DOÑA ANA COUNTY LEADERS CELEBRATE PROGRESS AT STATE OF THE COUNTY ADDRESS







Doña Ana County officials delivered an upbeat and optimistic State of the County Address on Tuesday, highlighting recent achievements and outlining strategic goals that align with the county's long-term planning document. The event featured remarks from County Commissioner Christopher Schaljo-Hernandez, County Manager Scott Andrews and Assistant County Managers Johnathan Macias, Steven Lopez and Deb Weir.

Doña Ana County highlights the road forward

Doña Ana County held a state of the county address for the first time in more than a decade to highlight accomplishments and future projects.

Doña Ana County Commission Chair Christopher Schaljo-Hernandez delivered opening remarks and said the county intends to make this State of the County address an an-

nual event going forward. He introduced Doña Ana Andrews, who has been at his job for less than a year after a national search the county undertook in 2024.

Schalio-Hernandez talked about the county's strategic plan, adopted in 2023, which creates seven areas of concern for county officials and departments. They include issues such as humane housing and basic needs

for health and safety.

Andrews called the County Manager Scott county staff "resilient." One of the projects under way for the county that Andrews highlighted is an ice-skating rink expected to go in at the county Fairgrounds to be open around Thanksgiving through the holidays until around Valentine's Day, Andrews said.

NMSU international students part of Trump visa reversal

New Mexico State University international students have regained their visas and are now able to remain legally in the U.S. after the Trump administration reversed its decision to revoke visas held by students studying at colleges across the U.S.

The Trump administration reversed its decision late last week to put legally documented international students studying at U.S. universities into legal limbo. Many of the international students who lost their visas earlier in April are now seeing their legal status restored.

That includes the nine international students studying at NMSU who lost their visas as of April 11. Amanda Bradford.

spokesperson for NMSU, told the Bulletin that, as of April 30, the nine in question have seen their visa status restored.

While officials at NMSU said the land-grant college was not aware of any connection between the federal action and any protests or campaigns the nine participated in, some affected students across the U.S. appear to have been targeted because they participated in campus protests or incurred minor driving tickets.

Bradford said that the support.

nine international NMSU students were not disenrolled when they lost their visas a few weeks ago nor did the federal action impact their academic standing. Although the visa revocation came in the middle of the semester, Bradford said NMSU's Office of International Students and Scholar Services reached out to each student. She said the university set up meetings to talk to the affected students and provided additional information and resources, including immigration attorney contacts.

Bradford said NMSUs Student Assistance Services Office also reached out to the nine international students to help them complete the current semester and offered academic and counseling

Founder of Alma d'Arte to be honored Friday

Alma d'Arte Charter High School is honoring its founder, Irene Oliver-Lewis on Friday, May 9th by renaming its historic 1941 building the Irene Oliver-Lewis Center for the Arts.

The fundraiser event labor. will be held at 402 W. Court Avenue and will include music, food and presentations from a variety of officials. Dr. Adam Amador, the school's principal, said the children who attend Alma d'Arte would not have the opportunities to learn and grow as artists anywhere else.

Oliver-Lewis is a theatre artist who grew up in Las Cruces in the Mesquite Historical District. She left Las Cruces in 1981 to run a bilingual theatre company in Albuquerque and continued that work until the mid-1990s when she decided to return to her hometown.

It was then she began volunteering to turn the abandoned Court Junior High School building into a youth center that would offer physical activity and arts activities for at-risk children. Oliver-Lewis told the Bulletin she worked at raising money. but she also did hands-on

To fully renovate the building cost \$13 million in capital outlay dollars and ten years of work, Oliver-Lewis said.

By then, the idea of turning the vouth center into a charter school had already taken hold. Oliver-Lewis said the youth center had begun teaching writing and visual arts to about 20 at-risk children three times a week. Oliver-Lewis said one of the students said, "this ought to be our school all the time," and the idea stuck.

"That's how it started." Oliver-Lewis said.

Oliver-Lewis said she began learning how to

start a charter school and when it became Alma d'Arte Charter High School in 2004, the school

started with 127 children.

Oliver-Lewis said it was on Friday, she emphasized always intended to be a small school.

Even as Oliver-Lewis gets ready to be honored

He talked of some of Alma d'Arte's successes. which includes graduates who have gone on to have creative careers. He said that is the legacy of Oliver-Lewis.

More than 400 people gathered the morning of Thursday, May 1 for the 17th annual Lou & Mary Breakfast, a record-breaking event for the Boys & Girls Club of Las Cruces held at the New Mexico Farm & Ranch Heritage Museum.

Two shining examples of courage took the stage early. Soledad Hibner, the 2025 New Mexico Junior Youth of the Year, and Brayden Gantzler, the 2025 Youth of the Year. shared emotional stories of how the Club became a stabilizing force in their lives during uncertain times. Both described the Club as their anchor, offering guidance, safety, and a place to dream big.

Soledad confidently spoke of her goal to become an astronaut and serve as a role model for others, particularly young girls. Brayden followed with his aspiration to become a marine biologist. He shared how he went from survivor to someone who thrives finding mentorship in helping learn to trust others and develop a desire to "help those who can't help themselves."

Las Cruces Utilities Water Conservation "Let's water smart!"

"Let's water smart!"

That's what City of Las Cruces Utilities Department (Utilities) Water Conservation Coordinator, Rhonda K. Diaz, advises year-round, and especially during the City's warm season, April 1st through September 30th.

Las Cruces' first Water Conservation Ordinance was adopted by the City Council in 1994 and is administered by Utilities' Water Conservation program. The ordinance sets out these outdoor watering restrictions during the summer months for all customers in the City:

- Residents of street addresses that end in even numbers (0, 2, 4, 6, 8) may water on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.
- Residents of street addresses that end in odd numbers (1, 3, 5, 7, 9) may

water on Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays.

- Watering is not allowed on Mondays. These restrictions keep the City's water system from being overloaded by everyone watering on the same day.
- No outdoor watering is allowed 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. on any day, April 1st through September 30th, due to water evaporating so quickly during hot summer days.

Allowing water to flow from your property onto adjacent property or into the street is a violation of the ordinance, and so is excessive watering of outdoor vegetation so that water ponds on your property. If you see water being wasted, call the Water Waste Hotline 24/7 at 575-528-4444 and leave the location or address and the date and time of the violation.

You can request a variance to the Water Conservation Ordinance, if, for example, you have put in sod or planted grass or other plant material from seed that requires daily watering to become established. Call 575-528-3549 or email ConserveWater@LasCruces.gov to request a variance. You can also call that number to get help in reducing your water usage.

Here's a great tip from Diaz to prevent overwatering: most Bermuda lawns require about one inch of water each week in summer, and that's what a five-ounce tuna can holds. Place an empty tuna can in your lawn's sprinkler zone, see how long it takes to fill up, and that's the total amount of time you need to water your lawn each week.

9 a.m. to noon, Tuesday, May 13, 2025, for coffee and pastries, and a walk through Utilities' outdoor demonstration garden at 680 N. Motel Blvd. Learn how to plant and maintain a garden in the desert that includes beautiful, blooming, healthy plants that thrive with efficient irrigation and free local compost. You can also get a free water-wise plant and Utilities compost made at Foothills Landfill and Jacob Hands Wastewater Treatment Facility. Experts will be on hand to answer your questions about trees, plants, weeds, insects and diseases.

Sister Beth Daddio felt called to help homeless children

Sister Beth Daddio talks modestly about her role in helping homeless children in Las Cru-

"I was called to this lifestyle." she said. "I continue to choose it, to help those in need, especially children. Every day, I wake up with this desire to just do that. It's just become a part of who I am. I've been answering this call for 65 years."

Sister Beth, who will turn 85 later this year, is one of the founders of Jardin de los Niños. a childcare and education center for homeless and near homeless children and families designed to provide a caring environment to help these vulnerable kids develop resiliency skills.

Sister Beth also helped to found Tutti Bambini, a children's store that provides funding through in-house sales and fundraising to local organizations that support at-risk youth. Sister Beth still works there.

Sister Beth and the late Sister Anna Waldschmitt started Jardin de los Niños at Peace Lutheran Church in 1995.

"Sister Anna and I knew it was needed." Sister Beth said.

Sister Beth felt called to enter the Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration convent in Colorado Springs after graduating from high school in Albuquerque. She then transferred to her present community, the Sisters for Christian Community, where she has been a member for more than 40 years.

A native of Maryland, Sister of Hope campus in 2001 and has

Jardin de los Niños moved to the Mesilla Valley Community a five-star rating. The school recently announced plans to expand its service area to Hatch.

As Jardin de los Niños began to flourish, Sister Beth said she realized the community needed a store for children.

When a building adjacent to La Tienda de Jardin (Jardin de los Niños' used clothing store for men and women) became vacant in 2013, Sister Beth leased the building, bought secondhand shelves and counters from a sporting goods store that had closed, found a welder to customize the hardware for the new space and became the first manager of Tutti Bambini, a nonprofit that sells gently used children's clothing, stuffed animals and toys, books, furniture and more, at 300 El Molina Blvd.

Tutti Bambini works with

31 nonprofit agencies to help families with young children, regardless of their ability to pay. Everyone who comes into the store is treated with the same kindness and respect, whether they have cash in hand or a voucher from a local agency, said Sister Beth.

In addition to a small paid staff, Tutti Bambini has 24 volunteers "who are very committed," she said. But, the store could always use more volunteers.

She said Tutti Bambini tries to help women who are raising small children and need more support.

"It's very much a part of me," she said. It's the passion, the driving force to leave this a better world than I found it. I do anything I can to help children's lives be better.

OMDP faces tougher challenge

Here we go again.

In 2017 President Donald Trump sent Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke to New Mexico to consider revoking or altering the status of the Organ Mountains-Desert Peaks National Monument. Monument supporters rolled out the red carpet. Zinke toured the OMDP on horseback and had a rustic photo of himself plastered all over the front page of the newspaper. And it worked. Zinke recommended that other

stead. Supporters of the OMDP felt like they had dodged a bullet, and it was now clear sailing ahead.

Now, the OMDP is reportedly again on the chopping block. And this time flattery may not be enough to save it.

Nothing is official yet, but a Washington Post story reports that the Trump administration is again considering changes to the monument, such as shrinking its boundaries and allowing for gas and oil production.

The Bureau of Land Management, which is responsible for the monument, released its Resource Management Plan earlier this year. The plan represents several years of careful study along with numerous hours of public input. It attempts to strike monuments be closed in- the right balance between

recreation and economic opened, the local opposidevelopment, while making conservation of the monument its top priority.

As we have seen these last 100 days, this Trump administration has no interest in balance. During the opening days of his first administration. Donald Trump was still feeling it's been nothing but slash and burn.

When the monument was first proposed, there was a vigorous effort led by local law enforcement to oppose it. Public lands are one of our country's great equalizers. It doesn't matter how much money you have - a billionaire and a bus driver both get the same access to our parks, deserts, rivers and forests. Each one of us owns these lands together. They are literally America's common ground.

Like so many Americans, I've built a life around public lands – exploring them, defending them and working to ensure they remain open to all. From my early days in Montana to leading the Bureau of Land Management and now as president of The Wilderness Society, I've seen what these places mean to people. And I've never seen a threat to them as serious and shocking as the one we face right now.

For weeks, there have been indications that the Republican-controlled Congress was going to sell off chunks of this priceless shared heritage to pay for tax cuts for the ultrawealthy. Not too long ago,

Surely, they wouldn't auction this extraordinary legacy of clean air, clean water and open spaces as a one-time favor to donors and corporations?

But earlier this month, the Senate proved just how serious they were about it. Democrats offered an amendment that would block selling off our public lands in the budget bill. The vote failed along party lines, with just two Republicans voting to oppose a sell-off. Last summer, I happened upon a young couple on a large rock outcrop overlooking a wilderness in Oregon. They had driven all the way from the Midwest to take in the view. I offered to snap a photo for them and then found myself documenting a remarkable moment as he dropped to one knee, pulled out a ring, and wove the magnificent scenery into the intimacy of his proposal. New Mexican borderlands recently transferred from the Bureau of Land Management to the U.S. Army hold many treasures.

I became familiar with parts of these spectacularly lonely reaches of Chihuahuan desert nearly 40 vears ago while attending New Mexico State University. A much older friend of mine had the privilege of patrolling the expansive stretches of sun-drenched scrub as a BLM volunteer. He extended an open invitation for me to spend days riding along with him in a battered pickup whenever I desired.

Even in that era of Reagan and Bush, we'd encounter groups of migrants making their way north across the rugged landscape wearing makeshift flip-flops fashioned from strips of discarded tire tread and rags of faded clothing. BLM's official guidance was avoidance, but sometimes we'd unavoidably come across a group huddling in the shade of a long-dry arroyo bank next to the primitive two-track we were navigating in low gear.

collective refusal to deal with the immigration issue for as long as I can recall.

Ironically, the Trump administration is not the first to militarize our borderlands. Democrat Woodrow Wilson did the same thing back in 1916 in response to Mexican revolutionary Francisco "Pancho" Villa's attack on the village of Columbus, which seems to have preserved much of its outlaw heritage throughout the past century.

Feds announce 'largest fentanyl bust' in U.S. history

The U.S. government on Tuesday announced drug trafficking and conspiracy charges against 17 people at least six in New Mexico – in what U.S. Attorney General Pamela Bondi is calling the "largest fentanyl bust in our nation's history."

At a news conference in Washington D.C., U.S. Attorney for the District of New Mexico Ryan Ellison said prosecutors have filed conspiracy, illicit fentanyl distribution, firearms and immigration charges as a result of the bust.

He also said the alleged drug trafficking organization is "one of the largest and most dangerous fentanyl operations in United States history" – spanning New Mexico, Arizona, Ne-

vada and Utah – and distributes drugs "throughout Mexico defendants David the western United States."

"We will not tolerate those who profit from poisoning American citizens," Ellison said.

Bondi said the organization is affiliated with the Sinaloa Cartel operating out of Mexico, and when authorities arrested its alleged leader. Heriberto Salazar Amaya, they found millions of dollars in cash and vehicles. She said he "insulated himself" from the drugs, which agents found in Albuquerque, location. Phoenix and Utah.

Asked for specifics on how the defendants were captured, Bondi said the investigation is ongoing and she won't reveal police sources or methods.

In court records, two Drug Enforcement Administration special agents

characterized three New Anesi, Vincent Montova and Francisco Garcia as "high-volume drug traffickers" in the Albuquerque area, and Phillip Lovato as a "significant customer" in Santa Fe.

They also named Roberta Herrera as Montoya's significant other "who has been observed participating in drug transactions" with him, and allege that Misael Lopez-Rubio rented out a storage unit in Albuquerque to use as a stash

DEA Acting Administrator Robert Murphy noted that the organization's drug distribution had "probably caused" someone to die.

Since 2018, New Mexico has experienced a dramatic increase in drug overdose deaths associated

with prescription drug use and, more recently, use of illicit fentanyl, according to the state Department of Health. Overall, deaths in the state attributed to drug overdose have fallen in the last two years.

Overall, authorities seized 11.5 kilograms of fentanyl powder; approximately \$4.4 million in cash; approximately 79 pounds tiate with those who are of methamphetamine; approximately 7.5 kilograms of cocaine; approximately 4.5 kilograms of heroin; approximately 41 firearms; and approximately 4.1 million fentanyl pills, according to court records.

Ellison said in Albuquerque alone, police found 2.7 million fentanyl pills; 11.5 kilograms of "concentrated fentanyl powder;" seven pounds of methamphetamine; "mul-

and cocaine;" 41 firearms; more than \$600,000 in cash and "numerous luxury vehicles."

"When we catch you all of these individuals, if convicted, we will put you behind bars." Bondi said. "There will be no negotiating, and we will lock you up for as long as humanly possible. We will not negokilling our family members including brothers, sisters, daughters, sons, parents, friends."

DOJ prosecuting, not deporting, defendants who aren't citizens

Bondi said six of the people charged are living in the U.S. unlawfully. A detention order for Lopez-Rubio indicates that he will be held until trial, in part, because he lacks legal status in the U.S. and tiple kilograms of heroin is subject to removal or de-

portation after any prison sentence.

When asked how she's deciding whether to prosecute or deport any defendants who lack U.S. citizenship, Bondi said it's based on their potential prison sentences, if they're convicted.

"I want them to stay in our prisons as long as possible," Bondi said. "There's a very big risk – we all know – releasing someone, especially to Mexico. Sending them back to Mexico, who knows, they could attempt to get through our borders. Not under Donald Trump, I doubt. But they're also part of a major drug trafficking ring in Mexico, so sending them back to Mexico to continue on with their drug business isn't going to happen under this administration."

A look at historic districts of Las Cruces

May is Historic Preservation Month in New Mexico, and Las Cruces is honored to have three neighborhoods listed as Historic Districts in both the New Mexico Register of Cultural Properties and the National Register of Historic Places. All three deserve a visit.

Mesquite Historic District

The past is almost palpable as you walk through the Mesquite Historic District, one of the few still intact neighborhoods dating from the mid-nineteenth century in the Southwest.

This birthplace of the City of Las Cruces was formally established in 1849 to ease crowded conditions in the village of Doña Ana. The area was surveyed using a braided rawhide rope to lav out parcels of land. One hundred and twelve settlers camped under a large tree in what is now Klein Park, while lots were drawn assigning ownership.

Descendants of some of these first families still live in the neighborhood.

But Mesquite has a history dating back even further. Members of the Piro. Mansa and Tiwa peoples lived in the area, and their families, too, still live here. And El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, the Royal Road of the Interior, ran approximately down what is now Mesquite Street. Between 1598 and 1882 trade goods were carried by oxcart along the 870 miles between Mexico City and San Juan Pueblo in northern New Mexico. Although the streets are now paved and lined with sidewalks, by walking down Mesquite Street, and using a little imagination, you can sense the multiple layers of history laid down by Mexican traders, Indigenous community members, and settlers of Spanish, African, and Northern European

descent.

portion to urban renewal in the 1960s and 1970s. But much of what remains is the real thing: houses, shops, and churches constructed between the 1850s and 1930s. Traditional adobe homes front directly on the streets and, in the rear, placitas, once spaces for work and livestock, are now yards and gardens. Many roofs are flat, often graced with an arched or pointed pediment, vigas protrude just under the rooflines, and canales extend through the parapets, draining rainwater away from the adobe walls. Philips Chapel CME Church was completed in 1912 to serve the neighborhood's strong African-American community, and doubled as a school beginning in 1924, during the time of forced segregation. The serene, white-plastered adobe church was restored by a diverse group of volunteers between 2010 and 2016 and services, open to anyone, are once again held there.

Today, Klein Park invites residents and tourists alike to rest in the shade, use the playground equip-

given in the small amphitheater. One of the best restaurants in the district is across the street, and a second is only a few blocks away. In recent years art galleries have moved into some historic buildings, and once a month the district sponsors a First Friday Art Ramble. Visitors can amble along Mesquite Street, or ride a free horsedrawn trolley, hopping out when they see something that catches their eye. Best of all is Christmas on El Camino Real, when the street glows with luminarias and, in Klein Park,

Alameda-Depot **Historic District**

Even before Atcheson, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad reached Las Cruces in 1881 a land development consortium, calling itself the New Mexico Town Company, began buying up and platting residential lots in the fertile farmlands to the west of downtown. New arrivals from the eastern states brought new and trendy ideas of home building. and the railroad gratified their desires by bringing

available before: milled lumber, hardware, window glass and pre-cut wooden trim. Between the end of the 19th century and into the first decades of the 20th a stylish suburb grew, boasting Queen Anne. Bungalow, Tudor Revival, Mediterranean and Pueblo Revival styles. One large adobe farmhouse, once surrounded by irrigated fields, is the only remnant of the agricultural days.

William L. Rynerson, whose lovely Queen Anne house still graces a shaded

lot on Court Street, came to Las Cruces with the California Column in 1862 and stayed to become a lawyer and a member of the New Mexico Town Company. He shot New Mexico Supreme Court Justice John P. Slough dead in the billiard room of the La Fonda Hotel in Santa Fe, and who later changed the venue of Billy the Kid's trial from

Lincoln to La Mesilla, ensuring the Kid's conviction for the murder of Lincoln County Sheriff William

adobe Territorial Style home of Sam Bean, Jr., whose brother, Judge Roy Bean, was the infamous Law West of the Pecos. A bungalow on South Miranda housed Albert Bacon Fall, once United States Senator from New Mexico, then Secretary of the Interior, but topped

this all off by being convicted of taking bribes in the infamous Teapot Dome Scandal in the 1920s.

At the heart of the On Griggs Street is the district is Pioneer Woman's Park, a tree-shaded square-block with a

charming gazebo in the center. The park was created by the Las Cruces Woman's Improvement Association in 1896, purchased from the railroad with funds earned from renting out the town's first hearse. Their 1927 Mission Revival meeting house still stands across from the Park on Reymond Street. The gazebo is a popular venue for concerts, rallies, and especially weddings. But on quiet afternoons the district, with its air of a late 19th century neighborhood, is ideal for a relaxed walk under the mature trees and along the avenues of eclectic period houses.



Mesilla Park began in 1887 as a planned urban development, independent of Las Cruces, with its own post office and train station. Also laid out on formerly irrigated farmland, the irrigation ditches, acequias, still provide water to the mature trees that line the streets. Non-residential portions of the town were designated near the train depot. Main Street ran along the railroad tracks, and the commercial strip ran along the east side of Main Street. For the resident's convenience there was a grocery store, a Wells Fargo Express office, telegraph agent, icehouse, Pueblo Revival, to mid-

stable. Where there are still small shops, some of them are in original buildings. West of the tracks, beyond the train station, were warehouses, many owned by mail order businesses which flourished when the country was still primarily rural. Today, art galleries and entertainment venues, workshops and light industry, continue to use these buildings.

A little further west is the residential area. where houses built from 1887 to the 1960s stand on large lots. The eclectic styles vary from Queen Anne through bungalows, Craftsman, Territorial and


a classic example of Gothic Revival. After creation of New Mexico A & M College in 1890, now NMSU, proximity to the campus attracted faculty and staff. Perhaps this interest in education prompted the community to open a one-room school for its children in 1901. In 1907 a Mission Revival style schoolhouse, designed by noted architect Henry C. Trost, opened. Over the years additions kept up with the needs of the community until, eventually, a new elementary school was built. The original school was renovated and now serves as the Frank O'Brien Papen Recreation Center, a space



Mesilla Park was annexed by Las Cruces in 1964, but still has an elegant and peaceful ambiance, with lovely places to walk, especially along the old acequias when the oleander are in bloom.

Spearman picked up First Team honors for the second straight season. while Watson earned a spot on the Second Team. Carranza was recognized for a remarkable first collegiate campaign with an


All-CUSA Freshman Team distinction.

Minimize your mistakes for better golf scores

From my point of view, playing golf the way you would like to play means minimizing your mistakes. A "mistake" on the golf course can mean many things to many people. But, fundamentally a mistake represents a result vou would like to erase if you were allowed to do it over again. Over the years, when I have watched highhandicappers play, I have noticed several typical side of a hundred yards mistakes that they make. Note that these tend to be different errors than a scratch golfer or pro would make. The pros tend to make their mistakes in the areas of decision and skill or technique.

A lot of dedicated, highhandicap golfers (18 to 30 handicap) can move the ball off the tee with some degree of talent. Of course, with the ball on the tee, there is a boost in confidence. A full swing with a long driver demands mostly large muscle coordination and is not a finesse play. The mistakes for our high-handicapper seem to happen the closer he gets to the green. In-

the problems with the finesse play begin; this is not disrespect, mind you, just observation. Let's say our 24-handicapper has 80 vards to an elevated, shallow green, with a deep judgement, rather than bunker guarding the hole location. Chances are he will aim at the pin, and either hit it "fat," advancing the ball only a few yards, or "blade" it over the green so he is left with an impossible chip back downhill toward the same bunker. On-course coaching would advise our novice to run the ball along the ground to the left of the gaping bunker onto the green and give himself a chance for a two putt. Finesse shots are difficult for high-handicap

golfers because they have glaring omission seems not mastered the touch to be failing to appreciate and feel of those delicate shots. "Feel" is mostly a golfer's estimation of what will happen with a ball hit from a particular shot in a particular situation. "Touch" concerns the actual execution of the shot that is planned. And skill with those shots comes from learning the fundamental technique involved, and many hours of practice.

It's agreed among all golf instructors everywhere that high-handicappers make most of their glaring mistakes next to and on the greens. Once on the green it seems that putting escapes notice. The most

the proper speed inside of ten feet. Folks with decent eyesight are pretty good at seeing the line of the average putt, sensing a right or left break. But there is often a disconnect when it comes to stroking the putt firmly and letting the ball follow the intended line.

Here are some things you can do immediately to reduce the mistakes you tend to make. First, spend five minutes on short putts (inside of six feet) on the practice green before you tee off. This will familiarize you with the speed and help your confidence. Secondly, play away from hazspeed is something that ards, whether they be sand or desert or water. With com.

your GPS and laser yardage devices you should be able to see and estimate exactly where and how far to position your ball for an easier next shot. Thirdly, ask your pro or an expert to go out with vou on a playing lesson where he can help identify and pinpoint where you, personally, are prone to make mistakes.
