# **Preserving the Past**

When the Mantorville Opera House began in 1918, no one truly recognized its future significance. However, after facing the effects of a changing nation and many years of neglect, the building slowly fell into disrepair. Under the burden of looming roof repairs and several other needs, the city decided to deed the decrepit building to the emerging Mantorville Restoration Association. Immediately recognizing the building's historical value, members of MRA quickly began their rehabilitation efforts. Following a careful restoration of the roof, utilities, and a specially refurbished interior, the Opera House has returned to its original glory, where it now serves as a space for rent and the Mantorville Theater Company's yearround plays.

My focus in this article will be on the gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ—something very important for the body of Christ to understand.







Its story reveals but one of the Mantorville Restoration Association's many efforts to promote, preserve, and protect the history and culture of Mantorville's historic district.

Before progressing this mission through annual events and fundraisers, the MRA began as a humble group of changemakers hoping to spark interest in local historical sites. Since their first meeting at a crowded cafe in 1963, membership exploded with a second meeting of 250 people and the purchase of the original Restoration House. With the hope of preserving the downtown area's integrity, they became a part of the National Register of Historic Places and further expanded preservation efforts. Mantorville's historic district began in 1974 with five new properties centered around Main and 5th Street. To better inform community members of their efforts, the association's monthly paper updates members on progress while sharing insights into the 24 structures as old as 1850.

Even before the buildings received new signs in 2021, their illustrious past stood out to members, tenants, citizens, and visitors for their well-known ghost stories and history. As a result, a large chunk of the board's budget lies in restoration projects like improving the Greek Revival House, tuckpointing the basement of the Opera House, roofing the Normal School, cleaning up flood damages, and much more. Guided tours set up through the organization's website are a big part of this economic growth, helping to attract tourists drawn in by their intriguing

tales. When asked to comment on these structures, Vice President Chris Pluto emphasized the vast historical and present differences in their scope. Despite these distinctions, each building closely works with each other and the Dodge County Historical Society to reflect its living history and support community members.

Chris Pluto: "We first purchased the Restoration House to serve as a museum. The log house, meanwhile, acts as a working building for the brewery. Functions of a oneroom schoolhouse are highlighted by the Normal School's interior. Before it was demolished, we saved the Greek Revival House and transformed it into an event area. Meanwhile, the Opera House manages the Mantorville Theater Company and the gambling side of things. Finally, income generated by Hawk Horvath's ghost adventures in the Carriage House and other buildings supports events, civic assistance, and playground equipment."

Funding these ventures requires more community interaction than one might expect. Alongside its many annual events and fundraisers, members rely on charitable gambling approved by MGCB regulations, generous donations, and further involvement in the community. To spark mutual change, the MRA funds local high school scholarships and the widely celebrated "National Night Out" event. Going through the restoration committee's yearly calendar, the town kicks off its year with its annual Mulligan Stew at the Hubbel House. While supporting a good cause, community members gather here for cocktails, wine, stew, and a live auction



whose funds go directly toward supporting Mantorville's preservation. Though weekly raffles and bingos make a difference, much of their funding derives from charitable gambling operations featured at the Mantorville Saloon, Harold's Club, and Dodge Center's Plaza Morena.

To utilize the beautiful downtown of Mantorville, the association hosts its annual Stagecoach Days from June 24th to the 26th. It's unlikely that the Victorian frontier era promoted by this three-day spectacle would shine without the surrounding area. Meanwhile, the regionally renowned Marigold Days occur every weekend after Labor Day. What initially began as a flower show to promote marigolds has transformed into one of southern Minnesota's most attended festivals, in which people will soon gather for its 60th anniversary to enjoy food, flowers, and flea markets on September 6th and 7th. Like Mulligan Stew, the Merry Hour caps off an eventful year with drinks, hors d'oeuvres, and a live auction of holiday decor. One of the only year-round drivers behind the city's economic growth has been the Mantorville Theater Company, which hosts its melodramas, musicals, and comedies in the historic Opera House.

Although the building has mostly returned to its former glory, over a century of damage has taken its toll on the roof. Temporary fixes may have stifled the damage caused by recent storms, but replacing the structure's rock, top layer, patching, and rubber will likely cost the board around \$50,000. Generating so much funding is only possible through the Mantorville Restoration Association's events, charitable raffles and gambling, and the generous donations of sponsors and individuals. Whenever community members attend events like the Marigold Days, play pull tabs at the saloon, or participate in weekly bingo nights, they actively help preserve what would have been a near-forgotten history. Beyond their restoration projects, this income allows the non-profit to pay taxes and rent, give their accountants and employees wages, and fund more games and events. Preserving the history of Mantorville or any town is a communal effort- not just a corporate one.




The weekly event is entirely free and community-driven. Visitors are encouraged to

Spring is starting to make an appearance here in Minnesota. The trees are starting to leaf out, flowers are beginning to bloom, and the birds are chirping! For many, spring is a busy time to start projects around your property, whether you're getting ready for the crop season, wanting to start a new construction project, or maintaining existing projects after the long winter months.

It is important as a landowner to know the regulations involving your land. One of the regulations to consider is the Wetland Conservation Act (WCA). The WCA was enacted in 1991 and designed to protect wetlands in Minnesota. Wetlands provide several benefits to the environment including, but not limited

to, flood control, wildlife habitat, and improved water quality. The protection of these unique ecosystems is done by regulating draining, filling, and excavating activities in a wetland area.

While some wetland areas have long periods of standing water and aquatic vegetation, other wetland areas aren't as obvious. As planting season kicks into gear, many Rice County farmers and rural landowners are out preparing fields, repairing tile lines, or planning new construction. But before digging, ditching, tiling, or filling any low-lying areas, it's important to consider potential wetland areas.

Whether you're new to rural landownership or have been farming for decades, understanding how wetlands interact with your land is key to avoiding surprises.



Question: I read your last article about road construction and work zones. Can you talk about the zipper merge? It seems like a lot of people don't know what it is or can't figure it out. Thank you.

Answer: The "Late Merge - Zipper Merge" is a driving strategy that requires drivers to change their mindset about merging. Traditionally, drivers have been taught to merge early when a lane is ending. Early merging leads to longer backups, more crashes and road rage incidents.

#### **Zipper Merge Procedure**

• When you see the "lane closed ahead" sign and traffic is backing up, stay in your current lane until the point of merge.

• Take turns with other drivers to safely and smoothly merge into the remaining lane.

• When traffic is heavy and slow, it is safer to remain in your current lane until the point where traffic can take turns merging orderly. **Benefits of the Zipper Merge**

• Reduces the overall length of traffic backups by up to 40 percent.

• Reduces congestion at freeway interchanges, especially in metropolitan areas.

· Creates a sense of fairness when all lanes are moving at the same speed.

• Reduces incidents of road rage.

Question: I drive truck for a living. Can you write about people that cut us off? These big riggs can't stop on a dime. It's frustrating because when they do that it can cause a wreck.

Answer: Changing lanes and cutting in too close in front of another vehicle is always dangerous, but it's especially dangerous to cut off a commercial bus or truck. If you move in quickly from either side, you're likely to be in a blind spot, so the driver may not see you in time. Even if you're visible, the vehicle may not be able to slow down quickly enough to avoid a crash because of the time it takes to stop.

Commercial vehicles need more stopping distance than cars.

• Stopping Distance: An average passenger car traveling at 55 mph can stop within 130 to 140 feet. A fully loaded tractor-trailer may need more than 400 feet to stop completely.

• Safe Following Distance: Following a commercial vehicle too closely reduces your ability to see the road ahead. Maintain a safe following distance and position your vehicle so the driver can see you in their side mirrors. This will also give you time to react if the commercial vehicle stops suddenly.

· Headlights at Night: Commercial vehicles have large side mirrors that can reflect light. When following a commercial vehicle at night, always dim your headlights to avoid blinding the driver.

• Merging: When a commercial vehicle merges into traffic, it needs more time than a car to accelerate and reach normal speed. Be prepared to slow down or change lanes to allow the truck to merge safely.

• Stopping on an Upgrade: If you stop behind a commercial vehicle on an upgrade, allow space for the truck to roll back slightly when it starts to move. Position your vehicle on the left side of your lane so the driver can see you in the side mirror.

Question: I have been receiving text messages about an "E-Z Pass Final Reminder." It's something about having an outstanding toll and submitting payment. I was told it was a scam. Can you get me more information on this?

Answer: Here is information from the Minnesota Department of Transportation E-ZPass page.

Scammers are sending fake messages pretending to be MnDOT, E-ZPass or other tolling agencies. These messages claim you owe money and direct you to a payment link. This is a scam! We will never text or email you asking for payment or personal information. If you receive a suspicious text or email message, delete and do not respond. Don't set up an account due to a text or email scam. Scam information:

 Minnesota E-ZPass (MnDOT) will never email or text you for payment or personal information.

Text numbers and email addresses are chosen at random, and they are targeting everyone-not just E-ZPass users. There is no data breach.

• Delete and don't click on anything that seems off or suspicious. Report as "junk" or "spam" if your device has this option. This helps your device recognize spam.

· Do not set up a new or different E-ZPass account due to a text or email scam.

· If you clicked on a link or provided information, take efforts to secure your personal information and financial accounts.

· You can report fraud activity to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center or the Federal Trade Commission.

If you have questions or concerns, check your account through the secure customer portal, or contact us (MNDOT E-ZPass) directly.

Sometimes scam artists send what looks like an invoice in the mail. Scam letters will include a bogus or questionable URL link and will often have a sense of urgency. Minnesota E-ZPass, MnDOT, or other agencies may send a letter in the mail, but it will look official including agency letterhead, detailed information, and multiple methods for contacting and/or remitting payment to the agency. If you receive a letter in the mail, confirm it is legitimate and always verify information directly with the agency.

#### Question: I caught part of the news the other night and heard something about the 100 deadliest days. Can you get me more information on that?

Answer: I certainly can. Here is some information we shared on the Minnesota Department of Safety blog. The Minnesota State Patrol is urging drivers to make smart, safe



decisions as the state enters what is known as the "100 deadliest days" on the road.

This stretch, from Memorial Day through Labor Day, is the most dangerous time of year to travel in Minnesota. It coincides with peak travel nationwide and a troubling spike in fatal crashes.

In 2024, Minnesota saw 151 traffic deaths during this period. By year's end, at least 479 people had died on the state's roads.

"Our troopers work hard every year to keep fatalities down, but last summer was especially hard," said Minnesota State Patrol Col. Christina Bogojevic. "These are not just statistics - they are lives, families and communities forever changed."

The four main contributors to fatal crashes remain consistent: speed, alcohol, lack of seat belt use and distraction. Last year, each played a major role in Minnesota's traffic deaths:

- Speed: 138 fatalities
- Alcohol: 124 fatalities
- Unbelted: 108 fatalities • Distraction: 29 fatalities

"These are the leading killers on our roads," Bogojevic said. "And we see the consequences play out every day - in the Twin Cities and rural counties across Minnesota."

She said troopers continue to encounter drivers making dangerous choices - speeding down highways, texting behind the wheel, not buckling up and driving impaired.

The state patrol and more than 300 agencies across Minnesota plan to increase enforcement over the summer. Expect more patrols, targeted campaigns and greater coordination with local agencies.

"If you're speeding, driving impaired, unbelted or distracted, expect to see us," Bogoievic said.

But law enforcement says it can't turn the tide alone. They are asking all Minnesotans to do their part.

• Slow down and give yourself time to get where you're going

• Stay off your phone

• Buckle up — everyone, every time • Never drive impaired, by alcohol or drugs

"If every driver made those choices, we could flip the script," Bogojevic said. "This summer doesn't have to be deadly. It can be the safest."

*You can avoid a ticket* - *and a crash* - *if* you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and always drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

ages 0 to 9 involved in crashes were properly secured. Of those who were, most (87%) were not injured, and the rest had only minor injuries. Morgan's Story is a powerful reminder of why properly securing a child in a car seat matters. On June 3, 2024, she buckled her three young daughters in before leaving her mom's house in Lamberton. Just 12 minutes later, a crash took Morgan's life. Her daughters survived without a scratch – thanks to her care in securing them properly. Minnesota's updated child restraint law includes these key points:

· Rear-Facing: Keep your child rear-facing for as long as possible, at least until age two, AND until they've outgrown the seat by weight or height according to the manufacturer.

This is the safest position for your child's head, neck, and spine.

· Forward-Facing: Once your child has outgrown their rear-facing seat and is at least two years old, they can transition to a forward-facing seat with a 5-point harness. They should stay in this seat until at least age four AND until outgrown by height or weight.

· Booster Seat: Children must use a booster until at least age nine or until they've outgrown the booster AND can pass the 5-Step Test.

Back Seat: Kids under 13 must ride in the back seat whenever possible.

· Restraint Requirement: All children under 18 must be properly restrained in a car seat, booster, or seat belt, depending on their size and age.
