## Gluckstadt holds first city meeting

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GLUCKSTADT — The mayor of Mississippi's newest city, in front of a standing-room-only crowd, called the first meeting to order amid cheers and applause Tuesday night in a church hall here.

"I am privileged to call to order Gluckstadt's first meeting of the mayor and board of

aldermen," Gluckstadt Mayor Walter Morrison said to the cheers and applause in the Church Hall at St. Joseph Catholic Church on Church Road.

Officials went on to identify insurance and taxes as the first key items of business to be tackled.

A handful of items on the docket were swiftly addressed, including matters such as

approving the city's charter, retaining Jerry Mills and John Scanlon as city attorneys and deciding to make further city positions to be appointed by the mayor and board.

Those positions include Police Chief and City Clerk.

Moving forward the city will need an insurance plan so that city leaders can officially occupy a space to hold meetings.

Officials approved pursuing a plan with Mississippi Municipal Services for a \$500,000 liability plan but said that could take between 30 and 60 days to be fully effective.

In the meantime, the board gave Morrison the authority to set up a P.O. Box and apply for a tax ID number so the city can open a bank account and receive tax revenue from the state.

Morrison said the latest estimates for sales tax alone collected in the city is at around \$1.8 million a year.

"Let's hope that continues," Morrison said.

The board also decided to hold regular meetings on the first Tuesday of every month.

Morrison was appointed to the position by a citizen's committee headed up by longtime Gluckstadt resident Kerry

Minninger and others during the incorporation filing process.

Gluckstadt's appointed aldermen are Miya Warfield-Bates, John Taylor, Jayce Powell, Wesley Slay and Lisa Williams, all of whom will initially serve in at-large capacities.

## Supreme Court tosses Harreld's supe appeal

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The state Supreme Court last week upheld Democrat **Karl Banks'** 2019 victory over Republican **Jim Harreld** for District 4 Supervisor.

Harreld had challenged the election results questioning ballot styles, absentee ballots and affidavit ballots, among other issues, asking a Madison County Circuit Court to decertify the election results and to order a new election or to declare Harreld the winner.

The circuit court, however, affirmed the election and Banks' 57-vote victory as certified and Harreld appealed to the Mississippi Supreme Court.

The Mississippi Supreme Court on June 17 in a 6-3 decision affirmed the Madison County Circuit Court decision that upheld Banks' election to the seat.

"Because the trial court did not commit manifest error by finding that Harreld failed to meet the requisite standard of proof necessary to overturn an election, this Court affirms the trial court's judgment," according to the majority decision written by Presiding Justice **Leslie D. King**.

Joining King in the majority opinion were justices **Robert P. Chamberlin**, **David M. Ishee**, **James W. Kitchens**, **Josiah D. Coleman** and **Dawn H. Beam**.

In his petition filed with the Madison County Circuit Court, Harreld alleged that "three split precincts gave out thirty-seven incorrect ballot styles, that thirty-three absentee ballots were illegally counted, that nine affidavit ballots were improperly counted, that three affidavit ballots were improperly rejected,

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# \$2M Rice Road extension project in full swing

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RIDGELAND — A \$2 million project to extend Rice Road west across U.S. 51 establishing another entrance into the new City Center complex is well underway.

Construction began in April after officials awarded a bid to Hemphill Construction in February this year.

Lisa Walters, executive assistant to Mayor Gene McGee of Ridgeland, said the road work extension should be completed by the fourth quarter of 2021 or sometime in the first quarter of 2022.

“This road is a continuation of the Master Plan for development of the remaining portions of the City Center site,” Walters said. “It will provide safe and convenient access for the future growth of this development as

well as accommodate future growth, and will connect from Highway 51 across from the existing Rice Road to the front of City Hall.”

Walters said the road is planned to be aligned with a signalized intersection at Highway 51 and a multi-use trail along the entire distance.

In February, the aldermen voted unanimously, 7-0, to award a \$2,095,667.45 low bid for the project to Hemphill Construction, based in Florence. Hemphill was chosen out of five other companies that submitted bids.

At the time of the bid award, McGee said the road extension would provide an alternate entrance to City Center to the north of the complex.

“This is really just another phase of development of the City Center Project,” McGee said.

# Madison man keeping city beautiful while out jogging

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Plogging is a recent phenomenon in which joggers pick up litter for a full-body workout while cleaning their streets.

While plogging is a relatively new initiative for organizations such as Keep America Beautiful, the city of Madison has had its very own plogger for more than a decade in Mark Davis.

At first, Davis’ efforts began by simply picking up a few bottles while covering his usual Madison Avenue route.

“I ran the same route every day down the side of the road where all the trash is anyway, and it was very easy to just bend over and pick it up,” Davis said.

Eventually, he was carrying so much stuff that it became easier to run with a plastic bag.

“I imagine people set things on their bumpers or the tops of their cars,” said Davis, which is how he’s found items such as tools, scissors, mail and watches strewn along the side of the road.

Nerf bullets are also common and Davis collects those for his family.

“The most money I’ve made is one \$5 bill,” he said with a laugh.

Davis is serious about his morning runs, however. If he finds mail belonging to someone on his route, he’ll drop it off in their mailbox. For larger discarded items, he’ll make a trip back with his car.

Davis also takes care to separate the recyclables from the garbage to help the environment. He mostly runs along Madison Avenue but also enjoys running down St. Augustine Drive to Strawberry Patch Park.

Miriam Ethridge, code enforcement officer for the city of Madison who is also chairman of Keep Madison the City Beautiful, noticed Davis’ hobby a year ago.

“Litter is a big nemesis,” said Ethridge, adding that is why she flagged down city native Davis after seeing him pick up litter on his morning runs. “If we could get a mindset going everyone can make a difference by going the extra mile to pick up litter.”

Davis also hopes to inspire others to make a difference in their city. Davis stopped picking up trash on his runs during the COVID-19 outbreak but returned to his routine when the trash began to accumulate.

“It was driving me crazy,” he said.

More than once, his neighbors have stopped to help him out.

“One fellow has stopped three or four times to help me when I’m really loaded down,” he said.

Those in attendance during Tuesday’s meeting included Gluckstadt residents and business owners as well as state Rep. Jill Ford, Madison Mayor Mary Hawkins-Butler and Chancery Clerk Ronny Lott.

Morrison presented himself and the board with name plaques for display during meetings.

Minninger read a brief history of the city starting with the first German immigrants to buy land in the area in 1905.

Morrison said that he was reminded of a Benjamin Franklin quote. Franklin was said to have asked after the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in September of 1787, “What do we have?”

He famously answered, “A Republic, if you can keep it.”

Morrison offered his own take.

“We have a city,” Morrison said. “If we can build it.”

Before the meeting closed, a time for public comment was

opened, though no one in attendance decided to speak.

After the meeting, alderman Bates said the meeting was short and quick, lasting less than an hour, but she felt like they got some work done.

Bates said she was quickly recruited into the incorporation effort six years ago when she first moved to Gluckstadt and looked forward to being a leader for the city moving forward. She said she was excited to tackle the work the city board had ahead of them.

Alderman Slay said the meeting “went very well.” He has been a part of the incorpo-

ration effort for at least 13 years and said people have been working on it longer than that. He said the effort has received a lot of support, prayer and hard work from the people of Gluckstadt and that it was nice to see that had paid off.

“We had a very good turn out and I think that a reflection that the people want this,” Slay said. “We have a lot of work to do, and we ask for patience and prayer as we work to lay a good solid foundation for the city.”

the Supreme Court decision states.

Harrel also alleged that the Statewide Election Management System (SEMS) placed voters in the incorrect supervisor district, that nine ballots were not initialed by poll managers, that one resolution ballot was not counted, and that twenty-five individuals who no longer reside in District 4 voted in the District 4 election.

“Harrel requested that the court decertify the election and order a special election for Supervisor District 4,” the Supreme Court decision says.

Harrel filed subsequently amended petitions further alleging that “six resolution ballots were not counted, that more than 200 individuals voted in District 4 who were incorrectly placed in District 4 by SEMS or who no longer reside at their listed address, and that 140 voters who reside in District 4 were incorrectly placed outside of District 4 by SEMS.”

Harrel also petitioned the court to declare Harrel the winner of the election and seat him as the District 4 Supervisor.

The court appointed Lamar Pickard as a special judge to preside over the matter.

The 42-page Mississippi Supreme Court decision takes up each matter.

“Harrel contests hundreds of votes in the District 4 supervisor election that he lost by a margin of fifty-seven votes,” the majority opinion states. “He does not allege any fraud or intentional wrongdoing. The circuit court found that Harrel failed to meet his burden of proof that any of the votes were illegal.”

The lower court also found that any irregularities did not substantially impair the integrity of the election.

“The circuit court erred by failing to find seven of those absentee ballot votes, all of which were lacking critical signatures, illegal,” King’s majority opinion states. “...

Further, the will of the voters remains ascertainable, and Harrel failed to prove any substantial failure to materially comply with election statutes. Because the circuit court did not manifestly err by holding that Harrel failed to meet his burden of proof of illegality on all but seven votes and did not err by finding that the will of the voters to elect Banks was ascertainable, this Court affirms the judgment of the circuit court.”

The dissenting opinion penned by Justice T. Kenneth Griffis and joined by Justices Michael K. Randolph and James D. Maxwell II, states the matter of votes is irrelevant.

“Because I am of the opinion that the trial judge erred as to the first issue, requiring that we reverse the decision of the Special Judge and order a special election for Madison County Board of Supervisors District 4, no reason exists to address the remaining issues,” Griffis wrote.



# Gluckstadt firefighters rescue dogs from house fire

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GLUCKSTADT — Two dogs are lucky to be alive after firefighters rescued them from a kitchen fire last Saturday.

Gluckstadt Fire Marshal Dustin Perry said firefighters responded to a 9:59 a.m. report of a house fire in the Wellington subdivision to find heavy smoke billowing out of the front door.

"I don't know if there were any active flames when they arrived," Perry said.

The owners were not at home at the time of the fire. However, dispatchers advised firefighters that two dogs were believed to be in the house.

"We had two engines there so we had two separate crews," Perry said. "We had one crew that concentrated on the rescue operations and we had another crew that simultaneously concentrated on the fire so they actually went at it at the same time."

Perry said the operation went smoothly and firefighters had the fire under control within 10 minutes of arriving.

As one crew was battling the blaze, the other crew located the two dogs, Luna, a 1-and-a-half-year-old blue heeler, and Maggie, a 3-year-old English pointer.

Perry said the dogs were fine after they were rescued. "They were hidden in the

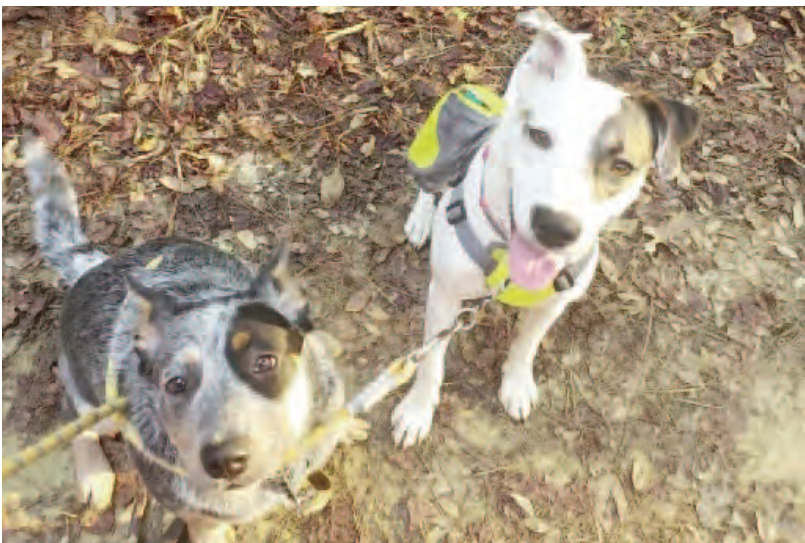
corner — one in the corner of the dining room, and the other in the corner of the living room," Perry said, adding they had no smoke inhalation problems. "They were lower to the ground than the heavy smoke can get so they were fine."

The dogs needed no veterinary attention, he said, and are at home with their family.

The cause of the fire is not yet determined and is still under investigation, Perry said.

No one was injured in the fire that moderately damaged the kitchen.

"Our guys did a great job of containing it to that one room," Perry said.

## Madison couple donates \$10M to UM

OXFORD (AP) — A Madison couple is giving \$10 million to the University of Mississippi's athletics foundation, and the school's basketball and event arena has been named for them.

The arena, which opened in January 2016, is now called "The Sandy and John Black Pavilion at Ole Miss."

The Mississippi Institutions of Higher Learning board approved the name Thursday, a university news release said.

John Black is a retired certified public accountant and entrepreneur from Madison.

"We're fortunate that we're able to do something like this and leave a legacy so to speak," he said. "We decided to respond with a gift that we could be proud of and have our kids and grandkids take a look from time to time as they happen to pass by this facility."

Sandy Black added, "We hope it will instill in them the importance of giving back to the community. We also want

them to realize how important the University of Mississippi is to us."

The contribution to the Vaught Society, the philanthropic arm of the Ole Miss Athletics Foundation, is their third major gift to the school.

They gave \$11 million in 2015 to the University of Mississippi Medical Center, the largest private gift it has ever received in one year. They also made a major gift to renovate the guest house at the chancellor's home on the Oxford campus.

In 2019, \$500,000 from Sandy Black essentially bought all of William Faulkner's furniture from the Nobel Prize-winning author's extended family with the understanding that the pieces would remain permanently on display at his home in Oxford.

Chancellor Glenn Boyce said the Blacks' loyalty to their alma mater is "as wide as it is deep — reaching broadly into not only athletics but also academics and the many facets of our medical center."

## Nolan Circle speed limit lowered to 25 mph

RIDGELAND — City officials lowered the speed limit on a street connecting Wheatley and School streets after residents have asked for measures to slow thru traffic.

At the regular Ridgeland Mayor and Board of Aldermen meeting on June 15 Public Works Director Mike McCollum presented a petition from residents of Nolan Circle in favor of enacting traffic-calming measures on their street.

As a result of a traffic study, aldermen voted unanimously to lower the speed limit on the street from 30 mph to 25 mph. Alderman-at-Large D.I. Smith said that 25 mph is the residential standard.

The ordinance changing the speed limit will take effect 30

days after its passage last week.

Nolan Circle is an L-shaped street that connects Wheatley and School streets. Smith said he estimates there are between 10 and 14 houses on the street.

Jimmy Whitehead, a Nolan Circle resident submitted the petition with the signatures of approximately a dozen neighbors. The petition asked that the city address "speeding, for the safety of our children."

It was initially suggested that a speed hump be installed in front of 222 Nolan Circle as a "traffic calming" measure. Aldermen decided to table the request to see if lowering the speed limit made a difference. The speed hump was estimated to cost the city \$2,200.

"We will wait and see what lowering the speed limit does," Smith said. "If they really, really want a speed hump we will

revisit the issue."

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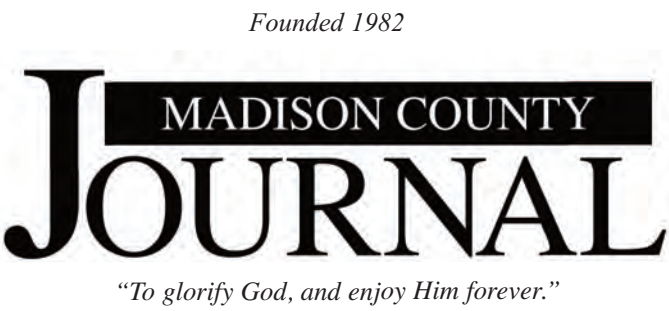

# Biden immigration failing

The Biden immigration policy is appalling on its face, but looks can be deceiving. Despite the record surge of illegal entries wracking the U.S. southern border states during President Biden’s still-fresh tenure, apparent failure appears intentional. Americans shouldn’t fall for the ruse.

Vice President Kamala Harris drew the short straw in the lottery to pick the administration’s immigration point person. Thus far, her thorniest dilemma since pulling the unenviable assignment nearly three months ago has been to dream up new ways of explaining why she hasn’t managed yet to see the border emergency for herself.

U.S. authorities recorded more than 180,000 border enforcement encounters in May, an eight-fold spike over the same month in 2020, according to U.S. Customs and Border Protection. The thought, then, of standing in camera range of the trampled thoroughfares of human smuggling is ample motivation for the vice president to opt for southbound side excursions. During a coronavirus vaccination campaign stop in Greenville, S.C., on Monday, Ms. Harris was met with peeved demonstrators shouting, “Go to Texas,” and holding signs that read, “Border is That Way.”

She knows very well where the borderlands lie, having overflowed them last week on her way to confer with Central American leaders about the “root causes” of the immigration crisis. While visiting Guatemala, the woman famous for dodging tough questions with loud yuks barely managed a quiet warning to prospective border-crossers: “Do not come.”

Such perfunctory advice could only

have fallen on closed ears. For Guatemalans and their neighbors in Honduras and El Salvador, the trek north can mean a U.S. job and a ten-fold hike in income.

Well aware of the magnetic effect of U.S. dollars on northbound migration, the Biden-Harris team has offered \$4 billion in economic assistance over four years to those Northern Triangle nations. The trekkers can do math, though, and have a financial incentive to stay on course: Ensconced in U.S. cities and towns, they sent back remittances worth \$21.6 billion in 2018 alone, according to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York.

Americans can do math, too, and it is obvious that Ms. Harris’ mission to Central America was designed to feign concern over the border surge without taking steps to curtail it.

By promising to naturalize illegals variously estimated to number between 11 million and twice that figure, by ending the Trump-era “remain in Mexico” policy whereby asylum-seekers were sent back across the border to await the results of their legal petitions, and by halting completion of the border wall, Biden-Harris has enacted an immigration policy that resembles failure, but only to those who believe border security is his goal.

Incompetence disguises intent: To flood the U.S. with immigrants — some worthy of future U.S. citizenship, some not — who would demonstrate their gratitude by voting for Mr. Biden’s political progeny forevermore. Americans must voice their disapproval in louder tones than Ms. Harris’ diversionary giggles.

# Three lives rememberered

*The Neshoba Democrat said in an editorial on June 23:*

The murders of three young men, James Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner, in Neshoba County 57 years ago this week registering blacks to vote changed world history by propelling passage of the Civil Right Act in the United States Congress.

Chaney, 21, Goodman, 20, and Schwerner, 24, were remembered again here on Sunday at the church in the Longdale community the Ku Klux Klan burned to the ground looking for Schwerner, who had been in Mississippi that summer based out of Meridian.

“We should never forget these young men,” said Jewel McDonald, a senior in high school when the Klan burned her church. “We should always try to commemorate them each year. There should be something talked about or done each year for them. We should never forget. Never, ever, ever.”

The 57th annual memorial service was held on Sunday at the Mt. Zion United Methodist Church which the Klan burned.

Evelyn Calloway’s parents, Bud and Beatrice Cole, were severely beaten the night of the fire on June 16, 1964, and Mr. Cole was left impaired for the rest of his life.

“All she could do was pray,” Calloway said of her mother the night of the beating. “She prayed and she told them, ‘Will you let me pray?’ and one of the guys said, ‘Oh, woman, you can pray all you want to but it ain’t going to help you now.’”

Calloway said her mother fell on her knees and said, “‘Father, I stretch my hand to thee for the help I know. If I withdraw myself from thee where else could I go?’”

Calloway said after her mother said those words she heard someone in the crowd say, “Let him live.” As the men were leaving, Calloway said, they told her parents, “You better not tell anybody.”

Mayor James A. Young gave the welcome at the memorial on Sunday.

Young said it is important to hold the annual event as a reminder of not only the events of 1964 but also of the importance of voting.

“I reverence that day in remembrance of those young men whose lives were taken for the very reason of training, teaching people the importance of voting,” Young said. “We see it now more than ever of the systems trying to deny in some case voters privilege to vote or delay it. It reminds me it is an ongoing battle for equality and representation.”

“That was a very severe case of hatred, animosity, whatever words you want to use to take someone’s lives simply because they were trying to get people to learn the importance of registering to vote.”

“Also in today’s market, I cringe at the lackluster approach to voting that we see all over this nation and especially during local elections. There are so many reasons why people don’t go vote. Some say it doesn’t matter, my vote won’t count but it matters. It matters enough for those men to sacrifice, to lose their lives, trying to get the rural South and others to step up and be represented.

“It is more than just a program to me. It is a troubling reminder of the price that so many have paid that we might have the privilege that we have today. I dare not take that privilege or right lightly. I’m hoping it reminds us we all need to participate in our government.”

Our community remembers gratefully.

# Denying Biden Communion

Last week, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops voted 168-55, more than 3-1, to provide new guidance for receiving Holy Communion.

Behind the decision?

Bishops’ alarm that the public religious practice of President Joe Biden is conveying a heretical message to the faithful and the nation.

At Sunday Mass, Biden regularly receives Communion. Yet he not only supports Roe v. Wade and a woman’s right to have an abortion, but his new administration also provides ample funding of abortions.

Restrictions that existed in the Trump era, such as the Hyde Amendments that prohibit taxpayer-funding of abortions, are about to be lifted in the Biden presidency.

If the “teaching document” the bishops are expected to produce is consistent with traditional doctrine, a series of collisions on moral issues is about to shake the American Catholic Church and Democratic Party.

For that majority of U.S. bishops, who believe pro-choice Catholic politicians should be denied Communion, will likely collide not only with Biden and their fellow bishops but with the Vatican. Pope Francis had wanted to avert this now seemingly inevitable showdown on the issue.

Even if the document does not mention him by name, Biden will be pressed by the media to explain how he can back government funding of the killing of the unborn and still receive Holy Communion.

Pope Francis will be pressed as to whether the U.S. bishops are wrong to insist that U.S. Catholic leaders who defy Catholic doctrine on one of the great moral issues of the age should not be treated as devout Catholics.

If the bishops produce a teaching document that is consistent with traditional Catholic doctrine, what will it say?

Abortion is the killing of an unborn child, a grave moral crime and sin. No Catholic

may be a party to it. Political leaders who endorse abortion rights and vote to fund abortions contribute to a systemic moral evil and a scandalizing of the faithful. And they should neither receive nor be given Holy Communion. To do so is to give moral sanction to their misconduct.

The major argument raised against a denial of Communion to pro-abortion Catholics is the deeper division in the church it could create.

“The choice before us at this moment,” said Washington, D.C., Cardinal Wilton Gregory at the bishops’ gathering, “is either we pursue a path of strengthening unity among ourselves or settle for creating a document that will not bring unity but may very well further damage it.”

But is episcopal collegiality a higher cause than standing up for the right to life of millions of unborn who are about to be done to death?

Is a perceived unity among bishops more important than public witness to the truth that the unborn in America have been destroyed for 50 years at an annual rate that exceeds the COVID-19 pandemic at its worst?

Is clarity about doctrinal truth less important than fraternity?

No one can know what is in the heart and soul of Biden, who visibly manifests a devotion to his Catholic faith unrivaled in any national politician of his generation.

Still, there is no denying the message Biden’s appearance receiving Communion gives off. It is that to be pro-abortion and fund abortions does not necessarily conflict with being a good Catholic.

Pro-life Bishop Kevin Rhoades of South Bend, Indiana, dissents: “There is a special obligation of those who are in leadership because of their public visibility.”

Rhoades previously objected to Notre Dame’s conferring of its prestigious Laetare Medal on Vice President Biden, citing his support for abortion and same-sex marriage: “I disagree with awarding someone for ‘outstanding service to the Church and society’ who has not been faithful to this obligation.”

Asked Friday how he felt about the possibility that Catholic bishops would vote to deny him Communion, Biden dismissed the idea and walked away: “That’s a private matter, and I don’t think that’s going to happen.”

Where is this going?

The bishops have scheduled a decision by their next conference to write a report that seems certain to be read as a rebuke to Biden.

While this will divide the Catholic community, the pope is unlikely to give the document his support. Hence, its effect will be restricted to those dioceses whose bishops agree with it — and choose to deny Communion to the president of the United States.

Biden will be pressed to speak to the issue of abortion and the bishops’ decision to deny him Communion. His attendance at Mass and taking Communion will become matters of deepening controversy. His attendance at Sunday Mass may be marked by demonstrations.

And he will be charged with hypocrisy — for pretending to be the kind of Catholic that a majority of American bishops contend he is not.

With many states having adopted new restrictions on abortion that appear to conflict with Roe v. Wade, the issue of abortion appears about to be returned to the Supreme Court — and to the front burner of U.S. politics.

Not good news for Joe Biden.

# Biden’s tribute to Trump

A key storyline of President Joe Biden’s overseas trip was how different Biden was from President Donald Trump, and indeed he was — except in one crucial area.

Biden’s hawkishness on China, which figured prominently, was a reflection of how fundamentally Trump changed our posture toward Beijing.

It is the ultimate victory for a politician if he doesn’t just reorient his own party, but the other party — Ronald Reagan and Margaret Thatcher both did this, producing more moderate Democratic and Labor leaders in Bill Clinton and Tony Blair, respectively.

On China, Trump’s wrenching shift in the U.S. approach is now getting the tribute of broad acceptance by a successor who has nothing good to say about him and wants, in fact, to differentiate himself from the former president as much as possible.

It is impossible to imagine President Barack Obama during his time in office, just five years ago, pressuring reluctant European allies to take a tougher line on China, as Biden did over the past week.

For 20 years, the U.S. had operated on the bipartisan assumption that welcoming Beijing into the international system and establishing closer commercial ties would pay off in a liberalizing China.

By the end of the Obama years, it was increasingly clear that this strategy had come a cropper. The Obama team talked of a “pivot to Asia,” or shifting attention and resources from the Middle East to Asia, but this was more sloganeering than substance.

Even as China invested massively in its military,

encroached further on the South China Sea, continued to engage in cyber espionage and hacking, launched the Belt and Road Initiative, started to build its own international financial architecture via the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank, and began its campaign of cultural genocide against the Uyghurs, Obama remained accommodating.

The situation resembled the end of the Jimmy Carter years, when any hope of the Soviets moderating their behavior was blown away by the invasion of Afghanistan.

The old consensus on China had become unsustainable, but it took Trump, contemptuous of elite opinion and willing to blow things up (or at least talk about it), to demolish it.

For years, the security and trade relationships with China had been considered separate realms, or worse, we’d been afraid of pushing too hard on security matters for fear of upsetting commercial relationships.

Trump linked trade and security, and sent the message to the world that the co-mingling of U.S. and Chinese economies wasn’t inevitable and, indeed, could be reversed.

Trump over-personalized his relationship with President Xi and oversold what might come of the trade war with China, but the reorientation was unmistakable.

Beneath the drumbeat of controversy from the top, though, Trump officials under-

took a thoughtful, deliberate effort to set out and implement a new strategy.

The administration produced several important documents across the government — from the Department of Defense to the National Security Council, to the State Department — that crystallized the new thinking.

The administration worked to buttress alliances in Asia and successfully lobbied European countries to exclude Huawei from its networks, part of a broad pushback on all fronts, including defense, diplomacy, cyber, telecom, trade and human rights.

By any fair measure, this was a serious campaign and China’s behavior in recent years has only underlined its necessity.

It would be foolish to trash all of this only because it had the name “Trump” attached to it. To his credit, Biden hasn’t. It remains to be seen how tough-minded he really will be on China, but directionally, his push to get allies on the record condemning Chinese malfeasance is welcome.

Biden’s bonhomie with Emmanuel Macron and Angela Merkel was fine as far as it went, and a marked difference from Trump.

But, more importantly, his emphasis on what might be the defining confrontation of the first half of the 21st century made an implicit nod to the enduring strategic transformation brought about by his predecessor.

The Apostle Paul’s heart for his co-laborers in Christ

Turn with me in your Bibles to Colossians 4:7-18. This concluding word is among the richest in all the Apostle Paul's letters. In this epilogue, the Apostle Paul reveals something of his own heart, his concern for the church there at Colossae. The personal references tell you that this church is more to Paul than simply someone, or some body of people that he is interested in. He's concerned about them individually. He gives individual words of encouragement and instruction and admonition. Though there are many items that we could explore, I'd like to point to four things that this passage teaches us about the character of the Apostle Paul, and which are transferable characteristics that God expects of all fulfilled Christians. First, the fulfilled Christian has a genuine concern for people. Secondly, the fulfilled Christian shares his ministry. Thirdly, the fulfilled Christian appreciates and supports his co-workers. Fourthly and finally, the fulfilled Christian is single-minded in his spiritual focus.

I. The Fulfilled Christian Has A Genuine Concern For People.

The fulfilled Christian has a genuine concern for people. Note that Paul not only remembers the names of these folks, he is genuinely concerned with them about their well-being. Notice why he says he is sending Tychicus and Onesimus. Look with me briefly at verse 8, "For I have sent him to you for this very purpose..." Paul says this is the reason why I am sending these men to you, "that you may know about our circumstances." He repeats that idea again in verse 9, where he says when Tychicus and Onesimus arrive, "they will inform you about the whole situation here." Now Paul is not telling this church about his situation because he wants them to have sympathy for him, but because he knows that they are concerned about him. Paul knows that these people are desperately interested in what his condition is: 'Paul, are you going to be taken to trial? Paul, is there a possibility that you will be released?' They have dozens of questions in their minds that they wanted answered about the beloved Apostle Paul whom had brought them the gospel. And Paul, even though in a letter where he is going to minister the majestic truth of our Lord and Savior Christ, he does not omit to deal with the

human concerns that they had for him. Paul knew how to talk both about the great truths of scripture and those things that concern us as human beings created in the image of God. Notice also in verse 8 that he sends them this servant Tychicus because he wants to comfort and strengthen them. He says, "that he may encourage your hearts." Paul is not only concerned to tell them about his condition, but also to encourage them in their own place. They may have been downcast, thinking that 'if Paul is in prison, surely our imprisonment is coming soon.' And yet, Paul wants to encourage them. Do we have that same kind of genuine concern for people?

II. The Fulfilled Christian Shares His Ministry.

Notice, secondly, in this passage, we learn that the fulfilled Christian shares his ministry. Paul willingly shares his ministry, and he acknowledges those who work with him: fellow servants (v. 7), fellow prisoners (v. 10), and fellow workers (v. 11). The apostle Paul is no lone ranger. Yes, he is gifted by God in an extraordinary way, supernaturally by the Holy Spirit, but notice that his ministry, he sees, to be a corporate ministry. He is not off on his own. He is willing to share that ministry, and he is willing to acknowledge that other people play integral roles in the work that he does. Do you ever have a tendency to sort of protect your turf in your area of ministry? You've got something that you do well for the Lord and you don't want anybody else in on it. Not Paul. Paul is always sharing the ministry that he does, and acknowledging those who are involved in the ministry, acknowledging them with the glorious titles of fellow servants and fellow prisoners and fellow workers.

III. The Fulfilled Christian Appreciates And Supports His Co-Workers.

Notice also in the passage how Paul is sincere in his compliments to those who are working with him in the gospel. For example, in verse 7 he speaks of Tychicus as his beloved brother, his faithful servant. What a beautiful ascription to this man, what a beautiful word of appreciation of his character and his service. Notice also his words about Mark and Jesus Justus, two Jewish Christians who were serving with Paul. Of them, he says, 'these Jewish Christians

encouraged me and they worked along side me and I'm thankful to God for them'. Regarding Epaphras, he says that he is a bond servant of Christ. On the tombs of the prophets were the words, 'Servant of the Lord.' What better title could one have than to be called a servant of the Lord? Paul says that Epaphras is always faithfully laboring in prayers. He is a man of prayer. Think of being called a faithful servant of the Lord and a man of prayer by Paul. How encouraging was Paul as he labored. He doesn't have to hoard the glory to himself. He's desirous of encouraging those who work with him. Do we build up the saints by those types of words of encouragement? Paul did. And so ought we.

IV. The Fulfilled Christian Is Single-Minded In His Spiritual Focus.

Finally, we see in this passage that the fulfilled Christian is single-minded in his spiritual focus. Paul began this epistle in chapter 1, verse 2, initiating the theme of loyalty to Christ, faithfulness to Christ, and even in his epilogue he's still on the theme of loyalty and faithfulness and Christ. For instance, when you see what Paul says he appreciates about these various people, what comes immediately to mind? Faithfulness, commitment, and loyalty. In verse 7 he says what about Tychicus? He is faithful. He is loyal. What does he say about Onesimus? He is a faithful brother (v. 9). What does he say about Mark and Jesus Justus? They have been loyal to him (v. 11), even though the others of his own race have not. And what does he say about Epaphras? He has been loyal to his flock, praying for them fervently, even while he was away, with a deep concern for them (v. 13). Paul highlights the loyalty of each of these people, and it represents the single-mindedness not only with which he has written the book, but with which he conducted his life. May God, by His Holy Spirit, grant us a desire to promote loyalty to Christ amongst our co-laborers in the gospel, just as he did in the life and ministry of the Apostle Paul.

Jesus Christ heals a man

Here we see the gospel spreading across Judea. Peter is traveling throughout the region, and Luke first gives us an account of his activity in the town of Lydda. There Peter encounters a man named Aeneas, who had been bedridden for 8 years due to paralysis. Peter says to him, “Aeneas, Jesus Christ heals you; rise and make your bed.” And immediately he rose.

This miracle closely resembles the work of Christ in Mark chapter two. Peter, as an apostle of Christ, is now acting as the hands of Christ healing and preaching in his name. And we see the people in Lydda and region of Sharon turn to the Lord in response. This means the gospel was explained to them and they turned to Christ for forgiveness of sins.

Next we see a similar event in Joppa (Acts 9:36-42). A devout woman named Tabitha becomes ill and dies. The saints in Joppa know Peter is in nearby Lydda, so they send two men to him on an urgent mission to ask him to come. Peter complies, and when he gets to Joppa finds a crowd of widows weeping over Tabitha’s death because she had made clothes for them and was full of good deeds.

Peter, again closely resembling the actions of Jesus (this time in Mark five), puts all the people out of the room where Tabitha lay. He kneels down to pray, turns to the body, and says, “Tabitha, arise.” She sits up, and he takes her by the hand and then presents her alive to the saints. This miracle became known in Joppa and many believed in the Lord.

As we have noted before, the miracles by the apostles served to authenticate their message that Jesus was the Christ, and he came to save sinners and restore us to a right relationship with God. The miracles also point to the future blessedness of a place with God, a place with none of the effects of sin, such as disease, misery, and death. The apostles would have explained these things in detail. The people who turned to the Lord would have necessarily been convicted of sin.

The basic tenant of the Christian faith is that sin is an offence against God which dis-

rupts a man’s relationship with God. Unless we see our shortcomings in the light of the law and holiness of God, we do not see them as sin at all. We never know what sin really is until we have learned to think of it in terms of God, to measure it not by human standards, but by the yardstick of His total demand on our lives.

It is not necessarily conviction of sin when a man is distressed about his weaknesses and the wrong things he has done. It is not conviction of sin just to feel miserable about yourself and your failures and your inadequacies to meet life’s demands. Nor would it be saving faith if a man in that condition called on Christ just to soothe him, and cheer him up, and make him feel confident again.

To be convicted of sin means not just to feel that one is a failure, but to realize that one has offended God, flouted His authority, defied Him, gone against Him, and put oneself in the wrong with Him. Christ is offered as the One who through the cross sets men right with God again. To put faith in Christ means relying on Him, and Him alone, to restore you to God’s fellowship and favor.

Christ, the Savior from sin and an Advocate with God, gives you peace and joy, desires to serve Him and His people (like Tabitha), and the privilege of being an adopted child of the living God. He is not offered merely to make better the frailties in a fallen world, though he can do that. But we leave the painful present and unknown future with Christ, the Lord over all.

The miracles done by the apostles were to demonstrate God has given a Savior to sinners who are alienated from God and exposed to his just condemnation. God is full of love and mercy, and it is poured out on us through Christ. So call upon him, and turn to him.

We need to put ourselves in the place of Aeneas and Tabitha spiritually speaking. The word “arise” spoken to them is often used of the resurrection power of Christ. Once we believe in Christ, we have been raised to eternal life, and we walk with God. So we can lay down all at Jesus’ feet and place the reins of our remaining days in his hand.

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THE SPEED REGULATION ON NOLAN CIRCLE CITY OF RIDGELAND, MISSISSIPPI

# J.S. Iupe’s celebrating 25 years in Madison

MADISON — For 75 years the Iupe family name has been synonymous with the clothing business in Madison County and was one of the premier clothing stores in Mississippi.

Joe Iupe has carved out his own part of that legacy with J.S. Iupe’s here at the current location for 15 years. The previous 10 years he was in Ridgeland off Highway 51.

J.S. Iupe’s mostly does team apparel whether it is fan gear for local high schools or uniforms for various youth sports. He said he even does the occasional bachelorette party or family reunion.

“We decorate everything we sell,” Iupe said, distilling his business model to the five-word sentence.

“The business has evolved as I have seen the need to adapt to changes and trends.”

This month, J.S. Iupe’s is celebrating 25 years and has been celebrating with a sale this week.

Iupe said he remembered his parent’s store, Iupe’s on the Square in Canton, doing summer sales and that his 25th anniversary was as good a reason as any to hold one. His parents were Joe and Jeane Iupe. He worked in the store with his siblings Pat, Beth, Linda and Bill.

Iupe said they lived blocks from the store so he spent a lot of time there. His first job when he was 9 or 10 years old was doing odd jobs for his parents. He remembers putting together boxes specifically.

“Everything in the store went out in a box,” Iupe said.

He said even though the products he sells are different from the ones they sold in his parents’ store, the core principles are the same. For example, a specialty in the Men’s Department at Iupe’s Canton was the Hart Schaffner & Marx tailored suits that some of the leading businessmen out of Jackson and elsewhere came to

be fitted. “What we sell is totally different than what my parents did but it still revolves around service,” Iupe said. “We are still taking care of the customer. ‘Service, selection and savings’ was an old slogan of the Canton store that I still think of today.”

The Iupes have been legendary in service for nearly a century.

That face-to-face interaction, Iupe said, quickly turns customers into friends and neighbors. He said he has been

in business long enough to supply multiple generations with apparel in some cases.

“Some of the same people that were 6 and 7 and 8 years old when they got their first uniforms are now coming in to buy uniforms for their kids now,” Iupe said. “It’s amazing.”

Before the store, Iupe played competitive golf. During his time at Canton High School, the team won two state championships. He would go on to play at Mississippi State where he was a letterman for all four years and graduated in

1979.

From 1979 to 1993 he worked in his parent’s store in Canton while pursuing an amateur golf career. During his time playing he picked up several significant wins including a then record-setting five wins at the MPGA Invitational in 1978, 1981, 1982, 1983 and 1986.

Iupe said his golf career was sidelined by an eye condition that has required several surgeries but in 1993 he took a job as General Manager and Director of Golf at Annandale. All in

all his career in the sport netted him a Mississippi State Sports Hall of Fame induction in 1989 and a Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame induction in 2005.

He said around the end of his tenure at Annandale in 1998 he opened J.S. Iupe’s, moving a clothing printing business he had started out of his house into his first building on Highway 51. Just a few years earlier his parents closed their store in Canton.

He has been married for 36 years to Sheri, who taught for 22 years at Madison Station.

They have three children, Rachel, Joseph and Andrew. He said they have eight grandchildren among them.

“My family has been blessed,” Iupe said. “We have had a number of great employees and it is like extended family.”

Iupe will be 65 in July and he believes he still has a few more years in him. He has been getting back into golf more.
