On September 21, 1595, Don Juan de Oñate's petition and contract for the conquest of New Mexico and the "golden cities" rumored to exist there, was presented to Luis de Velasco, the viceroy of Nueva Vizcaya. Though

he was eventually tried and sentenced in 1614 for his cruel actions and ineptitude, Oñate is credited with establishing a colony in New Mexico and exploring the geography of the region.

The New Mexico Territory was created on **September 9,1850**, which included most of Arizona and parts of Colorado. The addition was a result of the Treaty of Gua-

dalupe Hidalgo in 1848, which led to the establishment of the Organic Act, by President Millard Fillmore, admitting the New Mexico Territory into the Union.

Buddy Holly's classic hit "Peggy Sue" was released on **September 20, 1957.** It had been recorded at the Norman Petty Recording Studio in Clovis, New Mexico during the summer of that year. www.desertexposure.com SEPTEMBER 2024 • 5



City of Rocks State Park and Rockhound State Park, in conjunction with the Astronomy Friends of The Parks, have announced their 2024 fall/winter and 2025 spring astronomy program schedule.

Astronomy Friends of the Park are advanced amateur astronomers, many members of the Astronomical Society of Las Cruces, who like observing and sharing their findings. Members are always on hand to assist the park staff with their presentations.

CITY OF ROCKS STATE PARK

Program is presented at The City of Rocks State Park, 327 NM-61, Faywood, in the Orion Group campsite and the Gene & Elizabeth Simon Observatory. Check for status/weather and alerts before attending. Pass fees apply. Info: 575-536-2800. About 45 minutes after sunset, a laser guided tour is given on the highlights of the evening sky, weather permitting. Visual observations with telescopes follow, with assistance from members of the park friends, lasting approximately 2 hours. Arrive around sunset to 15 minutes after sunset to become familiar with the program layout. Chairs are limited, so it is recommended you bring your own, along with a small, red colored light to preserve night vision. Loaners are provided to those who don't have one.











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usic is an important part of any community, and Las Cruces is no exception. Though the city now supports more music venues than it did even a decade ago, it can still be difficult to know who the individual players are - musicians young and old who rely on live venues to get their work out. A group of enterprising young filmmakers and sound engineers have set out to change that.

Calling their project Valley Sessions, they have created a safe place for serious musical artists to show off their talent, for little or no cost, through a series of beautifully curated diegetic - or live performance - videos dropping every month on the project's YouTube page. Since January of 2023, twenty videos have been made and there is no indication that the group is slowing down anytime soon.

Season one consists of twelve sparkling performances, each set in a different location across the city. Some rely on multiple camera shots, like the six used for the Stoney Blue Fish video. Compare that to the incredible single take one shot used for the Papayas con Chile video, and the innovation becomes clear. Bathe them with expert lighting and you've got a series of masterful productions that showcase the incredible talent to be found here.

Among the other performers appearing

in season one are local musicians Era Snow, Nick Brower, Taylor Paul, Desirae Price, Jehnalvey, C.W. Ayon, M.qu, Anibal and Tucson-based band Female Gaze. Through word-of-mouth, Valley Sessions finds its reach expanding to include acts either passing through town, or who come here specifically to shoot with them. To date, season two consists of performers from Arizona, Wyoming, Nashville, Albuquerque and El Paso.

The brainchild of Ryan M. Robson, Kent Harkey, Zane Chaffee and Aaron Walter-scheid-all products of Las Cruces' burgeoning film scene who were looking for projects to fill their downtime between film projects - Valley Sessions has grown to encompass other willing volunteers from film, music, photography and other artistic pursuits. The result is a richness of visual splendor that reveals far more than musical prowess.

"I wanted to have something that local filmmakers and creatives can devote their time and energy to that would reflect back on the community," Robson says. "I like the idea of giving information and experience to people who are just trying to make a living here. Not just to students, but to anybody who wants to know how the industry works." Chaffee, lead singer for Stoney Blue Fish and a music producer in his own right, agrees. "Being able to record on set is some-



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

Artist Trading Cards Come to Silver City

Who would think that forty busy artists would want to create twenty small works of art every two months just to give them away? Well, Silver City artist Joel Armstrong does! Armstrong, who is the event organizer at Light Art Space, has organized two groups of twenty artists each who are creating and trading Artist Trading Cards (ATC), by alternating every other month. Though he has participated in many ATC swaps, this is the first time he has organized local artists to take part.

"This initiative is all

about celebrating the rich diversity of talent in our local arts scene," said Armstrong. "Artist trading cards provide a fun and accessible way for artists to connect, exchange ideas, and inspire one another."

The ATC groups meet on a monthly basis to swap their small works of art, with the first trade initiated in mid-August of this year. Each ATC is 2.5 x 3.5 inches, all original art, created in whatever theme, design and medium the artist desires. All levels of local artists are encouraged to participate, and as such come from diverse backgrounds and ages. Each

swap session includes a social discussion for each artist to present their ATC creations before the frenzied swap occurs. The miniature works of art then become treasured possessions of their fellow traders.

The artist trading card concept originated in Switzerland in the 1990's and soon became popular worldwide. Armstrong himself has been an art card trader since 2006. At the first meetings, Armstrong displayed several bulging binders of his personal ATC swaps, all unique and ranging from fiber art, paintings, collage, photographs and even

a piece of carved wood. These examples show the diversity of creative ideas in making the tiny art pieces.

The two Silver City trade groups filled quickly with enthusiastic artists. Most had never heard of Artist Trading Cards and were excited to get involved. Many of the comments ranged from how fun it is, to how the project inspires creativity and expands the ways of thinking.

"By bringing artists together in this way, we hope to strengthen the sense of community among Silver City's creatives," said Armstrong. "It's a chance to learn from each other, support one another, and celebrate our incredible artistic talent here. Let's create, share, and inspire – one card at a time."
