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Who Am I?

Have you ever said “I believe _____” but your actions didn’t follow up? Every single one of us has. It’s too common, it’s sadly kind of expected. “Yeah, Pastor, nobody is perfect...we all do that...it’s no big deal.” This excuse to behavior doesn’t work well anywhere else in my life. ‘Hey, son, I know I missed your graduation, but nobody is perfect.’ ‘Hey, Gary, I know I forgot our anniversary, but nobody is perfect.’

What is it with excuses? Florence Nightingale was asked about what helped her stay the course - what helped her live out what she believed. she said, “I attribute my success to this: I never gave or took an excuse.”

What if we decided to be as committed as that - to have no excuses, to really spend time on our faith commitment; to be in a close relationship with God. But- life happens—stuff just gets piled up and in the way. We get confused about life. We struggle with temptation. We have good intentions, and we struggle with the follow through- it’s easy to make excuses for why our relationship with God isn’t growing. Part of our problem is that we don’t know who we are- we have a difficult time recognizing and accepting who God says we are, we have a mistaken identity. This is not a new problem- Jesus introduced himself to a woman that had a mistaken identity. You can read about her in John chapter 4.

Jesus and his disciples had been walking all morning. Jesus is tired and thirsty, and He stops at Jacob’s Well. The disciples go into the town to get some food for lunch.

“Soon a Samaritan woman came to draw

water, and Jesus said to her, “Please give me a drink.” He was alone at the time because His disciples had gone into the village to buy some food. The woman was surprised, for Jews refuse to have anything to do with Samaritans. She said to Jesus, “You are a Jew, and I am a Samaritan woman. Why are you asking me for a drink?”

Right away she is using identity words: You’re a Jew. I’m a Samaritan.

John 4:10, “Jesus replied, “If you only knew the gift God has for you and who you are speaking to, you would ask me, and I would give you living water.” Jesus essentially says, “Oh, you think life is all about being a Jew or a Samaritan? There’s a bigger picture.

When the woman addresses Jesus, she leads with titles and identities established on earth – man-made titles. Jesus changes the subject and essentially says... Our identity is connected to eternity. In other words, our identity isn’t defined by our bad experiences. Our identity shouldn’t be crafted from cravings or desires, or by what we own or our family origins.

Jesus came to give us a new identity, the best identity! When we accept Jesus as our Savior, we become a part of His family. We are new creations, pure and holy, through His blood shed for us. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 5:16-18, “So we have stopped evaluating others from a human point of view. At one time we thought of Christ merely from a human point of view. How differently we know him now! 17 This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun! 18 And all of this is a gift from God, who brought us back to himself through Christ. And God has given us this task of reconciling people

to him.” Paul says that once we are Jesus followers, we stop looking at people through our human point of view- instead we look at them through Jesus eyes. We are a new person- our old life is gone- dead and buried- not to be resurrected!!! God gives us a new life- we are a new person in Jesus Christ. Our true identity doesn’t really emerge until we believe in Jesus and accept Him. When we’re struggling with who we are- we need to look to our Creator, He has the best answer for who we are. Life will hand us struggles and hard times: someone dumps you or you get fired, your mistreated or overlooked. No matter the struggle or the awfulness of a situation remember: You are still His. When the good times come, you are still His, when life is full and amazing or you’re at the top of the mountain, You are His during the good times too! Don’t forget those you are:

When you feel defeated: Remember who you are!

When you feel overwhelmed: Remember who you are!

When you feel ashamed- you’ve taken a wrong turn: Remember who you are!

When you get up tomorrow: Remember who you are!

When you look in the mirror: Remember who you are: You are a son, you are a daughter of the King of Kings, you are a child of God!!! He is with you and will guide you and shape you to become all that He has created you for!!!

Surrender yourself to Jesus Christ. He will make you new- He will give you your true identity. You are more than your circumstances- you are a son of God; you are a daughter of God! Now live like it! No excuses... Remember who and whose you are!!!

“Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go.”
— Joshua 1:9

It’s natural to have some fear or apprehension at the beginning of a new task. We may ask ourselves questions like “What if I don’t know what to do?” or “What if I’m not good enough?” Every time I stand up in front of a group of people to present something—whether it’s a sermon, a lecture, or a presentation of some kind—those questions run through my head and are accompanied by fear and doubt.

In our passage today Joshua had just been told that Moses, the leader of God’s people, was dead. And now God told Joshua that he would be the one to lead the people. What a huge task! We couldn’t blame Joshua for at least having a little fear. But God tells him to be strong and courageous and not to be afraid or discouraged. And this encouragement is more than a pep talk. This is God’s promise to Joshua that wherever he goes in the new land that God would bring them into—and however hard the task before him would be—God would always be right there with him.

We face difficulties all the time—at work and school, and with our families and friends. We have many opportunities to be discouraged and afraid. But God’s promise to us is the same as it was to Joshua: God will be with us wherever we go.

And if God is with us, what do we have to fear?

Prayer: Ever-present God, you promise to be with us wherever we go. Help us to remember this truth in the difficult tasks that lie ahead of us each day. Amen.

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Tat Daniels Erredge

Our dear son, brother and wonderful friend, Tat, unexpectedly, left this world on July 28, 2021 at the age of 33. Tragically, Tat was involved in an automobile accident.



Tat was born, the second of three children, to Terry (Thompson) and Robert Erredge on December 8, 1987. He was born in Zumbrota and grew up on the family farm. Tat enjoyed music and singing from toddlerhood on. His mom, Terry, said that often Tat would call to her (from his crib) to "turn over the cassette", he wanted to hear the other side.

Life on the farm was hard work for all, milking cows and doing chores. Always a music lover, as a young boy, Tat started singing in their church, Lands Lutheran Church. This is where Tat was baptized and later confirmed. He sang solo's and was in the youth choir which was led by his sister, Tomine. In middle school, under the encouragement of his mom, Tat sang in the Rochester Boy's Choir. Whenever the family was looking for Tat, they had to use their ears, not eyes, as Tat was always singing.

He attended Zumbrota/ Mazeppa High School, graduating in 2006. His many interests included; art, choir, drama, government and political science. He sang many solo's in High School, and was in many singing competitions. He continued his education at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Psychology. During college Tat participated in choir, was a decathlete on the track team, an honor student and on the Dean's List. Also, during his college years, Tat taught himself to play the harmonica and guitar. He began writing songs and joined in with other musicians to form a band called, "The Tree's".

After college, Tat was hired on as an assistant track coach for one year at Luther College. Also, he worked as assistant track coach at Zumbrota/Mazeppa School District. He and some high school buddies formed a new band, "The Unusual Suspects" and "Wine and Whiskey". In 2013, "Wine and Whiskey" was the opening band for Country music star Trace Adkins at the Goodhue VolksFest. Tat also began to teach guitar lessons to kids at Crossings, in Zumbrota. He worked a few odd jobs here and there, but his heart was at home, on the farm, helping his dad with the many duties of farm life. He worked alongside his dad

and grandfather on the 3rd generation dairy farm, for no compensation, other than the freedom and joy he found in working hard for a place to sleep and being home with family. Tat was instrumental in convincing his dad to sell the milk cows, the "27 bitches" and switch to beef cattle, as miking day in and day out was pretty grueling as most farmer's know!

Tat was a simple man, never having a desire to earn more than he needed to get by. He had an amazing singing voice, auditioning for The Voice and American Idol (x2). Tat could play many instruments, guitar and harmonica were by far his favorites, but he also had skill in playing slide guitar, banjo, mandolin and piano. He truly enjoyed bringing his music to backyard gatherings, various bars, weddings, funerals and charity benefits, not for pay necessarily, but for the pure enjoyment of being able to perform. Food and drink was enough "pay" for him. At the time of his passing, Tat was living and working on the family farm, he inherited the beef cattle after his father passed away in 2019. Tat was a lover of playing chess on-line, engaging in philosophical conversations, political debates, mythology, searching for agates and hanging out with Ren, his beloved dog, a black lab mix. Tat nurtured a love for all things that grew. Left to cherish his memory include; mom, Terry Erredge, sister and brother-in-law, Tomine and Chuck Earles, bonus nephew, Cole Earles, brother, Robert Erredge (Shareen Brazil), grandfather, Robert "Bob" Erredge, many aunts and uncles and very special companion, fur buddy, Renegade, "Ren".

If you have symptoms of COVID-19 stay home from work and get tested regardless of your vaccination status.

COVID-19 Key Messages from MN Department of Health

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness. We are still learning new things about COVID 19. Here is some information you should know about COVID-19 to help protect your community.



Anyone of any age can get the disease. Some people may get sicker than others. People who have COVID 19 can give it to others, even if they do not feel sick.

Symptoms

Some people who have COVID-19 infection have felt only a little sick. Others got very sick. Some symptoms are:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath
- Chills
- Headache
- Muscle pain
- Sore throat
- Fatigue
- Congestion or runny nose
- Loss of taste or smell

Other less common symptoms include gastrointestinal symptoms like nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea.

Get tested if you feel sick. To find a testing place near you, visit COVID-19 Testing (www.health.state.mn.us/diseases/coronavirus/testsites/index.html).

Call your health care provider if you have questions or are worried about your symptoms.

Protect yourself and your community

Reduce your risk of getting sick or spreading COVID-19.

Get vaccinated. Every Minnesotan age 12 and older can get vaccinated for free.

- Find Vaccine Locations (mn.gov/covid19/vaccine/find-vaccine/locations/index.jsp) and sign up for an appointment. You may be able to get vaccinated without an appointment at some locations.
- Two doses are needed for the COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna, but only one dose is needed for Johnson & Johnson.
- Once you get your final dose, it takes two weeks for your body to build up protection (fully vaccinated).

If you are not vaccinated (including children):

- Wear a face covering indoors in businesses, public settings, and when around people from other households, as well as outdoors when you cannot stay at least 6 feet from others.
- Stay at least 6 feet away from people from other households.

Vaccinated or not vaccinated, the Minnesota Department of Health strongly recommends that you:

- Wash your hands often.
- Follow guidance on staying home (quarantine) if you were exposed to someone who has COVID-19. People who are fully vaccinated may not need to quarantine in many situations.
- Stay home if you are sick.
- Follow testing recommendations for when you travel, have COVID-19 symptoms, or are exposed to COVID-19.
- Work from home if possible.

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

"Wabasha Count History" Provides Interesting Information on Town

"Mazeppa village is the metropolis of southwestern Wabasha County."

So says, "The History of Wabasha County," a most interesting volume published in 1920.

Mazeppa village was named from the poem, "Mazeppa" by Byron, a favorite poem by Ira O. Seeley, who was invited to name the village. The hamlet was founded by Joseph Ford and his son, Orville D. Ford in 1855.

In June 1855, J.E. Hyde began erection of a log building at the corner of Main and Walnut streets for a store and residence. This was completed in September, and he returned to Galena, Ill. for his family and a stock of goods. These arrived on Oct. 1, and from that time supplies were kept here for the convenience of settlers. In the fall of 1855, Elijah Lont and his brother-in-law Lewis Blunt, built a large house on the corner of Chestnut and First streets. Evander Skillman afterward converted a part of this into a general store. J. W. Judd was the first iron worker. The first hotel was house built by N. B. Smith in the fall of 1855, on the corner later occupied by Charles Colling. Stages passed here twice a week and traffic was heavy.

In 1856 Orville D. Ford built the house now occupied by the Ami McDonoughs and opened it as a hotel. Orton Ford was the first harness maker; Henry Washburn was the first shoemaker. The first doctor was O.S. Lont, who practiced here for two decades. Lewis, son of Francis A. Stowell, was born here in the fall of 1855 and Roxie H. daughter of Enoch Young, was born Dec. 14 of the same year. These undoubtedly were the first children born to white parents within the township.

Village Incorporated in 1877

Mazeppa village was incorporated by the legislature of 1877. E.L. Ford and N. J. Majerus were appointed judges of the first election when 86 votes were cast. Elected were: President O.D. Ford; trustees, Prosper Robinson, D. Van Fleet and Welk B. Smith; treasurer, George Maxwell; recorder, Wesley Kinney; justice J.S. Huntley and constable, Alvin Kinney March 11, 1901, the voters of the village to entirely separate from the township.

In 2016, the City decided to repair and increase seating capacity at the Municipal Liquor Store facility. The City used an interfund loan from our reserves (savings) to pay for it. The Council chose to charge the Liquor fund interest at a rate 0.25% over our annual CD rates, so our reserves are growing at a slightly faster rate. The Liquor fund is still paying a lesser rate than bonding for the project. The City just transferred another \$24,082 of principal and interest in payment of that interfund loan from MMLS to City reserves.

I mention this because this is the time of year that City staff compiles data for the next year's budget. We try to predict what the needs will be, and how to allocate funds accordingly to provide services and plan projects. We determine how much of the list of needs we can provide in the budget year. How much we can do is totally determined by how much revenue the City receives. We do our best to manage the budget responsibly. Next month, a bit more detail on where the money comes from and how it is allocated.

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
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Changes in Latitudes, Changes in Attitudes Run Aground

This column is written by Messenger editor and Minnesota native Terry Campbell. Terry now splits his time between Minnesota when it's warm here and Tennessee when it's cold here.

The American Cruise Line has big boat that comes past Dover frequently. It is on the Music City Cruise route. The 8-day trip starts at Memphis and heads up the Mississippi to Paducah where it stops for the first night. There the ship passes through the lock into the Cumberland River. It comes down Lake Barkley and stops for a day at Dover to tour the historical Civil War battlefields. From there it is on to Clarkesville and finally to Nashville.

The cruise ship has six decks and 99 cabins, accommodating 190 guests. There are two lounges, a dining room, a café, a library, yoga/fitness room, laundry and four observation/sundecks.

We see many barges coming up and down river on a daily basis and have a couple times passed the cruise ship while piloting our 17' runabout on the river. Our little bowrider has a draft of a couple feet and

one makes sure to stay between the marker buoys on the river because even a small runabout can touch bottom in some places. Lake Barkley was formed about seventy years ago when the hydro-electric dam was built on the Cumberland River. Flooding a river will give you a lot wider waterway, but the shoreline can be misleadingly shallow if you are not careful.

So back to the mechanics of boating where the weight of your craft determines the draft, or depth of your hull below the waterline. One assumes if you were piloting a mega-million dollar cruise ship, the captain would be well schooled in avoiding river bottoms. Really no excuse for a mistake with modern depth finders and navigational tools.

But imagine our amusement in June when the American Jazz Cruise Ship ran aground

just outside Dover. Seems the captain steered the ship on the wrong side of the channel buoy and got stuck in the mud. Took a couple Coast Guard tug boats to pull the ship free. And plenty of amusement to the local folk. Moral of the story seems to be if you see a tree growing in the lake, you might be in pretty shallow water.
