St. Johns County's COVID-19 testing site open every day

The St. Johns County COVID-19 testing site is now open seven days a week to meet the increased demand. The site is located at the Wind Mitigation Building, 3111 Agricultural Center Drive.

The site has been experiencing long wait times, and those seeking tests should be prepared to wait in line for at least an hour.

All tests will be administered on a first-come, first-served basis. To reduce your wait time, pre-registration is strongly encouraged and can be completed at t.co/T4NOf4CW3E.

PCR and rapid (antigen) COVID-19 tests are available for those 12 months of age and older, but recipients may only choose one. Rapid test results will be available the same day, and PCR test results are typically available within 48 hours. Tests are free. Insurance is not required.

The testing site's hours are 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Sunday. For more information, contact the Nomi Health call center at 904-295-0562.

Msgr. Daniel Bernard Logan



"Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matt 25:23)
Msgr. Daniel
Bernard Logan, a leader in the
Diocese of St.
Augustine, went
home to the Lord
on Dec. 27, 2021.
He was 83.

He was born on Feb. 3, 1938, in County Kildare, Ireland, to Peter Logan and Ellen Hynan Logan, and he had two brothers, John Joseph and Thomas Patrick.

Following his ordination to the priesthood in 1963, Logan was recruited to serve in the Diocese of St. Augustine, Fla., by Archbishop Joseph P. Hurley. His first parish assignment was assistant pastor at St. Paul's in Riverside (1963-1967). He also served as assistant pastor at Sacred Heart Parish, Jacksonville (1968-1970), pastor at St. John the Baptist Parish, Atlantic Beach (1970-1974), the founding pastor of Holy Family Parish, Jacksonville (1974-1999) and pastor of Our Lady Star of the Sea Parish, Ponte Vedra Beach retiring from full-time ministry in 2013.

In addition to his parish duties, Msgr. Logan had a long and influential career in Catholic education. He began teaching religion at Bishop Kenny High School in 1965. Two years later, Msgr. Logan earned a master's degree in religious education before being appointed the school's vice-president in 1968. In 1971, Bishop Paul Tanner named the 33-year-old priest president, serving the school until 1989. As pastor of Our Lady Star of the Sea, Msgr. Logan opened Palmer Catholic Academy,

which educates students in pre-kindergarten through 8th grade.

Since 1974, along with his duties as president of Bishop Kenny and pastor of a growing parish, Holy Family, Msgr. Logan was part of a weekly panel of religious leaders in Jacksonville on the television program "For Heaven's Sake," airing on Sundays at 7 a.m. on WJXT-TV. His media talents also included a regular "Question & Answer" column for Community, a diocesan-sponsored page in the Florida Times-Union and Gainesville Sun newspapers. He also wrote for the St. Augustine Catholic magazine and served as a key spokesperson for the diocese with local news media.

Msgr. Logan was a humble and humorous man passionate about his vocation as a priest. He was a man who lived his faith daily, modeling God's teachings.

He is survived by his brothers Tom (Sally) and Jay (Bridie), nieces and nephews, grandnieces and grandnephews and cousins. He will be dearly missed by his family, brother priests, parishioners, students and a wide circle of friends in Ireland.

The Vigil Service will begin at 6:00 p.m. with visitation to follow until 8:00 p.m. at Holy Family Catholic Church, 9800 Baymeadows Road, Jacksonville, FL 32256. A Funeral Mass will be celebrated at 10:00 a.m., Saturday, Jan. 8, at Holy Family. Interment will occur in County Kildare, Ireland. Please visit the online Tribute at www.quinn-shalz.com.



Jim Bush is Florida Power and Light's director of external affairs for most of the northern tier of Florida. As such, he is one of the many people who helps ensure that residents have the power they need.

helps ensure that residents have the power they need.

As told to Shaun Ryan

Many people don't give a lot of thought about the power coming into their homes beyond flipping a switch and seeing the lights come on. But I believe FPL has a lot of people working behind the scenes and a lot of resources devoted to ensuring that the electricity is there when we need it. Can you give us an idea of what it takes to meet the needs of FPL customers?

There is a whole lot that goes on behind the scenes that enables FPL to be consistently recognized as a national leader in service reliability.

We have invested more than \$5 billion over the past 15 years in our system to make our system stronger, smarter and more resilient to severe weather. We have hardened our main power lines, replacing wooden transmission structures with new ones made of steel or concrete. We have installed over 5 million smart meters and more than 155,000 intelligent devices and switches along the energy grid using advanced technology that helps detect problems and restore service faster if outages occur.

We also proactively review about 15,000 miles of power lines each year to trim and remove vegetation where necessary to keep lines clear and prevent outages. Our service reliability has improved by over 40% over the past decade and FPL has been named the most reliable electric utility in the United States in five of the past six years.

This is something that doesn't happen by accident but happens because we are focused on our customers and the communities we serve. Our entire FPL team works hard each day to deliver the most reliable electricity possible, which also happens to be among the most affordable and cleanest in the nation.

Has FPL made any improvements or taken on any initiatives in recent years that consumers should know about?

FPL's investments in highly efficient power plants that run on clean, U.S.-produced natural gas have saved customers nearly \$11 billion in fuel costs since 2001. As of 2021, FPL ended its coal-powered generation in Florida. All of FPL's new energy centers are more than 30% more fuel-efficient than their predecessors, which will help keep our customers' bills low.

FPL also began the Storm Secure Underground Program, a three-year pilot to determine cost-effective ways to replace overhead power lines with more reliable underground lines in select neighborhoods to enhance reliability in good weather and bad.

Additionally, Florida is in the midst of the one of the largest solar expansions in U.S. history, and FPL is the driving force behind this endeavor. Several years ago, FPL announced a plan to install 30 million solar panels by 2030 (the motto is 30 by 30) and we have already made a lot of progress in fulfilling this vision, which will also represent a 67% reduction in carbon emissions. By the time it is said and done, Florida will be a world leader in solar energy production and, most importantly, the air that all Floridians breathe will be much cleaner because of it.

Expanding zero-emissions solar energy is not only good for the environment, but it is also good for our customers as it helps us drive down their energy costs.



What is your role at FPL?

I am FPL's Director of External Affairs for the North and Northwest Regions – which covers from St. Augustine to Pensacola.

Can you give us an idea of your career arc, how you got to where you are today?

I joined FPL directly out of the U.S. Army where I served as an infantry officer. FPL, together with its parent company NextEra Energy, proudly employ nearly 2,000 veterans. That is nearly 13% of our workforce.

I believe there are a lot of similarities between the military and FPL as both are mission-driven organizations. The majority of my career at FPL has been in operational roles in the Power Delivery division, which directly oversees the energy grid.

I have also been fortunate to serve in other departments within FPL, which has helped me gain appreciation of how much is involved in providing the best service possible to customers.

What do you like best about what you do?

I'm all about service, and the most rewarding part of being with FPL is that it allows me to serve my community as well as all FPL customers throughout Florida.

What do you like about living here on the First Coast?

Throughout my life I have lived in many different locations, and I was even stationed overseas in the military, so I definitely have an appreciation for where we live and feel blessed to call North Florida and the First Coast home. We have the best of everything – climate, people and culture. I couldn't ask for a better place to live and raise my family.

How do you like to spend your free time?

I like to spend as much time with my family as possible and also try to find ways to give back to the community, whether it be serving on a local board, as a volunteer with Boy Scouts or a youth sports coach. Personally, I also like to stay active and exercise as well as spending time in the outdoors.

Stevenson files voter privacy bill

State Rep. Cyndi Stevenson filed House Bill 983, a bill regarding voter privacy, on Dec. 20. The bill would restrict who has access to a voter's registration information.

"House Bill 983 exempts voter registration information from public records to protect our citizens from scams," said Stevenson. "It is important to protect this information, as it can and has been misused by those seeking to do harm."

House Bill 983 seeks to strengthen privacy laws by removing voter registration data, such as date of birth, telephone number, e-mail address and party affiliation, from public records. The bill would limit who can request this data to: the individual whose records are confidential and exempt; a canvassing board or an election official in their official capacity; a political party, party official, a candi-

date who has filed qualification papers, or a registered political committee for political purposes only; or a person who receives permission to access the information from the Secretary of State's office.

"We thank Rep. Stevenson for helping to address the number one complaint we hear from our voters, that misinformation or excessive texts and calls come from the data that a voter has on file with us on issues completely unrelated to their right to vote," said Craig Latimer, 2021 president of the Florida Supervisors of Elections. "It is an open opportunity for personal information to be abused."





Ever since Matt Pounder developed a passion for lacrosse, he has been looking for opportunities to give back and help grow the sport he loves.


During the clinic Pounder worked on fundamentals, but the degree of focus on skill and position development can vary depending on the age and the experience level of the participants.

Historic museum plans program on women and slavery

The Ximenez-Fatio House Museum, a long-standing fixture of St. Augustine's historic Aviles Street, will re-launch its "I Lived Here, As Well" specialty tour on Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Jan. 17.

"I Lived Here, As Well — A Woman's Story" is told by the women who may have spent their entire lives in this house, yet never used the front door. Guests will be introduced to several women whose lives were restricted due to the color of their skin. Some were enslaved. Some were free. Some had hopes for freedom, and some saw no hope at all. For guests who had the opportunity to experience the first "I Lived Here, As Well" series told from an enslaved man's point of view in spring of 2021, the new program will continue the story of urban slavery from the woman's perspective.

The tour will be open to the public, led by costumed historical actors and last approximately 60 minutes. The program will include stories and accounts not heard during the traditional museum tour, and guests will also have access to the newly opened Servants Hall exhibit.

Rocket Man

On April 19, 1932, Robert Goddard led his students and staff out into the desert near Roswell, New Mexico, to launch a rocket. This was nothing unusual. Goddard had been launching liquid-fueled rockets for two decades. He had a Ford Model A truck with a homemade trailer to haul those rockets to the launch site.

What made today's rocket special was it was the first to use a gyroscope. The gyroscope allowed the rocket to be aimed. Dr. Goddard built the rockets in his garage. He called this new model the A-4. It blew up eight seconds into the flight, but Goddard decided the gyroscope worked.

Goddard would build more A-4 rockets, eventually flying almost four miles high. He publicly speculated that humans would travel into space and to the moon and maybe even to Mars. Most Americans considered him a quack.

But, across the Atlantic, in Nazi Germany they were taking Dr. Goddard's work very seriously. The Nazis had their own rocket program led by Dr. Wernher Von Braun. Hitler loved Von Braun and poured millions of marks into his

Von Braun and his team built a rocket initially called the A-4. The name was changed to V-2, the V stood for "Vengeance Weapon." The Germans built five-thousand V-2 rockets at Pennemunde in northern Germany. Most of those were launched at London, randomly killing innocent women and children.

After the war, we sent teams into Nazi Germany to collect important scientists. So did the Russians. We won the race to collect Von Braun and his team by one day. We then smuggled them all into the United States and put the former Nazis to work building rockets for us.

Von Braun became the head of NASA and literally built the rocket that took us to the moon. In the '50s, Wernher Von Braun was a regular on Disney. He talked

about traveling to space and to the moon, and maybe even to Mars. There was some controversy during the '60s when it was revealed that Von Braun had been a Nazi and a member of the SS. But, by then we were in a Space Race with the dreaded Soviets.

Today, we find ourselves in a new space race between billionaires competing to rule space tourism. Within a generation, humans will vacation on the moon. It will be a favorite destination for newlyweds seeking the ultimate wedding pictures and give new meaning to the term "honeymoon."

Elon Musk is the face of this new space race. He often talks about sending humans to space and to the moon and even to Mars. If he gets us to Mars, and many people think he will, the rocket that takes us there won't be all that much different than the liquid-fueled rockets that Goddard invented and launched in the desert, just bigger.



Giant next step

Berman drives mission with tour purchase

Mark Berman continues to look for ways to grow the women's golf game and think outside the box to create more opportunities for golfers at the developmental level.

He took another step toward accomplishing that mission, and a huge step it was, by recently purchasing the former Florida-based National Women's Golf Association Tour and quickly rebranding it as the East Coast Women's Pro Golf Tour.

"We're doing this all on credit cards and faith," Berman said. "At the end of the day, it's all about giving these players a taste of what it means to be a professional athlete."

One of the biggest differences is that the former tour solely focused on events in

Florida, compared to the new tour, which has contests tentatively scheduled up and down the East Coast.

Another change Berman has instituted is the introduction of a winter series that starts Jan. 17-19 with a championship at Black Bear Golf Club in Eustis.

The winter series will consist of eight events with the finale March 28-30, while the spring/summer series (official money tour) will have about 8 to 10 events starting in April and ending with the PXG Women's Match Play Championship Oct. 30 to Nov. 3.

"It was always part of the plan to rebuild it from scratch," Berman said. "I'm not just trying to add to the development landscape, but we're trying to find opportunities for these women and create an environment where they can chase their

According to Berman, creating opportunities means scheduling more events for them to showcase their skills and earn money, which is one of the primary reasons behind the creation of the winter series to go along with the already established spring season.

Berman hopes that the tour will help fill a void that currently exists along the East

on a massive undertaking designed to grow the game of women's golf, as he created and directed the inaugural PXG Women's Match Play Championship at World Golf Village this past October.

He understands going from operating a tournament to running an entire tour is quite the leap, but it is not something he had not thought about before.

In fact, Berman looked into purchasing the tour three years ago, but when the talks fell through, he turned his attention to putting on "the Super Bowl of women's developmental golf."

It was the experience at the championship that convinced him to pursue the tour once more.

"It all goes back to me being inside the ropes," Berman said.

His passion stems from not only directing the PXG Women's Match Play Cham-

pionship, but also from years of watching his daughter Hannah Berman learn and play the game over the years, including at the college level at Jacksonville University and during her quest to become a professional.

Player feedback is an important aspect in the way Berman plans to run the East Coast Women's Pro Golf Tour, as he hopes to create a tour that always has the best interest of its players in mind.

"I've listened to what the things are that would make for a meaningful tour," Ber-

Some of the best feedback he received was in conversations he had with players during a rain delay at the Match Play Championhip.

According to Berman, the stories of what players are willing to go through to see their golf dreams come true are end-

"One player works in an oil refinery at night and practices golf six hours during the day," Berman said. "That just shows the dedication."

Berman hopes to continue to promote similar stories taking place, while doing what he can to help lay the groundwork for future career paths in women's golf.

"It's a mission-driven effort, and people are buying into the mission," Berman said.

Ponte Vedra captures holiday tournament in Naples

The Ponte Vedra Sharks made their long trip deep into southern Florida for a remarkable success by winning the Kelleher Law Holliday Hoopfest with a 64-57 victory over Evans High School of Orlando in the 16-team tournament finale.

The Sharks earned the right to play for the title following convincing wins over Gulf Coast (59-26), Doral Academy (60-31) and Somerset Prep (62-39). Meanwhile, Evans High, which welcomed back a number of their regulars who missed most of their previous games before the Naples tourney, completely overwhelmed their first three opponents by scores of 81-26, 86-72, and 67-29.

The final game between the two finalists lived up to its billing and then some, but balance scoring, airtight defense, the ability to protect the ball and some deadly free-throw shooting led to a Shark win and their seventh straight victory since tasting defeat earlier in the month at the Fortegra tournament.

The Sharks led, but barely at every

stop, and held a slim 54-52 lead with 1:21 left in the contest. "My personal goals were involved with the building of the team in mind," Kelly said.


He is currently averaging 1.9 steals per contest and has shot 42% from beyond the arc, including draining six three-pointers




