







Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach honors Deane Beman at annual Mineral City fundraiser

The Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach hosted its annual Mineral City fundraiser on Saturday, May 4, at TPC Sawgrass.

Attended by over 500 people, the Gatsby-themed event honored former PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane Beman with the club's "Rock of the Community Award" for his efforts in making Ponte Vedra Beach the golf destination and community it is today.

"We are so honored to be here tonight and honor Deane Beman for his vision that transformed Ponte Vedra Beach," Rotary Club President Vickie Cavey said. "His vision that has contributed \$100 million to charity in Northeast Florida. His vision that has had a \$3 billion impact."

A four-time PGA TOUR champion, Beman is widely credited with transforming professional golf into a billion-dollar sport with an international following during his tenure as PGA TOUR commissioner. Central to Beman's vision for the TPC tournament network was the mandate that each tournament would be a 501c3 nonprofit, with tournament proceeds donated to area charities in recognition of the vital role local volunteers played in making the tournaments happen.

In addition to receiving the award, Beman and his wife, Judy, were presented with rutilated quartz cufflinks and a rutilated quartz necklace from Miriam's Jewelry.

"I want to say first, not only is it an honor to be here, but I also want to make sure to thank all of you here tonight to support the Rotary Club and the beneficiaries that are so important to this community," Beman said. "My many thanks to all of you who have contributed to tonight and contributed all year long."

The primary beneficiary of the fundraiser was Beman's charity of choice, Vision is Priceless, a nonprofit organization that works to improve the visual health of children and adults in Northeast Florida through education, vision screenings, treatment and referrals. The club's fundraising efforts will also benefit numerous other nonprofits and organizations in the area.

The Ponte Vedra Beach Rotary Foundation has distributed \$1.5 million to area nonprofits. Some previous beneficiaries of the Foundation include Beaches Habitat for Humanity, BEAM, Betty Griffin Center, Bright Holidays, Community Hospice and Council on Aging, among several others.

In addition to honoring Beman, the Rotary fundraiser also featured entertainment by The Groov, BSweet Entertainment and a Social Affair Dance Studio; decorations by Mugwump Productions; a diamond necklace giveaway thanks to Miriam's Jewelry; five antique cars; a silent auction; and more. Ponte Vedra resident named chair of Advancement Committee for Atlantic Aquarium

There's a buzz about a new project happening in town. "It's a really good project for Jacksonville," Ponte Vedra Beach resident Scott Grant said. "It's one of the coolest things you'll ever see. When it opens, you're going to love it."

Grant is the chairman of the Advancement Committee for the nonprofit organization, Aqua Jax, and the project he's referring to is the potential construction of the new Atlantic Aquarium in Jacksonville.

With a vision to break ground in 2021 at the Shipyards, the Atlantic Aquarium aims to be the coming attraction of Jacksonville. With a state-of-the-art structure and cuttingedge, eco-friendly technology, the Atlantic Aquarium would not only be a new form of entertainment, but also a new and interactive way to educate the community.

"We absolutely want to study water, climate, weather and wildlife and we absolutely want to be on the cutting edge of renewable energy," Grant said. There is even talk of pumping water from the Atlantic Ocean into the aquarium, cleaning it, and pumping it back out to the ocean in better quality than it came in."

Young great white sharks and manatees are confirmed to be part of aquarium exhibits, with penguins being a huge possibility, according to the deputy director of the Jacksonville Zoo. Most marine mammals, however, such as dolphins and whales will not be held in captivity as it is considered inhumane and unethical, Grant said, with the exception of therapy dolphins that will be available to Wounded Warriors and those suffering from PTSD trauma.

Grant refers to the aquarium as the "Solar-Powered Stingray," in reference to the solar panels on the wings of the diagram.

Grant manages investments for a living and is a firm believer that investing in this "solar-powered stingray"

is well worth it and has the potential to generate about a billion dollars over 10 years.

"The talk right now is building it at the shipyards and when we build it, that whole area will revitalize before your very eyes," Grant said. "I mean hotels, restaurants, firms, businesses, everybody's going to want to be there because of this iconic structure on the St. Johns."

And new businesses mean new employment opportunities. Aside from job openings within the aquarium gift shop and cafes, jobs will open for marine biologists, ecologists and other environmental experts, Grant said.

"This is 20 million dollars worth of payroll. This is a big deal," Grant said, emphasizing the potential impact this will have on the city. "Eighty-eight million people come to Florida every year on vacation. 3.2 million of that come to Jacksonville. That's a huge potential market for us." wonder he was hired as chair of advancement, but how is he so sure about this project? "We have some advantages here that most aiting don't"

"We have some advantages here that most cities don't," Grant said. "I mean, we're sitting on a major river right next to the Atlantic. We have opportunities to study aquatic life and different waters. And there are actual dolphins that come into the St. Johns. Wow, I never thought about that, free-range dolphins. Swimming right off the edge of this thing."

Another advantage is honestly, Scott Grant, himself. A fellow "Carpetbagging Yankee," as he likes to say, Grant moved to Jacksonville 14 years ago and wants to see it evolve. The countless research and case studies he's looked into all show signs of growth and prosperity.

"Dubuque, Iowa has a population of 95,000 and has 480,000 visitors to their aquarium every year," he said.

Roscoe community marina requests approval to build

An applicant behind a potential community marina is seeking a zoning variance with the St. Johns County Land Development Code to allow for construction at 405 S. Roscoe extension, south of the Palm Valley Bridge.

According to the request for approval, the applicant is seeking a "relaxation" of the terms of code at the location, where a marina is prohibited from being constructed at the property. This is due to a 2002 marine study conducted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which determined where marinas would be the most environmentally sustainable and adequate for specific locations. In 2014, the county implemented the study into the Land Development Code. Currently, marinas are allowed from the eastern shore from ICW Marker 51 south. The proposed location is north of ICW Marker 51, which requires a request for zoning variance.

Casey Dendor, St. Johns County Growth Management planner, said there is a distinction between "community" marinas and "regular" marinas.

A true marina, Dendor said, allows for charter fishing, sight-seeing, boat repair, fueling and is generally more "intense" than a community marina. The proposed community marina will only allow for berthing or storage of boats, although there is an attached retail building, which could be a "restaurant or tackle shop," Dendor said.

The applicant, represented by Bartlett & Faulkner, P.A, argues that the variance would not be contrary to public interest

because there is a lack of facilities to store boats in an area that has grown exponentially since the study was conducted. The applicant also mentions that the study makes no distinction between marinas and community marinas.

The project intends to include 75 slips of unenclosed dry berthing storage, which the applicant suggests will create less of an environmental impact. Twelve wet slips will line the Intracoastal Waterway, although they are only for boaters to tie up and visit the retail shop on the property and not for overnight use. Overall, the applicant claims the planned facility will "further the goals and objectives of the St. Johns County Comprehensive Plan to provide goods and services at a size and scale appropriate to serve the surrounding community."

Currently, there are no public boat

storage facilities along the Intracoastal Waterway between St. Augustine and the Duval County line. Dendor, however, told the Recorder that there is indeed another application for an actual marina, (as opposed to a community) proposed north of the Palm Valley Bridge. The second marina is currently undergoing a major modification to the application, after its initial 2004 PUD expired.

The proposal for the marina will go before the St. Johns County Planning & Zoning Agency on May 16 at 1:30 p.m. at the St. Johns County Auditorium located at 500 San Sebastian View in St. Augustine. The prepared staff report and supporting documentation will also be uploaded to www.sjcfl.us/Calendars+/gm.aspx for public view by the end of day Friday, May 10. Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

I became a Christian in 1964 at a Young Life camp. I was involved in Young Life in high school and then involved in Campus Crusade in college. Four of us, led by Ander Crenshaw, started Campus Crusade at the University of Florida. Then, I went off to seminary and got two degrees from Western Seminary in Portland, Oregon, a master's in divinity and a master's in theology. I came back here and started the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in Jacksonville. They had done some stuff a few years earlier, but it had kind of fallen apart, so it had to be raised up again. I did that for three years. Then, I was on the staff of Southside Baptist Church for three years as the minister of youth and discipleship. Subsequently, God called me to be a pastor, and so we started a church. I did that for three years. It was during that time that God called me to the Philippines. I made an initial trip to the Philippines and then moved my family there in the fall of 1985. I knew I wanted to go and preach the Gospel, train pastors and plant churches. We have since added an orphanage that we started in 1991. In 1994, we started taking young Americans and training them to preach the Gospel.

What inspired you to start the Bob Tebow Evangelistic Association?


That's a simple answer. God called me. I was driving to a city in Alabama to go speak that night. My daughter Christy was laying on the front seat asleep. My wife Pam was home with the three other ones. I was just driving along singing, minding my own business, when God took the peace of God away and troubled my heart and said, "You go." And I said, "OK, OK, I'll go." Then the peace of God returned. When I got home, I told Pam. She said she already knew it because God was also speaking to her. There wasn't any question for me. For her, there was a lot of questions. What about this? What about that? She wrestled with God for a while and finally said, "OK, I'll go."

When you reflect on the efforts of your ministry, what are you most proud of?

I don't need to be proud. I'm just a servant. It's not about pride. There are a lot of things I delight in. My daughter Christy and her husband Joey went with me on trips to the Philippines over 10 times, and they're now married and live in Asia. They're doing the same thing there that we were doing in the Philippines. There have been a lot of others who have become pastors and missionaries. There are a lot of miraculous things that have happened. So many God stories happen on every trip, that I can't even remember them all.

It's obvious that Tim and your children are caring like you. Where does that come from for you?

I didn't inherit that trait. I just responded to the Bible, what it says, how we're supposed to treat people, what we're supposed to do with people, etc. The New Testament is filled with things that tell us how we need to treat people. It's been a long, gradual process of trying to learn everything in the New Testament, applying it and loving people as Christ loved us.



What are you most proud of Tim for?

He's had a great impact. He had a big impact in high school, a really big impact in college and a big impact in the pros. I think that won't stop happening. I personally think he can hit in the major leagues, but nobody really asks my opinion. I'm Dad, so of course I'd think that. Even if he doesn't, he has enough things in his life to keep him busy. He has announcing football, his foundation, trips he can go on to other countries to preach the Gospel, etc. I don't know how he does what he does.

A lot of attention is given to Tim. What don't people know about the rest of your family?

They're all really neat people. Christy and her husband Joey are missionaries in Asia. Katie does a lot of ministry in Georgia. Robby is living in Arizona. He was a producer of the film, "Run the Race." He put his heart into it, did a great job on it and it turned into a really great movie. Peter is in Colorado, selling products that help people with wounds that do not want to heal. He also sells insurance and investments. Pam enjoys speaking for women's groups, nonprofit fundraisers and various events in many cities across the country. She just released a book she wrote on influencing women titled, "Ripple Effects."



"It worked in Chattanooga. It worked in Corpus Christi and it worked in the National Aquarium in Baltimore."

Grant's positive mentality is a huge ego-booster for the city.

"There are two points I can't emphasize enough," he said. "One is that this thing has to be the coolest thing that anybody's ever seen. The other is that the biggest impediment is sort of that Jacksonville mentality of, 'Oh, it'll never get done. It's just another one of them pipedreams.' I'm brought on board predominantly to fight that and say, 'Yeah, look, we can do this.' And we can."

Grant is focused and has the determina-

tion to make this aquarium happen, but what he doesn't have yet is the proper funding and he's not shy to discuss it. "Right now, I need money," he said. "Wells Fargo, for example, gives away \$485 million a year. I can't go there and say, 'Look at this cool picture. Give me \$200 million, and I'll build it.' I need to go in and really have something. I talked to a videographer last night. He wants to do a 3D virtual walkthrough, which would be huge. Haskell did those drawings for free, but people are going to want to get paid for 3D, virtual walkthroughs."

The completion of the Atlantic Aquarium is still years away, but the beginning is coming at full speed thanks to Grant and Aqua Jax. After endless discussions of what's next for Jacksonville, it's refreshing to see someone who has done the



PIFOR social media app plans to make compassion viral

It's no secret that social media has became a major player in how people consume goods, interact with others, perceive the world, and in many ways, affect who they are.

While it has certainly allowed people to connect with others from all over the world and from all different backgrounds, the colossal cultural giant has also negatively impacted perceptions in more ways than one. Cyber bullying, unrealistic body standards and the culture of mass consumerism riddle the medium with enough psychological bombardment that many people have chosen to simply opt out. Others, however, can't seem to get enough.

Ponte Vedra entrepreneur Peter Makris dreams about being a social media influencer. Yet, he doesn't plan on selling you B-12 shots, smoothie bowls, loungewear, vacation packages or makeup palettes photographed with Snapchat filters. Makris is actually hoping he can just influence you to be a good person. Not exactly trending, right?

One could say it's basically a benevolent Facebook (Or, perhaps, Empathy-gram or Tender?). The idea is that not only can users raise awareness for their own causes, but they can share their own contributions to the community, which in turn affects others to do the same.

Makris said he knows the concept works simply because he's seen it firsthand.





The idea came to him after a trip to New York, where he was visiting his family. He was headed back home one evening, and, just like any other night, he decided to call an Uber for a ride. That night a man named Isaac Gyamera picked him up.

"The conversation started flowing," Makris said.

Gyamera is originally from Ghana. He left the county to come to America when he was in his 20s with his wife and parents. At first, he said the adjustment was really difficult.

"(There was) so many differences in the way (Americans) talk and their words," Gyamera said. "Some are insults but others are not. It was the way they eat, the way they work. The way they react to people ... everything. It's like if someone was sick and they were lying on the floor, over here you don't go near that person? In Africa, if you see someone lying down on the floor (homeless), it's right to help that person."

When Gyamera met Makris, he had just had his son and was thinking about how he was going to celebrate his birthday with his family after his shift. With Makris he shared stories about his life in Ghana and his family, but he didn't mention his birthday.

As they arrived at his destination,

Makris suddenly had the inclination to give Gyamera a substantial tip, about \$200 to be precise.

"Usually when I go up to New York I don't spend a lot of money, so I had some extra cash in my pocket," Makris said.

That gesture not only ensured Gyamera had a nice meal out with his family that night, it earned Makris a friend for life. Currently, the two text and call almost every day.

"It was a very happy day for me," Gyamera said.

For Makris, the feeling of helping someone was almost addicting. "The way society is now, all

over the place people kind of box (other) people," Makris said. "People that are different, you know, they assassinate their character and they don't really know what's (in their heart). People only look at people from the surface. So, I said, I think we need more goodness in this world."

PIFOR.org differentiates itself from other social media platforms by only encouraging charitable causes and volunteerism. It allows users to easily find and participate in causes that are locally active as well as promote ones they believe in. Causes are registered within the database and vetted in order to keep accountability. Makris said there will be no direct fundraising on the site.

"It's really about connecting humans and about humanity, which is what I think we should get back to, and not the layers and layers of garbage," Makris said. "I want to open my newsfeed in the morning and hear positive stories. (Lately the news) is all garbage. It just fills (the newsfeed) and influences people in the wrong way. I want the reason why I bought the site is that you go on and you're looking at stories that are uplifting and that'll change your day. It will change it."


Gyamera said he hopes that one day the application will help emotionally connect not only those living in the same neighborhoods and towns, but those living across the world.


"It's not only Ghana, it's so many countries," Gyamera said.

For him, the hungry, poor and hurt in Africa might as well be his neighbors. Unlike most people, because he has seen it firsthand, he doesn't feel any significant distance from himself and the devastation that also exists worlds away. Gyamera said he hopes the borders between people will lessen with technology aimed at shortening that distance.

"There's so many countries," he emphasized.

Yet, Gyamera knows that every act counts, just as it did for him the two years ago when he met Makris. Every small act that a person does causes a ripple effect that can go on longer than anyone could possibly imagine. In some cases, you might never even know that today just happened to be a complete stranger's birthday. If you ask Gyamera, he likes to say often, "Everybody needs help, everybody."



She became the first dedicated women's coach in the program's history and during her tenure, the Dolphins have seen a number of school records fall, including the

lowest team scoring average in a season, the top-10 lowest team tournament rounds, the top-six lowest two round scores and the top-15 lowest three-round totals.

JU won three tournament titles, including two in the 2017-18 season, tied for the most in a single season and was the best in individual scoring categories in the program's history on a year-in-year-out basis.

Under Borocz's tutelage, Jessica Welch became the first women's golfer at JU to qualify for NCAA postseason play, as well as the first and only ASUN Golfer of the Year and ASUN Scholar-Athlete of the Year in the program's history. The team has also achieved its best conference tournament finishes since the program was formed in 1985, four years running, and achieved the first-ever top-100 Golfstat finish in program history in 2017-18.

"I would like to thank President Cost and Alex Ricker-Gilbert for their support during my time at Jacksonville University," Borocz said. "Most importantly, I would like to thank the players that I've been so fortunate to coach. Their hard work and dedication brought the program to new heights, both on and off the course.

"I can't thank them enough for their tireless dedication to JU Women's Golf. This was an extremely difficult decision, but I feel we've laid a solid foundation for the program and I am confident it will be successful well into the future. JU has meant so much to my family and we are incredibly grateful for the opportunities JU provided us."

The team has also excelled in the classroom, earning the WGCA All-Scholar Team GPA Award after posting the highest team GPA in the country (3.924) in 2016-17, the only team to have over a 3.9. Seven members were honored individually as well by the WGCA, with Megan Collins, Michelle Forsland, Amanda Detmer, Louise Persson, Maria Brunzell, Maria Juliana Fueyo and Welch all receiving recognition for their academic achievements. Most recently, this team earned the Outstanding Team GPA Award at the JAXPYS for the fourth consecutive year, awarded to the team that recorded the highest GPA among the 20 sports under the Dolphin banner. Previously, the team received the Dolphin C.U.R.E Award, presented to the team with the most service work completed, in 2017, and the D.B. Milne Sportsmanship Award in 2018.

Borocz will remain an advocate for the program and as an ambassador for women's golf in Northeast Florida. She has already provided some input as the department begins its search for a new leader of the program and will continue to support the program throughout the hiring process.


