Members of our community are actively involved in many volunteer, leadership and business ventures.


Whether a home-based business or a growth company, Pagosa Springs has the resources available to help businesses succeed.

# Retail sales: Pagosa Springs far exceeds Colorado towns of similar size

#### Region 9 Economic Development District report

The Pagosa Springs community is showing itself to be a regional shopping and tourist center based on the retail data released by the Region 9 Economic Development District of Southwest Colorado (Region 9).

As a State Data Center Affiliate, Region 9 has updated Retail Data for each of the five southwest Colorado counties since the year 2000. These reports measure how each community's retail sales compare to other communities of similar size across the state.

"Bayfield and Pagosa Springs and Durango in particular are showing significant retail sales and compare positively to other communities their size," said Laura Lewis Marchino, executive director of Region 9. "Cortez and Ignacio are also trending well." In 2015, as in preceding years, actual sales in Pagosa Springs far exceeded expected sales (a whopping 542%).

One reason is the town serves the larger population in the unincorporated areas, as well as seasonal visitors and second-homeowners.

Pagosa Springs also serves the larger region, including portions of the San Luis Valley, northwestern New Mexico and the nearby Jicarilla Apache Reservation.

The data is determined by looking at estimates of the sales level a town would achieve if it were performing on par with Colorado towns of similar size. It includes the population, state per capita sales, the index of income and the median pull factor. The median pull factor for medium sized towns in this analysis (population 1,000 to 5,000) is 0.82; the pull factor for Pagosa Springs is 3.95.

This report also looks at retail trade sectors to determine whether sectors such as food/beverage or health care products as examples, are drawing in shoppers for these items from outside of the area, or showing leakage (purchases of these goods are being made outside of the county). By looking at trends over time (2003, 2005, 2011 and 2015) several sectors (including motor vehicles and parts, furniture, electronics and appliances, and clothing), are consistently not meeting their potential. However sales of these items, with the exception of motor vehicles, are likely occurring in the Walmart Supercenter and other general merchandisers and cannot be calcu-

Pagosa Springs benefits from tourism as seen through gas stations, food services and lodging sales. Non-store outlets (catalog and Internet sales) are also doing exceedingly well, providing goods or services way beyond what might be expected from local demand.

A closer look at retail trade sectors can identify opportunities for new businesses or expansion of existing businesses. 

### Creating access to capital & entrepreneurial infrastructure

The Region 9 Economic Development District of Southwest Colorado, Inc. (Region 9 EDD) is a nonprofit economic development organization that promotes and coordinates economic development efforts throughout southwest Colorado.

Its mission is to work cooperatively with the private and public sectors to enhance the economic conditions in the area, and improve the region's economic prosperity.

Region 9 EDD serves the counties of Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata, Montezuma and San Juan, the 10 cities and towns within those counties, as well as the Southern Ute and the Ute Mountain Ute Indian tribes. Its board of directors includes representatives from each of those governmental jurisdictions as well as nine representatives from the private sector.

Among Region 9 EDD's programs, the largest is providing loans to businesses creating or retaining jobs, or needing "gap" financing in partnership with banks. Region 9 EDD, through its micro-loan program, provides smaller funding amounts not always available through traditional financial institutions. Staff also cites that Region 9 EDD is the lender of "first resort" for start-up businesses that haven't yet established a track record.

In addition to loan programs, Region 9 EDD administers the Southwest Colorado Enterprise Zone, a state tax credit program; provides

administrative support to the Four Corners Film Office supporting production work in the region; provides technical assistance to countylevel economic development groups; and helps to facilitate and leverage state and federal funding into the region.

Region 9 EDD partners with community organizations, governments and the private sector to assist in the development of special projects that result in job creation/retention and the economic enhancement of the region. Region 9 EDD is currently assisting with the Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation; and participating in the Southwest Colorado Accelerator Program for Entrepreneurs (SCAPE), which provides in-depth mentoring to entrepreneurs planning to grow their business enterprises in Southwest Colorado.

Region 9 EDD is also a State Data Center and consistently publishes a variety of regional economic sector data reports that provide citizens and policy-makers access to reliable, unbiased and timely information. This includes the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy that assists local communities with economic development strategic planning and identifying viable economic projects and initiatives.

## Opening a business

#### In the Town of Pagosa Springs

The Town of Pagosa Springs requires an annual business license for all businesses located and/or conducting business within the town's boundary. This includes special events, vendors, seasonal/temporary businesses, vacation rentals, retail and service businesses, building general and subcontractors, home-based, nonprofit entities, etc.

It is recommended that you contact the town planning and building department at the beginning of your planning process and prior to determining a location for your business. There may be zoning restrictions and building code requirements for particular businesses that you should know about before you get too far along in your planning process, and certainly before you lease or purchase a property.

This will help eliminate surprises and very costly oversights along the way.

In addition, a sign permit is required for all permanent and temporary signs (banners). Again, you should contact the planning department prior to designing or manufacturing a sign to ensure you meet the town's code requirements and prevent any costly mistakes.

Town staff is available to help guide you through the process of opening or relocating a business in Pagosa Springs. The Pagosa Springs Community Development Corporation (CDC)
coordinates economic development initiatives that aim to enhance the
economy in Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County.

Born of the former Archuleta Economic Development Association (AEDA) which formed in the late 1980s, the AEDA was tasked with improving rural economic development. Today, the CDC — a nonprofit corporation formed in the spring of 2010 — maintains the goal of enhancing economic vitality in Archuleta County. Supported by county and town government, utility groups, local banks and individual businesses, the CDC's mission is to help Pagosa grow, diversify and become more economically stable.

Recent projects the CDC has undertaken include the attraction and support of Parelli Natural Horsemanship World Wide Headquarters; assistance with the development of Growing Spaces — one of the top 50 Companies to Watch in Colorado in 2010 and support for SkyWerx Internet Services, another Colorado top 50 Companies to Watch in 2014. Other CDC efforts include assisting with alternative energy development projects in and around Pagosa Springs — including a major biomass project and power plant project — and supporting research and development of the geothermal cache in the area. With the current focus on alternative energy nationally, the CDC encourages individuals and companies interested in energy entrepreneurship to look no further than Pagosa Springs.

Better than a highway running through town, Pagosa Springs has the San Juan River flowing through town. With the Weminuche Wilderness and southern San Juan Wilderness in Pagosa Springs' backyard, out-

## Educational enrichment courses for Archuleta County home-school, private school and public school kids

Pagosa Family School (PFS) works to bring Archuleta County homeschool, private school and public school kids together for educational enrichment courses.

According to PFS Director and Shared Schooling Liasion Jane Parker, PFS began with Archuleta School District (ASD) Superintendent Linda Reed and the previous shared schooling liaison, Blue Lindner, asking the question, "What are the educational needs of the home-school and private school community and how can Archuleta School District help reach those needs?"

"Input from an advisory committee of homeschool and private school leaders, conversations, and surveys showed that homeschool and private school students would benefit from educational electives, as they tend to be expensive or hard to find," Parker explained in an email. "Then, work began to develop and fund the program to launch in the fall of 2016."

That launch was successful, and PFS, an outreach of the ASD, now offers Spanish, art and choir, with each class meeting two afternoons per week during the school year.

And the best part? It's free to every student — no matter if they're part of ASD schools or not.

"Pagosa Family School offers a dynamic educational environment connecting homeschool, private school, and public school families as they learn together in enrichment courses," the program mission statement notes.

PFS currently employs one choir teacher, two art teachers and two Spanish teachers, as well as a number of educational aides, who, during the 2016-2017 school year, worked to serve 144 students, including 56 home-school students and 88 public school students.

The PFS choir serves middle school-aged students (in the fifth through eighth grades).

The art classes allow students to "work toward a mastery of art skills

while exploring their unique personal creativity," the course description notes.

In addition to encouraging creative thinking, the course works to instill an appreciation of art history and world cultures.

The Spanish courses immerse students in a Spanish-language environment that uses experiences such as music, games, stories, drama, role-play, art, chants and rhymes. Additionally, the students learn about Spanish-speaking cultures throughout the world.

But, beyond providing educational opportunity for the area's students, Parker wrote of another benefit: "It also has helped promote a positive growing relationship between the various educational communities in Pagosa and has been successful as a result of that positive cooperation."

Too, the parents of those enrolled in PFS are also pleased, with Parker gathering numerous positive testimonials during the program's first year.

"I love the students at family school. Seeing students interact in conversations while doing art projects or playing on the playground makes me feel like we have become a family. My own girls love the content and warm atmosphere provided by the other teachers. They are becoming better singers, Spanish speakers, and artists. But most of all, they are becoming more confident by gaining new skills in a fun environment."," one mother said.

Another said, "My daughter loves her Spanish class through Pagosa Family School! She comes home speaking Spanish afterwards. I think it is wonderful that she has been given this opportunity in our small town. She also loves her teacher, Mrs. Kurz."

"I am SO grateful for the extra educational opportunities that Pagosa Family School has provided for my children!" another wrote. "They are learning SO much, and LOVE PFS (so much so, that they're bummed if they have to stay home sick because they 'don't want to miss Family School!'). My kids are talking to each other in Spanish all the time (and this is their 1st year taking any Spanish ever, and the year hasn't even ended yet!), and teaching me Spanish too! My son is always excited about the new techniques he's learning in Art class, and [my] daughter is singing all the songs she learns in Choir, at home. It's definitely enriched, not only their lives, but mine as well! And, at no extra cost to me! (As otherwise, I don't know if they'd be able to take advantage of this opportunity). We are truly BLESSED by the PFS, [its] staff and teachings. ... I can only imagine the way it's blessing the community in the way of the students and families it's touching."

And the program plans to survey families involved in the program each year to determine ongoing needs for electives, Parker explained, "We have big dreams of being able to build our program by adding a wider variety of courses, in addition to our core of Spanish Art & Choir, to allow more and more students in Archuleta County to be involved in the program. We hope to be able to offer electives that may not be offered in the mainstream classroom, thus adding extra opportunities for all students in Archuleta County."



## Education Options Private & Homeschool

While Archuleta School District offers excellent educational opportunities, some people relocating to Pagosa wish to enroll their children in a private school or would like to homeschool their children. Pagosa Springs offers several private educational options.

An estimated 50-plus families homeschool their children in and around Pagosa Springs. Pagosa Valor Academy, for example, is a primary education school for kindergarten through ninth grades. It combines the best traits of home education with the best traits of public school education. It is a family-oriented school with the core purpose of teaching kids from a biblical perspective while preparing college-ready young adults.

Some homeschooling options follow the traditional school schedule, while others work year-round, offering a diversified schedule based on chores at home, jobs, training, vacation schedules and other variables. Families interested in homeschooling need to register their intent with the Archuleta School District 14 days before homeschooling and every school year. Pagosa Family School is a state-funded educational outreach program offered, for the first time in the 2016-2017 school year, to all Archuleta County students K-8. This program is for homeschool, private school and public school students. PFS offers Spanish, choir and art classes. Our Savior Lutheran School: This early childhood school offers three preschool classes, Kindergarten, first, second and third grades in which every discipline is taught from the Christian worldview. All classes are taught using a Classical Christian Curriculum, which includes such classes as Latin, cursive, traditional math (no common core), phonics-based English, science, art and music. ### Proud Partners Program

The Archuleta School District is in the midst of launching a new effort, known as the Proud Partners Program, which aims to bring the Archuleta County business community and individuals together with the district's schools, to the benefit of everyone involved.

Appropriately, the idea for the program was born out of community meetings held by the school district a few years ago. Those meetings primarily included business representatives, but also individuals.

According to the program's director, Doug Hershey, "The Pagosa Proud Partners Program was created through a collaborative effort by the school board, school district staff and community members in order to help the community better support student success. It's a way to better connect businesses and individuals who are interested in helping our students and teachers."

And while the program is still being formed and the full breadth of it has not yet been determined, Hershey indicated that the program will have several facets to support everyone involved.

Among them are expected to be volunteers working in the schools and directly with students, community volunteers and businesses donating time and skills to help the school with proj-

ects that might otherwise be expensive and time-consuming for the schools, and placing students in businesses to gain job experience and skills.

Some of those things include, for example, community members helping to run clubs within the schools or provide tutoring.

Teachers can also put out requests for things they need volunteers to help with.

One business has volunteered to maintain the bikes used for an after-school health program at the middle school, with the possibility of that growing to involve students working alongside the professionals to learn the skills.

The program also aims to help students gain employment, both over summer breaks and to help them gain experience for future careers. The school has initiated as part of its course offerings a school-to-work program, which Hershey said will intertwine with the Proud Partners Program.

That not only helps employers with an immediate need for help, but also helps to provide workforce training and helps students explore possible fields to enter.

Too, the program is working with the Pagosa Springs Area Chamber of Commerce on a number of projects, including having young



professionals come in and help students with things such as interview skills beyond what they already learn in the course of school.

This spring, the program worked with the Chamber to help students work for summer employment. That was accomplished by arranging to have a students-only portion of the job fair take place prior to the fair being opened to the general public.

Hershey also noted the program will "be a way to recognize our community partners who have done so much to help our schools. It will be a way to both acknowledge our partner contributions and to spread the word to others who are interested in helping out."

"Like small rural schools across Colorado, we are in a perpetual budget crisis," he wrote. "We work really hard and have phenomenal success. However, individual volunteers and businesses can be a great help in our efforts to find ways to provide the best possible education to our kids. We are always looking for partners to volunteer in classrooms and after school programs. We also need business sponsors for students looking for on the job work experience. And, donations of any size are always welcome."

VICA (Vocational Industrial Clubs of America) was formed in 1965. Its purpose was to motivate students at the high school and collegiate levels to understand and value opportunities present in America's skilled workforce.

In 2004, VICA became Skills USA. In 2006, the Pagosa Springs High School Skills USA chapter was founded, and it continues to grow each year. Now, Skills USA includes more than 312,000 students nationally. The organization conducts state, national and global competitions at which Pagosa Springs High School students regularly compete.

At Pagosa Springs High School, students have access to subjects such as crime scene investigation (CSI), auto technology, auto

refinishing, welding, motorcycle mechanics, firefighting, computer programming, digital photography and web design.

Pagosa Springs High School funds the students' attendance for regional and state competitions, while students who qualify for national competitions must raise their own funds to attend.

There are over 88 different competitions available to students. This year, Pagosa Springs sent students to state in three competitions. In two of the three competitions teams were entered in, they achieved podium finishes.

Skills members volunteer at the 9Health Fair for setup and takedown of the event, as well as helping out with the local antique auto show. This provides students and community members a chance to get to know each other outside of the high school setting while raising money for incidental costs at events.

### Pagosa Peak Open School:

## Community's first charter school opens in the fall of 2017

Opening its doors for the first time in the fall of 2017, the Pagosa Peak Open School (PPOS) is the community's first charter school.

PPOS aims to serve students in kindergarten through fourth grade in its first year, then adding one grade level each school year, building up to offering kindergarten through eighth grade.

The public school is tuition-free and is chartered through Archuleta School District, but is governed by its own volunteer board of directors and boasts an educational model different than the district's other schools.

PPOS offers an educational model that incorporates project- and place-based learning, as well as experiential learning, for a hands-on

approach.

"Students at Pagosa Peak Open School will learn through doing, and by reflecting and discussing what those experiences have taught them. Students will develop knowledge, skills, and values from direct experiences, both in and out of a conventional academic setting," the website states.

To better accommodate its project- and place-based education, including a focus on outdoor education and gardening/horticulture, the school will operate on a year-round schedule.

The school is based out of the Parelli Natural Horsemanship headquarters.

## Elementary school's 100 Mile Club: Making memories and logging miles

Pagosa Springs Elementary School's 100 Mile Club hosted a snowshoe adventure at Sonlight Camp last winter, featuring great snow, blue skies, camaraderie and a hot dog roast.

Students and parents were able to try out new skills in managing snowshoes while accumulating miles that go to individual and collective totals. Coaches Lindsey Kurt-Mason, Michelle Ziegler and Nicole Jones taught skills while making sure that all students had a great time.

The new club was implemented at Pagosa Springs elementary and middle schools as a fitness challenge to students. This challenge, called The 100 Mile Club, is part of a national program that is sponsored locally by the San Juan Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES).

The 100 Mile Club presents students with a straightforward goal: run, jog or walk 100 miles over the course of the school year.

At the elementary school, participating students and parents

are encouraged to log miles before and after school in a variety of contexts.

Miles are tallied daily and charted on a graph for the school community to see. Currently, the collective miles total over 1,900, more than it takes to get to Philadelphia from Pagosa Springs.

The program is adaptable to the resources and needs of individual students, and may be implemented in many different ways throughout the school day.

Making the program unique are life lessons in goal-setting, determination and team spirit delivered alongside exercise. Rather than compete against each other, students at the elementary are members of the 100 Mile Club "team," where every student has the opportunity to be successful.

Whether they run, jog or walk toward their goal, the 100 Mile Club inspires students of all abilities — athletic, nonathletic, learning disabled, challenged — to be active in an accepting, positive environment.



## Continuing Education

#### **Southwest Colorado Community College**

Learning technical skills, achieving a higher level of education and earning an associate degree and/or technical training certificate is a very real possibility while living in Pagosa Springs.

What once was a smattering of vocational, technical and online studies has now been gathered under the umbrella of Southwest Colorado Community College (SCCC), a division of Pueblo Community College (PCC).

SCCC operates its two campuses with the aid of a regional advisory board with representatives from local counties, including Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata and Montezuma. The diverse regional representation assists SCCC in highlighting the needs of local communities, such as workforce demands and education interests.

Courses can be taken on campus or online and all classes are accredited by the Higher Learning Commission. Efforts are also being made to broaden the accessibility of classes. #### Fort Lewis College & Adams State University

Pagosa Springs is situated between the sites of two higher learning establishments: Fort Lewis College in Durango and Adams State University in Alamosa.

Fort Lewis College also offers internships, service learning and undergraduate research programs.

Durango marries the educational requirements with the accessibility of the natural playground in which it is located. Community members can enjoy the museum and research library at the Center of Southwest Studies and a wide variety of performances at the Community Concert Hall at Fort Lewis College. Travel to FLC from Pagosa Springs is just an

#### **Adams State University**

Adams State University is located in Alamosa, approximately 90 miles east of Pagosa Springs. ASU is a comprehensive institution offering bachelor degrees in over 60 areas of study, in addition to 11 master's-level programs and one doctoral program.

Adams State is distinguished by caring professors and a diverse, yet close-knit community. The average class size is 18.

Adams State was Colorado's first four-year higher education institution to be federally designated a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI), with 35 percent of undergraduate students identifying as Hispanic.

With about one-third of the student body participating in athletics, the Adams State Grizzlies compete in the NCAA Division II and the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC). Adams State has over 40 student clubs and organizations.

The Adams State campus has been transformed through \$104 million worth of recent improvements. An intimate campus with treed-lined walkways, state-of-the-art classrooms and laboratories, supportive programs, and vibrant student life await Adams State students.

Seeds of Learning is open Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and is open year round. The center is located close to the downtown area and provides an educational, nurturing environment for children and parents.

The sense of community pride resonates throughout the medical center and is best captured by Brad Cochennet, CEO of Pagosa Springs Medical Center: "We embrace the belief that it is our privilege to fulfill the community's need to have access to health care. The dignity bestowed upon us not only to provide that access but also to continually elevate our level of care is something we hold in high regard."

Another step in elevating health care to the region was completed in early 2017 with the addition of the new clinic. The expansion will help meet the demands of our growing community by providing additional exam rooms, more specialty services and increased waiting space. While the completion of the expansion marked a milestone moment for the community and medical center, there are still ad-

ditional remodels this year to improve services to the community; in addition, there are future expansion phases included in the facility's master plan.

The 11-bed hospital at Pagosa Springs Medical Center offers both inpatient and outpatient services. General and orthopedic surgery is available. The medical center can accommodate many surgical procedures including, but not limited to laceration repair, laparoscopic surgery, gallbladder surgery, hernia repair, excision of lymph nodes, thyroid surgery, GI services including endoscopy and colonoscopy, and therapeutic procedures. PSMC also provides women's health procedures such as breast ductectomy, lumpectomy and mastectomy, and tubal ligation.

Orthopedics and Sports Medicine is lead by Dr. William Webb. Through his services, community members are able to receive total joint replacement for hips and knees, arthroscopy for shoulders and knees, ACL reconstruction and ligament repair. PSMC orthopedic services also include carpal tunnel release, trigger finger release and pain management. Many patients are often surprised at the number of services offered for a rural hospital and it is not uncommon for patients to travel long distances to have their procedures done by the physicians at PSMC.

The hospital also features a radiology department with industryleading equipment, including a GE 128-slice CT scanner and a new MRI system that produces images in superb quality. The medical center also has x-ray, ultrasound and digital radiography. In the H. Pat and E. Nancy Artis Mammography Suite, patients can get mammography and bone density screenings in a comfortable and intimate setting.

When you are in need of emergency medical services, you want to know you are in good hands. In 2014 the Pagosa Springs Medical Center's EMS team was awarded Colorado EMS Ambulance Service-of-the-Year, an honor that is awarded to the EMS team that demonstrates leadership in patient care, medical control, quality assurance, public education, public access, and training and education. The medical center's 24/7 Emergency Department has obtained a Level IV designation for trauma care by providing injured patients with advanced trauma life support, 24-hour laboratory coverage, stabilization, diagnosis and surgical services. This designation allows the medical center to have transfer agreements to Level I and Level II Trauma Centers for patient care after stabilization at PSMC.

The Pagosa Springs Medical Center believes in being a supportive establishment for the community and surrounding area. As the largest employer in Archuleta County, you do not have to look far to find someone connected to the organization.

A comprehensive aquatic wellness program with therapeutic water exercises is offered for adults with chronic health conditions or healthy individuals who just wish to improve their fitness level.

Pagosa also has its share of qualified chiropractors. There are a variety of chiropractic treatments available, serving a wide range of





## Axis Health System: A new integrated health care facility

On Wednesday, Aug. 24, 2016, 65 people turned out to watch Axis Health System and local elected officials dig in to a new construction project just northwest of City Market at 52 Village Drive.

The Durango-based Axis Health System will bring increased health care options to Pagosa Springs in a new facility on Village Drive behind the City Market. The new clinic will follow Axis' "integrated" health care model, providing primary care and other services in a single location.

Opening of Archuleta Integrated Healthcare is targeted for June of 2017.

"This is phenomenal that we are all here for this purpose, because this is a cause that is absolutely near and dear to my heart," said Pagosa Springs Mayor Don Volger at the ground-breaking ceremony. "This is more than just kind of cool. This is darn near miraculous.

"We have been dreaming about having something like this in Pagosa Springs for years," he said. "This facility will complement our phenomenal hospital. It's my prayer that we go forward in this healthcare community with hands held with the hospital, with private practices and with Axis."

"We are so proud to be here and put shovel to ground, and kick off the start of a fully integrated clinic," said Axis Chief Executive Officer Bern Heath. "It will provide primary care, mental health and substance use treatment. We've also designed it for — and we're working to get funding for — oral health care."

For more than 40 years, Axis has been known in the region for providing care for mental health concerns. Archuleta Integrated Healthcare is the next step to expand services through the integrated care model, which combines primary care, behavioral healthcare and oral health care in a one-stop shop.

"Axis has embraced a new idea called integrated health, but I'm not sure people understand how innovative that is. It is amazing," said Volger. "When you can go in, and somebody cares about the whole person: They don't just care about the complaint that you came in with. They care about you."



# Geothermal Greenhouse Partnership Growing food and community with local energy

A remarkable all-volunteer community project, the Geothermal Greenhouse Partnership (GGP), began in 2009 as the idea of a small group of community members and local officials. This idea ignited a passionate movement to build three greenhouses that would draw their energy from the town's pride and joy, the deepest geothermal pool in the world, according to the Guinness Book of World Records.

The GGP's mission is to educate the community in sustainable agricultural practices by producing food year-round using local renewable energy.

As visitors stroll along the San Juan River Walk in downtown

Pagosa Springs, it's impossible to miss the first of the three green-houses, the Education Growing Dome. The geodesic dome sits on a beautiful .78 acre site in Centennial Park, leased to the nonprofit by the Town of Pagosa Springs, along with 100-gallons-per-minute of geothermal water.

In 2010, the project was heralded by state representatives, senators, the Colorado governor and national energy officials. Major grants have included the Laura Jane Musser Fund, the Colorado Department of Local Affairs award and a Colorado Water Conservation District award. In 2013, the GGP was selected by the Colorado Environmental Film Festival to officially host a mini-festival, or caravan, to serve the community with education and entertainment,

which financially benefits the GGP.

By 2016, the first greenhouse, the Education Dome, and the adjacent amphitheater were built. Much of the on-going labor and needed materials have been donated by Pagosa Springs businesses and community volunteers. Local school sports teams donated their time to fill all the beds with soil. A section of the beds within the structure is managed by the nonprofit's all-volunteer Seeds, Soil and Water Committee and is dedicated to supporting the project.

Visitors can see GGP's volunteers in action at least two workdays each week.

As its name suggests, the first dome's main purpose is education. Growing beds within the dome are dedicated largely to youth, and the GGP's Programming Committee collaborates with local schools and Colorado State University 4-H to bring the youth programs into the dome.

The GGP is also offering six Lifelong Learning Workshops in 2017 to explore varied topics from greenhouse growing to birds on Pagosa's River Walk to cooking with native foods.

A membership-based organization, the nonprofit christened its outdoor amphitheater in 2016 with a special thank you party for all its contributors.

The outdoor amphitheater also served as the site of its signature fundraiser, Breakfast with Balloons. It's the perfect viewing spot for the balloon ascension of the community's annual ColorFest celebration. The GGP's first gourmet breakfast with champagne was a sold-out event.

What's ahead? The year 2017 should bring more grant awards and plans are in the works for the second dome, the Community Garden Dome. This greenhouse will be made available to local community organizations whose objectives address community needs. The third greenhouse will be dedicated to innovation. Fundraisers, including live outdoor concerts and workshops, will be held at this perfect location on the San Juan River.

As you stroll by the domes, if doors are open, please come in. The volunteers will share more about the GGP with you and your family.

Grab a lunch at a local restaurant and enjoy the Pagosa Springs sunshine at the GGP amphitheater.

### What is it like at that altitude?

Regardless of physical fitness, Acute Mountain Sickness can strike anyone not acclimated to Pagosa's 7,000-foot elevation. To guard against altitude sickness:

- Drink three to four quarts of water per day.
- Avoid overexertion, while keeping caffeine and alcohol intake moderate for the first few
- Seek medical attention if persistent headache, fatigue, poor coordination or shortness of breath occur.

### What is the weather like?

Archuleta County is located in the "Colorado Sunbelt," just north of the New Mexico border and along the Western slope of the Continental Divide. This combination of high desert plateau and dramatic Rocky Mountains to the north and east creates an unusually mild climate compared with much of the surrounding Southwest. We are favored with some 300 days of sun each year, as well as four distinct seasons. With low wind and warm sunshine, residents can enjoy a variety of year-round recreational activities.



### Reservoir Hill

### A gem in downtown Pagosa Springs

Reservoir Hill — a wooded, public park overlooking downtown Pagosa Springs — is considered a local gem and the flagship of the Pagosa Springs parks system.

The all-season park boasts more than 120 acres of mostly ponderosa-pine covered land and overlooks downtown Pagosa Springs and its world-famous mineral hot springs.

Included on the hill is an extensive trail system for hiking, mountain biking, snowshoeing and cross-country skiing that has been improved over the years. Trailheads are located behind the San Juan

Motel and off of San Juan Street behind the Healing Waters Resort and Spa. Parking is available by Town Park off of San Juan Street and at the trailhead behind the Healing Waters Resort and Spa, with parking availability at that location expanded in recent years.

In addition to its many trails, the hill is home to a "festival meadow" with a gazebo that is home to two longstanding and well-known music festivals — the Four Corners Folk Festival, which has been running for upwards of 20 years and takes place over Labor Day weekend, and Pagosa Folk N' Bluegrass, which occurs in June and is now in its 11th year. Both festivals bring world-class entertainment to Pagosa Springs in a setting that's hard to beat so close to amenities.

Reservoir Hill is also home to one of Archuleta County's two disc golf courses. The 18-hole disc golf course was installed in recent years and is well-used by both residents and visitors, even playing host to tournaments.

Further adding character to the forested park are wood sculptures scattered on the hill and the endangered Pagosa skyrocket flower, which is endemic to Archuleta County (meaning it's found nowhere outside of Archuleta County). Reservoir Hill is one of the few public places the plant can be found—although it can be tricky to spot.

In the winter, when snow permits, the trailhead behind the Healing Waters Resort and Spa is home to a sledding hill. Year-round, the area has a picnic table perfect for taking in the view of the beautiful surroundings.

The hill is also home to a water reservoir. The hill took on its Reservoir name around 1900, when the town installed its first community water system. Prior to that, the hill was known as Robidoux Hill, named after a trapper named Antoine Robidoux. Near to the water reservoir is a large, locally crafted metal star that is lit up during the winter holiday season.

In addition to being well-loved and hosting numerous events, Reservoir Hill has been the center of attention several times over the years, with last summer and this spring being no different as several new improvements were made to the hill.

In 2015, a pump station for potable water was installed, making fresh water available seasonally for things such as refilling water bottles.

Too, the first phase of an observation deck was completed by the Friends of Reservoir Hill — a grassroots organization formed in 2012 to offer ideas for developing Reservoir Hill that were in line with its natural beauty.

The observation deck is the Friends' first undertaking and was funded by members of the public through a crowdfunding campaign.

Another Reservoir Hill project involves tree-thinning to improve the health of the forest — which also provided free firewood to the community for a time. That project was paid for through grant funding.

The thinning process took more than a year to complete due to the weather and the need to not damage the hill with machinery needed to thin some larger trees. In addition to machinery, crews from the Southwest Conservation Corps camped out on the hill during the summer of 2015 to complete hand-thinning efforts.

If all of the amenities and improvements show anything, it's that Reservoir Hill is a treasured aspect of Pagosa Springs and will continue to be for years to come. And, as history has proven, it will continue to be well protected by Pagosa Country citizens who want only the best for their cherished hill.

### The Parks of Pagosa

The employees of the Pagosa Springs Parks and Recreation Department take great personal pride in their stewardship of the town's facilities and amenities.

The parks of Pagosa Springs run the gamut from the wild and natural pine forest on Reservoir Hill to the well manicured fields of Yamaguchi Park. What follows is a list of each park and a description of what it has to offer.

### **Reservoir Hill**

The most prominent physical feature of the downtown area, Reservoir Hill towers over the south bank of the San Juan River and is distinguished by the large green water tank visible from U.S. 160. This park is featured on the previous two pages of this guide.

### Town Park

On the southeast corner of the U.S. 160/Hot Springs Boulevard intersection, Town Park connects to Centennial Park via the Riverwalk and contains a wind harp, bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a playground, two special-event 200-amp electrical services, a performance space with stage and a white-water feature in the adjacent river. The park and the athletic field across Hermosa Street host several events throughout the year, including the Fourth of July Park 2 Park Arts and Crafts Fair, ColorFest and the Mountain Chile Cha Cha.

### Yamaguchi Park

Located on South 5th Street between Pagosa Springs High School and the river, Yamaguchi Park is home to a favorite hang-out for local kids — the Pagosa Skate Park. The Skaters Coalition for Concrete, a local grassroots organization formed over a decade ago, raised funds and added a full-sized bowl to the 4,500 square-foot concrete terrain at the park.

The park was designed to appeal to skaters of all ability levels and includes several plaza elements and a bowl feature.

The park is open from dawn to dusk throughout the year, provided the skating surface is free of ice and snow in the winter months. To learn more about the skate park, or to find out when the annual skater competition and fundraiser will take place, visit www.skaterscoalitonforconcrete.com.

Another amenity of Yamaguchi Park is the kayak/raft launching facility and two whitewater features, complemented by the paved Riverwalk to facilitate viewing activities on the river.

A heated year-round restroom, drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills and picnic shelter allow for family gatherings, while a state-of-the-art playground and beautiful soccer and softball fields give plenty of room for the kids to play. A special-events and performance venue with electrical service is also available.

### South Pagosa Park

A true neighborhood park located on the south side of town on Apache Street between 7th and 8th streets, South Pagosa Park has bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a picnic shelter, horseshoe pits, a playground and a basketball court. The park is well used by local families.

### **Centennial Park**


Centennial Park stretches along the river behind the Archuleta County courthouse, and includes several tables for enjoying a family picnic while watching the activities in the river and hot springs. A pedestrian bridge provides a continuous connection for the Riverwalk that winds through the wetlands behind Town Hall and the Ross Aragon Community Center. A pedestrian bridge at the other end of the park connects to The Springs Resort and Spa. This park is also the site of the Geothermal Greenhouse Partnership's growing dome and amphitheater.

### **Mary Fisher Park**

Along the south bank of the San Juan River directly across from Town Park, and connected to it by another pedestrian bridge, Mary Fisher Park contains several picnic tables, as well as a changing screen for kayakers and inner tubers to use before hitting another one of the new whitewater river features.

### **River Center Park**

Nestled behind the River Center shops on the east end of town (from U.S. 160 go behind the River Center buildings), the River Center Park contains two small fishing ponds with a handicap-accessible pier and access to the river for launching rafts and kayaks.

When the days begin to warm up, resident activities exemplify the phrase "spring fever." Walking around town or taking a quick trip up Reservoir Hill on your lunch hour gets everyone in the mood for summer. As the snow begins to melt and the river rises, kayak and rafting enthusiasts hit the river. The San Juan River boasts several developed water features downtown along the Town Park and Yamaguchi Park. There is also improved fishing access and ongoing habitat improvements along the river through town. Fish are plentiful in Pagosa waters, with species including catfish, bass, pike and a variety of trout. Hikes in the lower elevations, perhaps around the Piedra River Trail, are a great way to break in the season and relish the beauty of the first signs of spring. Usually by April cyclists abound, enjoying moderate rides together to get in shape for the season. Spring also brings out birding enthusiasts who tag and identify which species have returned to beautiful Pagosa.

Summer brings out the athlete in us all with warm days, cool nights and typically excellent weather conditions. Summer is perfect for just about every sport, especially hiking, mountain and road biking, and running. Summer also means motorcycle rides, offroading and camping in gorgeous locations. Pagosa Springs boasts a wonderful 27-hole golf course, two 18-hole disc golf courses located on Reservoir Hill and at Cloman Community Park and one nine-hole disc golf course in Aspen Springs. Boaters enjoy cruising on Navajo Lake, which spans the Colorado and New Mexico border. Horse enthusiasts head to the Western Heritage Event Center to compete in team roping and rodeo events.

Many of the activities of summer continue into the fall. Athletes get to enjoy the stunning hues of changing leaves as they add another layer of clothing in the evenings. The temperate weather mixed with the gorgeous colors is just another incentive to get out and enjoy the outdoors.

Winter is just as active as the other seasons. For the alpine skier, Wolf Creek Ski Area is just 24 miles away and is known for its radical powder days. 

### **GETTING SETTLED**



Moving to a new town with your pets can be an exciting adventure with many new discoveries. It can also be a bit stressful for you and your pets leaving behind the familiar. Before moving, it is important to know any information dealing with pet regulations.

Before you move, make sure that your pets are healthy and up to date on their vaccinations. If you are moving from out of state with dogs or cats, Colorado requires that you have a certificate of veterinarian inspection that is no more than 30 days old. If your cat or dog is three months or older, they must also have had a rabies vaccination within the preceding 12 months. For livestock requirements, visit the Colorado Department of Agriculture website (www.colorado.gov/ag).

Part of moving involves gathering all your important personal documents. Make sure you do the same for your pets. Have all of their

# Relocating your animals

health and vaccination records on hand so that when you choose a local veterinarian, you can provide your new vet with your pets' medical histories

There are many Internet sources of information available on how to safely move your pets, as well as great tips on how to help your dogs or cats acclimate to their new home. A site that offers a good overview of both is www.healthypet.com.

Losing a pet can be nerve-wracking. The Humane Society of Pagosa Springs (HSPS) operates the only animal shelter in the area, located at 465 Cloman Blvd. The shelter is open seven days a week. A call to the animal shelter, (970) 731-4771, should be one of your first steps in finding a lost pet.

The HSPS website (www.humanesociety.biz) hosts detailed information on what to do if you and your pet become separated. The website also has information on adoptions, spay/neuter voucher programs and other services. The HSPS offers low-cost spay and neuter programs.

To aid in finding a lost pet, make sure that your pet has a secure collar with a sturdy identification tag attached. The ID tag should contain your name and contact information, including information on rabies vaccination. If you are moving, make sure the tag has your current cell phone number. Secondly, have a microchip inserted in your pet. This aids identification if your pet's collar is lost or removed. The Humane Society animal shelter scans every incoming pet for a microchip. Make sure you have registered your animal's chip and updated your contact information with the chip company.

If your pet does not have a microchip, the HSPS can provide you one at low cost. If your pet already has a microchip, it would be a good idea to stop by the shelter and provide the staff with the chip number and your updated contact information.

Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County do not require licensing for dogs or cats at this time. You are, however, required to have a current rabies vaccination for your pets. While Archuleta County does not have a leash law, Pagosa Springs does. You are required to have your dog under control at all times. If you want to exercise and play with your dog in a safe, controlled environment, there is a community-accessible dog park at the animal shelter.

If you are purchasing property in Pagosa Country, make sure you check for additional pet regulations or restrictions in the covenants of your property owners association. Keep in mind, too, that regardless of where you live, some homeowner insurance policies have certain dog breed exclusions, so check your insurance policy for pet restrictions.

Pagosa Springs is one of the most animal-friendly places that you will find in Colorado.



### Volunteer opportunities

In addition to the wondrous beauty, plentiful wildlife and an active outdoor lifestyle that you will enjoy in Pagosa Springs, there are tremendous opportunities for enriching your life by volunteering in the community. No matter what your level of involvement has been in the past, you will find wonderful ways to share your interests, talents and abilities.

Pagosa Springs has traditional civic clubs, churches and organizations that you will find in almost every community. There are two Rotary clubs that are very active. The churches and nonprofit community have a wide variety of projects and activities year-round. Loaves and Fishes provides a free hot meal every Thursday with different organizations adopting a week of service. Habitat for Humanity builds and renovates homes using both local and national

There are also multiple organizations supporting Pagosa's youth. Big Brothers Big Sisters provides mentors for boys and girls who need an active role model. GECKO (Giving Every Child Knowledge of the Outdoors) promotes getting off the couch and getting outside and provides scholarships for youth outdoor education. 4-H, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts help keep our youth involved in positive activities, including the Archuleta County Fair.

For our veterans or active military, there are Veterans For Veterans and the American Legion Post 108.

The Democratic Central Committee and the Republican Women meet regularly and are involved in community affairs.

We also have many volunteer opportunities unique to our area. If you like outdoor activities, you can volunteer with clubs like the San Juan Outdoor Club, the Pagosa Nordic Club, the Gray Wolves Ski Club or the Back Country Horsemen. If you have a love of history, you can be a guide with the Chimney Rock Interpretive Association for Chimney Rock National Monument, volunteer with the Pagosa Springs History Museum (San Juan Historical Society) or be a guide at the Fred Harman Art Museum. If you love animals, you can be a volunteer at the Humane Society Shelter or Thrift Store, or LASSO horse rescue or other organizations.

In addition to paid professional staff, the Pagosa Fire Protection District relies heavily on volunteer firefighters. The San Juan Mounted Patrol assists with numerous community events and emergencies, as does the Sheriff's Volunteer Patrol.

To help people who need assistance in our backcountry or with emergencies, we have the Upper San Juan Search and Rescue, the Mounted Search and the Incident Management Group.

If the arts are your passion, we have Friends of the Library, Curtains Up Pagosa, the Thingamajig Theatre Company, Pagosa Community Choir and the Pagosa Springs Community Band. There is a garden club, quilting club, archaeology club and homemakers club. The Audubon Society has an active presence, as does the League of Women Voters and several other women's groups.

### About the Area

Archuleta County is located in southwest Colorado, situated at the junction of U.S. 160 and 84 at an elevation of 7,079 feet. The county seat, Pagosa Springs, is located 30 miles north of the New Mexico border, and 60 miles east of Durango. It is also near the Four Corners region where Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Arizona meet.

Archuleta County is comprised of 872,960 acres. Only 34 percent of lands in Archuleta County are in private ownership. Tribal lands comprise 14.4 percent of the county. Most of the northern and eastern portions of the county (51.6 percent) are within the San Juan National Forest. There is a total of approximately 2.8 million acres of National Forest and Bureau of Land Management surrounding Archuleta County.



# Voter & Vehicle Registration

### **Motor vehicles**

In making your transition from another state to Colorado or from another Colorado county, we would like to help in making the registration of your vehicle as easy as possible.

Colorado law requires you to register your vehicles, trailers, motor homes, heavy equipment, etc. within 30 days of becoming a Colorado resident. Unfortunately, the law does not allow you to "run" on your out-of-state plates until they expire.

If you are currently a Colorado resident and are just moving here, you may call the Archuleta County Clerk's office and they will help you change your registration address so you will receive a renewal notice from Archuleta County when your plates expire.

Some of the most obvious reasons that, by law, constitute becoming a resident are: obtaining a Colorado driver's license, registering to vote, enrolling children into school or becoming employed. If you are retired and consider this your legal place of residence and intend to file your federal income tax with a Pagosa Springs address as your legal address, you need Colorado plates.

To obtain Colorado license plates, you will need:

- 1. A current registration or title from the state you are coming from
  - 2. Proof of Insurance (Must be Colorado).
- 3. A vehicle identification verification done by any law enforcement officer. The sheriff's office is located in the courthouse (west end of the building) and charges \$10 (cash or check) for this service.
  - 4. An acceptable form of ID.

Vehicle registration in Colorado is based on the year, weight and taxable value of the vehicle, when new. The taxable value is then depreciated according to the age of the vehicle. The office is located at 449 San Juan St., in the east side of the courthouse.

The nearest place to obtain a Colorado driver's license is Durango, approximately 60 miles west of Pagosa Springs. The DMV is located at 305 S. Camino del Rio. You may contact their office at (970) 247-4591.
