

Pagosa Waters Building a Local Partnership

Imagine using geothermal energy to generate electricity locally.

"The Town of Pagosa Springs sits on one of the largest geothermal aquifers in Colorado," town manager David Mitchem asserts. "Current usage of the geothermal resource is limited to three bathing spas and winter heating for a small number of downtown businesses, homes and a school."

That may soon change.

Jerry Smith of Pagosa Verde, LLC, has formed an alliance with the Pagosa Springs Town Council and the Archuleta Board of County Commissioners to explore the feasibility of building a three- to 12-megawatt power plant south of town. "Many in our community have dedicated time to our geothermal heating and greenhouse partnerships," Mitchem says, "propelling both initiatives forward in a manner that has earned the respect and participation from our citizens and secured a positive relationship with the Governor's Energy Office's Geothermal Working Group. Jerry Smith of Pagosa Verde, LLC, is one of the people who have been actively advancing geothermal research in the Pagosa Springs area."

"What we're talking about," Smith adds, "is a strategy for carrying on the work that's been going on since 1980 — all the studies that have been done on Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County about our geothermal aquifer.

"Even the earliest one, Mr. Galloway's report in 1980, said there was

two hundred degree water at two thousand feet, and getting hotter going deeper. In 1980, if you didn't have three hundred or three hundred and fifty degrees you couldn't make power and two thousand feet was pretty deep. Most of the wells here in town are three hundred to seven hundred feet deep.

"The technology has come back to us. In 2007 we were able to make power at one hundred and sixty five degrees with water in Alaska. That has changed the whole ball game. I have been tracking that technology, hoping it would allow us to get to the point where we can really benefit our community."

A number of separate studies have been conducted in Pagosa Country recently in an attempt to figure out the size and capacity of the town's geothermal resource and to determine whether or not it would be safe to expand its use. Most notably, for the last two summers the town has played host to a team of faculty and grad students from the Colorado School of Mines Geophysics Department and the Imperial College London.

The results of these studies were enough to encourage Smith to take the next step and begin to secure funding for exploration.

"The difference between California, Oregon, New Mexico, Nevada and Idaho, where they already have a hundred and forty seven plants in operation," Smith explains, "is that in most of those areas you're lucky if you can find a desert tortoise.

"In Colorado, everywhere we have hot water and the likelihood of doing geothermal development, we also have some of the most beautiful and valuable real estate in the world, with some of the most intensive tourism attractions there is. We have wildlife habitat. We have big game migration patterns. We have all sorts of things that make it difficult to do a big power plant.

"If we want to receive the kind of economic boost, and create the jobs and save the money ... we need to have a model for development that accommodates all of those other things."

Smith refers to it as the Pagosa Verde model and explains how it works without damaging the aquifer or disturbing the environment.

"The Pagosa Verde model is different than what's been done before in that the new technology allows us to have almost an invisible plant. We're not extracting anything and harvesting it like we do with coal or timber or gold or any other type of mining. We simply bring the geothermal fluid up, take some heat off of it, and place it right back in the aquifer, very carefully."

Smith also describes the financial aspect of the Pagosa Verde model. By developing a public/private partnership with the town and the county, as well as securing grant funding from the U.S. Department of Energy and the State of Colorado, the economic benefit the project will bring to the local community remains much more impressive than if a Fortune 500 company had fronted the original capital.

MAKERS EVENT HIGHLIGHTS CREATIVE BUSINESSES, INDIVIDUALS

The second Pagosa MAKERS Expo and Tour happens Oct. 11-12, 2014, and is expected to be even bigger and better than last year.

The first Pagosa MAKERS Expo and Tour, in 2013, featured more than 90 local MAKERS who produce everything from growing domes and television programs to jewelry, soap, beer, bread, art, furniture, sculpture, ceramics, clothing, collage, guitars, hats, scarves, paintings and more. If it's made by hand and made in Pagosa, you can find it at the Pagosa MAKERS Expo and Tour over Columbus Day weekend.

The expo takes place at Pagosa Springs Center for the Arts and SHY RABBIT Contemporary Arts, and the tour happens at studios, homes, workshops and businesses in and around Pagosa Springs.

The Region 9 Economic Development District of Southwest Colorado, Inc. (Region 9 EDD) is a Colorado nonprofit community economic development corporation that promotes and coordinates economic development efforts throughout southwest Colorado.

Its board of directors is comprised of 26 members, 17 from local government jurisdictions and nine members that represent the private sector in the five-county area. Region 9 EDD serves the counties of Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata, Montezuma and San Juan, and the cities and towns within those regions, as well as the Southern Ute and the Ute Mountain Ute Indian tribes.

The mission of Region 9 EDD is to be a regional leader, working cooperatively with the private and public sectors to enhance the economic conditions in the area, and improve the region's economic prosperity.

Among many services, Region 9 EDD offers a revolving loan program for "gap" financing to assist small business retention, expansion and job creation. They also offer a micro-enterprise loan program for loans up to \$100,000 for qualifying small businesses with five or fewer employees.

In addition to their loan programs, Region 9 EDD administers the Southwest Enterprise Zone, a state tax credit program, provides administrative support to the Four Corners Film Office and the Southwest Regional Transportation Planning Commission, and helps to administer different state and federal programs. They also publish a variety of economic data reports including the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) to assist local communities with regional economic development strategic planning and technical assistance.

Region 9 EDD often partners with community organizations, governments and the private sector to assist in the development of special projects that result in job creation/retention and the economic expansion of the community or enterprise. Region 9 EDD is currently assisting with the Colorado Blueprint Economic Development Plan and Growth Company Initiative.

Emerging Growth Companies (EGCs) are critically important to southwest Colorado's economic development and diversification. Nationwide, these companies create about 75 percent of all new jobs, provide unique products or services and have growing national or international markets.

Most importantly, because of their need for highly skilled employees, EGCs provide higher-than-average wages. OPENING A BUSINESS IN THE TOWN OF PAGOSA SPRINGS

The Town of Pagosa Springs requires an annual business license for all businesses located and/or conducting business within the town's boundary. This includes special events, vendors, seasonal/temporary businesses, vacation rentals, retail and service businesses, building general and subcontractors, home-based, nonprofit entities, etc.

We recommend that you contact the town planning and building department at the beginning of your planning process and prior to determining a location for your business. There may be zoning restrictions and building code requirements for particular businesses that you should know about before you get too far along in your planning process, and certainly before you lease or purchase a property. This will help eliminate surprises and very costly oversights along the way.

In addition, a sign permit is required for all permanent and temporary signs (banners). Again, we recommend you contact the planning department prior to designing or manufacturing a sign to ensure you meet the town's code requirements and prevent any costly mistakes.

The town currently has an Economic Stimulus Sales Tax Rebate program in place that may provide benefits to your business. More information is available at Town Hall.



STEM INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Internship Program of Southwest Colorado seeks to contribute meaningful workforce development within the region. The program coordinates employment opportunities for high school students where they can learn STEM skills, establish relationships and gain professional expertise. The program connects businesses and students in Archuleta, La Plata and Montezuma counties and is a joint effort between Region 9 Economic Development District, La Plata County Economic Development Alliance, Alpine Bank and the Durango Discovery Museum.

Beginning in 2013, Jacob Manzanares, a senior with Pagosa Springs High School, was hired through the Internship Program at Growing Spaces.

"We love having him," reports Stacey L. Couch, creative media coordinator for Growing Spaces. "He is such a great individual."

Manzanares is involved with many aspects of the company including building bed designs for growing domes using 3D software, video

editing, website programming and hands-on manufacturing in the shop.

VICA (Vocational Industrial Clubs of America) was formed in 1965. Its purpose was to motivate students at the high school and collegiate levels to understand and value opportunities present in America's skilled workforce.

In 2004, VICA became Skills USA. In 2006, the Pagosa Springs High School Skills USA chapter was founded, and it continues to grow each year. Now, Skills USA includes more than 312,000 students nationally. The organization conducts state, national and global competitions that Pagosa Springs High School students regularly compete at.

At the high school here, students have access to subjects such as crime scene investigation, auto technology, auto refinishing, welding, motorcycle mechanics, computer programming, digital photography and web design. The program hopes to add TV/video production soon and has recently begun introducing firefighting.

Pagosa Springs High School funds the students' attendance for regional and state competitions, while students who qualify for national competitions must raise their own funds to attend. The Pagosa chapter has qualified for nationals multiple times in crime scene investigation (twice) and computer programming (three times), as well as in firefighting and digital photography.

Skills members volunteer at the 9Health Fair for setup and takedown of the event, as well as helping out with the local antique auto show. This provides students and community members a chance to get to know each other outside of the high school setting while raising money for incidental costs at events.

PRIVATE & HOMESCHOOL EDUCATION OPTIONS

While Archuleta School District 50 JT offers excellent educational opportunities, some people relocating to Pagosa wish to enroll their children in a private school or would like to homeschool their children. Pagosa Springs offers several private educational options.

GOAL Academy is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education, serving ages 14-21, with an academic coach-to-student ratio of 1:30. GOAL Academy maintains a blended learning format with online courses and drop-in centers with individuals to help with any questions or problems, and works on a block structure for student/academic accountability. GOAL Academy adheres to all State of Colorado Common Core Learning Standards. The curriculum is prescriptive, so it allows students to work at their pace. Visit online at www.goalac.org or go to the Pagosa Springs site at 100 Country Center Drive, Ste. L to apply. Students will graduate with life skills, post-secondary and workforce readiness, assuring they will become productive members of society.

Our Savior Lutheran School: This early childhood pre-school offers a curriculum in which every discipline is taught from the Christian world view. The school is now 22 years old, but its facilities are modern, being located on three acres, complete with six self-contained classrooms, a gymnasium and a playground area. There is no testing required for the pre-school; however, children are expected to adhere to behavior that is respectful to teachers and fellow students. Information is located at www.oslcpagosa.org.

Homeschooling: An estimated 50-plus families homeschool their children in and around Pagosa Springs. Pagosa Valor Academy, for example, is a primary education school for first through sixth grade. It combines the best traits of home education with the best traits of public school education. It is a family-oriented school whose core purpose is teaching kids from a biblical perspective while preparing college-ready young adults.

Some homeschooling options follow the traditional school schedule, while others work year-round, offering a diversified schedule based on chores at home, jobs, training, vacation schedules and other variables. Families interested in homeschooling need to register their intent with the Archuleta School District 14 days before homeschooling and every school year. EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Seeds of Learning

Seeds of Learning, a NAEYC-accredited early care and education center 501(c)(3) organization in Archuleta County, is a quality early childhood education facility serving preschool and toddler-aged children from 18 months to 5 years old. The center encompasses early education, childcare, parenting classes and staff in-services. Seeds of Learning is the only early care and education center in Archuleta County serving toddlers.

The center piloted and currently provides the Incredible Years Program, which brings children, their parents and their teachers together in a proven prevention strategy that has been shown to reduce child behavior problems, promote positive discipline and improve school performance. They are also contracted by the Archuleta County School District to implement the Colorado Preschool Program, which serves children in need of language development and helps reduce the risk of school failure by providing support through early childhood education.

Seeds of Learning provides a hot lunch every day, along with breakfast and afternoon snack. Tuition is offered on a sliding scale.

Seeds of Learning classes continue to remain at attendance capacity most of the year. The center is located close to the downtown area and provides an educational, nurturing environment for children and parents.

The Tri-County Head Start program is a federally funded early childhood program servicing low-income guideline families in Archuleta, La Plata and Montezuma counties. Head Start works with children from 3-5

years old, providing activities for the children to help them grow mentally, emotionally, physically and socially. Head Start also works with children with special needs. Head Start is the only other facility in Archuleta County besides Seeds of Learning that offers the Colorado Preschool Program serving children who are in need of language development and are at risk of school failure unless they receive support offered by early childhood education services. The school is located close to the downtown area. You can check out the Head Start website at www.tchs4c.org.

Private Schools and Day Care

THE UMBRELLA OF PUEBLO COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Learning technical skills, achieving a higher level of education and earning an associates degree and/or technical training certificate is a very real possibility while living in Pagosa Springs.

What once was a smattering of vocational, technical and online studies has now been gathered under the umbrella of Pueblo Community College.

Based in Pueblo, Colo., PCC has been offering community outreach education and training programs in the area for over 30 years. In 2008, PCC and the San Juan Basin Technical College in Mancos, Colo., entered into an educational partnership to broaden

the number of educational programs offered in the region. In 2009, former Colorado Governor Bill Ritter signed into law legislation that officially merged PCC's southwest campus and SJBTC into one entity — the Southwest Colorado Community College.

SCCC, a comprehensive two-year college, now operates as a division of Pueblo Community College and has two campuses. The "west campus" is located in Mancos where the former SJBTC was housed. The "east campus" is located in Durango at The Commons Building.

The SCCC operates its two campuses with the aid of a regional advisory board with representatives from local counties, including Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata and Montezuma. The diverse regional representation assists SCCC in highlighting the needs of local communities, such as workforce demands and education interests

Courses can be taken on campus or online and all classes are accredited by the Higher Learning Commission. Efforts are also being made to broaden the accessibility of classes through Archuleta School District 50 JT. CONTINUING EDUCATION: FORT LEWIS COLLEGE & ADAMS STATE UNIVERSITY

Pagosa Springs is situated between the sites of two higher learning establishments: Fort Lewis College in Durango and Adams State University in Alamosa.

Fort Lewis College

Serving southwest Colorado for over 100 years, Fort Lewis College is a selective, public liberal arts college located approximately 60 miles west of Pagosa Springs in Durango, Colo. Smaller classes (19:1 ratio of students to faculty) is a hallmark for FLC. There is a diversity of studies offered, with specially accredited programs in accounting, athletic training, business administration, chemistry, education, engineering-physics and music. With over 70 student organizations, including NCAA Division II sports, Fort Lewis prides itself in not only community activities, but national and international activities through their Study Abroad and Getting Outdoors programs. Fort Lewis College

also offers internships, service learning and undergraduate research programs.

Voted No. 30 among the top 40 College Towns by Outside Magazine, Durango marries the educational requirements with the accessibility of the natural playground in which it is located. Students have the option of living on campus or selecting housing usually located very close to the campus and easily accessible by the "T" bus system or biking. Travel to FLC from Pagosa Springs is just an hour. Persons interested in pursuing an education through Fort Lewis College should check out the school at www.fortlewis.edu.

Adams State University

Adams State University is located in Alamosa, Colo., approximately 90 miles east of Pagosa Springs. ASU is a comprehensive institution offering bachelor degrees in 16 majors, nearly 30 minors and graduate degrees in a variety of

subjects including art, business, counseling education and physical education. Similar to Fort Lewis, Adams State focuses on small class sizes, usually with 20 students or fewer per instructor. Adams State is also part of the NCAA Division II and Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, and has won a number of national championship team titles and individual All America honors. Adams State has over 40 student organizations and specializes in outdoor programs.

Adams State also offers extended studies or distance learning undergraduate programs, which are accredited by the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Adams State is continuously voted one of the 100 Best College Buys, offering excellent and challenging studies in a small college environment. SCHOOLS OFFER MULTITUDE OF REASONS FOR <u>LIVING IN PAGOSA</u>

For families with children who are interested in moving to Pagosa Springs, there are a multitude of reasons, many of them found in our schools. Our teachers are all highly qualified and most of them hold masters degrees. Our district mission statement embodies what we believe is important. "The mission of the Archuleta School District 50 JT is to empower students to achieve personal and academic success in a safe and appropriate learning environment while providing them with the tools to effectively navigate in the 21st century." Our school board's core values are Accountability, Communication and Transparency (ACT) and their goals are Student Achievement, Organizational Effectiveness and Community Relationships.

In addition to an outstanding academic program, our schools offer many co-curricular activities for students of all ages. At the elementary level, there are arts activities and opportunities for students to engage in snowshoeing during winter as part of their physical education program. Middle school students ski at Wolf Creek, also as part of their physical education program. Seventh-graders make a spring overnight trip to Bandelier National Monument, where they engage in nature hikes, ecosystem studies, geology studies, study of ancient cultures, swimming and viewing the Los Alamos Museum. Archuleta School District 50 Joint was created in 1950 and consists of three school campuses: Pagosa Springs Elementary School (kindergarten through fourth grade); Pagosa Springs Middle School (fifth and sixth grades are in one building with the seventh and eighth grades in another building); and Pagosa Springs High School (ninth through 12th grades). Extra-curricular activities are offered throughout all buildings and athletics are offered from seventh to 12th grade.

The district works collaboratively with Pueblo Community College and San Juan BOCES to provide on-line courses. Head Start and Seeds of Learning work hand in hand with the district through the Colorado Preschool Program, which also offers assistance to at-risk preschool students. Stay Healthy With Pagosa Springs Medical Center

Pagosa Springs Medical Center (PSMC), a Level IV Trauma Center, has been providing superior healthcare to the area since 2008. Community residents and visitors have access to quality hospital services, a primary care clinic, EMS and telemedicine services, a women's health program, surgery including orthopedics and ER — all within minutes of their homes. PSMC also focuses heavily on promoting healthy lifestyles through community education, such as its DocTalk series.

CEO Brad Cochennet writes, "From its physician-staffed 24/7 ER to the on-site Wellness Center, the Pagosa Springs Medical Center is committed to improving healthcare access and availability for Pagosa Springs and the region." The Wellness Center mentioned by Cochennet serves the community in collaboration with The Mayo Clinic. The Wellness Center provides educational classes on nutrition and fitness, health information and methods on how to live a healthy lifestyle. Classes are centered around incorporating physical activity, eating a balanced and nutritional diet, stress management techniques and other lifestyle elements.

The Wellness Center also provides free heart health checks to members of the community, giving them tools to make specific, beneficial changes in their lifestyles. Patients who go through the heart health screening are also connected with providers and follow-up services when required.

Pagosa residents can also become members of the Wellness Center. Joining the center comes with benefits at local gyms, fitness studios and businesses, free aerobics classes and more.

When it comes to integrated health, PSMC goes above and beyond to bring you the best care possible. For people who have experienced cardiovascular trauma and need more specialized attention than local physicians might be able to provide, especially in the case of stroke, PSMC has telemedicine capabilities. Telemedicine allows Pagosa area patients to be connected in real time with the best doctors available all over the country.

PSMC, in collaboration with the Wellness Center, is also in the process of launching a paramedic community outreach program designed to help patients transition from the hospital back to their normal lives. The outreach program will bring primary care physicians into patients' homes using remote access technology, thereby providing comprehensive care where patients are most comfortable and at ease.

For patients in need of emergency services, PSMC continues to expand. According to Claire Bradshaw, director of PSMC marketing and development, "The center's EMS team has upgraded to a critical care paramedic level of trauma care, which means life-saving care happens on route to the emergency room, saving lives when minutes count."

PSMC's Primary Care Clinic offers same-day appointment availability and is able to see patients for acute to urgent care needs. The clinic is dedicated to keeping the community healthy, offering free cholesterol screenings with counseling and follow-up services. The clinic also offers low cost, self-ordered lab testing.

The center's Diagnostic Imaging Department has state-of-thescience equipment, including a GE 28 Re-Con 128-slice CT. The department also boasts ultrasound, digital radiography, a portable x-ray machine and digital mammography capabilities.

PSMC offers both inpatient and outpatient services, with an 11-bed inpatient care unit. The center takes prides in its ability to provide unparalleled customer service due to its small size and dedicated staff. The center also offers 24/7 emergency lab services, with the majority of tests performed on-site.

Surgical capabilities at PSMC include breast ductectomy, lumpectomy and mastectomy; excision of lymph nodes, abscesses, cysts and moles; skin grafts; laceration repair and colonoscopy.

New to the center is a world-class orthopedic surgery program led by Dr. William Webb. The program offers total joint, hip and knee replacements, as well as treatment and surgery on shoulders, elbows and hands.


A comprehensive aquatic wellness program with therapeutic water exercises is offered for adults with chronic health conditions or healthy individuals who just wish to improve their fitness level.

BUILDING AND REAL ESTATE BEYOND THE UPWARD TREND

It's no secret that Archuleta County, like much of the country, fell on hard times when the recession hit. The rate at which new homes popped up throughout the county slowed, and many homes began sporting "For Sale" signs in their yards.

And it seems the upswing in the building and real estate sectors that began bubbling to the surface in Pagosa Country last year remains, with several promising signs.

Over the last year, new homes have been built, with more on the way. Handfuls of homes can be seen in various stages of completion as you drive throughout the county. Building permits for new homes are on par with 2013, which was the best year since 2007.

Property sales continue to see an upward swing, as well, up 10 percent over 2013 through the early portion of 2014. The same was true last year, with home sales up over 2012. The majority of those properties sold and put under contract are residential.

Outside of new homes and those that are finding new owners, property owners are also pulling more permits for things such as decks and garages, increasing the value of their homes.

The vacant land market has also picked up, with prices far below what they were in peak times — making now an appetizing time to find prime real estate to build your dream home.

But the upward trend in Pagosa Country doesn't end with the what's for sale or what other people are doing. It also includes the people helping to make it happen.

For example, Archuleta County often meets with a committee of the area's prominent and dedicated builders to discuss issues facing the building community and how to solve them.

The committee is also very involved any time the county is faced with adopting updated building and fire codes, with several reading hundreds of pages line by line to see what works for Archuleta County.

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



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THE GEOTHERMAL GREENHOUSE PARTNERSHIP

Here in southwest Colorado, the earth's heat exists close to the surface, so Pagosa Country enjoys a resource unavailable to much of the world — geothermal energy — and a group of local visionaries has become committed to leading Colorado and the rest of the United States, and perhaps the rest of the world, in responsibly stewarding such natural resources while creatively stimulating local economies.

The Geothermal Greenhouse Partnership, a Pagosa Springs nonprofit organization, was formed in January 2009 to harness renewable solar and geothermal energy for growing safe, affordable food for local people.

Utilizing land and geothermal water provided by the town, the GGP's vision is to take a section of the Riverwalk area in Centennial Park behind the county courthouse and across the San Juan River from The Springs Resort and create a center of renewable energy and agriculture. The plan is to construct three geodesic greenhouse domes, 51 feet in diameter, each with its own purpose — educational, commercial and communal.

First, the GGP facility will become a center for K-12 interdisciplinary education and advanced study in agriculture and renewable technology. A relationship has already been developed with the local school district, the Colorado State University Extension Office and the Dean of Agricultural Science from the University of Colorado.

The second part of the GGP's mission is to provide a test site for year-round organic crop cultivation at high altitude using renewable energy. As a business incubator, the second greenhouse dome will show what can be done. For a small commercial entity, limited by the fact that it is now outdoors, expanding to a dome would mean year-round production.

The third part of the GGP mission is to provide affordable, organic, locally grown food for individuals and businesses, along with providing year-round community gardens for the citizens of Pagosa Springs.

"This is a good concept," former Pagosa Springs Mayor Ross Aragon said, "because it is a natural resource and green is in. The theme of the GGP is green."

The GGP project, which will be highly visible from U.S. 160, will be quite a tourist attraction. Imagine having bananas, papayas and a variety of exotic fruits and vegetables growing in the middle of the Colorado Rockies, at this altitude, and in the coldest part of the winter.

With geothermal energy you can do all sorts of things.



CREATING NEW AMENITIES EXCITING RECENT PROJECTS FROM PAGOSA SPRINGS PARKS & REC

The employees of the Pagosa Springs Parks and Recreation department take great personal pride in their stewardship of the town's facilities and amenities, and are always willing to take the time to bend your ear when it comes to bragging about what they have to offer to tourists and residents alike.

Jim Miller, the town's superintendent of parks, says he thinks of each tree, bush and flower as one of his own children, having lovingly planted, protected and nurtured most of them himself. He also keeps a watchful eye on every picnic table, park bench and public restroom to make sure they are clean, safe and ready to use.

The parks of Pagosa Springs run the gamut from the wild and natural pine forest on Reservoir Hill to the well-manicured fields of Yamaguchi Park, and many of them have seen significant recent additions and improvements.

The most prominent physical feature of the downtown area, Res-

ervoir Hill, towers over the south bank of the San Juan River and is distinguished by the large green water tank visible from U.S. 160.

The park is accessible from three trailheads — located across the highway from the River Center, behind the Healing Waters Spa, and next to the U.S. Post Office — and offers miles of hiking and biking trails ranging from gentle and peaceful to steep and technical. Look for a new trail sign system that will include names and difficulty levels.

Reservoir Hill is also home to one of the best disc golf courses in the region, featuring 18 baskets, 18 regular tee boxes, and 18 recently installed alternative tee boxes for those experts looking for a bit more challenging game.

Near the top of the disc golf course is a large meadow, the home to two of Pagosa's largest musical events: The Folk 'N Bluegrass event takes place in early June and the Four Corners Folk Festival over Labor Day weekend. Thanks to a generous local benefactor, the town recently installed a beautiful log gazebo, nearly 40 by 40 feet in size,



which will be available to rent for special occasions such as weddings or reunions.

Follow the trail beyond the festival meadow and a hiker will eventually reach the high point, where a grassroots organization known as the Friends of Reservoir Hill plans to build an observation platform. The structure will provide a destination for hikers, shelter in times of inclement weather, a place to relax and reflect on the natural beauty of the surroundings, and will also include educational displays describing the history, geography, geology and ecology of the surrounding area.

While there currently are no permanent restrooms on Reservoir Hill, there are plans to install such facilities soon, and while Reservoir Hill may be the most prominent downtown park, it isn't the only one seeing new improvements.

Located on South 5th Street between Pagosa Springs High School and the river, Yamaguchi Park is home to the 4,500 square-foot Pagosa Skate Park, which was designed to appeal to skaters of all ability levels and includes several plaza elements and a bowl feature. Adjacent land has been set aside to allow for further expansion (a larger, deeper bowl), and local fundraising and planning efforts are ongoing. Look for the second phase of the park coming soon.

The park is open from dawn to dusk throughout the year, provided the skating surface is free of ice and snow in the winter months. To learn more about the skate park, or to find out when the annual skater competition and fundraiser will take place, visit www.skaterscoalitonforconcrete.com.

A heated year-round restroom, drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills and picnic shelter allow for family gatherings, while a state-of-the-art playground and beautiful soccer and softball fields give plenty of room for the kids to play. A special events and performance venue with electrical service is also available.

Another amenity of Yamaguchi Park is the kayak/raft launching facility and speaking of the San Juan River, Pagosa recently completed

a number of improvement projects, including a Fishing Is Fun grant project and the installation of two more whitewater features. The two new river features include a new wave feature at the south end of Yamaguchi Park and a new wave feature just west of Town Hall. These features are enjoyed by rafters, kayakers and tubers.

The Fishing Is Fun grant included aquatic habitat improvements along a 1-mile stretch of the San Juan River between the River Center Park and Centennial Park. The aquatic habitat improvements will promote healthy fish populations for anglers' fishing enjoyment.

A true neighborhood park located on the south side of town on Apache Street between 7th and 8th streets, South Pagosa Park has bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a picnic shelter, a playground and a basketball court. Perhaps the best feature of the park, however, is the series of high-quality horseshoe pits, well used by those who enjoy pitching a ringer or two.

The future home of three geodesic domes that will house the Geothermal Greenhouse Project, Centennial Park stretches along the river behind the Archuleta County Courthouse and includes a section of the Riverwalk, a gazebo and several tables for enjoying a nice family picnic while watching the activities in the river and the hot springs beyond.

On the southeast corner of the U.S. 160/Hot Springs Boulevard intersection, Town Park connects to Centennial Park via the Riverwalk and contains bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a playground, two special event-200-amp electrical services, a performance space and stage, and a white-water feature in the adjacent river.

The park hosts several events throughout the year, as does the athletic field across Hermosa Street, including the Fourth of July Arts and Crafts Fair, Colorfest and the Mountain Chile Cha Cha. The athletic field, where the annual Fourth of July carnival is held, also contains a baseball diamond and is frequented by the Pagosa Springs Middle School PE classes.

HOME TO OUTDOOR ENTHUSIASTS

Pagosa Springs has the privilege of enjoying four distinct seasons, each one playing host to myriad activities. Participating in outdoor activities is like being a kid in a candy store, with appealing options no matter the season. Groups like the San Juan Outdoor Club and Gray Wolves offer activities all year long in a group setting. Face a challenging hike up Pagosa Peak or head out on a hut-to-hut excursion with like-minded enthusiasts and capitalize on the over 3 million acres of national forest and wilderness areas surrounding Pagosa.

When the days begin to warm up, resident activities exemplify the phrase "spring fever." Walking around town or taking a quick trip up Reservoir Hill on your lunch hour gets everyone in the mood for summer. As the snow begins to melt and the river rises, kayak and rafting enthusiasts hit the river. The San Juan River boasts several developed water features downtown along the Town Park and Yamaguchi Park areas, including "the wave" that was built in 2009. There is also improved fishing access and ongoing habitat improvements along the river through town. Fish are plentiful in Pagosa waters, with species including catfish, bass, pike and a variety of trout. Hikes in the lower elevations, perhaps around the Piedra River Trail, are a great way to break in the season and relish the beauty of the first signs of spring. Usually by April cyclists abound, enjoying moderate rides together to get in shape for the season. The Turkey Springs trail system was recently improved, with plans to expand and improve other biking trails in the area soon. Spring also brings out birding enthusiasts who tag and identify which species have returned to beautiful Pagosa.

Summer brings out the athlete in us all with warm days, cool nights and typically excellent weather conditions. Summer is perfect for just about every sport, especially hiking, mountain and road biking, and running.

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Summer also means motorcycle rides, offroading and camping in gorgeous locations. Pagosa Springs boasts a wonderful 27-hole golf course, two 18-hole disc golf courses located on Reservoir Hill and at Cloman Community Park and one nine-hole disc golf course in Aspen Springs. Boaters enjoy cruising on Navajo Lake, which spans the Colorado and New Mexico border. Horse enthusiasts head to the Western Heritage Event Center to compete in team roping and rodeo events.

Many of the activities of summer continue into the fall. Athletes get to enjoy the stunning hues of changing leaves as they add another layer of clothing in the evenings. The temperate weather mixed with the gorgeous colors is just another incentive to get out and enjoy the outdoors.

Winter is just as active the other seasons. For the alpine skier, Wolf Creek Ski Area is just 24 miles away and is known for its radical powder days. The volunteer Nordic Club has developed and grooms an extensive system of trails for classic and skate skiing. Enjoy one of their monthly Sunset/Moonrise free ski socials at various locations around the area. Snowed-over hiking trails become excellent snowshoeing trails in the winter. If you feel the need for speed, the Wolf Creek Trailblazers snowmobile club is out and about enjoying the hundreds of miles in the backcountry. Consider taking a dog sled ride, ice-skating on the frozen pond behind the River Center or checking out the plethora of sledding hills in the area.

Pagosa has outdoor activities to enjoy all year long! It is no wonder that so many people choose to live in this stunning mountain town overflowing with natural wonders for individuals of all ages and abilities. Explore on your own or join up with one of the many organizations that will happily show you the ropes and introduce you to the wonders of Pagosa's outdoors.

The Pagosa Nordic Club strives to enhance winter recreational opportunities by maintaining and grooming winter trails for cross-country and skate skiing and snowshoeing enjoyment for all ability levels. Throughout the winter months, the club holds free Moonrise/Sunset Ski Socials at various groomed trails. You can find out more about this group at www.pagosanordic.com.

The Wolf Creek Trailblazers Snowmobile Club grooms forest service trails for use by snowmobilers, cross-country skiers and snowshoers. They have active outings throughout the winter and also typically meet the second Tuesday of every month September through March. The purpose of the club is to have a great time riding snowmobiles while operating an active trail-grooming effort.

The Pagosa Area Trails Council is an all-volunteer organization dedicated to planning, building and maintaining trails and trailrelated facilities around Pagosa Springs. The Weminuche Audubon Society programs provide opportunities for visitors and residents to explore our local environment through bird walks, nature and science presentations, and collaborations with other outdoor and nature-based organizations. The senior center has an array of activities and services for the young at heart and supportive services for those in need of more assistance.

The center offers delicious lunches, including a fabulous salad bar, on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Monthly menus are posted online, with weekly menus displayed in The SUN newspaper. Seniors interested in dining at the center can make reservations by calling 264-2167. Seniors may also set up a standing reservation to eliminate the need to call each week. Home delivered meals are available to qualifying homebound individuals.

The Senior Center offers transportation and ride vouchers which can assist seniors in getting to medical appointments, attending lunches, going to the post office, pharmacy, grocery store and other necessary errands. Arranging transportation can be completed by contacting the Senior Center office.

Additionally, the Senior Center offers a wide range of supportive informational and referral services. Services include Medicare counseling, AARP safety driving classes, legal assistance and Alzheimer's support programs, to name a few.

RELOCATING YOUR **ANIMALS**

Moving to a new town with your pets can be an exciting adventure with many new discoveries. It can also be a bit stressful for you and your pets leaving behind the familiar. Before moving, it is important to know any information dealing with pet regulations.

Before you move, make sure that your pets are healthy and up to date on their vaccinations. If you are moving from out of state with dogs or cats, Colorado requires that you have a certificate of veterinarian inspection that is no more than 30 days old. If your cat or dog is 3 months or older, they must also have had a rabies vaccination within the preceding 12 months. For livestock requirements, visit the Colorado Department of Agriculture website (www.colorado.gov/ag).

Part of moving involves gathering all your important personal documents. Make sure you do the same for your pets. Have all of their health and vaccination records on hand so that when you choose a local veterinarian, you can provide your new vet with your pets' medical histories.

There are many Internet sources of information available on how to safely move your pets, as well as great tips on how to help your dogs or cats acclimate to their new home. A site that offers a good overview of both is www.healthypet.com. This website provides moving guides, a trip planner to help locate nearby veterinarians in case of an unforeseen emergency, travel information and relocation information.

Losing a pet can be nerve-wracking. The Humane Society of Pagosa Springs (HSPS) operates the only animal shelter in the area, located at 465 Cloman Blvd. The shelter is open seven days a week. A call to the animal shelter, (970) 731-4771, should be one of your first steps in finding a lost pet.

The HSPS website (www.humanesociety.biz) hosts detailed information on what to do if you and your pet become separated. The website also has information on adoptions, spay/neuter voucher programs and other services. The HSPS offers low-cost spay and neuter programs.

To aid in finding a lost pet, make sure that your pet has a secure collar with a sturdy identification tag attached. The ID tag should contain your name and contact information, including information on rabies vaccination. If you are moving, make sure the tag has your current cell phone number. Secondly, have a microchip inserted in your pet. This aids identification if your pet's collar is lost or removed. The Humane Society animal shelter scans every incoming pet for a microchip. If the chip number is not in the shelter's database, the shelter will contact the chip manufacturer for more information, so make sure you have registered your animal's chip and updated your contact information with the chip company.

If your pet does not have a microchip, the HSPS can provide you one at low cost. If your pet already has a microchip, it would be a good idea to stop by the shelter and provide the staff with the chip number and your updated contact information.

Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County do not require licensing for dogs or cats at this time. You are, however, required to have a current rabies vaccination for your pets. While Archuleta County does not have a leash law, Pagosa Springs does. You are required to have your dog under control at all times. If you want to exercise and play with your dog in a safe, controlled environment, there is a community-accessible dog park at the animal shelter.

If you are purchasing property in Pagosa Country, make sure you check for additional pet regulations or restrictions in the covenants of your property owners association. Keep in mind, too, that regardless of where you live, some homeowner insurance policies have certain dog breed exclusions, so check your insurance policy for pet restrictions.

Pagosa Springs is one of the most animal-friendly places that you will find in Colorado.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

In addition to the wondrous beauty, plentiful wildlife and an active outdoor lifestyle that you will enjoy in Pagosa Springs, there are tremendous opportunities for enriching your life by volunteering in the community. No matter what your level of involvement has been in the past, you will find wonderful ways to share your interests, talents and abilities.

Pagosa Springs has traditional civic clubs, churches and organizations that you will find in almost every community. There are two Rotary clubs and a Kiwanis club that are very active. The churches and nonprofit community have a wide variety of projects and activities year-round. Loaves and Fishes provides a free hot meal every Thursday with different organizations adopting a week of service. Habitat for Humanity builds and renovates homes using both local and national volunteers.

There are also multiple organizations supporting Pagosa's youth. Big Brothers Big Sisters provides mentors for boys and girls who need an active role model. GECKO (Giving Every Child Knowledge of the Outdoors) promotes getting off the couch and getting outside and provides scholarships for youth outdoor education. The Pagosa Springs Youth Center provides a safe and drug-free haven for teen-age youth and an affordable summer program. 4-H, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts help keep our youth involved in positive activities, including the yearly Archuleta County Fair.

For our veterans or active military, there is the Veterans Helping Veterans and the American Legion Post 108, which also hosts bingo twice a month. The Democratic Central Committee and the Republican Women meet regularly and are involved in community affairs.

We also have many volunteer opportunities unique to our area. If you

like outdoor activities, you can volunteer with clubs like the San Juan Outdoor Club, the Nordic Club, the Gray Wolves Ski Club or the Back Country Horsemen. If you have a love of history, you can be a guide with the Chimney Rock Interpretive Association for the Chimney Rock National Monument, volunteer with the San Juan Historical Society or be a guide at the Fred Harman Art Museum. If you love animals, you can be a volunteer at the Humane Society Shelter or Thrift Store, or become a foster parent with the Pagosa Animal Advocates or LASSO horse rescue.

In addition to paid professional staff, the Pagosa Fire Protection District relies heavily on volunteer firefighters. The San Juan Mounted Patrol assists with numerous community events and emergencies, as does the Sheriff's Volunteer Patrol. To help people who need assistance in our backcountry or with emergencies, we have the Upper San Juan Search and Rescue, the Mounted Search and the Incident Management Group. If the arts are your passion, we have Friends of the Library, Curtains Up Pagosa!, the Thingamajig Theatre, Pagosa Makers, Pagosa Community Choir and the Pagosa Springs Community Band. There is a garden club, quilting club, archeology club, bridge clubs and homemakers club. The Audubon Society has an active presence, as do the League of Women Voters, the Red Hat Society and several other women's groups.

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V<u>oter</u> and V<u>ehicle</u> Registration

Motor vehicles

In making your transition from another state to Colorado or from another Colorado county, we would like to help in making the registration of your vehicle as easy as possible.

Colorado law requires you to register your vehicles, trailers, motor homes, heavy equipment, etc. within 30 days of becoming a Colorado resident. Unfortunately, the law does not allow you to "run" on your out-of-state plates until they expire.

If you are currently a Colorado resident and are just moving here, you may call the county clerk's office and they will help you change your registration address so you will receive a renewal notice from Archuleta County when your plates expire.

Some of the most obvious reasons that, by law, constitute becoming a resident are: obtaining a Colorado driver's license, registering to vote, enrolling children into school or becoming employed. If you are retired and consider this your legal place of residence and intend to file your federal income tax with a Pagosa Springs address as your legal address, you need Colorado plates.

To obtain Colorado license plates, you will need:

1. A current registration or title from the state you are coming from.

2. Proof of Insurance (does not need to be Colorado).

3. A vehicle identification verification done by any law enforcement officer. The sheriff's office is located in the courthouse (west end of the building) and charges \$10 for this service.

4. An acceptable form of ID.

Vehicle registration in Colorado is based on the year, weight and taxable value of the vehicle, when new. The taxable value is then depreciated according to the age of the vehicle. The office is located at 449 San Juan St., in the east side of the courthouse.

The nearest place to obtain a Colorado driver's license is Durango, approximately 60 miles west of Pagosa Springs. The DMV is located at 305 S. Camino del Rio. You may contact their office at (970) 247-4591.
