Forgiveness Freedom

To err is human to forgive divine...Most of us have experienced the relief of receiving forgiveness from someone we hurt. And as believers we have experienced the forgiveness of Jesus Christ for our sins. Sadly, we have times and people that we struggle to forgive; those that have sinned against us. There's a warning that deals with that in a pretty well-known passage in the Bible-the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 6:12-15, "and forgive us our sins, as we have forgiven those who sin against us. 13 And don't let us yield to temptation but rescue us from the evil one. 14 "If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive vou. 15 But if you refuse to forgive others. your Father will not forgive your sins."

Pretty tough standard put into place by Jesus- Forgive as we have been forgiven- or you will not be forgiven.

It had been over 22 years since Joseph had seen his brothers. The Bible tells us that he was 30 years old when he stood before Pharaoh and was made the 'prime minister' over all Egypt. For thirteen years, after being sold into slavery, he spent time as a slave and a prisoner. All through no fault of his own. Now, before him stands the very ones that sold him into slavery and caused all his pain and the separation from his family. But, despite the pain that his brothers had caused him we see an amazing response to his brothers.

Instead of vengeance Joseph gives forgiveness. Did they deserve it? No. Yet Joseph knew God and he knew the hand of God. He also understood that no matter what happens to us in life "Everything works good for them who love the Lord". (Romans 8:28.) The bad in our lives may be caused by someone else but God always brings good. Not always as we think it should be or even when we think it should be. God redeems those bad things in our life and brings about something amazingif we keep our faith and trust in Him. And that's where Satan will attack! He desires to

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We see it here in full force- Satan wanted to destroy the people of Israel and what better way than through envy and fear within the family of Jacob/Israel. If he could destroy Jacob's family- God's plan for the Messiah would have been stopped (in Satan's mind anyway.) Allowing bitterness and hatred into our family is a powerful tool of Satan. This often comes from unforgiveness. We have to

destroy anything good- especially our fam- remember that "Conflict is inevitable, but relationships- even those of our families. Forcombat is optional."

> It is extremely important that within our families we learn to forgive one another. Sadly, there are people who carry around unforgiveness toward their parents or siblings for years. They are eaten up with unforgiveness which turns to hatred. If you or someone in your family has done something to hurt another person, your best recourse is forgiveness. Forgiveness can mend our

giveness may even help win our relatives to the Lord.

We must learn to forgive.

• Forgive as you have been forgiven, 'Make allowance for each other's faults, and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others." Colossians 3:13.

• Forgive as often as necessary Back to Matthew 18:21-22, "Then Peter came to him

and asked, "Lord, how often should I forgive someone who sins against me? Seven times?" 22 "No, not seven times," Jesus replied, "but seventy times seven!

Dine-In Returns to Vang Lutefisk Dinner





It's Homecoming!


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



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Application Deadline Extended for FEMA Individual **Assistance**


ST. PAUL -Homeowners and renters who suffered damage to their property from the severe storms and floods of June 16 -July 4 have additional time to apply for federal disaster assistance. FEMA has extended the application deadline to October 27, 2024, for survivors in the 21 Minnesota counties designated for Individual Assistance.

FEMA assistance may include funds for

temporary housing while you are unable to live in your home, such as rental assistance or reimbursement for hotel costs; funds to support the repair or replacement of your primary home, including privately-owned access routes, such as driveways, roads, or bridges; and funds for disaster-caused expenses and serious needs, such as repair or replacement of personal property and vehicles, funds for moving and storage, medical, dental, child care, funeral expenses, and other pre-approved miscellaneous items.

Disaster survivors who have not yet applied for FEMA assistance should apply online at DisasterAssistance.gov, use the FEMA App on your phone, visit a Disaster Recovery Center or call 800-621-3362. If you use a relay service such as video relay service, captioned telephone service or others, give FEMA your number for that service when you apply.

Benjamin Dierks has chosen a project that will help our small community by building a "Pollinator Garden" at the Wanamingo Community Gardens. As many of you are aware, pollinator numbers in the United States are decreasing. It is important for all of us to pitch in and do what we can to increase the population of bees, beetles, butterflies, flies, wasps, moths, and even mosquitos.

This is crucial to our survival as a species, because without our pollinators, we have no food. The causes of this decrease are pesticides used on our crops, habitat loss as we continue to destroy their habitat with developments, and diseases as the climate changes. So, what Benjamin is doing with this project is giving the bugs a place to thrive.

Benjamin is also a member of the Goodhue County 4H, in the yellow class, which is a leadership program across the United States. "We went to Morris, Mn to help the community build a pollinator garden with vegetables and flowers for their town. In 4H, we help

others with projects, and it is a lot of fun. I took a picture of their garden, surrounded by rocks with a tower of rocks in the middle, and felt it would be a great project for my Eagle Scout badge."

Benjamin's design is a triangle with rocks around the perimeter, and stepping stones going through the garden. There will be signs telling what the plants are, and how they help the environment. Benjamin's dad, Eric, added that they are going to try to put in the indigenous plants that thrive here. Eric has been studying the plants, too, through a Minnesota Master Naturalist Volunteer program through the University of Minnesota, so I know it will be a lovely plot of ground when they are done. They have been meeting with the Master Gardners of Goodhue County to help them decide what the best pollinator plants



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Today, September 14th, they broke ground, and laid out the triangle. They used the Community Garden's tiller to till the soil after removing the first layer of grass. Next week on the 21st, they are going to be laying out the perimeter of the garden with rocks they find, and are hoping some folks will come down to the gardens from noon to 4 pm to make

Rommegrod

Funding Available to Assist with **Sustainable Agriculture** Research

Applications are due December 12, 2024

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) is now accepting applications for grants to support innovative sustainability-focused research or demonstration projects on Minnesota farms.

The Agricultural Growth, Research, and Innovation (AGRI) Sustainable Agriculture Demonstration Grant funds projects that explore the energy efficiency, environmental benefit, and profitability of sustainable ag techniques, from the production through marketing processes. Minnesota farmers or individuals from organizations including agricultural cooperatives, educational institutions, nonprofits, tribal governments, and local units of government (such as Soil and Water Conservation Districts) are eligible to apply.

Eligible projects must test and demonstrate on-farm practices that will benefit a broad range of farmers. Past grants have explored topics such as cover crops and crop rotation; conservation tillage; pest management techniques; input reduction strategies; and alternative energies such as wind, methane, and

The MDA will award approximately \$350,000 in this round of grant funding, and applicants may request up to \$50,000 per project. No cash match is required for requests below \$25,000. However, for requests between \$25,000 and \$50,000, applicants must provide a dollar-for-dollar match.

Projects must last two to three years, and grantees are asked to share what they learn through outreach efforts. Project updates are published annually in the MDA's Greenbook, which provides a summary of each project along with results, management tips, locations of previous projects, and other resources.

The AGRI Sustainable Agriculture Demonstration Grant program will accept applications through 4 p.m. on Thursday, December 12, 2024. To apply and read the full request for proposals (RFP), visit the grant webpage.

Funding for this grant is made available through the MDA's AGRI Program, which administers grants to farmers, agribusinesses, schools, and more throughout Minnesota to advance the state's agricultural and renewable energy sectors.

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
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Anhydrous Safety Key Goal for Farmers This Fall

The MDA offers safety tips for those maintaining equipment and applying and transporting NH3

Many farmers and custom applicators will soon apply anhydrous ammonia (NH3) after harvest. Even with a rush against time and the weather, safety should never be compromised. Accidents involving NH3 have proven how dangerous and deadly the fertilizer can be when not handled properly.

The Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) offers the following tips to farmers, fertilizer dealers, and custom applicators to safely field apply NH3.

Always wear NH3-rated goggles and gloves. Never wear contact lenses.

Be sure to have a clean and accessible emergency water supply of at least 5 gallons available.

Exercise caution when making connections and disconnections of transfer lines, treating them as if they always contain NH3.

Stand upwind when connecting, disconnecting, bleeding lines, or transferring NH3. Also, close, bleed, disconnect, and secure valves and transfer lines when taking breaks or disconnecting lines, and be sure to handle hose end valves by the valve body.

Position equipment away and downwind from homes, people, and livestock.

Safety is also key to those maintaining NH3 equipment, operating NH3 storage facilities, and transporting NH3.

Never assume NH3 lines are empty.

Always wear the required protective safety equipment.

Have access to safety water (NH3 storage facilities must have a minimum of one open

top container holding 150 gallons of clean, accessible water or an accessible emergency shower with a plumbed eyewash. A 5-gallon container of clean, accessible water must accompany NH3 nurse tanks).

When towing a nurse tank down the road, drive sensibly. Do not go any faster than 30 miles per hour, display a slow-moving vehicle (SMV) emblem visible from the rear, and be sure the tank is secured to the tractor or truck with two separate, independent chains that supplement the hitch pin/clip.

If an accident or spill occurs, seek medical care if needed, immediately call 911, and then the Minnesota Duty Officer at 1-800-422-0798

As a reminder, fall application of NH3 should happen after average soil temperatures reach 50 degrees F or cooler to help prevent nitrogen loss and ensure more nitrogen will be available for next season's crop.

Under the MDA's Groundwater Protection Rule, fall nitrogen fertilizer application is prohibited in vulnerable groundwater areas of Minnesota due to environmental concerns or risks. View a map of the vulnerable regions of the state.

MARSHALL, Minn. - Yelloh has announced it will cease all operations in November 2024, closing out a storied 72-year history as a Min-

nesota pioneer in the food home-delivery market. Founded in Marshall, Minn., where it still maintains a headquarters, the company grew to a nationwide frozen food delivery leader with the country's largest fleet of freezer trucks.

Since its founding in 1952, Yelloh made highquality frozen meals, foods, treats, and ice cream accessible to American homes by delivering products to neighborhood doorsteps with its fleet of iconic yellow trucks. The company set itself apart with the friendly, trusting relationships it built between customers and team members, some of which lasted for decades.

"It's with heavy hearts that we made the difficult decision to cease operations of Yelloh," said CEO Bernardo Santana. "We are thankful to our many loyal customers and hard-working employees for everything they have done to support us. I am deeply grateful for our employees' tireless and bold efforts, and our customers' dedication. It has been our utmost

pleasure and honor to serve our customers their favorite meals and frozen treats.

'As it is for the people of Yelloh, closing this company is a heartbreaking decision for me personally," said Michael Ziebell, Board Member, who was a 22-year veteran of the company holding leadership roles in the 1990s and early 2000s before returning recently as a Board member. "Our concern is now for our employees and caring for them as we all come to terms with the fact that this business - that served millions of families and provided a livelihood for thousands over the decades – has regrettably run its life cycle.

The company cited multiple insurmountable business challenges for the decision, including economic and market forces, as well as changing consumer lifestyles.

"The current Yelloh team has worked hard against external headwinds such as the nationwide staffing challenges and crushing food supply chain disruption caused by the pandemic," said Ziebell. "These challenges, combined with changing con-



sumer lifestyles and competitive pressures that have been building for over 20 years, made success very difficult. Digital shopping has replaced the personal, at-the-door customer interaction that was the hallmark of the com-

Yelloh will wind down operations over the next two months, taking care of employees with notice and pay in accordance with the WARN Act. The last day products may be purchased via Yelloh trucks will be Friday, November 8.

Yelloh - the former Schwans home delivery business, is separate from the Schwans Company, which continues operations serving retail, grocery and food service customers. The home delivery business was split off in 2019 when new majority owners took over the Schwans Company.

- Don't Rush It may take an extra moment or two to walk down every step or double-check a piece of equipment. But that extra time may be a lifesaver. Don't cut corners when it comes to
- Identify hazardous areas on equipment and make sure you stay away from moving parts. Beware of pinch points, shear points, wrap points, pull-in areas, thrown objects, crush points, stored energy hazards and freewheeling parts.
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- Wear proper dust-filtering respirators when working in and around grain handling areas. High amounts of dust and molds could be present and could be very dangerous.

Ask **A Trooper**

Ouestion: This week it has been extremely foggy on the morning commutes, can you give some advice on driving in fog?

Answer: Driving when the weather limits your visibility can be a challenge for all of us on the road. You can reduce your chances of being involved in a crash by eliminating distractions and by following a few safety tips.

Minnesota law states that every vehicle on a roadway shall display lighted headlamps,

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lighted tail lamps, and illuminating devices from sunset to sunrise. The law also applies when it's raining, snowing, sleeting, or hailing and at any time when visibility is impaired by weather or insufficient light, at a distance of 500 feet ahead.

Basic automatic headlights work through sensors which detect how much light is outside. These sensors are located on the dash of the vehicle. The headlights turn on when the sensors detect a certain level of darkness or the level of ambient light.

The problem is there are limitations to automatic headlights. Sometimes they do not turn on during heavy rain, snow or fog, as the light sensor still detects some light.

Many drivers fail to physically turn on their headlights, which will also activate the rear taillights and marker lights. Some drivers as-

sume the sensors will activate all of the vehicle's lights in reduced visibilities, but that is not always the case.

We recommend what's called the 3-secondplus following distance rule. Watch the vehicle in front of you. When that vehicle passes an object such as a sign, pole, bridge, etc., count off three seconds. You should not arrive at that spot sooner than your count to three. If you do, you are following too close! Also, you must add one second for every hazard that exists. Hazards include but are not limited to heavy traffic, rain, snow, fog, driving into the sun, etc. In some cases you might have to allow six, seven seconds (or even more) to be safe because of existing hazards.

We also recommend when driving in dense fog, heavy rain or snow to drive in the right lane of a two lane roadway going in the same direction. In the event that a vehicle is traveling the wrong way, chances are that they will be in your left lane as they approach and pass by you.

When visibility is reduced, slow down, increase your following distances, manually turn on your lights and eliminate all distrac-
