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Dr. Jennifer Crozier, MD, is a hematologist/oncologist at Jacksonville's newly opened Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center. An Atlanta native, she fell in love with the First Coast after completing her residency and fellowship at Mayo Clinic. Crozier's ambitions in the medical field were all but a birthright, and she is constantly looking to the ever-progressing research in the field to help put an end to breast cancer.

Are you originally from the First Coast?

I am originally from Atlanta and went to the University of Georgia, where the Georgia vs. Florida football game was my first introduction to Jacksonville. I knew that after I graduated from medical school from the Medical College of Georgia that I wanted to move to the First Coast for my residency. After completing residency and fellowship at the Mayo Clinic, my husband and I knew the First Coast was the only choice.

How did you first become interested in medicine?

My parents have a great story about their parent-teacher conference with my first-grade teacher, where I had informed my teacher that I was going to be a doctor and she asked me if there was anything else I was interested in and I told her no. I had the opportunity to observe some doctors at a young age and it really impressed me how they could be so caring at such a difficult time in people's lives.

What prompted you to pursue a career in hematology/ oncology?

In medical school, I was most fascinated by the lectures in

oncology and the complex nature of cancer care. One of my first patients in medical school was a patient with advanced breast cancer. The relationship that I built with her and her family helped solidify my interest in caring for cancer patients. It was also at that time that I became interested in conducting research to find new and better treatment options.

The new Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center just opened in Jacksonville one year ago. What do you feel the benefits of the partnership between Baptist Health and MD Anderson have been?

The Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center is an amazing addition to the First Coast and the Southeast. This partnership combines the unique and extensive network of Baptist Health, the "most preferred" health care provider in the Jacksonville area, with the state of the art personalized cancer care of the number one ranked cancer center in the United States according to U.S. News & World Report. The multidisciplinary team approach employed at our center provides individualized comprehensive care utilizing the latest technology and research.

Has there been any promising new research in the hematology/oncology field?

Research in the hematology/oncology field is evolving quickly. There are discoveries daily and technology and research are changing the way cancer is diagnosed and treated. My research has focused on breast cancer and the development of new treatments. We continue to make progress in the treatment of breast cancer but will not stop until no patients are dying of breast cancer.

What do you find most rewarding about your work as a hematologist oncologist?

Working with patients with cancer is my passion and by far the most rewarding part of my career. Hearing the diagnosis of cancer is one of the worst moments in someone's life. During this difficult time, I want to decrease the anxiety of the diagnosis as much as possible. I enjoy spending time educating my patients on their illness and the options for treatment that we have available.

What do you enjoy most about living on the First Coast?

The weather here is incredible and allows us to enjoy year-round outdoor activities, but our favorite thing about the First Coast is the people. Everyone is so kind and friendly it felt immediately like home. We enjoy the sporting and cultural events and continually evolving culinary options. The First Coast is amazing and I have enjoyed my last six years here and cannot wait to continue to be part of this vibrant community for many years to come.

What do you like to do in your spare time?

There is so much to do and see I feel like we haven't even scratched the surface. We love walking our golden retriever down the beach at Mickler's Landing. We enjoy attending concerts at the St. Augustine Amphitheater and Ponte Vedra Concert Hall. We are discovering all the amazing restaurants including the fantastic seafood at Aqua Grill and I've recently started Pure Barre at Sawgrass Village.

In 2015 alone, more than 18,000 children and adults were helped by BEAM's services, more than half a million pounds of food was distributed to BEAM families and 855 children received school supplies, clothing and shoes through its school supply drive.



"Last year, our counseling services increased by 130 percent, reports into our Rape Crisis Unit increased by 32 percent and we had a 55 percent increase in the nights at shelter, so this is still a very serious problem in our community," Mahr says. "Events like the 5K allow people to contribute in the effort to help victims of domestic and sexual abuse in a fun way, knowing they are helping provide support services to the women, men and children we help every year."

Betty Griffin Center shelters up to 350 victims of domestic and sexual abuse annually, operates a 24-hour crisis helpline, provides professional counseling for victims of domestic and sexual abuse, provides age-appropriate violence prevention training and operates two thrift stores at Julington Square and Anastasia Square to assist in funding the agency's ongoing operations

Robert Byars agreed. "I stand before you at 28 a college graduate, a husband, homeowner and father of three beautiful children," he told attendees. "A stable foundation is the basis for a successful life. (Executive Director) Terri Florio is a maternal figure and a pillar of support to everyone up here."

The evening also focused on the future, as foundation officials presented \$59,000 in college scholarships to current program participants, who told attendees about the impact the foundation is already having in their young lives.

"If I hadn't attended (MWYF) I probably wouldn't have set goals in life," said Terry Thomas-Jacobs, recipient of the George M. Soper Student Athlete of the Year scholarship award.

A student at Robert E. Lee High School, Thomas-Jacobs said he enjoyed participating in the foundation's tennis and tutoring programs as well as educational field trips, one of which took students to a local jail.

"It informed me that I never want to go to jail – ever," he said. "It also made me appreciate my mom's home cooking. I'd like to thank my mom and my coaches for helping me become the young man I am today."

Washington told attendees that his reason for starting the foundation was "selfish."

"I love watching young people succeed," he said,."I love putting young people in situations that are uncomfortable and watching them excel."



Dr. Ben Carson believes God has a sense of humor.

Coming full circle:

The acclaimed pediatric neurosurgeon – famed for being the first doctor to successfully separate twins conjoined at the head – told attendees at his Florida Forum presentation Oct. 25 that as a youth he struggled both academically and with a temper that threatened to send his life down a dark and troubled path. After praying that God would grant him wisdom, Carson found his perspective transformed by reading from the book of Proverbs, which was written by King Solomon.

"My middle name is Solomon," Carson noted. "So God knew that I was going to have an affinity for the book of Proverbs and Solomon."

The connection went even further. "Solomon was famous for his wisdom and for telling the two women who fought over a baby to divide it in half," he continued. "And that's how I became very well known – for dividing a baby. So, I think God has a sense of humor!"

Carson's story held particular significance for members of The Women's Board of Wolfson Children's Hospital, which was founded in the 1970s after twin girls Annie and Abbie Martin were born prematurely and the hospital lacked the equipment needed to care for both infants. As a result, Abbie lived just eight days. Since that time, The Women's Board has raised more than \$28 million to support the hospital's program and equipment needs through fundraising events such as the Florida Forum speaker series.

Thanks in part to that support, in 2015 Wolfson Children's Hospital was the facility at which conjoined twins Conner and Carter Mirabal were successfully separated. Now at home with their parents, the twins were backstage briefly at Carson's Florida Forum presentation – an experience that organizers said felt like The Women's Board had "come full circle."

"What a poignant evening this is for us," said Grace Sarber, president of The Women's Board and the older sister of Annie and Abbie Martin. "To have this renowned pediatric neurosurgeon visit our hospital and to hear about his life and his perspective on medicine, it was really just the perfect way to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Florida Forum."

Robin Albaneze, who co-chairs the Florida Forum series with Judy D'Antignac, agreed. "To have Dr. Carson here and to see how far we've come," she said, "it just makes your heart sing."

Harnessing potential

Carson said the most rewarding part of his recent presidential campaign was having an opportunity to meet some of the 15,000 patients on whom he operated during his 29-year career as a pediatric neurosurgeon. At an appearance in Kentucky, for example, Carson was approached by a family who pointed to a young man in his 20s and said, "Do you recognize this young man?...You operated on his brain when he was a year old and he just





graduated from college, number one in his class."

At another event, a young woman told Carson, "You operated on me when I was still in my mother's womb."

"That's why no one will ever convince me that what's in a woman's womb is a meaningless bunch of cells," Carson said.

Carson also addressed the nation's current political climate and stressed that Americans must be unified if our country and its people are to realize their full potential.

"We the American people are not each other's enemies," he said. "Because there really are people out there who want to destroy us."

America is unique on the world stage, Carson said, because our founding documents are based on Judeo-Christian values and an inherent belief in right and wrong that is currently being sacrificed at the altar of political correctness.

"The secular progressive movement, they don't care if you disagree with them as long as you sit down and shut up," he said. "If America is to remain 'One Nation Under God,' then it's time for people who believe that to stand up and shout out."

In order for America to remain competitive with other countries, Carson said, it is imperative for all Americans to have the opportunity to climb out of poverty and become part of the fabric of society.

"When we look at the myriad young people wasting time, we begin to understand how important it is for us to cultivate that talent," he said. "And isn't that what real success is – using the talent God has given you to elevate other people?"

The 25th anniversary season of the Florida Forum continues on Jan. 30, 2017 with a presentation by FOX News Anchor Megyn Kelly. The series will conclude March 13, 2017 with an evening with Tim Tebow.

The 1865 Victorian had seen better days.

By the time St. Augustine businessman David Corneal purchased the boarded up building at 102 Bridge St. in the city's Lincolnville neighborhood, the home had been stripped of both its historic character and its dignity, serving at various times as a gas station and convenience store before being shut down in an organized crime raid in 2010.

To witness the home today, therefore, is to appreciate both the full extent of its transformation and the aptness of the name of the restaurant that now calls it home. Open since April, Preserved has given new life to the former home of Thomas Jefferson's greatgranddaughter while preserving Southern cuisine, albeit with a French influence.

The response from both residents and patrons has been enthusiastic.

"It's been overwhelmingly amazing, really," Front of House Manager Francesca Cooper says. "Everyone is really excited – excited about the house because it was under construction for two years, and excited about what we're doing in the kitchen."

From the gracious front porch and understated dining room to the picturesque outdoor dining patio, Preserved evokes a genteel Southern history updated for modern times – a feeling that carries over to the cuisine. From the "pickle wall" featuring preserved pickles, asparagus, radishes and okra – to the in-house charcuterie board, Preserved takes its name seriously, and reflects the commitment of Executive Chef Brian Whittington, well-known for his tenure as executive chef at Jacksonville's acclaimed Restaurant Orsay.

"It's really important to him to have locally sourced ingredients," Cooper says. "With the in-house charcuteries, it's important to him that the staff appreciate every being on the planet and know that nothing goes to waste."

To that end, Preserved's supper menu features locally caught fish with Conagree & Penn rice middlins, shrimp and grits featuring Anson Mills antebellum grits, Black Hog Farms chicken, Maple Leaf Farms duck breast and more.

Lunch offerings include a shrimp po' boy, chicken with black-eyed pea and corn salad and a corn flour-fried fish sandwich, while the brunch menu includes house-made lemon scones, banana bread French toast with fresh berries and spiced pecans, chicken and potato hash, a variety of omelets and more.

"All of our staff are just insanely talented," says Cooper, who notes that customers have been pleased with both the cuisine and Preserved's commitment to superior customer service that includes inquiring about and recognizing special occasions with a complimentary glass of wine or dessert.

"People are just amazed at how much attention we're paying to their needs," she says. "Then they get the food and it's just icing on the cake."

The second course is a large fish of seabass, prepared simply with coarse salt, olive oil and lemon. This is served with vegetables that can include cauliflower, spinach and broccoli.

The desserts include the Pandoro, Panettone, Torrone and Pan Giallo, which is purchased at a special store in Rome.

The dinner is filled with family, friends and is a lively celebration of conversation that ends with the sharing of gifts right before the Mass. Santa Claus is not the central figure in giving gifts in Italy. Rather, it is the special gifts given by family members that









are meaningful and shared. It is the Epiphany on Jan. 6 where the children throughout Italy receive gifts from the Befana, or "good witch." Legend has it that the Befana was visited by the three Magi or wise men on their way to visit baby Jesus. She offered them lodging and they invited her to join them. She declined then changed her mind and tried to find the wise men to bring a gift for the baby Jesus. Today, she flies around on her broom on the feast of the Epiphany to give gifts to children!

Christmas Day in Italy begins with the celebration of Christ's birth during Mass from 11 a.m. to noon, followed by the traditional all-meat luncheon where lamb and roast potatoes are served.

Chronicling the adventures of Babbo Natale (Santa Claus) in Italian tradition, Taddei illustrated the holiday collection as an homage to time honored traditions of penning letters to Santa, chopping wood for fire and delivering presents from chimney to chimney.

"It's nice and it's special because ... these are stories," Taddei explained. "Each story ... it (means) something to me, but it will mean something to other people as well. People can create their own stories and their own memories with each piece."


During the event, Taddei signed and dated pieces of the handmade, hand painted collection and posed for photos with fans of his work. The artist's extensive line of Father Christmas-adorned décor, linens and dishware dotted Pineapple Post's main floor space with the sometimes-silly musings of Taddei's childhood. On one piece, an exhausted St. Nick slumps against a rooftop after trekking through snow with a sack full of gifts. On another, he eyes a smiling gingerbread man in contemplation. All are created in the artist's signature watercolor-like style, and Taddei welcomes the nostalgia they bring to those who see them.

"I created them with my own (memories) in mind, the stories I heard as a child," he said. "And I hope other people ... feel their own memories when they see them."

Caramel and Pecan Fudge

C. butter
 C. light brown sugar
 C. heavy whipping cream
 1/3 C. dulce de leche
 4 C. sifted powdered sugar
 C. chopped pecans

Bring 1 cup of butter and 1 cup of light brown sugar to the boil.

Stir in 1/4 cup of heavy whipping cream and a 1/3 cup of Dulce de leche and take off heat once stirred through. Add 4 cups of sifted powdered sugar and mix well using an electric mixer.

Mix through 1 cup of chopped pecans and press fudge into lined pan then place in the fridge to harden. Cut into squares and box for great gifts!





Graham crackers or other cookies, crushed 100g dark chocolate 1 bag marshmallows 1 can evaporated milk

Make a pie base using crushed Graham crackers or other preferred cookies and one stick of melted butter. Place in the fridge while preparing the filling.

Melt 100g of good quality dark chocolate with a bag of marshmallows until it is melted smoothly together. Don't overheat the marshmallows otherwise it will become too chewy! Blend in a tin of evaporated milk until you have a velvety chocolate flow.

Pour the mixture into the cookie base and allow to set overnight.

Top with heavy whipped cream and decorate with, if you can get your hands on, a crushed Nestle peppermint crisp chocolate bar otherwise some peppermint bark!

3 eggs

- \cdot C. sugar
- · C. oil
- · C. cocoa
- 1 C. boiling water
- 1 C. all-purpose flour
- 3 t. baking powder

100g grated peppermint bark

Beat together 3 eggs, 3/4 cup of sugar and 1/2 cup of oil until light in color.

Blend in 3/4 cup of cocoa dissolved in 1 cup of boiling water.


Sift 1 cup of all purpose flour and 3 tsp baking powder and mix until incorporated.





In July 1967, Ted Johnson and George Ballis sat in an empty lot on Beach Boulevard in Jacksonville, chatting over coffee at an elegant table set with fine china and a candelabra, and envisioning the future.

Alhambra Theatre & Dining.

Nearly 50 years later, the dinner theatre they built on that spot has become a beloved local institution and the longest-running dinner theater in the country. Now, as the Alhambra Theatre & Dining prepares to launch its 50th anniversary season, the theatre is embracing its past and celebrating a bright future with the theme "Looking back. Looking forward." To that end, the golden anniversary season will begin with a limitedrun presentation of "Come Blow Your Horn" – the first show ever performed at The Alhambra back in 1967. What's more, the show set to open Jan. 4, 2017 will be offered at a special 50th anniversary price of two tickets for \$50.

The season will feature "Gilligan's Island" star Dawn Wells in "Steel Magnolias," Morgan Fairchild in "Dixie Swim Club" and such popular musicals as "Showboat," "Dreamgirls," "Annie" and more. Both Wells and Fairchild performed at the Alhambra back in the 1960s and 1970s.



The season will also be punctuated by special events, including a signing party for the Alhambra's commemorative coffee table book in December 2016 and a 50th Anniversary Birthday Bash in December 2017.

"For 50 years The Alhambra has been a place of Broadway-quality shows and fine meals, but the Alhambra really is more of a place where people make memories," Managing Partner Craig Smith says. "This theater is where we go to celebrate birthdays and anniversaries; it is where people came for the prom; it is the place of first dates and marriage proposals. Recently, the Alhambra has even been a place where people get married."

A JACKSONVILLE TRADITION

Opened in 1967 as The Alhambra Dinner Theater, the Alhambra has hosted nationally known entertainers such as Tony Curtis, Claude Aiken, Sid Caesar and Cesar Romero, and more recently the likes of Loretta Swit, Barry Williams, Jamie Farr, Sally Struthers, Joyce DeWitt, Michael Learned, Barbara Eden, Lisa Whelchel and Mike Farrell. It has been a place of beginnings and endings: Former Miss America Leanza Cornett got her start at the Alhambra at age 15, while pin-up idol Betty Grable made her last theatrical appearance at the theater.

"When I walk through this theater, I can almost hear the voices of the memories," Smith says. "Some say the Alhambra is haunted and those are the voices of the ghosts, but I say she just shares a lot of stories - and a lot of joy."

Over the years, however, attendance waned and the theater's subscriber base dwindled from a peak of 4,500 to fewer than 500. In November 2009, Smith and his partners purchased the theater and began an overhaul that included changing the name and replacing the traditional buffet dinner with a seated, high-quality dining experience featuring menus tied to the theme of the evening's performance.

"We wanted to change every aspect of this experience, to make the Alhambra not just relevant again, but to make it a leader in Jacksonville's cultural renaissance," Smith says. "We broke the mold and started over, but still managed to keep the charm, passion and joy to which our guests had become accustomed."

Today, Alhambra shows regularly boast 80 to 90 percent capacity – including several sold out shows in recent years – and its subscriber base has grown to nearly 5,000. The theater employs more than 70 full-time staff and donates tens of thousands of dollars and tickets annually to area charities.

"Our job isn't just to sell seats to a great show – it's to be part of this community and supportive of things that are meaningful to our guests," says Smith. "We can only take credit for putting a good product together. I give all the credit to the Jacksonville community for rallying around this old girl and putting her back on the map. It's a journey that isn't finished, but we're off to a good start...that's more than 50 years in the making."

The Beaches Oktoberfest returned to Jacksonville Beach's Sea Walk Pavilion Oct. 14-16, bringing with it the brews, music and festivities for which the ocean-side festival has been known for three years.

Featuring a score of musical guests, locally made craft beers, food and attractions, the three-day festival enlivened the beach in its first celebration since Hurricane Matthew. Kicking off with Craftober, the largest festival of its kind in the nation, visitors were welcomed to taste brews made by more than 50 local breweries and listen to the sounds of The Movement and Cloud9 Vibes.

The festival continued Saturday with a packed musical lineup including the likes of local favorites The Band Be Easy and the Grammy-award winning Blues Traveler. With the weekend's festivities bolstered by a food truck village, brat eating competitions, a kids' "Kinderzone" and an arts market, many locals welcomed the opportunity to look to lighter activities in the face of Hurricane Matthew's destruction.

"I think it's just what the people here needed," said Lisa Moore, who decided to attend the festival for the first time after returning from an evacuation to a relative's home in Georgia. "I'm just happy we have a beach community to return to. Everyone's been in the process of ... trying to return to normal and just breathing a sigh of relief so this festival and all the events going on here came just in time."

The Jax Beach Fall Clean Up was one such event, kicking off Saturday morning just behind the pavilion with a goal of doubling last year's efforts where more than 200 people collected, extending a community tradition of conducting a series of cleanups to protect and beautify the beach and its inhabitants. The festival closed Oct. 16 after performances by headliner Collie Buddz and local bands Split Tone and Young For a Day in addition to the festival's annual Oktober 5K Beer Run.

Vendors, artists and visitors alike all expressed appreciation for the passion of the event's coordinators and the commitment of the community to thrive, even in the face of adversity.

"It's just a nice reminder that the Jax Beach community is always lively, always fun and always ... here for one another," said Moore. "As long as there's a will to support the art, music and business of this community there'll be a way."
