G'stadt unhappy with modifications

GLUCKSTADT — The developer of Germantown Village here drew the ire of the mayor and aldermen during Tuesday night's board meeting for constructing buildings at the proposed 35-acre mixed-use development differently than approved

during the site plan process. Mayor Walter Morrison brought up the project as a last-minute addition to the agenda after it was discovered that there were some cosmetic changes and overall elevation changes, including the addition of a driveway not on the approved site plan. "The buildings were...

constructed differently than what were approved," he said. "Very significant areas where they were different." Morrison explained the cosmetic changes were greenlit by someone with the city's architectural review, and while unfortunate, the developer did get what he thought was a blessing from the city.

"We had some cosmetic issues that when they first came to me I wasn't happy they'd been done," he said. "Once this board approves it, that's the way it's supposed to be done. Our architectural review folks basically blessed the cosmetic changes." His bigger issue though came from modifications to

the site plan for a driveway that didn't exist on the initial site plan and what Planning & Zoning Director William Hall said was a 22-foot shift in the buildings on the north section. "Why were those changes made," Morrison asked of developer Sandeep "Sunny" Sethi, the CEO of Bellamare Development.

Sethi explained the cosmetic issues were made because of cosmetic changes to hotels planned for the development and he wanted there to be "continuity" across all buildings. He told Morrison the other changes were because of an error with the architect on the

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SUPREME COURT Party City killer loses appeal

The man found guilty in the 2012 deadly armed robbery at the Party City store in Ridgeland recently lost an appeal with the Mississippi Supreme Court.



Joshua Leon Archie was sentenced in 2021 to life without parole for a capital murder charge and five years for conspiracy to commit a robbery charge. The state did not seek the death penalty.

The Court ruled 5-4 that Archie's conviction be upheld.

The five justices ruling in the majority were Chief Justice Mike Randolph and Associate Justices Robert Chamberlin, James Maxwell II, Dawn Beam and Kenny Griffiths.

The dissent included Presiding Justices Leslie King and James Kitchens, and Associate Justices Josiah Coleman and David Ishee.

Archie appealed that the jury should have been given alibi instructions when deliberating, which the dissenting justices agreed. The majority, however, ruled there was an overwhelming weight of evidence and not giving the jury instruction had no impact on the overall case.

Archie also argued there was no reasonable doubt instruction, admittance of an unauthorized photo of Archie, and ineffective counsel.

Archie stood trial on three separate occasions, with the first two ending in a mistrial.

The incident in question involved Archie and an accomplice, Undra Ward, in the murder of 68-year-old Party City Manager Bobby Adams in what law enforcement say was an inside job on Oct. 26, 2012.

Archie was a former Party City employee and is charged with murdering Adams on Oct. 26, 2012. Adams was closing the store he managed for 20 years that night when Archie allegedly burst through an unlocked back door. Officials say Adams attempted to grab the gun from Archie and was shot and killed in the process.

Ward pleaded guilty in exchange for 45 years.

Storms down trees on Madison homes

Dawn Foster was in her bed on Jasper Lane in Madison's Treasure Cove Tuesday night as the first round of severe weather rolled in and a large tree fell into her home.

Foster wasn't injured in the ordeal and said Wednesday afternoon her main concern was addressing "all the water pouring into her house."

Trees were down on a couple of houses in Treasure Cove, but that wasn't the only neighborhood that was pummeled by the back-to-back storm systems.

In Northbay, Tiffany Regan reported damage to several homes in her neighborhood, including hers, where the entire chimney was blown off.

Tuesday night began with severe thunderstorms that brought straight-line winds and nickel-sized hail to parts of Madison County. Severe weather continued

Wednesday morning, with thousands of power outages spread across the county and metro. As of 11 a.m., 6,520 customers were without power in Madison County according to Entergy spokesperson Sandy

Powlett. "We are continuing to assess damage and restore power as quickly and safely as possible," Powlett said. "Weather continues to move through the area."

A portion of U.S. Highway 51 in Madison had to be closed from Olympic Way to Green Oak on Wednesday for Entergy crews to replace numerous power poles. The road will again be closed Thursday morning, beginning at 8 a.m., official said.

According to the Madison Police Department, on Wednesday afternoon Entergy was responding to a power line over the road at Ashtree Lane and North Azalea. There was a tree over the road with power lines on Ingleside Road from Ingleside Drive to Ingleside East Drive. Another tree with power lines was down on Picnic Hill Road and North Old Canton Road.

Elvis' music will come alive on the St. Joseph Catholic

School stage this weekend when students perform the spring musical "All Shook Up" for a three-day run starting Friday.

Students have spent the past three months practicing lines, rehearsing songs, learning dances and building sets for the musical. The spring musical is the largest of two stage shows the Fine Arts Department stages every year.

"This is a fun show filled with classic music from the Elvis Presley songbook and a hilarious script that will have the audience laughing from the first note to the final bow," said Leslie Ann Harkins, the theater teacher directing the musical. "Our student actors, crew members and musicians have a great show planned you definitely won't want to miss it."

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Storm

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No major injuries have been reported so far.

As Entergy crews are "swamped," Madison the City spokesman Matt Smith said first responders were operating at full capacity.

"Our first responders are going 100 percent," Smith said. "There are no lapses in coverage."

He said Entergy told the city they were "aggressively" working to restore power in affected areas.

Moist of the trees that have

come down due to the weather have been pines, according to Smith.

"We want to remind people to stay weather-aware and keep an eye out for hazards," Smith said. "Please do not hesitate to call the city or 9-1-1 if you see anything."

Madison Fire Chief Derrick Leyton said three trees had struck homes in the southwest part of town.

"There have been no injuries, no entrapments and no fires," he

said.

Ridgeland Police Chief Brian Myers said the city has no ongoing issues.

"We dealt with trees on a few residences and across many streets," Myers said. "No major injuries reported. All major roads are now passable."

Myers said there were still a few trees down on neighborhood streets but crews are working to get everything cleared on Wednesday.

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LIVINGSTON- The gas station at Livingston officially opened under new management on Saturday.

Joseph Stodghill is developing the space formerly known as The Gathering into a Madison County location for Jackson staple Martin's Downtown.

He said he hopes to open Martin's in Livingston in May but the first step was to get the gas station, now dubbed Martin's Market in working order.

"The feedback we have received has been overwhelmingly positive," Stodghill said. "We have met neighbors we

didn't know we had and a lot of people have said they are grateful for the store. This just reaffirmed our desire to keep it open."

Stodghill said the market was down for a few days after they began work last Tuesday, April 2. He said that between then and Saturday they reorganized the space, did some minor renovations and restocked everything in the store they could.

In addition to gas, Martin's Market will serve full breakfast offerings and competitively priced, staple grocery items at the gas station.

"We are not running out of bait or anything," Stodghill

said. "We are well stocked and well provisioned. We want anyone who has not been there in a while to come back by and see us."

Stodghill acquired Martin's Downtown on State Street in Jackson in 2012. He heard that space was open in early January — a day he remembers well because he had surgery that morning.

"As soon as I got home and got comfortable I started working the phones," he said.

He said the current target is to open the Martin's location at the end of May.

original site plan with the curb cutouts and the request for a driveway in the north.

"The original architects put that in the wrong place," he said. "The buildings didn't get moved. The driveways were represented incorrectly."

Sethi said the buildings had been inspected 3-4 times and nobody with the city

said there was anything inaccurate.

"Once P&Z approves it, once this board approves it, that's the way it's supposed to be built," Morrison said, saying it wasn't the city's responsibility.

Morrison said the problem was that Sethi was seeking a certificate of occupancy for a building built improperly and that was putting the city in a tough position.

"It's about the integrity of the process," he said, saying the board was going to vote for approval because they

didn't want an empty building sitting there. "It's not personal. The board spends a lot of time going over these things. They adopt rules and regulations."

Morrison said he was sorry that Sethi had to be the example but he indicated in the future that if builders don't follow the rules there is a chance they do not receive approval.

The board then voted unanimously to grant approval pending receipt of an updated and complete site plan.

Ukraine funding conundrum

House Speaker Mike Johnson is in a tight spot. With a single-vote majority, no matter what choice he makes about bankrolling Ukraine’s fight with Russia, he’s likely to spark an internal rebellion when Congress returns from vacation next week.

The Louisiana Republican floated a few ideas in an Easter Sunday interview with Fox News host Trey Gowdy. As Mr. Johnson explained, the best he can do under the circumstances is offer incremental progress.

“You gotta build consensus,” the speaker said. “If we want to move a partisan measure, I gotta have every single member — literally.”

Mr. Johnson isn’t falling for President Biden’s disingenuous \$61 billion proposal wrapping Ukraine aid into a package that also provides some support for Israel, Taiwan, and our southern border. “They opened the border intentionally,” Mr. Johnson said.

Instead, he wants the so-called national security bill to have “important innovations” such as the REPO Act, which would effectively steal the property of Russian citizens and send it to Ukraine. “If we can use the seized assets of Russian oligarchs to allow the Ukrainians to fight them, that’s just pure poetry,” he said.

Of course, when countries such as Cuba and Venezuela seized U.S. property, the United States rightly retaliated. It’s hard to see how such a move wouldn’t be shortsighted, discouraging foreigners from ever trusting the United States with their assets.

Another option on the table is sending the cash to Ukrainian leader Volodymyr Zelenskyy and calling the handout a loan. “They can provide it back to us when the time is right,” said Mr. Johnson. We know how that will go.

Without any auditing of the funds

already dispensed, there’s no way to know how many millions are already stashed in offshore accounts belonging to officials in a country that, before Russia invaded it, ranked near the bottom — not far from Russia — in Transparency International’s corruption index.

Perhaps the most promising idea the speaker is floating would leverage the Ukraine issue to cajole President Biden into repealing his ban on the export of our natural gas resources.

The left is reluctant to oblige because driving up the cost of fossil fuels is the key to making inefficient windmills and solar panels seem attractive. The administration’s energy policy only plays into the hands of Russia — the world’s No. 2 natural gas producer behind the United States. Reducing energy costs, on the other hand, is great for Americans and puts the squeeze on the primary source of capital for Vladimir Putin’s war machine.

Opponents of financing a conflict that has taken 70,000 Ukrainian lives would probably want to see a blueprint for how further assistance wouldn’t simply perpetuate the bloodshed for the benefit of defense contractors.

To hold together a party holding such divergent views, Mr. Johnson shouldn’t tie the vote to Israel or rebuilding Baltimore’s Francis Scott Key Bridge. Put Democrats in the hot seat by forcing them to choose between supporting Ukraine and reducing Mr. Putin’s energy profits or enhancing U.S. border security. After all, we shouldn’t invest in someone else’s border to the neglect of our own.

Stuck in a no-win situation, the speaker might find consensus if he can craft legislative language that moves the needle on illegal immigration and energy. Even the fiercest opponents of aid to Ukraine might take that deal.

More spying on citizens

Congress is once again mulling the wisdom of allowing government officials to spy on citizens without a warrant. Authorization of Section 702 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act expires next week, and House Speaker Mike Johnson, Louisiana Republican, appears to be fast-tracking renewal over the objection of conservatives — and a few liberals.

The annual dispute highlights a divide that doesn’t line up neatly with the usual partisan categories. Boosters of the national security establishment and military-industrial complex are eager to get the FISA renewal done so they can move on to sending an added \$60 billion in taxpayer dollars to Ukraine, on top of the \$74 billion already dispatched.

Against this crowd, all but two House Judiciary Committee members voted in December to recommend the full House adopt the End Warrantless Surveillance Act. This includes the panel’s chairman, GOP Rep. Jim Jordan of Ohio, and the top Democrat, Rep. Jerrold Nadler of New York.

Their modest proposal shouldn’t be controversial, since it prohibits federal agents from sidestepping the Constitution by buying private data about Americans from third parties. It would also tell G-men they need to get a warrant based on probable cause before querying the NSA’s vast surveillance database and perusing the communications of a “United States person.”

Queries of this sort aren’t rare. The FBI conducted 1.3 million searches on Americans in 2020, rising to 3.4 million the following year, according to the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.

If what’s happening is legitimate, a warrant isn’t a high bar given the willingness of Foreign Intelligence Surveillance

Court judges to rubber-stamp whatever a government representative brings to their attention. This compliant court did nothing to sanction the FBI or its agents after they deceived the court, falsifying information to unjustly label Carter Page an “agent of a foreign power.”

Mr. Page was a campaign volunteer for Donald Trump at the time, but partisan FBI executives leaked the existence of a surveillance warrant to the media to spread the fiction that Mr. Trump was under Russian influence. This lie, orchestrated by the Hillary Clinton campaign, took on new life when partisan actors abused the awesome powers of the national security establishment to make it appear true.

Never forget that 50 senior intelligence officials — including five former CIA directors — signed a duplicitous letter saying that the Hunter Biden laptop was Russian disinformation in an effort to salvage Joe Biden’s 2020 campaign. This demonstrates the willingness of those in charge of the national security establishment to wield their titles and tradecraft to achieve personal ends.

Such vicious actors ought not to be rewarded with blanket renewal of wiretapping powers. Mr. Johnson is reportedly mulling options like passing a clean extension and bringing up the House Judiciary Committee’s reforms as a free-standing measure. While presented as a compromise, this would be an empty gesture, as true reform wouldn’t get past either the Senate or the president’s veto pen.

Given the pattern of abuse, the nation would be better served by allowing FISA Section 702 authority to expire in the hope that a new administration will take a fresh look at the issue next year.

Hatred of Jews continues

Repetition while teaching children is a necessary tool that allows them to absorb information and to build on it for future understanding. It is why my teachers required repeating times tables and words in language class.

When it comes to the Middle East, repetition has been unsuccessful in causing Europeans and many in America to accept certain truths.

To repeat. Hamas and Iran, and every other terror organization, are on record by their words and deeds about their goals: the complete destruction of Israel; a one-state solution with themselves in control and either expelling or killing as many Israelis as possible; that no diplomatic efforts will deter them from their objective and the reason is they believe they have a mandate from Allah to do what they are doing; if they are killed, their reward is an immediate transport to Heaven and all those virgins who await them.

Former Israeli diplomat Yoram Ettinger gets to the heart of the matter when he writes: “The diplomatic option assumes that the Ayatollahs are amenable to good faith negotiation and peaceful coexistence. It dismisses the regime-change option and resists the option of a viable military option hovering above the head of Iran’s rogue Ayatollahs. The State Department’s detachment from Middle East reality has been underscored by the suspension of economic (and especially oil export) sanctions, which has yielded to the Ayatollahs’ anti-US rogue machine more than \$100 (billion) since February

Despite these recent and previous examples that Israel’s enemies are serious about their objectives and the unseriousness and denials of reality by the secular West, President Biden has decided to ramp-up pressure on Israel to order an immediate ceasefire. He thinks this will get the remaining hostages released. Even if it did, a temporary ceasefire (which the UN and others will demand be made permanent) would serve as a lifeline to Hamas, allowing them to regroup and rebuild because they have said they have no intention of abandoning their goals. Suppose they decide to do another Oct. 7 attack on Israel (as they have threatened) taking more hostages and repeating the cycle? It doesn’t take a modern prophet to predict that it will if Hamas is not destroyed and security is established to protect both the residents of Gaza and Israel.

There are many sermons by Islamic clergy, many textbooks that teach hatred of Jews and Israel and many media stories (sadly, they are not only from the Muslim world, but also in the Western press) that appear

more on the side of Hamas than Israel. Here is an excerpt from one of many sermons delivered a decade ago at the al-Aqsa mosque in Jerusalem. The speaker, identified as Ali Abu Ahmad, calls for Jerusalem’s liberation from “the Jews, the most vile of creatures” and for the destruction of America and the international coalition against Islamic State.

“Oh Allah,” he prayed, “annihilate America and its coalition. Oh Allah, enable us to cut off their heads. Oh Allah, help our brothers, the mujahideen in the land of Iraq and Syria...”

There have been numerous statements of this kind before and after that sermon. Why would anyone need them repeated to understand their goal and why must the West endlessly repeat support for policies that have not and cannot work?

On Sunday, the Jerusalem Post reported that Defense Minister Yoav Gallant announced “the IDF withdrew from Khan Yunis after Hamas ceased to function in the area, adding that the troops left in preparation for a coming Rafah operation.”

Is funding Ukraine right?

Marjorie Taylor Greene’s bizarre case against the Republican speaker of the House.

The first time that Republicans toppled their own speaker during this Congress, it wasn’t a particularly edifying spectacle, but Marjorie Taylor Greene is reaching for new lows.

To paraphrase Marx: first as a farce, then as a more preposterous farce.

Greene made her anti-Mike Johnson case on Tucker Carlson’s show last week, and it was — as you’d expect — a stew of conspiratorial thinking and sophomoric ranting.

There’s a serious case against funding Ukraine, based on the scarcity of our matériel and the geostrategic preeminence of Asia over Europe, but Greene and her friendly and encouraging interlocutor didn’t come within a hundred miles of it.

Greene complained that in the space of a couple of months, Johnson has gone from a good Christian conservative to being indistinguishable from Nancy Pelosi.

Put aside the grossly unfair exaggeration, what might have happened to change Johnson’s view of his role in Congress? Would it have something to do with going from a backbencher with no responsibility to the leader of a narrow, fractious majority that, unless it can show some minimal ability to govern, is headed straight to the political dustbin?

Just asking questions ...

Obviously, it’s one thing to inveigh against spending deals when what you say or do doesn’t matter much; it’s another to be the one who has to decide whether to lead your party into a shutdown fight that it will

definitely lose, blighting its political prospects for no good reason.

Similarly, Johnson should feel a responsibility to at least get a Ukraine package to a vote. There’s a bipartisan majority in both chambers of Congress in favor of sending more aid to Ukraine, and Johnson is the one standing in the way. If he doesn’t move and Ukraine subsequently collapses on the battlefield, he will have played an outsized role in the defeat of an ally at the hands of a bitter adversary of the U.S.

Greene, who has nothing if not an inquiring mind, speculated that it is really that Johnson might be getting blackmailed.

It’s not clear what this insinuation is supposed to be about. Johnson is an evangelical Christian attorney who has not, as far as anyone can tell, lived a life conducive to creating material for a blackmailer. What did Johnson do? Mess up a citation in a brief 10 years ago? Miss a filing deadline once?

On the question of Ukraine, Greene and Carlson are self-professed nationalists who apparently have no idea why people might want to defend their homeland.

Greene said supporters of the war in the West care most about “murdering” Ukrainians, a bizarre way to characterize

support for a war of self-defense.

If this is the standard, every leader who has ever resisted a foreign invasion has engaged in the “murder” of his or her own people. If only Joan of Arc hadn’t been party to the murder of so many Frenchmen as she tried to expel the English in the Hundred Years’ War, and if only Elizabeth I hadn’t murdered so many British sailors in the course of checking the Spanish Armada.

Carlson, as he often does, made much of the Ukrainian government’s actions against the Ukrainian Orthodox Church. Whether you agree with what Ukraine has done or not, it is relevant to know that the church is a cat’s paw of Moscow. Although, of course, that wasn’t mentioned.

Greene went on to say that it violates “every tenet of our Christian faith” to aid Ukraine, which is, shall we say, an interesting interpretation of the word of God.

Doing a little somnology from afar, Greene also noted that Johnson is always complaining that he’s tired and only getting three hours of sleep. She believes this shows that Johnson must have a guilty conscience that’s keeping him up at night.

But maybe his sleep is disturbed by the thought that his majority is so small that someone like Marjorie Taylor Greene matters. And who can blame him?

No one like you

If you have your Bibles, I'd invite you to turn with me to Psalm 86. This is the only Psalm of David in the Third Book of the Psalms. As we look at this Psalm, I want to look at it in three parts. Verses 1 – 10 focus on the character of God. Then secondly, if you look at verses 11 – 13, this Psalm focuses on the believer's relationship with God. And then in verses 14 – 17, the believer lifts up specific requests to God.

I. The Character of God

First, in verses 1 – 10, David is meditating on God, thinking about His character. David is basically coming up with arguments as to why God ought to hear his prayer in the first place. And before we look at those specific arguments, don't we learn from that great principle that the Puritans used to say, "Pray until you pray"? That there are times when you are absolutely dry and empty, and you try to pray, and you can't. What do you do when that happens? You pray until you pray.

The first five arguments are about David. I will highlight two of them. His first argument is, "Lord, I'm needy." But his second argument is, "Lord, I'm a godly man." Now understand, David is not saying, "Lord, I haven't sinned. I'm perfectly righteous in this situation that I find myself in." Later in this Psalm he recognizes that he still must ask for forgiveness, so he's saying, "I'm in a really tight spot, and some of it may be my fault." But he can still say, "Lord, I'm a godly man." And what does he mean? He means, "Lord, I am a man that loves God. I'm a man that desires fellowship and communion with God. I'm not a perfect man, I'm not a sinless man, but I am a man who wants God. So hear me."

Now notice what happens at the sixth argument, because there is a shift. The first five have been about David, but the rest of the arguments are about God. I will highlight three of them. Notice what he says in verse 5: "For You, Lord, are good." There's his first argument about God. "My God is good." I wonder how many times David had to say that to himself before he could believe it. I wonder how he had to wrestle with that thought. Because you understand he's not experiencing the goodness of the Lord where

ever he is, or at least he's not conscious of it. He's so snowed under, and so he starts off, "Lord, You're good. I know You are." And then he goes on to say, "Lord, You're ready to forgive." David is acknowledging, "It's not that I'm without any sin. But You are ready to forgive." And lastly, in verse 10, "You alone are God."

II. The Believer's Relationship with God

Notice where David goes now in verses 11 – 13. Before he ever states what his trouble is, we see an expression of David's desire for right relationship with God. We see something of the importance of the believer's relationship with God: "Teach me Your way, O Lord. I will walk in Your truth." Walking is a good Hebrew metaphor for living. And so he prays, "Lord, show me how to live in Your truth, to live the way that You want me to live."

And then he says in a beautiful prayer, "Unite my heart to fear Your name." It's an extraordinary prayer. It has echoes of what Jesus teaches in the Sermon on the Mount about having an undivided heart and a single eye. But notice what he's asking for. He wants a heart that is not tugged towards the world and loving the things of the world. He doesn't want a divided heart, moving in two different directions. He wants a heart that is wholly and solely focused upon God and His glory. He wants a single mind. He wants to be utterly focused and devoted to that one truth, and that is the one true God.

And then notice what he says: "I will give thanks to You, O Lord my God, with all my heart." So he's saying, "Lord, it's absolutely important in the midst of this problem that I thank You. I'd be very tempted right now not to be thankful because of this problem that I'm dealing with, but I realize that I need to be thankful because You've given me everything that I have and am." And then he says, "And I will glorify Your name forever." So what's that about? Worship. This guy is in the middle of a tight spot, and he's praying that God would show him how to live, show him how to revere God, show him how to be thankful, and show him how to worship. He's more concerned about his relationship with God than

anything else.

III. The Believer's Requests

Finally, he tells you the problem. And the problem is he's got arrogant ungodly men that have revolted against him and are trying to kill him. And he asks God for three things.

Firstly, he asks for strength. Notice how David prays here: "O grant Your strength to Your servant." He just doesn't want to be strong, he wants God to give him His strength to face this. And that's the first thing he needs, is God to give him strength. Secondly, he prays, "Lord God, save me. If I'm going to be saved, it's going to be You that does it." And then he says, "Lord, show me a sign for good."

In the story I'm about to tell, the names and the cities have been changed to protect the innocent. A godly Christian mother has reared three children in the church. The second child has always walked to the beat of a different drum. And this mother has wrestled with her, she's talked with her, but the daughter always seems to pick the wrong priorities of life, and this mother is just at the end of her rope with the kinds of choices that her daughter is making. But she is faithful in praying for her. This mother prays, "Lord, please give me some sign of encouragement with my daughter. This has just been such a long fight." Well, the daughter calls from Singapore. Fifteen-minute inconsequential conversation, the mother just yearning for something substantive. The daughter gets ready to hang up the phone, and she says, "Oh Mom, you remember that lady that you grew up with in Kosciusko? Well, she's a missionary here in Singapore and we bumped into her, and she invited us over for supper tonight."

God provide encouragement to this Christian mother to go on. And I think David might be right there in this Psalm. So, when you're in one of those spots and you don't know how to pray, open up Psalm 86, and pray until you pray.

After law school, he practiced law in Laurel, MS, where he met and married Kathryn Hollingshead. A 52 year marriage produced three children: John Mark Clark (1960), Michael Scott Clark (1962), and Geoffrey Miles Clark (1964). In 1962, they settled in Waynesboro with their children. In 1963, Shannon was elected County Attorney for Wayne County. In 1966, he was appointed by Gov. Ross Barnett as

Chancery Judge for the newly created 19th Chancery Court District encompassing Wayne County and Jones County. Judge Clark served continuously as Chancery Judge until his retirement from the bench in 1994, after which he resumed private practice in Waynesboro in addition to serving as a Chancellor by appointment in cases around the State of Mississippi. He maintained an active law practice until 2022, and during this time he served for several years as attorney for the Wayne County Board of Education.

Despite his vast accomplishments as both a lawyer and Judge, Shannon was a humble man who enjoyed playing golf and fishing, as well as faithfully serving the church. He was also a devoted fan and supporter of the athletic teams at Waynesboro Central High School and later Wayne County High School.

Judge Clark was preceded in death by his wife, Kathryn, as well as his brothers, Reynolds and Donald. 

Holmes to host mental health program

The Holmes Community College Social and Behavioral Science Department is hosting a Mental Health Awareness program on Thursday, April 18 at 12:15 p.m. in the McGowan Workforce Training Center on the Ridgeland Campus. The presentation will be broadcast to Goodman and Grenada campuses, as well.

The event will feature keynote speaker Deborah Upton, a mental health therapist, who will discuss student mental health issues, including how to handle stress.

"I'm knowledgeable in helping people navigate their journey to healing and wellness," Upton said. "I believe that you're not responsible for the hand you were dealt. You are responsible for your own awareness and healing so that you can become far more than who you thought you would be. My mantra has always been and always will be hope!"

"Should anyone decide to make a telehealth appointment, they should know that I have knowledge and experience in treating a variety of conditions such as depression, anxiety, PTSD, OCD, grief, emotional dysregulation, relationship

issues, parenting and behavior modification techniques, divorce recovery, conflict resolution, anger management and effective communication," Upton said. "I am certified in Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR), a psychotherapy treatment that is designed to alleviate the distress associated with traumatic memories. My approach to therapy incorporates sensitivity, compassion, empathy and trust while honoring confidentiality, religious or spiritual beliefs and self-determination. Everyone has a story, and your story isn't over."

Holmes Practical Nursing instructor Caley Stogner will also present information and resources for mental health wellbeing as part of the program. Participants will learn about mental health resources available to them through Holmes' MindHealth Navigator, as well.

According to Dr. Sarah K. Lipson, an assistant professor at Boston University School of Public Health, "College is a key developmental time; the age of onset for lifetime mental health problems also directly coincides with traditional college years – 75 percent of lifetime mental health problems will onset by age 24."

Additionally, according to https://www.nimh.nih.gov/health/statistics/mental-illness, there were an estimated 57.8 million adults aged 18 or older in the United States with mental illness in 2021. This number represented 22.8 percent of all U.S. adults. Young adults aged 18-25 years had the highest prevalence of mental illness (33.7 percent) compared to adults aged 26-49 years (28.1 percent) and aged 50 and older (15.0 percent).

"The mental health of college students has been in a continual decline for the past decade and even more so with the recent pandemic," said Holmes psychology instructor David Jones. "Too often, those seeking help with mental health issues are stigmatized. We want our students to realize there is nothing wrong with seeking help to address issues such as stress, anxiety, depression, suicidal ideations and other mental health problems. We go to our family doctor when we have physical problems and seeking help for mental health related issues should be just as common."

Christ’s peace after you have sinned

In John chapter 21, we are taught the how the Lord Jesus restored his disciples after they deserted him in his death. The resurrected Jesus had appeared briefly to his disciples a couple of times before this story. In those appearances the Lord had showed them his hands and side, and said, “Peace be with you.”

There is no more sure expression of Christ’s love to you than for him to pronounce peace after you have sinned grievously against him as the disciples had. The peace Christ declared was won for them by his death. The Lord is going to teach his disciple’s how his death fulfilled the prophets and the purposes of God, but first he wants them to see that the bond of love between them is even stronger than before he died on the cross.

There is no Christian that doesn’t know what it feels like to fail the Lord. Some of those failures strike deeper in the soul than others. Peter had denied Jesus 3 times openly and emphatically, and the Lord knows how that sin weighs on Peter. The chapter opens with Peter and 6 other disciples at the sea of Galilee going fishing.

They aren’t fishing for recreation. They need to sustain their lives, and they were commercial fishermen. Nevertheless, the mention of Peter leading them in fishing indicates they think they will return to their previous way of living before Jesus called them to be disciples.

What follows is an account of the Lord’s providence that recalls when he first called Peter and others to be his disciples (Luke 5). The disciples fished all night and caught nothing (John 21:3). At daybreak someone from the shore tells them to cast their nets to the right side of the boat and they will find some fish.

They do not recognize that it is the Lord Jesus by appearance, but after the net fills with fish (indicating divine power), John proclaims, “It is the Lord.” Peter instantly jumps into the water to make his way to shore. The rest of the disciples follow in the boat, dragging a net full of fish.

The Lord is reminding the disciples that he is in charge of their lives. He has not rescinded his call for them to be his disciples. It is important for us to remember

that when we sin against the Lord, we are to draw near to him. We tend to want to distance ourselves or try to make up for it in some way. The way of restoration is humbling ourselves and seeking his grace.

He also wants them to see that his resurrection as a man is real, so he serves them a meal (verses 10-13). Later in Acts 10, Peter witnesses to Cornelius about Christ: “He was put to death by hanging on a tree. But God raised him on the 3rd day and made him to appear to us who had been chosen by God as witnesses, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.”

This may not be adequate proof for a sceptic, but it is great consolation to the Christian. “He is risen indeed” is the hallmark of the Christian faith. Jesus, after being raised, ate and drank with his people. He has conquered death. He will be the judge of the world. All who believe in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name. These facts we live by and move us to serve Christ.

After the meal, Jesus asks Peter, “Do you love me?” The Lord asks Peter this question three times as a reminder that Peter had denied him three times. The grief Peter felt the third time the Lord asked the question was intended to do Peter good. The question, ‘Do you love me,’ is a searching question for anyone to ask, but especially if it is Christ.

The Lord is restoring Peter by way of love, humbling Peter so that the apostle will know that Christ’s grace and love will be the foundation of the soul he uses in spreading the gospel. When we aspire to be like God in self-will it casts us down to the devil, when we aspire to be like Christ in love it lifts the soul to heaven. Let Christ’s love be the impetus to all you do for him.

We are not sound in the faith until the light we receive from Christ is turned into love. Perfect love is a kind of voluntary death, where the soul is not thinking of his own interests but how he may please and gratify the one in which he loves. “Do you love me,” the Lord asks. If you do, then follow me. Look after my interests, and my will.

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
