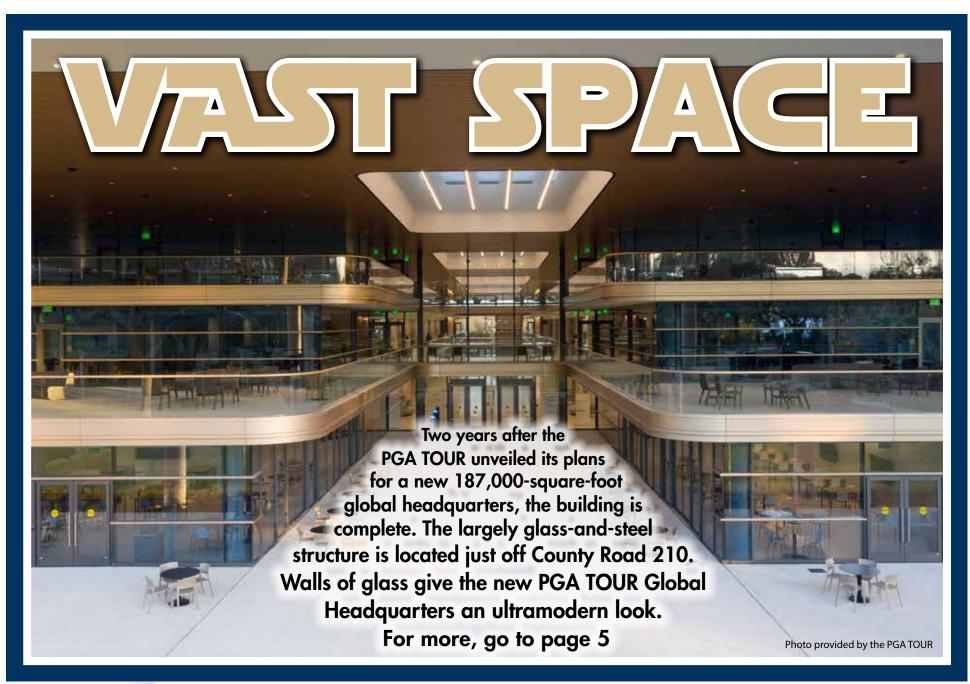

St. Johns County COVID-19 vaccination registration opens at 9 a.m. Feb. 4

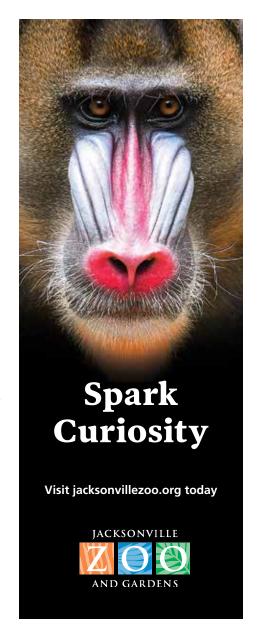
St. Johns County received an allotment of 3,900 Pfizer vaccines from the State of Florida this week. Registration will open at 9 a.m. on Thursday, Feb. 4, for vaccination appointments on Feb. 5, 8 and 10. You may schedule an appointment by going to tinyurl.com/y52tcoaz or by calling the St. Johns County COVID-19 Vaccination Hotline at (904) 295-3711 after 9 a.m.

on Thursday. You will not be able to register for an appointment through the website or hot-line prior to 9 a.m. It is recommended vaccine recipients arrive no more than 15 minutes prior to their appointment. The Pfizer vaccine requires the recipient to receive a second dose in 21 days. Those who receive their first dose of the Pfizer vaccine through the county will leave with an appointment for the second dose. The limited number of COVID-19 vaccines St. Johns County receives from the state determines appoint-

Middleburg woman's body found off A1A

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office is investigating the death of a Middleburg woman whose body was discovered early Sunday morning, Jan. 31, along State Road A1A North just south of the Duval County line.

According to a spokesman for the Sheriff's Office, the call came in at 5:30 a.m., though some media reports put the time about an hour earlier.

Both the Sheriff's Office and the Florida Highway Patrol responded to what was believed to be a fatal pedestrian hit-andrun crash. The decision was made to turn the investigation over to the Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit to further investigate the case as an undetermined death.

Investigators identified the victim as Brianna Jane Gibson, 24, of Middleburg.

According to a report from the Sheriff's Office, detectives learned that Gibson and her boyfriend — who has not been identified — left the victim's family home Saturday evening. Neither Gibson, her vehicle or her boyfriend were seen afterward that night, the report said.

Investigators performed an aerial search and located Gibson's vehicle abandoned at an apartment complex. It was seized and taken to the Sheriff's Office Forensics Unit for processing.

Detectives began to search for the boyfriend and, a short time later, members of the boyfriend's family contacted the Clay County Sheriff's Office and said he wanted to turn himself in regarding an outstanding and unrelated warrant.

Investigators met with the boyfriend and reported that he was cooperating and

had provided an account of the night's

The investigation is ongoing, and detectives are seeking information regarding the whereabouts of Gibson and her vehicle between 10 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 30, and early Sunday morning, Jan. 31.

The vehicle is known to have been in Duval, St. Johns and Clay counties during that period of time.

Readers are asked to call the Major Crimes Unit at 824-8304 if they have any information regarding the investigation.

Nease NJROTC cadets in championship form as drill team captures title in 1st competition

After a long hiatus due to COVID-19, the Nease NJROTC Academic, Athletic and Drill team competed at the Terry Parker High School Drill Meet on Jan. 23. in Jacksonville.

Whatever rust there may have been was not apparent as the team continued its winning ways, capturing first place in nine of the 12 events en route to the overall meet championship.

Nease's last appearance before the Terry Parker Drill was a win in the 2019-2020 Navy Area-12 (state) Championship in Coffee County, Geotrgia. COVID-19 derailed the team's hopes to compete for a national championship, and since then, competitions have been canceled or rescheduled until Jan. 23.

With the Terry Parker Drill victory, the team qualifies for the Area-12 Drill Championships in Georgia in March where it competes against the best programs in Georgia and northern Florida.

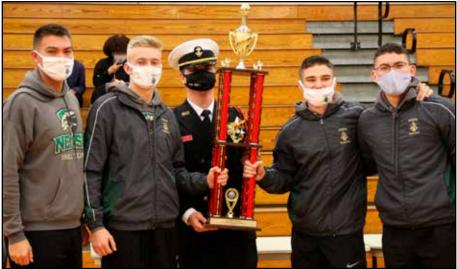
"This competition has been a long time coming," said Cadet Battalion Cmdr. Dylan Dosio. "To say the team was ready to bust out is the understatement of the year."

Drill is much more than a marching competition. Drill championships include a series of events, including unarmed and armed marching, color guard, personnel inspection, academics, pushups, situps and running relays. Points awarded in each event are combined to determine the day's overall winner.

This year Nease won first place in personnel inspection, athletics overall, situps, pushups, 16x100 relays, overall drill, color guard, armed basic and armed exhibition drill.

Of the 25 individual medal awards for academics, pushups and situps, Nease cadets garnered 16. Lauren Villareal was first in female pushups (90), Anthony Tucker was first in male situps (309) and Emmelie Neff placed first in female situps (325)

"Few things have seemed normal this year," said senior Cadet Michael Winc-

zner, anchor of the 16x100 relay. "But today felt like old days."

Nease is currently the No. 1-ranked NJROTC drill team in Area-12 (59 programs covering northern Florida and the state of Georgia), having won the Area-12 Drill Championship each of the



past six years.

"Despite all the trophies, we've got a lot to work on before our next competition," said Color Guard Cmdr. Isabella Rivera. "Everyone wants to beat Nease and they give us their best shot every time."

PGA TOUR global headquarters ready for employees

Two years after the PGA TOUR unveiled its plans for a new 187,000-square-foot global headquarters, the building is complete and will begin housing employees this month.

The largely glass-and-steel structure, designed by Foster + Partners, is located just off County Road 210, situated between the Couples and the Nicklaus gates. It replaces 17 other facilities scattered throughout the area.

Surrounded by water, the building was inspired by the iconic 17th hole at TPC Sawgrass. It is actually two three-story buildings connected by bridges and a 44-foot-tall atrium, a feature that would allow all employees to gather in a single place.

"We could have an entire company meeting in this room," said Kirsten Sabia, vice president of integrated communications.

The extensive use of glass and five 1,400-square-foot skylights made from a weather-resistant material illuminate the entire structure with natural light.

"Our architect, prior to designing and building the space, interviewed hundreds of employees, and light and meeting space were the two top answers of what people desired in the new building," said Sabia.

There are about 100 conference rooms in the new structure, up from the current 12.

The work environment is rich in amenities, including a den with golf swing simulator; a genius bar where employees can get help with technical issues; a fitness center with treadmills, cycles, yoga studios and more; and a coffee bar.

The large café, under the direction of Chef Eric Butcher, prides itself on the high quality of its products and partnership with local vendors. It offers vegan, keto and gluten-free options, as well as more mainstream fare.

"We're always so aware of wellness and wellbeing, and we have amazing benefits here at the TOUR," said Sabia. "But what the chef and his team are able to provide from a healthy perspective is just really incredible."

The amenities will prove attractive to prospective employees as the organization grows.

"We want the smartest accountants, the brightest lawyers," said Sabia. "To be able to provide them this office space that's an amenity unto itself, we're very fortunate."

The interior of the building also features a variety of local artists commissioned to depict the PGA TOUR brand personality and the heritage of the First Coast.

Sisters Holly Blanton and Heather Blan-

ton supplied canvas paintings of significant moments in PGA TOUR history. Four Jacksonville artists — Dustin Haywood, Ansley Randall, John Votel and Shawn Thurston – painted murals in the building's stairwells.

Currently, the PGA TOUR has about 750 employees locally. Though most are working from home during the pandemic, they will have the option of moving into the new space as of Feb. 17. The building's total capacity is 1,100 employees.

The general contractor for the project was Clark Construction Group of Tampa. Clark also delivered the clubhouse at TPC Sawgrass in 2007.

The PGA TOUR moved to Ponte Vedra Beach from Washington, D.C., in the late 1970s and started off with three employees in a single house in the Players Club development in Sawgrass.

"We've been here for over 40 years, and we're excited for another 40-plus to come," said Sabia.

Can you please briefly tell us about your artistic background?

"It gives the girls a chance to engage with the community and sell cookies," said Laura Gainor, a Ponte Vedra resident and Girl Scout mom. ANNUALS VS. PERENNIALS

A great way to add color and variety to your landscaping is a combination of

annuals and perennials. If you ask me, both are needed in your

ANNUALS

- Annuals are temporary season-to-season.
- They exert their energy unconditionally with consistent

vibrant colors until their season ends and will not grow back.

- Choose two-to-three places in your garden you would like to enjoy the beautiful array of constant color, and that can be changed out with each passing season.
- Most popular areas for planting front door, near street or mailbox, and back patio areas where you relax.
- Creating "special" annual beds with good, soft #3 mix topsoil aids in manageable replacement once their season is over. (Annuals last 3-6 months, changing seasonally 2-3 times per year)
- Annuals are most often used in planters as
- Annuals recommended to plant now: petunia, dusty miller, pansy and snapdragon.



- Perennials last indefinitely. Most of them bloom in and out of color but do not give the constant vibrant color of annuals.
- Many perennials die down in the winter and tend to look dead, but they are not! Wait until spring and they will just need pruning. Prune off dead stems and wait for them to re-appear.
- Perennials should be about 90-95% of your landscaping as they grow back and bloom. However, this is why you need to incorporate both in landscaping to give extra color in those die down months. Annuals should only be about 5-10% of your landscaping due to time, effort and repeat expense.
- Perennials recommended to plant now: blue daze, foxtail fern, geranium and drift roses.

Palm Valley mourns loss of 2 prominent residents

In the last week of January, Palm Valley lost two of its most prominent and well-respected residents. Sid Mickler, a member of the famed local family, died on Jan. 27. Jerry McCoy, a longtime business owner, died four days later.

The men were neighbors and friends, and both were well-liked by the community.

Mickler's roots run deep in this area. In 1825, just four years after Florida became a territory of the United States, his great-great-grandfather settled in the area now known as Palm Valley.

Born in 1926, Mickler one of 10 children. He attended a school started by his parents on their property, growing up at a time when Palm Valley had dirt roads and there was no electricity.

As a young boy, he helped his father build the pier at Mickler's Beach.

He attended Fletcher High School in Duval County, but quit to join the U.S. Navy and fight in World War II. Upon his return to the States, he worked alongside his father on their shrimp boat. After that, he went on to become an electrician, retiring from the City of Jacksonville Beach after 25 years.

He and wife Jo had five children, and the family would travel all over the country during summers, with the electricians' union finding Mickler short-term jobs along the way. Daughter Julie Mickler Bhatia said her father was well-loved by the community, but not for his familiar name or being a part of one of Palm Valley's founding families.

"This man, Sid Mickler, was well-loved because he was a good, decent human being," she said.

Mickler was not one to judge, criticize or complain about others. And he valued opportunities to speak to others about forgiveness.

"He really, honestly got up every morning and made a conscious decision that he was going to be a decent human being," Bhatia recalled.

A devout Catholic, "he was very, very dedicated to making sure that people knew how much Jesus meant to him," she added.

McCoy was born in 1942 and grew up in Indiana. He joined the U.S. Navy and served for 22 years, retiring as a master

chief electrician's mate in 1983.

Three years later, he and fishing buddy Jerry Gray opened Double J's Repair Shop in what he called "downtown Palm Valley." Over the next 32 years, the small engine and landscape supply business grew to become a keystone of the community. McCoy retired in 2018.

"He was very energetic, hard-working," said Ronda McCoy, his wife of 45 years. "He had such common sense about so many things. He didn't have the higher education, but he knew so much about so many things and how to fix things and how to figure things out."

She said her husband was well-respected by all who worked for him. Former employees have told her that they felt she and her husband treated them like family.

"That's so special to us," she said.

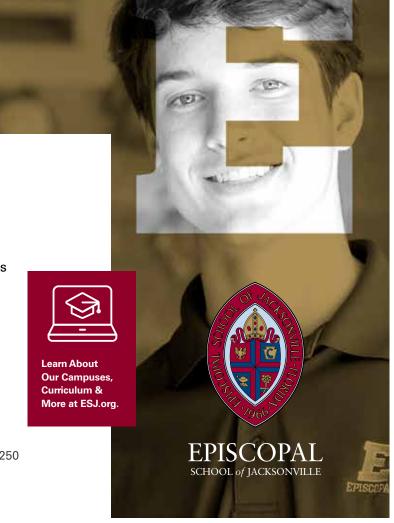

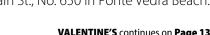

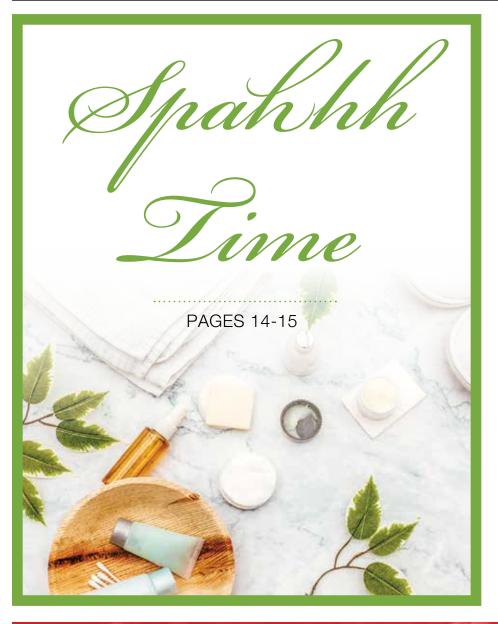

Getting fresh and vibrant skin: How to navigate spa treatments

The desire for healthy, clean-looking skin drives the multibillion dollar cosmetics and skincare industry. Chemical and fruit acid peels rely on various acids to exfoliate and peel off the outer layer of skin. The skin beneath is usually more smooth and less wrinkled. Some deep peels target the middle layer of skin to remove damaged skin cells. The American Society for Dermatologic Surgery says that peels can be used to treat anything from acne to aging skin to scars. Alpha-hydroxy acid and lactic acid may be used in mild peels. Trichloroacetic acid, or phenol, is used for more potent chemical peels. Peels are best left to an aesthetician or dermatologist.

FACIAL MASKS

Masks may contain many different ingredients designed to treat various skin problems. A paraffin mask, for example, involves the process of applying molten warm wax over a thin mask. The wax will open pores and moisturize the skin. Masks are applied, and then there is a waiting period, during which the mask dries or penetrates. Then the treatment will be removed.

MICRODERMABRASION

In microdermabrasion, layers of dead skin are buffed. This dead skin may have accumulated due to age and sun exposure. Many spas employ a device that scours the skin using micronized aluminum oxide crystals. Similar at-home products use motorized spinning brushes that employ bristles to slough off skin cells.

LYMPHATIC MASSAGE

Many facial treatments also include some massage. With lymphatic massage, particular pressure points are targeted to release strain from tension headaches and may even reduce skin puffiness. Massaging the skin can promote blood flow and lead to a rosier, more youthful glow.

COSMETIC FILLERS

Injectable dermal fillers can soften facial creases, remove wrinkles and improve the appearance of scars, says the American Society of Plastic Surgeons. These procedures are best left to professionals

How tax brackets work: A potential snore

OK, enough of the chit chat ... away we go. We (United States) have what is referred to as a progressive tax system, which means folks with higher taxable incomes pay higher federal income tax rates. However, being "in" a tax bracket does not mean one pays federal income at that rate on all of their taxable income.

I like the way that the informative website, www. nerdwallet.com, explains it; "The government decides how much tax you owe by dividing your taxable income into chunks — also known as tax brackets — and each chunk gets taxed at the corresponding tax rate. The beauty of this is that no matter which bracket you're in, you won't pay that tax rate on your entire income."

You got it? In other words, one could be "in" say a 24% tax bracket but his or her "effective" tax rate will always be lower. I will give you an example that should add clarity to the issue in question, but first take a moment to review the 2021 marginal tax brackets below for an unmarried individual and married individuals filing a joint return.

Example: Let's say you are a single-filer with \$32,000 in taxable income. Please keep in mind that the \$32,000 is the "taxable" income, which is your income after you apply your standard deduction (see below) or if you itemize, after your itemized deductions.

would you pay 12% on all of your \$32,000? If you said, nope, and it was not a guess, kudos to you student! You are correct if you are thinking that you would pay 10% on your first \$9,995 (see above brackets) and then you would pay 12% on the rest. Therefore, you might be "in" the 12% marginal tax bracket, but your "average" or "effective" tax rate is 11.36%. Confused? Don't be, as it is rather simple math to get to the 11.36% rate.

Here is how the math works ... 10% of \$9,995 = \$995 + 12% of 22,005 (which is the additional amount to get to \$32,000) = \$2,640. So, your tax amount due is \$995 + \$2,640 or \$3,635. To determine what the average rate is, you would simply divide your tax amount, which is \$3,636 by \$32,000, which is your taxable income (your taxable income). That my friends is how you get to 11.36% effective tax rate on \$32,000 of taxable income. Once again, you're in the 12% marginal tax bracket but your effective tax rate is lower at 11.36%.

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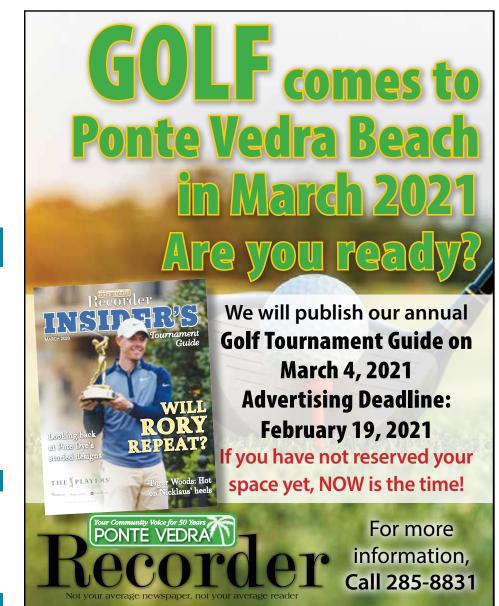
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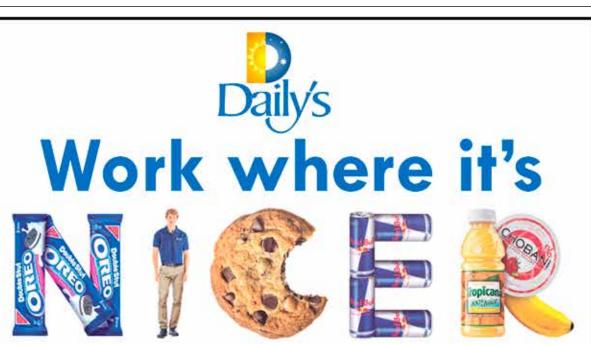
