Discussion on 80-acre Put Hill subdivision continued

At its May 24 meeting, the Pagosa Springs Planning Commission moved to continue discussions of a rezoning application for a possible development that proposes a major subdivision with a variety of housing and lodging options after concerns regarding infrastructure emerged.

The proposed development spans around 80 acres and is located at 500 and 600 W. U.S. 160, just west of Pagosa Springs Elementary School and its fields.

The site is located within the rural transition (R-T) zoning district, but the town's 2018 Comprehensive Plan anticipates the area be rezoned to R-22 with a Put Hill overlay district, according to the town's brief on the project.

The applicant, Village Care Partners LLC, applied for a planned development overlay zoning to allow site-specific considerations for allowed uses and development standards that vary from the R-T zoning standards, but due to the anticipated rezoning of the area anyway, the zoning designation is discretionary. According to the development

### Commission OKs Mill RV Park rezoning

At its May 24 meeting, the Pagosa Springs Planning Commission approved the rezoning application for the proposed Mill RV Park and Food Court Park on Put Hill.

The development is being proposed in an area that previously housed a 28-unit RV park that closed "around 2005," according to Courtney King, representative for applicant James Prutsman.

King explained that this park would "revitalize and reactivate" the old park by updating 23 of the existing RV units with full hook-ups and reserving the other five for food truck spots.

The food trucks will be independently owned and operated, King stated.

In addition, the site will feature a multiuse building that has a commercial kitchen and cold/frozen food storage for the food truck operators' use, as well as indoor seating, bathrooms and a bar area for customers.

This was the second time that the planning commission heard about the development; at its May 10 meeting, the commission moved to continue discussion at the May 24 meeting due to a failure to meet public notification requirements.

The parcel that the RV park is set to go on is currently zoned as mixeduse residential, which does not allow RV parks at this time, Planning Director James Dickhoff explained. The applicant sought approval from the planning commission for a planned development overlay, which is a zoning designation that allows for

Ranger Frank McDaniel of San Juan station has a crew of four men now at work reconstructing the East Fork government trail. When this work is completed, they will commence work about June 20th on a new trail connecting the state highway with Turkey creek, and from there proceed to the Treasure Mountain trail.

### 75 years ago Taken from SUN files of

June 6, 1947

Members of the Town Board will hold a meeting Friday afternoon, Mayor R.C. Connelley said Tuesday morning. Top item on the list of business will be a new parking ordinance to prohibit long trucks and trailers from parking on the business side of the main street.

While the town has tentative plans for a filter system and chlorination plant to purify the water supply, action is being held up until further information can be secured. Meanwhile work on the present reservoir is being planned to provide adequate water for the town, Connelley said.

#### 'Slaughter of innocents'

Dear Editor:

The heart-rending scenes of grief-stricken parents mourning the death of their Uvalde, Texas, children pull at the heart-strings of every American. The senselessness of the slaughter of innocents still boggles the mind. Truly these families need to be held up in prayer.

Following this tragedy, the scenes in Washington, D.C., were predictable. Before the gun smoke cleared the air in Texas, the Democrats were calling for more gun control measures as they have done after every such tragedy. The urge to "Do something." can be a dangerous thing. The often threatened confiscation of so-called "assault weapons" (which they are not), needs to be balanced by asking a simple question: "Will this measure actually make any difference?" Confiscation of personal property and the surrender of Constitutional rights is not something that many Americans would take lightly. There would be every likelihood that non-compliance with any such unconstitutional edict would be very wide-spread.

Confiscating American's personal firearms would be much like banning automobiles because a few bad actors have killed people when those drivers were drunk. Punishing people who have done nothing wrong for the actions of a crazed murderer is simply unjust and unnecessary.

People need to remember that we are God's creation. So is everyone else we see and meet. We are made in God's image as Scripture tells us. So part of what needs to change is to acknowledge that we are all God's children and that means that every one of us has value and worth. God's command that, "Thou shalt not murder." is not a suggestion.

What needs to change? Fathers need to be part of their children's lives. Fathers and mothers need to instill in their sons and daughters a sense of morality and ethics that value life, and teach them that to take the life of another human being is to destroy what God has made, unless under eminent threat of injury or death.

The DOJ tells us that 63 percent of suicides are from fatherless homes. Ninety percent of homeless youth and runaways come from fatherless homes. Eighty-five percent of behavioral disorders occur in fatherless homes. Seventy-One percent of school dropouts, 70 percent of juvenile detentions, 75 percent of substance abusers, and 75 percent of rapists all come from homes with no father. This needs to change.

### 'Responsible gun legislation'



A garden in peril Dear Editor:

Re: "Gravel Pit Proposed in Hinsdale County" (May 19, 2022), a permit is currently under review for creating a gravel pit in southern Hinsdale County just south of the Piedra River crossing on Piedra Road. The proposed pit borders Northern Archuleta County. Its operation will require access via Piedra Road (CR 600/631) so it might as well be in Archuleta County.

My question is what is the cost of maintaining a balance between growth and despoilment in our mountain town? How do you keep a garden like Pagosa Springs growing while an intruding environment keeps trying to kill it?

Our local leaders seem not to care about the cost of allowing "outside" investors to ruin the pristine wilderness environment we live in – particularly mining investors.

How about this cost: not longago, High-Country News (March 18, 2019) reported that toxic waste from mines "accounts for a full half of toxic waste generated by all industries across the country. . .,' and that "[m]ining is the nation's largest source of toxic pollution."

But our garden keepers don't seem to care. Their common response to the invading investors is "it's their land and their county, and we need gravel to handle our booming growth." But again, at what cost?

What our garden keepers don't seem to question is how does this industrial use fit into a residential, recreational, and agricultural area?

And what reformations must take place to provide adequate mitigation of the environmental impacts the mine will have on wildlife and residents - not to mention the aesthetic degradation to our pristine mountain views?

Wildlife studies indicate that when operations like this become active, wildlife leave the area and do not return.

Fish and river life will be affected by run off from mine operations due to sediment which clouds the water. It will affect insect populations and the fish will leave the area or die. The buildup of sediment also affects eggs laid by the fish which will reduce the fish population as well.

In our area where hunting and

fishing is a source of income, this industrial development will greatly impact our local economy.

Another question: how will the mine impact the water system in our community? Has the proposed mine prepared a drainage study of the creeks and rivers that enter and exit the proposed development site? This is not an industrial area.

Also, how will an industrial mine affect the air from dust and diesel pollutants. And how will the proposed mine mitigate the impacts of traffic generated by the project?

In summary, I quote a resident in one rocky mountain community that speaks of the impact of a mine on the air and the water resources in her neighborhood: "I think it (gravel pits) is a large part of our dust pollution. Some days it is hard to see the mountains... It takes a lot of water to keep a good pit. Is that what we want to use our water for?" ("Jobs, dust among benefits, harms of gravel pits", aggregateresearch. com, January 2003).


troops organized in this country, Troop One, sponsored by the Floral Heights Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, Texas.

#### **Voter Service** and Polling Center information

Beginning June 20, the Archuleta County Election's Office, located at 449 San Juan St. (in the back of the courthouse) will serve as the Voter Service and Polling Center (VSPC).

The hours for the VSPC will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday from June 20 through June 27. On June 25, it will be open from 8

a.m. to noon. On June 28, it will be open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

#### How to return ballots

Voted ballots may be returned to the VSPC or taken to one of the county's ballot drop boxes.

Those drop boxes are located at the courthouse at 449 San Juan St. (outside on the sidewalk near the flagpoles) and at the TARA Community Center at 333 Milton Lane in Arboles.

According to the county's election notice, the drop boxes will have 24/7 video surveillance from June 20 through 7 p.m. on June 28.

#### What if I didn't receive a ballot or need a replacement?

Eligible residents can register to vote up to and including Election Day either online or at the Archuleta County Election's Office/VSPC.

June 20 is the last day for an individual to submit a voter registration application and still receive a ballot in the mail for the June 28 primary, according to the state.

Replacement ballots are available at the VSPC.

More information on eligibility and registering to vote can be found at http://www.archuletacounty. org/192/Elections or www.GoVoteColorado.gov.

Those with questions should call the Archuleta County Election's Office at (970) 264-8331.

#### What's on the ballot?

Registered Republicans and Democrats will each receive a primary ballot specific to their party.

If a voter has not declared a party preference, they will receive two ballots in their mail-ballot packet. They must only return one ballot in order for their vote to count.

#### **Republican ballot**

The Republican ballot will include three choices for U.S. senator: Ron Hanks, Joe O'Dea and a write-in option.

Daniel Hendricks filed the required paperwork with the Colorado secretary of state to be a write-in candidate.

According to the Archuleta County election notice, "A write-in vote should be counted if the writein line on the ballot includes at least a reasonably correct interpretation of the candidate's last name and the voter fills in the target area next to the write-in line. For more information, please review sections 1-4-1103, 1-5-407(3), 1-7-114, and 1-7-304, C.R.S., SOS Rule 18, and the Voter Intent Guide.'

The ballot will include two candidates for U.S. representative for District 3: Lauren Boebert and Don Coram.

Two names will appear on the ballot for Colorado governor: Greg Lopez and Heidi Ganahl.

Republican voters will have three candidates on the primary ballot for secretary of state: Tina Peters, Mike O'Donnell and Pam Anderson.



#### How to track your ballot

Colorado voters in all 64 counties will be able to track their primary election ballot using BallotTrax, according to the Colorado Secretary of

State's Office.

BallotTrax is a program that was implemented statewide in 2020 that allows voters to track their ballot, including when it is sent, received and counted.

According to a press release from the office, "BallotTrax enables voters to receive notifications by phone, email, or text about the status of their mail ballot, from the time it is mailed to the voter, to when it is received, and counted. In 2020, over 1.6 million voters used BallotTrax to follow their ballots. This year, nearly 2 million active voters are enrolled in the program.'

According to the press release, messages about the status of voter ballots will begin after ballots are mailed out by counties.

Colorado voters can enroll themselves in BallotTrax by going to www. GoVoteColorado.gov and clicking on "Sign up for BallotTrax."

She added that the county will also need to hold discussions with SJBPH staff and receive the formal report from the BoH before making a decision to leave and opening negotiations with Archuleta County.

Rogers also mentioned that the staff of the new department would be hired in an open process by La Plata County, although the county hoped that existing talent would apply.

La Plata County Manager Chuck Stevens added that the county would want to pursue staff-tostaff interactions with SJBPH to determine the financial details and roles of its staff, a process that would likely take 60-90 days and which Stevens described as "due diligence." Commissioner Marsha Porter-Norton summarized this process by stating that the county would first perform the due diligence work, then make a decision on leaving or dissolving the health district, then move forward with structuring the new county health district and determining needs.

mixed-use residential community that features two-story townhomes, three-story condominiums and apartments and one-story cottages. It would also feature a luxury RV park.

In addition, the site proposes a multitude of amenities, including a paved trail system; a "pitch & putt" small golf course; indoor and outdoor pickleball courts; and an outdoor theater for movies and events that are open to the public; a pool and hot tub area; a playground; several barbecue gazebos and horseshoe pits; and a clubhouse that features a fitness room, game room, meeting room and a bistro for beverages.

According to its plan, the development will add between 530 and 600 new housing units and between 130 and 140 RV lots to the Pagosa Springs community.

Of all the units, the application estimates that 47 percent will be for purchase, 30 percent will be for rent and 23 percent will be part of the RV resort

However, at the meeting, the developer's representative, Carl Bommarito, stated that initially 75 percent of the homes will be for rent and 25 percent will be to own.

In addition, Bommarito stated that the developer is willing to commit to designating 100 units as workforce housing.

The inclusion of workforce housing and public trails and amenities is the developer's case for why the site should qualify for a planned development overlay zoning, which requires that developments with this zoning designation offer "a substantial benefit to the Town," according to the language in the town's current Land Use and Development Code.

Bommarito explained that the building would take place in phases, likely spanning "around a decade."

He explained that the site's infrastructure would also happen in phases, to avoid "going out of business in a year."

Concerns from the planning commission centered around the

water and sewage usage of the development.

Bommarito stated that the developer is paying the Pagosa Area Water and Sanitation District (PAWSD) to do a water model to see if the current system could handle infrastructure of this magnitude.

"There may be improvements needed two years from now, four years from now, to handle this. Same with the sewer system," Bommarito said. "This is a big project."

Bommarito stated that on-site sewage or water may be considered, pending the results of the model study.

He said that added landscaping would be kept at a minimum, which could reduce water demand.

Planning Director James Dickhoff explained that the decision about water servicing to the site will have to be a mutual effort between the developer and PAWSD.

Regarding access to the development, Bommarito stated that no conversations with the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) have occurred yet.

Bommarito noted that a roundabout is needed to mitigate traffic congestion, and Dickhoff explained that the developers plan to "piggyback" off the access control plan that is already in the works by the town, county and CDOT.

A full traffic study will also need to be conducted, Dickhoff stated.

In addition, planning commission members nodded to a letter from the Archuleta School District as a reason for their hesitancy.

The letter, written by Interim Superintendent Laura Mijares, lists several concerns regarding the development, including the elementary school's near-capacity status and the need to build a new school should the development be created.

The letter also expresses disapproval of the RV park in the development's close proximity to the Pagosa Springs Elementary School play fields.

"I am incredibly concerned for the safety of my students, knowing the population of any RV park is

transient," Mijares wrote in the letter. "Colorado sex offender laws require registration after 14 consecutive business days in a given location. The juxtaposition of a churning population and delayed registration of sex offenders raises concerns for the safety of my elementary students."

Bommarito replied at the meeting that the developers are "here to listen" and are open to looking at other uses of space for that section of the development.

Nearby resident Patty Holmes expressed concern during public comment about the landfill and infrastructure capacity of the town, as well as the lack of environmental review, as reasons for disapproving of the project.

'This is gonna double the size of Pagosa, I don't care if it's in phases," Holmes said. "Can some consortium of five guys just double our town?"

Lori Henricksen, nearby resident and executive director of Habitat for Humanity of Archuleta County, expressed concerns about traffic, dark-sky compliance and the disruption of migration patterns of wildlife during public comment.

However, she noted that she was appreciative of the variety of income levels that the site caters to and acknowledged the need for housing as the community grows.

Other public commenters asked the developers to scale back the size of the project.

After a long discussion, Bommarito and the planning commissioners agreed that the discussion should be continued, with no decision being made during the meeting.

The developer is now tasked with returning to the planning commission at its June 28 meeting with a clearer idea of water, sewage and traffic models; how to address the concerns of the school district; and more realistic parameters for density and what each phase of construction will include.

"We will see what we can do based on the concerns," Bommarito said at the conclusion of the meeting. dorothy@pagosasun.com

Both the May 24 and May 10 meetings were met with lengthy public comment sections, mostly expressing disapproval over the RV park.

A frequently repeated concern was regarding the traffic the park would cause. Prutsman is proposing an extension of Eagle Drive to avoid traffic on Pike Drive, the primary road that the residents in the area use.

"What happens if someone misses the turn onto Eagle Drive?" one public commenter asked. "How would they turn around on Pike with an RV?"

Others expressed concern over the backup that the park could cause for highway access.

The board then discussed that the BoH members would receive the report by May 31 with the potential for a special session to discuss the report after this point, although Goldman commented that this would be dependent upon board members' responses to the draft.

Another public commenter, Stefany Mitchell, explained that one of the reasons for the purchase of her property, which is nearby the development, was because she thought it was going to be a strictly residential area.

"If we would have known that we were going to be looking at RVs outside of our window, we probably would have not bought the house ... What's it going to do to my property value? That's what I'm the most concerned about," Mitchell said at the meeting.

During the final discussion, many commission members expressed their uncertainty about approving the application.

"At this point, I'm still a little bit mixed," planning commissioner Peter Adams said at the meeting, "but my sense is to go forward with it because it's got a long way to go ... Ultimately, it's up to town council."

The motion passed unanimously. The Pagosa Springs Town Council is likely to hear the application at its meeting on June 7, according to Dickhoff.



### Plumtaw Fire transitioning back to local control, at 77 percent containment

Containment on the Plumtaw Fire continued to be 77 percent on Wednesday, June 2, according to the San Juan National Forest.

The fire has burned 721 acres 7 miles north of Pagosa Springs, 2 miles west of the intersections of Plumtaw and Fourmile roads, with Wednesday's update anticipating no spread beyond the current fire perimeter.

The fire was reported on May 17 and was estimated to have burned more than 600 acres that day. The cause continues to be listed as under investigation.

The fire will transition back to the local management unit today, Thursday, June 2, according to Wednesday's update.

The Rocky Mountain Incident

Management Team 2 took over technology on Tuesday. management of the fire on May 20, and on May 28, command of the fire was turned over to a Type 3 incident management team as containment increased.

Wednesday's update states that the fire "showed little heat throughout the fireline perimeter. An engine found an interior hot spot late in the day and was able to add water to extinguish the heat. Interior hotspots have little chance of escaping the established fire perimeter because the fuel between the hotspot and fire edge has already burned."

The update further indicates that firefighters continued to systematically examine the entire area for heat Tuesday — an effort that is ongoing — and the Unaweep Wildland Fire Module continued collecting fire and fuels data through unmanned aircraft system

Also on Tuesday, a Burned Area Emergency Response (BAER) team

began arriving. According to Wednesday's update, the BAER team "will begin assessing the fire area and create a report on burn severity. The report will be used to create a rehabilitation plan to protect the natural resources in the area."

The update further notes that fuels remain "critically dry" before stating the fire is anticipated to remain within the existing perimeter.

#### Closure order lifted, flight restriction remains

On May 31, the San Juan National Forest announced that the closure around the Plumtaw Fire area had been terminated, with the area reopening to the public on June, 1.

Wednesday's update urges, "Please use caution as hazard trees and firefighting equipment are still around the fire area.'

A temporary flight restriction (TRF) remains in effect over the fire, according to Wednesday's update.

"TFR violations can disrupt aerial firefighting operations and may [force] fire managers to ground essential aircraft. [Wildfires] are a no-fly zone for unauthorized aircraft, including drones. If you fly, we can't. http://knowbeforeyoufly. org," the update states.

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
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### Are you up to date on your knowledge of fire prevention?

For outdoor enthusiasts, forest lovers and mountain adventurers, it can be hard to accept that you could be the cause of a wildfire.

However, the U.S. National Park Service reports that from 2000-2017, nearly 85 percent of wildfires in the country were human-caused.

Luckily, with safety precautions and thoughtful practices, you can reduce your risk of starting the next big fire. Test your knowledge below to see if you are up to date on the current fire prevention tips.

True or false? When putting out a campfire, it is only important to drown red embers.

False. It is critical that you drown all embers when extinguishing a campfire, not just those that appear to be hot.

According to the U.S. Forest Service (USFS), if the fire is too hot to touch, it's too hot to leave. A good rule of thumb is to pour water over the fire until you cannot hear a hissing sound.

If you do not have enough water, the USFS recommends that you mix your fire with sand and dirt, gradually, until there is no detect-

able heat. However, you should not sure that debris is cleared from bury your fire, as the fire will continue to smolder and could catch roots on fire that will eventually get to the surface and start a wildfire.

Once you feel that you are safe to leave your fire, use a shovel or large rock to dig around your fire and make sure that there are not any active embers buried.

True or false? If I am using a permanent metal or concrete fire pit or grate that was installed by the USFS, my fire is safe.

False. Although using these types of pits is one of the safest ways to burn a campfire, there are several factors that can put your fire at risk of growing out of control. Before you start your fire, make

the area of the pit. Be on the lookout for pine needles, as they are highly flammable, according to Bill Trimarco, Archuleta County coordinator for the Wildfire Adapted Partnership.

The USFS also recommends that fires are positioned in cleared areas with no overhanging branches, minimal grass and brush.

Tents, hanging clothing and other flammable camping equipment should be at least 10 feet away from your fire, according to the National Park Service.

In addition, avoid burning a fire if winds are high or conditions are especially dry, regardless of how isolated you feel your fire is. Always check fire restriction statuses in the county or town you are camping before you go, and make sure to follow all of those regulations.

True or False? There are several ways that your vehicle or equipment can start a wildfire.

greased, and safety chains are properly in place and not dragging on the ground," the DOI website states. In addition, equipment can also start a wildfire. Just last month, the Ute Mountain Pass fire near Duran-

go was started after a heavy-duty lawn mower hit a rock, causing a spark, according to the Durango Fire Protection District.

The DOI states that you should never operate equipment that produces sparks near dry vegetation. You should always clear the area around your workspace, and this area should be larger if it is windy and dry.

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### **County planning commission approves new** rules for swimming pools and utility structures

At its May 25 meeting, the Archuleta County Planning Commission approved changes to the Land Use Regulations (LUR) regarding private pools and personal utility structures.

At the meeting, Development Director Pamela Flowers explained that the changes to the regulations on private pools were made following discussions highlighting that the current LUR only mentioned swimming pools, excluding hot tubs, and that the current regulations, which require a 6-foot fence around any private swimming pools were a "pretty high bar to ... achieve the goal of security and safety" for children around pools.

Flowers added that new regulations will provide more options for securing pools and apply to other private pools beyond swimming pools.

The proposed new regulations define private pools as a swimming pool, hot tub, spa or the like connected to a residence, condominium or apartment complex solely for the use of the residents of that dwelling. The regulations also mention that wading pools with depths of less than 24 inches do not qualify as private pools.

Flowers explained that the new regulations require that private pools follow the setback rules for auxiliary structures, although pools do not require a building permit.

She added that the regulations also require that any private pool is secured to prevent unsupervised access to the pool by children, or accidental drowning. Among the allowed security measures are the construction of a non-chain-link fence or wall on the ground completely enclosing the pool; the addition of a pool safety fence of at least 18 inches in height to an above ground pool with a removable ladder; or the installation of safety cover, compliant with ASTM International Standard F1346-91, when the pool is not in use.

What height of fence or wall was needed to secure a pool was a subject of debate at the meeting.

In her proposal, Flowers had lowered the height of fence from the 6 feet required in the former regulations to 4 feet.

However, planning commissioner Peter Beaudry raised concerns that a 4-foot fence might be too low.

Flowers explained that 4 feet is the industry standard for securing swim-

ming pools from children and that this requirement would likely be secondary as the easiest way to secure a pool is to use a pool cover.

Planning commissioners Adam Buttons and Mont McAlister also commented that a 4-foot fence might be too low, with McAlister citing that, where he had grown up, the requirement had been 6 feet and Buttons commenting that, as a parent of a 20-month-old child, he "would be fine with" a 5- or 6-foot fence requirement.

Buttons and Beaudry then agreed that they would prefer a 6-foot requirement for ground fences around pools

Flowers explained that the new regulations concerning personal utility structures were driven by residents placing solar panel arrays in utility easements under the erroneous claim that they represented a utility.

Additionally, she added that the new rules clarified where other personal utility structures could be placed on a property.

Flowers then explained that a personal utility structure is defined in the new regulations as a structure that provides utility services — including water, gas/propane or electricity — primarily for the personal

use of the owner.

The proposed regulations, Flowers continued, prohibit the construction of personal utility structures in utility, ditch, right of way or access easements.

The proposed new rules also add that the above-ground portions of permanent personal utility structures must obey property setbacks while the below-ground elements of the structure could cross into the setback.

Additionally, the proposed rules stipulate that all temporary personal utility structures which are above ground, such as propane tanks, are exempt from setbacks and that onsite wastewater treatment systems must obey setbacks for nearby water features.

During this explanation, Beaudry and Flowers highlighted that, even though some solar panels send power back into the grid, this does not make them a public utility.

The commission then unanimously approved the changes to the LUR, with the change of requiring a 6-foot ground fence around private pools secured by a fence.

These new regulations will go before the Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners for final approval at a later date.



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### **Commissioners hear Human Resources update**

Town continues moving forward with East End Multimodal Master Planning Project

At the May 24 Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) work session, Human Resources Director Tina Woodman delivered a semiannual update to the board.

In her update, Woodman explained that the training program started and is going well.

She also noted performance reviews are being conducted using the recently approved form and were being performed on or around the employee's hire date or the anniversary of their hire date.

She added that the county's employee-of-the-month program is highly successful and that workers' compensation recently completed an audit — the results of which she would hear soon.

She also mentioned that she is completing a presentation to the BoCC for switching the county to a paid time off (PTO) system from childbirth, among other uses. its current leave plan.

She then explained that, while no new equipment operators or dispatch staff had been hired, staffing levels increased across other departments, with approximately 20 openings in the county.

She also mentioned that she is working with the county finance director on options for outsourcing payroll, a move which she believes would simplify the payroll process in the county.

She also discussed, at the request of County Attorney Todd Weaver, the impact of the Family and Medical Leave and Insurance (FAMLI) Program on Archuleta County employees.

She explained that the county currently operates under the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA), which allows for employees to take non-paid leave to care for family members with serious health conditions or bond with children after

She added that county employees can accrue vacation and sick time and can use that time to pay

FAMLI, she explained, provides paid leave sponsored by the state in exchange for a payment of 0.9 percent of the employee's gross salary to the state, split in half between the employer and employee. When the employee goes on FAMLI leave, which has similar parameters to FMLA leave, the state then pays their wages, without benefits.

Woodman commented that she would prefer to opt out of the FAMLI program as the county's leave policies already provided a mechanism for payment during FMLA and the program would cost the county and its employees more money.

Weaver explained that the BoCC would need to pass a resolution to opt out of FAMLI program.



Commissioner Ronnie Maez commented that he would like to hear employee opinions on the program, while Commissioner Alvin Schaaf stated that he would like to hear from the taxpayers as well, since they would have to pay for the program through its impact on the county's General Fund.

Woodman explained that Archuleta County's utilization of FMLA is low and that because of this and the mechanisms the county already has in place for payment, she does not support the FAMLI act.

"I don't like it," Maez concluded, "I agree with Tina on this; scrap it." josh@pagosasun.com

The project aims to assess and update pedestrian sidewalk and trail connectivity, river and park access, public parking, functionality of roadways and traffic flow in the area, and transit opportunities, according to the Town of Pagosa Springs' website.

Planning Director James Dickhoff explained the East End area extends roughly between 1st Street to just east of the U.S. 160/U.S. 84 intersection. "Multimodal" emphasizes a variety of transportation modes in addition to vehicles, including cycling and walking, as well as public parking, and access to businesses and public spaces.

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The Town of Pagosa Springs is well underway with the project, which began in August 2021, and was awarded a \$156,850 Multimodal Options Fund Grant from the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT). The total project budget is \$178,238.64, with the town providing a cash match of \$21,388.64.

Currently, the town is looking at a few different scenarios for use of the frontage roads in the project's area, with diagonal versus parallel parking being considered. Currently, CDOT owns the frontage roads and will only allow parallel parking, but diagonal parking spots would generate more parking spaces, according to Dickhoff.

The town has the option to accept the rights to the road from CDOT, thus allowing them to create any type of parking, but Dickhoff suggested he is reluctant to take the road until the asphalt is in better condition or the town has the funds to accept responsibility for the road's maintenance.

Mayor Shari Pierce inserted that it could be a good idea to acquire the road and she does not want to regret a missed opportunity to expand owned land for the town, but Dickhoff replied that he thinks that the offer will remain from CDOT after this project concludes.

Diagonal parking could also force it into being a one-way road due to the limited remaining road

space after sidewalks are added, Dickhoff explained.

However, several council members were opposed to parallel parking due to difficulty of parking and were not opposed to the idea of a one-way road.

The town is also exploring different concepts for land acquisition in the area of the project. If land was acquired, the largest priority would be a public parking lot. Some concepts also explore the option of purchasing land for a regular spot for the farmer's market and an iceskating rink.

Council member Mat deGraaf was in favor of the purchase of land for a parking lot, stating that the success of the plan rests with availability of parking to the public.

Pierce explained that she wants to wait to give a concrete answer until after the town council's retreat on June 23, where members will set annual priorities for the town.

Pierce noted this year the priority is housing and the town's purchases need to reflect that.

"I'm totally not against doing this," Pierce said, "but I'm just concerned financially until we get this housing project figured out."

Dickhoff and Town Manager Andrea Phillips will continue conversations and give updates regarding the future of the road and the project at future meetings.

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### Judge sets hearing on water board member's reappointment

The dispute surrounding the reappointment of director Bill Hudson to the San Juan Water Conservancy District (SJWCD) board continues, with Judge Jeffrey Wilson, who makes appointments to the board, setting a June 6 hearing to receive additional information regarding the situation.

The district court hearing, which will occur at 10 a.m., follows a vote at the April 18 SJWCD meeting where a motion to not recommend the reappointment of Hudson failed 3-2, with directors Joe Tedder, Susan Nossaman and Hudson voting against and directors Al Pfister and Doug Secrist voting for.

Following this meeting, Pfister sent a letter to the judge, dated April 21, reiterating his complaints about Hudson's conduct and opposition to Hudson's reappointment.

Pfister's letter focuses on his concerns about Hudson's ability to follow his fiduciary duties and the adverse working environment his presence has created for the board.

The letter states: "In short, his participation as a Board member has created a very unhealthy environment for our Board to operate within. We have spent too much money involving legal counsel and his meeting his fiduciary duties, as well as too much time debating issues which have minimal to no value in helping the District accomplish our mission. It is not just his disagreement with some issues within the District, which are typically resolved when we take a vote and he Is [sic] the sole Board member voting no. Situations such as this are good for all points from different perspectives that are likely within the community are at least represented, enabling a well reasoned decision. It is more his criticism and innuendos presented in the Post (not fulfilling fiduciary duties) that create the unhealthy environment. This unhealthy environment was highlighted in our most recent meeting and thus creating mistrust and a lack of good faith within our community. My impression is that he is more interested in developing a headline for the Post, instead of ensuring our community has adequate water to meet our future agricultural, environmental, municipal and recreational water needs in a warming and drying water future. His cumulative unprofessional and divisive behavior outweighs the positives he has provided to the District. Another way of viewing his performance of Board member duties is that he corporation for which he acts as seems to try to come up with issues that will delay or sabotage District lated this section most recently - in mission accomplishment. From an additional perspective, Director Hudson will become a Board member of the Pagosa Area Water and Sanitation District. In this letter, Hudson begins by summarizing SJWCD's previous failed motion to not recommend his reappointment, adding that SJWCD had already made a motion opposing his original appointment in 2018, which Secrist and Pfister had both voted for.

He continues to state, "One of the ongoing disagreements between Director Pfister and myself concerns Director Pfister's continuing willingness to - in my opinion violate the 'conflict of interest' statutes described in CRS 24-18-109 and other statutes. These violations have been ongoing consistently for at least the past two years.

"Last summer, at my suggestion, the SJWCD board adopted a new section to its bylaws, to clarify the behavior expected of Director Pfister and the other board members regarding financial conflicts of interest.

"Section 11. Disclosure of Conflict of Interest. A Director who has a financial interest in a matter coming before the Board shall recuse himself/herself from participation in discussion of voting on the matter, and shall propose no motions or offer comments while the matter is before the board. Whenever possible, recusal shall include removing himself/herself from the meeting while the matter is under consideration. A potential conflict of interest of any Director shall be disclosed in accordance with State law, particularly Article 18 of Title 24, C.R.S., and Section 18-8-308, C.R.S.

"Regardless of this action by the board, Director Pfister continues to participate in official board actions - discussing, making motions, and voting in favor of donations made to Mountain Studies Institute, a a paid consultant. Mr. Pfister viomy opinion - on February 21, 2022 and March 21, 2022. My criticism of Director Pfister's behavior has resulted in considerable tension at board meetings."

request, but request you consider and stating that has abided these policies since their inception, although "two particular directors" continue to accuse him of violation his fiduciary duties.

> The letter then adds, "Although Colorado law is very clear - in my opinion - on questions of financial conflict of interest, the definition of 'fiduciary duty' when serving on a conservancy district board is much less clear.

"Since serving on the SJWCD board, I have considered it part of my fiduciary duty to help the district taxpayers understand the laws and policies that influence water allocations and uses, whether local or statewide. A couple of my fellow board members have consistently argued that such communications, when carried through a local news outlet that I operate, are damaging to the work of the district.

"In spite of an official board policy, these two directors have attacked my work, without any evidence that I am, in fact, violating my loyalty to the district taxpayers. These constant attacks, aided and abetted by our current legal council, have resulted in ongoing debates and antagonistic feelings during board meetings, causing tension and frustration.

"The difference in opinion seems to center on whether the fiduciary 'duty of loyalty' refers to 'loyalty to the board of directors' - as some board members have argued - or whether it refers to 'lovalty to the district taxpayers,' which is the stance I have maintained.

"It's my belief that sharing information about the District with the taxpayers, and sharing my understanding of the District's actions with those same taxpayers, is a key part of my fiduciary duty. I believe a well-informed public is best able to make well informed decisions.

"Director Pfister disagrees with my interpretation of 'fiduciary duty,' and he has consistently argued from that perspective, thus generating a steady series of contentious board discussions that have very little to do with productive work by the board.

"In 2017, a majority of the SIWCD board voted last year [sic] to place a proposed mill levy increase on the November ballot, to support a reservoir construction project. The mill levy increase was subsequently rejected by the District voters by a 2-to-1 margin. I was among the voters who rejected the mill levy proposal, and I believe SJWCD needs more board members who represent the majority of the taxpaying voters, so that a comprehensive, community-centric examination of past and current SJWCD policies can take place. I am eager to continue promoting that direction on the SJWCD board." In response to these letters, Wilson issued an order on May 23 stating, in part, "As to the issue as to whether to re-appoint Director Hudson, the Court has reviewed his response to President Pfister's letter to the Court. After reviewing both letters, the Court believes that it needs more information prior to deciding the issue. The Court

therefore sets a short hearing on this issue on June 6, 2022 at 10:00 AM at which time director Hudson, President Pfister and/or the board may present additional information they deem appropriate for the Court to consider."

Hudson's concerns about Pfister's obedience to conflict-ofinterest laws and the upcoming hearing were discussed at the May 26 SJWCD board meeting.

At the April 18 meeting, the board had moved to have Hudson submit his concerns, which had been stated at that meeting, to Jeffrey Kane, SJWCD's attorney. During a discussion on the progress of this submission, which had not been completed by the time of meeting, Hudson explained that he was waiting on communication from another board member.

He elaborated, "I've been covering government boards and writing about and documenting government boards for 18 years and have never, ever, heard an attorney attack an individual board member of the board that he serves, in public, the way Jeff Kane attacked a board member at the last meeting. I have never heard an attorney act the way Jeff Kane acted at the last meeting. So, I will not send a letter that comes from Bill Hudson because Jeff Kane does not like Bill Hudson.

"In fact, he's willing to attack a board member of this board, his employer, in a public meeting and badmouth a board member in a public meeting. So, I will not send the letter coming from Bill Hudson, but I will send it if it comes from more than one board member. Doug wasn't willing to put his name on it. ... I'm looking to see if another board member will put their name on this letter because Jeff is just going to toss it in the trash if it comes from Bill Hudson."

Secrist commented that Kane would respond to Hudson's concerns.

Hudson responded, "That's an assumption. I don't make that assumption." The discussion ended with Pfis-

ter reiterating that Kane would respond to Hudson's concerns and Nossaman agreeing.

The board then moved on to discuss the hearing request from Wilson, with Pfister summarizing the previous meeting and letters before commenting that he would prefer Kane to be there.

Hudson expressed his objections to this, stating that this is between the judge and the applicants and that he would not agree with paying Kane "\$200 an hour to attend a hearing."

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
















### **PSMC presents automatic external defibrillators** to Archuleta County Sheriff's Office

#### Pagosa Springs Medical Center staff

On behalf of Pagosa Springs Medical Center, (PSMC) Dr. Rhonda Webb, PSMC CEO, presented five automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) to the Archuleta County Sheriff's Office (ACSO) for the benefit of the community.

The AEDs are a portable medical device used in the case of cardiac arrest to analyze heart rhythm and deliver a shock to restore the heart rhythm to normal. The units will be housed in five ACSO vehicles.

The ACSO responds within an 1,800-square-mile area that includes Archuleta County as well as parts of Mineral and Hinsdale counties. Deputies are most often the first on scene to major medical and trauma emergencies, including cardiac arrest calls where defibrillation and early CPR may be the difference between surviving or not. All sheriff's deputies are trained by PSMC's Emergency Medical Services staff.

### Local COVID-19 transmission rate rising

Recent COVID-19 incidence and positivity rates indicate that transmission is rising in La Plata and Archuleta counties, according to San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH).

Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment data showed a 100 percent increase in COVID levels in local wastewater between April 28 and May 5, with the amount of virus continuing to increase since, according SJBPH Communications Director/CO-VID-19 Public Information Officer Megan Graham.

"SJBPH encourages residents, especially those who are at high risk for severe illness, to act now to protect themselves and their families," a May 27 press release states. "Residents should continue prevention efforts such as staying home if you have symptoms, frequent hand-

washing, and staying up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and boosters. High risk and vulnerable individuals should consider resuming masking in public indoor spaces."

SJBPH's data dashboard showed Wednesday that, as of Tuesday, Archuleta County's one-week positivity rate was 9 percent and oneweek cumulative incidence rate was 82.30 new cases per 100,000 people.

"I think we can safely assume that the incidence rate is higher than the numbers indicate," Graham said, explaining that while the widespread availability of home testing is good, it means not all cases are being reported to the state.

Hospitalizations continue to remain low in the region, Graham reported, with one unvaccinated individual hospitalized at Mercy Regional Medical Center as of Wednesday.

#### June special events

The Chimney Rock Interpretive Association (CRIA) offers two different Night Sky Archaeoastronomy Programs: Our Solar System on Friday, June 3, 7:15-10 p.m., and Stars and Galaxies on Friday, June 27. For both programs, your evening begins with a sunset and interactive discussion at the Mesa Village Trailhead just off the high mesa parking lot. After the discussion, volunteer astronomers await with telescopes to provide a closer look at the wonders of the night sky. Tickets are \$16 (adults) and \$8 (children 5-12) plus booking fee and are nonrefundable. Check our website for program times and bring your questions.

This month's Geology Tour will take place on June 1, 8, 15, 27 and 29, 7 to 8:30 a.m. This program includes a 2.5-hour guided tour that explores local geology and its







### VA establishes presumptive service connection for rare respiratory cancers for certain veterans

As part of President Joe Biden's Unity Agenda commitment to support the nation's veterans, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is adding nine rare respiratory cancers to the list of presumed service-connected disabilities due to military environmental exposures to fine particulate matter.

The following list of rare respiratory cancers have been added to the VA's regulations through an Interim Final Rule published in the Federal Register on April 26:

• Squamous cell carcinoma of the larynx.

• Squamous cell carcinoma of the trachea.

• Adenocarcinoma of the trachea.

• Salivary gland-type tumors of the trachea.

• Adenosquamous carcinoma of the lung.

• Large cell carcinoma of the lung.

• Salivary gland-type tumors of the lung.


• Sarcomatoid carcinoma of the lung.

• Typical and atypical carcinoid of the lung.

The VA determined through a focused review of scientific and medical evidence there is biological plausibility between airborne hazards and carcinogenesis of the respiratory tract — and the unique circumstances of these rare cancers warrant a presumption of service connection.

The rarity and severity of these illnesses, and the reality these conditions present, is a situation where it may not be possible to develop additional evidence, which prompted VA to take this action.

"Last year we made promises to fundamentally change and improve how we establish and expedite presumptions — now we're keeping them," said VA Secretary Denis McDonough. "We are taking a new approach to presumptives that takes all available science into ac-



count, with one goal in mind: getting today's veterans — and vets in the decades ahead — the benefits they deserve as fast as possible."

The VA will begin processing disability compensation claims for veterans who served any amount of time in the Southwest Asia theater of operations beginning Aug. 2, 1990, to the present, or Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, Syria or Djibouti beginning Sept. 19, 2001, to the present.

### Thank you, firefighting team

#### Thank you, firefighters!

And when I say firefighters, I mean the entire team that goes into making the fire fight happen. If you went by the fairgrounds last week, you saw the grounds filled with trucks, semis, tents, trailers, equipment and people that work into the big picture of fighting the fire.

On May 19, a Type 2 Incident Management Team was deployed to the Archuleta County Fairgrounds to set up its self-contained mini city that provides all the resources and amenities to help the firefighters fight the Plumtaw fire. Most of the team members came from the western states including California, Nevada, Washington, New Mexico, Wyoming, Utah, Montana and more, and some came from as far as Virginia and Alaska.

The team officers are made up of the incident command, public information, safety, liaison, operations, planning, logistics and finance, and all the support staff that they bring in. They not only come from all over, but they are also different government agencies and private contractors that make up the team.

If you are interested in learning more about incident command systems and the team, I would encourage you to go on the FEMA. gov website to learn more.

Last week, a small group of officials were invited (I got to tag along) to walk around the fairgrounds with Mike LaFrentz from the Shoshone National Forest in Wyoming to see the different services and support that provide the resources needed to support the incident. Services include communications, medical and food. Support are the underlying needs of the incident such as supplies, providing facilities and ground support.

We visited the food facility first. Three semis and 32 employees made up the kitchen and staff to pump out six meals per minute. That is breakfast, lunch and dinner, and they provide all the in-between snacks on and off the fire line. They fed us some tasty peach cobbler and a fruity salad, and some went back for seconds.

We walked over to see the shower units next — two long trailers that provided hot showers to all the firefighters and the rest of the mini-city residents. The contractor who brought in the bathrooms (and there were plenty of those to go around) also brought in the hand-washing stations that were strategically placed around.

We saw the communications trailer where the Starlink satellite had them connected to the entire team. Walking through the cache of ground support, they had pallets of hoses for the engines, pumps, hand



tools, lights, office supplies, first aid supplies, bottled water, toiletries and so much more. Anything that they needed, they could get.

Mike showed us the incident command post (ICP) meeting rooms (OK, yurts) that were set up just outside the exhibit hall where different meetings could take place. Inside the exhibit hall is where the heartbeat of the ICP was set up. This is where the incident management team officers were stationed so they could provide the functions necessary to effectively manage the incident.

We are so grateful for all the people who make up the firefighting team. Thank you to each and every one of you who helped save homes and land in Archuleta County. We hope you don't have to come back unless you want to.

### **Bison: back where they belong**

Early in the COVID-19 epidemic, I visited the Bison Range on the Flathead Indian Reservation in northwestern Montana. But the bison didn't get the memo about social distancing.

A trio of bull bison — each a ton on the hoof — fed on bunchgrass. I watched my son's eyes grow wider as one of the bulls approached our truck, as if it might want to rub off its winter coat on the fender.

Not long ago, the Bison Range visitor center would have given my family a history of the place by focusing on Theodore Roosevelt, America's 26th president and founder of the National Bison Range. Now, that story is getting a much-needed makeover.

Roosevelt still captivates the American imagination, as demonstrated by the recent Ken Burns miniseries on PBS. In particular, Roosevelt has been lionized by conservationists. He helped rescue American wildlife from extinction after the market-hunting bloodbaths of the 1800s, created the first national wildlife refuge and signed the Antiquities Act that enabled the creation of national monuments.

More than any other elected official in U.S. history, he made conservation a household word. Americans were so grateful we carved his face on a mountain.

But that ignores the rest of his legacy. Roosevelt was also a white supremacist who believed that whites were meant to rule the world. His views on race warped his policies, both foreign and domestic. It's easy to dismiss this dark side of Roosevelt as reflecting the norm for his era, but he was behind the times even in his times.

This contradictory man was someone who knew birds by their songs and wrote bestsellers about the beauty of nature. Yet, he also threw around racial slurs and used



pseudo-science to justify his racist policies.

So, what are we to make of this today? Is Roosevelt a hero for being a trustbuster, savior of the Grand Canyon and the egret? Or did he set destructive policies for a century to come? Perhaps both are true.

Case in point: The huge bison that thrilled my son. Before 1776, tens of millions of bison roamed North America. But by the time Roosevelt was a young cowboy in the Dakotas in 1883, only a few hundred animals still lived in Canada and this country, somehow avoiding the mass slaughter that accompanied Manifest Destiny. After Roosevelt shot one of the last lonesome bison, the death is said to have sparked a change in him, spurring him to become a conservationist.

But there is more to that story. Indigenous people had created deep cultures of conservation that predated Columbus. In Roosevelt's day, tribes were desperate to save the bison and their way of life. It was Indigenous people, such as Sam Walking Coyote and Michael Pablo, who helped rescue a small herd of bison from Saskatchewan and brought them back to the Flathead Reservation.

President Roosevelt also wanted to restore bison, and as president in 1908, he created the National Bison Range by taking 18,500 acres out of the Flathead Indian Reservation. But this action ignored the wishes of the Salish, Pend Oreille and Kootenai people, who had been forced to live there since 1855. What's more, the bison refuge was run not by the tribes, but by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which mostly inflated Roosevelt's role in the story and dismissed those of Native Americans.

But history has written a new chapter. Congress in 2020 moved to return management of the Bison Range to the Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes, and this May, Interior Secretary Deb Haaland visited the Bison Range to take part in a celebration of that long-awaited change.

The return of the Bison Range to the Tribes is a "triumph and a testament to what can happen when we collaboratively work together to restore balance to ecosystems that were injured by greed and disrespect," said Haaland at the ceremony.

It has taken decades, but a historic wrong has been righted. All we had to do was look honestly at history and one of our conservation heroes.







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### **Bird of the Week**

This week's Bird of the Week, compliments of the Weminuche Audubon Society and Audubon Rockies, is the evening grosbeak.

A misconception about this bird's behavior, by early explorers who believed it sang only at dusk, put the "evening" in its name. Anyone familiar with these birds at feeders knows that they are noisy all day long. They don't really sing, but their calls are distinctive.

Grosbeak is derived from French words meaning thick beak. Evening grosbeaks share this trait with grosbeaks in the cardinal family, but they are more closely related to birds in the finch family.

The colorful male is a golden color with a large white patch on his black wings. A bright yellow eyebrow accentuates his dark head and at this time of year his bill is greenish. Females are more gray brown with greenish tones and white-tipped tails.

In summer, they eat insects including spruce budworm, caterpillars and aphids, but their strong beaks allow them to specialize on large seeds. They can exert enough pressure to crack a seed as tough as a cherry or olive pit, and pine seeds are a staple in their diet.

Traveling in flocks, they will wipe out sunflower feeders. Observations have determined that one bird is capable of cracking more than 90 sunflower seeds per minute.

Evening grosbeaks are permanent residents of southern Canada and the western mountains. They wander widely in search of food, with numbers rising and falling in relation to availability of pine seeds on their breeding grounds. In the last 20 years, reports from Project Feederwatch, ebird.org and Christmas Bird Counts have shown alarming population declines throughout their range. Factors believed to play a part in this decline include pesticide spraying in Canadian and U.S. forests which have reduced spruce budworms, a favorite prey, and shrinking of boreal forests from climate warming and harvesting of old growth forests.

It's hard not to feel a sense of awe when you look at the stars on a clear, dark night. Modern digital cameras are able to produce high-quality images from long exposures of weak starlight. This allows photographers to extend landscape photography into the night, producing stunning "nightscape" images in which both the land and the sky are important compositional elements.

In this presentation, Butler

will discuss planning and taking nightscape photos featuring the moon, Milky Way, star trails and other features of the night sky. Topics will include planning for nightscape photos, discussion of camera and lens choices, focusing and exposure considerations, and use of both natural and artificial light to illuminate the foreground.

The Pagosa Springs Photography Club promotes educational, social and fun interactions between all who enjoy making and viewing great photography. 



Temperance is self-control. It has also been described as abstaining from things that are harmful and using in moderation even that which is good. When eating, be moderate and do not overate. Temperance also includes eating at the proper times. Eating a massive bowl of fruit and oatmeal at midnight is just as intemperate as eating 6 donuts for breakfast.

Science Says: A study done by the Veterans Affairs Medical Center and the University of Oklahoma showed an increase in blood pressure upon ingestion of caffeine.





We said, "You've come to the right place. We can help you."


