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

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

## Tell us a little bit about yourself. Where are you from originally? What is your background?

# THE PLAYERS to hold "Cooking with Champions" event

THE PLAYERS has teamed up with Duval County Public Schools to hold a "Cooking with Champions" event designed to educate students about the culinary arts field and test their cooking skills.

Several schools will take part in the competition, which is scheduled for Feb. 8 at Frank H. Peterson Academies of Technology in Jacksonville.

Students will get the opportunity to work side by side and will be judged by TPC Sawgrass senior executive chef Azhar Mohammad and PGA Tour Global Home chef director Eric Butcher.

"We can give an exposure to a student like nowhere else in this area," Mohammad said. "We need to get these students familiar with what it's like in the culinary field."

The recipe chosen for students to cook will be a dish featuring scallops and served with butternut squash risotto.

"Risotto is something every student needs to know," Mohammad said.

He compared cooking risotto to that of cooking pasta.

According to Mohammad, when deciding on a recipe many factors were considered, including finding a dish that challenges the students' skill sets, while also being a dish popular with many. "By giving them a dish that is very technical, it will allow us to see their knife skills, how they sear and their temperature control," Mohammad said.

Creating a popular dish is especially important because the winning group of students will then prepare the dish to be served to patrons during this year's championship in March.

"I'm excited to see the culinary talent,"
Butcher said.

Publix will present each team with a \$100 gift card to go toward the purchase of supplies to prepare for the competition. The business will also provide the necessary materials used during the event.

Florida State College of Jacksonville will offer a \$500 scholarship to the winners with the option for them continuing their culinary experience at the school once they graduate high school.

Students were selected to compete in the competition after advancing through each school's respective semifinal stage.

Five teams will compete and be represented by students from Frank H. Peterson Academies of Technology, Mandarin High School, First Coast High School and two teams will be from Sandalwood High School.

# County bans release of balloons, sky lanterns

St. Johns County Commissioners voted unanimously at its Jan. 18 meeting to prohibit the outdoor release of balloons and sky lanterns within the county.

In doing so, the board amended an ordinance that had been drawn up in 1988 to prohibit littering and the abandonment of cars on public rights of way within unincorporated areas of the county.

The ban applies to all balloons, regardless of whether they are made from rubber, latex, polychloroprene, nylon fabric or myla

Any release, even if unintentional, could mean a fine of up to \$500.

The county's ordinance is stricter that Florida statute, which only bans the release of 10 or more balloons.

Wildlife advocates have long opposed the release of balloons because they inevitably come down and are mistaken by animals for food. When an animal ingests a balloon, it can damage the digestive system, leading to starvation and death.

In addition, animals sometimes become entangled in the strings tied to the bal-

loons

According to the county's amendment, experts rate balloons as the single most deadly marine debris to sea birds and the third most deadly to sea turtles and marine mammals.

In addition to posing a risk to wildlife, mylar balloons have been known to cause power outages when caught on power lines, and balloons of any type may endanger aircraft.

Sky lanterns are similar to small hot-air balloons, typically a bag with a flame that heats the air inside it, allowing it to float into the air. One danger associated with sky lanterns is that, if they land on combustible materials, they can start a fire.

The National Association of State Fire Marshals has advocated for a nationwide ban on their release. In fact, Florida is one of 30 states to ban sky lanterns.

In addition, balloons and sky lanterns return to earth as litter.

The ordinance spells out two exceptions to its ban: balloons released on behalf of a government agency for scientific or meteorological purposes and balloons released indoors.

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## County Commission hears residents' concerns about growth

During a public listening session on Tuesday, Jan. 25, the St. Johns County Commissioners had an opportunity to hear from residents regarding the abundant growth currently under way. And one theme appeared to dominate: many want the ongoing development checked.

The county auditorium was filled to capacity, with nearly every seat taken. And when it came time for public comment, so many queued up to have their three minutes at the mic that the workshop lasted for four hours.

Speakers cited a host of impacts wrought by the accelerated pace of new development, particularly its effect on infrastructure, the environment, the school system and traffic flow.

"One of the things that we're hearing here today is a lot of different concerns from a lot of different folks," said Katherine Sanborn of Ponte Vedra Beach. "I think it's safe to say that many if not the majority, perhaps the vast majority, of folks in St. Johns County, residents, don't want to see a lot more development."

Her comment drew applause from the assembly.

"It seems to me that we have almost uncontrollable growth right now, and because it's happened so rapidly, it may be a good idea to be able to address some of these varied concerns, to have a pause," she continued.

Other residents of the Ponte Vedra area also weighed in.

Anna Logan of Nocatee showed photos of ground water turning a wooded area near her home into as swamp. Brian Anderson, also of Nocatee, pointed out that traffic has significantly increased on Palm Valley Road and that area sidewalks were not adequate. Glen Landers of Ponte Vedra asked that the county take the impacts of climate change and sea level rise into consideration as it addresses growth.

Between 2010 and 2020, the county's population grew by 44%, from 190,039 to 273,425. The inflow of new residents has resulted in a housing shortage, resulting in people paying more than the asking price for homes on the market.

The growth has posed challenges not just with regard to transportation, but for law enforcement and fire rescue. It's also had an impact on utilities, parks and recreation, waterway access, libraries and solid waste.

Though growth is happening throughout the county, the northwest and Nocatee are seeing an especially high amount of residential development.

And, as many new homes have been built, there is a potential for many more.

Of the 137,153 planned unit development residential units approved over the past 50 years, only 75,480 have been built, leaving 61,673 yet to come.

As motorists have noticed, this surge in growth has affected traffic.

Phong Nguyen, the county's transportation development manager, reported that, based on existing traffic, 18 roadway segments are deficient, eight critically so. The estimated cost of improving these roads is about \$191 million.

To improve county roads alone – as opposed to state roads – available funding falls about \$140 million short of what is

eeded

One of the problems with funding results from a delay between when a development is approved and when it is built.

Impact fees imposed upon construction are supposed to fund road construction to mitigate the impact of the resulting increase in traffic. But if construction is delayed – sometimes for decades – the fee remains the same even when inflation during that period means the cost of roadway improvements is higher.

The commission was not able to take action at the meeting as it was a workshop.

"She's a beast going to the basket,"


Piggott said. "No one wants to get in her way."

She will enter college as a business major but also wants to focus on the marketing side of things.

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
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
