Members of our community are actively involved in many volunteer, leadership and business ventures.


Whether a home-based business or a growth company, Pagosa Springs has the resources available to help you succeed.



About the Area

Archuleta County is located in southwest Colorado, situated at the junction of U.S. 160 and 84 at an elevation of 7,079 feet. The county seat, Pagosa Springs, is located 30 miles north of the New Mexico border, and 60 miles east of Durango. It is also near the Four Corners region where Colorado. Utah. New Mexico and Arizona meet.

Archuleta County is comprised of 872,960 acres. Only 34 percent of lands in Archuleta County are in private ownership. Tribal lands comprise 14.4 percent of the county. Most of the northern and within the San Juan National Forest. There is a total of approximately 2.8 million acres of National Forest and Bureau of Land Management surrounding Archuleta County.







Pagosa Springs sits at 7,079 feet in southwest Colorado at the base of the Continental Divide, Featuring rushing rivers and streams, lakes galore, hiking and biking trails, spectacular fall colors, ancient ruins, deep powder in the winter at nearby Wolf Creek Ski Area, incredible hunting, amazing wildlife, clean air and 3 million acres of National Forest surrounding the area, Pagosa Springs offers plenty of opportunities for our valued visitors, any time of year.

Regardless of physical fitness, acute mountain sickness can strike anyone not acclimated to Pagosa's 7,000-foot elevation. To guard against altitude sickness:

- Drink three to four quarts of water per day.
- · Avoid overexertion, while keeping caffeine and alcohol intake moderate for the first few
- Seek medical attention if persistent headache, fatigue, poor coordination or shortness of breath occur.

What is the weather like?

Archuleta County is located in the "Colorado Sunbelt," just north of the New Mexico border and along the Western slope of the Continental Divide. This combination of high desert plateau and dramatic Rocky Mountains to the north and east creates an unusually mild climate compared with much of the surrounding Southwest. We are favored with some 300 days of sun each year, as well as four distinct seasons. With low wind and warm sunshine, residents can enjoy a variety of year-round recreational activities.



'I want this to always be Terry's place. Without him, it wouldn't be what it is.'

For Grace, Max and Quinn Smith, becoming the second-generation owners of their father's store, Terry's Ace Hardware, was not a hard decision.

The sibling trio bought the company in September 2017, with Grace serving as president of the ownership group and taking over management of the store, and Max and Quinn providing support and input while also pursuing other careers.

"They're my on-call guys," Grace explained, adding that their different backgrounds and educations are helpful with long-term planning for the store.

Max works in IT in the Boulder/Longmont area, while Quinn graduated in the spring from Fort Lewis College with a degree in economics.

"I think we're all very attached to this place. It's definitel/ not just a business and work for us. It's definitely, like, our childhoocs," Grace said. "It's like it's our life, where it's very much home, you know, being here. It's definitely an attachment."

Terry opened Circle T in 1996 as a lumber yard and hardware store to supplement his building business.

But, as Grace pointed out, it turned into something bigger when the

general public started shopping there more than was anticipated.

From there, Terry branched out, opening Elements, a store focusing on housewares and gifts, and later Bedroom Elements.

Over the years, those stores were incorporated into the main store, which, in 2005 moved into its current, bigger location. Now, the store offers everything from traditional hardware store fare to furniture, books, toys, clothes, housewares and more.

Grace, like her siblings, grew up in the business-folding flyers for her dad's home-building business for him to take to trade shows. Sometimes she went with him to those trade shows, passing the time by reading under the table.

As she grew, she graduated to odd jobs like dusting shelves, later working in the furniture department after school while she was in high school.

After she graduated high school, she served as ∈ cashier for about three years and helped the store's purchaser.

She's appreciative of that work now, she pointed out, because it helps her to know what everyone is doing and what she wants them to do.

Grace then struck out on her own to see what life had to offer and

worked at a puzzle company in the Denver area.

But when a longtime employee of her dad's retired, Grace explained, she knew it was time to head home.

She was dating the man who would become her husband, who was also from Pagosa, and they knew Pagosa was where they wanted to be.

"I mean, it just all made sense," she said.

So, Grace returned to manage the garden center.

It was also a chance for years of family discussions about the siblings taking over the store to begin to materialize.

"It was very complicated to figure out how to make that happen in a permanent way knowing that he probably wasn't going to be here always," she said, explaining that they worked through about six different scenarios before finding one that worked and having Grace take over in September 2017. "He was ready to, like, not be here every day at that point because he just couldn't."

Terry passed away in May of 2018 after 10 years of working through the highs and lows of being sick.

But, even though Terry isn't in the store every day, his presence is still felt, and the siblings like it that way.

"These were all Terry's ideas," Grace explained of the changes she implemented in her first year and a half of managing the store without her father.

"Having her at the helm gives me confidence it was the right business decision as well as the right decision for our family. Family is very important to me and I consider many of the people at Ace not just Grace and Quinn, family as well; many of them helped raise me," Max stated.

All three stated a hope and goal for the store to carry on their father's legacy and the sense of community felt there.

"I hope for it to remain Terry's Ace," Quinn said.

"I want this to always be Terry's place," Grace said. "Without him, it wouldn't be what it is."








- Colorado Enterprise Zone Tax Credits This incentive program provides tax credits to businesses located in Enterprise Zone designated areas. See if your business is in the EZ and what tax credits you are eligible for.
- · If you are a business interested in relocating from another state, ask us about Rural Jumpstart, another Colorado incentize program.
- · If you have a development project, ask us about Opportunity Zone capital gain incentives. This is a new federal program and

certain areas in Archuleta County are eligible.

- · Need information on grant funding? If you are a not-for-profit organization, we have a "grant finder" database and can identify some eligible grant programs for your project.
- Supporting entrepreneurial infrastructure Today, jobs follow people rather than people following jobs. If you want to be here and need to create your job, we can refer you to a variety of business resources that provide workshops, business advising, mentorship and even investment.
- · Need data? Region 9 is a State Data Center Affiliate and consistently publishes a variety of economic data reports that provide citizens and policymakers access to reliable, unbiased and timely information. If we don't have it, we can direct you to what you need.

Opening a business in town

License, permits, zoning information and more

The Town of Pagosa Springs requires an annual business license for all businesses located and/or conducting business within the town's boundary. This includes special events, vendors, seasonal/temporary businesses, vacation rentals, retail and service businesses, building general and subcontractors, home-based, nonprofit entities, etc.

It is recommended that you contact the town planning and building department at the beginning of your planning process and prior to determining a location for your business. There may be zoning restrictions and building code requirements for particular businesses that you should know about before you get too far along n your planning process, and certainly before you lease or purchase a property. This will help eliminate surprises and very costly oversights along the way.

In addition, a sign permit is required for all permanent and temporary signs (banners). Again, you should contact the planning department prior to designing or manufacturing a sign to ensure you meet the town's code requirements and prevent any costly mistakes.

Town staff is available to help guide you through the process of opening or relocating a business in Pagosa Springs. Town and County Regulations

Before you build, expand or open your business

Before you build, renovate or open your doors for business, there is one step that many people forget — and it is one that could save you time, money, surprises and headaches. That step is checking with the Town of Pagosa Springs or Archuleta County building and planning departments regarding doing business in our community. Depending on where your business is located, each entity may have different requirements and zoning laws.

Zoning and land use

Of course, most entrepreneurs know that you need a building permit before you break ground. But are you breaking ground in the right zone? Both the town and county have land use permitting and zoning. It is important to check to make sure that your business fits within the zoning and building code guidelines. Even though a zone may permit light manufacturing, you will need to make sure that your manufacturing operation fits within those guidelines. You may need to ask for a variance and that involves speaking with each entity's building department. Even if you bought an existing building, contact the building department to make sure your business is compatible within the zone. This includes converting a house from long-term to short-term rental, adding accessory structures to a nonresidential location (including portable shipping containers), paving or changing access and parking lots, and doing any work in a floodplain. Some properties may be "grandfathered"; however, the improvement must meet current codes when expanded or changed or if vacant for more than a year. If your property doesn't fit within a particular zone, check with the planner for other locations that may suit your needs.

Permitting and licensing

It is not necessary to obtain a business license within the parameters of Archuleta County; however, if doing business within the Town of Pagosa Springs, you must have an annual business license. Even if your business is physically located in the county, but you perform a business function within the town (delivery of products, repairs, sales), you still need a town business license. Business licenses are also required within the town for temporary or vendor permits and contractor work permits. Depending on the nature of your business, licenses, permits and required fees can vary. In both the town and the county, sign permitting is required for both temporary, modified or permanent signage. Before you spend the money on making a sign, this process will alert you to size restrictions or perhaps colors if you are doing business in the historic district of the town. Any new construction will need to have plans submitted to each building department and feedback will be provided. Each entity will provide a building and fire safety inspection before issuing a certificate of occupancy.

Both the town and the county have rules regarding short term rentals (under 30 days) and each have a different fee schedule and all short-term rentals need to be licensed and collect sales and lodger's tax.

Before you build or set up your property for short-term rental, check the guidelines.

Many of the licensing forms can be found on the town's website at pagosasprings.co.gov or on the county's site at archuletacounty.org.

The town's building and planning departments are located at Town Hall at 551 Hot Springs Blvd. and the county building and planning offices are located at 1122 U.S. 84.

What's Cookin'? Culinary arts class gives options to local students

For many high school students, certain subjects just catch their eye and attention. That could be math, English or art for some, and for others, it could be more hands-on classes such as shop or welding.

Pagosa Springs High School (PSHS) discovered that, based on a student survey, there was one area that was untapped - culinary

At the start of the 2018-19 school year, PSHS began offering a culinary arts class for students who had the interest.

Archuleta School District (ASD) Food Service Director Todd Stevens, who also serves as the teacher for the class, explained that he became involved with the class after that student survey.

"As a school, we're trying to fill those needs," Stevens said.

In its first year, the class wanted to not only get kids scme cooking experience, but also, begin to teach curriculum from the National Restaurant Association, Stevens explained.

For Stevens, his goal in teaching the class is to create a program to teach students the ins and outs of not only cooking food, but the food industry and the lessons that come with it.

Other parts of the class involve kitchen math for things such as recipes and teaching students food safety.

When the kids get in the kitchen and get hands-on experience, Stevens explains, his students love it.

"That environment for them is really fun," Stevens said.

Interestingly, sometimes the hands-on activities within the class teach kids how to purposefully get things wrong within a recipe, Stevens noted.

The reason behind that, as Stevens explains, is to show students how to fix their mistakes in the moment.

Within the class, Stevens hopes to create a safe environment for students to make mistakes.

These types of culinary arts classes are huge for students with the interest, Stevens explained.

"Because they're going to get that sort of baseline. The community will have people that have some knowledge," Stevens said.

Stevens does acknowledge the fact that students won't be experts, but they will have the fundamental knowledge needed going forward. Students have already begun to make their own culinary

creations such as crafting food platters for parent-teacher conferences, Stevens explained.

However, there was the hope that students would be able to participate in internships as a school-to-work-type program, but Stevens explained that he felt like the students would be better served doing things in a controlled environment.

"I just didn't think that we had gotten far enough to do that, but that's ultimately what I'd like to see," Stevens said.

The most important part of this whole process is giving students choices for their creative endeavors and interests.

"I think the goal is to give kids a choice for what they want to do and to have that available as something they can learn," Stevens explained.

For PSHS Principal Sean O'Donnell, the feedback he has received on the culinary arts program has been nothing but positive.

"Through the course of the year, we have learned a lot about where we would like to take the program in the future," O'Donnell wrote in an email.

O'Donnell added later that PSHS would like to see the program expand, however, there are some limitations.

"We would love to expand the program into multiple levels and also hope to offer to more students. Unfortunately, we are unable to expand beyond what we offered this year because of limited space. We simply do not have the facilities to expand," he wrote.

As PSHS was looking for ways to expand opportunities for its students to earn experience in the various trades within Pagosa Springs, culinary arts was an area that the school was lacking.

ASD as a whole identified the economic drivers in the community and have used those drivers as a road map for its career and technical education programs, ASD Superintendent Linda Reed explained in an interview.

"I couldn't be happier with the way that they're being received," she said.

Stevens has the background in the industry needed, but also has a natural tendency to be an educator, Reed noted.

"I'm thrilled with the way it's working," she said. "I think it's the right thing at the right time."



Education Options Private and Homeschool

While Archuleta School District offers excellent educational opportunities, some people relocating to Pagosa wish to enroll their children in a private school, online or blended school, or woul-l like to homeschool their children. Pagosa Springs offers many private educational options online and blended options, and homeschooling groups.

Pagosa Family School: Pagosa Family School is a state-funded educational outreach program offered to all homeschool, private school and Archuleta School District students. PFS offers Spanish, art, drumline, choir, and an exploratory class consisting of science, music and drama. Pagosa Valor Academy: Pagosa Valor Academy is a University Model School for kindergarten through 11th grades. It combines the best traits of home education with the best traits of public school education. It is a family-oriented school with the core purpose of teaching kids from a biblical perspective while preparing college-ready young adults. Learn more at pagosavaloracademy.org

Our Savior Lutheran School: This early childhood school offers preschool through eighth grade in which every discipline is taught from the Christian worldview. All classes are taught using a Classical Christian Curriculum, which includes such classes as Latin, cursive, traditional math (no common core), phonics-based English, science, art and music. The school is located on three acres, complete with six classrooms, a gymnasium and two playground areas. Information is located at oslepagosa.org.

Online and blended options: Online schooling options, many of which are tuition-free public schools, are gaining popularity.

GOAL Academy is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education, serving ages 14-21. GOAL Academy maintains a blended-learning format with online courses and drop-in centers with incividuals to help with any questions or problems. Visit online at goa.ac.org.

A sampling of other popular tuition-free public online schools available in Pagosa include Southwest Colorado eSchool (southwestcoloradoeschool.org), K-12 schools (k12.com/colorado-online-schools), and Colorado Connections Academy (connectionsacademy.com/colorado-online-school).

Pagosa also has a robust and diverse homeschooling community. Homeschooling families of all educational philosophies are invited to stay connected through Pagosa Homeschool Connection's Facebook page. In addition, three homeschooling groups meet weekly throughout the school year. Classical Conversations of Pagosa Springs group (classicalconversations.com) follows a classical home-education model with weekly community days. Finday Co-Op offers academic classes and field trips for preschool through high school as participation dictates. Adventures à la Carte group gets together every week for social and enrichment activities such as hikes, sledding and other field trips. Families who are considering homeschooling for the first time or moving into Colorado are encouraged to review homeschooling laws in Colorado, available through HSLDA (hslda.org) and the Colorado Department of Education.

In 2004, VICA became Skills USA. In 2006, the Pagosa Springs High School Skills USA chapter was founded, and it continues to grow each year. Now, Skills USA includes more than 312,000 students nationally. The organization conducts state, national and global competitions at which Pagosa Springs High School students regularly compete.

At Pagosa Springs High School, students have access to subjects

such as crime scene investigation (CSI), auto technology, auto refinishing, welding, motorcycle mechanics, firefighting, computer programming, digital photography and web design.

Educational enrichment courses for Archuleta County home-school, private school and public school kids

Archuleta School District's Pagosa Family School (PFS) offers a dynamic educational environment connecting homeschool, private school and public school families as they learn together in enrichment courses.

PFS currently employs one choir teacher, one drumline teacher, two art teachers, two exploratory teachers and two Spanish teachers, as well as a number of educational aides, who, during the 2018-19 school year, worked to serve 123 students, including 69 private and home-school students and many public school students.

The PFS choir serves middle school-aged students (in the fifth through eighth grades).

The drumline class offers students an exciting class for students to engage in a dynamic and energetic group while learning the skills and practice of drumline.

The art classes allow students to "work toward a mastery of art skills while exploring their unique personal creativity," the course description notes.

In addition to encouraging creative thinking, the course works to instill an appreciation of art history and world cultures.

The Spanish courses immerse students in a Spanish-language environment that uses experiences such as music, games, stories, drama, role-play, art, chants and rhymes. Additionally, the students learn about Spanish-speaking cultures throughout the world.

A new exploratory course was added for the 2018-19 school year that included a semester of science rocks and a semester of music and

Science rocks class explores a variety of science concepts through life science, physical science, and earth and space science. The students complete many experiments and get hands-on opportunities

with specimens from the Denver Museum of Nature and Science.

In the music and drama course, classes alternate between general music and theater, though often the subjects are integrated. Students explore music appreciation, history, and theory in a blended approach as well as pursue improvisational drama, interpretive drama and performance skills.

But, beyond providing educational opportunity for the area's students, Parker wrote of another benefit: "It also has helped promote a positive growing relationship between the various educational communities in Pagosa and has been successful as a result of that positive collaboration."

"I have a passion for building community relationships —my heart is all about building and supporting community, and I have the privilege of doing so in my role as principal with PFS," said Parker.

Too, the parents of those enrolled in PFS are also pleased, with Parker gathering numerous positive testimonials during the program.

"I love the students at family school. Seeing students interact in conversations while doing art projects or playing on the playground makes me feel like we have become a family. My own girls love the content and warm atmosphere provided by the other teachers. They are becoming better singers, Spanish speakers and artists. But most of all, they are becoming more confident by gaining new sk.lls in a fun environment," one mother said.

Another wrote, "My daughter loves her Spanish class through Pagosa

Family School! She comes home speaking Spanish afterwards. I think it is wonderful that she has been given this opportunity in our small town."

"I am SO grateful for the extra educational opportunities that Pagosa Family School has provided for my children!" ano her wrote. "They are learning SO much, and LOVE PFS (so much so, that they're bummed if they have to stay home sick because they 'don't want to miss Family School!'). My kids are talking to each other in Spanish all the time (and this is their 1st year taking any Spanish ever, and the year hasn't even ended yet!), and teaching me Spanish too! My sonis always excited about the new techniques he's learning in Art class, and [my] daughter is singing all the songs she learns in Choir, at home. It's definitely enriched, not only their lives, but mine as well! And, at no extra cost to me! (As otherwise, I don't know if they'd be able to take advantage of this opportunity). We are truly BLESSED by the PFS, [its] staff and teachings. ... I can only imagine the way it's blessing the community in the way of the students and families it's touching."

Each spring, the program surveys families to determine future course offerings for electives, Parker wrote, "We have big dreams of being able to build our program by adding a wider variety of courses, in addition to our core of Spanish Art & Music, to allow more and more students in Archuleta County to be involved in the program. We hope to be able to offer electives that may not be offered in the mainstream classroom, thus adding extra opportunities for all students in Archuleta County."

Pueblo Community College Southwest

Learning technical skills, achieving a higher level of education and earning an associate degree and/or technical training certificate is a very real possibility while living in Pagosa Springs.

What once was a smattering of vocational, technical and online studies has now been gathered under the umbrella of Pueblo Community College (PCC) Southwest.

Based in Pueblo, Colo., PCC has been offering community outreach education and training programs in the area for more than 30 years.

PCC Southwest, a comprehensive two-year college, has two locations: The Southwest Campus is located in Mancos, just one mile west of the Mesa Verde National Park turnoff, and the Durango site is located on the campus of Durango High School

PCC Southwest operates its locations with the aid of a regional advisory board with representatives from local counties, including Archuleta, Dolores, La Plata and Montezuma. The diverse regional representation assists PCC in highlighting the needs of local communities, such as workforce demands and education interests.

Courses can be taken on campus or online and all classes are accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

Seeds of Learning is open Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and is open year round. The center is located close to the downtown area and provides an educational, nurturing environment for children and parents.

Tri-County Head Start

Tri-County Head Start has provided quality early childhood education programs at 10 sites throughout Southwestern Colorado for over 40 years. Each year, over 50 enrolled children from ages 3-5 in the Pagosa Springs' region benefit from daily activities helping them grow mentally, emotionally, physically and socially.

Considering rural oncology is tremendously underserved, with

70 percent of the counties in the U.S. having no direct access to cancer care, PSMC's cancer center is a crucial achievement for the Pagosa Springs area.

We have a unique population that previously had limited access to cancer care. For example, veterans in Pagosa Springs previously had to travel to Albuquerque to receive treatments. Now, residents of Pagosa Springs and the surrounding area have access to medical oncology services at the Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders at PSMC.

The center has most modern diagnostic capabilities and an infusion center consisting of experienced infus on nurses and support staff that offer modern medical cancer therapies including chemotherapy, hormonal therapy, immunotherapy, along with supportive treatments for blood and auto-im nune disorders. The center offers the latest treatments for patients, with individ-

ual treatment plans, at a level of experience not ofter available in rural areas, and PSMC's cancer center team collaborates with other institutions, including major cancer centers, as needed or as appropriate to best address patient needs.

Nationwide, the increase in new cancer rates statistically outpaces the increase of new oncologists who treat cancer. The Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders has found new ways to tackle that issue by means of a true collaborative effort within PSMC by using primary care and advanced practitioners more effectively in order to provide quality care, not only to cancer patients, but to patients with non-cancerous blood disorders. This effective collaboration is a desire to create a model for rural oncology for a county with limited resources — and the center is succeeding.

Dr. Jordan has been thoroughly impressed by the collaborative effort of such talent at PSMC, as well as the support of the community.

In addition to Dr. Jordan, the cancer center team includes Dr. Tjan, hematologist and oncologist; Dr. Tinguely, surgery; Kelly Cesary, advanced practice oncology nurse; Lauren Muir, doctor of physical therapy and certified lymphedema therapist; Christina Reeves, director of pharmacy and admin strative director for The Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders; and Bill Wasserman, PharmD oncology pharmacist.

The cancer team works together to develop an integrated treatment plan specific to each patient. They provide patients with a personalized, coordinated health plan with access to advanced technologies, groundbreaking oncological and hematological treatments, and compassionate medical care.

So what is next for the center? The Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders at PSMC, in its second year cf operation, will continue to provide quality care, expand community awareness and will strive toward expanding its technology to provide radiation treatment.







Building a future:

Building trades classes crafts options for students

As students go through the ranks of high school, and graduation is soon staring them in the face, many have choices to make

For some, that may mean going off to a college or university to further their education, but for others, they may want to dive headfirst into the workforce waters.

At Pagosa Springs High School, an effort was made to incorporate more classes that were aimed at students who aim to do more handson work in the form of building trades classes.

Building trades teacher Torry Hessman explained that these classes were created in part because of the demands of the local industry.

"We couldn't find young, skilled labor," he explained.

If the local school system is able to "grow its own" skilled laborers, that might help with some of the issues that local contractors were facing with finding young workers, Hessman added.

The Pagosa Area Builders Committee, now known as Build Pagosa, went to Archuleta School District to see what could be done about this issue, he described further.

This movement led to not only building trades classes being implemented at Pagosa Springs High School, but other classes such as culinary arts as well.

For Hessman, these classes are important because it gives the kids an opportunity to live and work in Pagosa Springs while making a decent living wage.

"The summer work program allows these kids to kind of test the waters," he said.

It also gives the employers a chance to watch these kids grow and develop into skilled workers and lets them see who they would like to hire when they graduate, Hessman added.

For kids who are new to these classes, some intimidation is felt, but once the students get confidence, they realize they have the skill set to use the tools and it makes all the difference, Hessman noted.

The kids who took part in the summer work program saw the fruits of their labor, according to Hessman, with some earning promotions and being asked to come back and work again next summer.

Getting here from there

Stevens Field Airport

Archuleta County's Stevens Field, located just 3 miles west of downtown Pagosa Springs, is one of the most scenic airports around.

In addition to beauty, the airport boasts a fully lit asphalt runway that is 100 feet wide and 8,100 feet long. That runway has aircraft weight capacities of 70,000 pounds for dualwheel gear and 59,000 pounds for singlewheel gear. Flight safety at the high-altitude, general aviation airport is reinforced with a Precision Approach Path Indicator system.

The airport has seen a great deal of improvement over the years. In 2006, workers widened and resurfaced Runway 10/19 and built a new fixed-base operations building at midfield to provide fuel and services to local and visiting aircraft. In 2008, a new 3,000-foot parallel taxiway was constructed. In 2013, Archuleta County acquired additional snow removal equipment solely to be used at the airport. Alongside the other improvements, new hangars have appeared, an Automated Weather Observation System (AWOS) has been installed, and the airport identifier became KPSO

In keeping with its commitment to Archuleta County and Stevens Field, the Federal Aviation Administration also completed and published a GPS instrument approach for pilot use during nighttime and low-visibility landings.

In 2015, nearly \$6 million was spent to extend the parallel taxiway and complete other associated projects, further increasing the efficiency of aircraft movement and safety.

Those improvements have not only increased safety, but have also helped solidify the airport's status as an economic driver for the community. According to an Economic Impact Study completed by the airport's advisory committee, for every dollar Archuleta County invests in the airport, the county receives a return of \$10.86.

The airport facility also boasts a private, onsite maintenance shop in one of the hangars.

Fixed-Base Operator

For aviation services or to visit Avjet Corporation, the fixed-base operator, travel 3 miles west of town, then approximately 1 mile no thwest on Piedra Road (CR 600). Turn right (northeast) on Cloman Boulevard and proceed to 61 Aviation Court.

The FBO offers a number of amenities, including restrooms, telephone, shower

facilities, a flight-planning room, pilot snooze room, Internet, vending nachines, catering services, coffee, a lounge area, heated hangar and more. Avjet also provides fuel, Avgas and Jet-A rated fuel.

The Durango-La Plata County Airport offers daily service with American Airlines and United Airlines. The airport offers a full range of services within the terminal to make your visit comfortable. The aimport has short- and long-term parking, full rental car services and shuttle/taxis.

The airport is located 60 miles from Pagosa Springs at the intersection of Airport Road and County Road 309A, approximately 1 mile from County Road 309.

The Parks of Pagosa

The employees of the Pagosa Springs Parks and Recreat on Department take great personal pride in their stewardship of the town's facilities and amenities.

The parks of Pagosa Springs run the gamut from the wild and natural pine forest on Reservoir Hill to the well-manicured fields of Yamaguchi Park. What follows is a list of each park and a description of what it has to offer.

Reservoir Hill

The most prominent physical feature of the downtown area, Reservoir Hill towers over the south bank of the San Juan River and is distinguished by the large green water tank visible from U.S. 16C.

The park is accessible from three trailheads — located across the highway from the River Center, behind the Healing Waters Spa and next to the U.S. Post Office — and offers miles of hiking and biking trails ranging from gentle and peaceful to steep and technical.

A large meadow right next to the water tank is the home to two of Pagosa's largest musical events: The Folk 'N Bluegrass event takes place in early June and the Four Corners Folk Festival over Labor Day weekend. A large, wooden gazebo in the festival meadow is available to rent for special occasions such as weddings or reunions.

Located one-fourth of a mile east of the gazebo is an overlook that allows one to overlook the town and see stunning views.

Reservoir Hill is also home to one of the best disc golf ccurses in the region, featuring 18 baskets, 18 regular tee boxes and 18 alternative tee boxes for those experts looking for a bit more challenging game.

There are restrooms available on the hill.

Centennial Park

Centennial Park stretches along the river behind the Archuleta County courthouse, and includes several tables for enjoying a nice family picnic while watching the activities in the river and the hot springs beyond. A pedestrian bridge provides a continuous connection for the Riverwalk that winds through the wetlands behind Town Hall and the Ross Aragon Community Center. A pedestrian bridge at the other end of the park connects to The Springs Resort and Spa.

Town Park

On the southeast corner of the U.S. 160/Hot Springs Boulevard intersection, Town Park connects to Centennial Park via the Riverwalk and contains a wind harp, bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a playground, two special-event 200-amp electrical services, a performance space with stage and a white-water feature in the adjacent river.

The park and the athletic field across Hermosa Street host several events throughout the year, including the Fourth of July Park 2 Park Arts and Crafts Fair, ColorFest and the Mountain Chile Cha Cha.

Yamaguchi Park

Located on South 5th Street between Pagosa Springs High School and the river, Yamaguchi Park is home to a favorite hangout for local kids — the Pagosa Skate Park. The Skaters Coalition for Concrete, a local grassroots organization formed over a decade ago raised funds and added a full-sized bowl to the 4,500 square-foot concrete terrain.

The park was designed to appeal to skaters of all ability levels and includes several plaza elements and a bowl feature.

The park is open from dawn to dusk throughout the year, provided the skating surface is free of ice and snow in the winter months. To learn more about the skate park, or to find out when the annual skater competition and fundraiser will take place, visit www.facebook.com/skaterscoalition.

Another amenity of Yamaguchi Park is the kayak/raft launching facility and two whitewater features, complemented by the paved Riverwalk to facilitate viewing activities on the river.

A pump track was installed in 2017 south of the skate park for bicycle use and in 2018, an outdoor basketball court was installed.

A heated year-round restroom, drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills and picnic shelter allow for family 3 atherings, while a state-of-the-art playground and beautiful soccer and softball fields give plenty of room for the kids to play. A special-events and performance venue with electrical service is also available.

Mary Fisher Park

Along the south bank of the San Juan River dire:tly across from Town Park, and connected to it by another pedestrian bridge, Mary Fisher Park contains several picnic tables, as well as a changing screen for kayakers and inner tubers to use before hitting another one of the new whitewater river features.

River Center Park

Nestled behind the River Center shops on the east end of town (from U.S. 160 go behind the River Center buildings), the River Center Park contains two small fishing ponds with a handicap-accessible pier and access to the river for launching rafts and kayaks. The park also offers a playground climbing structure for kids.

South Pagosa Park

A true neighborhood park located on the south side of town on Apache Street between 7th and 8th streets, South Pagosa Park has bathrooms, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, barbecue grills, a picnic shelter, horseshoe pits, a playground and four pickleball courts. An ice rink is available during the winter months. The park is well used by local families.



Relocating your animals

Moving to a new town with your pets can be an exciting adventure with many new discoveries. It can also be a bit stressful for you and your pets leaving behind the familiar. For peace of mind, plan ahead for your pet's safety during the move. There are many Internet sources of good information on how to safely move your pets, as well as great tips on how to help your dogs or cats acclimate to their new home.

Before you move, make sure that your pets are healthy and up to date on their vaccinations. If you are moving from out of state with dogs or cats, Colorado requires that you have a Centificate of Veterinarian Inspection (CVI) that is no more than 30 days old. If your cat or dog is three months or older, they must also have had a rabies vaccination within the preceding 12 months. For livestock and other animal requirements, visit the Colorado Department of Agriculture website (colorado.gov/ag).

Part of moving involves gathering all your important personal documents. Make sure you do the same for your pets. Have all of their health and vaccination records on hand so that when you choose a local veterinarian you can provide your new vet with your pets' medical histories.

Losing a pet can be nerve-wracking. The Humane Society of Pagosa Springs (HSPS) operates the only animal shelter in the area, located at 465 Cloman Blvd. The shelter is open seven days a week. A call to the animal shelter at (970) 731-4771 should be one of your first steps in finding a lost pet.

The HSPS website (humanesociety.biz) hosts detailed information on what to do if you and your pet become separated. Check the website's "Lost and Found" page for a list of useful suggestions. The website also has information on adoptions, low-cost spay/neuter voucher programs and other community services.

To aid in finding a lost pet, make sure that your pet always wears a secure collar with a sturdy identification tag attached. The ID tag should contain your name and contact information, including information on rabies vaccination. If you are moving, make sure the tag has your current cell phone number. Secondly, have a microchip inserted in your pet. This aids identification if your pet's collar is lost or removed. The HSPS animal shelter scans every incoming pet for a microchip. Make sure you have registered your pet's chip with the manufacturer, and update your microchip contact information with your new address and relevant phone numbers right before you move. If your pet does not have a microchip, the HSPS can provide one at low cost.

Pagosa Springs and Archuleta County do not require licensing for dogs or cats at this time. You are, however, required to have a current rabies vaccination for your pets. While the Town of Pagosa Springs does have a leash law, Archuleta County does not. You are required to have your dog under control at all times, whether by leash or verbal command. If you want to exercise and play with your dog in a safe, controlled environment there is a fenced community-accessible dog park at HSPS animal shelter.

If you are purchasing property in Pagosa Country, make sure you check for additional pet regulations or restrictions in the covenants of your property owners association. Keep in mind, too, that regardless of where you live, some homeowner insurance policies have certain dog breed exclusions, so check your insurance policy for pet restrictions.

Pets are important members of our community, and Pagosa Springs is one of the most animal-friendly places that you will find in all of Colorado.

Home to **Outdoor Enthusiasts**

Pagosa Springs has the privilege of enjoying four distinct seasons, each one playing host to myriad activities. Participating injoutdoor activities is like being a kid in a candy store, with appealing options no matter the season. Groups like the San Juan Outdoor Club and Grav Wolves offer activities all year long in a group setting. Face a challenging hike up Pagosa Peak or head out on a hut-to-hut excursion with like-minded enthusiasts and capitalize on the over 3 million acres of national forest and wilderness areas surrounding Pagosa.

When the days begin to warm up, resident activities exemplify the phrase "spring fever." Walking around town or taking a quick trip up Reservoir Hill on your lunch hour gets everyone in the mood for summer. As the snow begins to melt and the river rises, kayak and rafting enthusiasts hit the river. The San Juan River boasts several developed water features downtown. There is also improved fishing access and ongoing habitat improvements along the river through town. Fish are plentiful in Pagosa waters, with species including catfish, bass, pike and a variety of trout. Hikes in the lower elevations, perhaps around the Piedra River Trail, are a great way to break in the season and relish the beauty of the first signs of spring. Usually by April cyclists abound, enjoying moderate rides together to get in shape for the season. Spring also brings out birding enthusiasts who tag and identify which species have returned to beautiful Pagosa.

Summer brings out the athlete in us all with warm days, cool nights and typically excellent weather conditions. Summer is perfect for just about every sport, especially hiking, mountain and road b king, and running. Summer also means motorcycle rides, offroading and camping in gorgeous locations. Pagosa Springs boasts a wonderful 27-hole golf course, two 18-hole disc golf courses located on Reservoir Hill and at Cloman Community Park and one nine-hole disc golf course in Aspen Springs. Boaters enjoy cruising on Navajo Lake, which spans the Colorado and New Mexico border. Horse enthusiasts head to the Western Heritage Event Center to compete in team roping and rodeo events.

Many of the activities of summer continue into the fall. Athletes get

to enjoy the stunning hues of changing leaves as they add another layer of clothing in the evenings. The temperate weather mixed with the gorgeous colors is just another incentive to get out and enjoy the outdoors.

Winter is just as active as the other seasons. For the alpine skier, Wolf Creek Ski Area is just 24 miles away and is known for its radical powder days. The volunteer Nordic Club has developed and grooms an extensive system of trails for classic and skate skiing. Snowed-over hiking trails become excellent snowshoeing trails in the winter. If you feel the need for speed, the Wolf Creek Trailblazers snown obile club is out and about enjoying the hundreds of miles in the backcountry. Consider ice skating or checking out the plethora of sledding h.lls in the area.







Voter & Vehicle Registration

Motor vehicles

In making your transition from another state to Colorado or from another Colorado county, we would like to help in making the registration of your vehicle as easy as possible.

Colorado law requires you to register your vehicles, trailers, motor homes, heavy equipment, etc. within 60 days of becoming a Colorado resident. Unfortunately, the law does not allow you to keep your out-of-state plates until they expire.

If you are currently a Colorado resident and are just moving here, you may call the Archuleta County Clerk's office and they will help you change your registration address so you will receive a renewal notice from Archuleta County when your plate; expire.

Some of the most obvious reasons that, by law, constitute becoming a resident are: obtaining a Colorado driver's license, registering to vote, enrolling children into school or becoming employed. If you are retired and consider this your legal place of residence and intend to file your federal income tax with a Pagosa Springs address as your legal address, you need Colorado plates.

To obtain Colorado license plates, you will need:

- 1. A current registration or title from the state you are coming from.
 - 2. Proof of Insurance.
- 3. A vehicle identification verification done by any law enforcement officer. The sheriff's office is located at 777 County Road 600 and charges \$10 (cash or check) for this service.
 - 4. An acceptable form of ID.

Vehicle registration in Colorado is based on the year, weight and taxable value of the vehicle, when new. The taxable value is then depreciated according to the age of the vehicle The office is located at 449 San Juan St., in the east side of the courthouse.

The nearest place to obtain a Colorado driver's license is Durango, approximately 60 miles west of Pagosa Springs. The DMV is located at 329 S. Camino del Rio. You may contact their office at (970) 247-4591.
