

"This exhibition showcases the artistry of our region while inspiring a deeper connection to the wildlife that makes the Mesilla Valley such






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# 'Driving While Black'

Motorists in Southern New Mexico found respite in the Green Book during the height of Jim Crow

lack motorists traveling across Mexico's highways during Jim Crow faced indignities most of us can't imagine. Hotels and motels catered almost exclusively to white people, and even some gas stations refused to sell to anybody else.

But Victor Hugo Green, a postal worker from Harlem, made the journey a little easier for thousands of travelers when ist home" operated by R. he published "The Negro Motorist Green-Book," a

guide to motels, restaurants and service stations that were friendly toward black people.

The "Green Book," as it was known, became an indispensable resource for travelers in search of rest, refreshments and gas. Along the historic Highway 80 through New Mexico, only two locations, one in Las Cruces and one in Lordsburg, would accommodate black motorists.

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

It was located a mile east of downtown on Motel Drive and provided a "direct route to and from the West Coast," the guide said.

The Hightower became a welcome respite for travelers who had been turned away from

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

# **Silver City Celebrates Its Unique Territorial Charter**

ilver City remains the only municipality in New Mexico operating under its original 146-yearold charter. History of the Territorial Charter is celebrated annually on February 15th.

publications, this charter which precedes statehood by 34 years was due to conflict between early settlers and the New Mexico Territorial Legislature. 1978. Finally, on February 15, 2020, Being denied equal representation by the corrupt "Santa Fe Gang," a rebellion resulted, with settlers threatening then the Town of Silver City has sponto secede from the New Mexico Territory and join the Arizona Territory.

The early residents knew they needed a town charter to build their community the way they needed it. Santa Fe relented and granted Silver City its own charter on February 15, 1878. The self-governing charter provided

the ability to incorporate as a town, set taxes, establish free public schools and - as described in an Albuquerque newspaper – become "the only real American town in New Mexico." The newspaper added that it was also "the liveliest and most enterprising."

Over the years, the community has As stated by the Silver City Museum celebrated this rich heritage in a variety of ways. First with semi-Centennial celebrations in 1927 and 1928. Frontier Days in the 1960's and a Centennial in Mayor Ken Ladner declared February 15 as Territorial Charter Day. Since sored events celebrating this rich historv. which includes a Territorial Charter Ball, historical re-enactments, and a burlesque baseball game.



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# Legacy of the Buffalo Soldiers

he Civil War ended. Troops went home, among them nearly 145,000 African Americans. But Confederate white people did not want armed former slaves roaming the south. Something had to be done. Instead of trying to disarm these veterans, the Army organized new regiments and sent the men west to defend sparse, yet rapidly expanding, settlements. It was an "out of sight. out of mind" solution, and it worked well. Thus, the legacy of the Buffalo Soldier was born.

In 1866, Congress created five all-black regi-

ments — the 9th and 10th Cavalry and the 24th. 25th, and 38th Infantry. No one knows for certain where the name Buffalo Soldier came from. Some believed Plains Indians first used it. They saw the dark skin and curly hair and thought the men resembled their sacred buffalo. Others said it was because black troopers stood and fought long after white regiments retreated. The Indians thought them ferocious and brave, traits they respected. So, Buffalo Soldier was a name of high praise.

Nearly 4,000 Buffalo Soldiers served at 11 frontier forts, established


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The 9th Cavalry Band was invited by Santa Fe's Music Committee to perform at Fourth of July festivities in 1880. Credit: National Park Service

along the length of New Mexico like a string of pearls. The first black troops arrived at Fort Selden in 1866. There were no African American officers, and black troopers faced extreme racial prejudice from the Army establishment. To break the monotony of routine, the Army frequently rotated troops. But troopers scarcely had time to learn the land and who their enemies were before they were moved and had to start over.

Life at Fort Selden was never easy. When not standing guard or on patrol - always on horseback and vear-around. often for a week or two

keep their gear in good condition. Historic letters say food was, at best ... marginal.

They built roads and other infrastructure. guarded the mail, and protected settlers playing significant roles. They engaged Chief Victorio in Hembrillo Canyon Two remain alive; both near Victorio Peak on the west side of today's White Sands Missile Range. They fought the Apache in Dog Canyon, where the Indians not only fired on them but dropped large rocks from above. By the time the troopers reached the ridge line, like true guerrilla fighters, the Apache were gone.

Buffalo Soldiers fought

Wars. They contributed to maintaining border security during the Mexican Revolution. Black regiments were excluded from WWI's American Expeditionary Force because of President Wilson's racist policies. Instead, they fought under French command, the first time ever American troops were controlled by a foreign power.

During World War II, the Army established the 92nd Infantry Division for African American troops. They fought in Europe. The original 25th Infantry served in the Pacific. When the Army ended segregation in 1951, those who had served as Buffalo Soldiers were allowed to retain that distinction. centenarians. Rov Caldwell, born 1922, had

been an assistant deputy warder at New York's Rikers Island. Marshall Allen, born 1924, an avantguard jazz musician, released his latest album just last November.

# **Talent of Tin:** The Life and Art of Richard Gabriel Jr.

lossy and striking, with countless designs of ornamentation, tinwork is a distinct art. In New Mexico, it is especially cherished as a form of expression that is intimately connected to the confluences of its unique history.

As the U.S. Cavalry moved westward on the Santa Fe Trail in the 1840s, it hauled all of life's necessities for its members. Many of these supply items, such as lantern oil, were stored in tin cans. After the items were transferred or emptied, the giant square tin cans were discarded.

"To the local Hispanic population, it looked like silver," said Spanish artist and tin worker Richard Gabriel Jr. "It's not silver. But they realized that they could make beautiful stuff out of it."

beautify a host of old and new government buildings. The tin light fixtures still in use at Bandelier National Monument's visitor center are an example.

Still, the number of artists

who work primarily with tin of late is relatively low compared to those engaged in other mediums. Gabriel estimates there are about 20 to 30 tin workers. For those that do exist, he said. their primary audience is in New Mexico. "Here it is a traditional art, which makes it doubly interesting to people."

Chances are quite high that if someone owns an example of tinware made in New Mexico, that piece was made by Gabriel. At the peak of his production, he was creating more than 10,000 pieces annually - mostly "bread and butter" ornaments, but also more intricate pieces, such as three-dimensional birdhouses handsomely embellished mirrors, candleholders, and light fixtures.

At one point, he said, his work could be found on sale in about 30 stores, but now he supplies only a few, all in Santa Fe. They include A Christmas Store, Sunwest on the Plaza, and Leslie Flynt. A resident of Tijeras since the late 1990s. Gabriel teaches tinwork class-



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es at Santa Fe Community College, where he is regarded as a living almanac and instruction manual of the art form. "I would like to pass it on to as many people as I can to keep it from dying," he said.

"I always tell people that I could teach tin in five minutes," he said. "Everybody can take a mallet and cut. There are not a lot of steps to remember and very simple tasks. You have to have the right tools to punch. It is not like learning photography. There is no high technical ability."

Perhaps that's just Gabriel's soft-spoken, unassuming temperament on display. In truth, tinwork is deceptively challenging,

and even the simplest tasks of cutting, punching and scoring requires rapt attention.

Working almost exclusively with galvanized steel (as opposed to the more expensive canning tin) and occasionally with a rusty old piece of scrap, Gabriel said that there are two ways of looking at what you can do with tin: You could let your imagination run wild or choose to keep it simple.

"Both are good, and there is room for both," he said. "It just depends on how involved you want to be. Refining your technique into something special takes time and practice."
