest to the bishop as he sprinkles holy water at the animals and sometimes, to their delight, over the children.

They arrive at the head of a field, where a ditch full of water awaits release to signify the beginning of the growing season. The girls line both sides of the water entryway and the bishop blesses the water. He touches the cool wave as it releases, still mumbling the blessing and the girls toss rose petals into the water as it moves to spread across the field.

Fourth grader Marcelle Chiffolleau tells me, “Blessing the fields helps the cows and helps crops

In accordance with NMSA §7-38-60, notice is hereby given that delinquent property tax notices have been mailed out to accounts with unpaid balances. The 2023 Property Taxes become delinquent after May 10, 2024, and have now accrued penalty and interest. Accounts that are delinquent for more than two years shall be transferred to the state's Property Tax Division on July 1, 2024, where the account will accrue an additional fee of \$125 and may be subject to public auction.

According to State Statute §7-38-53 NMSA 1978, a County Treasurer may collect delinquent property taxes by asserting a claim against the owner's personal property for which taxes are delinquent and an additional \$25 fee may be assessed. The property may be seized for auction.

UNM approves land acquisition for Las Cruces reproductive health center

Thursday, the University of New Mexico Board of Regents approved a land acquisition for a full-spectrum reproductive healthcare center, that will include abortion care, in Doña Ana County.

The UNM Board of Regents voted 6-1 to move forward with the purchase of land, according to a news release. Charlene Bencomo, executive director of Bold Futures, told NM Political Report that the goal is to have the reproductive center open to see patients by October 2025.

The project is called the Reproductive Healthcare Success Project. Bencomo said the \$10 million allocated by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, which was approved by the 2023 legislature despite an effort to block it by Republicans, is the money UNM is using to acquire the land. That money will also be used to construct the building, she said.

Bencomo said the four organizations collaborating on the creation of the center are Bold Futures, UNM Health Sciences Center, Strong Families and Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains. She said the four groups are still working out who will run the center but she said it is a full partnership among the four.

She said the group is also in discussion with the New Mexico Doula Association.

Bencomo said the center will provide a full spectrum of reproductive healthcare and that will include both abortion and gender-affirm-

ing care. She said due to the center's location, it will likely attract patients coming from out-of-state and more rural areas of southern New Mexico as well as residents of Las Cruces.

The center is a part of the changing landscape of reproductive care in Las Cruces and New Mexico in general. Since the U.S. Supreme Court's Dobbs decision in 2022 that overturned Roe v. Wade, more abortion clinics have relocated to New Mexico and new clinics have opened in both Albuquerque and in Las Cruces. In addition, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains expanded its abortion care in the state to include medication abortion in its Farmington clinic and the organization opened a brick-and-mortar clinic in Las Cruces last year.

Bencomo said the RHSP clinic has been needed in southern New Mexico for a long time. She said the way the center will deliver care will be a holistic approach focused on good outcomes for both patients and providers.

An example of that is having doula care available for patients in the future clinic. Bencomo said doulas can assist with more than birthing. They can provide assistance in explaining medical information to patients, which frees time for the provider to see another patient but allows the patients to get the information they need about their care.

Doulas can also bridge language barriers, Bencomo said.

Bencomo said the proj-

ect has taken time to move forward because the collaborators have involved community members and have been "truly listening." She said it has been important to involve community members who will be the most impacted by the decisions the group is making.

Bencomo said the group has not picked a specific location yet but that they are looking for one that will be accessible by public transportation. Security will be considered.

University of New Mexico OB-GYN Department Chair Eve Espey said through the release that the department is excited to be a part of the project.

"We are dedicated to reducing health inequities across our state," she said through the release.

PPRM said through a statement that they are "honored" to also be participating in the project.

"We take our responsibility to steward these funds seriously, knowing that high levels of transparency and collaboration often result in longer timeframes. We prioritize these values over moving too quickly through this one-of-a-kind community-led endeavor," Adrienne Manzanares, president and chief executive officer of PPRM, said through the release.

Marshall Martinez, executive director of Equality New Mexico, told NM Political Report that having a full-spectrum reproductive center in Las Cruces that will include both abortion

Angelica Rubio makes the case to stay District 35 rep

Angelica Rubio is looking to remain the state representative for District 35. First elected in 2016, she is seeking her fifth two-year term in the state House of Representatives. To do that, she'll have to fend off a single challenger in the Democratic primary. There is no Republican candidate for the seat.

Gabriel Duran, who ran for Las Cruces City Council in 2023, is challenging Rubio for the Democratic nomination.

The Bulletin requested Duran and Rubio respond to questions generated by its readers. Only Rubio responded by the given deadline. Duran said he would supply the Bulletin with the questions before the print deadline, but did not.

Due to limited space, Rubio's responses have been abbreviated in our print edition, but appear in full at LasCrucesBulletin.com.

Oil and gas made up more than half of the state's revenue for the first time in New Mexico's history. This is unsustainable. How should the state move past this?

Since my election in 2016, my main priority has been to work not only to address climate justice but also to center frontline communities directly impacted by the fossil fuels

industry. With New Mexico relying so heavily on fossil fuels for its revenue – almost 50 percent – the same can be said about our communities across the state who have only known this work, and one that provides so much for their livelihood 100 percent of the time, directly and/or indirectly. Most frontline communities believe that the climate is in crisis, but they're just trying to survive another day.

Despite the challenges of imagination in the New Mexico Legislature, little by little, policy by policy, we're making some headway. While we have the answers to transition thoughtfully, the industry has an incredible stronghold and influence on the elected officials across the state – not by one party over another (both Republicans and Democrats are heavily influenced by the industry), making it so hard. But when we center frontline communities, and not industry, we have the tools to do it.

Oil and gas are also major sources of pollution. As New Mexico residents grapple with the effects of climate change – i.e., more wildfires, water shortages, heat waves and crop failure – what role should the legislature play in mitigating these effects?

As mentioned above, we need a multi-faceted approach that combines revenue diversification,

regulatory measures, community engagement and resilience-building efforts; the legislature can play a significant role in mitigating the effects of climate change while transitioning away from fossil fuels. If we prioritize the principles of community ownership, restoration and conservation, circular economy practices, environmental justice and education and awareness, this can make a difference.

Our readers lamented the lack of access to doctors and health care. What will you do to increase access to health care?

First and foremost, I believe that health care should not be something that people have to pay for or that any institution should be profiting from those who are sick. Puncto. The older I get, and the quicker my body is changing (and having just accessed health care myself for the first time in over 10 years through my new job), I still can't fathom how this is still a debate in this country. However, because things in government work slowly, I think New Mexico has a prime opportunity to do things differently and could be a leader for the rest of the country.

Like the climate crisis, we have to work on this issue in a multi-faceted way – and with a tremendous amount of up-front investments. First and

foremost, we must center cultural competency in this work. New Mexico has a diverse and beautiful constituency, and so we have to be sensitive to our culture, make language accessibility a priority and ensure that health education is adequate for communities. Secondly, we must stop saying that we're the poorest state and instead change this narrative to say that we have the resources to invest in our communities; we're just choosing not to. This

is one of those areas. Because the fossil fuel industry is so volatile, this is why we have so many living in poverty: Folks can't catch up. So, in the case of health care, we need to make that up-front investment to also expand Medicaid eligibility to cover more low-income individuals and families. This could significantly increase access to health care services for those who currently can't afford it.

What steps, if any, would you take in the

legislature to increase access to abortion?

I have and will always protect the right, and equitable and just access to an abortion for anyone with a uterus. I have demonstrated that in my votes time and time again since my start in the legislature eight years ago. From here on out, though, there is so much left to do to protect people's rights due to what is happening at the national level. I am honored that New Mexico has become a sanctuary for nearby states who have traveled to or relocated to not only attain abortion access and healthcare but also that they've come searching for gender-affirming healthcare. I will continue to work on initiatives to expand these services and ensure that all providers can operate without restrictions or regulations that are absurdly unnecessary.

I support the opening of new clinics and ensuring that existing clinics have the resources they need to provide comprehensive care. I want to continue to take steps to protect abortion clinics and providers from harassment and violence and will work with my colleagues to strengthen protections for clinics and providers and work to counter anti-abortion rhetoric and stigma. If a person needs abortion care, I want to make sure that they can attain that

care immediately. I oppose waiting periods, mandatory counseling requirements, and/or restrictions on insurance coverage for abortion services.

What steps would you take to protect democracy amid threats to public officials and attempts at undermining elections in the U.S.?

Since my election in 2016, I have worked to protect democracy in all possible ways through legislative policy. While we have made some significant updates to our election code over the last few years, more needs to be done, and I'm committed to being a part of that. First, I support measures

that ensure the integrity of elections, whether we're talking about the implementation of paper ballots, robust cybersecurity protocols and transparent auditing processes.

Furthermore, and more importantly, my commitment to combating misinformation is critical—and I support initiatives that promote media literacy and fact-checking. I 100-percent support policies that expand voting access, such as automatic voter registration, early voting options and many of the other ideas that are being considered in this expansion. Anything that works to suppress voters, I will always oppose.

Various groups have pointed to different "flaws" in the legal

system. Some have suggested that bail reform should be tweaked or removed. Others have pointed to challenges around competency. Others have said that more focus on poverty alleviation is needed to reduce crime. Where would the legislature's time be best spent to address crime in New Mexico? And what changes are you in favor of seeing?

This is a multi-faceted answer, but unfortunately the current political narrative does not allow for us to have this conversation because what people are experiencing day-to-day has heightened our inability to have this conversation and dialogue around more sustainable solutions.

What is being consid-

ered today are short-term band-aids that will not solve our problems in the long term. With that said, I will continue and always advocate for policies that prioritize redemptive over punitive measures. I will only support funding opportunities for community-based crime prevention programs, and major investments to support efforts to address underlying social and economic factors contributing to the increase in crime.

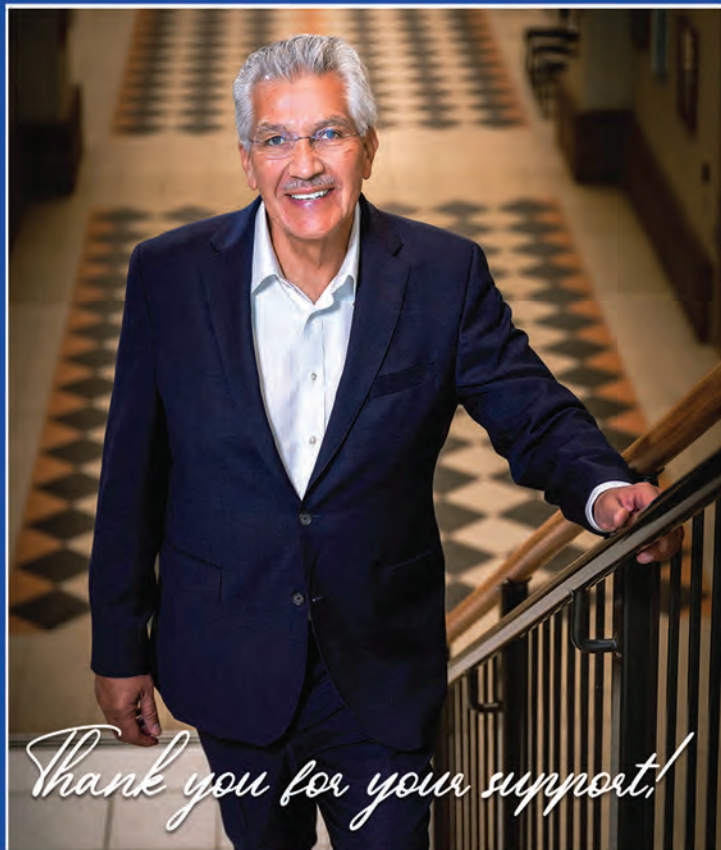
I have and will always stand by restorative justice as we head to a special session in July (to consider) legislation related to incarcerating those deemed incompetent and individual(s) who are panhandling and increasing penalties for felons with guns. I will not support it.

How do you intend to maintain contact with constituents during your term?

Since my election in 2016, I've done my very best to stay in communication with my constituents. Whether it was daily video updates shared on my YouTube channel, which was linked to all of my social media platforms from the legislative sessions to sharing details on Twitter, to a newsletter that I would send as often as I could, including a yearly letter I mail out, to hosting Spill the Beans w/ Rep. Rubio at local coffee shops. Sadly, the response from the community was low in comparison to the amount of work it was taking me to do—especially as someone who is

a volunteer legislator.

Over the course of the last few months, I've lessened that connection due to time. The bottom line is that most of our constituents, not just here locally but nationally, do not know who their state legislators are, or the importance that they make in their everyday life—but that's not their fault. The fault lies with those of us elected and politicians, who have perpetuated the awfulness that is politics, instead of focusing on governance. I've prioritized modernizing our legislature so that it is no longer a volunteer, unpaid role but one that is equitably salaried, with a dignified salary – that allows more people with lived experiences to participate in this process.

History of structures can be preserved even if buildings come down

Historic Preservation Committee Commissioner Judy Berryman said she would like to see the property at University Avenue and S. Chaparral Street, which is at least 75 years old, preserved for history. She describes the property as vernacular architecture, which is based on local needs and availability of construction materials, probably built by several families.

She explains the buildings are on private property and not in a designated historic district and so there is no mechanism to prevent the owner from taking down the structures in order to build new ones.

“Private property always has the upper hand,” she said. “You can’t force an individual who owns private property to go against their wishes. We would like to be given the opportunity to adequately document those build-

ings.”

The city has a number of ordinances providing guidelines in the case of cultural resources including historic buildings, she said. Specifically, Chapter 40 outlines the city’s commitment to preserve historic resources in Las Cruces. That effort is in an early phase of developing a program to preserve and protect the historic assets. The commitment to reviewing properties in historic districts is a significant step, as many

preserve significant buildings and neighborhoods.

“If we tear down all historic buildings, what is left of our history?” she said. “There are standards one can look at. There are processes to go through. You do need to have standing examples of important places and events.”

The property on University Avenue is owned by a bank and it has the right to develop the property, she said, while noting there are specialists at New Mexico State University willing to record those buildings at no cost.

“That would be an ideal situation,” she said. “If we can get a property owner to agree, that would be great.”

She also suggested the owner could take an extra step and develop some photo exhibit on the property so people to see what’s inside. This could be a positive step for the owner because it would show they care about and are working to show the history of the area.

communities don’t even have that much protection.

The ordinance is in the process of being reviewed and updated, Berryman said. One of the goals of updating chapter 40 will be to apply it to any buildings in the city more than 50 years old.

The property could be significant, but under the current Chapter 40 the city can only look at historic buildings in a historic district. This property is not in a district designated as historic.

“The city is growing, and many ordinances are growing and changing,” she said. “Historic preservation is a difficult topic to understand. It doesn’t mean everything needs to be preserved.”

Berryman said there are both state and national standards about what makes a building significant. In many cases it’s not possible to save or preserve properties, so the goal is to collect the data to record the history. But it is still essential to

and gender affirming care is also of importance to the LGBTQ community. In addition to making it possible for individuals who live in southern New Mexico to have access to care that is closer to home, it will make it easier for individuals who live in Texas to access gender affirming care. He said the

fact that Texas has banned gender affirming care for minors has sent a chill in the medical community in Texas and that adults now also struggle to find the care they need.

In addition, having gender affirming care in Las Cruces will make it easier for undocumented individuals to receive healthcare because of border checkpoints along the route to Albuquerque.

“A good percentage of asylum seekers from Central and South American countries seek asylum here because their lives are in danger as queer people,” he said. “We have to think about everything we can do to reduce the harm to them.”

State's top elections officer confronts AI fakery

Robocalls during election campaigns are nothing new, and the voice that greeted some New Hampshire voters on the phone last February sounded plausibly like a recorded message from President Joe Biden. But it wasn't Biden, and the message conveyed false information about the primary election and discouraged voters from turning out.

New Mexico's elections chief, Secretary of State Maggie Toulouse Oliver, called it a "wake up call" in an interview with the Las Cruces Bulletin.

In 2024, the prevalence of generative text and images has rapidly increased over the past few election cycles. "Deepfake" video imitations of people, manipulated photographic images and other deceptive materials have grown more sophisticated and difficult to spot without an eye for fine detail.

"We're concerned about the potential impact on voters having accurate information about where, when and how they cast their ballots," she said. "We decided that, going into this cycle, it would be really helpful to ... make folks aware this could be a real challenge for voters in this upcoming election cycle – to be able to discern accurate, correct information from the things that look very real but may not be."

In previous cycles, Toulouse Oliver's office has invested in promotional campaigns and online resources to combat misinformation (defined as false information shared without

intention of harm), disinformation (deliberately misleading information) and malinformation (often defined as disinformation based on a kernel of true information but presented deceptively or exaggerated so as to mislead). At the office's website, sos.nm.gov, a page styled "Rumor vs. Reality" addresses some common rumors and misunderstandings about elections and voting.

This year, the office is focusing more attention on "AI-manipulated media that could distort the truth about the election and candidates," Toulouse Oliver said in a news release earlier in May. "With the creation of deepfakes and other manipulated media through AI software, seeing is no longer believing."

Besides spreading awareness of fakery and ways to spot it, the campaign also promotes avenues for obtaining information about elections, either through a residents' local county clerk or the Secretary of State's office.

"We're all trying to grapple with this new technology and the new level of perceived reality that it brings to mis- and disinformation," she told the Bulletin.

It could also be seen as an exercise in building trust in election processes. Ahead of the 2022 elections, a survey by the Pew Research Center indicated most voters were confident that their elections would be administered properly, and their confidence appeared to have grown since the 2020 election although it still lagged behind 2018.

The survey found, however, a marked difference when it

came to party affiliation: 56 percent of Republican supporters expressed confidence that congressional elections would be administered at least "some-what" well, compared to 88 percent of Democratic supporters.

And there is a trend in federal politics this year, among Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump and his prominent supporters, of not committing to accept the results of elections in November. At campaign appearances, the former president has continued to present false claims about the 2020 election, which he lost to Joe Biden.

"There are people out there that believe in some ways not wrongly, that as much distrust as they can sow in the system,

it's beneficial for a perceived political outcome," said Toulouse Oliver, a Democrat elected to her second term as Secretary of State in 2022.

"We're trying to thread a needle here. We want voters to be aware and engaged, and to make sure they have the tools they need to try to determine what is fake and what is real. By the same token, what we don't want to do is encourage voters to feel that they can't believe anything ... because then what happens is we end up, as election officials, undermining our message, which is that we're the trusted sources of accurate election information."

Working with the Esparza Digital+ Advertising firm, the office has developed a coordi-

nated public information campaign across traditional media and advertising modes as well as social media. Also, a new state web page, sos.nm.gov/AI, presents primers on how to recognize AI-manipulated images and content, along with a quiz presenting genuine, professionally produced photographic images versus convincing computer-generated images.

The materials encourage citizens to look for signs such as unnaturally shaped features or facial expressions, inconsistent shadows and lighting and other irregularities that indicate an image or video was faked.

Additionally, Toulouse Oliver said, "We have a new law that was passed (in 2024) that does require disclosure of any sort of AI-generated content in the context of political ads. ... We want the voters to know whether what they're seeing is real or generated by a computer."

Reported violations of that law would be investigated by the New Mexico State Ethics Commission. Toulouse Oliver's office does not have investigators to enforce it. Alex Curtas, a spokesman for Toulouse Oliver, told Source New Mexico this spring, "We operate under the idea of trying to seek voluntary compliance from people."

Spreading awareness among the general public is an additional strategy for repelling misleading information.

"We are in this brave new world, trying to see whether or not this law has teeth and how effectively we can enforce it," Toulouse Oliver said. "For good or for bad, this year is going to be a pilot project."



City pools will be open on Memorial Day

The Las Cruces Natatorium (1405 E. Hadley Avenue) will be operating as normal, 6 to 11 a.m. and 4 to 8 p.m.

Additionally, solid waste collection will proceed as normal for residential and commercial customers scheduled for service Monday.

The South Central Solid Waste Transfer Station (2865 W. Amador Avenue) will operate from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., with Doña Ana County collection sites and the Corralitos landfill remaining open for the same hours.

Las Cruces man found guilty in 2022 vehicular death

BULLETIN REPORT

A jury convicted a Las Cruces man of manslaughter following a road rage incident near S. Espina Street and University Avenue in 2022.

Jason Salias, 38, was convicted of voluntary manslaughter on May 10 following a weeklong jury trial in the 3rd Judicial District court. A jury found Salias killed Jose Gomez, 22, when Salias rammed his Ford SUV into Gomez' motorcycle. During the trial, Salias said he acted in self-defense.

According to police,

Salias said Gomez chased him around Las Cruces before the crash. Salias also said he feared Gomez was going to shoot him.

Salias was held in jail on the matter for more than a year before he was released in May 2023. He was initially charged with first-degree murder, which the jury found him not guilty of. Instead, the jury convicted Salias of the lesser charge of voluntary manslaughter.

Salias could face up to three years in prison. As of the publication of this article, the court had not scheduled a sentencing hearing.

Solid Waste Implements Friendly Reminder “Oops!” Tags

It's a busy day, the kids are chaotic, your dog is barking, you're in a hurry and oh yeah, you have to drag your trash container out to the street before you shuffle off to work. Yes, we all have those hectic mornings, but a few extra moments of care can really help keep the solid waste service running smooth.

The City of Las Cruces and Las Cruces Utilities want to remind Solid Waste customers to keep their trash containers serviceable by following a few simple instructions:

- Place your container on the street before 6 a.m.
- The front of the container must face the street
- Keep the container at least 5 feet from cars, trees, mailboxes or other obstructions
- Keep it 3 feet from other containers
- Place trash in tied bags before putting them in containers
- Only trash in the container will be picked up (unless it is your designated Grappler day)
- Do not overfill the container - the lid must be closed
- Do not put hazardous waste nor construction material in the containers
- Do not place hot ashes in the container
- Do not place containers under trees, basketball goals or power lines

These requests keep service vehicles and their operators moving along quickly and efficiently through neighborhoods.



So, what happens if you don't follow these rules? Its possible service operators could skip your container and you may have you wait until the following week for collection. Repeated occurrences might result in an operator leaving an “Oops!” tag affixed to your trash container, explaining why the container was not serviced.

Drivers can't fix the collection day morning madness, but they can help you have a better afternoon when you wheel your empty, serviced container back up toward the house to start a new week all over again.

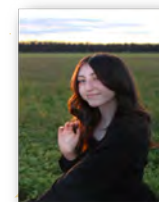

Journalism is not a crime

On May 15, New Mexico State Police and campus officers at the University of New Mexico tore down an encampment that had been established by protesters calling for a cease-fire in Israel's military offensive in Gaza. According to local reports, seven people were arrested. Two of these were not protesters, but journalists covering the operation: Bryant Furlow and Tara Armijo-Prewitt, both contributors to New Mexico In Depth.

In a statement last week, Furlow said he and Armijo-Prewitt, a photojournalist who had been documenting the UNM protests for weeks,

followed standard professional practices by asking whether a public information officer for the police was on site and where media would be permitted to stand, following instructions and standing behind yellow tape marking the police perimeter. After asking a state police officer for their name and badge number, Furlow said they were both arrested, held in custody for 12 hours and charged with criminal trespass and wrongful use of public property.

It could easily have

been us: On May 9, two reporters for the Las Cruces Bulletin covered the arrests of protesters at New Mexico State University, observing and documenting police operations and gathering information from authorities on scene. It should not be a matter

of luck that we were treated by local officers with professionalism and allowed to do our jobs without facing arrest and criminal charges. The treatment of journalists should never depend on the whim of a uniformed officer, such as when a

television correspondent in Ohio was ordered to halt a broadcast last year because the head of the state's National Guard felt the reporter was being "rude."

Data from the U.S. Press Freedom Tracker this week suggests arrests of reporters this year have already doubled 2023's total, driven mostly by coverage of protests: 27 as of this week, compared to 14 last year, here in the storied land of the free.

Reporters have faced charges such as criminal trespassing or disorderly conduct, forced to weigh accepting guilt and paying penalties versus

mounting legal expenses.

The press tracker put it succinctly in its report: "The criminalization of routine journalism ... shows authorities either do not understand news-gathering practices or, more alarmingly, do and use prosecutions as a cudgel to chill future reporting."

We don't know which was the case in Albuquerque last week, but either way, UNM police should immediately drop all charges against these two reporters and the university's regents should declare firmly that the First Amendment is in force and journalism is not a crime.

It's debatable if debates happen

The problem with presidential debates is they don't have a scoreboard.

We treat them as if they were a football game, with clear winners and losers. President Joe Biden sent out a taunting video last week in which he claimed, "Donald Trump lost two debates to me in 2020."

To my pleasant surprise, Trump responded to the taunt by agreeing to all of the terms proposed by the Biden campaign. That means there will be two debates, the first June 27 on CNN and the second Sept. 10 on ABC.

More significantly, the debates will be held

without a live audience and the microphones will only be turned on when it's the candidate's time to speak.

The last debates between Trump and Biden had so many interruptions that both the moderators and the time limits were meaningless. And moving the debate from a college campus, which has become the favored locale, to a sterile TV studio will completely change the experience.

The most effective debate moment of the last

few cycles was scored by Donald Trump in 2016 without saying a word. At a time when he was facing sexual assault allegations (has there ever been a time when

he wasn't?), Trump arranged to have Juanita Broaddrick, Paula Jones, Kathleen Willey and Kathy Shelton seated together in the front row staring down Hillary Clinton throughout the debate. All had made allegations against her hus-

band Bill similar to those made against Trump.

Trump is apparently having second thoughts about agreeing to all of Biden's terms. He's now demanding a drug test, giving him an excuse to back out. I'll be pleasantly surprised again if the debate set for June 27 takes place as planned.

I didn't expect there to be any debates this year, after the Republican National Committee decided in 2022 to no longer agree to terms set by the Commission on Presidential Debates, which has overseen the process since 1988.

That leaves it up to the campaigns to negotiate their own terms without a neutral arbiter. If I'm right, and Trump backs out of the terms he seemed so eager to accept last week, it won't be the first time he's reneged on an agreement.

And it won't be a great loss to the voters. The problem with debates isn't that they don't have scoreboards, it's that we treat them like they should. We keep score based on best zingers or, more likely this year, most verbal gaffes.

Hip-hop and rap might make you popular, but it won't help you open a bank account or get auto insurance. In a world of constant change sponsored by an aggressive mobile phone industry, we are experiencing more slang terms and abbreviations that are dividing us into consumers and merchants.

Ordinarily this division makes a healthy community but with evolving technologies we are exposed to the new threat of communication – ignorance! PROUD OF OMDP

Dear editor,

As we come upon the 10-year anniversary of the designation of the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument, I can't help but beam with pride over how Las Cruces serves as an example for other communities in embracing our public lands.

On May 21, 2014, President Barack Obama designated OMDPNM as a national monument, citing the unique historical, cultural, natural and scientific resources of Doña Ana County's public lands. For those of us who live here, we have since experienced the numerous benefits of the monument's establishment.

When I started Southwest Expeditions 11 years

ago, the designation was still just a hope and dream of many who saw how important it was to protect these sacred places. Now, as we celebrate the tenth anniversary, we see not only an increase in monument visitation but also an increase in the economic impact, jobs, outdoor recreation and tax revenues.

The economic benefits are significant, as documented by a report released last September by the Las Cruces Green Chamber of Commerce, of which we are members.

The report's economist authors at BBC Research and Consulting found visitation to the monument has increased three-fold since OMDPNM was created, resulting in \$234 million in new spending over 8 years that

currently supports over 300 jobs in hospitality, outdoor recreation, retail services, and other sectors.

My business specializes in outdoor excursions and experiences. New visitors and current residents want to experience our majestic landscapes, wildlife and unique sunsets. I have seen an increase in tour bookings, visitation to Las Cruces and an expansion of services.

OMDPNM is good for our community and I have seen firsthand the benefits it has brought to our area. I celebrate the first 10 years of the monument and look forward to seeing what transpires in the decades to come.

1780 ballet takes a look at AI issues

Borderlands Ballet Company's 2024 production of the classic ballet, Coppélia, is about to open in Las Cruces.

If you haven't heard of the comic ballet, "Coppélia," don't feel as if you are a dummy. The title character is actually the dummy. Or perhaps, better said, she is a life-sized automaton. The show is set in a quaint rural village of Galicia, where an eccentric and mysterious toymaker, Dr. Coppélius, has crafted a lifelike doll named Coppélia. Franz, a young man of the village, mistakes Coppélia for a real person and becomes infatuated by her mysterious beauty – much to the dismay of his true love, Swanilda. Deception and mischief abound as Swanilda and her friends sneak into Dr. Coppélius' workshop, setting the stage for a tale of mistaken identities and heartwarming revelations.

NMSU film students premier showcase at Centennial Celebration of Gila Wilderness

New Mexico's Gila Wilderness is the nation's first designated wilderness area. This year, the United States Forest Service celebrates the Gila's 100th anniversary in early June in Silver City with help from more than a dozen New Mexico State University film students.

The Gila Film Showcase consisting of seven short documentary films will premiere June 1-2 as the centerpiece of a week of festivities hosted by the U.S. Forest Service for the Centennial Celebration of the Gila Wilderness.

The Gila Film Showcase will have two screenings at 4:30 p.m. Saturday, June

1 and 1 p.m. Sunday, June 2 at the Silco Theater in Silver City.

Professors Ilana Lapid and Kristi Drexler launched the project after creating the Gila Film School in NMSU's Creative Media Institute, an immersive three-semester program led by Lapid and Drexler with support from a team of educators. The project includes not only the student-produced documentaries, but also a package of educational materials to be shared with fourth grade students across the state.

"The objectives of the Gila Film School were fourfold," said Lapid, Gila Film School director and CMI professor. "Our goal was to connect students to

the wilderness, empower the next generation of diverse environmental filmmakers, harness the power of visual storytelling for conservation education and inspire audiences of young people to love and protect the wilderness."

In the summer of 2022, Drexler and Lapid led 13 student filmmakers into the Gila Wilderness for a field school joined by Julian Alexander and Kyle Ivy, who co-produced the project with Jarrett Gladstone involved in postproduction. What emerged is seven short documentaries that reflect the unique natural, cultural and conservation history of the Gila, including Indigenous and Latino history.

Through compelling human-interest stories, they explore the relationship between people and their natural environment and the importance of protecting public lands.

The innovative program in immersive environmental filmmaking was funded by a U.S. Forest Service Youth and Veterans Engagement grant, along with support from the NMSU College of Arts and Sciences, NMSU's Vice President for Research, Creativity and Economic Development, the Creative Media Institute and American Rivers, a collaboration and trust that prioritizes protect-

ing and restoring rivers throughout the country.

"Kristi and Ilana presented the idea as a transformative journey for the students that would result in student-created films we would showcase during the Gila Wilderness Centennial celebration," said Henry Provencio, district ranger of the Wilderness Ranger District of the Gila National Forest. "Taking the students backpacking into the wilderness where they could experience firsthand the natural beauty and solitude, and then watching them grow as they conducted interviews and learned more about how

wilderness positively impacts the world around us, was inspiring to witness. I am very excited to share the films with others, and I look forward to the films being incorporated into a curriculum for fourth graders across this great state."

Drexler led a team of educators from universities, public schools, federal agencies and nonprofits to create educational materials to go with each of the seven films. These materials, including discussion questions and vocabulary designed specifically for fourth

graders, will be included along with the films in a Digital Suitcase that will be sent out as a resource for fourth grade teachers across the state of New Mexico, in honor of the Gila Centennial Celebration.

As conservation director, Drexler, who earned a doctorate from NMSU, provided guest lectures on conservation, coordinated program logistics and helped to strategize how to use the student films for educational, conservation and social impact.

“Through these films and educational materials, we hope to inform, excite and engage youth to value and protect wild areas like the Gila Wilderness and other special places across New Mexico,” she said.

During The Gila Film School, student filmmakers spent time in the field with forest firefighters, wildlife biologists, U.S. Forest

Service wranglers, trail users, archeologists and community leaders. These are the films and the students who made them:

“Stewardship of the Gila,” exploring the relationship between Indigenous ways of knowing and modern conservation. Directed by Ezekiel Soliz, Ingrid Leyva and Sigidavid Trevizo.

“Legacies of the Gila,” about Gila Hot Springs and communities alongside the Gila Wilderness. Directed by Noah Montes and Gayla Lacy, with sound design by Iliana Aragon.

“Fire Season,” about wildland forest fire management in the Gila. Directed by Julia De La O, with cinematography by Bardo Sanchez and sound design by Jarrett Gladstone.

“Tales of the Gila Trout,” about conservation of the threatened Gila Trout. Directed by Patricia Soto, Reyes Gabaldon and Luis Roman, with cinematography by Angel Salgado and sound design by Jarrett Gladstone.

“To Love the River,” about protecting the endangered Gila River. Directed by Samantha Jaso, Nidia Jimenez and Jackson Markman, with sound design by Iliana Aragon.

“Finding My Own Trail,” about the empowering benefits of spending time outdoors. Directed by Lexi Minton, Cherish Pena and Ky Blohm.

“What We Hold Sacred,” about the making of the Gila Film School. Directed by Araceli “Blue” Hernandez and Dom Adame.

“I think the project that Ilana and her team are leading with this group of students is a wonderful ‘Creative Campus’ endeavor because this experience demonstrates the power of media and how creative content lies at the intersection of so many different areas,” said Amy Lanasa, CMI professor and department head. “I am confident that this work will have a greater impact than any of us can imagine.”

World-class trumpeter to play Mayor's Jazz Fest

Internationally-known trumpeter Wayne Bergeron, performing with the popular area ensemble Border Jazz Orchestra, is set to headline the 2024 Mayor's Jazz Fest.

Bergeron's career has spanned everything from big band performances to features on television and film soundtracks to guest performances with ensembles around the world.

Later this month, the acclaimed trumpeter will perform on the Plaza de Las Cruces the city's event, which will begin at 6 p.m. Sunday, May 26. Organ Mountain High School Jazz Workshop Bands 1 and 2 will also perform.

"I'm excited about coming out and playing this festival, and what an honor it is to be asked," Bergeron said.

The annual jazz event is free and open to the public on the Plaza de Las Cruces, located at 100 N. Main St.

Bergeron spoke with The Las Cruces Bulletin about his career and upcoming Las Cruces date. The Q&A has been edited for length.

Q: Can you walk us through your personal background, how you got into music to begin with?

Bergeron: Basically, I got started playing brass. I've been interested in

music since I was a little kid. My parents used to tell me that I was always grabbing stuff and banging on it and banging on pianos. When I took up going into seventh grade, I started on French horn and was switched to trumpet. ... My school was vandalized and my French horn was destroyed, so they switched me to trumpet, so that's how my career kind of started.

My junior high band director was my first trumpet teacher ... and he kind of took me under his wing and showed me a lot of things about playing different styles of music and things and skills that I still draw on to this day.

I had some natural ability when I was young, as far as playing in the upper register on the trumpet, for whatever reason. Sometimes it's just our physical makeup. Anyway, I've been able to do this since I was a little kid. I had some little things I could do and I noticed the other kids couldn't do it ... That's probably what kept me interested in playing trumpet. I pursued it through high school. I ended up starting college but dropping out of college to go on the road – I got called to go on the road with a band, so I actually left college to do that.

I toured with Paul Anka and I toured with a singer named Helen Reddy ... I've lived in Los Angeles my entire life so I've kind of been here in the hub of

the entertainment industry.

I went on the road with Maynard Ferguson, who was a very famous trumpet player in the mid-80s, and that kind of helped my career a bit. You get a reputation for being on a band like that. So in Los Angeles, I started doing a little bit more studio work and getting called for some things and now that's kind of mainly what I do – I'm in the studios, I do movies and play on people's records and things like that. I do a lot of teaching and master classes.

Q: What keeps you excited about trumpet, about playing?

Bergeron: A little bit of it's about legacy ... I'm 66 now and I've been doing this for a long time. So I have people in college coming up to me or even out of college or older, you know, they're maybe 28 or 29 years old, and they go, 'I met you when I was in my first year in college and you did a master class and you played with that band.' And then they'll say, 'I'll never forget that you were so kind to us, and I learned this and that.'

Q: Do you have a performance or a piece or just an experience that really impacted you during your career?

Bergeron: I've done a lot of really cool things in my career ... A lot of times people ask me, 'What's your favorite movie you

ever played on?' It used to be "The Incredibles," just because it's a very trumpet-heavy movie ... "The Incredibles" was like a James Bond kind of score, a lot of high trumpet, which is kind of like what I like to do. More recently, in 2019, I played on the new "West Side Story" movie with the New York Philharmonic, so I was flown back several times to get to record with them.

My teacher, Uan Rasey, played first trumpet on the original "West Side Story" movie. So to get to play that music, that iconic Leonard Bernstein score, in my trumpet teacher's chair ... it's a big full circle moment for me. And so that movie is something I'm very, very proud of and I'm kind of featured prominently in it.

Q: Can you give us a hint as to what audiences might hear from you this month?

Bergeron: It'll be big band music, of course, they know that, and it'll be mostly jazz-based. But there'll be some Latin things; like, I do some very recognizable things that I've had arranged in a jazzy way, like "Friend Like Me" from the Disney movie, "Aladdin."

People that don't know jazz or music or kids, they recognize the song as well, so you can pull an audience in that doesn't know anything about this kind of music.

We're going to do "When You Wish Upon

a Star," which is a trumpet duet that Pancho (Romero) and I will probably play together. It's a really beautiful arrangement of that ... The (Border Jazz Orchestra) will probably play a couple of tunes on their own before I come out and I'll probably play five or six things.

Q: What can we expect from you next? What projects are you working on?

Bergeron: The last movie I did was this movie, "Wish," the new Disney movie. I did that and ... "Big City Greens," which is an animated feature they made into a movie recently. But it's

been slow. This summer there'll be an onslaught of stuff because all those things (halted during the SAG-AFTRA and writers guild strikes) will be getting done. ... I play on "Family Guy" ... and "American Dad," I do Mickey Mouse shorts. I do a lot of children's things like that.

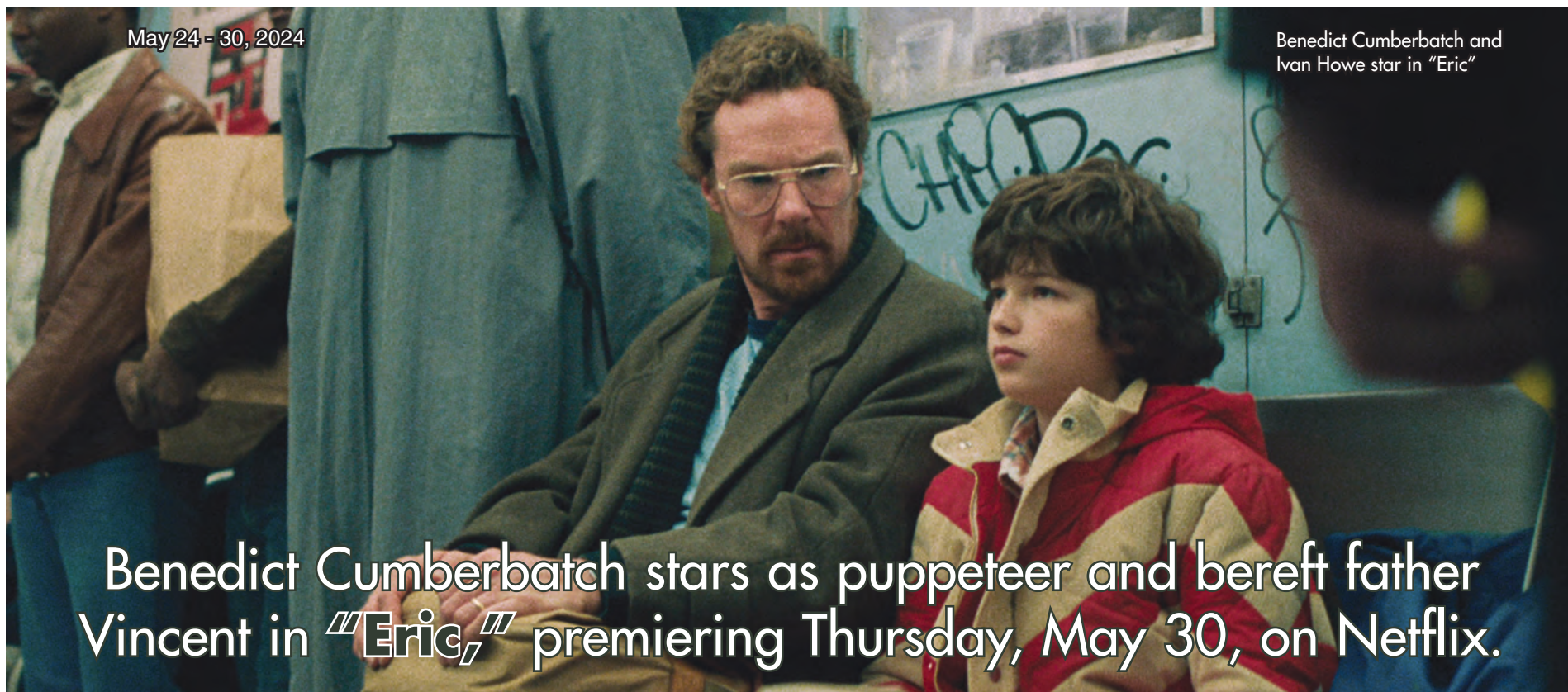
...I play with the Hollywood Bowl Orchestra here, which is a sister orchestra to the LA Philharmonic. It's like the pops orchestra. I'm not a regular member of the group, but I do almost every concert. And I'm doing something with the San Diego Symphony in early July, as well.

Q: With "Young Sheldon" over, what will Iain Armitage do next?

A: The young actor – who turns 16 in July, and has posted on social media that he'll be getting his pilot's license – didn't have definite professional plans at the time this was written, though having had a weekly series commitment for the past seven years (minus last year's actors' strike), we suspect that something of a more regular school schedule might be in his immediate future. Of course, there was tutoring on the set of his just-ended CBS series, but it's not the same going-to-class situation that most youngsters experience.

Armitage has built such an identity with viewers as the youthful incarnation of brainy Sheldon Cooper, also of "The Big Bang Theory" fame, it'll be interesting to see what sort of role he tackles next and how soon. When identification with one character is that strong, the given performer sometimes waits a while before trying something else, so the audience has a chance to recalibrate and accept the actor as someone else. Still, Armitage came into "Young Sheldon" already having notable acting experience. He had such television credits as HBO's "Big Little Lies" (as the Shailene Woodley character's son) and NBC's "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit." Additionally, Armitage worked on such films as "Scoob!" (as the voice of the young Shaggy, of the "Scooby-Doo" franchise) and "PAW Patrol: The Movie," as well as "The Glass Castle" and "Our Souls at Night." Armitage – who speaks Russian fluently, possibly opening him up to roles of that nationality – is the grandson of Richard Armitage, who served as a deputy secretary of state in the administration of President George W. Bush.

The City of Las Cruces Public Art program seeks an artist, or artist team, to create a site-specific outdoor art piece to beautify the soon-to-be-open East Mesa Public Recreation Complex.

LCPA will commission an art piece that will be installed at the EMPRC's 10-acre park located off Sonoma Springs Avenue in City Council District 6. The Organ Mountains provide a backdrop to the park that is surrounded by undeveloped desert landscape that is home to a variety of indigenous wildlife.

Archeological evidence of the property shows it was once covered by prehistoric waters that provided a habitat for amphibious animals, such as giant jellyfish.

The commission is open to all artists and artist teams. Artists are not required to have previous experience in public art but should demonstrate a level of expertise and professionalism that is commensurate with the project scope and budget.

All submissions will be reviewed by jury process. The winning design will be presented to the City Art Board and the Las Cruces City Council. The selected artist or art team shall collaborate with the City of Las Cruces Public Works Department and the LCPA program coordinator in the specifications and completion of this project. Artists must apply via callforentry.org.

Tenth anniversary of Organ Mountains monument celebrated

The people of Las Cruces and surrounding communities have “a deep pride and a shared ownership” in the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument and its cultural and economic impacts for the region have far exceeded all expectations, U.S. Sen. Martin Heinrich, D-N.M., said as hundreds of stakeholders, elected officials and outdoor enthusiasts gathered at the Las Cruces Convention Center to celebrate the monument’s 10th anniversary on May

18.

President Barack Obama signed federal legislation creating the monument on May 21, 2014 at the White House, praising Heinrich and former New Mexico U.S. Sens. Tom Udall and Jeff Bingaman, “who were instrumental in preserving this treasured landscape,” Obama said.

The nearly 500,000-acre monument, located less than 30 minutes west of downtown Las Cruces on Dripping Springs Road, includes five mountain ranges; hiking, biking and horseback-riding trails;

thousands of archeological sites, including Kilbourne Hole (volcanic crater) National Historic Landmark, the Aden Lava Flow Wilderness and 22 miles of the historic Butterfield Stagecoach Trail; the Chihuahuan Desert habitat and its unique wildlife and landscape; training sites for Apollo astronauts; bombing sites used to train World War II pilots; and “some of the most strikingly beautiful places on earth,” Heinrich said at the celebration.

The monument also includes 10 wilderness areas added in 2019, as the

“strong and broad coalition of local supporters” that helped to create the monument “keep building on what we achieved in the designation,” Heinrich said.

Heinrich singled out the late David Soules during his keynote speech at the celebration, saying the Las Cruces author and New Mexico Game Commission member’s “eye for detail (and) behind-the-scenes work” were vital in mapping OMDP’s natural wonders, cultural resources and historic sites.

Soules’ brother, state Sen. Bill Soules, D-Las Cruces, attended the celebration, along with former Las Cruces city councilor Cassandra Gandara, to whom he is married. Also attending were new Las Cruces City Manager Ikani Taumopeau and state Sen. Jeff Steinborn, D-Doña Ana, who is executive director of Outdoor New Mexico and was a leader in establishing the monument.

“It is your monument, not the government’s, not the BLM’s (U.S. Bureau of Land Management, which manages OMDP),” said state Sen. Carrie Hamblen, D-Las Cruces, who, as president and CEO of the Green Chamber of Commerce of Las Cruces, was also a strong voice in support of monument designation.

The economic impact of the monument has “exceeded our initial predictions by 51 percent,” Hamblen said. Many local businesses were created because of the monument’s designation and have not only reaped its economic benefits, but also have become “thoughtful stewards” of OMDP, which is celebrated in Las Cruces, Mesilla and other com-

munities with a cocktail, a cupcake and a host of other specialties – and businesses – named in its honor.

Visitation to the region has tripled since pre-monument 2012, Heinrich said. A study commissioned by the Green Chamber and published last fall estimated the total economic impact at \$234 million

Let's examine cannabis industry together

April 20 marked three years since cannabis was legalized in New Mexico. We have waited over 50 years to see the sacred medicinal herb be legalized and made available without fear of legal repercussions.

Legalization is still a controversial subject nationwide. Together, we will be exploring many facets of this industry in this column. We will also address the value of the New Mexico medical cannabis program and why we must do all we can to ensure it survives. (Recreational use and medical use are different.)

The state Cannabis Control Division regu-

lates cannabis in New Mexico. CCD had a rough start in 2021. There have been four directors since 2021 and most were not prepared. The good news is that the new CCD director, Todd Stevens, comes from Colorado with a background in cannabis. He seems to be proactive and focused on handling cannabis issues in New Mexico.

One problem was evident right from the get-go: CCD was not prepared for the onslaught of applicants. Another issue that continues to affect the industry is the lack of compliance officers and no law enforcement to address illegal activities that have gone unchecked for over two years.

The damage has been

done. Many illicit operators gained advantage due to the rules not including law enforcement. Some of you want to know how that happened. The rules and regulations also did not include limiting licenses to support New Mexico residents first.

When the rest of the country got wind of the ease of obtaining licenses in New Mexico, they came and overwhelmed the system. Ours is a state with a small and economically challenged population. We are not California or Colorado. Las Cruces only has 115,000 residents.

There are those who continue to exploit the cannabis industry. Case in point, Estancia had two commercial produc-



tion facilities which were found to have employed 1,000 Chinese immigrants — who, by the way, lived in the greenhouses illegally.

Jobs at these facilities went to exploited Chinese immigrants, not New Mexicans.

The facilities in Estancia were out of compliance and shut down by CCD a few months ago, but they continue to operate, partly due to the fact that they are on sovereign

land and state and federal laws have limited jurisdiction. The issue is still unresolved.

There are immigrants and residents from other states moving to New Mexico to work in the cannabis industry, thinking they will make millions. I personally have met folks from Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Oklahoma and Arizona who are making Las Cruces their homes.

One purpose of the “Good Herb” column is to include you, the residents of Las Cruces, in this journey. You have questions and together we can find answers. For example:

How does legalization

affect me as a resident of Las Cruces? How can 115,000 residents support 60 dispensaries? Why is the Border Patrol all of a sudden confiscating legal cannabis at the border checkpoints? Can licenses be limited in oversaturated cities? Who will listen to and address my concerns?

over ten years.

“I am so proud of how far we've come in a decade,” Heinrich said, and “even more excited about where we will go.”

“The work never stops,” said Patrick Nolan, executive director of the non-profit Friends of Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks, which hosted the 10th-anniversary celebration.

The monument's continuing mission includes creating “the next generation of public lands stewards,” Nolan said, protecting more land in southern New Mexico and ensuring public access to protected areas for current and future generations.

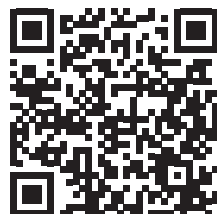
Las Cruces city councilor Johana Bencomo was the evening's master of ceremonies. Bencomo and Nolan, who is also a member of the Las Cruces

Public Schools Board of Education, are married.

High court rules against candidate

The New Mexico Supreme Court affirmed the disqualification of a Las Cruces Republican seeking to challenge a long-time statehouse representative.

Ronnie Sisneros' disqualification was affirmed on May 9 following a Supreme Court order.

The ruling effectively confirmed that District 37 Rep. Joanne Ferrary, a Democrat who has held the seat since 2017, will remain in office.

Sisneros was disqualified after changing the headers of his petition forms.

In an interview with the Bulletin, Sisneros railed against the Clerk's office and accused "badged

Democratic election workers and county clerk employees" of providing preferential treatment to Democrats over Republicans, especially upon filing to run.

Sisneros connected this experience with his complaints about the Democratic party's support of abortion, DEI (diversity, equity and inclusion) and the rights of transgender people.

"What about my diversity? What about my equity? What about my inclusion? I guess it doesn't apply unless you sign on with exactly what they want. No. I'm pro-life, not pro-Planned Parenthood. And I happen to know I'm not signing up to have boys go to girls' bathrooms," Sisneros said when asked why he

changed the headers.

The County Clerk's Office denied providing preferential treatment to any candidate in any election.

"I looked for every possible way to keep him on the ballot," Clerk Amanda López Askin said.

López Askin also noted that Democrat candidates were disqualified just as Sisneros was.

In March, Sisneros was first disqualified by the Doña Ana County Clerk's office. According to letters provided to the Bulletin by the office, the candidate had changed his nomination forms in breach of election rules.

To run for state representative, a prospec-

tive candidate must return the signatures of 32 district residents. For Sisneros, this meant canvassing the neighborhoods around the Mesilla Val-

ley Mall, the intersection of Spruce Avenue and Telshor Boulevard and the Sonoma Ranch Golf Course.

Sisneros submitted seven nomination forms and exceeded the signature threshold. However, he altered five of the seven forms by crossing out "House of" and replacing it with "State."

The altered language read "State Representative" instead of "House of Representatives."

The state election code allows nominating forms

to be invalidated in a few cases. For one, the county clerk must invalidate the forms if they are missing required information, such as the office sought. The forms can also be invalidated if the information was changed after the voter signed them.

After the clerk disqualified Sisneros, the Republican appealed to the Third Judicial District Court. Through his attorney, Sisneros argued that the clerk's decision deprived voters of a choice in the election.

District Judge Manuel Arrieta found no reason to reverse the disqualification during a hearing in April. Neither did the state Supreme Court in May.

Sisneros confirmed to the Bulletin that he changed the headers. He

said he found the current header confusing and changed it after conferring with other Republicans across the state. He said they told him not to change the headers.

"Not one of them to the man would say – or woman, because it was men and women – would say how to put it on there. And you know what that says right there? Because they did not want to be responsible. That goes to show you the environment that exists here in Las Cruces," Sisneros said.

Sisneros expected his case to be tossed out by a local judge but assumed the state Supreme Court would side with him.

"This is not over," Sisneros said, promising more legal action.

the parking lot.

Sister Mavis, who works with Las Cruces Catholic School, is fairly new to the area. 2023 was her first year experiencing the blessing event. She has served in Zimbabwe, Italy and Bangladesh yet she

said she has never seen anything like this.

"I think it's a very important event," she said. "When we get through the blessing of the water, it's so crucial here, magnified, in this area.

"In our world today, in

our culture here, many times we are removed from our sources of our food. This is not only for the children, but the adults to remember the food comes from the earth; so the blessing of those things is crucial."

Cash flow to DA candidates indicates heated race

One candidate collected thousands as a salaried employee of Doña Ana County. Another has been getting her contributions from donors in Santa Fe and Albuquerque. A third is taking out loans.

As the race to be southern New Mexico's top prosecutor heats up, so do donations. Voters – especially those with money to donate to political causes – are watching the race for 3rd judicial district attorney closely as Las Cruces and New Mexico grapple with anxiety around crime and safety.

The latest documents show that the five candidates have raised about \$120,924 and spent about \$61,542 combined. Most of the money flows to just two candidates: Fernando Macías and Ramona Martinez.

Campaign finance records, such as cash donations or expense receipts, reveal who's backing whom and with how much. They illuminate the dynamics shaping the race, which is expected to draw high turnout and has already featured a half-dozen debates.

Ebb and (cash) flow

In the first two reporting periods, from October 2023 to May 2024, the two Democrats with the longest-standing ties to the party raised the most. And it wasn't close.

Fernando Macías, former county manager and former district judge, and Ramona Martinez, a Las Cruces defense attorney and former Bill Richardson staffer, raised \$42,129.63 and \$39,815.00, respectively.

Shaharazad Booth, another Las Cruces defense attorney and former Deming prosecutor, raised \$28,740. Gerald Byers, the incumbent district attorney, raised \$10,240.74, mainly through taking out loans.

Michael Cain, a defense attorney and the lone Republican in the field, raised just \$2,700 in an uncompetitive primary.

Macías has also spent the most. Cam-

paign finance records show he's shelled out \$28,587.28. Martinez spent \$16,658.30. Booth spent \$12,646.32. Byers spent \$3,650.80.

Macías money

According to Macías' campaign finance records, the former county manager began fundraising in February, about three months after the Board of County Commissioners voted to end his contract. Macías remained employed until April 30, meaning he raised his \$42,129.63 while salaried with the county.

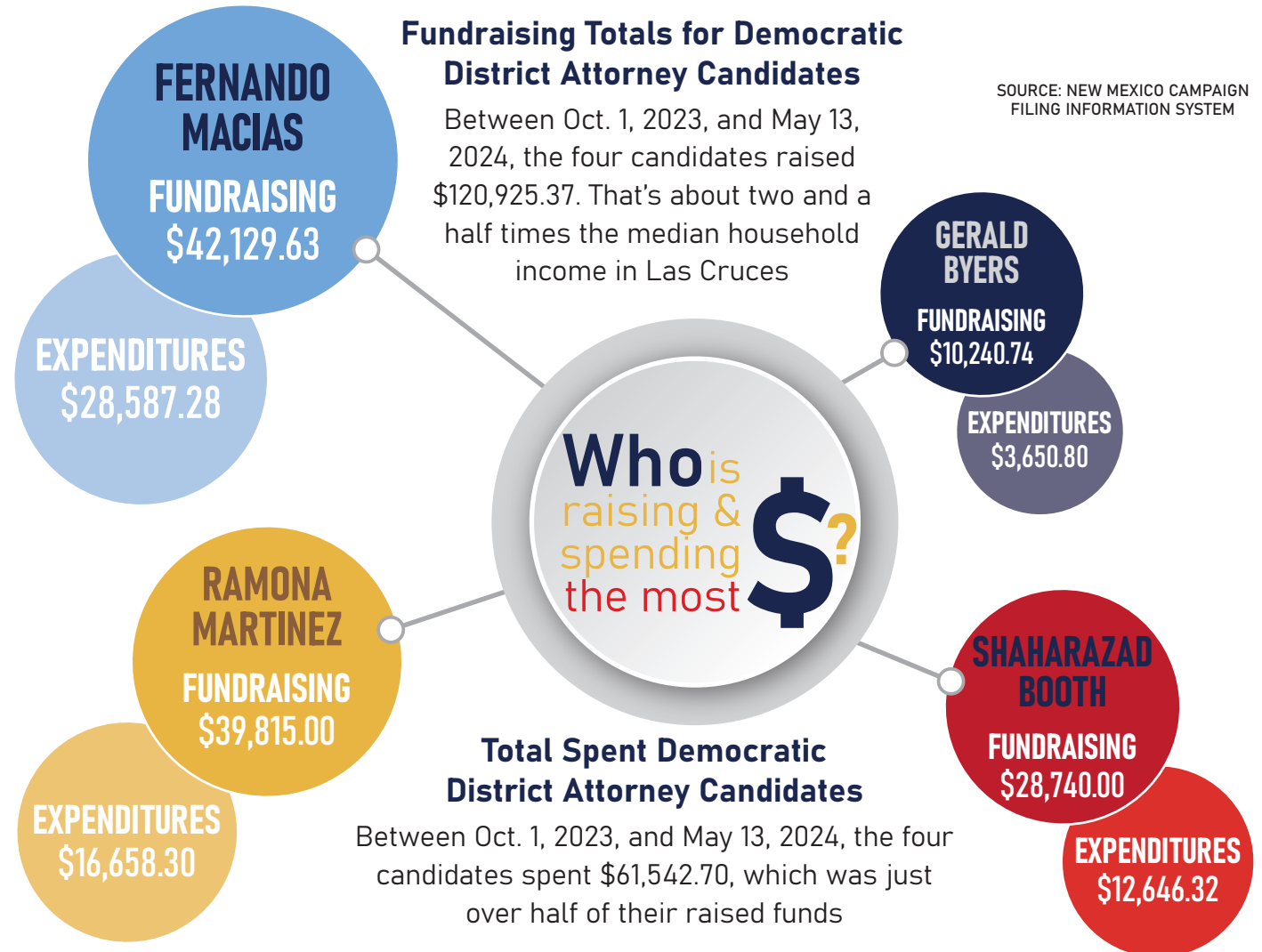
In an interview with the Bulletin, Macías said he did not fundraise while on county time.

"My sense is that county manager is an 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.," Macías said. "And at

that point (when he started fundraising in February), I already knew that I was leaving county government."

Macías added, "Anyone who's holding any kind of position, and they know that they're transitioning out, they certainly have to be preparing for the next step."

Macías also felt that the total raised was smaller compared to other elections. "That amount of money is relatively small in comparison to, you know, larger campaigns. And a lot of it is basically from individuals. I'm assuming almost all of it is from individuals who know me very well," Macías said.

From Feb. 9 to May 1, Macías received 82 donations at an average of \$518 per donation. His top donors were:

- Evangeline Lindberg, a longtime

Macías supporter and local businesswoman, who gave \$5,500;

- Ken Miyagishima, former Las Cruces mayor and insurance titan, who gave \$4,059.63 across several donations;

- Oscar Andrade, the owner of Pic Quik, who gave Macías \$2,500;

- Lynn Underwood, an author and former Department of Consumer and Regulatory Affairs chief, who gave Macías \$2,000.

Macías also received \$1,000 donations from Heidi Moccia, wife of New Mexico State University's Athletics director; Kim Hakes, a home developer in Las Cruces; and Edward Avalos, former Undersecretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs at the U.S. Department

of Agriculture.

Macías has spent most of this money with two El Paso-based print shops and Las Cruces-based marketing and consulting firms to produce campaign signs and other materials.

Lastly, all but 12 of Macías' donations have come from people in Doña Ana County. The same cannot be said for one of his competitors.

Martinez moolah

Ramona Martinez started fundraising for her run in October 2023, but not in Las Cruces. Of the 123 donations Martinez has received, 31 have come from Doña Ana County residents. The other 75 percent has come

from northern or central New Mexico residents. On average, each donor has given about \$312.

Martinez, who was born in Tierra Amarilla and spent much of her career in northern and central New Mexico, was unavailable for an interview. Instead, she provided an emailed statement.

"I have been fortunate to be supported by donors both large and small from across the state. I continue to meet with voters in Doña Ana and listen to concerns and ideas from the community by going door to door, attending local events, and participating in forums," Martinez wrote.

Her top donors are:

- Matt Ancieux, the owner of a Las Cruces-based IT solutions firm,

who gave \$2,750;

- Bob Pitre, an Albuquerque-based car dealership owner, who gave \$2,500;

- Rudy Guzman, of Guzman Construction based in Albuquerque, who gave \$2,500;

- Joseph de La Rosa, a New Mexico Department of Transportation administrator, who gave \$2,100;

- Dennis Malouf, an Albuquerque-based real estate developer, who gave \$2,000.

Martinez also received \$1,000 donations from William Fietz, an Albuquerque realtor; Sandy Jones Contractor, a construction firm in Williamsburg; and Southwest Designs, a Santa Fe-based interior design firm.

Like Macías, Martinez has spent most of her

money on ads and campaign consultants.

Martinez' campaign finances records also presented donations around several anonymous donations the candidate received. Records show Martinez received \$1,200 from 11 anonymous donors, including two that exceed \$100.

State law prohibits this. The law states that anonymous contributions may not exceed \$100 and that the aggregate number of anonymous contributions received by a candidate in an election cycle may not exceed \$500.

Any contribution received in excess of this "shall be donated to the state general fund or an organization to which a federal income tax deduction," the law says. Martinez said she would

donate the excess money to La Casa.

Martinez is not the only candidate with at least one donation that may violate the state election code.

Booth bucks

Shaharazad Booth also has one donation that may violate the state election code. She received a single anonymous donation of \$200.

Otherwise, Booth received 66 donations with an average contribution of \$402. Her top donors include:

- Cynthia and Jeremy Settles, who gave \$6,600 in two donations;

- Oscar Andrade, the owner of Pic Quik, who gave Booth \$2,500;

- Rob Atchley, president of a Las Cruces building supplies firm, who gave

\$2,500;

- Mollie McGraw, a Las Cruces attorney, who gave Booth \$1,500.

Two other Las Cruces lawyers, Victor Poulos and Jessica Kane, contributed \$1,000 to Booth. Angelica Rubio, a state representative for central Las Cruces, also gave Booth \$1,000.

While Rubio gave the most, Booth received small contributions from other local politicians.

Las Cruces Public School board members Teresa Tenorio and Patrick Nolan gave her \$100 and \$50, respectively. Las Cruces City Councilor Becky Corran also donated \$50.

Booth was not available to comment on her finances. Like Martinez, Booth said she was preoccupied at court when the Bulletin inquired.

Wisdom is precious. Over the years I have found quotations from famous golfers, personalities and others to be most entertaining, thought-provoking and informative. Here are a few of my favorites.

Ben Hogan once said, "Golf is not a game of good shots. It's a game of bad shots." He believed that if you manage to make something of your misses, you'll do all right. When asked by a club member how he could make more putts, Hogan replied, "Hit it closer to the hole." "Don't ever get old," Hogan said to a fan as he drove away from the Shady Oaks clubhouse for the last time.

Contemplating the game of golf, Arnold Palmer described it this way: "Golf is deceptively simple and endlessly complicated. It satisfies the soul and frustrates the intellect. It is at the same time rewarding and maddening – it is without a doubt the greatest game mankind has ever invented." Arnold also said, "Success in golf depends less on strength of body than upon strength of mind and character."

The late Bobby Jones has been often quoted over the years, and here are three of those gems. "Some people think they

The late Gardner Dickinson stated: "They say golf is like life, but don't believe them. Golf is more complicated than that." Rev. Billy Graham quipped: "The only time my prayers are never answered is on the golf course." And the late golf writer Dan Jenkins wrote, "The devoted golfer is an anguished soul who has learned a lot about putting, just as an avalanche

victim has learned a lot about snow."

Mark Twain is famously quoted as saying, "Golf is a good walk spoiled."
