

#### Growth management workshop to seek community input

St. Johns County has seen substantial growth over the last 10 years. The 2020 census revealed that the county grew by nearly 44%, placing it among the fastest-growing counties in the United States and the second-fastest-growing county in Florida.

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners will discuss topics related to managing future growth and addressing infrastructure needs at an upcoming growth-management workshop.

Residents and stakeholders are invited to provide comments after county staff completes their presentations.

The four topics that will be discussed include: local government's role in managing growth, current growth trends and infrastructure needs, transportation planning and concurrency and additional considerations for new development

The workshop will be held at 9 a.m. Jan. 25 in the county auditorium, 500 San Sebastian View, St. Augustine.



# Off-duty patrol absent in MSD during holidays

The new partnership between the Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District and the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, in which the MSD hires off-duty deputies for extra patrol has some kinks that need ironing out.

According to MSD chairman Brad Wester, he was informed that there had been no off-duty patrols in the area since the last board meeting Dec. 13, 2021.

Wester stated during the Jan. 10 meeting that the Sheriff's Office did not continue to post the off-duty patrol sheet over the holidays.

He said that he was surprised by the information he received, especially after specially talking to the Sheriff's Office about the need for holiday patrol.

Trustee John Cellucci asked if there is someone that could monitor the situation, so they don't have to wait until the end of the month before realizing it again.

Wester agreed that there should be a trustee assigned with tracking the off-duty schedule.

Also discussed, was an email Ben Bright with the St. Johns County Public Works Department sent to Wester that mentioned the county is looking into a study pertaining to traffic calming on San Juan Drive.

However, any study would not start until the waterline and paving project on Ponte Vedra Boulevard is complete.

Other approvals included the placement of a streetlight at the intersection of Maria Place and Le Master Drive. Trust-

ees Gary Jurenovich and Mack McCuller opposed the addition of the streetlight.

Jurenovich was not sure if all the residents with houses near that intersection would be in favor of it, but Trustee Holly Kartsonis assured that she went to each house and spoke with the owners, who were in favor of it.

The board also approved Trustee Kitty Switkes' request for \$840 to pay Bob's Backflow & Plumbing Company for work needed at the intersection of State Road A1A and Corona Road, as well as a resolution for the allowance of dual driveways along Ponte Vedra Boulevard for lots less than 150 feet wide that will be taken to the St. Johns County Commission for approval.

Kartsonis was the lone opposition to

the proposed dual driveway allowance.

The MSD also held the board's annual election of officers and Al Hollon was unanimously named the new chairman.

Hollon replaces Wester, who served back-to-back terms as chairman and will remain on the board as a trustee.

"I've learned a lot about myself," Wester said.

Hollon has held the role of chairman on the board in the past.

"It's certainly a high honor," Hollon said

Switkes will replace Hollon as vice chair following a unanimous vote as well and Jurenovich will remain treasurer.

#### **As told to Anthony Richards**

#### Can you please tell us a little bit about your background and what your goals are for the future?

# Vigils provide opposing views of Capitol riot

The first anniversary of the Jan. 6 incursion into the U.S. Capitol as Congress met to count electoral votes cast into high relief a growing division among Americans. That division was just as apparent in St. Augustine as elsewhere in the nation.

A candlelight vigil on the west lawn of the Castillo de San Marcos, organized by Blue Guardians of Democracy, attracted several dozen people — including a small group of dissenters. The gist of the gathering was that the riot at the Capitol was an assault on democracy and that those who took part were insurrectionists.

Speaking at the vigil were representatives of the St. Augustine Black Caucus, the National Organization for Women Jacksonville, Blue Wave of St. Johns County and

League of Women Voters of Jacksonville President Lanelle Phillmon described three pieces of legislation related to voters' rights that vigil organizers encouraged

attendees to support.

These were the Freedom to Vote Act, the Protecting Our Democracy Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act.

Later, in the Plaza de la Constitucion, another group gathered for another candlelight vigil, this one in support of those who pieced the Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021.

Signs at this rally referred to those arrested after the

riot as political prisoners. It was one of several such gatherings across the nation organized by Look Ahead America. The opening speaker was Pastor Kevin Tuck.

On Jan. 6, 2021, thousands of supporters of President Donald Trump attacked the Capitol to disrupt the joint session of Congress, which was assembled to formalize the victory of President-elect Joe Biden.

# Pedigo named St. Augustine fire marshal

St. Augustine Fire Chief Carlos Aviles has announced that Fire Safety Inspector Abby Pedigo was selected as the next fire marshal

to succeed retiring Fire Marshal Robert "Bob" Growick, effective Feb. 23.

A St. Augustine native, Pedigo graduated from St. Augustine High School in 2008, and went on to complete her associates of arts in English from Santa Fe College in 2009. She graduated from Flagler College in 2017 with a bachelor of science in public administration.

Pedigo joined the St. Augustine Fire Department in November 2014 as a firefighter and paramedic.

"The office of the fire marshal plays a vital role in our overall mission, and with the position comes an immense amount of responsibility," Aviles said. "Abby is a loyal and dedicated professional who embodies and lives by our core values. I am confident in her abilities to continue to lead the department forward and face the challenges of future growth and redevelopment."

When asked about being selected as fire marshal, Pedigo said, "I am grateful for the opportunity to serve my city in this capacity and humbled by the outpouring of support from my department and our city administration."

In 2019, Pedigo was promoted to fire safety inspector, responsible for conducting fire and life safety inspections in busi-

nesses and short-term rentals, overseeing all public education, and reviewing building construction and engineering plans.

Among many other responsibilities as fire safety inspector, Pedigo also performed fire scene investigations, attended weekly special events and development

review committee meetings, led firefighters on pre-fire tours in new construction, coordinated with other city departments and officials to enforce the city's shortterm rental ordinance, and served as a member of the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office Incident Management Team.



# **Sunland Acres continues to expand beyond boarding**

Sunland Acres Pet Boarding Camp in Fruit Cove has been offering a place for owners to leave their dogs and cats since 1976, and it continues to be a fixture in the North Florida area.

Lynn Lamoureux bought the business at its Fruit Cove Road location five years ago from original owner Marjorie Winchester and has expanded the boarding facility to include a grooming service.

The business has been in its current location for so long that houses were built around it over time and now it is in a quaint setting tucked in amongst a neighborhood.

"Every dog needs attention, but different dogs need different things," Lamoureux said. "We hire people that really just love working with dogs and have the

patience and want to be doing this kind of work. It takes a special person to be good at reading the dogs."

Eight members currently make up the Sunland Acres staff, including team manager Tish Finnieston.

"The most important thing is having the right culture, and that means having the right people in place," Lamoureux said.

As a result, Lamoureux is always on the lookout for passionate animal lovers that have an interest in their program and learning the ropes as either a groomer or pet receptionist at either of the facilities.

"It's like dropping your child off at daycare," Finnieston said. "These owners are dropping their pets off and trusting that everything is going to be good and happy."

One of the things that spurred the addition of the grooming service at Sunland

Acres was going through the COVID-19 pandemic, which was a period where not many people were traveling, and therefore they did not have to board their dogs.

There was so much interest that the grooming option has continued, even once people started traveling more.

"This year people started traveling again and even more people wanted their dogs groomed," Lamoureux said. "It was a new challenge of how to gear up for the extra work that quickly. That's where Tish does an amazing job of verifying that all the things are lined up and running correctly."

Sunland Acres consists of 48 rooms and some dogs that come together can stay together, which means they can house more than 48 dogs at one time depending on the situation.

The rooms inside each have a door on

a pulley that can be opened and allow the dogs to go back and forth from their inside room to their individual fenced-in space outside.

Lamoureux also owns Green Dog Spa on Baymeadows Road in Jacksonville, which has been open 10 years and focuses solely on grooming of dogs and cats.

"We work with the National Dog Groomer Association of America to follow the guidelines and perform the specific breed profile haircuts," Lamoureux said.

Each dog that is boarded at Sunland Acres gets groomed right before they go home to their owner.

"We love it, because we love to see them (dogs) looking pretty and getting all fixed up with bandanas and bows," Lamoureux said.

# Officials break ground on public golf course project

If all goes according to plan, St. Johns County residents and visitors will begin teeing off in October at a newly renovated, "must-play" public course in Elkton.

On Wednesday, Jan. 5, county officials, staff and members of the public gathered at St. Johns Golf Club for a groundbreaking ceremony marking a new chapter in the life of the 33-year-old course. The project will give the landmark venue a major facelift.

In April, the County Commission approved funding for the renovation, with that money coming from recreation impact fees, the transportation trust fund, the utility fund, the bed tax and the general fund.

The project will cost \$8 million with \$6.2 million for course renovation performed by Wadsworth Golf Construction Co. of Plainfield, Illinois, and about \$900,000 for clubhouse and cart barn renovations performed by DiMare Construction of St. Augustine.

The need for the project is manifest. The course and clubhouse are showing the effects of heavy use —1.8 million rounds have been played there since they opened in 1989. The clubhouse, built to serve 35,000 people annually, saw use by 62,000 last year alone.

Statistically, 65% of rounds played on the course were from local golfers, with the remainder being visitors. In addition to individual golfers, the course has been used by teams from Pedro Menendez and St. Augustine high schools and St. Joseph Academy. It has also operated in partnership with First Tee of North Florida, and four leagues call it home.

brown and various attributes in need of re-creation.

According to course director Wes Tucker, the contractors will re-do the greens, tees, fairways, irrigation, drainage, bunkers and cart paths. The clubhouse will be roomier and ADA compli-

"It will basically be a brand new golf course when we finish," Tucker said.

County Commissioner Henry Dean predicted that, once done, the course will be one of the better ones in Northeast Florida.

The new course has been designed by Erik Larson of Ponte Vedra-based LarsonGolf.

"The golf course must have, in my opinion, its own identity and its own character unlike anything around," he said, adding that he wanted it to be a "must-play" course.

He projected that construction would take between six and seven months and that growing would take about three months.

The course is par 71, with par 35 on the front nine, par 36 on the back.

County Commissioner Paul Waldron said he was at the original opening and called the course a "great asset to the

# Celtic festival, St. Patrick parade set for March

Plans are under way for the St. Augustine Celtic Music & Heritage Festival, which will be held in March.

The 2022 Grand Marshal of the parade will be The Sisters of St. Joseph representing the Miguel O'Reilly House, which has been in the care and ownership of the Sisters since 1866.

The unique history of the house and its tradition is an important part of the history of St. Augustine. Father O'Reilly, an Irish priest, was vicar to the Spanish colonists in the city, which was Spain's capital in La Florida.

The Sisters opened The O'Reilly House,

known officially known as the Father Miguel O'Reilly House Museum, and the House of Don Lorenzo de Leon as a museum and fundraising site at 32 Aviles St. On Oct. 15, 1974, the house was added to the U.S. National Register of Historic Places.



# Growing number to play in JAGA First Coast Amateur

Entering its sixth year, the Jacksonville Area Golf Association's (JAGA) First Coast Amateur continues to enjoy growing appeal and popularity among the nation's top amateur golfers. The Conservatory at Hammock Beach Golf Resort and Spa will host the event for the third year.

Interest in the upcoming (Jan. 15-17) championship was so strong this year that 140 players signed up within four weeks of the Nov. 1 start of registration. That number grew to as many as 177 in December.

Thirty-seven of the 96 available playing spots were allocated based on seven exemption categories. An additional 10 committee picks were awarded Dec. 23 to round out the field.
