County to repair South Ponte Vedra Beach pavilion after nor easter

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners is taking steps to address the damage caused by the recent nor'easter. During its Tuesday, Nov. 16, meeting, the board unanimously voted to approve \$120,000 to repair the South Ponte Vedra Beach Park dune walkover and pavilion.

"The nor'easter made the walkover and the pavilion in South Ponte Vedra Beach unusable for public access," said Ryan Kane, director of St. Johns County Parks & Recreation. "The funding approved today will help us restore this public amenity for all to enjoy."

Additionally, county commissioners voted to authorize the Emergency Temporary Coastal Armoring Property Owner Permit Application Package under Florida statute. Following a coastal storm event, authorizing this statute allows eligible property owners to apply for temporary emergency structure permits.

Applications need to be submitted within 30 days from the initial coastal event, which was earlier this month. Properties built after March 17, 1985, are not eligible. For a complete list of eligibility requirements, go to bit.ly/30HI5Yd.

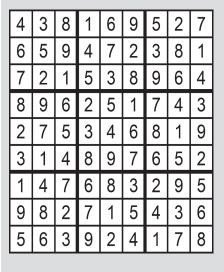
Library food for fines program returns

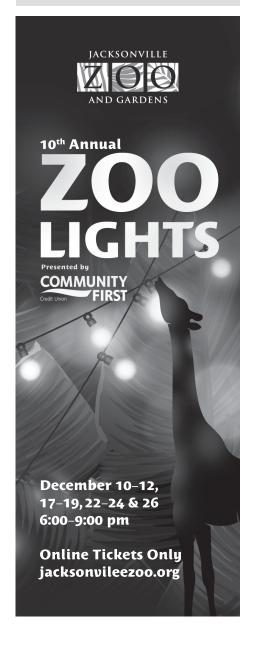
The Food for Fines program has returned this year to St. Johns County libraries and bookmobiles.

from the service will provide programs and services for the more-than 18,000 North Floridians impacted by multiple sclerosis.

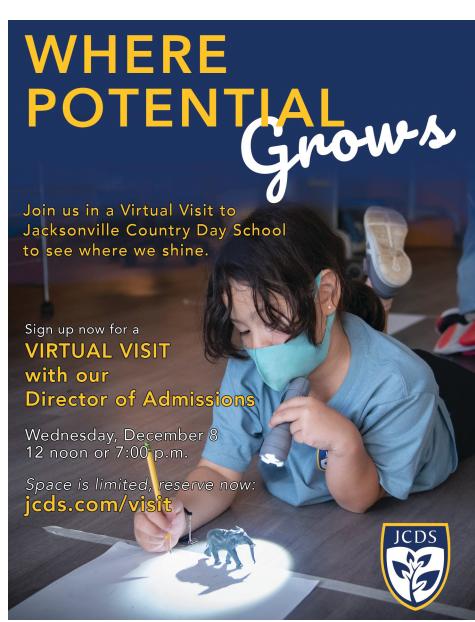

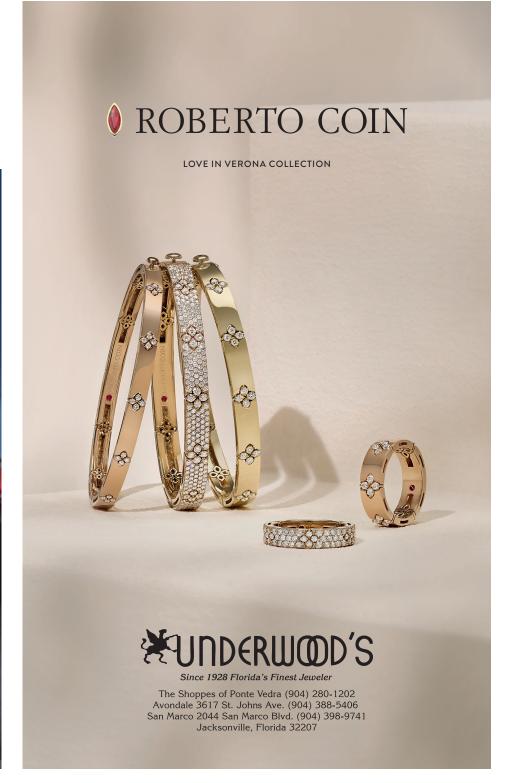

Dylan Lane is a Ponte Vedra High alum that is doing some unique things with his 2005 BMW 330ci, which has become known as the "camera car." He has always been passionate about cars and looks to capture their speed for others to enjoy as well by filming a variety of high performance makes driving on the open road.

As told to Anthony Richards

Can you please tell us a little bit about your background?

I am 19 years old and bought my first camera roughly two years ago.

I started shooting photos for the Ponte Vedra football team in the 2019-20 season and for basketball as well.

While I was paying off my camera shooting sports, my heart was in cars. I went to countless car events shooting photos of whatever I could get in the frame and slowly learned how to shoot in the basic scenarios.

As things progressed and I moved to Orlando for school, I dove headfirst and learned everything I could and put myself in as many scenarios as possible to network and get involved.

After working like crazy this last year or so, it is really cool to see the direction things are heading in.

Have you always had a fascination with cars and speed?

Since day one. My mom could tell you better than I can, but cars were a part of my life from the very beginning.

My grandfather and I were as close as could be and together we covered thousands of miles in his cars, and it was honestly the core behind our relationship.

Without him I wouldn't be doing any of this. I grew up and eventually someone thought it was a good idea to give me legal rights to drive a car, so here we are.

Please talk a little bit about your "camera car" and how it works?

So, the "camera car" that people see today was actually my grandfather's car.

He was the one that introduced me into the automotive world and was honestly my best friend growing up. He gave me the BMW when I turned 16 and immediately after I dove into this world of cars.

About a year ago, he passed away and immediately following his death my entire life changed.

I dedicated everything to growing my skills and eventually all of it led to me building his old car into my film rig.

Three speed rails/poles are put together and mounted in two places on the roof with 9-inch suction cups and then bolted to either the front or rear tow hook depending on how I want to film.

That is the general structure. From there I have the arm which hangs the camera and acts as a suspension to keep the camera steady and away from all the bumps and vibrations of the road.

Everything from the camera is fed into the car to a screen I have mounted on my dash that records the footage and allows me to see what the camera sees from inside the car.

What are some of the projects you have done?

I've been really lucky to have worked on some cool projects since I started in film. I have covered Ferrari events, exotic car rallies, filmed for a large YouTube channel, the list goes on.

In October I covered a cancer awareness rally from Orlando to Jupiter. My job was to essentially retell the story of the event and highlight the real cause behind what they do. We ended up losing a participant to cancer just weeks before the event, and one of his dying wishes was for his wife and her brother to still come along in his honor. Of course, we had to give a tribute to them in the video and putting that together was just indescribable.

These jobs that I expect to be all about cars and going fast just seem to always work their way into things that are so much bigger than all of that.

What are some of the challenges that you face when during the filming process?

The biggest issues I face are honestly things I must take care of prior to even turning on a camera.

Just like any business there are tons of costs associated with growth, and for me, the hardest part has just been overcoming the first stages of equipment costs and building a network/clientele.

Filming is shockingly the easy part for me. There really is not much I have to plan for other than timing and location, so film days are honestly just days for me to have fun and enjoy the work I have put in to put the cars in front of the camera.

The rest of the details related to filming I like to let work themselves out. When you have cars going down the road mixed in with other traffic you just have to let it play out.

What do you enjoy most about living in the North Florida area?

The people. Plain and simple. I have been blessed beyond description to have grown up in this area.

The support I have received from day one from teachers, friends and everyone else I was around growing up has been pretty incredible and I owe a great majority of my success to the people of North Florida.

My family is here and alongside everyone else it really makes this part of the world home for me.

What do you like to do in your free time?

On top of film, I'm also a full-time student at UCF. Between school and everything else, I really don't have a ton of free time, but whenever I get a light day or have some time, I just go drive.

Growing up my grandfather and I spent so much time together riding around Colorado in his cars and to this day my favorite way to go relax is just to get a Red Bull or something and go drive around and listen to music.

I don't like to go with anybody or talk on the phone because driving just lets me dig really deep into my thoughts and separate myself from this crazy world, we all live in. The goal is just to get my mind completely removed from all the noises and notifications. It may sound cliche, but that's what I do.

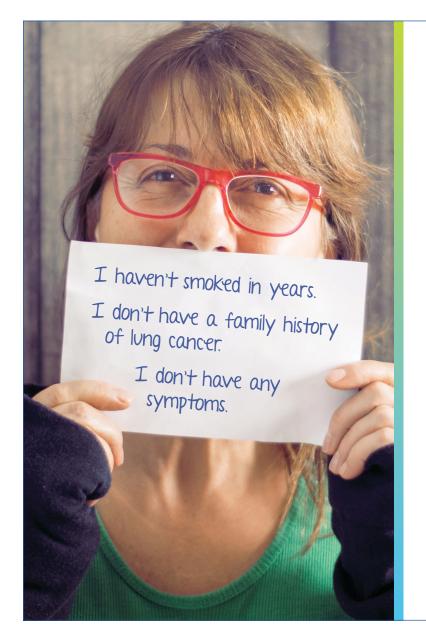

Watson leaders discuss real estate market predictions

Watson Realty Corp. gathered data from real estate leaders to discuss key changes in the industry for the fall/winter 2021 season. Watson leadership and real estate experts, Regional Vice President of Watson North Central Region and Northeast Florida Association of Realtors President Mark Rosener and Regional

Vice President of Watson Central Region Jeffrey Fagan share their predictions for the region.

Will the market crash in Florida or Watson footprint regions?

"Although there has been significant upward movement in terms of median and average price, we do not see a crash [happening]," said Rosener. "Price increases have been driven by exceptionally limited inventory, [so] there is no indication that will change substantially."

"I agree with Mark's assessment," said Fagan. "While the market in general has stabilized marginally, there is now the beginning of a differentiation within the market. There will not be a crash, and in my opinion, there will be continued slow moderation."

Predictions for the rest of the season include fewer home sales, overall leading to a much-needed increase in home inventory in many areas of the country.

What does this mean for Florida and South Georgia customers? Will we see an increase in inventory or will it remain low?

"Inventory is beginning to open up slightly in most of our markets," said Rosener. "We believe there will be incremental increases in terms of active residential homes for sale over the next

six to 12 months that will help to stabilize the market, but most likely, inventory will remain low compared to historic levels."

"Slow growth in inventory as the market tries to find its equilibrium, while new construction starts have drastically trailed demand for over a decade," added Fagan. "And with [current] supply chain issues, this segment will take at least 10 years or more to even out in Florida."

Is this millennial-based trend happening in Watson's regional markets as well?

"Yes, it is a trend that we are experiencing and it likely will expand, particularly if the number one hinderance of property acquisition - student loan debt is reduced through government action ... stay tuned," said Fagan. "We also are seeing a wonderful advancement of female head-of-household property acquisition in the current environment."

"There is no question that household formations from the millennial generation are fueling a part of the current demand for residential real estate," answered Rosener. "We see that happening across the board in most markets that Watson Realty Corp. does business. This is a national trend that is definitely happening in our markets, and we anticipate it will continue over the next one to five years."

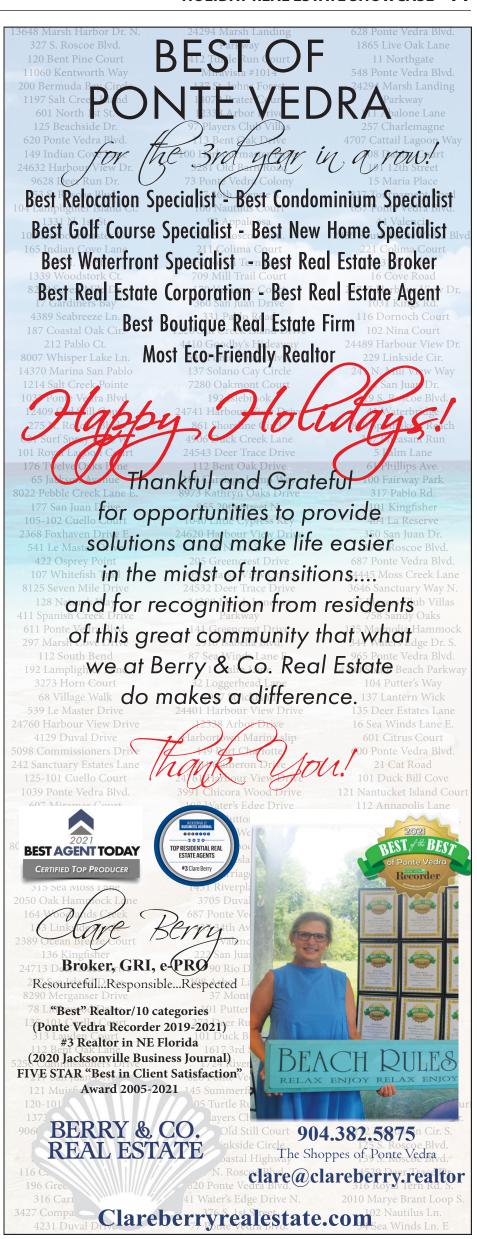

Majetich joined the military out of Kennewick, Washington, in 1988 because he wanted to better his life while serving and protecting his country. He served for nearly 20 years, including a stint in the Marine Corps, before being honorably discharged in 2007.

While riding in a vehicle convoy as part of a large battalion, Majetich's vehicle was struck by an IED, causing severe injuries. In the firefight that ensued, he was shot four times before being airlifted out for emergency care.

He suffered burns on more than onethird of his body, including his face and scalp, the loss of his ears and nose, right hand and fingers on his left hand to amputation, the removal of part of his intestines and stomach, a fractured spine, fractured left foot, and bullet wounds in his right shoulder and right leg. He also suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder and a traumatic brain injury.

Since his initial injuries occurred, he has undergone more than 80 surgeries to

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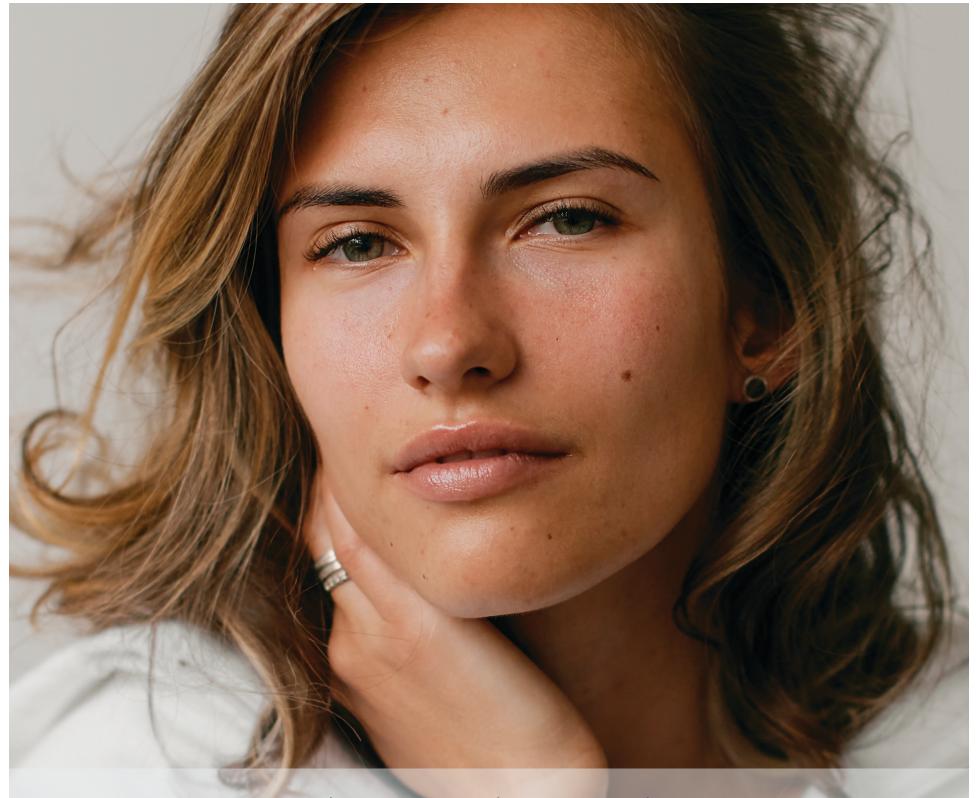

THE PLAYERS Championship, VyStar Credit Union, Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation join effort to heal veterans

UF Health Jacksonville, the Gary Sinise Foundation and philanthropic partners came together Friday to cut the ribbon on a new facility that brings comprehensive brain health care to Northeast Florida.

The groundbreaking effort will help veterans as they recover from medical issues related to their service.

The new UF Health Jacksonville Leon L. Haley Jr., M.D., Brain Wellness Program will provide transformative care to veterans and first responders experiencing post-traumatic stress, traumatic brain injuries, depression, anxiety and substanceuse disorder.

The clinic, the first and only one in Florida, is a collaboration between UF Health and the Gary Sinise Foundation Avalon Network, in partnership with the Marcus Foundation and Arthur M. Blank Foundation, and is receiving crucial support from THE PLAYERS Championship, which announced a donation of \$1

million Friday. VvStar Credit Union and the Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation also made philanthropic contributions to help construct the new space and create a fund to support veterans' care.

"The ability to help veterans and the military, which are part of the fabric of Northeast Florida, is an honor for UF Health and the UF College of Medicine -Jacksonville," said Russ Armistead, CEO of UF Health Jacksonville.

The Gary Sinise Foundation Avalon Network is the first comprehensive traumatic brain injury and post-traumatic stress network available free-of-charge to veterans, service members and first responders nationwide.

"Since before the creation of the Gary Sinise Foundation, it has been Gary's life mission to support and uplift our nation's veterans, service members, first responders and their families," said Mike Thirtle. CEO of the Gary Sinise Foundation.

Gary Sinise joins the co-founders of The Home Depot and philanthropists Bernie Marcus and Arthur M. Blank, who each invested \$20 million from their personal foundations to lay the groundwork for the Gary Sinise Foundation Avalon Network.

The program will serve military veterans suffering from invisible wounds of war, specifically mild-to-moderate traumatic brain injury, post-traumatic stress and substance abuse. It will also serve non-veterans, helping subsidize the cost of care for veterans.

The new collaboration is made possible through several donations, including a \$12.5 million grant to UF Health Jacksonville from the Gary Sinise Foundation Avalon Network.

Other community partners say they are also pleased to be part of a groundbreaking initiative.

Haley Jr., M.D., Brain Wellness Program and its efforts to bring this network of care to our community's heroes," said Jared Rice, executive director of THE PLAYERS. Airport begins commercial flights in time for holidays

The Northeast Florida Regional Airport in St. Augustine welcomed in commercial flights for the first time a little more than two years Nov. 19.

"It's exciting for Elite Airways and the City of St. Augustine, because you've got non-stop service to a place that is highly desirable in New York and New Jersey," Elite Airways CEO John Pearsall said. "I believe there are so many people here from the northeast that will take advantage of it."

A ceremony was held to commemorate the landing of the first scheduled commercial flight into the airport since 2018, and the timing could not have been better as it came just in time for the holiday season.

The catalyst behind introducing commercial flights once again is a partnership between the airport, Elite Airways and the Transportation Security Administration.

According to Pearsall, it is a partnership that has been years in the making.

"We had started talking to Ed (Wuellner,

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Northeast Florida Regional Airport executive director) and his group before the pandemic, but of course the pandemic hit and everything got put on hold," Pearsall said. "We saw the opportunity that there wasn't anyone here or planning to return for the time being." Wuellner does not see there being any

major issues with the logistics of operation by adding commercial flights, especially since much of the airport staff has experienced having handled such flights at the airport in the past.

"The good part is we've done this before, so our guys are pretty seasoned and know the procedures in place what has to be done," Wuellner said.

Working with a trusted business partner

that shares a similar philosophy is vital to the success of any operation. Pearsall believes that is what makes the relationship between Elite Airways and the airport a perfect fit.

"It's a great feeling," Pearsall said. "Ed and the airport staff have been so enthusiastic. We think it is going to be a long relationship and we look forward to eventually adding some additional destinations."

The flights will run to and from the airport and Newark, New Jersey. The plan is to have flights scheduled Mondays and Fridays with an ideal arrival time of 12:45 p.m. and departure at 1:15 p.m.

"For us it's super exciting to welcome commercial service back," Wuellner said. "It is by far and away the largest market

that is of interest to this area. We look forward to great things to come."

The fact that there are a lot of transplants from the northeast that have come to Florida over the years was a factor that weighed heavily when making the decision of which destination would be best suited.

"It's an ideal route to start with," Pearsall

The plane used will be a 90-seat jet with two-by-two seating, which means no middle seats.

Tickets will start at \$129 each way and will include bag checking, carry-on, seat selection and no change fee.

"We think that our pricing is nice, in that everything is included in the price," Pearsall said.

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Legacy cemented despite title game defeat

The Ponte Vedra Sharks did something in the 6A State Championship that they rarely do, they lost, falling in three straight sets to Hialeah Gardens Mater Academy, 25-22, 26-24, 25-20.

However, by no means does the loss define how they will ultimately be remembered as a team.

Instead, what will be remembered is the fact that they won the last two 5A state titles and had the rare opportunity at a third straight title.

"They've given up homecoming dances or getting ready to get their nails done ahead of time for volleyball," head coach Robin Mignerey said. "I'm fortunate as a coach, because they eat, live and breathe volleyball. That is what hard work looks like, and they reap the rewards from it."

The group finished the season 29-2 and did not miss a beat despite moving up a class prior to the year.

"It speaks to the strength of this team

and the strength of the program," senior Rachel Johnson said.

The group has defined what it means to be part of the Sharks' volleyball program and will enter next season riding a 51-match winning streak at home, with their last loss in the Shark Tank coming on Oct. 11, 2016.

The Sharks' last five-set loss was on Oct. 30, 2018, which demonstrates once again the dominant run they have been on

Losing in the championship was only the eighth defeat the Sharks have endured over the past three seasons.

"We started playing volleyball together at an early age, so we're friends on and off the court, which really helps," Johnson said. "I spend so much time with them that it really builds those bonds. It's just a loving family atmosphere."

Johnson continued her excellent play of late with a team-high 13 kills to go with 11 digs, while fellow senior Kendall

Mignery had 12 digs and had seven kills on the night.

Zeta Washington continued to have success with her service game with five aces to go with nine kills and a block. Jessica Shattles led the way with 26 assists and Ava Witt topped the team with 17 digs from her libero position.

Sharks win first girls swim team title in school history

It turns out that after all the records the Ponte Vedra High girls swim team set during the season, they ended up saving the best result for last, as the team won the first state title in school history.

The Sharks finished atop the Class 3A state competition with 245 points, 42 ahead of runner-up Tallahassee Chiles and 80 of third place Saint Petersburg.

The highest finishes en route to the team title came by both the 200-yard medley and 200 free relay teams, who won their respective categories.

Annie Wohlgemuth, Annabelle Mac-Adams, Mary Agnes Smith and Penny Zarczynski made up the winning 200 medley relay team, while the 200 free relay champions were Zarczynski, Wohlgemuth, senior Holly Cox and Liv Copland.

Both teams broke their school records they set earlier in the year by roughly two seconds in the process of bringing back home a state title.

The 200 medley relay posted a time 1:46.05 and the 200 free relay set a blistering pace with a time of 1:36.27.

However, it was the strength of the squad's depth that made the ultimate difference in the winning the team overall title.

The Sharks racked up points on a consistent basis with several swimmers coming through with impressive performances on the biggest of stages.

Runner-up finishes at state included Wohlgemuth in the 100 backstroke and the 400 free relay of Smith, Cox, Copland and Sydney Straub.

Despite the 400 free relay coming up short of another state title, they made a statement run of 3:35.66 that smashed the former school record by a nearly threesecond margin.

The Sharks left the championship meet having set seven new school records.

The following individual records were

- Copland with 2:09.75 in the 200 individual medley
- Zarczynski with 23.96 in the 50 free
- Wohlgemuth with 53.85 in the 100 back
- MacAdams with 105.92 in the 100 breast

and got it from the legs of Marcus Stokes who ran for a touchdown to give Nease a 24-17 lead with about five minutes to play.

The defense, which recovered a fumble to set up Stokes' late score, took over from there and forced a turnover on downs to halt a Niceville drive that was beginning to sniff the red zone at the Panther 28-yard

Fourteen points were scored off turnovers by the Panthers, including the first points of the contest when

Stokes hit Dom Henry from eight yards out following a Donavan Wilson interception early in the second quarter.

Three turnovers were forced by the defense on the night.

Last week's hero Cannon Kimball buried a 35-yard field goal, and the game was tied at 10-all at halftime.

The Panthers trailed 17-10 heading into the fourth quarter, but that Eagles' lead was short lived as Taliek Golphin punched in a four-yard rushing score to knot the game back up early in the final

With the win, the Panthers move on to the third round of the 7A playoffs and will face top seed Gainesville Buchholz (11-1), once again on the road.

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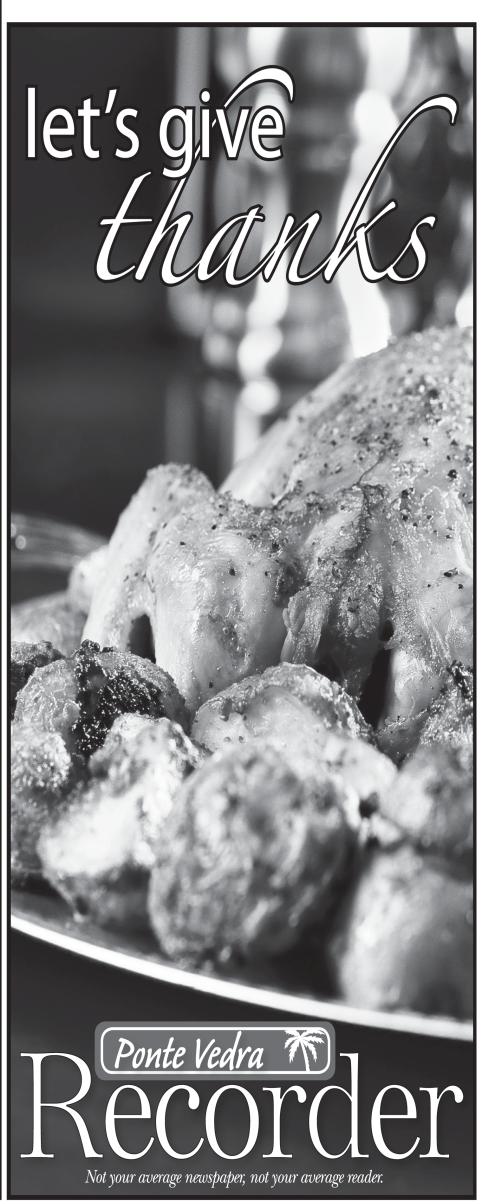
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
