New St. Johns County property appraiser identifies growth as office's greatest challenge

New St. Johns County Property Appraiser Eddie Creamer said the biggest challenge for his office is meeting the demands of growth and increased residential development.

"There are 3,700 new houses that were built last year in St. Johns County," said Creamer. "Another 3,700 will be built this year. Another 5,000-6,000 lots have been permitted, and new roads are being built."

Since the county is primarily funded by property taxes, which start with assessed values on property, Creamer said the buck stops with his office. He said his team's ability to maintain inspections of new and existing homes and permits in an area that's growing as fast as St. Johns County is critical.

"The challenge in the office will be leveraging technology and people to keep up with the growth of our county and making sure we meet our constitutional mandate and are ahead of the curve in doing that," said Creamer.

The new property appraiser will work to address this challenge after 35 years of private sector experience in the banking industry. The former CEO of Prosperity Bank and regional president of Ameris

Bank takes over for Sharon Outland, who retired from the property appraiser's office at the end of her term.

"I think I bring to the office the ability

to supervise large staffs and grow those staffs and provide leadership and motivation to the people who are actually doing the jobs," he said.

Creamer ran unopposed for the position and was sworn into office Jan. 3. He jokingly said the job is going great so far since nobody has quit or thrown anything at him

"I'm absolutely loving every minute of it," Creamer said. "This is a fantastic staff within the office: a lot of people with a long tenure that understand what we do, and they do it well. It's been an honor to join them."

Hurricane Matthew has also presented his office with challenges, Creamer added, noting that his office typically begins its normal property assessment process now. But due to Matthew, his assessors are conducting damage inspections and reassessing homes, which have pushed the timeline for the start of normal assessments into February.

"Any time there's a large natural disaster like that, it will put a strain on the office." he said.

For residents who are unsure whether the damage to their homes from Matthew qualifies for reassessment, Creamer stressed that they contact his office so his team can help them determine what to do.

Creamer's other primary responsibility in office is to manage homestead exemptions. He said residents who need to apply for homestead exemptions or change them need to do so by March 1. He said this is especially important in Florida.

"It lowers your immediate taxes, but it also puts a cap on how much your property can go up as we go forward," said Creamer. "In this county with the growth, getting that cap on your homestead is going to be very important."

Originally from Port St. Joe in the Florida panhandle, Creamer and his wife have lived and worked in St. Augustine for 25 years. The new property appraiser has been actively involved in the community as a member of the Rotary Club, Florida Highway Patrol Advisory Council, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office promotion board, and as a trustee at Flagler College. He's also served on the Betty Griffin House board of directors and as an active volunteer at Catholic Charities.

"Public service has always been really important to me," said Creamer. "I've always believed it's important that people get involved in every level to try and improve both government and the charitable sector."

Congressman John Rutherford recovering from medical episode in hospital

Northeast Florida Congressman John Rutherford is recovering after experiencing a medical emergency in the U.S. Capitol Jan. 11.

According to a statement from Rutherford's Chief of Staff Kelly Simpson, the Republican from Florida's 4th Congressional District experienced an acute digestive flare up, and not a heart attack as widely reported.

"Doctors are happy to report that all of his vitals look great," said Simpson in the statement released Jan. 12.

"While he will briefly remain in the hospital to treat the inflammation, the congressman's care providers expect

that he will be back to full strength in little time."

Rutherford experienced significant discomfort while outside the House chamber the evening of Jan. 11, said Simpson, and

received medical care in the Capitol before being evacuated to a local hospital.

Rutherford, the former Duval County Sheriff, was elected to the U.S. Congress in November and sworn into office in early January.

The event – which takes the place of the traditional Noche de Gala marking Pedro Menendez's birthday – will benefit St. Augustine Youth Services.

The festivities will begin at 5 p.m. Friday, Feb. 10 at OC White's in the historic district with a free meet and greet followed by a scavenger hunt.

On Saturday, Feb. 11, the event will begin at 5 p.m. with a "Jollification Hour" followed by the ball from 6:30 to 10 p.m. Guests are invited to join the royal family in dressing in cream and white, period dress from 1513 to 1812

or cocktail attire.

All proceeds from the ball will benefit St. Augustine Youth Services (SAYS), a therapeutic residential group home for boys ages 6-17 who have been victims of severe abuse and/or neglect.

SAYS also coordinates the countywide Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) to address the dramatic increase of St. Johns County children who are involuntarily hospitalized.

Tickets for the Winter White Ball are \$90 per person and include appetizers, a buffet dinner and music by Cotton-

U.S. Marshals arrest suspect in Ponte Vedra Beach home invasion

Car stolen from victims recovered in Jacksonville

The U.S. Marshals Service arrested a suspect in last week's home invasion and robbery in Ponte Vedra Beach, and St. Johns County detectives are now seeking two additional suspects believed to be associates of the man in custody.

Kyle Andre-Justin Byrd of Baldwin, Florida was taken into custody Jan. 13 for violating probation in Duval County. Following his arrest, St. Johns County detectives interviewed him regarding the events surrounding the Jan. 9 home

invasion on Great Harbor Way in Ponte Vedra Beach. Byrd was subsequently charged with kidnapping, false imprisonment, home invasion and grand theft of a motor vehicle. That car – a 2009 grey Subaru Legacy belonging to the

victims of the home invasion – has since been recovered in Jacksonville and is being forensically examined by the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office. Following his arrest, Byrd was transported and booked into the Duval County Jail. Detectives continue to seek two additional suspects who are believed to have participated in the Jan. 9 home invasion, when two black males armed with handguns reportedly forced their way into a couple's residence on Great Harbor Way and began taking property. According to the couple, a third black male arrived later holding another person – later identified as Marcus Anthony Hatch, 16, of Jacksonville – at gunpoint. The couple's roommate then arrived home and was also held

at gunpoint. The suspects then tied up the three victims before leaving with Hatch in the couple's Subaru.

An Amber Alert was issued Jan. 10 for the stolen car and Hatch, who was found in good health later that day in Jacksonville. Investigators were working with him to gather more information on the alleged home invasion and robbery.

Sheriff's deputies are asking anyone who may have information regarding Byrd's activities or his known associates to contact the Major Crimes Unit or Crime Stoppers.

SJCSD organizes meeting to collect input on Nease's next principal

St. Johns County School District administrators recently assembled a group of teachers and parents at Nease High School to gather input on the desired characteristics and profile of Nease's next principal.

Kyle Dresback, Nease's current principal, has been selected to become associate superintendent of student support services for the district. Dresback will replace Cathy Mittelstadt, who has been selected to serve as the deputy superintendent for operations

Brennan Asplen, deputy superintendent for academic and student services, and Cathy Hutchins, associate superintendent of human resources, moderated the discussion regarding the ideal qualities for Dresback's replacement.

"You are the folks that know what's happening at Nease more than anybody," said Asplen at the meeting Jan. 11."You know where the school is going. You know where you want it to go, and you know the characteristics you want to see in your principal. That's really why we're here, and we do take that information seriously."

In general, the meeting attendees said their ideal principal is family friendly, passionate, caring, forward thinking, positive, inspiring, creative and flexible, among many other traits.

Kelly Barrera, St. Johns County School District School Board member representing District 4, specifically said that the community is looking for a principal that is broad ranging.

"He/she has both the ability to run the operational side of the house and the academic side of the house," said Bar-

rera. "And yet he/she has a heart for the community, with the students and for the teachers. He/she is willing to go to bat for the students and the teachers."

Parent Lyn Wolfe added that Nease needs someone who is open to working with multiple constituencies.

"Someone that looks around and makes measured decisions after trying to understand why things are the way they are and makes decisions in due course," she said.

In addition, Asplen and Hutchins gathered input on the challenges and goals that the new principal will need to address at Nease. Mittelstadt, who also attended the meeting, said the community members hit the nail on the head with their feedback.

"It's about managing the growth and all the pressures that apply to Nease High School," said Mittelstadt. "The teachers' voice, the parents' voice...sharing those concerns is really critical and viable for (Supt.) Forson to make an informed decision moving forward."

The teachers and parents also identified issues such as construction, the quality and maintenance of advanced programs and resources for mental health as challenges

According to the meeting attendees, some of the school's primary goals include maintaining high performance while keeping high performing teachers, creating more opportunities for professional development for teachers, and maintaining school spirit and pride among students and staff.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Asplen said they would send notes from the session to Superintendent Tim Forson, who is leading the search committee. Forson is reviewing both internal and external

candidates for Dresback's replacement, said Asplen. The exact timeline for the selection of the new principal is unknown.

"I can't tell you that' he's going to make a decision this week or next week," said Asplen. "He'll take a lot of time to look at it to make sure he has the right person coming in."

In the interim, Asplen reiterated that the district is not going to move Dresback into his new role until a new principal is selected for Nease.

"Nease is an awesome school," he said.
"We want to make sure it stays an awesome school. I know all of you as teachers
and parents really make it a great school
as it is. We want to make sure we get the
right fit in here."

Starting March 1 we will have more than 1,000 summer camps so families can research prices, dates, early registration discounts, free camps, and area of town in one click

We also have a calendar page that lists hundreds of events for families. If you have the kids home on a Monday, just check that date and you'll see all the library programs, free fun places to jump and special events. Families will love following our social media pages where we do multiple fun giveaways weekly and share ideas for free fun! We receive over 200,000 page views a month, all from families in Northeast Florida looking for things to do with their children. Essentially we are a one stop shop for kids in Jacksonville.

You have an extensive background in forestry and conservation. How did you come to found a website focused on family activities?

I grew up on the beaches of Jacksonville, but through my dad's extensive gardening at home, I developed a love for nature and caring for the environment. That led me to The College of Charleston to pursue a Biology degree. Following an internship with the USDA Forest Service, I came back to Florida to complete a master's degree in Forest Resources and Conservation at The University of Florida. Growing up in the city within Jax, you can imagine how surprised I was to find myself working for almost a decade alongside mostly cowboys and men in Florida's forests. I am a Florida Certified Prescribed Burner, qualified to lead prescribed burns and respond to forest fires. I've conducted close to 100 burns in Florida's forests

When my first baby was born, I decided I couldn't sleep on wildfires for weeks without her. I stayed home and started my own environmental consulting business while I finished my second master's degree. For two years with my daughter at home, I used the Fun4GatorKids.com website to find tons of activities around town. When they started expanding, I decided to team up with my sister and start our own Fun4FirstCoastKids. com website in Jacksonville!

As a Jacksonville native, what do you think visitors or newcomers may find surprising to learn about the First Coast and the things to do here?

Many people think of beaches when they think of Florida, but many would be surprised to know that Jacksonville has the largest urban park system in the entire United States. We have hundreds of City of Jax parks, thousands of acres of St. Johns River Water Management District backcountry lands, and national parks lands. You can get lost in our forests yet be right in the middle of big city Jacksonville! This is a great place to immerse

children in nature and start them on a path towards loving and protecting our environment.

With your background in nature and conservation, what are some of your personal favorite First Coast outdoor activities?

My sister and I started playing beach volleyball at age 16 at our Jacksonville Beach pier so we love being active at the beach. Even though we fought growing up, we were actually beach doubles partners and toured Florida regionally, playing in beach volleyball tournaments. We were a great team, then and now! We also like hiking at Julington Durbin Preserve in Bartram Park so we can get our kids out in nature and show them where I used to work with prescribed fire.

While your website is focused on local activities, you have traveled quite a bit. What were some of your favorite destinations and experiences?

I love learning new languages and experiencing life in different cultures to learn about other perspectives. That led me to travel to Europe in 2006 and experience the food, languages and ancient architecture of many of the western European countries. In 2008 I was invited to experience a Rotary International Group Study Exchange to study water management in the Netherlands for a month. I have volunteered with kids in Guatemala, where I hiked a volcano to within arm's reach of flowing lava; I've hiked many trails throughout Alaska; I've hiked the four-day Incan Trail to Machu Picchu with my husband while pregnant; and I've hiked on almost every trail in Northeast Florida. In fact, my book, "100 Backcountry Hikes: Hiking the Trails of Florida's Water Management Districts," comes out this year!

What is your favorite part of living on the First Coast?

My favorite part of living on the First Coast is being so close to such a unique ecosystem of Florida nature. Every day we are part of, survive in and get to see Florida's natural beauty. I love being near our swamps, rivers, creeks, estuaries and nearby springs. How cool is it that we have manatees, right whales that swim to our oceans to calve in the winter and even Florida black bears not far from Jax? Our beaches are wild and untamed and the ocean air brings relaxation and peace. The First Coast has all the "Old Florida" beauty, and even though we have alligators, tons of mosquitoes, bugs, heat, snakes and humidity, I love it all.

Sawgrass resident and former golf executive turned published author of unique golf book

Ponte Vedra Beach is well known for being home to the PGA Tour, one of golf's greatest courses in TPC Sawgrass and some of the sport's most prominent players in Jim Furyk, Vijay Singh and Fred Funk, to name just a few. What people may not know, however, is that it's also home to a great sources of golf knowledge in the form of former golf industry executive David Hueber, who recently published a book about the sport that he said is unlike any other.

Formerly the vice president of marketing at the PGA Tour and president and CEO of the National Golf Foundation, Hueber is also now the author of "In the Rough: The Business Game of Golf," which has been on sale since Oct. 1.

"I describe it as a 'Forest Gump'-like experience through the golf industry," said Hueber, who lives in Water Oak in the Sawgrass Players Club community. "My book is about the business of the game based on my experience and the people I worked with."

Hueber takes his readers on a behindthe-scenes adventure through his business career in the golf industry and shares life lessons he both personally experienced and observed in others involved in the sport. He stresses that the book is more about the people he encountered than himself

"It's about the greats of the game and golf business...what they were like off the course and in the boardroom," he said.


These greats include Ben Hogan, one of golf's best all-time players and a highly success-

ful golf-equipment executive and businessman; Deane Beman, who was a star amateur, successful professional golfer and commissioner of the PGA Tour for 20 years; and Minoru Isutani, a wealthy Japanese entrepreneur, who is probably best known for having lost \$350 million on the purchase and sale of Pebble Beach. Other characters featured in the book include Jack Nicklaus, Ping Golf Company Founder Karsten Solheim, Greg Norman and Ely Callaway Jr.

"It makes it an easier read when you connect the dots to people and personalities," said Hueber.

"In the Rough" also touches on Hueber's knowledge regarding trends in the golf industry, specifically related to why the sport has seen a recent decline in participation.

"We created a monster," said Hueber, who noted that the golf industry has averaged 160 course closures a year since 2006. "We built too many golf courses, often times in the wrong places. The

model is broken."

Jerry Tarde, chairman and editor-inchief of Golf Digest, speaks highly of the book.

"You've probably never heard of David Hueber, but he's one of the most influential people in golf over the past 25 years," said Tarde in his review of the book.

"Over the course of the book, you'll get a glimpse inside the PGA Tour during its

'Wonder Years,' as well as what it was like to work alongside Ben Hogan or play Pebble Beach anytime you wanted."

Hueber, who also holds the patents for the invention of hybrid woods, is a native of Fort Wayne, Indiana, that grew up in the golf business. His father was a club pro, and he started out as a caddie, mowed greens and played well enough as a teenager to earn a golf scholarship to Florida State University. This led to a business career in marketing at the PGA Tour under Commissioner Deane Beman.

He served as vice president of marketing until he moved to the National Golf Foundation, becoming the organization's president and CEO. He then became president and CEO of the Ben Hogan Company when it was owned by Cosmo World, a Japanese company. He also served as president of Ben Hogan Property Companies, which owned Pebble Beach.

Now with a doctorate from Clemson University, where his dissertation research focused on sustainable golf course development, Heuber is currently a consultant and strategic planner for golf companies and real estate developers, working to make the golf industry less myopic.

Hueber has lived in Ponte Vedra Beach with his wife Cindy for more than 25 years.

Melodica Men: Musicians take on new instrument after viral hit

Joe Buono and Tristan Clark come from musical backgrounds that would be considered impressive by any stretch of the imagination. At just 24 and 26 years of age, the pair out of Murray Hill has a series of accomplishments between them: Buono is a composer and teacher who has earned two master's degrees from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins Peabody Institute, and Clark is a recent graduate of the Juilliard School who plays principal trumpet with the Jacksonville Symphony.

But in 2016, it wasn't the trumpet or a series of original compositions that took the duo on a whirlwind journey of busking that would eventually lead them to a solo debut with the Jacksonville Symphony at the Holiday Pops concert series. It was the melodica – a free-reed instrument crossing a keyboard and a harmonica, more typically used for play or music education than serious performances.

The two saw viral fame after their three-minute melodica arrangement of "Rite of Spring" racked up more than 1.5 million views on Facebook in just a day – exposure that would get the ball rolling for the friends who would later refer to themselves as Melodica Men. With a strong start under their belts, Clark and Buono are looking to take their skills to the stage and beyond – but for that ambition, there was a rather lighthearted start.

Playful beginnings

It was a toy that lead to the inception of Melodica Men, a duo born almost on a whim after Buono discovered a



toy instrument in his grandfather's attic.

"About a year ago, I found a toy melodica at my grandpa's house and I thought it was pretty funny, so I just took it," Buono said, recalling the day he first tried the instrument. "And I just had so much fun with it that when my mom asked me what I wanted for graduation, I asked for a real one."

Buono would eventually show an equally enthused Clark, and after weeks spent playing the instrument they later put their skills to test on the street.

"During a trip to Seattle, Joe came up to visit and brought his melodica," Clark said. "We went and played on the street for 10 days over the course of two weeks and, unexpectedly, people really loved it."

So much, in fact, that the pair netted about \$2,000 in those 10 days – enough to fund a trip to Paris where they drew crowds of locals and tourists alike for their street

performances. It was in the City of Lights that Clark said they realized how a fun hobby could be a potentially transformative experience, one that made them want to pursue other opportunities as a duo.

"When we were playing Paris, hundreds of people from all over the world would watch us," he said. "We ran into people from New Zealand, Lebanon – everywhere. So many people from different cultures and countries, some who didn't even speak the same language as us, would just gather around and have a great time."

Realizing the significance of bringing people together in what had recently become a high-alert city was in the wake of terrorist attacks was "humanity affirming," Clark said, and it made the decision clear.

What's next

Though Buono and Clark regard their unorthodox new venture with a healthy dose of playfulness and self-deprecation, the young musicians are eager to share with others the sense of joy and togetherness the melodica is meant to bring. In the future, they'd like to begin playing jobs as Melodica Men at weddings and parties. The two are open to acting as entertainers for a variety of events, and are equally excited to spearhead a new style of play.

"It may seem unusual but it's just really fun because it's a toy instrument but you can do things with it that are pretty surprising, even to us," Buono said. "We almost feel as if we're pioneering this instrument because we're constantly discovering new things."

Call for contact lens users to commit to healthy vision

January is National Eye Care Month, making the start of the new year the perfect time to develop good habits – and if you're a contact lens wearer, it may

also be time to

eliminate a few bad ones.

Ninety-nine percent of contact lens wearers in the United States report at least one behavior that puts them at risk for a contact lens-related eye infection – including wearing contacts for too long, keeping them on while in the pool or occasionally wearing them overnight.

While these may seem like minor offenses, a recent study from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) found these oversights can lead to contact lens-related infections that can cause long-lasting eye damage. The study found nearly one in five contact lens-related eye infections result in serious issues, including scarred corneas, reduced vision or the need for a corneal transplant.

The good news is these infections

are largely preventable, but to ensure the health of your eyes, it's important to understand the association between contact lens care and corneas.

Contact lenses and corneal health

The cornea is the outer layer of the eye that acts as a clear, protective window. Unlike most tissues in the body, the cornea contains no blood vessels to nourish or protect it against infection.

Many contact lens-related infections start as a corneal abrasion, or scratched eye – a common eye injury that causes discomfort and redness. Improper contact use causes bacteria to grow in the lens – and when the lens is put into the scratched eye, it increases the risk of bacteria getting in the abrasion and becoming infected.

Best practices

Fortunately, it's easy to vastly reduce your risk of developing an eye infection by following contact lens best practices.

The most important practice is to follow your doctor's protocol. Because they are so commonplace, it's easy to forget that contact lenses are medical devices. Just like prescription medicine, you should use contacts as directed by your doctor – including regularly cleaning and replacing them.

Other good practices include washing and drying your hands before touching lenses, using fresh solution when cleaning, and removing them before going to sleep or swimming. It's especially important to teach these practices to children or young adults who are just starting to wear contact lenses, as it will help them develop good lifelong habits

In terms of contact lens type, daily disposable lenses are associated with the fewest risks, especially compared to extended wear lenses. Another option for lifelong contact lens wearers is LASIK, or laser eye surgery, which eliminates the need for glasses or lenses by reshaping the cornea and permanently correcting your vision.

If you do experience corneal irritation for more than a few days or develop an abrasion, please contact your eye doctor immediately. By getting early treatment, you can prevent a scratch from becoming an infection.

As we begin 2017, one of the easiest resolutions you can adopt is taking good care of your eyes. With proper contact lens use, you can keep looking forward to a promising new year with clear vision.



Jim Furyk named U.S. Ryder Cup team captain

Ponte Vedra Beach resident Jim Furyk will be the U.S. Ryder Cup team captain for the 42nd Ryder Cup, which will be played Sept. 28-30, 2018 at Le Golf National in Guyancourt, France.

"For more than two decades, Jim Furyk has stood proud and tall on the American golf stage and we are thrilled to have him as our Ryder Cup Captain," said PGA of America President Paul Levy, who joined Furyk for a news conference Jan. 11 with members of the media at PGA of America Headquarters. "His accomplishments as a player are well known, but his inherent competitive spirit and leadership traits are what made his candidacy so attractive. Jim offers the total package and is well suited for the task at hand."

The unanimous choice by the Ryder Cup committee last month, Furyk is the 28th U.S. captain since the Ryder Cup started in 1927. Thomas Bjorn of Denmark was appointed as the 2018 European Ryder Cup team captain.

The 46-year-old Furyk has played in nine consecutive Ryder Cups, which is the second-most consecutive appearances in U.S. Ryder Cup history. Only Phil Mickelson has played in more among Americans, with 11.

Furyk played on winning U.S. Ryder Cup efforts in 1999, 2008 and in 2016, when he served as vice captain.

A 17-time winner on the PGA Tour, Furyk also played in seven Presidents Cups, serving as captain's assistant in 2015.

"I would like to thank Davis (Love III) and the PGA of America Ryder Cup Committee for their faith in me and my selection as United States Ryder Cup captain," said Furyk at the news conference. "I've said many times that the Ryder Cup is part of my DNA, so this opportunity was a privilege and honor to accept. This is a special moment for my family."

Furyk named Love as the first of his vice captains. Love was the U.S. captain in 2012 and 2016, playing in six Ryder Cups overall

Last year, the United States won the Ryder Cup for the first time since 2008 by defeating Europe, 17 to 11, at Hazeltine National Golf Club in Chaska, Minnesota.

"I am anxious to get started and recapture the momentum we enjoyed at Hazeltine, both in the team room and on the golf course," said Furyk.

"It's been a long time since we've won in Europe, and I am looking forward to the challenge."

Furyk has lived in Ponte Vedra Beach since 1996, and he and his wife Tabitha have been involved in numerous local charities through the Jim and Tabitha Furyk Foundation.







Professional home stager offers tips for keeping house organized

The holidays are over, kids are back to school, your northern house guests have returned to the snow, but your home is a mess!

You said, "It's a new year, and I'm getting organized!" You have no idea, however, where to begin. Organization. To some it's a four-letter word. To others it's as relaxing as a day at the beach! Joking aside, there's one truth to living an organized life: an effortless daily routine. If you place your phone, purse, wallet, grocery list, etc. in a designated spot, you will always know where it is. Always.

Being a home stager, I like to see every item, in every room, in its place, all the time. But let's get real, that's impossible. You can, however, make a family effort to try! Ask yourself, "I feel organized when?" Then develop a system for maintaining that one goal, and do it every day for a week. Do this for all areas in your home in need of organization.

Take a picture of an area, or room, which needs some TLC, then analyze the picture. Look for cluttered areas, or out-of-place items, such as magazines, multiple remotes, kids' toys, etc. If you see stacked magazines, or papers, get the recycle bin and toss them. Were you saving that magazine for an article, or recipe? Take a picture with your smart phone, then toss the paper (now you'll have the recipe next time you're at the store). Invest in a large, decorative, wicker basket, then ask the kids to place their toys in there.

Tidy up a closet by first determining the items you don't need. No longer have a twin sized bed? Then, you probably don't need twin sized sheets. Ask yourself, "Have I used this item in the last year?" If

the answer is no, then consider donating, selling or tossing the item. Stack same-sized towels and sheets together, then place items facing the same way. This makes the closet appear tidy. It's a little work, but well worth the effort.

The kitchen counter seems to be a catch all for everything under the sun. The importance of adopting a system for consolidating these items is vital for everyone's sanity. Start with purse, keys and phone. Find a central location to house these items, so they're out of your way, yet easily accessible. Next, invest in a file system that works for you. Folders, baskets and stackable trays are great organization tools, and there are so many decorative choices which look nice on a counter or shelf. Accordion files are great for storing kids' artwork separated by year, by child; but only keep the most special pieces – for example, the hand/footprints or stories they've written. Go through your mail near the recycle bin and immediately toss the junk, then file the important mail accordingly. Put bills in a "To Pay" file, weekly ads/restaurant coupons in a shopping file, etc., but remember to purge these files often.

Lastly, I feel most organized when I know what's for dinner every night. So, I create a breakfast, lunch and dinner menu for the coming week. I keep an ongoing grocery list in my kitchen and add things as needed. Finally, I add the necessary items from my weekly menu to my list, go shopping and rest easy knowing that I know "What's for dinner?" every time I'm asked.

Goodwill: Get organized and help create jobs by donating items

Was one of your new year's resolutions to declutter? Start 2017 off right with a solution that will help you – and your neighbors, too. Collect the items you no longer need and donate them to Goodwill of North Florida. In doing so, you will help fund job placement, training and community-based services right here in our area.

"With the holidays over, it is time to examine your home and remove items that you no longer need," said Lorie Marrero, founder of the Clutter Diet® and Goodwill's national spokesperson. "It's also a time of year when many people set out to find new jobs or plan their careers. Thanks to Goodwill, many people are employed and caring for their families as a result of your donations."

A good place to start is the closet. Two ways to get honest about what should stay and what should go are the sixmonth and daily reject rules.

First, go through the closet and pull anything you have not worn in six months. This won't be easy. It is in our nature to get attached to our things. Once you have made this initial sweep, turn all of the hangers backwards. When you put back washed clothes, hang them the correct way. In June, pull anything on a hanger that is still backwards.

Marrero also recommends making sure everything in your closet fits and flatters you today. Take note of the clothes that you put on then take off because you don't like the way it fits or looks. Don't put it back.

"If it doesn't work for you, donate it to Goodwill so someone else can get use out of it, and it brings jobs to the community," she said.

In 2016, Goodwill provided more than 104,000 services and placed 15,011 individuals into employment right here in Northeast Florida.

Goodwill also accepts household items, so divide the house into zones. This could be the entire kitchen, living room, bathroom, attic or garage, or it could be as simple as one drawer. Tackle each zone one at a time. Once you have started a zone, challenge yourself to keep going until you are finished. Take before and after photos to stay motivated

Stay organized throughout the year by creating a "donation station" – a paper bag or reusable bin to toss anything unwanted into until your next trip to a Goodwill donation center.

"Your donations to Goodwill have a direct, positive impact on the lives of people in our community," said Goodwill CEO Bob Thayer. "A job offers the independence that comes with a paycheck, increases one's self-esteem and helps break the cycle of poverty."





Shark boys mercy Clay on Senior Night

The Ponte Vedra boys' soccer team celebrated Senor Night last Thursday with an impressive 8-0 mercy rule shutout of the Clay High School Blue Devils. Senior Jack Bingemann was the Sharks' top scorer, completing the "the three-goal hat-trick."

The win improved the Sharks' record to 5-0-1 in class 3A district 4 play and 13-2-3 overall

Earlier in the week, the boys lost 3-0 to non-district foe Fleming Island – only the team's second loss of the season. Their other defeat also came at the hands of a non-district opponent Oakleaf, 3-0; and the only blemish on their district record is a December tie against Matanzas.

The Sharks started early against the Blue Devils when Bingemann came

Sophomore Michael Gambuzza put Ponte Vedra up by three when he banged home his own rebound with 11 minutes left in the half.

Things went downhill fast for the

visitors in the second half. Junior Steven Sifontes beat the Devil keeper with a quick move at the four-minute mark. Less than two minutes later sophomore Nate Fordham deked the keeper out of position to put Ponte Vedra up 5-0.

Sifontes registered his second goal of the night at the 27-minute mark, then three minutes after taking the lead 6-0, Bingemann added his third goal of the game. It came when senior Ethan Penn sent a low cross in front of the net to Bingemann who made a horizontal dive to head the ball into the open goal.

Penn's goal at the 17-minute mark put Ponte Vedra in front 8-0, mercifully ending the game.

The eight Shark seniors – Bingemann, Penn, Carson King, Andre Mauriello, Josh Greene, Joe Gravelle, Crowley and Lucas Nomura – and their parents received flowers to honor the Senior Night occasion.



Nease wrestling honors five seniors before victory over Atlantic Coast

The Nease wrestling program celebrated senior night Jan. 11 before defeating the Atlantic Coast Stingrays 39-26.

"It's always a big night," said Nease Coach Craig Muckle. "We preach family. We're really tight. Any guy that leaves, I always have a hard time. I'm a big, emotional guy. It's always tough."

The team honored seniors Aidan Pagana, Jon Walter, Derek Alexander, Matt Valdivieso, Cayse Clouse, Dylan Martinson and Dalton Koike. Parent and team assistant Brian Pagana said these student athletes are true leaders.

"Too often, athletes, and in this case wrestlers, are thought of as 'jocks,'" said Pagana. "But if you look at the senior class we have this season, you will see they are a much more diverse group than just athletes. We have class presidents, National Honor Society members and accomplished musicians."

A team captain, Aidan Pagana picked up a win at 138 pounds after pinning his opponent. Throughout his career at Nease, the four-year varsity letterman has advanced to both districts and regions. Off the mat, Pagana served as class president from ninth to 11th grade as well as student council advisor in 12th grade. He plans to major in pre-dentistry at University of Central Florida, Florida State University or University of Florida.

Also a team captain, Walter suffered a mild concussion during his match at 220 pounds after Muckle said the opposing Atlantic Coast wrestler committed an illegal move. Walter was taken to a local hospital and forced to forfeit the match.

"He didn't control him back to the ground," said Muckle. "It wasn't malicious. He didn't do it on purpose. It was a scramble, they got caught in the air and he landed on the back of his head."

A two-year varsity letterman, Walter also advanced to districts and regions while at Nease. In addition to wrestling, Walter played on the football team for four years and served as a chief petty officer in the Nease ROTC. He's interested in pursuing admission to the U.S. Coast Guard Academy.

Alexander won his match by forfeit at 160 pounds because Atlantic Coast didn't have a wrestler at that weight class. In addition to wrestling at Nease for two years, Alexander has been a member of Nease ROTC. He also plays piano and oboe for Nease's wind ensemble as well as the Jacksonville Symphony Youth Orchestra. Alexander plans to attend Florida State University.

Valdivieso was not in the varsity lineup against the Stingrays. A four-year wrestler for Nease, he is also a member of the student council, senior class vice president and ambassador for the communications academy. He plans to travel and then join the U.S. Air Force.

The wrestling program also honored Clouse, who has served as the team's manager for three years. She plans to attend the Arizona Academy for Emergency Services and major in paramedic studies.

Throughout the match, Nease juniors Brenden Teaman and Jacob Sorgen won via pins at 126 pounds and 145 pounds, respectively. In the most exciting match of the night at 170 pounds, junior Grayson Suggs defeated his opponent 5-3 in overtime.

"Our guys worked hard," said Muckle. "They kept going. They never stopped."

Freshman Colin White lost his match at 152 pounds in a close 2-2 contest that ended in a pin. Junior Jarrod Case and freshman Nick Thoressen also lost their matches at 182 pounds and 195 pounds, respectively.

Moving forward, Muckle said his message to the team is to focus.





Sharks top district standings

Faced with the prospect of playing three of their toughest opponents this past week, Ponte Vedra fans had to be pleased that the Sharks emerged victorious in two of those battles

Sandwiched between a pair of victories over Bolles and Palatka was a tightly contested loss to one of the area's top ranked team, the Creekside Knights. The Sharks survived the week despite losing a pair of their best players.

Senior guard Mike Nicandri suffered a knee injury during Tuesday's victory over Bolles and will be sidelined for the remainder of the season. It was a double whammy at the guard position for the Sharks, as starting guard Will Mons likewise had a season-ending knee injury early into this campaign.

Leading scorer JD Pirris is scheduled to return to the lineup after this week's trio of games and will be a most welcome addition for the injury-riddled Sharks.

Overcoming these drawbacks, the Sharks were able to hold off Palatka on Friday

night, improving their overall record to an impressive 11-5 and a district leading 4-1.

The Sharks enjoyed a seemingly comfortable 11-point lead in Friday's always interesting road trip to Palatka. Unlike last year, when Palatka's tenacious full court pressure defense turned into a Panther home win, such was not the case this year.

The Sharks led 46-35 heading into the final quarter before Palatka went on a furious rally. With some questionable home cooking from the men in stripes, Palatka outscored the Sharks by 10 points, but fell one point short of overtaking the Sharks.

In their only home game of a quirky schedule, that will find Ponte Vedra playing but one home game as opposed to 13 on the road, the Sharks surprised the defending state champions from Bolles with a convincing 77-47 victory in front of a large crowd at the Shark Tank.

The Sharks, after leading 27-20 at halftime, played perhaps their best half of basketball of the season by exploding for 50 second-half points to run way from Bolles. Pirris led a balanced attack for the Sharks, with a game-high 21 points while pulling down 11 rebounds and dishing out

five assists.

Eston Hensley continued his great play with 15 points while 6'8" junior center Jack Johnson chipped in with eight. Johnson also was a domineering factor on defense by blocking four shots and altering a number of other errant Bolles attempts.

The Sharks took the short jaunt to nearby Creekside last Thursday as huge underdogs to a Knight team boasting of a lofty state ranking.

In the first game of the season, the Sharks were man handled by Creekside 69-41, and Knight fans expected more of the same in the rematch.

However, the Sharks, playing without Mons, Nicandri, and Pirris, gave the Knights a real scare before running out of gas in the game's final moments.

The Sharks trailed by only two points late into the third period before the Knights were finally able to pull away from the shorthanded, but gritty, Sharks.

Several of the Sharks stepped up nicely for Coach Bud Beech's crew, led by Jack Shannon with a team-high 17 points. Junior center Johnson continued his improved play with 11 while sophomore guard Reese Russi, forced to log a lot of minutes with the Sharks missing three of their guards, added 10 points to complement his five rebounds and four steals.

Hensley, who drew a crowd of Knights

throughout the contest, was the fourth Shark to reach double figures with 10 points, all coming in the first half.

The most important game during this week's busy stretch of games was PV's tight victory over Palatka.

Playing in a Panther gym, where the Sharks had but one win (2014) in school history, the 53-52 conquest of Palatka saw several Sharks make major contributions.

Shannon led all Shark scorers for the second straight game with a team-high 16 points and a team-high six assists. Sophomore Russi was close behind with a career-high 14 points while Johnson was a dominant force on the defensive end of the court

The still improving Johnson scored 10 points but that didn't begin to account for his most important role.

With his long wingspan, Johnson blocked eight Palatka shots to equal his own school record that he set a year earlier, also against the Panthers.

After Tuesday's important district game with Menendez, the opposition doesn't get any easier for "The Beech Boys."

The Sharks will play Thursday against an always-competitive Bishop Kenny team that were state runner ups last season. Less than 24 hours later, PVHS will again hit the road to play a district game against a muchimproved and well-coached Matanzas five.





Planning the perfect party

A birthday party planning checklist

For all the fun and games to be had at a birthday party, the planning process can be an entirely different experience.

When considering party venue, menus, activities, favors and any number of mishaps, it's clear that throwing a shindig that looks effortlessly fun requires planning and preparation. So what should be considered for a party without a hitch?

One to three months before:

The average birthday party should be planned one to three months in advance. Now is the time to discuss themes, a guest list and potential entertainment options such as clowns, petting zoos, live music or mascot appearances. Deciding on a time and place several weeks out allows guests the time to make the appropriate arrangements to attend – plus, delegating tasks

early leaves less to do in the days leading up to the party.

Decide on a theme. Choosing a party theme should be one of the very first steps taken in party planning as it helps streamline the process; selecting a character, movie, color or pattern gives party planners a guide with which to purchase décor, entertainment, favors and food.

Send invitations. Will parents need time off? Will children be attending other events at that time?

Book the entertainment and venue.

Any entertainment or venue option will need advanced notice of party dates, times and locations. Booking sooner rather than later is the best way to ensure the entertainer and event location will be available. Should planners have a change of heart, cancellation is always an option – but there's no guarantee that either will be

available for booking a party at the last minute. This stage is also a good time to reach out to a photographer or videographer should one be hired.

Three to four weeks before:

At this stage, the "skeleton" of the planning should flesh out. With a theme decided, entertainment booked and invitations sent, it's time to begin purchasing party supplies and consider a schedule of events and a party menu.

Plan the meals. When choosing food, tie the menu back to the theme through colors. flavor and presentation and carefully consider the needs and whims of the guests. Guests with food allergies may not be able to eat snacks, cakes or candy that contain or have been in contact with certain ingredients.

Common food allergies include nuts, sov. gluten and shellfish. As a precaution, consult with guests about potential allergens before finalizing a menu.

Gather supplies. Consider what supplies and décor will be needed and draw up

a list. Items such as disposable tableware, balloons, streamers and confetti are most commonly needed, but don't overlook smaller necessities – if there will be crafting activities, games, prizes or favors, this stage is also the time to purchase them.

One week before:

At crunch time, follow up with guests who haven't RSVP'd to ensure that all guests have been accounted for.

Order cake, balloons and catering at this

Three days before:

Purchase any groceries needed for the party no more than three days before the event so that fresh ingredients say fresh.

Prepare prizes and goody bags to set



North Florida Land Trust triples conserved land in 2016

The North Florida Land Trust (NFLT) tripled the amount of land it conserved in 2016, protecting more than 12,000 acres of land.

That is the most land NFLT has been able to preserve in one year since the organization started its mission. Founded in 1999, NFLT serves as a champion of environmental protection primarily in Baker, Clay, Duval, Flagler, Nassau, Putnam and St. Johns coun-

"We are elated with what we have been

able to accomplish this year and grateful to all our partners and donors who made it possible," Executive Director Jim McCarthy said, noting that from 1999 to 2015 the nonprofit protected just over 6,000 acres of land.

One of NFLT's main projects for 2016 was to create a document called the Preservation Portfolio that identifies 112,346 acres of land the organization would like to preserve. NFLT assigned a price to the cost of acquiring the land and compared it to

the ecosystem benefits that the land would provide for free if left undisturbed. The nonprofit found the ecosystem benefits from the land were worth double the cost of acquisition. NFLT acquired about 214 acres of land in the portfolio and will continue its mission through 2017.

Overall, NFLT's success in 2016 was attained by helping landowners sell conserva-

tion easements, acquiring land from developers and receiving donations of both.

"I credit our staff for our historic success," said McCarthy. "They have been incredibly diligent and focused on our mission. We still have a way to go to preserve all of the land that we have identified as critical for preservation and I look forward to another historic year."
