

"Every day is just a question of unknowns," said Janna Ross, a Pagosa Springs High School graduate who has resided in Kyiy, Ukraine, since 2011.

Normally, Janna, husband Daniel and 2-year-old son Oliver help run Safe Haven, a transition home in Kyiv for teens who are aging out of state-run orphanages. The home helps the teens learn basic life skills (in some cases even screwing in a light bulb) and navigate what's next in life, whether that's university, trade school or getting a job.

But now, they're helping those teens and their fellow workers navigate a war and provide aid to fellow Ukrainians. They're also helping the families and teens settle as refugees in the Czech Republic while settling there themselves.

#### A calling

"As a kid in high school, maybe even earlier, and into college, I just always wanted to do something bigger, be a part of something bigger, give back," Janna said.

We heard from another city near Mariupol known as Zaporizhzhya. Wearing a shirt that read "You are Stronger," O. shared that they are in a place where they are not an occupied territory, "Thank God." They are receiving people who are escaping from the city Mariupol.

'We can observe the horror of the situation through their stories and through their eyes. ... Our newsroom has this problem that we are trying to cover the whole region, including the occupied territories ... Russians cut off the Internet, cut off all the social networks and they also detained our colleagues ... It is very hard to cover what is going

on there ...," she continued. She spoke of the crimes Russia was committing and the threats journalists were receiving, saying, "We are receiving threats almost every day. They are coming from Russian email addresses, and they write that they know all of our personal information, and it's all been sent to Russian forces, and that we will be taken to court, according to Russian

law, as terrorists. ... "We do feel that it's very important to try to cover what's going on here and now, so we are trying to just keep working and ignore the threats."

Another journalist spoke of the injured who are flooding her city and how psychologically difficult it is to see the wounded children and soldiers.

A journalist from Kharkiv said that many of their journalists had to relocate. One of his co-workers was captured by the Russians and was able to escape and made her way to Finland.

'The main problem here is the shellings of the city of Kharkiv are quite chaotic ...," S. said. "When it is aviation or when it is rockets that are shelled from far away like heavy rockets, there is no way to predict where it is going to fall. It makes it difficult to ... cover things."

It was noted that many could not print their newspapers due to active combat and areas being occupied by Russia. They are relegated to only reporting online. These journalists are trying to evacuate their own families.

'We have lots of information about what's going on in the region. We keep in touch with the other hyper-local, smallwill be talking about peace and we will town regional media and exchange

10 percent of the information that we have because we do think about the security of our people. We are very afraid," she said about attracting the Russians to their location.

An editor from Odessa said their staff was still publishing three of their four print publications and running their online papers, too. Two of their staff members had joined the army as volunteers, three women had evacuated their children and the remaining 35 staff members were still working.

G. was in Lviv, where they were undergoing an air raid as he spoke. He should have been in the underground parking instead of Zooming with journalists.

"It's like a running joke, wherever I go, the air raids are coming massively," G. said. "So they say, maybe you should go to Moscow to the Red Square so the air raids will be concentrated there, finally."

These days they sit on balconies watching the warships at sea while shells fly overhead and they wonder where they will land. Will they be hit next?

"It feels like it's a terrible dream that's been lasting forever," he added.

G. said that they are observing the Russian army focusing on local government and journalists in the areas they occupy. One of his former classmates, who is the mayor in a neighboring city, was kidnapped.

"And we know that they do torture journalists and they do torture the representatives of local governments. ... he said. "So, we do take our security seriously. ... We have no doubt that victory will be ours," he added.

Those who remain struggle to stay safe and change the names of their family and friends in their phones for fear that they may be detained by the Russians. They have to decide whether they should keep generators to help them report or send them on to other places with no power. They spoke of trauma, tragedy and destruction, including shelling and bombing of civilians.

We were struck by the perseverance of those journalists who have armed themselves with their cameras and laptops to document and expose the atrocities against the Ukrainians that are unfolding each day.

One journalist emailed after the meeting: "Thank you for keeping Ukraine in your heart - this means a lot for us all!

## 100 years ago

Taken from SUN files of April 7, 1922

Lee Crane, carrier of the mail from Debs to Pagosa Springs, is having more than his share of grief these days. He is compelled to make his trips by snow shoes, sled, horseback and the running gears of a wagon, consuming as much as three days for one way.

The work of setting up the C.W. Houser mill on Snowball creek is proceeding as fast as weather and snow conditions permit. Several of the buildings have been completed and all machinery is on ground. It is now believed that it will be ready for operation about May 15th.

Someone imagined that the bath house on the east side of the river was afire at one o'clock this afternoon and turned in the alarm. Damage — nil.

About 4:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon one of the large plate-glass windows in the north room of the Hatcher Hdw. Co. store building was cracked by some means unknown to any of the occupants at the time it happened. It was at first thought to have been caused by a rifle bullet, but it is now believed that a marble in the hands of a small boy did the trick.

## 75 years ago Taken from SUN files of

April 4, 1947

At least two new business buildings and four dwellings are in the process of construction here in Pagosa Springs this week and additional accommodations for vacations are under way.

L.D. Goodrich, proprietor of Goodrich Tailors, stared work on his new Triangle Building next to the Boy's Market. The structure will be 40x50 feet and will be of block construction, an entirely modern building including living quarters in addition to the tailoring and cleaning plant.

Construction of an extension and entire new store front on Boy's Market was underway this week. Charles and Dick DeVore said the remodeling will give them about twice the amount of floor space the store now uses. The construction will be frame and will include display windows for the bakery goods and groceries.

Work continued on the modern tourist court being constructed by Harvey Catchpole as he installed wiring and plumbing.

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
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

It was announced this week by Eaton International that construction had started on a \$1.45 million dollar motel complex at the Pagosa development. The first phase will have 56 rooms, four suites, a restaurant, gift shop, lounges, swimming pools, sauna baths, and other facilities. It is to be known as Pagosa Lodge and will be affiliated with the national chain of Friendship Inns.

Snowfall on Wolf Creek Pass during March was the lightest of record. April is normally a month of fair snowfall. Snow course readings show that the snowpack is now far below normal and that moisture will have to be heavy in April if there is to be an adequate supply of runoff water.

April 10, 1997

A federal bankruptcy court recently passed a decision that will impact some Pagosa Lakes Property Owners. This decision is that the bankruptcy court has no jurisdiction over a request for relief and refund of the recreational amenity fee (FUSA fees) imposed by Fairfield Communities Inc. on some lots in Pagosa Lakes. These fees are meant to provide financial support for certain recreational amenities (including the golf course and tennis courts). The fees are unrelated to the Pagosa Lakes Recreation Center which is owned and operated by the PLPOA. Contingent on a number of legal options open to Fairfield, the bankruptcy court's decision could allow this class action suit to be heard by the Colorado District Court.

#### **Electric vehicles** Dear Editor:

A few weeks ago I penned a letter

regarding all electric vehicles (EV's) that claimed that 40 percent of America's electricity was produced by coal generated power stations. The following week Mr. Mike Schaefer corrected that claim by pointing out that only 19 percent of this nation's electricity is generated by coal. I appreciate the correction.

However, what Mr. Schaefer did not mention was that according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration is that not only is 19% of American electricity generated by coal, but an additional 40% of our electricity is powered by the fossil fuel natural gas. Thus a total of 59% of the power used by EV's comes from fossil fuels. Nearly 60% of the miles driven by these socalled "green" EV's are dependent on the fossil fuel industry.

Mr. Schaefer also claimed that EV batteries do not use rare earth minerals, but CBS news reports, "Neodymium is a vital component

of EV motor magnets. Two other rare earth minerals -- terbium and dysprosium are added to neodymium to allow it to remain magnetic at high temperatures." These rare earth minerals the nearly exclusive resources found in the People's Republic of China.

Mr. Schaefer also claimed that recharging times are a fraction of the eight hours I had claimed is inaccurate. Aside from the fact that it currently costs about \$2,000 - \$3,000 to install a level 2 charging station in your own garage, the reality is that the "ultra high speed charging stations" that can do the job in 15 minutes are nearly unavailable today. We live in a remote area of the United States. It is 100 miles to the closest Sam's Club and we are 160 miles from the closest Interstate Highway where charging stations are more likely to be available the years to come. Additionally, keep in mind that the driving range for EV's is for new batteries. Anyone who owns a cell phone knows that battery life deteriorates over time. Same is true for EV's. If you spend the money for an inhome charger you can save some money over the currently high cost of gasoline, but if you're on a road trip, you will pay through the nose to charge your EV.

The erroneous claim by Washington's environmental zealots is that it is not possible to produce clean energy from fossil fuels. The reality is that we can, and we have. Yet, the Biden regime seems intent on pushing the EV revolution on all of us despite the reality that those vehicles are still dependent in large measure on fossil fuels, rare earth minerals owned by China, and cobalt and nickel mines that are destroying not only the environment but the lives of the children forced to work in them.

So, if you want to drop between \$50,000 and \$70,000 on an EV, be my guest, but you will not save money and you will not save the environment.



#### **County Road 500** maintenance Dear Editor:

I was pleased to read in the March 24th edition of the Pagosa Sun that the Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) and the Southern Ute Tribal Council met to discuss potential risks and repairs on County Road 500. They talked about washouts and erosion on the road. As heavily traveled as this road is, ongoing maintenance throughout the year is critical not only for the health and safety of the county road residents and people driving the road but for fire trucks to be able to access fires higher up in the mountains. The article mentioned

the fire concerns. I wanted to point out that on Tuesday, March 29 there was a heavy rain storm down on CR 500 that turned the road into heavy mud in areas. I have family that live on CR500 to the east of the Caracas Bridge that crosses the San Juan. That day they were returning from Durango and had to drive up the hill. It would have been impossible to get up the hill without their 4 wheel drive because it was a dan-

gerous muddy mess. I know that in the past people have traveled that far after heavy storms only to turn back because they could not safely get up the hill.

The solution is to maintain the road throughout the year and put down gravel. There is very little gravel left from when the roads were maintained by graveling which seems to have been years ago. Now the emphasis seems to be on keeping the dust down so it gets sprayed but no gravel is added. I would like to strongly encourage the BoCC and the Southern Ute Tribal Council to seriously consider this in their plans.

#### ACRP and the 'big lie'

Dear Editor:

I am deeply disappointed that the Archuleta County Republican Party (ACRP) appears to have embraced the folly of the "Big Lie," the false allegation that the 2020 election was stolen, despite NO evidence that significant election fraud occurred at the Federal. State, or county level. I say this because on the homepage of the party's website, the following appears:

DEMAND ELECTION INTEG-RITY.

Require Photo ID

Get rid of any machines involved in the process, including tabulators.

End mass mail-in voting.

Voters must request a mail-in or an absentee ballot.

This demand is an insult to the thousands of election officials who toil faithfully to make our elections fair and honest, including here in Archuleta County. Many of these democracy heroes are Republicans, as the county party knows.

The ACRP wants everyone to vote on a paper ballot which would then be tabulated by humans This proposal is opposed by most County Clerks of both parties, as it would slow the process dramatically, cost much more, and make it less accurate. I saw an interview with the Republican Clerk in conservative El Paso County, Chuck Boerman, appearing in the Colorado Springs Independent. He cited a study conducted by two universities in 2012 that found that hand counting ballots resulted in a 2% error rate. He says that scanners are virtually error-free. His county's scanners were tested against the national standard of one misread ballot in 500,000 scanned. There was actually not a single misread. That, plus the fact that scanners are carefully secured and the whole process of vote tabulation is overseen by election judges of both parties makes hand tabulation a charade.

How about mail voting, which includes dropping off ballots at a drop box? Legislation establishing all mail voting passed in 2012 The legislation acknowledged that 70% of Coloradoans were already casting mail ballots. The law was developed with input from local

election officials of both parties, so received widespread support. The key to security in the system is ballot signature matching software, the same software used by banks to process billions of checks. Signature matching is supervised by election judges who are free to challenge any ballot. Ballot dropoff boxes require 24-hour surveillance. And voters can still cast ballots in person at the county election office, although only a tiny percentage do.

Mail in balloting has increase voter turnout from 51% in 2010 to 78% in 2020, which seems like what democracy is all about. Since 2012, both Democrats and Republicans have been elected, including Cory Gardner, who won a close upset race against incumbent Senator Mark Udall in 2014. Three other Republicans also won statewide races that year. At the same time, the cost of elections has plunged over 50%. So, mail balloting appears like a win-win, unless your party feels that it can't win elections if more voters turn out.

And where is the evidence of fraud? I ask all voters to look at the facts and reject solutions in search of a problem.

ering both sale prices and requests, such as fee waivers.

The report compared the offers with the assumption the county would occupy the courthouse for three years after sale, though some offers included provisions for the county to remain for longer.

In response to a question from Brown, Bernberg explained his report did not consider financing costs on the building, so a net present value calculation, which converts the value of money being paid over time in the future into a value in the present, was not needed.

However, he added that he had performed a net present value calculation on the lease-purchase financing the county currently owes on the building, which he indicated could be paid off immediately for \$875,651 or the county could place money in an escrow account which could be invested in interest-bearing securities issued by the U.S. government.

These investments would allow the county to pay off its \$875,651 debt while only spending \$764,000 in initial funds, Bernberg indicated.

Maez then raised concerns about the clarifications listed in Bernberg's report, which indicated areas of ambiguity in the various bids.

Maez suggested that the county should clarify these issues before moving forward and highlighted his concerns that the county lacks a "solid" plan for moving forward with constructing a new building.

Bernberg responded by stating that he would be willing to provide this service and by highlighting that he believed Ronnie Urbancyzk's bid provided five years of occupying the courthouse rent free and that this offered the county a high degree of flexibility in moving forward.

Maez then commented that even five years might be too little time and that he was interested in seeking arrangements that would give the county more than five years of occupancy.

Brown commented that he came at this issue with a "slightly different perspective" than Maez and highlighted that the county process for selling the courthouse and developing a new building had lasted two years so far.

He explained that he believed the county had a plan to move forward with constructing a new building and that the county would learn more about the offers and potential occupancy provisions in the process of selecting a bid and moving into negotiations.

"Frankly, I don't think that we're going to keep our bidders interested if we continue to kick this down the

#### the next step."

He agreed with Brown that the negotiations would help define specific terms of the bids.

He added that he felt that the only "real" items that were not included in his analysis were the costs of waiving the fees for dumping material from the building, which, according to his report was requested by Hart and potentially Urbanczyk, although Bernberg's report mentioned that this would require clarification.

Maez commented, "I'm not opposed to selling the building, but I want to know the brass tacks. I don't care what they put in there, but what I do care about is what we're responsible for. ... That's what I want the bottom line on."

He stated that the county could "accept one of these and then enter negotiations and that can still fall through too, the negotiations."

Schaaf commented that the county has a plan for developing a new building and that he is concerned about maintaining the interests of the bidders.

Bernberg praised Urbanczyk's bid, stating that it "rises to the top" due to its flexibility and added that the bid showed "some real creativity and thinking outside the box that, at least in my mind, can strategically align with the county and its future growth."

Bob Hart, who was present at the work session and also submitted a bid, then spoke to the commissioners about concerns he possessed surrounding the financial analysis and bidding process.

In this statement, he referenced a letter he had sent to the commissioners on April 3 outlining his concerns.

Hart objected to the report's statement that Urbanczyk's offer provided the most flexibility in terms of the county's options for staying in the courthouse, highlighting that his offers both offered five years of free occupancy of the courthouse, the same as Urbanczyk's, and included provisions allowing the county to stay in the courthouse and pay rent after the five years ended, which Urbanczyk's bid did not.

He also objected to the three-year time period the report had considered the bid values under, stating that the slow speed of building made it unlikely that the county would be able to move in three years, and suggested that the report had misrepresented the pricing on his second bid option.

Bernberg responded that he had interpreted a use of the word "or" in Hart's offer to indicate a separation of terms and that Hart's second option did not include a pricing scheme offered in his first option.

cerns, explaining that the document which modified Urbanczyk's bid was not dated, making it unclear when the modification had been made, and, in his opinion, had increased Urbanczyk's cash payment amount from \$250,000 to \$450,000, placing him ahead of other bidders.

Scholl, speaking for Scholl/Loeser/Blumhardt, and Hart both requested that this change to the bid be removed from consideration since it was potentially made after the deadline for final bids set by the BoCC, and that the offer be reverted to Urbanczyk's Jan. 19 offer, which included a \$250,000 cash payment.

Brown responded that the bidding process was not set up as a sealed bid process, although he believed it should have been due to the inequities that the county process had created favoring later bidders who had the opportunity to review and respond to earlier bids.

"But, I think this is also where we are in this and I see my responsibility as what's best for the county because that's my obligation," he said.

At the BoCC meeting later that afternoon, Hart reiterated his concern that the financial analysis, which he highlighted was paid for by the Archuleta County taxpayers, was inaccurate and stated that the potential revision by Urbanczyk after the bid deadline was "just wrong, plain wrong."

Hart also mentioned that he had spoken with Bernberg, who Hart said had agreed that there were inaccuracies in his analysis and had indicated that he would correct his report.

Scholl requested the county "level the playing field" and move forward with making the decision "properly."

"I know that there's thought that there's no plan. Well, I can tell you, if you never start, you never finish. And that's for sure. I don't like kicking the can down the road," Brown said, speaking of the disservices done when governments do not make decisions in a timely manner. "They don't because they're often the hard decisions to make and, frankly, they don't want to take the flak for making decisions. And so we put it off until we can just slip it in and nobody notices. And that's irresponsible governing, in my opinion."

Brown then commented that he wanted the financial analysis to ensure the county makes the best decision it can and that he felt that it was crucial to ensure the prospective buyer is able to close on the property quickly to prevent further delays in the sale process.

He also highlighted that he feels it is important to consider remodeling versus demolishing the building, as demolition would both change the

a professional presenting a report that has inaccurate ... information should be accepted by the county and the taxpayers."

Archuleta County Attorney Todd Weaver then suggested that the county could table the decision until the next BoCC meeting on April 19 and give all current bidders until April 8 to submit a revised bid.

Brown responded, "My thought is, I don't like pushing this off. I don't like it. But, I can also see the points that are being made. And if we're going to continue this for two weeks, in two weeks, I don't care what the arguments are, I am going to make a suggestion on decision ... and we're going to move down the road."

Maez commented, "I don't agree with Commissioner Brown on this. You know what we need, we need the most we can get. That's what we need. We've gotta build another building."

Maez then suggested that another round of bidding should be opened to all offers, not just the current bidders before concluding, "I'd rather see this go through with a plan for the replacement of the building we're about to sell, but I do agree we need to start someplace."

Brown then suggested that, to preserve fairness and show respect for the current bidders, the next round of bidding should only be open to the current bidders.

Schaaf then entertained motions. Brown moved to accept Urbanczyk's offer, which was not seconded and died.

Maez then offered a motion to not sell the courthouse at this point in time. This motion was also not seconded and died.

Schaaf then offered the motion to reject all bids and give the opportunity for all current bidders to submit revised bids by 5 p.m. on April 8. This motion was seconded by Brown and passed 2-1.

In a later interview, Woodman explained that he had received Urbanczyk's revised offer on March 8 and that the apparent revision was merely a clarification of terms Urbanczyk had mentioned verbally in his Jan. 18 presentation of the offer to the BoCC.

Urbanczyk verbally stated everything included in the letter in public meetings, Woodman stated, explaining that the increase in the offer was Urbanczyk was "where he said he would cover all the costs from the architect, the engineer ... which was [Reynolds Ash + Associates (RAA)] ... It was all of those additional costs ... that he said verbally he would cover."

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road," Brown said.

## Prescribed burn to be conducted

By Scott Owen Forest Service

The Columbine Ranger District is planning to burn approximately 1,500 acres this spring in the Beaver Meadows and the First Notch areas of the San Juan National Forest to reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfire and to improve forest health.

The area is located approximately 10 miles northeast of Bayfield. Operations may begin as soon as early April, depending on weather conditions and availability of fire personnel and other resources.

Ignitions will occur over several

consecutive days. Operations may take several weeks to complete and will be conducted by Forest Service personnel and partner agencies. Ground and aerial ignition sources will be used to meet resource obiectives.

The burn unit is part of the larger Vallecito-Piedra prescribed burn project aimed at reducing hazardous ground fuels, reducing the risk of unplanned catastrophic wildfire, restoring ponderosa pine ecosystems and improving wildlife habitat. More information on the San Juan National Forest prescribed fire program can be found

Daytime smoke is expected to travel to the north/northeast and will be lofted high into the sky. Nighttime smoke is expected to travel downslope into the Beaver Creek drainage, the Piedra River and south to the Pine River just north of Ignacio. Smoke will be heavier in the mornings following burning operations. Smoke should lift and clear out by mid-day. Smoke will be visible from Bayfield, Pagosa Springs and the U.S. 160 corridor. Learn how smoke from prescribed fire may affect your health by vis-

The forests in southwest Colorado are part of a fire-adapted ecosystem, which historically experienced frequent, low-intensity fires on a large scale. Prescribed fire replicates that fire regime under controlled conditions. Prescribed fires will only be ignited when all weather, fuels, smoke and safety requirements are met.

Communities in the rural West can stand up to giant outside gas companies, if they work together despite their differences. That's how the Jordan Cove gas pipeline project was finally killed in Oregon by a coalition of conserva-

"The last thing we needed was another giant fossil-fuel project and another major fire hazard just to profit an outside corporation," recalled Allie Rosenbluth, campaigns director of Rogue Climate, a grassroots group in southern Oregon.

Rogue Climate contacted hundreds of landowners whose prop-

Don Gentry, chair of the Klamath Tribes, protested that the pipeline would "strip shade from streams and pollute them with sediment, harming fish central to the Klamath's

In the wake of this broad and vocal resistance, state agencies finally announced that the pipeline and terminal failed to qualify for necessary permits. That led Pembina to tell federal regulators it was dropping the project.

The coalition didn't stop with its victory. Members convinced the Oregon Legislature last year to pass bills to transition the state to 100 percent clean energy by 2040, provide \$50 million for community-based resilience and renewable energy projects outside of Portland, and appropriate \$10 million for energy-efficient home repairs for low-income households. The Legislature also banned any new natural gas power plants in Oregon. "Most of us who live in small towns and rural areas all want the same things," said Rogue Climate's Hannah Sohl. "Good jobs, a healthy climate, communities that work for everyone. We can accomplish a lot when we talk to each other and organize." The victory occurred last December, when a Canadian energy company called Pembina announced it would halt plans to build a 230-mile pipeline through rural southwestern Oregon, crossing more than 400 streams and rivers along the way. The pipeline was to carry fracked gas from the Rockies to a huge terminal proposed for the coastal town of Coos Bay, where it would be loaded onto ships bound for Asia.

When the Jordan Cove export project was first announced some 15 years ago, the odds of stopping it appeared slim. Supporters included the state's governor and its two U.S. senators — all Democrats — plus most of the Republican political establishment.

But community organizers in Coos Bay and beyond didn't give up. erty would be affected while also working with local environmental groups like Rogue Riverkeeper.

They quickly found that many ranchers were angry about threats from the company. If landowners didn't let the pipeline cross their land in return for a onetime payment, they were told, the power of eminent domain would be invoked to impose it on them anyway. Congress granted this power to gas pipelines in 1947. Över a seven-year period, an un-

likely coalition grew in strength, turning out thousands of residents to public hearings and spurring more than 50,000 people to submit written comments to regulatory agencies. A delegation representing all parts of the coalition even held a sit-in in the governor's office.

Seven rural landowners from across the political spectrum also published a column in the state's largest newspaper, the Oregonian. It was blunt: "We are sick and tired

traditions and way of life."

Bill McCaffree, a lifelong Republican and longtime president of the local electrical workers union in Coos Bay, also publicly disagreed with construction union leaders who wanted the short-term work for their members.

"Everyone who works in the building and construction trades wants to build things that benefit communities and don't cause harm," McCaffree said. "Since I was a kid, there have been jobs here in Coos County from fishing, clamming and oyster farming. What would happen to those jobs when the bay is disturbed by construction and operation of this export terminal?"

A better strategy for creating good, stable jobs, McCaffree said, would be investing in energy efficiency and renewable energy development. That sector is "creating jobs at a rate 12 times faster than the rest of the U.S. economy."

She was also, she noted, drawn to Slavic culture and history.

So, they expanded their search to orphanage ministries in countries like Ukraine and Kazakhstan.

Janna noted they stumbled upon an outdated website from a missionary in Ukraine that matched with the work they envisioned doing, so they reached out to learn more about it.

They were then invited to go and do a mission trip to further check out the program the missionary worked with and, in 2010, Janna and Daniel went to Ukraine for the first time.

Janna said the mission trip gave them a good glimpse of the work being done — Daniel, who has a background in construction, was able to help build a transition home, and they went to an orphanage every day to spend time with and work with the children.

They then spent another week in Kyiv, meeting with other people who served and learning about what it would be like to be there, working.

When they returned to the United States, they decided to join the organization and start fundraising to go as missionaries.

Within four months, Janna noted, they'd sold everything, including their house and cars.

In July 2011, Janna and Daniel moved to Ukraine with six suitcases and two carry-ons.

#### Service in Ukraine

When they arrived in Ukraine, Janna explained, they didn't know the language and began with language school and lived with a host family for about 10 weeks.

The Ross family works with First Love International in Ukraine, with their main focus being partnering with Ukrainian Christians to provide Christ-centered homes for orphaned children.

They arrived in the U.S. for the furlough on Nov. 8, 2021, with plans to fundraise for Evergreen Home.

As they were fundraising, they began to get questions about the buildup of Russia's army along the Ukrainian border.

But, Janna explained, they weren't surprised or worried. Russia had been attacking eastern Ukraine since 2014, and there had been buildups before. They just thought Putin was trying to "flex his muscles" or cause fear as part of a strategy.

"We just didn't think too much of t," she said.

But, it kept getting worse and worse, growing and growing, she explained.

The family was supposed to go back to Ukraine on Feb. 8.

As the date approached, the Ross family called Safe Haven's house parents, Anya and Bogdan, to talk to them and get a sense of what was really going on compared to what they saw on the news in the United States.

Anya and Bogdan reported it was totally different this time, and everybody was scared, Janna recalled. They recommended the Ross family postpone returning for a month, which they thought would be a critical period of time.

Janna explained if anybody else had told them that, they might not have listened, but they trust Anya and Bogdan with their lives and opted to postpone their return to Ukraine.

They decided to use that time to continue to fundraise and to visit more family, like her aunt and uncle in California.

"That's where we were when we found out about the invasion," she said, recalling she was in their living room and she was looking on her phone and started seeing reports of explosions across Ukraine. Putin had declared Russia was conducting a "special military operation" in Ukraine.

They turned on the TV, Janna added, and started seeing the news of the explosions across the country.

#### Helping from afar

When they saw the news, Janna said she immediately wrote to their closest friends - the ones planning to expand for Evergreen Home asking if they were OK.

Lena wrote they were on their way to Safe Haven, Janna explained, adding Lena and Vitalik live 20-25 minutes away from Safe Haven.

Janna relayed Vitalik had woken up to the sound of explosions very early in the morning.

Meanwhile, Janna explained, Bogdan had headed out with fellow members of a Christian motorcycle

The next decision was whether or not the families should be separated so those who were eligible could evacuate out of Ukraine, Janna noted. Men aged 18-60 are not allowed to leave the country.

behind.

Janna explained she could tell from the messages she was getting from the group that they were traumatized, glued to the news and worrying about other family members who were unable to leave areas occupied by the Russian army.

So, Janna and Daniel stepped in, she said, and helped research offers from contacts in various countries who had expressed a willingness to help.

They then presented the group in Ukraine with a suggestion that those who could evacuate should do so and gave them what they felt were the best two options.

"You can always go back," she remembered telling them.

The group ended up choosing the Czech Republic, and Janna and Daniel began working out logistics and getting in touch with their friends there, with Janna noting they didn't sleep at all that week.

The group in Ukraine said goodbye on Vitalik's birthday, Janna reported.

"His daughter's birthday was when Russia invaded, and his birthday was saying goodbye to his wife and daughter," she said. "Nobody knows. Nobody knows when or how this ends."

The 11 women, children and teens leaving Ukraine were taken to the border, where they waited in the freezing cold for nine hours to cross into the Czech Republic on foot.

Daniel flew to the Czech Republic to be there waiting for them and help friends and volunteers.

They were able to secure apartments, get one-year visas, phones, and even find work and educational opportunities for members of the group.

Janna said she and Oliver will join the group once she again has a passport (hers was lost by the a Social Security Administration office in Texas).

"We're really so grateful to the people and the country of the Czech Republic," Janna said, noting they have done an amazing job welcoming hundreds of thousands of Ukrainian refugees who have been left with nothing and are trying to start over in foreign countries where they may not know the language.

Those who stayed behind in Ukraine, Janna explained, are working to disseminate supplies to various groups and get people out, such as a family who had been locked

#### she said.

Janna said she's just taking it one day at a time and is continuing to fundraise, now for a car for the group in the Czech Republic, while preparing to move there herself and send care packages.

"No one wants this war," she said. "No one chose it."

The war, she added, has affected every Ukrainian, with cities being

bombed and civilians, including children, being shot. It, she said, is "totally unjustified."

Janna noted it's been "so touch-

properly cared for and not allowed to run loose, and to feel safe in their community. And, they recognize that the town will grow. to dismiss the lawsuit, arguing they were not liable for Hernandez de la Torre's wrongful death or for any violation of his constitutional rights through a failure to provide medical care and treatment. Last week, Arguello determined that Archuleta County could be held responsible, even though Hernandez de la Torre died outside its jurisdiction, because the county had an obligation to ensure its detainees were cared for in accordance with the U.S. Constitution. As for La Plata County, "Defendants' conduct goes beyond a simple failure to monitor. Despite the fact that Mr. Hernandez de la Torre was on suicide watch, Defendants 'provided him with the means to kill himself' by leaving bedsheets that he could use to commit suicide," Arguello wrote in a March 29 order. David Lane, an attorney litigating the case against the two jurisdictions, agreed with the judge's conclusion that counties cannot escape liability when they effectively outsource their jail operations to another entity with deficient training. "Essentially, she held that you can't simply throw a prisoner into a shark tank and then blame any ensuing damage on the sharks, which is what the defendants were trying to do," Lane said. "We have no reason to believe any of the jails involved have improved over time or learned any lessons as of yet. But school is not yet out and we hope to teach them a lasting lesson by the conclusion of this case." Attorneys for the various defendants did not respond to emails seeking comment. According to the lawsuit filed by Jhenna Hernandez de la Torre and the estate of Saul Hernandez de la Torre, the Archuleta County jail was uninhabitable at the time of his intake due to flood damage. The jurisdiction signed an intergovernmental agreement with La Plata County to house detainees, which stipulated, in part, that their legal custody "shall at all times remain with Archuleta County." On May 24, 2019, Saul Hernandez de la Torre reportedly refused to eat any of his meals and disclosed that he was thinking of suicide. The jail placed him on suicide watch and he met with mental health personnel. They agreed upon a safety plan in which Hernandez de la Torre would

and then stick its head in the sand as to what the other county's policies and procedures are."

As for La Plata County, the magistrate judge indicated it could be held liable for failing to train its employees if it was predictable or obvious that jail guards would violate detainee's rights by not having the specific skills needed for recurring situations. Neureiter found that all signs, from the failure to monitor Hernandez de la Torre to supplying him with the bedsheets he used to kill himself, pointed to a training lapse. "The death of a suicidal inmate is a 'highly predictable' or 'plainly obvious' consequence of a training program that permits a suicidal inmate to be left in his cell alone. unmonitored, and with access to materials that can be used to hang himself," Neureiter concluded. The defendants objected to the magistrate judge's findings. La Plata County maintained that nothing linked its level of training to Hernandez de la Torre's death. Archuleta County believed the unique facts of the case, whereby a county had outsourced the entirety of its jail operations to another jurisdiction, had never been considered before under the "non-delegable duty" doctrine, at least by the federal appeals court that covers Colorado. Arguello was unmoved by those pleas. The allegations currently before the court reasonably suggested a lack of training, she wrote. And regardless of whether a county is rural or finds itself contracting its jail operations, there are "two important aims of the non-delegable duty doctrine: (1) permitting plaintiffs the opportunity to vindicate Mr. Hernandez de la Torre's Constitutional rights; and (2) preventing Archuleta County — a public entity - from avoiding liability by contracting with another public entity, La Plata County," Arguello concluded. The judge did, however, dismiss the wrongful death claims against Archuleta County only. Remaining in the lawsuit are Hernandez de la Torre's constitutional claim against Archuleta County, the failure-totrain claim against La Plata County, and claims against individual jail guards and a nurse.

The organization, Janna explained, has been able to make strategic investments, such as helping with bigger vehicles, additions to houses or necessities for families to adopt and foster children.

About seven years ago, Janna and Daniel took full responsibility for Safe Haven, with Janna explaining teens generally move into the home when they finish high school (generally 11th grade in Ukraine).

The home has helped more than 80 kids in the last 20 years — kids she noted might otherwise end up as statistics as alcoholics, adults who end up in prison, girls who end up pregnant and living off of welfare, or people who commit suicide.

"We've seen a much better situation for kids who live at Safe Haven." she said.

A planned project for this summer was to add on to the home of Lena and Vitalik, who also work with the program, to foster kids and open Evergreen Home.

#### A furlough and the war

When Russia began its buildup along the Ukrainian border, Janna explained she and her family were in the United States on a scheduled furlough and fundraising trip.

club to deliver supplies to the east when they fell under rocket fire and turned around.

Bogdan called Vitalik, Janna reported, and told them to get out.

They then panicked and began grabbing their to-go bags — Janna explained everyone had a to-go bag packed by this point — and other things they could think of, including a present for their daughter. It was her fifth birthday. They left for Safe Haven.

After they and another family associated with Safe Haven reached the home, Janna reported, they decided to start driving to western Ukraine.

Those who could fit in three available cars — Bogdan and some of the boys stayed behind at Safe Haven - caravaned. Janna explained what was supposed to be an eight-hour drive took 20-28 hours because the group had to go around bumperto-bumper traffic in Kyiv and stop driving at night because of marshal law and curfews.

After they safely made it to western Ukraine, Bogdan and some of the others made their way out. Janna noted some of the older boys at Safe Haven who have factory jobs that are supporting the war effort stayed

in a school basement for five days with little or no provisions, as well as cooking for fellow volunteers.

They were able to send the volunteers serving as drivers bulletproof vests to help keep them safer, she noted.

#### 'No one wants this war'

Janna and Daniel have no idea if their apartment on the edge of Kyiv is still standing or untouched.

"I have no idea," she said, adding she hasn't been able to find information about where the missile strikes and bombings have happened around there.

Right now, she explained, she's still in a lot of shock and feels like she moves through the stages of grief among them anger, sadness and shock — daily.

"You feel so powerless," she said. "Like, I can't do anything to stop it. I can't do anything to make the war end. I mean, ultimately, we all want to go home, and that's taken from us.

It's made worse, Janna indicated, by her being stuck in the United States and unable to go help.

"Every fiber of my being just wants this to not be my reality, or the reality of over 44 million Ukrainians,"

Two days later, Hernandez de la Torre hung himself using a bedsheet in his cell.

Allegedly, no jail staff monitored Hernandez de la Torre on his suicide watch, and a deputy finally found his body two hours after his suicide - but only because the deputy was delivering evening meals.

Both counties challenged their culpability for Hernandez de la Torre's death. La Plata County argued there was no pattern of similar incidents, suggesting the jurisdiction was not on notice that its training of jail personnel was so obviously subpar that it would lead to constitutional violations.

Archuleta County pointed the finger at La Plata, arguing it simply could not control how another jurisdiction chose to run its jail.

"Archuleta County and La Plata County are rural counties in southwestern Colorado. The distance between their respective county seats is approximately 60 miles," wrote lawyers for Archuleta County. "It is neither practical nor realistic to expect Archuleta County, and other rural Colorado counties like it, to regulate the policies and day-today operations of another county's jail facility located far away and outside Archuleta County's boundaries."

In February, U.S. Magistrate Judge N. Reid Neureiter issued a recommendation after analyzing the allegations and arguments on all sides. For Archuleta County, Neureiter agreed it had a "non-delegable duty" to provide adequate care for Hernandez de la Torre, given that he was the county's detainee. Other cases supported the notion that a government entity has a responsibility to ensure, when it delegates certain functions, that those contract relationships do not result in violations of detainees' constitutional rights.

"That such a holding might open the doors for more Colorado counties to be sued for violation of constitutional rights does not strike the court as unreasonable," Neureiter wrote in his recommendation. "A county cannot contract with another for the housing and care of inmates


including a 9-0 loss against Manitou Springs.



The Pirates dropped three of four games to 2A teams over the last week, with three of those games coming as part of the Buena Vista Tournament and the fourth coming against Monte Vista.

But, the coach noted, the Pirate pitchers pitched well enough to win in each of the games.

The Pirates dropped their first tournament game on Friday 16-1 to the undefeated Rye Thunderbolts.

Pagosa's run came in the bottom of the first inning, when Rye's pitcher walked Braylon Cotts while the bases were full of Pirates.

The Thunderbolts' runs came over five innings: five in the second, one in the third, three in the fourth, one in the fifth and six in the sixth.



## New pickleball courts slated to begin construction

#### Pagosa Pickleball Club

The sport of pickleball has been around since the 1960s, but its popularity has grown exponentially over the last two decades.

For the last 10 years, an annually increasing number of people have been playing pickleball year-round on three courts in the Ross Aragon Community Center. Beginning in 2014, four pickleball courts were established at South Pagosa Park on a concrete surface in significant disrepair which have been heavily used during the warmer months with numbers significantly exceeding the available space.

The number of players in the Pagosa area has grown to the point that, about four years ago, local residents established the Pagosa Pickleball Club as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization which currently consists of more than 250 active members. A significant number of players from other states and even foreign countries also stop over for days, weeks or even months to play pickleball in Pagosa Springs during the warmer months, with many people picking areas to vacation based on the availability of quality pickleball facilities.

Pickleball provides healthy lifestyle opportunities for all ages and is in great demand, especially for second-home and retirement populations. The sport's user base is gradually expanding toward younger players, thanks to programs in physical education classes schools, and is currently being

The bid was approved by the Pagosa Springs Town Council and awarded in late March. Construction is slated to begin in June or July and be completed within 2.5 to 3 months. The addition of well-built, dedicated courts will not only fill a rapidly growing recreational need for county residents, but will also provide a venue for tournaments and an attraction to multiday tourism, providing an economic benefit to the community by attracting out-of-town visitors and holding them longer in RV parks, motels, short-term rentals, restaurants and other businesses.

## **Community vaccine clinics scheduled** through April 30; second booster shot available to eligible populations

San Juan Basin Public Health

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently announced updated guidance on COVID-19 booster shots, recommending additional vaccine boosters for eligible individuals. Vaccine providers in Colorado are authorized to administer the additional doses now.

Under the new guidance, adults aged 50 and over and immunocompromised individuals ages 12 and over are eligible for a second COVID-19 booster at least four months following their last booster shot. Only Pfizer or Moderna vaccines are authorized for second can be used, regardless of whether an individual received Pfizer, Moderna or Johnson and Johnson for their initial doses.

These additional shots are widely available, including at community clinics in La Plata and Archuleta counties currently scheduled through April 30, as well as through other providers such as pharmacies and physicians. For a complete list of clinics and providers and the latest guidance, please visit the SJBPH website, https://sjbpublichealth. org/covid-19-vaccine/, or contact our office at (970) 247-5702.

COVID-19 vaccines are effective in protecting individuals from severe illness, hospitalization and

booster doses and either option death from the virus. Because immunity can diminish over time, additional booster shots increase protection against COVID-19. The CDC recommends that everyone 5 years and older receive at least two doses of the vaccine. Individuals ages 12 and older should receive at least three doses. COVID-19 vaccines are safe, effective and free. No insurance or ID is required to receive the vaccine.

## Pagosa charter school invites board member applications

Pagosa Peak Open School (PPOS) has announced a vacancy on its board of directors and invites applications from the Pagosa community to fulfill a two-year term.

PPOS is an intentionally small and intimate tuition-free public charter school in Pagosa Springs. PPOS is chartered through Archuleta School District and governed by an independent, volunteer board of directors. Current enrollment is approximately 120 students in grades K-8, but the school district recently approved a plan to expand the enrollment.

PPOS was started by a small group of local parents dedicated to bringing educational choice to our small mountain community. These parents visited multiple innovative schools across Colorado and New Mexico, and attended workshops and conferences to learn the process of starting a school. They researched alternative forms of education and decided that a school focused on project-based learning (PBL) would be the best educational model for their students.

The experience of thousands of teachers across all grade levels and subject areas, backed by research, confirms that PBL is an effective and enjoyable way to learn and develop deeper learning competencies required for success in college, career and civic life. PBL is not merely a tool for learning academic skills; it also strengthens a child's ability to successfully collaborate, and to persevere in the face of challenges.

Place-based education (PBE) is another component to the educational model of PPOS. PBE immerses students in local heritage, cultures, landscapes, opportunities and experiences, using these as a foundation for the study of language arts, mathematics, social studies, visual arts, agriculture, science and

other subjects.

To incorporate project- and place-based model into the school, the founding parents decided on a year-round school schedule to allow children to experience all of the various outdoor activities beloved to Pagosans.

The board currently consists of six members: Ursala Hudson, Julie Simmons, Gary Hedgecock, Elly Osmera, Bill Hudson and Michelle Carpenter.

Students in Holly Blackman's U.S. history classes brought their emotions and personal experiences to life through careful crafting of diaries and journals that accurately relayed historical events through the eyes of characters of their choosing.

Jerry Nichols and Richard Nichols died in World War II; Hughes was able to understand which battles they died in, where they are buried and why they received certain service medals.

Jaylynne Ramsey shared the inside details of being a battle nurse and working with shortages of supplies and the threat of being captured while working around the clock to save lives. Jazmine Mendoza and Oryan Atole shared details of the Navajo Code Talkers and how their code was never broken. Kye Kelley shared how the Allied Forces used fake messages on the radio to redirect the enemy prior to D-Day.

Blackman's AP U.S. history class also created battlefield displays, made hardtack, built models of enslaved people's hiding crates and brought in replicas of uniforms. They used maps and imitation soiled bandage rolls to help the readers relate to their characters.

Blackman said, "Some students choose to work with partners while others do this project on their own. Many anticipate the scrapbook as they already know about this project from past students. I spend hours immersing myself in them, too, reading about their characters and life experiences. I'm so proud of their efforts in these projects and am humbled by the realism in each."

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
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# Food System Summit to highlight local food heroes



During this exciting event, we will feature local chefs, advocates, and local growers and producers who are key stakeholders in the local food system. Come join us on April 9 and meet some of these amazing people from Archuleta County and the surrounding region.

#### Local food heroes: Kelle and Keith Bruno

Today, we would like to feature the story of Southern Roots Farm's Kelle and Keith Bruno in their own words:

"We grow on 1/8 acre, which is equal to (12) 100-foot rows. We have a 50x15-foot hoop house where we grow our heat-loving crops: tomatoes (slicers, canners for sauce and cherries), jalapenos, summer squash and lots of basil. We also have a pole barn that is half greenhouse, half chicken coop/ storage. We can grow greens and lettuce April through November in the greenhouse without any heat inputs. We also have built cold frame lids which fit over our growing beds in the greenhouse, where we propagate our seedlings (with only passive solar heat). The greenhouse is great for greens in the spring and fall and tomatoes, basil and peppers in the heat of the summer. In the field rows, we



grow potatoes, onions, garlic, lettuce, spinach, radishes, sugar snap peas, carrots, beets, asparagus, winter squash and annual flowers for the pollinators. We also have a few dwarf apple trees and 13 laying hens.

"Kelle studied sustainable de-

velopment and agroecology in college and her first job was managing the field operations at the Seeds of Change Research Farm in New Mexico, where she worked for five years. During this time, she and Keith met and he proceeded to See Food on next page



We eventually began our own veggie production farm in Bayfield (Southern Roots Farm) and sold organic vegetables to the Durango Farmers Market, ran a 20-member CSA and sold wholesale to restaurants in Durango for three years. Keith also ran a wholesale potato and onion operation with a friend for two seasons and Kelle worked as a landscaper in Durango for multiple seasons.

"After trying hard to turn a farm into a sustainable business venture, both Keith and Kelle de-

cided to go back to school to find more lucrative career opportunities. Kelle became an elementary school teacher and Keith received his master's in natural resources and environmental education. We eventually settled in Pagosa Springs and bought our property in 2017. Our goal was to grow food for our family and link our garden to educational opportunities at Pagosa Peak Open School, where Kelle teaches first/second grade. We enjoy the work it takes to supplement our food supply with organic vegetables and our passion is sharing our knowledge with

others, especially our 6-year-old daughter.

"Our biggest challenge is finding the time to work in the garden. We both have full-time jobs and are raising a young daughter. We enjoy getting outside and camping in the summer, so we have to balance our work time on the farm with our adventures on the weekends. Our farm is located in Meadows, so we are on city water, which can be pricey. We began our farm operation in the summer of 2018 and have sold veggies through a CSA, at the Pagosa Farmer's Mar-**I** See Food on next page

The Library Affair will present 17 uniquely decorated dining tables with the complete contents of each table offered to the highest bidders in the silent auction. Each table will be adorned with decor based




The first rehearsal for the Com-

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### Potatoes for the community: Pagosa Springs Community Garden launches new project

The 2022 project of the volunteers that manage the Pagosa Springs Community Garden, the 30-year old space located downtown at the end of 5th Street on the river, will be to grow potatoes free of charge for the benefit of community members.

Decades old, the garden is on land owned by the Town of Pagosa Springs, and plots are granted to the town's citizens free of charge. With pride and respect to the beautiful space, each member of the volunteer group takes on tasks to prepare the garden for the growing season. Thanks to the generosity of Pagosa Springs merchants, goods (soil, compost, fertilizer, bird seed, tools, etc.) are donated annually to ensure the garden's perpetuity. This year, as in the preceding six years, all plots are full.

Every year, a relevant component is added to the gardening program. Last year, with the assistance of local donors and the Town of Pagosa Springs, the garden has been designated a Certified Wildlife Habitat by the National Wildlife Federation. Located on the river, the space inherently held all the natural elements needed. All gardeners agreed to an organic environment to ensure the survival and prolific thriving of bees, birds and insects. A bird bath and bird feeders were added, as were pollinating plants. The town generously provided certification and a plaque.

This year, heritage farmer LeRoy Salazar is donating an enormous amount of certified seed potatoes to enable the volunteer gardeners to continue their community contributions. The seed potatoes will be planted and nurtured; as the

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## The power in an apology

The doctor waved a handful of forms at me and shouted, "Why aren't these processed! You are holding up my department's work. Patient care is at stake.'

Our small admitting office in the new community hospital supported the emergency department. Local physician offices dropped off patient specimens for testing at the clinical laboratory. Lab staff completed forms for the samples and placed them in a slot in our office. Admitting employees created a computer record to store and communicate test results.

"May I see those forms?" I checked the time stamps. "You're absolutely right. These should have been completed already. I'm very sorry, Dr. Lester. We will get them done immediately. I apologize for the delay." I handed half the stack to an admitting rep and kept half myself.

Dr. Lester looked surprised. Maybe he expected excuses from me. Instead, he started making them on my behalf. "I know you are busy in this office with ER patients. I realize my forms aren't all you have to deal with." His voice softened. "I'm sorry I shouted at you. Thank you for getting them done."

I marveled at the sudden 180-degree turnaround from redfaced anger to a "thank you." There is power in a sincere apology and acceptance of responsibility.

First Samuel 25 tells the story of David and Nabal, a very rich man. King Saul, with evil intent, pursued David, the anointed king to be.

Out in the desert, David and his men protected Nabal's servants and property - sheep and goats. David later sent men to Nabal requesting food. Nabal refused. When David's men relayed the rude reply, he



commanded them to strap on their swords and repay evil with evil.

Abigail, Nabal's wife, heard that David was headed toward her husband with 400 men. She quickly loaded donkeys with provisions and led the caravan to meet him. When she saw David, she bowed before the future king and apologized. Her quick action stopped David in his tracks.

David praised God for sending Abigail to him and thanked her for keeping him from bloodshed.

This is the power of an apology. The situation was not Abigail's fault, yet she took responsibility and saved many lives that day. Abigail later became King David's wife.

We can respond like Abigail. Be sincere. Consider the upset person's perspective. Don't be defensive. Take responsibility.

And when we've missed the mark ourselves, it may be difficult to be humble and apologize, but oh so powerful.

"All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, because, 'God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble.' Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time." — 1 Peter 5:5b-6.

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## **Bird of the Week**

This week's Bird of the Week, compliments of the Weminuche Audubon Society and Audubon Rockies, is the osprey.

Melting ice on area lakes signals that it's time to be on the lookout for osprey. Open water is essential for these hungry migrants that return from winter grounds as distant as South America and which feed almost exclusively on live fish.

Osprey hunt by gliding and hovering over water while watching for fish near the surface. Waterproof feathers and the abilities to protect their eyes with a third, translucent eyelid and to close their nostrils allow osprey to plunge into the water feet first, sometimes becoming completely submerged. Barbed pads on their feet and the ability to position two toes forward and two back allow them to hang onto slippery fish, which they position aerodynamically head first for flight back to the nest or perch.

Osprey require an open, elevated nest site like those provided by snags, tree tops or platforms built for them. A reliable source of fish within 12 miles must be available. Pairs may use the same nest and add to it for several years, ending up with one large enough to hold a person. From egg to fledgling takes 14 weeks and young may stay with parents two to three months after leaving the nest before becoming independent.

Osprey are large hawks with slender bodies; long, narrow wings; and long legs. They are colored a rich brown on the back and wings and white underneath. A broad, dark stripe goes through their eyes. Females are larger than males and show a mottled brown band across the breast. You can follow the development of osprey from egg to fledgling on the

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


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
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
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## Noxious Weed of the **Month: Russian olive**



Russian olives are a perennial shrub or tree which can grow to a height of 40 feet tall. It was initially introduced as an ornamental planting and for windbreaks.

Russian olive is a major problem along riparian corridors, where it out-competes native trees and consumes water at a higher rate — which is a serious concern in our drought-stricken state. It has gravish-green leaves paired with reddish-brown thorns. It has small yellow flowers that produce olives. Russian olive may be used as forage for wildlife or nesting for birds, but to a lesser degree than native vegetation. Seeds survive ingestion by animals, which can be a vector for spread.

This plant is common in Archuleta County on private property and may escape along our river cor-

ridors. Small plants can be treated with foliar herbicides or manually removed and monitored for suckering from the root system. Larger trees should be treated via a cutstump method.

Russian olive should not be removed before proper identification as it has a native look-alike, the silvery buffaloberry plant. Buffaloberry has red fruits and opposite thorns, while the thorns of Russian olive are arranged in an alternating pattern.



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
