## Town will put on Fourth of July parade

"The parade is happening," Town Manager Andrea Phillips told the Pagosa Springs Town Council at Tuesday evening's meeting.

The Town of Pagosa Springs will now serve as the event sponsor, with the Rotary Club of Pagosa Springs assisting with publicity and volunteering on the Fourth of July.

At its meeting Tuesday evening, the Pagosa Springs Town Council opted to dip into General Fund reserves expenditure of up to \$7,500 for trained traffic control to help put on the parade after the Rotary Club announced last week it would no longer produce the event due to concerns.

"It's gonna be a great Fourth," Mayor Don Volger said prior to the council's unanimous vote to take on the additional cost and enter into a memorandum of understanding with Rotary.


In introducing the topic to council during the

meeting, Phillips noted Rotary has done a "fantastic job" building up the parade as a community event, but now had discomfort about the club's liability.

"I think we have a plan that's going to work," Phillips explained to council.

Following council's discussion on the logistics of the event, Volger noted that the parade is one of the few left

#### Class of 2019 receives more than \$700,000 in scholarships

Not only did the Pagosa Springs High School (PSHS) class of 2019 begin the first step of its collective journey on June 1, but the class earned more than \$700,000 in scholarships for higher education.

The class of 2019 earned 135 scholarships totaling \$725,840, many of which are renewable. Of the total graduating class of 78, 19 students were a part of the National Honor Society, which requires a GPA of at least 3.4.

One student, Cameron Lucero, earned Academic Distinction, which requires a GPA of at least 3.8. Three students — Cade Cowan, Morgan Thompson and Elise Yeager - earned Great Distinction, which requires a GPA of at least 3.9.

Eight students from the class of 2019 earned Highest Distinction, having a GPA of at least 4.0. Those students who earned this distinction were: Paul Farrah, Nathan Lewis, Javier Mariñelarena, Isabella Mijares,

## Local snowpack 1,454 percent

## Colorado out of drought

Thanks to a wet, cool spring, Colorado's drought is officially over and snowpack statistics remain eye-catching.


According to the U.S. Drought Monitor's May 30 map, the entire state of Colorado has no reported drought.

And in Pagosa Country, the cool, wet spring has helped snowpack levels hold strong, according to the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

The Colorado Climate Center tweeted on June 3 that, per the Western Regional Climate Center, "May 2019 was the 4th coldest May for Colorado, dating back to 1895, with a temperature anomaly of 5° below average. The last May this cold was back in 1995, and before that, the coldest Mays were over 100 years ago!"

The cold May delaying snowmelt has led to the San Miguel, Dolores, Animas and San Juan River basins being at 1,454 percent of median this week. Last week that total was

#### County finalizes financing terms for new jail By John Finefrock The principal of the loan is

Archuleta County has finalized the financing terms for the new jail, with the county receiving better terms that it had anticipated.

According to an email from Archuleta County Finance Director Larry Walton, the winning bid was from Baird, Red Bank, N.J., who had a 20-member syndicate behind it, representing banks from across the \$14,055,000, with the principal and interest totaling \$19,478,085, according to a report on the financing deal by Ehlers Inc., the county's municipal advisor.

Walton wrote that the winning bid offers an interest rate of 3.0749 percent and the next three bids offered 3.15 percent, 3.28 percent and 3.4 percent.


At its May 23 meeting, the Pagosa Springs Town Council adopted the Destination Master Plan, which provides recommendations for local tourism development.

The Pagosa Springs Area Tourism Board worked with Place Dynamics in 2018 to develop the plan, an agenda brief prepared for the meeting states.

The report offers "no silver bullets" in terms of things missing, Tourism Director Jennifer Green told the council, which she sees "as a good thing."

## D-Day: Following in his father's footsteps

"D-Day was the turning point that decided the future of the world. It brought together strangers who became brothers forever. Their ultimate sacrifices and the sacrifices of those who survived live on today." — "D-Day: The Untold Stories," History Channel.

He came across a small notebook his father kept while training with the Fourth Cavalry at Camp Maxey, Texas. The last diary entry was dated Nov. 15, 1943: "Closing because I am going overseas."

Edward J. Valentine was a medic with the 24th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron. He arrived in France on D-Day plus nine.

Edward didn't talk much about his time in the military. His passing at age 59 left many unasked and unanswered questions for his son, Val Valentine. That factor is the reason that Val decided to retire at age 59, the same age his father died. That is also when his quest to document his father's steps began.

Val joined the Fourth Cavalry Association and began researching the history of both his father's unit and the World War II European Theater of Operations. His research allowed him to ascertain where his father was on any given day.

'This avocation of my father's time during World War II gave me a connection to him when I was too young and unable to ask the right questions I ask myself today," Val explained.

When he returned from his 58-day, nearly 2,000-kilometer solo cycling adventure, many of his friends asked, "How was your vacation?"

Val told them that it wasn't a vacation. "It was an avocation I have held dear for about a dozen years and actively

pursued since retiring in 2007. It's the culmination of research, education, planning and training of where my father was during the war and what I learned and gained when visiting those places," he explained.

He found himself telling his story of the places he visited "when my father was there and what his unit was engaged in and what I found there, the interesting people I met is a story in itself. There is a story in each place and in most people I met. Then I would proceed to tell them anecdotally, of one experience or encounter of my travels."

Val wrote about his father, "I bicycled on the same cobblestone, along the same narrow roads he traveled in a jeep or ambulance, probably visited the same churches he attended Catholic

"I have a greater sense of time and place of World War II European Theatre of Operations ... For everyone I met during my two months cycling the Voie de la Liberte, I told them, 'Bonjour Monsieur -Madam, mon père était ici il y a soixante-cinq ans.' (My father was here sixty-five years ago.)'

Val shared that "members of the Fourth Cavalry paved the way, figuratively and literally, [along] a narrow swatch of countryside from commune to commune, kilometer by kilometer through France and Belgium, leaving their mark in world history and on the hearts of very grateful nations."

The biggest lesson he learned from his experience is that, "The French will never forget what those Boys of '44 did for them. D-day, while a commemoration for Americans to remember the success and sacrifice of liberating France, for the French, it is their 'Independence Day,' a second Bastille Day." Val's journey allowed him to meet some of his father's fellow troopers and learn their stories.

His father was involved with the Battle of Cherbourg in June, 1944, in Saint Marcouf. It was there where Val met a woman who was 12 years old during the Nazi Occupation of France.

"Her eyes, more than the words, translated by her friend conveyed her gratitude for their liberation," he wrote.

Val has been hard at work documenting his journey in a book for those of us who are seeking answers to our unasked questions about D-Day.

The book, "Through His Eyes," is dedicated to "'Speedy,' a great name for a combat medic, who I [simply] knew as 'Dad'." It is also dedicated "to the memory of the 16 million who served in the armed forces of the United States in World War II and the more than 400,000 who died, and all those who supported the war effort from home." Most importantly, it is dedicated "to the cavalry troopers, past and present; always heroic, your guidon has blazed the way for us to follow.

"Some days my children will sit around a kitchen table and share 'dad stories' this avocation and my writing has helped me to share the story of the grandfather they never knew," Val shared.

Of his journey he explained, "I told so many grateful people I met as a Free American cycling in a Liberated France, it's not about a sixty-year old on a personal solo cycling adventure, it's about 'those Boys of '44.'

Today marks the 75th anniversary of D-Day — a day that changed the world. Terri Lynn Oldham House





## 90 years ago Taken from SUN files of

June 7, 1929

The June term of the Archuleta county district court opened Tuesday morning for its first session in the new court house. Judge Searcy said: "I think it is proper the Judge of the Court should remark this morning that the people of Archuleta County are entitled to a great deal of credit; they are to be congratulated for producing such a splendid building as this new Court House for the administration of public affairs ... There is another thing in the erection of public buildings of this kind, and for which the people of this County are to be congratulated. To my mind, the having of good public buildings tends to increase our own self-respect as a people; the fact that we have a beautiful statehouse for our State and a beautiful Court House for our County tends, in my opinion, to cause the people to think of their government, to have more self-respect as a self-governing people. To some extent it is like a man who puts on good clothes, which make him feel more dignified and cause him to have greater self-respect.'

## 75 years ago Taken from SUN files of

June 9, 1944

Mr. and Mrs. F.R. Yamaguchi received a cablegram from their sons, Fred and Ralph, stating that they landed safely at their destination overseas.

The daily publications and radios broadcast information about the Allies invasion along the Normandy coast and extending east. Everybody has been excitedly obtaining reports possible and are already up to date with the news of this action. Therefore detailed reports in a weekly publication like The Sun would not give any news. Tuesday morning about 2 o'clock the local church bells began to ring and also help announce invasion had started. Dailies and radios broadcasted reports every few minutes from headquarter of Gen. Dwight E. Eisenhower, the supreme commander, revealing movements of the Allied Expeditionary Force including 4000 ships and 11,000 planes as they invaded Hitler's west wall. They met considerable less resistance than expected and prepared for and the Allied "offensive area" has increased speedily. This "invasion" action by the Allies will bring favorable results, but will also include vast loss and injury of both troops and equipment.

## 50 years ago Taken from SUN files of

Ralanco Industries, Inc., some weeks ago announced that a huge development is being planned for the area west of town, now known as Sunetha Flats. Ralanco officials said that the development is proceeding as rapidly as possible but that special care is being taken in preliminary planning and engineering. They emphasize that proper planning is most essential to a successful development and say that they feel that a late start on construction is much better than starting before proper planning is completed. Indications are that construction will start on a major scale next spring and that by late fall of 1970 some very solid evidence of the scope of the development will then be apparent. Few things in recent years have caused as much comment as the start of the Pagosa Development, which is expected to be one of the biggest developments of this type in Southwestern Colorado.

## 25 years ago Taken from SUN files of

June 9, 1994

Second lieutenant Kevin Stone, son of Richard and Mary Anne Stone, graduated from the United States Air Force Academy June 1 with a bachelor of science degree in political science and a minor in Russian. It was the first time for a Pagosa Springs High School graduate to receive a degree from one of the U.S. military academies.

**Bob Hand** moved to Pagosa Springs 29 years ago. Soon, Hand will leave the area, but the mark he has made on this community is indelible -a legacy of productive activity and positive change. He has been a member of the Pagosa Springs Chamber of Commerce for 28 years. He served as a member of the board of directors for three years and as chamber president in 1986. In July 1987, he became chamber manager. Hand is a charter member of the Pagosa Springs Rotary Club and has worked over the years with many civic organizations. Rotary Club president Marion Francis paid his tribute for fellow Hand by saying: "We are losing an heirloom."





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
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Town looking at downtown parking options Dickhoff and Schmidt explained to council some of those challenges and opportunities for increasing parking in the downtown, including striping parking spots, meeting the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), signs to help people locate parking, RV parking, expansion opportunities,

> parking enforcement and more. "We looked at different ways to improve the parking situation in town," Schmidt said, explaining that one of the things that came forward was striping that was inadequate, missing or not as efficient

as it could be. "Paint striping in parking lots and along public streets is a big part of having a good parking program," the agenda brief explains, adding later, "Better signing of on-street and off-street parking opportunities is being explored. Staff is working with CDOT to stripe the on-street spots on Highway 160 in a way that is acceptable to the state through a permitting process and will decrease the effects on traffic flow while people attempt to parallel park.'

The brief also explains that, the ADA requires that each individual parking lot have one accessible spot for every 25 spots in that lot. Those spots must have a "durable surface" and must be the closest spots to the accessible entrance to the facility.

"The Town is currently lacking 10 accessible spots Townwide. Signing and striping changes can be made by Public Works to address some of these issues, but the cost of compliance on lots such as Res Hill will be high. ADA requirements do not extend to on street parking," the brief explains.

Schmidt indicated there is also an opportunity to improve wayfinding signage in the town to help

people locate parking lots. Schmidt indicated the potential

of installing limited-time signage (two-hour parking) to encourage people to not park all day or all

Schmidt also explained that there are a lot of big trailers that come through town that are unable to stop in Pagosa to utilize local businesses and recreation.

One way to help that, Schmidt indicated, is to make parallel parking spaces a uniform size so RV drivers are able to more easily spot multiple open spaces and know there is room for their vehicle.

"Another thing that's being considered or thought about is enforcement options," Schmidt explained.

Schmidt explained Pagosa used to have a parking enforcement officer who was almost like a community outreach officer, as well as outlining options like parking meters to help cycle vehicles and people through the downtown area.

Schmidt indicated the police chief was not against the idea of an enforcement officer, with Town Manager Andrea Phillips noting it would just need to be funded.

Phillips also explained to council there have been some recent court cases against the chalking of tires.

"So, that type of parking enforcement is no longer allowed because that's seen as an extension of private property and infringement on private property rights," she said. "So, you can't chalk tires anymore, which makes metering maybe a little more advantageous."

Schmidt also noted work to improve and expand existing lots, such as the removal of the broken asphalt in the Centennial parking lot behind the courthouse.

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## Planning commission recommends RV park expansion, denies short-term rental appeal

At its meeting on May 22, the Archuleta County Planning Commission voted to recommend approval of the eight-site expansion of The Last Resort RV Park and Campground and denied an appeal from a short-term rental homeowner who petitioned that his home be considered five bedrooms instead of four.

The planning commission, a volunteer group of citizens, makes recommendations to the Archuleta County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC).

The Last Resort RV Park and Campground submitted plans to the county to expand its park by eight RV sites, and the planning commission was set to vote on its recommendation to the county commissioners.

At the meeting, Archuleta County Planning Manager John Shepard gave an update on the status of the owners' (TJ and Stacy Fitzwater) application.

"They submitted a land use permit application on April 22. I informed them by email on April 23 I had concerns with the completeness of the application and that they could proceed at their own risk," said Shepard, adding, "This is the crux of the matter here for me, I do not professionally feel I have enough information to recommend approval or denial of this project. I simply don't have enough information."

Shepard said the Fitzwaters provided "very detailed construction drawings of the new RV pads and their driveways," but said they did not include a complete site plan that illustrated the entire RV Park in their application.

Shepard's staff report recommends six conditions relating to water, road access, septic requirements, a floodplain development permit and a full site plan that he suggested the planning commission include should they vote to recommend that the BoCC approve

In addition to the conditions listed in his report, Shepard also touched upon some of the current tent sites being in the floodplain and explained he needs to protect the county should it ever be audited by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

Planning commission chair Michael Frederick discussed with Shepard the applicability of his

applicability of our zoning regulations and is in the area we've already determined is not being improved at this point. So, we don't have a floodplain problem here, do we?" said Frederick.

"Well, we may have one, but it's not affecting the proposed area," Shepard said, referring to the proposed expansion.

Frederick ultimately did not press Shepard's concerns about the floodplain any further.

One of the six conditions suggested in Shepard's staff report notes that the Fitzwaters "shall address CDOT's [Colorado Department of Transportation] Access Permit requirement," although his report notes that county engineer Bob Perry had denied to pursue CDOT's request.

"The reason why I declined to address that is simply that if I address this and we start having to write a right of way permit every time some development is done on one of our county roads that accesses a state highway, I would need two people hired just to do the paperwork," Perry said in a followup phone interview, adding that CDOT doesn't have an access permit to any county road in Archuleta County and doesn't have permits for 90 percent of roads in Colorado.

In an email to Shepard regarding the access permit, Perry wrote, "I do not want to voluntarily begin a process that would require Archuleta County to generate significant paperwork on each and every county road that intersects with a state highway ... CDOT may have the resources to process that kind of paperwork, but Archuleta County R&B [road and bridge] does not.

"If it becomes mandatory, for whatever reason, then we may begin the process, but not until it is mandatory," wrote Perry.

Shepard and planning commissioner Anita Hooton also pressed the Fitzwaters on the fact that their septic permit was issued for six additional RV sites, not eight, although the Fitzwaters said they were building a "dump station" that could empty the waste tank of any RV that drove up to it.

Ultimately, after about two hours of deliberation, the planning commission voted to approve the applicant's request, with the condition that the applicant provide evidence that the sewage capacity is adequate for the design as presented.

In its decision, the commission also included findings C and D

"C. The application DOES meet the review criteria for a Conditional Use Permit in Section 3.2.3.4 of the Archuleta County Land Use Regulations, and

"D. The application DOES meet the required findings for a Conditional Use Permit in Section3.2.3.5 of the Archuleta County Land Use Regulations...'

In a statement to The SUN jointly signed by TJ and Stacey Fitzwater, they wrote, "We have addressed all issues presented by the Planning Department staff and we look forward to the June 18th BOCC meeting so we can move forward."

#### Short-term rental appeal

The meeting also included a public hearing pertaining to the Pagosa Springs home of Hans Vlieger, who called in to the meeting to appeal the decision that his short-term rental house is considered four bedrooms, and he argued that it should be considered five.

Archuleta County has required homeowners who rent their houses for 30 days or less at a time to obtain a vacation rental permit since late last year. The permit costs \$400 annually.

Part of the permitting process requires an inspection from the Planning Department, where the number of bedrooms of a home is determined.

The short-term rental regulations specify that maximum occupancy is calculated at two people per bedroom plus two additional

In question was Vlieger's alleged fifth bedroom, which the planning commission referred to throughout the meeting as a "rec room."

Shepard's staff report describes how the Planning Department makes a determination if a room should be considered a bedroom.

"Staff has evaluated loft or other atypical sleeping area as typical of a 'bedroom', if building & fire safety cases can be met, on a case-bycase basis, including egress (stairs not a ladder, window to escape in a fire) and minimum size (at least 70 square feet with no less than 7'headroom). The International Code Council (ICC) defines a bedroom as 'a room primarily intended for sleeping purposes.' If it has a closet AND a door, we generally consider it 'a room primarily intended for sleeping purposes' and require the necessary arcfault protection, smoke detectors, and proper egress windows. Areas NOT primarily intended for sleepcupancy."

New requirements issued by San Juan Basin Public Health (SJBPH) that most septic systems must be inspected prior to sale of a home have surprised some home sellers, with those sellers figuring out that the number of bedrooms listed on their septic permits sometimes don't match the number of bed-

rooms they serve. "What [the new regulations require] is that most septic systems, on-site wastewater treatment systems, be inspected prior to the property that they serve being sold," explained Brian Devine, water quality program manager for

SJBPH, in an interview. He added, "Without a transfer of title inspection, we've had so many cases of folks buying a property — they have no idea where their system is located, what it consists of, how it's supposed to work, how they're supposed to maintain it, and then when it doesn't work and they are responsible for fixing it, they have a repair obligation and a repair bill that they did not expect when they

purchased the property." Wayne Pierce, who was from Archuleta County until he recently sold his house, told The SUN when he got his inspection from SJBPH prior to sale of his home, that his septic permit was listed for two bedrooms when his house is three bedrooms.

Lori Unger, Pierce's real estate agent in selling his property, explained the situation.

"[Pierce] bought a cute little cabin in 1982. The original owner added an additional bedroom on and we cannot confirm because the county did not keep their records," explained Unger. "We cannot confirm if the septic was built out, too, and so because we can't confirm it, we have to add on."

Unger explained that Pierce had to pay about \$10,000 to upgrade his septic system to meet the requirements of his three-bedroom house.

When asked about this specific situation, Devine said the new regulations are in place to prevent

"The assessor's office does have it listed as a three bedroom because they went to the county and got the permit to add on the bedroom," said Unger, adding, "San Juan Basin





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

Health still had it listed as a two bedroom and we cannot prove that the septic system got added on at that time when they did the permit."

"Mr. Pierce, when he bought that property, I'm sure it's the case that he was not told, you know, what his system consisted of, or how it works or how to properly maintain it. And, that's extremely common in our area; actually all over Colorado," Devine explained. "This regulation acts on that lack of information that's being presented to the buyer and says, 'No, actually you need to make sure that the system is correct when presented to the buyer and the buyer knows what they're getting, what it's approved for and how to maintain it."

Another local real estate agent, Debbie Loewen, said that her clients have had similar issues to Unger and

Loewen explained she had a client selling their older ranch house, where a septic permit was never finalized and the system needed a bigger leech field, costing them an additional \$15,000.

With all the headache and cost, Loewen explained she understands why the new regulations are in place.

"I think it's actually a good thing, 'cause there was so many people just dumping stuff everywhere, you know, and just lines going anywhere and putting in septic tanks anywhere. So I think it's actually something that needed to happen. It's going to cost more, but you know, we're not going to have all that waste

In a statement to The SUN, Archuleta County Assessor Natalie Woodruff explained that outside entities who use the assessor data may not be using it properly.

"Our data is for assessment purposes only. When outside entities use our data for anything else, it can be troublesome," wrote Woodruff, adding, "If I hadn't sent 2 of my staff to a class provided through Pagosa Springs Association of Area Realtors, we would have been caught off guard when home owners started calling us to say their bedroom count didn't match the data and therefor [sic] San Juan Basin Health wouldn't give them their septic certificate (or whatever it is they need to sell their home)."

Devine admitted that SJBPH made a "mistake" in not doing direct outreach to the assessor's office and reiterated home sellers need to check on their septic status sooner rather than later.

"People get a tax bill with their bedroom count on it and if they wait until the last possible second to make sure that that's accurate when they go to sell their home, it's going to create a backlog for everybody, said Devine, adding, "If people get this taken care of early enough in the process, which is what we always advise, it doesn't pose a huge problem. The problem arises when you're two days before closing and you realize you have illegal bedrooms in your

Devine outlined how residents can check the status of their septic systems online and avoid surprises such as what happened to Pierce.

"So our website, sjbpublichealth. org/septic, the first link on that page is a big green button that says, 'Click here to search existing permits' and that is public access to our permit database, so every permit that we've issued since 1967 has a record in that database, or at least it should, and you can get a copy of your own permit anytime," he explained. "One of the reasons we've set this up the way that we have is people can get that information before they even order an inspection so if you look at your permit and you see, 'Hey, look at that, I've got two illegal bedrooms in my home that wasn't disclosed to me when I bought the property,' you can address that. You can apply for an alteration permit, you can tell us how you're gonna alter the system to make it suitable for those extra bedrooms and then we can do an inspection of your new or expanded system and you don't have to get a separate transfer of title inspection. We've set it up to do that and I want people to take advantage of that.'

Devine reiterated what he suggests the public should do to make sure their septic is in compliance: "I really want people to take that advice: Get a copy of your permit before you even start looking at ordering an inspection."

## Snowpack

693 percent of median.

On May 30, the Colorado Climate Center explained why the changes in snowpack can be drastic this time of year.

"After peak snowpack (aka SWE), the snowpack at our SNOTEL sites typically begins a pretty rapid melt off. A lot can change from one day to the next," the center tweeted.

"Obviously, it's more than expected," NRCS District Conservationist Jerry Archuleta said of local basin totals in an interview. "We're sitting real pretty."

The closest total to local basins is once again the Gunnison River Basin. This week that basin is 1,276 percent of median, last week it was 528 percent of median.

There is no reported snowpack total for the Upper San Juan site due to missing data. Last week, however, that site was 602 percent of median.

The Upper Rio Grande Basin jumped 239 percent of median from last week, going from 434 percent of median to 673 percent of median this week.

For the Arkansas River Basin. reported snowpack totals for this week sit at 502 percent of median.

of median.

The Yampa and White River basins saw a 49 percent increase from last week, with totals going from 224 percent of median to 273 percent of

median this week. A 67 percent increase was reported for the Laramie and North Platte River basins as totals went from 195 percent of median to 262 percent of median.

This week, the South Platte River Basin is 546 percent of median; last week that basin was 290 percent of

The Upper Colorado River Basin jumped 249 percent in a week, going from 343 percent of median to 592 percent of median this week.

The Wolf Creek summit was 240 percent of the June 5 peak and 112 percent of the median peak. Last week, the summit was 191

percent of the May 29 peak and 128 percent of the median peak. As of June 5, the San Juan River through Pagosa Springs had a flow

of 2,760 cfs, well above the average for June 5 of 1,540 cfs. Last week, the San Juan had a

reported flow total of 941 cfs. The highest reported flow total for

Juan had a reported flow of 3,980 cfs. The lowest came in 2002, when the river had a flow of 102 cfs.

Through Sunday, the National Weather Service (NWS) indicates slight chances of thunderstorms; however, Sunday temperatures will top out at 80 degrees.

On Wolf Creek Pass, the NWS indicates chances of rain showers through Friday, but Saturday and Sunday are forecasted to be sunny.

This summer should be a nice one, Archuleta noted, with the cool spring temperatures experienced

"We've recovered from '18, thank goodness, and we've had a wet spring, so we're sitting really good going into summer," he explained.

#### Low-land flood potential

A hazardous weather outlook released by the NWS states that in the coming days, "Temperatures will be above normal through the week which will accelerate the snow melt causing some rivers to rise to bank level or a just a little higher resulting in nuisance type low-land flooding."

The Rotary Club announced May 30 that it is withdrawing its involvement in the annual Fourth of July Parade due to liability, safety and manpower issues.

Rotary has been involved with the parade for over 30 years.

"After much consternation and consideration, the Rotary Board has decided to withdraw involvement,

this year, in the 4th of July Parade," an email statement from JoAnn Laird, Rotary's parade director, to local public officials states.

Rotary's statement notes that, while the club wanted to continue the event, liability, safety and manpower have become issues.

"This decision was not made cavalierly, as the club wanted to continue this community service project that is not only the largest attended annual event in Archuleta County but a project that has been near and dear our heart for over thirty years," the statement reads.

"We so appreciate everything that Rotary has done through the years," Phillips said May 30 following Rotary's announcement.

The statement describes that the parade has grown to 85-100 entries, with crowds and traffic increasing to a point that an outside firm is needed to barricade sidewalks and manage the crowds.

Phillips noted, "We're kind of a victim of our own success," with holding the parade on U.S. 160 complicating matters.

"The parade has grown to the point that it cannot be treated as a small town parade any longer," the statement reads. "We rival any bigger

city on the western slope. Durango, as an example, has had barricades for their parade and Snow Down for years.

The statement commends Pagosa Springs Police Chief Bill Rockensock's work on the parade each year before delving into the club's liability

The statement concludes by stating that if liability issues are relieved, the Rotarians will help with the parade in the future.

"Rotary knows there is no question that everyone wants the parade to continue and the financial and personal harm this can do to the community," it reads. "We just can't be liable for any risk the day of the parade. This has been discussed for months. If released of liability, the club would be thrilled to volunteer all the manpower it takes leading up to the parade five weeks beforehand, until the thank you to the sponsors, winners, volunteers and public are announced the week following the parade. We want this event to continue and are happy to join forces with you next year. Just turn us loose, without liability or day-of manpower for traffic and crowd control."

pense between the low bid and the high bid is \$715,262. The County was originally hoping for less than 3.8% and more recently, less than 3.5%," wrote Walton. "On "sale day", average sales were close to 3.5%, so the winning bid of 3.0749% was a pleasant surprise. As our Municipal Advisor (Deb Hinsvark/Ehlers, Inc.) says 'We did good'."

Walton also noted that the "expected" annual payments were \$839,000 per year, "while the actual annual payments will all be less than \$819,000 (\$20,000+ lower than expected)."

Walton wrote that after seven years, the county can pay off all or part of the principal early.

full term of 25 years ... but we could if we needed to," he wrote.

Walton added, "the County asked for the ability to pay off the COP's early ... just in case we end up with more revenue in the coming years than what our projections show. If we pay them off early, we save interest expense."

The county is using certificates of participation (COPs) to finance the jail. COP financing is a lease-purchase mechanism where Archuleta County will agree to make lease payments for use for the jail and ultimately own it once the full balance has been paid off.

Springs has a very sophisticated tourism promotion infrastructure," the 44-page plan begins. "That is matched with diverse and highquality assets that will draw overnight visitors both regionally and nationally. What is lacking is the public and private infrastructure to service those visitors and grow their number."

Council member Madeline Bergon, who also sits on the tourism board, noted that it was nice to have reassurance that things are on the right path, while Mayor Pro Tem David Schanzenbaker added that it is a big process, but it is important to have a strategic plan.

"This is a great plan," council member Mat deGraaf said, noting that it reads well and complimenting those who put it together.

The purpose of the study, the report explains, "is to examine the travel market, local assets, visitor patterns, and support infrastructure in the Pagosa Springs area, and to recommend a plan of development that will better position the Town to capture visitors and their spending. This will lead to a stronger economy, year-round employment, a better quality of life for residents, and increased revenues to businesses and the local government. It specifically

looks at the demand and feasibility for a large meeting and banquet space that may help the Town and its businesses tap a travel segment that it does not currently reach."

#### Key findings and actions

"Recommendations for tourism development are presented as short-, medium-, and long-term initiatives, based on considerations such as cost, complexity, and the time needed for planning and implementation," the report explains.

The agenda brief on the topic also notes that several of the recommendations in the report are already in the process of being implemented by the town, through the tourism board and through other organizations.

The tourism board, the brief further explains, reviewed the recommendations and provided guidance to establish which recommendations fall into which category in terms of time for implementation.

According to the report, actions that can be taken in a time frame of 2019 to 2020 include:

- Improving road signage direct-



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

## School superintendent announces retirement in 2020

After seven years as Archuleta School District (ASD) superintendent and 11 total years in the district, the 2019-2020 school year will be the last one with Linda Reed at the helm, as she announced her pending retirement in a letter to parents on June 2.

Reed was previously ASD's assistant superintendent from 2009-2013. Then, in August of 2013, she career and technical educational was named interim superintendent programs at Pagosa Springs High by the district and became the permanent superintendent in 2014.

For 10 years, Reed taught in Appalachia and then found herself in California, serving as a special education teacher and principal for 16 years, ultimately coming to Pagosa Springs and serving another decade for ASD.

Before moving to Pagosa Springs in March of 2009, Reed had already retired from education, she explains in her letter, adding that she took the job of ASD assistant superintendent because she felt she had more to contribute.

"However, after much deliberation and consideration, and after some long talks with my husband, I've decided to retire, again, at the end of the 2019-2020 school year, at the end of June, 2020," Reed wrote in her letter. "That allows the Board of Education a year to seek out my replacement. It also allows me time to complete some of the things I would like to accomplish in the district before I retire, again."

Reed called her time as ASD's superintendent an "honor" and a "privilege," also giving praise to the educators and leaders of ASD, as well as the community for being supportive of ASD's children.

ASD Board of Education (BOE) President Greg Schick explained in an interview that he had suspected the news was coming for a few weeks.

"We're extremely happy with her performance. I think she's taken us through a challenging time and I think we've made some big improvements to our school district. We've still got a ways to go. I'm very happy the direction that schools are going," Schick said.

For Schick, Reed's biggest accomplishments for ASD involve

the helm of the successful mill levy override (MLO) ballot issue that passed in November of 2018, efforts with Pagosa Family School, and the addi-



tion of popular

School (PSHS). Archuleta County voters approved Ballot Issue 5A in November of 2018, increasing property taxes for a seven-year period for funding

for ASD. That funding will be used to recruit and retain highly qualified teachers and staff; fund fulltime school resource officers for safety; fund full-day kindergarten; and provide required funding for Pagosa Peak Open School to increase staff salaries, supplement full-day kindergarten and improve school safety.

Schick also cited Reed's ability to improve morale within the district and help the community have a "better feel" for ASD's schools.

"I think any of all of those are pretty major accomplishments,"

For the next superintendent, whomever that may be, improving test scores is a goal for that individual, Schick noted.

"We have physical plant question marks that we need to address. I think to continue on a positive upslope manner in our whole school system," he said. "I don't know that we need anybody to come in and make any big, huge changes this way or that. Again, that's my opinion; maybe the rest of the board feels differently. But I like the general, positive, upward direction our school system is taking."

As the process begins to find Reed's replacement, Schick noted that there have not been any conversations on if the search for a new superintendent will start internally or externally.

Schick offered no comments on this particular search on behalf of ASD, but stated, "My personal feelings on replacing people is, I kind of like the idea of you bring people up through your farm system."

He added, "That being said, it doesn't hurt to go out and sign a big one every now and then, either."

Schick noted that he was aware of some individuals within ASD who might be interested in the superintendent position, but reiterated that no discussions have been held with these parties regarding the matter.

In an interview, BOE member Brooks Lindner commended Reed for announcing her retirement this far ahead of time so as to give the board time to do a search for her replacement.

The search for Reed's replacement will probably be a combination of both an internal and external search, Lindner explained, noting that the board will discuss the topic at its June 11 meeting.

Lindner explained he thinks it would "behoove" the district to look at outside candidates.

"I don't know of anyone within the district that has expressed the interest," Lindner said, acknowledging that the news is still fresh, adding, "I'm sure we will consider any in-house candidates as well as looking outside. In my mind that would be the best course of action."

The development of the district's strategic framework by Reed set ASD on an "intentional" path toward whole-student education, Lindner described.

"Which has now morphed into a focus on personalized learning," he added. "I would say the hiring that she's done at the admin level, the team that she's surrounded herself with, has been an accomplishment.'

Lindner also mentioned the MLO passing as an accomplishment for the district.

#### A time to reflect

In an email to The SUN, Reed explained that she is glad she is not retiring for another year so that she can complete some unfinished projects, but also to give the ASD board time to find her replacement.

When asked about her accomplishments as ASD superintendent, Reed also cited the MLO passing, writing that it verified to her that the district is doing good work and listened to what the community

"We took almost two years to work with stakeholders and to really dig in to what they thought we should do. At the end of the day, the work of so many dedicated people made all the difference and allowed us to pass the first significant tax increase for education in almost 20 years," she wrote.

Another accomplishment that was mentioned by Reed was how she was able to assemble a group of leaders comprising administrators, teachers and support staff.

Reed described these leaders as "incredibly talented.

"They are innovative, creative, and their first priority is to provide the best possible education for the children of this community," she

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

described further. "That can only happen when everyone believes in continuous improvement and strives to always do a better job, whether that's planning lessons, preparing meals for our students or driving a bus on a snowy day."

Reed went on to note that ASD is a strong fiscal organization, which she explained only happens when careful attention is paid to the financial side of the district.

Lastly, Reed explained that another accomplishment is the addition of differentiated options for students, citing examples such as advanced placement and career technical education classes.

Being a superintendent is not without its struggles, and for Reed, the problems came when ASD wanted to do more for its students but was limited by location and state funding challenges.

"I often read about some of the opportunities that students who live on the Front Range have, and I'm sad that we can't provide those for our kids," Reed wrote. "Access to concurrent enrollment, which allows high school students to earn college level credits while still in high school is so much easier when there are multiple community colleges near by.'

Reed praised PSHS for bridging that gap, but noted that it takes a lot of time and energy to do so.

As superintendent, Reed wrote that she has tried to lead by example and implement systems that will have ASD be recognized as a District of Distinction.

Additionally, Reed explained that she has tried to make sure that ASD staff receives recognition for their work through financial means and other ways.

In terms of how the search will go for a new superintendent, Reed is leaving that choice up to the ASD board.

Reflecting on her time as superintendent, Reed notes that she hopes that she changed the district for the better, adding that education is changing at such a rapid pace, and people can often be

intimidated by that sort of change. "I hope the change that I have instilled has honored the past but been done with a vision for the future of our children and our

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
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
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

# Chimney Rock: Experience a rare view into an ancient world this summer

Chimney Rock National Monument offers a rare view into an ancient world with daily tours and monthly programs that are fun and educational for the whole family. Walk in the footsteps of the fascinating and enigmatic ancestral Puebloans of the Chaco Canyon culture, following primitive pathways that haven't changed for 1,000 years. Archaeological ruins and artifacts, abundant wildlife, and its setting in the breathtaking San Juan National Forest make Chimney Rock a mustsee this summer.

This month, the awe-inspiring Full Moon Program takes place on Monday, June 17. The Full Moon Program occurs against the backdrop of the Great House Pueblo at the top of Chimney Rock Mesa. The program includes an informative lecture on topics specific to the Chimney Rock site. Then, guests watch the full moon rise to the live music of Charles Martinez' Native American flute. The program lasts approximately three hours including check-in, driving to the mesa top and hiking to the Great House Pueblo. There is a \$20 fee for attending or \$25 to attend the Full Moon Program with an early tour.

The first Geology Tour of the season will take place on Wednesday, June 19. This 1.5-hour guided tour only takes place twice a year and explores local geology and its relationship to the daily lives of the ancestral Puebloans who lived at Chimney Rock. No prior knowledge of geology is needed. The fee is \$16 for adults and \$8 for ages 5-12, and is considered a nonrefundable donation.

Welcome summer at Chimney Rock on June 21. Watch the sun rise over the San Juan Mountains this first and longest day of summer. With a 360-degree vantage point and the hush of early morning in the wilderness, the sunrise from the Great at The Choke Cherry Tree, Pagosa



#### VA and Virta Health partner in innovative approach to diabetes care

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced a partnership on May 13 with Virta Health to explore an innovative program focused on improving the health of persons with Type 2

In effect since March 22, the agreement will give 400 veterans the opportunity to participate in the Virta Treatment, which can help individuals safely and sustainably achieve glycemic control while reducing use of medications.

This diabetes care will be provided for up to one year at no cost to the VA or veteran participants.

"Partnering with community providers facilitates a more comprehensive approach to care," said VA Secretary Robert Wilkie. "Many veterans have Type 2 diabetes, and it is strongly linked to obesity, so we are excited to explore Virta Health's approach to tackling this debilitating and costly condition."

Currently, the VA offers medical care, education, counseling, weight-loss programs and blood glucose monitoring for more than 1.5 million veterans with Type 2 diabetes. This partnership provides a small group of veterans access to Virta's proprietary, individualized, low-carbohydrate nutrition protocols on a 24/7 continuous remote care platform from medical providers and health coaches, an approach currently not widely in

Virta Health, a licensed medical provider in all 50 states, focuses on treating Type 2 diabetes through noninvasive means. Its services, available 24/7, include personalized nutrition, peer support, health coaching and physician monitoring, all delivered remotely.

This partnership exemplifies the work of the Veterans Health Administration (VHA) Office of Community Engagement (OCE), which supports and develops community and corporate partnerships to benefit Veterans. 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#### Thingamajig's 'Ring of Fire' defies categorization

The iconic songs of American songwriter Johnny Cash provide the heart and soul of this summer's Thingamajig Theatre Company production "Ring of Fire" as part of its "Broadway in the Mountains" summer repertory season at the Pagosa Springs Center for the Arts.

The show is not a tribute concert and it doesn't attempt to present a direct dramatization of Cash's tumultuous life and career. The show lands somewhere between those extremes — somewhere that defies categorization into a genre, much like the music of Johnny Cash itself.

"Ring of Fire" is for all musical theater lovers — not just Cash fans.

Theater patron Cynda Green attended the sold-out opening night performance on May 17 not knowing what to expect: "I knew nothing about the show, other than it featured Johnny Cash songs that were never on my playlist. But between the prologue and 'A Boy Named Sue' encore, I became a Johnny Cash fan — not just a fan of his music, but of Johnny Cash the man who struggled to understand and overcome his troubled life. That's how powerful this production is.'

The 2006 Broadway "Ring of Fire," conceived by William Meade and created and directed by Richard Maltby Jr., has an interesting history. According to Meade, he was one of many who approached Johnny Cash with the idea of putting his music on stage. It took five years, but, finally, and shortly before Cash's death in 2003, Cash gave Meade stage rights to his material.

In turn, Meade asked Maltby Jr. (Tony awards for "Ain't Misbehavin'" and "Fosse") to become involved as creator and director.

Maltby Jr. said: "When Bill asked me to create a theatrical show out of the music of Johnny Cash, he gave me a stack of CDs and books about 2 feet high (and rising). I listened and read and began to think, and two things became immediately clear. First, we shouldn't attempt to put Johnny Cash himself on the stage. The persona, the voice, are unduplicatable and the very best we could achieve would be a poor imitation. Second, as interesting as Johnny Cash's life was, dramatizing it on the stage (it

seemed to me) would only lessen, not enhance, it.'

"Ring of Fire" was revamped by Maltby Jr. in 2013 with a "Ring of Fire" Small Cast Edition, featuring five musician/actors.

To quote Theatrical Rights Worldwide, "The new, streamlined song showcase features a cast of five actor/musicians. The remarkable story of Johnny Cash and his music is searing and arcs with an exhilarating concert experience that is unforgettable.'

The "Ring of Fire" Small Cast Edition is what Thingamajig brings to its stage, and it does, indeed, tell the story of Cash's life — through his music — in an intimate way that draws the audience into the performance.

"Director Christopher Willard made excellent choices in staging this production," Green said.

Musician/actors Nick Abbott, Rayshaughn Armant, Tommy Paduano, Steven Sitzman and Allie Tamburello play various characters through the years of Johnny Cash's life, including Cash and June Carter Cash.

"The cast's live instrumentals and vocal interpretations of Cash's songs were inspirational and seemed effortless. The song mix of comedy and drama played with the audience's emotions and kept us engaged — one moment laughing and the next silently mourning Cash's painful life as poured out in his lyrics," Green added.

"Ring of Fire" plays in repertory

throughout the summer at Pagosa Springs Center for the Arts along with four other "Broadway in the Mountains" musicals — "Mamma Mia!" (now playing), "The Who's Tommy," "Jekyll and Hyde, the Musical" and Disney's "Alice in Wonderland JR." 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



The need to find meaning, the need to understand, to make sense of our surrounding—this more thanany other trait distinguishes the human species from all others. Unitar $ian\,Universalists\,(UUs)\,have\,codified$ this need in our fourth principle - "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning" - one of the seven principles which we hold as strong values and moral guides. The ultimate quest for meaning asks questions about the universe. Where did it come from? How will it end? What is it made of? And what is this thing called life that dances on the surface of our planet? And does it dance elsewhere?

The Sunday's message is titled "My Universe Story," and we can expect our speaker, Dick White, to engage with this kind of questioning.

In his words, "Scientific understanding of the universe amplifies its wonder, without dispelling its deep mystery. How might we find meaning in the experience of the evolutionary moment we occupy in this vast unfolding?"

White is professor emeritus of astronomy at Smith College (MA), where he taught for 28 years. Taking early retirement in 2002 to pursue climate protection and sustainability, he moved to Durango in 2003. He served on the boards of several local sustainability organizations, including the Sustainability Alliance Southwest Colorado, for which he was the founding chair. After serving on the steering committee for the La Plata County Climate and Energy Action Plan and on the citizens working group for the county's (failed) comprehensive plan, in 2011, he ran successfully for the Durango City Council. He recently completed his two terms of city council service, during which he was mayor for a year in 2013-14 and again in 2017-18. He also has authored three book

chapters on the subject of global food insecurity.

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
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#### Traipsin', tradin' and explorin'

I've been writing about early explorers in Pagosa Country. One of the earliest of those risk-takers gives us a description of the Pagosa Hot Springs in its virgin state before settlers moved in and rearranged the countryside.

In 1859, Army Capt. John M. Macomb was given the chore of putting together a task force to explore and map a route connecting New Mexico with Utah and California. Macomb's endeavor had a two-fold purpose.

In the first place, a war, called the "Mormon War" by historians, threatened the peace between Mormon settlers in Utah and other frontiersmen wanting to live in or pass through what was to become the Beehive State. The Army needed a way, a fast way, maybe you could call it a war path, to reach the Salt Lake City area with troops in case people started shooting an unacceptable number of lethal holes in each other.

Secondly, the U.S. didn't know much about this part of the continent they had recently inherited. And so, Macomb, who was a topographical engineer, assembled a team of scientists and mapmakers, loaded up the pack mules, got his men settled into their horses' saddles, and left Santa Fe in June of 1859 clippity-clompin' north and west through northwestern New Mexico, southwestern Colorado, and parts of Utah and Arizona.

Macomb leaves us the following description of the Pagosa Hot Springs:

"In the upper part of this valley is the Pagosa, one of the



most remarkable hot springs on the continent, well known, even famous, among the Indian tribes, but up to the time of our visit never having been seen by the whites.

"It can scarcely be doubted that in future years it will become a place of celebrated resort, both for those who reside in the surrounding country and for wonderhunting health-seeking travelers from other lands."

Motter's note: This is an appropriate time to point out that in claiming to be the first white man to see the springs, Macomb was not historically accurate. Fur trappers had visited the springs regularly since the 1820s. In addition, others using the Old Spanish Trail starting with Rivera in 1765 undoubtedly saw the springs. Since a good number of the trappers were illiterate and knew they were trespassing, they left little in writing to draw attention to their whereabouts.

Nevertheless, we are indebted to Macomb because he left the first in-depth, scientific description of the hot springs, Among his crew were skilled draftsmen who left us illustrations of the spring and surrounding San Juan River Valley including Chimney Rock. His detailed description will be in next week's column.





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

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

The first clue that a house wren is nearby might be its melodious song or harsh, scolding call. This perky, sparrow-sized songbird is often seen with its tail held upright while darting about in brush close to the ground. Brown on its upper parts, lighter underneath, the house wren has dark and light barred markings on its tail, wings and sides. It has a thin, slightly curved bill and flattened head designed for reaching insects and spiders found in bark, twigs and foliage. Males and females

Its habitat includes open woodlands and forest edges. It appears to tolerate human activity well. Birds seen in our area have migrated from Mexico and the southern U.S. in early May. They begin their return migration in September at the end of their breeding season.

Unable to create their own cavities for nesting, house wrens use existing sites. The male builds multiple, simple nests of twigs and grass. He may use a crevice in a building, nest box or tree opening, sometimes taking over the nests of other cavity nesters. After the male attracts a mate with his insistent songs, the female chooses and completes one of the nests by adding a soft cup made of plant fibers, animal hair, feathers and sometimes spider egg sacs. When the spiders hatch, they help control mites and other nest parasites.

The current conservation status of house wrens appears to be stable. Their range includes much of the western hemisphere.

#### Financial protection for elders

I advocate for residents at Pine Ridge, a 24-hour extended care home, and BeeHive, an assisted living residence, as the part-time long-term care ombudsman for Archuleta County. Federal and state laws protect residents to promote quality of care and quality of life.

When talking to residents in both homes, often the subject of money comes up, especially the elder's concern about their bank accounts they had before they moved. In some cases, the family is managing these accounts, and it would be helpful to frequently remind their loved ones about what is happening or happened to their money and why.

Sometimes, elders have legitimate concerns about their money. According to the National Center on Law and Elder Rights, "Controlling access to money and resources is a

common way that abusers control their victims," and elders who have limited income may be particularly vulnerable because they lack surplus funds to start over or move. Victims of such abuse may then end up in a nursing home under Medicaid despite their preferred choices.

Pagosa community members often step in to try to help such vulnerable elders. In a May "Practice Tip" by Odette Williamson, the National Consumer Law Center offers advice on prioritizing debts and stopping harassment from debt collectors, understanding that Social Security and certain other retirement benefits are protected from garnishment, reporting unauthorized use of credit or debit cards, placing fraud alerts, protecting against utility shutoffs, and seeking restitution from abusers.

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
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
