LUMINARIAS The warm glow of tradition

f you've lived in New Mexico for any length of time, you no doubt already know that as the holiday season swings into prominence, so, too, does the tradition of lighting luminarias along walkways, roads and

buildings. Throughout the month of December, luminarias (or farolitos, if you're so inclined) light up the night from Santa Fe to Mesilla and beyond, sparking joy and comfort wherever viewed. In Las Cruces, it begins with New Mexico State University's Noche de Luminarias, on December 1.

From there, every evening tree lighting ceremony, winter festival, fiesta, or holiday celebration employs the tradition, and we love them for it. All it takes is a stack of brown paper bags, a pile of sand, a passel of tea lights and a crew of conscripts to assemble and line them up. If you grew up here, you were most likely one of those conscripts and have the burn scars to prove it.

As ubiquitous as this tradition is, however, there are many who are unfamiliar with the history of the luminaria. How and when did the tradition get its start? There are many different speculations. The tradition of lighting luminarias is older than New Mexico itself, and to say it's steeped in cultural significance is an understatement. One thing we do know is that the Spanish brought it with them during their days of con-

Governor announces immediate departure of Health Secretary

After less than two vears on the job. the state Department of Health Secretary is stepping down, effective immediately.

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham announced in a news release on Nov. 20 that Patrick Allen would no longer be the Health secretary by the end of the day.

"Pat has been a dedicated public servant, and I'm grateful for his contributions as secretary for the Department of Health. I wish him well in his next endeavor." Lujan Grisham said in the news release, without providing a reason for the departure.

Allen left behind a long career as a public official in Oregon before coming to New Mexico in 2023. He succeeded Dr. David Scrase, a physician who served as the state's Health and Human Services secretary concurrently with a stint as interim health secretary during the height of the

COVID-19 pandemic. Scrase retired from state government in January 2023.

According to the news release, Gina DeBlassie, the governor's health policv advisor since 2022, will serve as interim cabinet secretary.

The grave of deceased military veterans will be honored in Las Cruces and El Paso, and nationwide, on Wreaths Across America Day, Dec. 14.

In Las Cruces, the nonprofit United Military Women of the Southwest says it will place wreaths on graves at HillCrest Cemetery, 5140 W. Picacho Avenue, beginning at 2 p.m. on Dec. 14. The wreaths are purchased through donations by local businesses and military friends' organizations. Preceding that, the UMW will host a Bingo event at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 7, at the American Legion, 1185 E. Madrid Avenue.

Last year, the organization distributed 192 wreaths locally.

The El Paso Composite Squadron Civil Air Patrol called for sponsorships for wreaths to be placed on veterans' graves at the Fort Bliss National Cemetery, 5200 Fred Wilson Avenue in El Paso. City of Las Cruces officials said they have found no lead pipes since sending thousands of letters to utility customers warning of "unknown" materials in pipes, but will continue inspecting thousands of lines over the coming years.

The letters descended on thousands of homes and businesses in Las Cruces last month as a part of the city's effort to comply with an Environmental Protection Agency rule that went into effect in late October.

The rule requires drinking water systems across the country to identify and replace lead pipes within 10 years; lowers the threshold of lead exposure requiring protective action and enhances testing requirements; and mandates communication with communities about risks, location of lead pipes and plans to replace them. The latter requirement led to the letters from the city.

Despite having more than 20,000 city-owned pipes made of "unknown material," officials said at a Nov. 18 presentation that the public has little to worry about.

"About 15,000 (service lines and pipes) have been proven to not have lead so far," Councilor Becky Corran said at a council meeting on Nov. 18. "So,

this is not something to necessarily have a big panic about."

According to the World Health Organization, lead exposure can severely damage the brain and central nervous system. "There is no level of exposure to lead that is known to be without harmful effects," WHO said on their website. Lead exposure can cause several significant health challenges and especially affects children and people having children. Although the effects of lead poisoning have been known for most of human history, builders of the 19th century frequently used it to construct water lines across the U.S.

Starting in the early 1900s, copper and plastic became the preferred materials for piping, but thousands of U.S. water systems still contained lead. According to EPA records, the U.S. banned new lead piping entirely in 1986.

Starting in 1991, the EPA has sought to implement new rules around lead pipe remediation.

"EPA estimates that up to 9 million homes are served through legacy lead pipes across the country, many of which are in lower-income communities and communities of color, creating disproportionate lead exposure burden for these families," the EPA said in a news release about the rule.

The rule change required water utilities like Las Cruces' to notify the public if their pipes contained lead or were made of unknown material. Since then, city officials have said it's unlikely that many, if any, service lines in the city are made of lead, since much of the city was constructed at a time when lead pipes were either banned or rarely used.

quest and colonization.

Some believe it entered their ethnic vernacular in the Philippine Islands, where Chinese culture was prevalent and included the widespread use of paper lanterns. Catholicism, being what it has always been, syncretized the custom and brought it with them to the new world. Interestingly enough, paper bags weren't introduced until 1872, so the supposition isn't without its flaws.

Another belief is that the tradition dates back to 1590, when one Gaspar Castano de Sosa and his men lit small stacks of piñon bark and dry wood to guide scouts back to their camp. Apparently, the Pueblo people saw this and integrated it into their customs while performing traditional dances. Catholics just thought the little bonfires looked pretty and decided to use them in their religious ceremonies. Interesting fact: It is this

the luminaria/farolito debate. In northern New Mexico, "farolito" is the word for the paper lantern, while "luminaria" is the word used to describe the small, paperless bonfires. Here in the south. they're all luminarias because they illuminate the night. There's no right or wrong way to say it, except that depending on where you live, it could brand vou as an outsider.

The anthropological perspective on the history of the luminaria is that it had something to do with the winter solstice, which is celebrated throughout the world in different ways. This being the darkest time of the year, torches and lanterns were an integral part of many religious and cultural celebrations in lands where daylight was limited. Again, owing to syncretization, Catholic Spain brought those traditions with them, changing them to suit the situations as they arose.

Whatever the genesis,

the tradition spread like wildfire throughout the Spanish territories. In fact, these days, what started as a quaint custom with nebulous beginnings has become a symbol of hope in times of darkness. The American Cancer Society uses luminarias as a symbol of remembrance and hope to honor cancer survivors and those who have lost the battle to cancer. The American Foundation for Suicide Prevention uses luminarias to memorialize those lost to suicide. And all across the nation. luminarias are used to light paths, line streets and delineate buildings, structures and even ships at sea.

At town hall, hospital pledges to improve

"You are here to make us better," Dennis Knox said as he convened a town hall-style meeting in a crowded conference room at Memorial Medical Center.

Since August, Knox has served as the hospital's interim CEO, arriving days after the abrupt retirement of John Harris amid controversy over a state probe that followed a NBC News report on alleged denials of service to cancer patients. The scrutiny prompted the city of Las Cruces to investigate potential breaches of the for-profit hospital's lease of land jointly owned by the city and Doña Ana County.

The hospital's board of trustees convened the public meeting on Nov. 16, primarily, to listen to comments and answer questions from the public, with pledges to continue outreach efforts, listen to feedback and improve its service and communications with patients – without explicitly admitting to past wrongdoing.

That admission is what Earl Nissen sought when he took the podium, recalling that Harris had denied the hospital had violated its lease, criticized the news report for "inaccuracies and misinformation" and defended the hospital's record on indigent care. Nissen asked the board if they admitted that improper denials of service had occurred.

Several board members took turns to say that Memorial intended to move forward, to include community input, review the facts of what had taken place in the past, improve procedures related to patient referrals, billing and negotiating with insurance companies on out-of-network care. City Manager Ikani Taumoepeau, who sits on the hospital board as the city's representative, said, "We look forward to the reset" as legal staff from the city and county were working closely with the hospital. In August, the city demanded documents from Memorial to examine whether any denials of care at the hospital violated its lease.

Seated on his walker, Nissen paid close attention to the answers before saying, "That's still not answering the question."

"We understand the frustration with that; we do," board member Frances Scappaticci replied. "What the CEO said is the hospital's position."

Earlier, Knox himself had said, "We've done a comprehensive review of the (lease) and we've had very good collaborative meetings, and are developing a strong partnership with the city and the county ... We're cooperating fully with the Attorney General's office, and (as) that's still a pending legal matter, I can't get into details, but I am very hopeful that it will be resolved very soon."

Memorial's chief financial officer, Laura Thomas, was asked about a comment she had made to Doña Ana County commissioners in June, that prior to her arrival on the job, "there was a decision made to remove the cancer indigent care out of the lease agreement. And so that was removed out." She said she did not recall the comment, which came during an open session

archived on the county's You-Tube channel.

Yolanda Diaz, a patient advocate and cancer survivor herself who has worked to publicize the plight of cancer patients denied service, asked for more time than the three minutes allotted to speakers, and was granted the space to make a 12-minute address calling for transparency and accountability over the hospital's treatment of indigent patients. Diaz went so far as to call the alleged neglect of patients "an atrocity, a form of population control, a form of genocide."

Besides the matters aired in the NBC News story, some of the speakers raised individual complaints about confusing billing practices and conditions they had observed at the hospital as patients or as former staff. A former nurse asked direct questions about protections for nursing staff from workplace violence

and burnout. More than one speaker pressed the board to outline specific policy changes they planned to put in writing.

Knox, in turn, highlighted the hospital's patient family advisory board, recent expansion of medical staff, the upcoming opening of an acute care center in Anthony, N.M., a new urology clinic and new treatment methods in wound care and radiology.

He noted that in 2025, Memorial Medical Center will mark its 75th anniversary.



Alamogordo man sentenced after killing police officer

An Alamogordo man convicted of killing a police officer was sentenced on Nov. 15 to life in prison.

Dominic De La O, 27, was convicted by a jury after police said he killed Alamogordo police officer Anthony Ferguson on July 15, 2023.

According to court records, police said that APD officers attempted to pull over De La O near Puerto Rico Avenue and 9th Street when he fled from police. The chase ended with De La O wrecking near First Street and Delaware Avenue. Shortly after, De La O

shot Ferguson with a shotgun. Ferguson was taken to an El Paso hospital, where he succumbed to his injuries. De La O was also shot, but sustained

non-life-threatening injuries.

After he was released from the hospital, De La O was charged with firstdegree murder, tampering with evidence, aggravated fleeing from a law enforcement officer, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, resisting arrest and criminal trespassing.

A judge ordered that De La O remain in jail following his arrest.

De La O pleaded not guilty to the charges and faced a trial that started on Nov. 4. After five days of trial, a jury found him guilty of all charges except aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

Controversial nonprofit bill passes House without Vasquez's support

A bill opponents fear would give the Trump administration the power to strip taxexempt status away from nonprofits passed through the U.S. House of Representatives despite some Democrats backing away from the bill.

Gabe Vasquez, D-N.M., was among the Democrats who initially supported the Stop Terror-Financing and Tax Penalties on American Hostages Act. In an email to the Las Cruces Bulletin,

stemmed from the bill's other provision, which would allow the Internal Revenue Service to suspend penalties and back taxes on people wrongfully detained overseas.

Vasquez and other Democrats backed away from the bill after criticism swelled over its authorization for the U.S. Treasury secretary to strip nonprofits of their tax-exempt status if the secretary deems them "terroristsupporting organizations."

Opponents of the

legislation included the American Civil Liberties Union, NAACP, Greenpeace USA and Planned Parenthood. In a letter to Congress earlier this week, the nonprofits said the bill "creates a high risk of politicized and discriminatory enforcement."

The bill passed the House by a vote of 219-184, mainly on party lines. Fifteen Democrats supported it, and one Republican voted against it. All three New Mexico House members voted against it. The bill now heads to the U.S. Senate.

Former 911 dispatcher charged after posting bomb threats online

BULLETIN REPORT

A Las Cruces man and former 911 dispatcher faces criminal charges after the FBI accused him of threatening to blow up the Doña Ana County Government Center and Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority building.

Jason Rivera, 53, is charged with making multiple terroristic threats against county facilities, according to a U.S. Department of Justice news release. A federal judge ordered that he remain in jail without bond until the case is resolved.

The charges largely stem from a flurry of Facebook posts on April 25, 2024, that led to an evacuation of the Doña Ana County Government Center as the building was swept for bombs.

According to a criminal complaint, Rivera posted threats like "MVRDA 911 center Go outside and stand in the middle of the back lot, it's is heavily wired with explosives, And look up to the sky," and "Dona Ana County Government Center, You allowed a foreign agent to access my trunks MVRDA cifically targeted MVRDA 911 Center is sitting on a lot That lot is heavily wired to explode," among dozens of other posts around 5 a.m. on April 25, 2024.

Rivera's page showed several other posts tagging MVRDA 911 Center as well as Kim Jon Un and several Balkan Republics," the criminal complaint said.

The criminal complaint also noted that Rivera was a former employee from 2009 until 2020.

"Rivera was once disciplined for abuse of sick leave and earned a repu-



tation for walking into new-hire orientations and 'hovering' around new female employees in a way that made them feel

uncomfortable," the complaint said.

The complaint also noted that Rivera was accused of showing up to

the Border Patrol checkpoint on Interstate 10 west of Las Cruces, claiming to have lost his car and wearing no clothes.

Attorneys for Sunland Park residents filed a lawsuit against a troubled southern New Mexico water utility, a former operator and the city and county running it, alleging the sale of arseniccontaminated water to the 19.000+ residents violated their civil rights.

The civil suit filed Wednesday in the 3rd Judicial District Court in Doña Ana County, comes nearly a year after the revelation from state agencies that the Camino Real Regional Utility Authority sent water with "high levels of arsenic" to residents, without telling

The 49-page complaint alleges that the utility, city, county and the utility's former executive director failed in their duty to provide safe drinking water and were



negligent in operating and maintaining the system or alerting the public to contamination from arsenic. The lawsuit claims that

officials ignored the unsafe levels of arsenic in drinking water, failed to correct them and that the failure to notify the public was a means of covering up the unsafe levels.

The complaint also listed out the harms the high levels of arsenic caused to residents, naming corroded pipes, water that made people's eyes burn, a concern that using the water places people at risk, and increased bills when the utility flushed water from the system.

The lawsuit also alleged unfair business practices, saying that people paid to receive clean water were sold water that was "con-

taminated and unsafe." Doña Ana County

declined to comment, citing the pending lawsuit. The city of Sunland Park confirmed the city had received the lawsuit, and also declined to comment.

Emails and calls requesting comment to the Camino Real Regional Utility Authority went unreturned Friday.

The utility's former executive director. Brent Westmoreland, said he has not retained a lawyer when reached by phone, and that he "probably shouldn't get into any pending litigation," declining further comment. Westmoreland led the utility starting in 2015, and resigned abruptly after a series of water quality incidents in November 2023.

One of the newer laws

that impact the case is the 2021 New Mexico Civil Rights Act, which ended qualified immunity as a defense for public officials and allowed people whose state constitutional rights were violated to seek a civil lawsuit.

"When a utility, like CRRUA, has an obligation to provide citizens clean drinking water, not to hide really important details about that water. like that it contains arsenic – that violates the New Mexico Civil Rights Act." said attorney Knut Johnson, an attorney from Singleton Schreiber, a firm representing Sunland Park residents.

The utility has a history of violating federal drinking water arsenic stan-

Avast! Beware of porch pirates this season

Hand-in-hand with the holiday season, especially in the internet era when more and more gifts are purchased online and shipped to households, comes the phenomenon of porch piracy. Nationwide, billions of dollars' worth of merchandise was snatched from doorsteps. Law enforcement agencies report increases in reports of packages stolen near the entrances of homes during the winter holidays.

The Las Cruces Police Department urged vigilance in a news release, warning that increased deliveries, often after sunset, attracts thieves. The LCPD provided tips to help prevent porch piracy as follows:

• Track packages online and try to be home for scheduled deliveries.

• Require a signature for packages sent to residences.

• Leave instructions where packages may be left when scheduling a delivery.

• Request electronic notification of a completed delivery.

• Ask a friend or neighbor to receive packages.

• Create a concealed dropoff zone where packages may be left, unseen from passers-by.

• Have packages shipped to your place of employment or a secure location.

• Arrange for in-store pickup of packages from big box retailers such as Target, Walmart, etc.

• Have packages delivered to a FedEx or UPS store for pickup.

• Install motion-activated porch lights to discourage pirates.

• Further, consider installing a motion-activated security system, such as a doorbell camera that notifies your mobile phone and records video of visitors.

• Watch your neighborhood and report suspicious activity to the police.

• Consider purchasing insurance for packages at the time of purchase, to recover some funds in the event a package is stolen.

dards, the lawsuit stated. It included U.S. Environmental Protection Agency records showing the utility reported that its drinking water violated the arsenic standard every three months for the last decade. The levels were as high as three times the maximum level allowed.

Johnson said laying out a timeline of arsenic violations and prior citations from state regulators as far back as 2016 shows a history of problems with clean drinking water and failures to warn the com-

munity.

"It tells us what all the principal actors in the area knew about, and what they didn't do about it, including telling the public about it for many, many years," he said.

In recent months, the utility has posted tests showing the utility's arsenic levels in the water are below the federal maximum limit, after repairs were made in January to the arsenic treatment equipment. Since April, the tests submitted to the state have been under the arsenic maximum limit.

Currently, attorneys represent five residents, but held a town hall in Sunland Park last Thursday to represent additional people. Nearly 40 people attended the listening session in the Doña Ana Community College lecture hall.

Attorneys are seeking monetary damages but also asking the court to address the longstanding water quality issues.

"We would like to secure compensation for the residents affected by the health and financial impacts of the contaminated water," Johnson said. "And we want to demand corrective action, to ensure safe drinking water for Sunland Park, moving forward."

Fire department urges safe cooking on Thanksgiving

Structure fires tend to increase during Thanksgiving and the winter holiday season, according to fire departments nationwide, and a frequent cause involves cooking accidents.

The Las Cruces Fire Department issued a news release featuring precautions for home cooks in time for Thanksgiving.

• Start cooking projects with clean working areas and surfaces, and keep them maintained.

• Keep the cooking area off-limits to children and pets.

• Remember the saying about "too many chefs." Limit the number of people cooking.

• Avoid loose clothing or jewelry that might interfere with cooking or even catch fire.

• Do not leave cooking areas unattended, indoors or outdoors. Turn burners off if you're leaving the area alone.

Deep-frying hazards

Next, we come to the source of Thanksgiving joy and danger: Deepfrying turkeys.

The LCFD reminds residents never to use a deep-fryer in a garage, on a porch or around any fire hazards. Recommended practice is to place the fryer a minimum of 10 feet from all surfaces, walls and fences.

Additional tips followed: • Check the hose con-





necting the fryer to the propane tank, ensuring

it is free from cracks and long enough to keep safe

distance between the tank and the fryer.

• Ensure the turkey is completely thawed, and

move the turkey to and from the fryer slowly to avoid dropping the bird or upsetting the fryer.

• Cover bare skin while using a fryer.

• Never leave the fryer unattended and check the oil temperature regularly.

• If a fire starts, call 911 immediately.

• Do not attempt to put out a grease or oil fire with water.

• Follow instructions and safety protocols that come with burners and fryers carefully.

• Keep a fire extinguisher on hand and learn how to use it in advance.

Knife safety

The Las Cruces Bulletin adds its own recommendations for safe knife habits, noting that the Consumer Product Safety Commission reports hundreds of thousands of people injured annually by knives during Thanksgiving.

• Carving meats should not be performed amid distractions or after consuming alcohol.

• Dull knives are dangerous knives. Keep them sharp and clean.

• Cut away from, not toward yourself.

• Use a fork or other utensil to hold meats while carving, and keep your other hand clear of the blade.

• Wash knives and put them away promptly, or keep them well away from counter edges or other objects.

Sensitive Santa is a Santa for all

For many families, the holiday season can have a list of must-dos. Welcome the season with the tree lightning in downtown Las Cruces, check. Drive around and look at Christmas lights, check. Book a time to see Santa, check. Often, seeing Santa can bring stress and anxiety to any family, but when a child is on the autism spectrum, more planning and care is needed.

The New Mexico State University Papen-Aprendamos Autism Diagnostic Center will host their first Sensitive Santa meetand-greet on Dec. 3 at the Edgar R. Garrett Speech and Hearing Center, 1405 International Mall on the NMSU campus. This event will provide a sensory friendly environment designed for children on the autism spectrum.

"Our goal for Sensory Santa is for families that have a child that has autism to get to be families, and experience those Christmas traditions. We know that seeing Santa at the mall can be really overwhelming. There's long lines, there's lots of people. You're in big places, it's echoey, it's loud. You have to wait forever. And all of that can be overwhelming. And it makes it so that some children with autism are very, very uncomfortable. That experience of families trying to have one of those

Christmas memories turns into something that is really frustrating," Kali Hall, the center's community outreach coordinator, said.

Unlike traditional meetings with Santa, here families will book a staggered time to meet Santa that is just for their family. If the child feels comfortable to meet Santa and take the photo, they can proceed. However, if the child is wary of Santa or the space, there are options for the child and Santa to gain familiarity.

"It is much more on the terms of the child and the family," Hall began. "If they walk in, Santa's there and they're not quite sure about it, we have some small rooms off to the sides (where) lights are a little dimmer and we've got some really regulatory activities."

Activities such as

Christmas stamps, taking ornaments up and down off of felt trees or creating their own sticker ornament, allow the children to engage in activities that are comforting and creative until they are ready to try meeting Santa again.

Hall said that if the child is still leery, "Santa can go into a room, if the parents are okay, and play stamps with them or kind of have an experience with them... You still have this positive moment of interacting with Santa."

Families will need to reserve a time via email at adcoutreach@nmsu.edu. Space is limited, to ensure families have their dedicated time.

Hall noted that staff and volunteers from the center and the Communication Disorders Department at NMSU will work together to reach their goal of providing a positive experience for the children in whatever way that looks for them. She said they are not the first to offer this event, but their inspiration arose from parents with children on the spectrum sharing their experiences.

In 2019, the Autism Diagnostic Center was established at NMSU. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, they didn't have their two full diagnostic teams until 2021. One of their teams is bilingual. Hall explained their teams consist of a Stage 1 certified autism specialist psychologist and speech language pathologist. Their Stage 1 certification is a special certification through the state of New Mexico allowing them to give the diagnosis of autism recognized through Medicaid. PAADC also has occupational therapists on staff to assist with sensory profiles and supports.

Their main mission is diagnostics, because so many families need that diagnosis to be recognized by Medicaid before they can get autism-specific services. Hall noted that families seeking assistance from their department need a medical referral. Further information is available via adcoutreach@nmsu.edu.

Our refusal to accept the truth has had a lasting impact on Native Americans that continues to this dav.

And so, I'm conflicted. I'm going to stuff myself, then fall asleep on the couch while watching football, like I always do. And I am going to take a moment to give thanks. I just wish we'd stop

In a sane judicial system, that gentleman



would still be in jail, yes? Not here. He was released on his own recognizance after a grand total of 12 hours and 2 minutes, free to return to his apartment and his original victim.

Imagine chasing a dangerous felon for days. weeks or months, capturing him and then finding out he was released almost immediately for being incompetent or otherwise. Most people would become disillusioned with the job very quickly.

But the pay is great, right, so it makes up for the frustration? That would be wrong again. Las Cruces pales in comparison to what other

Mexico offer to new police recruits. New Mexico State Police, for example, are paid nearly twice what our officers receive straight out of the academv. And their facilities are far better than what is available to LCPD. The current LCPD academy building is a modular office building that is probably 30 years old.

communities in New

Crumbling flashing and roof, missing skirt pieces and antiquated HVAC and plumbing issues abound. What message does that obvious failure provide as a first impression to new recruits who have just signed up to put their life on the line for this city? "We don't care about you enough to give you a safe and sanitary facility in which to train."

Is it any wonder that Las Cruces has failed to fill an academy in recent times? Scheduled academies have even been cancelled because of a lack of qualified applicants.

Next week. we will discuss what citizens can do to support our law-enforcement officers, including legislation that must be passed to ensure their dedication to our city is

no longer squandered.

To all the law-enforce-

ment officers and first responders: we love you and appreciate you and are so very thankful for your continued diligence in holding the line for our safety. May your Thanksgiving be filled with family and may you find comfort and encouragement in an eternally grateful community.

he second annual Krampus Recommends Movie Marathon is coming this weekend to Thomas Branigan Memorial Library.

On Saturday, Nov. 30, the Las Cruces Public Libraries will host free screenings of four movies "in honor of Santa's scarier and more violent partner from central European folklore," per a news release.

The first two films are rated PG-13, while the latter two are rated R.

The marathon begins at 10:30 a.m. with "Black Christmas," a 2019 slasher film in which a group of female college students during Christmas break confront a serial killer operating from a secret society on their campus. The film is rated PG-13 and runs 92 minutes.

Krampus himself takes center stage for a 12:15 p.m. showing of "Krampus," a 2015 release about a young boy who unwittingly summons a demonic Christmas guardian who unleashes monsters and mayhem on a family that has lost its holiday spirit. Rated PG-13, the film runs 98 minutes.

A darker comedy follows at 2 p.m. with "Bad Santa," a 2003 film starring Billy Bob Thornton about a con man who works as a department store Saint Nick, but robs the stores he visits. The cast also features Bernie

Gruß vom Krampus! Who is Krampus?

On Dec. 5, the eve of Saint Nicholas Day, in Austria and other places in central and eastern Europe (and, more recently, some American cities) people celebrate Krampusnacht – the night of Krampus.

Typically depicted as a frightening, hairy and horned figure, Krampus is said to accompany the kindly Saint Nicholas (not the red-suited Santa Claus of modern times) on his rounds to visit the homes of children ahead of Christmas. While Saint Nick gives gifts to children who have been well behaved, legends say Krampus swats naughty children with a birch rod or scares them into better habits. Sometimes he rattles chains or rings loud bells. In older legends, he may even stuff the naughtiest children into his sack and spirit them away. (Succeeding generations softened Krampus a bit.)

Celebrants today participate in "Krampuslaufs," donning horned masks, cowls and related costumes and marching in parades with drumming and clanging bells, generally raising a racket and making mischief. Traditionally, Saint Nicholas has a presence here as well, watching over his counterpart.

Some also send Krampus-themed holiday cards called Krampuskarten, bearing the German message, "Gruß vom Krampus," or "Greetings from Krampus!"



Even without an "Idol" win, Hudson's career skyrocketed in the aftermath of her performances on that program. Cast as Effie White in the 2006 movie of the stage hit "Dreamgirls," she won an Oscar for best supporting actress for that film debut (Barrino reportedly was up for the role as well). After that came more movie work for Hudson — in programs such as "Sex and the City," "The Secret Life of Bees" (2008) and "Winnie Mandela" (2011) — and the release of her eponymous debut album, which yielded the singles "Spotlight," "If This Isn't Love" and Giving Myself." She won a Grammy Award for Best R&B Album for the release.

Food is also part of the scene, with green chile cheeseburgers, baked goods and local kombucha" among the offerings. "H Tea O" will also be on hand to give away free drinks to the first 60 guests.

"I think the goal here is to get more people to watch the videos and, hopefully, to share them," said Robson. "The videos are to help promote the musicians, so you can see how they feed back into each other. It's turning into a really special thing. This project and my love of filming here, is what keeps me here. If it works for me, maybe it will help keep other creative people here."

New Mexico agency seeks \$50M for insurance program

New Mexico's insurance regulator is asking lawmakers for \$50 million to expand what its staff calls its "insurer of last resort," as homeowners across the state report private property insurers continue to cancel their policies, refuse to renew them or hike up premium prices.

The Office of the Superintendent of Insurance is seeking the one-time appropriation at next year's legislative session, as it rolls out a pilot program increasing coverage in Lincoln County. That area was hit hard by fire and floods this year.

The money would allow the state to increase payouts for property owners from its state-run insurance company, which they said has proved a lifeline for property owners seeking to rebuild or stay insured in fire-prone areas.

The OSI has had a staterun insurance program, known as the Fair Access to Insurance Requirements, or FAIR Plan, since 1969. The nonprofit insurance organization is there for New Mexicans who are unable to secure insurance in the normal marketplace.

Recipients have to be denied by two private insurers to qualify, according to Alice Kane, the state superintendent of insurance.

A one-time infusion of \$50 million would represent a huge increase in funding for the nonprofit, which is largely funded by premiums. It has operated off of about \$4.5 million in revenues in recent years, according to recent tax filings. The program also was slightly in the red last year, generating \$4.6 million in revenues - mostly premiums and spending a little more than \$5 million, including \$3.7 million in claims.

The program still has about \$9.8 million in assets, despite the small loss, according to its filings.

The OSI did not respond to a request last week from Source New Mexico for more details on how an expanded FAIR Plan would work

The current program caps payouts at \$350,000 for homes and \$1 million for commercial properties, Kane told lawmakers at a meeting of the Legislative Finance Committee on Thursday.

With the help of the additional funding, Kane said, an expanded FAIR Plan could increase coverage to \$1 million for homes and \$2 million for commercial properties. It would also serve as a "backstop" in case a catastrophe occurs before the state can collect enough in premiums to make the program sustainable.

That increase in coverage makes sense given the increase in home prices, Kane said. While \$250,000 might have paid for an "amazing house" back in the 70s and 80s, "the numbers have gone up dramatically" since then, she said.

More than 1,000 homes were destroyed due to the South Fork and Salt fires and ensuing floods this summer, according to local estimates. Some residents have reported difficulty finding any private insurance coverage as they seek mortgages to rebuild.

Federal mortgage providers like Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac accept New Mexico's FAIR plan, Kane said, which is a big help for those trying to rebuild.

It's unclear how many policies across the state have been canceled or were subject to huge price hikes, but the office said the number has increased statewide.

The office has circulated a handout showing some counties saw huge increases in home insurance premiums between 2020 and 2023, ranging between 41 percent and 47 percent in Hidalgo, Roosevelt and Curry counties. On average, New Mexico premiums increased by 16 percent in the same time period, and the average annual premium is \$1,817.

Despite the uptick in cancellations and nonrenewals, insurance companies remain largely profitable in New Mexico, according to the OSI. Still, insurers here did have losses in 2016, 2017 and 2022. The two biggest wildfires in state history occurred in 2022.

Nationally, insurers have paid out more in claims than they received in premiums over the last decade, according to the OSI.




open to public, with plans for live music, prizes, food trucks, refreshments and family-friendly activities.

828 Productions hiring post-production workers

828 Productions, the full-service film and production company establishing Las Cruces as its headquarters, recently announced it is hiring post-production workers, with a target of 12 hires by mid-2025 - and made sure to extend that welcome to recent college graduates.

The company announced plans to relocate to Las Cruces in 2022 and invest \$75 million in building a soundstage, studio lots, other production

and training facilities and business offices spanning three locations in town. Those locations include a property dominated by a former cotton gin located off of S. Compress Road near Amador Avenue: production and training facilities on S. Miranda Avenue: and business offices on S. Church Street downtown.

It also secured pledges of millions in public money: The state committed \$3 million through the Local Economic Development Act, based on a promise the company would employ 100 people

by the end of 2029. Last December, the city of Las Cruces approved \$2.8 million, on top of \$900,000 in previously-allocated capital outlay, to support construction and building renovations.

Construction was slated to begin as soon as February 2024, according to presentations 828 executives made to the city council. 828's manager of operations and public affairs, Jonathon Sepp. told the Las Cruces Bulletin, "We have started construction," but did not provide any further detail.

There may not be visible signs of major construction, but 828 is in operation, involved in financing and a full range of production services for the film industry including postproduction. "Post" refers to the extensive stage of production after principal photography is complete, including editing of footage, sound design and mixing, visual effects, musical scoring, titles and credits, and more.

"While we remain focused on bringing new productions to the state, we need to ensure that we're servicing the post side of things, too, and we are doing that right here in Las Cruces," 828 CEO Todd Lundbohm stated in a news release.

828 Productions announced its New Mexico move after Netflix and NBC Universal revealed their own major investments in the state. Unlike them, however, 828 set its sights on southern New Mexico rather than the Albuquerque region.

Local filmmakers, in-

cluding faculty members of New Mexico State University and Doña Ana Community College, have advocated for building an infrastructure supporting the local film and television industry, seeding opportunities for graduates

Endangered species lawsuit settled

Thirty years after being declared endangered, the Rio Grande silvery minnow has reeled in an incremental victory.

Conservation group WildEarth Guardians, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Bureau of Reclamation and the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District reached a settlement last week in a 2022 lawsuit that alleged violations of the Endangered Species Act.

A 2016 assessment, known as a biological opinion, on the impact of river management on threatened and endangered species was insufficient to ensure protection of the silvery minnow and other species that rely on the river, said Daniel Timmons, wild rivers program director for WildEarth Guardians.

Now, the groups will have to go back to the drawing board and

come up with a new biological opinion by 2028, this time further taking into account climate change and the impact of a dry river on vulnerable species such as the silvery minnow and riverdwelling birds like the southwestern willow flycatcher and the vellow-billed cuckoo.

"We remain extremely concerned by the plight of the species," Timmons said. "We're encouraged by the conversations with the agencies and hope that there is a path forward to protect these species in a meaningful way and do it in a more collaborative way going forward ... finding a path to really restore a living Rio Grande."

Requests for comment to the bureau, fish and wildlife service and the conservancy district about the impact of the settlement on their respective agencies were not immediately returned.

The silvery min-

now was declared endangered in 1994. It's a boom-or-bust species, Timmons said, but while there have been a few good spawning years since 1994, there has been scant population growth.

The 2016 biological opinion, which acknowledged proposed actions were likely to affect the silvery minnow and other species, mandated the density of the silvery minnow population not drop below 0.3 fish per 328-feet squared in two out of 15 years. The population is measured in October.

The population dropped below that threshold in 2018 and 2020, said Timmons, then again in 2021 and 2022, when historically low river flows caused the river to run dry in areas around Albuquerque. That should have automatically triggered a consultation process, Timmons said – but didn't.

The summit is Dec. 3, 2024, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum.

They're picking up new techniques, collaborating effectively with teams, and embracing constructive feedback."



SPORTS Boxing program raises generations

The quiet darkness outside the Sammy Burke Youth Boxing Center on this Wednesday night conceals the bright, enthusiastic activity taking place inside the old building on Solano Drive.

Nearly 40 participants, ranging in age from 8 to 23, work on their craft under the watchful eyes of volunteer coaches.

The city of Las Cruces and the Burke family helped create the Police Athletic League Boxing

Club in 1972 and Louie Burke was among the first and white, I come to team members. He went on to stardom as a worldrated contender and an ESPN champion in the late 1970s and early 1980s. Burke recently retired after 25 years with the Las Cruces Fire Department. Through the years, he has maintained his connection to the program, training all levels: from beginners to champions such as Austin Trout.

shop, a church. This has been a legacy for our family. It's not just about the competition. There's something deeper to it. This program has done

so much for the community and helped so many people."

The program found a home in its current location in 1986 and in 2001. the gym was named in honor of Louie's father. Sammy Burke. Louie's brother, Rocky, also a former boxer and referee. serves on the program's board of directors.

The gym has two elevated boxing rings and punching bags of all sizes and shapes. The walls are decorated with flags, promotional posters of past events and iconic boxing photographs. The young boxers go through hand and foot drills in groups after going for a run, and get in some individual work on the bags.

The leader in group drills is 21-year-old Alvaro Garcia, whose story

inspires everyone in the gym, including the coaches. Garcia joined the club about five years ago after a series of tragic events in his life. He had no boxing experience and weighed 316 pounds.

Garcia said the program and the gym "give color to my life."

"When days are black and white, I come to the gym and it turns to color," he said. "Here, I learn key factors in what it means to be a man. Discipline. Hard work. It's not talent; it's work ethic. In this sport, whoever gives the most, gets the most out of it."

Garcia, a college student now, lost 140 pounds and last year won the state Golden Gloves championship.

"Boxing does attract a lot of at-risk kids and lower-income people,"

Burke said. "It gives them an avenue to move forward. A lot of kids get inspired here and Alvaro is a perfect example. He inspires me, too."

At 97 pounds, 16-yearold Nysse Rivera is ranked sixth in the nation in her weight class after two years at the gym. "I love doing this so much," she said. "I really like the discipline that boxing teaches you."

Osvaldo Villa, a 13-yearold with two years of boxing experience, said the sport and the program have helped him learn to concentrate in school and be a better student. Sixteen-year-old Jorge Corral has been boxing for three years, but moved to the PAL gym a year ago to work specifically with Burke. "The younger kids are learning the basics here," Jorge said. "It's a great environment for teaching."

Burke said alumni from the PAL boxing club have gone on to become lawyers, engineers and business leaders. Many of them continue to support the program to help make a difference.

"And I couldn't do this without the help of our volunteer coaches," he said. "They make this work and they deserve a lot of praise. We've never had this many kids in the program."

PGA Tour and Saudi PIF negotiations

On June 6, 2023, the PGA Tour and the Saudi Public Investment Fund. the bankroll for LIV golf, signed a "framework agreement" aimed at some sort of merger, the "details" of which were to be ironed out through negotiations.

It's now been almost a year and a half and those details still have not been worked out and no unification is forthcoming. In the meantime, the PGA Tour Enterprises, a new title and now for-profit, was created with the help of a \$1.5 billion initial investment from Strategic Sports Group.

The battle for control of professional golf began in 2022 when the Saudi PIF

backed the upstart LIV golf league, headed by Greg Norman. With virtually unlimited funds, the LIV people basically bought PGA Tour players. LIV golf is concluding its third year of tournaments.

going negotiations, PGA Tour Commissioner Jav Monahan has said, "There are a lot of different factors at play, but nobody who is having the conversation is unaware of the complexity."

Speaking of the on-

None of those conversations have been made public, but one aspect is obvious: PIF seeks to keep team golf, while the PGA Tour hates it. Ron Green.

Jr., writing for GlobalGolf-Post.com, sees it this way:

"It's the money. the sense of greed,

the air of entitlement that has poisoned fans. It has shown in lagging television ratings and a general lethargy toward two sides who seem intent on getting

what they want more than giving those paying the freight what they want."

What is most interesting to me, in terms of how pro golf has become disrupted, is the background of the roots of LIV golf starting with Greg Norman. That history has been wonderfully explained by Hughes Norton, who was Tiger

Woods' and Greg Norman's agent in the 1980's and '90's.

Norton explains in his 2024 tell-all book, "Rainmaker," that Norman got the idea of a world tour from International Management Group founder Mark McCormack. In 1994 Norman, together with John Montgomery, the Tour's tournament organizer, pitched the whole idea to the PGA Tour players who were playing the Shark Shootout at the time. Arnold Palmer, a special invitee, was in the room. At the end of his spiel, Norman says, "I'd be interested in your reaction." After a pause Arnold stands up and says, "Greg, how many times do you think Jack (Nicklaus) and Gary (Player) and I were approached with this same idea over the years? It didn't work then, we shot it down, and it's not going to work this time for me. I'm never going support something that's bad for the fellas." Arnold then walked out of the room.

Norton reports that Norman was "famous for holding grudges." Three decades later, Norman had his chance as Saudi money appeared.

When the "framework agreement" was announced in June 2023, I immediately thought LIV golf was finished and Norman would disappear. I found the whole idea of a 54-hole professional golf

tournament anathema, and their slogan, "Pro golf, only louder," was foul. I said at the time "you can't buy a golf game, but you sure can buy a golfer," which is what the Saudi's did, poaching all the Tour players.

There are plenty of high quality, talented, loyal players on the PGA Tour worth watching. What does worry me is that the PGA Tour/PIF negotiations might result in some diluted compromise, including a LIV format. It would be like pouring fine wine into old wineskins. As a game, golf has never been in a better spot. As a professional sport, it has never been more fractured. Green writes.
