Second Timothy 4:3 (AMP) says, "For the time will come when people will not tolerate sound doctrine and accurate instruction [that challenges them with God's truth]; but wanting to have their ears tickled [with something pleasing], they will accumulate for themselves [many] teachers [one after another, chosen] to satisfy their own desires and to support the errors they hold."

When we read this verse, it should sadden all of us. It is stating that there will be a time when many will want to hear only what makes them feel good and not hear the truth, the Bible. These people will listen to "teachers" who will just make their ears content. They will turn away from truth by rejecting Jesus and will choose to conform to the ways of the world. Here are a few things I have seen and heard from some pastors, priests, and other religious leaders.

False Doctrine:

- Jesus isn't the only way to heaven.
- The Bible is too old, and it needs to catch up to the times we live in.
- It will be okay to take the mark of the beast.
- Do whatever feels good.
- Denial of the Trinity.
- There is no hell.

True Doctrine:

- Jesus is the only way to heaven (John 14:6).
- The Bible is the inspired Word of God, is alive and active, and is profitable for teaching as well as reproof (Hebrews 4:12 and 2 Timothy 3:16). As the times change, which they will, this just proves the importance of being rooted in the Bible and following its truths

- It will not be okay to take the mark of the beast. If one does, they will be tormented, and that torment will be in hell (Revelation 14:9-
- Truth does not stand on feeling; truth stands on what the Word of God says (2 Timothy 2:22 and John 17:17).
- We have one God made of three persons. God is the Father (1 John 3:1–2 and Ephesians 4:6). God is Jesus (John 1:1, 4). God is the Holy Spirit (Acts 5:3-4). Matthew 28:19, Isaiah 48:16, and 1 Peter 1:1-2 also confirm the

Trinity.

• Hell is real. Jesus warns us of hell—eternal punishment (Matthew 25:41-46).

What are some things we can do to prepare so we don't fall into false doctrine? Here are a few steps we can take to be able to distinguish between truth (the Bible) and false doctrine. We have to be reading the Bible. The only way we can differentiate truth versus untruth is by being in the Word. We need to be studying and soaking in it. If it is difficult for you to get into the Word of God, I would recommend starting with the Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and

John). Even if it is a chapter a day, it is better than nothing. Over time I believe your reading of the Bible will increase and your passion to learn the Word will grow. The enemy is trying to groom all of us to a point where evil is good and good is evil (Isaiah 5:20). This is scary, but it is happening already and will continue to happen. Preparing for this has to be now—it can't wait. Our lives depend on it. Let's stand up for truth (the Bible) and grow together. We are a team, and let's help each other out. "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another" (Proverbs 27:17 NIV).



Thomas Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the

disciples when Jesus came. John 20:24

I can understand Thomas's doubt. For whatever reason, he wasn't with the other disciples when Jesus first visited them after his resurrection, so he hadn't seen Jesus firsthand. Maybe he should have taken the disciples' word for it when they told him they had seen Jesus. Maybe he should have had more faith. Or maybe he was just an untrusting sort of person. Whatever the case, Thomas said he just couldn't believe Jesus was alive until he saw Jesus for himself.

When Jesus came again and Thomas could see him, Jesus was patient with Thomas. Jesus even showed Thomas what he said he needed to see in order to believe. But Jesus also noted that all who believe without seeing him will be blessed.

Today that includes you and me. Belief without seeing is the nature of our faith most of the time. We probably won't see Christ in person until we join him in eternity. Until then, though, we believe even though we have not seen.

We are called to have faith in Jesus for who he is, all he has done, and all he has promised. We believe because others have seen, because others have witnessed, and because their testimony is in God's Word to us, along with all of God's promises. We believe because the Spirit of God guides us into the truth of God's Word and gives us faith (see John 16:7-15; Ephesians 2:6-10). And in believing we are blessed.

Lord, help us to believe even though we have not seen. By your Spirit, lead us to know the truth that brings life in you. Amen.

She served others without expectation.

When she retired in Arizona, Stella soon found Lord of Life Lutheran Church where she used her excellent hosting skills to serve the congregation through food and met her second love, Stew Morton. They married May 27th, 2009. Sadly, Stella began her Alzheimer's journey too soon. They moved back to MN to be closer to family help until she moved into memory care in 2022. Cancer eventually took her to the Lord.

She loved her family and friends unconditionally and celebrated every milestone and accomplishment. We will miss this devoted, demanding, hardworking, glamorous, fierce, compassionate, dedicated, joyful, funny, intelligent, gracious, organized, practical, ethical, and generous woman.

67-year-old Killed in Rice County Crash Wasn't Wearing a Seatbelt, State Patrol Says

A 67-year-old man who was killed Friday after his vehicle collided with another on a wet road was reportedly not wearing a seathelt

According to the Minnesota State Patrol, Craig Eugene Johnson, 67, of Nerstrand, MN, was driving a 2014 Ford Escape in the eastbound lanes on Highway 246 around 1:42 p.m.

A GMC Yukon, driven by a 44-year-old woman from Kenyon, MN, was driving west on the highway when the two vehicles collided near 170th Street East.

The Minnesota State Patrol said Johnson was killed in the crash, and the other driver received non-life-threatening injuries and was taken to the hospital. She, according to the State Patrol, was also not wearing a seat belt.

Business Planning Grants Open for Minnesota **Dairy Farmers**

Apply early, funding is awarded on a first-come, first-served basis

Minnesota dairy farmers are encouraged to apply for the Minnesota Department of Agriculture's (MDA) Dairy Business Planning Grants, a funding opportunity designed to support diary operations in planning for the future.

Eligible projects include hiring a qualified, independent third party to help create a business plan for your dairy operation. This can include plans to:

Evaluate the feasibility of expanding your operation

Plan for environmental upgrades

Develop a farm transition or succession

Update feedlot permits

Address other business planning needs

"Dairy farming comes with real challenges,

and thoughtful planning is essential. We're proud to offer Dairy Business Planning Grants to support Minnesota farmers as they look ahead to strengthen their operations. Their hard work brings fresh, high-quality dairy products to tables here in Minnesota and beyond," said MDA Commissioner Thom Petersen.

The grant pays 50 percent of the cost to develop a business plan, up to \$5,000. Producers are responsible for the remaining 50 percent. Applications will be funded on a first come, first served basis until June 1, 2025. The MDA has approximately \$28,000 remaining to be used this fiscal year.

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
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

Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management Launches Grant Program for Organizations to Help Farmers Succeed in the Legal Cannabis Industry

The Minnesota Office of Cannabis Management (OCM) announced a new program to



help Minnesota farmers enter and thrive in the cannabis industry. The \$2 million CanGrow program includes grants to eligible organizations that will help farmers navigate the regulatory structure of the legal cannabis industry through CanGrow farmer training grants, and to nonprofit organizations that will fund loans to farmers who want to expand into the legal cannabis industry through CanGrow farmer loan grants.

CanGrow farmer training grants will fund these eligible organizations to provide educational materials, training, and technical support to farmers who want to enter or expand into the legal cannabis industry. Project categories eligible for funding are outlined in the request for proposals. CanGrow farmer loan grants will fund nonprofit organizations to assist farmers by providing low-interest loans for entering the legal cannabis industry. This initiative aims to accelerate market entry and growth for farmers ready to start or expand their farms, avoid costs and risks for farmers at all stages of readiness, and reduce compliance risks, costs, and infractions for cannabis farms.

"Providing farmers the financial opportunity to take part in Minnesota's cannabis market and make strategic investments is the best way to ensure they can build equity," said OCM Interim Director Eric Taubel. "Through CanGrow, farmers who want to enter the cannabis market will receive support and tools to succeed."

The announcement comes a week after the formal adoption of OCM's rules governing Minnesota's adult-use cannabis market - a crucial step that allows the office to begin is-

suing business licenses to applicants who have completed all necessary steps in the application process. With rules in place, hundreds of social equity applicants are first in line to receive business licenses after completing application requirements.

CanGrow grant awards for technical assistance in the first round of funding are expected to range from \$10,000 to \$50,000 per project. Grant awards for loan financing are expected to range from \$200,000 to \$500,000 per eligible organization (individual farmer loans will range from \$2,500 to \$50,000 or up to \$150,000 for projects with matching funds). OCM intends to fund investments in eligible communities throughout the state with this competitive grant program. Organizations eligible to receive CanGrow farmer training grants include nonprofit organizations, educational institutions, local governments, private businesses, community groups and partnerships between different types of organizations. CanGrow farmer loan grants are only eligible to nonprofit corporations.

Organizations interested in applying for a CanGrow grant must submit a written application that explains their proposed community investment, the community's needs, and the expected positive outcomes. Applications will be evaluated based on their potential community impact, the organization's track record of success, and community support for the investment. Priority will be given to applications from organizations that demonstrate a history of successful training or navigation services, particularly for farmers facing barriers to education or employment. OCM will give weight to applications where

the proposed grant projects will serve areas where residents are eligible to be social equity applicants.

CanGrow grants are part of a larger collection of grants that will support and provide funding for technical assistance, financial capital, and workforce training for the Minnesota legal cannabis industry. The other grant programs are CanRenew, promoted through OCM, and three programs that are overseen by the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED): CanStartUp, CanNavigate, and CanTrain. "We recognize that financing and resources are critical for Minnesota farmers," said Jess Jackson, OCM's director of social equity. "CanGrow helps to increase access to ownership by ensuring underserved farmers get a fair opportunity at entering the cannabis market."

Funding will be awarded through a competitive process with review by a committee representing content and community specialists. OCM will announce selected grantees/awardees in fall 2025. If selected, applicants may only incur eligible expenditures when the grant agreement is fully executed, and the grant has reached its effective date.

Letter to the Editor;

Our state legislature is in the process of determining the budget. One item on the table is the funding of benefits for immigrants. I would urge readers to consider the economic benefits that immigrants bring to the United States and Minnesota. Immigrants compose about one-third of the workforce in farming, fishing and forestry, building, grounds cleaning, and maintenance organizations. Immigrants also provide 29% of the textile and garment industries workforce (2018, U.S. Department of Labor Statistics). Immigrants fill an important employment gap in the United States. There is a great demand for lowskilled labor. Immigrants are willing to fill those positions. Immigrants to the U.S. are also more likely than U.S. citizens to be employed (65.7% for foreign-born, 62.3% for native-born individuals). Immigrant workers help support the aging native-born population (sometimes as direct caregivers in group homes, assisted living, and long-term care institutions). They are willing to take the jobs that retiring baby boomers can no longer fill. Immigrant workers increase the Social Security and Medicare trust funds. (Yes, immigrants contribute to YOUR social security). Immigrants may require SNAP and Medicaid benefits to make ends meet; they are employed at minimum-wage jobs. Most of the immigrants who receive these benefits are employed while receiving benefits or they are married to someone who is working.

As a nurse, a nurse practitioner, and a nursing instructor I have worked with many students who did not begin their lives in the United States. I found them to be dedicated to quality patient care. I have worked with many nurses, nurse practitioners, and physicians who immigrated to the United States or those who held work visas I haven't had any problems working with them. I found them competent, easy to communicate with, and compassionate.

Therefore, I do NOT begrudge immigrants SNAP, Medicaid, and other benefits in Minnesota. When my great-great-grandparents came to the United States, they were immigrants. I am the descendant of immigrants and unless you are a member of one of the indigenous nations who share geography with Minnesota, so are you.

Talking Spring Allergies with U of M

As spring arrives, so does allergy season. The runny nose, sneezing and watery eyes that come with spring allergies can sometimes dim the excitement of the new season.

Neal Godse, MD, with the University of Minnesota Medical School and M Health Fairview, talks about spring allergy symptoms and steps to keep them under control.

Q: What are the main causes of spring allergies?

Dr. Godse: Allergies are an inflammatory response that our bodies create in response to some external irritant. Early spring allergies are typically caused by tree pollens — commonly birch, maple and oak — and, later in the season, by grass pollens. Molds can



also grow in damp, snow-melt environments and are another common source of spring allergies.

Q: What are the most common symptoms of spring allergies?

Dr. Godse: Runny nose, sneezing, itchy/watery eyes, nasal congestion — difficulty breathing through the nose, or a "stuffy nose" — facial pressure and headaches are classic issues that people with spring allergies face. This can also affect sleep, create fatigue and cause brain fog when severe.

Q: What steps can you take to minimize your exposure to allergy triggers?

Dr. Godse: It can be difficult to avoid exposure to spring allergens. With the weather getting better, people want to be outside! Some helpful strategies include staying indoors with air conditioning on days with high pollen counts, using an air filter to reduce airborne pollen counts in your home, keeping windows closed at night and using a mask when gardening or doing yard work.

Q: What are the available options for managing allergy symptoms?

Dr. Godse: There are a number of good options for treating allergies. Nasal saline can help flush irritating allergens out of the nose. Oral and topical antihistamines block histamine, one of the key inflammatory chemicals released in response to allergens. Nasal steroid sprays are powerful anti-inflammatory medications that work very well to reduce symptoms. Be careful of decongestant sprays: these can help with symptoms, but can damage the nose over the long term.

Q: How does your work at the University of Minnesota advance health in Min-



nesota?

Dr. Godse: Our research at the University of Minnesota Medical School is focused on better understanding how issues like nasal allergies play into chronic inflammatory sinus diseases and how we can treat these issues in a more comprehensive and targeted way.

Dr. Neal Godse is an assistant professor at the University of Minnesota Medical School and a rhinologist and skull base surgeon at M Health Fairview. His research focuses on better understanding and treating patients with cancer of the nasal cavity and skull base. He is also interested in the novel applications of emerging technologies to patients with these issues and chronic inflammatory sinus disease.

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
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






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
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
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




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
