

Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach executive director announces retirement

Judy Hixenbaugh recently announced that she will be retiring at the end of the month from her position as executive director of the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach. Latitia (Tish) Sheesley will replace Hixenbaugh as the new executive director effective Nov. 1.

"It's been and honor and a privilege to serve as the executive director of the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach," Hixenbaugh said. "I've had the opportunity to work closely with our amazing and talented staff and board of directors, combined with the unyielding support from our generous community.

"Together, we have continued to grow our core arts programs and have begun planning for an expansion of our arts center in the near future," she added.

Hixenbaugh began her career with the Cultural Center eight years ago as the director of development. Under her leadership, the Cultural Center introduced the PVB Home and Art Tour, now one of the largest and most profitable fundraisers for the organization.

Three years ago, Hixenbaugh was promoted to the executive director position following the retirement of Dick Williams.

During Hixenbaugh's tenure, the art tuition enrollment set new records; the sound connections music therapy outreach program for children with special needs expanded from one elementary school to four and fundraising events grew popular enough for larger venues.

Hixenbaugh has been involved with community and board leaders to expand the Cultural Center from its current 7,800-square foot facility to a state-ofthe-art, 15,000-square foot arts center. Hixenbaugh plans to remain active with the Cultural Center following her retirement. She will participate in the steering committee for the new building, and she has been invited to join the board of directors in 2018.

Sheesley, Hixenbaugh's successor, has over 30 years of experience in nonprofit


leadership. She comes to Ponte Vedra from a state-and-county-designated local arts agency in Southwest Florida where she served as the executive director and was responsible for providing leadership and direction of the county's cultural assets.

Sheesley has experience working with city, county, tourism development and chamber of commerce representatives, as well as local businesses and community organizations on fundraisers, cultural arts programming and opportunities for artists, including art walks and other arts festivals. Sheesley's community involvement

included being a county commissioner appointee to the Tourism Development Advisory Board; sitting on the "Alive After 5 Art Walk" committee and serving as missions director of the Susan G. Komen SW Florida organization. She is a graduate of University of Central Florida with a Bachelor of Arts in advertising/public relations.

2017 PLAYERS Championship raises record amount for local charities

While last year THE PLAYERS Championship raised a then-record total of \$8.5 million for more than 300 Northeast Florida charities, it was announced on Tuesday, Oct. 17, that the 2017 tournament had surpassed that amount for a total of \$8.7 million.

The announcement was made at THE PLAYERS Charity Celebration, which was held at the famed 17th hole of THE PLAYERS Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass. Part of the organization's annual Giving Back month, the celebration honored the philanthropic work of those charities that benefit from the tournament. After guests had the opportunity to enjoy food and drinks, the record-breaking amount was announced and displayed on a scoreboard for all to see.

"The impact of THE PLAYERS on the Northeast Florida community is why nearly 2,000 volunteers put in tireless hours each year," said Kevin English, 2017 tournament chairman. "It was my privilege to serve as the 2017 tournament chairman, and I am ecstatic to see that we generated a record \$8.7 million for charity through this incredible tournament."

The day following the announcement, past tournament chairmen – also known as "Red Coats" – dispersed throughout the Northeast Florida community to surprise 21 local charities with funds generated by this year's tournament. One recipient was Ponte Vedra High School, which was presented with a check for \$37,750. "I'm just thrilled," said Ponte Vedra High School Principal Fred Oberkehr upon receiving the news. "There is so much community support around here, and it's not just from the community, it is the community. The kids here go above and beyond the call of duty in every shape, form and fashion, so I think this is not only a testament to what THE PLAY-ERS does, but it's also a testament to Ponte Vedra Beach, our community and our high school students."

Last year, the Ponte Vedra High School Booster Club raised a total of \$32,750 through THE PLAYERS' Chip In For Youth program, which allows local youthrelated organizations to sell discounted PLAYERS tickets, with half of the proceeds going back to those organizations. Since the program's inception in 2011, the booster club has raised a total of \$154,345.

Including this year's record amount, THE PLAYERS has raised more than \$92 million for charities since the event was moved to Ponte Vedra Beach in 1977. Other organizations to benefit from the 2017 tournament included Angelwood, Dreams Come True, the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach and more.

"It's an honor and a pleasure to be able to hand out these checks," said 2016 Tournament Chairman Michele McManamon, who presented the check to Ponte Vedra High. "Ponte Vedra High School and the other charities are very special to our community, and overall, being a part of this organization is a blessing."

SenioRITAs take center stage in fight against breast cancer

Almost 300 women from across the country came out to compete in the SenioRITAs tennis tournament last weekend (Oct. 20-22) at the Sawgrass Country Club to benefit breast cancer research.

The tournament, in its 18th year, was the first women's tennis tournament in Northeast Florida. All proceeds from the event go to breast cancer research at Mayo Clinic and to Baptist Medical Center Beaches for patient services.

"Last year we made a little over \$100,000, and I think we're going to do even better this year," said Karen Aaro, co-chair of the SenioRITAs. "We're an all-volunteer committee of 33 people, so all the proceeds go to research. We have very little overhead."

The RITA (Research is the Answer) Foundation is a Jacksonville-based nonprofit, and 21 years ago, Charles Jantz started the RITA women's tennis tournament to help raise money for local breast cancer research programs. Sawgrass member Mary Pappas decided to create the SenioRITAs tournament, which is open to women age 40 and above.

"It levels the playing field," said Aaro, who also competed in the tournament.

Planning for the tennis tournament began in April, and it's just the finale of a busy Breast Cancer Awareness Month event schedule for the SenioRITAs. The group also held a kick-off party attended by more than 200 people on Oct. 3 at Pussers, and held live and silent auctions on Oct. 18, at Sawgrass.

For many of the women participating in the SenioRITAs tennis tournament, however, the cause took on a personal meaning.

"There are many survivors out there playing," Aaro said. "There are many people who lost a loved one, and they're out there playing for them. It touches so many people at this point that we all know somebody or have had a personal experience with breast cancer."



Fonville hopes that other girls will join in her efforts by donating dresses to her cause. With permission, she hopes to set up collection boxes at local schools so that girls can bring in their dresses for her to pick up.

As part of the Miss Universe organization, the Miss Teen USA competition encourages young women to make a positive impact on their communities. As she moves forward in the selection process, Fonville intends to continue using her platform to affect change.

"When you have a title and you have all those connections, then you have an opportunity to actually get something done," she said. "I hope to spread this platform, and trying to make a difference in the community as Miss Teen USA would be great."

All of us at Mission House would like to sincerely thank the Beaches community for all your prayers and concern over the incident that took place here at Mission House. We especially want to thank Chief Pat Dooley of the JBPD and his officers who responded within four minutes of the incident.

On Friday, Oct. 13, an unknown gunman came into the outside patio and after approximately 45 minutes shot and wounded two of our homeless clients. The JBPD caught the shooter approximately 30 minutes later in a nearby surf shop. The two wounded have been released from the hospital.

Mission House has been in cooperation with Jacksonville Beach officials, and NO staff or volunteers of Mission House were harmed. Mayor Charlie Latham was also present and gave staff incredible support by assuring a chaplain was present for any of the staff, volunteers or clients.

I also want to thank the staff for their quick thinking and professionalism during the entire event. They kept a cool head and assisted volunteers, clients and the police. I am very, very proud of them. It is sad that this extreme type of violence has affected Mission House as we have never had an incident like this in the seven years I have been executive director. We feel this is an isolated incident. We have put additional security measures in place to assure that we continue to remain the safe home for our clients to come and receive assistance.

Safety is and has always been our No. 1 priority at Mission House. Safety of clients, volunteers and staff. We depend on our community to assist us in helping those dealing with homelessness regain their independence. We have assisted 58 people obtain a home this year and could not have done that without the support of our faithful and generous supporters and volunteers. We will continue to be the answer for those needing assistance and thank all for their support during this difficult time.

Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

James McElroy

James E. McElroy wore many hats throughout his 80 years, but the gift he shared in all aspects of his life was his ability to teach, encourage and inspire others. At 5 feet 5 inches, Jim was usually one of the smallest in the crowd, but what he lacked in physical stature, Jim made up for in heart.

From his early days in Hancock and Sidney, New York, where he competed in sports, to serving as a jungle warfare survival instructor in the U.S. Marine Corps, Jim McElroy was a natural leader of men. Woodcraft Camp, Syracuse and Ponte Vedra Beach. They were like a second family to him. During his 40 years of living in Ponte Vedra, he was dubbed the "mayor" for his outgoing, uplifting personality.

All those who loved him knew Jim possessed a remarkable ability to weave words into a compelling story. His storytelling ability eventually led to the fulfillment of a lifetime dream to publish a novel. His book, "The Tampa Kid," embodied many of his own life lessons: the underdog overcoming and finding a spiritual and meaningful solution to the challenges of life.

Those lessons undoubtedly helped Jim to have meaningful relationships with his adult children and through the final stage of his life. He faced a litany of diagnoses, but he faced them with dignity, courage and grace. Instead of complaining, he focused on brightening the days of those around him. On Aug. 26, 2017, he joined his first-born grandson Trenton McElroy in heaven. He leaves behind his sons and daughtersin-law, Steven and Leigh Anne McElroy and Robb and Isabella; his daughter and son-in-law, Laura and Jeff Fenske; and his grandchildren Luke, Blake, Drew, Lindsey, Chloe and Morgan. He is also survived by his sister and brother-inlaw, Mary and Quentin Beagle and their three children Liz, Jeffrey, John and his wife Chris. Jim loved his family dearly and was immensely proud of his three children and grandchildren.

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

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Two insurance tips to bear in mind following Irma

It has been a month since Hurricane Irma struck, with Ponte Vedra Beach making headlines with images of homes devastated by the massive storm.

While much of the

cleanup is behind us, reminders such as debris that lines our streets and shorelines remain.

Whether or not you suffered damage, Irma served up a good reminder of why it's important to understand what your homeowner's policy covers and what it doesn't.

In the days following Irma, I saw many heartbreaking losses that I want to do everything I can to protect my friends and neighbors from experiencing. Here are two things to think about now to ensure you don't suffer incredible loss at the hands of a hurricane.

First, while your homeowner's policy probably covers water damage from household mishaps like burst pipes, sump, sewer backup or an overflowing bathtub, it doesn't cover damage to your home caused by floods.

And in Hurricane Irma, we saw areas of our town flood that had never before experienced one. This is why everyone (not just those in mandatory flood zones) needs flood insurance. When you talk with your insurance agent about flood insurance, pay

attention to the limits of coverage. Flood policies through the National Flood Insurance Program, for example, have limits of \$250,000. If you carry \$400,000 in Coverage A (the amount the insurance company will pay to replace your home) and your flood policy has limits of \$250,000, you'll either be out \$150,000 in the event of a total loss of your home, or you'll need to buy an "excess flood" policy to cover the difference.

The great news? Both flood and excess flood policies are very affordable, and relative to a \$400,000 or even a \$150,000 out-of-pocket cost, are great investments to make to ensure your peace of mind. **Second, while a typical Florida**

homeowner's policy does cover damage from hurricanes, a hurricane deductible on a standard homeowner's policy is 2 percent of your Coverage A (dwelling replacement cost). Therefore, if you've chosen a Coverage A amount of \$400,000 and you suffered damage caused by the hurricane, your hurricane deductible would be \$8,000. This means you would pay \$8,000 before your insurance company

would begin to pay on the covered loss. There are a couple of solutions to this.

You can now buy a policy with a hurri-

cane deductible as low as \$500 from some carriers.

Or, you can buy a policy that covers your deductible amount in the event of a covered loss. This is a brand new product on the market called Cat4Home, and the policies cost as little as \$141 per year.

If you haven't done so already post-Irma, please take a minute to review your current homeowner's and flood policies. You'll be glad you did.

More mortgages keep housing market booming



during the second half of 2017. Creditors are more willing to offer borrowers slack, with the average borrower

credit score dropping from 742 earlier this year to 725 on refinance and purchase transactions.

One recent example of loosening mortgage guidelines that affects us happened in July with one of the two Government Sponsored Enterprises (GSE), Freddie Mac. Freddie eliminated maximum income standards for its 97 percent loan to value purchase product in Federal Disaster Declaration areas, including Ponte Vedra Beach. The goal was to offer a loan program that allowed high income, first-time homebuyers a low down payment option to spur more sales in the Hurricane Matthew affected areas. At the time, we didn't realize our city would become the victim of another damaging hurricane called Irma.

However, I believe the ongoing loosening

have been loosening

of mortgage lending standards—because of a continuing, improving housing market and borrower mortgage payment trends will more than blunt the effects of Irma to the local housing market.

For instance, niche mortgages known as Alt-A non-government or GSE programs for self-employed borrowers and investors have begun to enter the market. One example requires a 20 percent down payment and decent credit scores, but offers a reprise in other areas that stimulate investors that want to buy multiple properties to rent.

The GSEs Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae have increased their debt to income ratio from 45 percent to 50 percent. Debt to income is the percentage of a household gross monthly income compared to the proposed mortgage payment, including the principal, interest, homeowner's insurance, property taxes and homeowner's association dues. This also includes recurring debts such as car payments, credit card payments and student loans. GSEs are the largest source of mortgage backing for non-government loans and represent the largest monetary source of mortgage funding in the world. When the GSEs make a change as substantial as this, it means they feel confident

with the housing market, home values and the prospects of lenders being repaid by homeowners.

A 97 percent loan to value mortgages offered by GSEs offers first time homebuyers a non-government loan program requiring a relatively low down payment.

Government lending options include the Federal Housing Administration (FHA), Veterans Administration (VA) and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Immediately following the housing decline of 2009, the major lending source was the FHA. In my opinion, the FHA, backed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), was primarily responsible for providing a lending option during those dark days when most lending sources dried up, especially for first-time home buyers.

If not for the FHA back in the post-housing bubble bust days, builders and realtors would have lacked a source of financing for their customers, and possibly the last slimmer of hope of preserving what was left of the U.S. housing market would have been lost. Fortunately, thanks to expanded lending standards, we do not have to worry about a lack of mortgage options, which also ensures the government and taxpayers aren't carrying the risk of as many defaults in the case of overreliance on governmentinsured lending options.

If expanded mortgage offerings weren't enough to ensure a continuing improvement in the Ponte Vedra Beach and surrounding housing market, I need to mention interest rates across the board remain historically low, benefiting all homebuyers and refinances. Rising home values in PVB partnered with low rates create an appealing refinance environment. Traditionally, lowering interest rates created a refinance market. However, increasing home values create an additional refinance opportunity because the more your home or condo is worth, the lower your loan to value. A low loan to value gives creditors incentive to lower interest rates.

I know what some of you are thinking. Before you suggest what I am describing sounds like the same risky lending patterns that less than a decade ago contributed to the worst economic recession since the Great Depression, allow me to address what is different. Dodd-Frank finance legislation and the intense effort through mortgage



Champions for hope: The story behind the JT Townsend and Funk-Zitiello foundations

Have you ever met someone who has taken their seemingly impossible situation and turned it into good by helping others? That is what happened when I met J.T. Townsend. I wanted to discover how a 19-year-old could handle a life-altering incident with faith and grace, and turn it into a platform that would live on long after his passing.

J.T. was a senior at Episcopal School of Jacksonville (ESJ) in 2004 when he took a freak hit on the football field, suffered a near fatal spinal cord injury and became a quadriplegic. 2005 PLAYERS Championship winner Fred Funk led the community by building a wheelchair accessible home for J.T. and his family. J.T. was so moved that he formed the J.T. Townsend Foundation (JTTF), a nonprofit with a mission to help others with disabilities. Sadly, J.T. passed away in 2013 at just 26 years of age. But, his foundation lives on, helping First Coast families with no means to purchase items that can make their lives easier. J.T. was a true champion.

As board chair for JTTF, I saw to it that his dream continued. To date, we have helped over 270 families, providing countless adaptive strollers, iPads for non-communicative children, hospital beds, wheelchair ramps and money. Today, J.T.'s mother Carmen delivers each piece of equipment personally just as her son had, bringing hope to the hopeless.

Just 10 months after my friend J.T. passed, I was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, the deadliest form with a five-year survival rate of just 9 percent. After surgery and treatment that lasted eight months, JTTF funds were depleted and faced an uncertain future.

When local businessman Jacques Klempf heard about our situation, he was moved to step up in a huge way. Within an hour, his wife brought us a \$50,000 check to cover all pending applications. JTTF was still in the miracle business.

But, my husband Tommy knew that we needed to do more to sustain JTTF. Just like J.T., Tommy had a dream of establishing a charity golf tournament on the course he had awakened to every morning for 24 years—TPC Sawgrass. And he had a friend he could call to make it happen—Fred Funk.

The Funk-Zitiello Foundation was formed in 2016 with a mission to help champions like J.T. to sustain programs that change lives. Father's Day weekend in June 2017, we held our first annual Champions for Hope Gala and Celebrity Golf Tournament at TPC Sawgrass, raising \$881,000 to fund JTTF programs and Mayo Clinic for pancreatic cancer research for early detection. Countless lives will be impacted by this effort.

If you want to do something to help others, don't waste another moment thinking about it. Take action; we promise your life will be richer and fuller than you could ever dream possible. You too can be a champion for hope.

For dinner, we chose to leave the Gramercy Park area and head to an old



Our next port of call was Regensburg, Germany. It is the oldest city on the Danube and is one of the best preserved medieval towns in Europe. The city center escaped damage in the war, and its half-timbered buildings and architectural gems exude a timeless charm. Still standing are the Roman gates of 179 AD. We had a special treat this day. My next-door neighbor Mary Ann has a sister who lives in Regensburg. Loretta met us for mass at the beautiful St. Peter's Cathedral and then for lunch in a lush courtyard. Loretta plays the violin in the city orchestra so we got a backstage tour.

Traveling now on the Main River the next four days, we visited Nuremberg, Bamberg, Wurzburg, Wertheim, and Koblenz, Germany. On this section of the river, we passed dozens of castles, with the vista including hilltop vineyards. They plant their vines vertically so they can get the most sun exposure. Their shortened harvest time for the grapes lessens the possibility of erosion.

The Marksburg Castle was breathtaking. Sitting high on a hill, this medieval castle has been perfectly preserved since the 13th century. The Marksburg serves as the German Castles Association's headquarters, working to preserve medieval fortifications.

Sailing now on the Rhine River, we made a port call at Cologne, Germany, which featured more beautiful architecture. One of the tours included an opportunity to ascend to the roof of the Cologne Cathedral. This required riding a lift on the outside of the cathedral and then entering the ceiling to see the vast tower spaces, before going through a rooftop door onto the roof for an incredible view. We passed on that adventure.


Before our cruise came to an end, we visited Kinderdijk, Netherlands, where the famous windmills intrigued me (This is another UNESCO site.). These windmills represent the courageous fight of the Dutch against the sea. 

You've got to take your hat off to someone who starts a business in their living room with \$500 and grows it into an international company with millions in sales ... or, in Jeff Whitaker's case, put your hat on.

Whitaker, a Nease High graduate and former Florida Gators football player, is the co-owner of DOME Headwear Co., one of the country's largest providers of custom headwear, headquartered on 3rd St. S., in Jacksonville Beach.

After graduating from the University of Florida in 2004, Whitaker moved to Colorado and got a job selling custom hats to area high school coaches for a small business owner. During his time in Colorado, Whitaker got married and had his first of three children, prompting his desire to move back to the Jacksonville area to be near family.

He also decided to open his own custom headwear company and incorporated DOME in August 2010. About three months later, he was joined by co-owner Chris Hetland, also a Nease grad and former Gators football player, and the two began working out of Whitaker's living room with an initial bank deposit of about \$500.

Whitaker said the two owners grinded it out for about three years, selling direct from high school to high school. But things really took a positive turn for the business in 2014, thanks to an exclusive partnership with Riddell, which is the leading manufacturer of football helmets and football pads. Whitaker said Riddell didn't have a custom hat product and really liked what DOME had to offer.

Now, DOME sells hats in all 50 states, and benefits from Riddell's 300-plus person sales team. But Whitaker also makes sure that no matter where the hats end up, it's no

"They gave us some basic instructions, but they wanted to see eight to 10 designs, and we totally struck out the first time we presented," Whitaker said. "They didn't like it at all, and we said, 'Give us one more chance, and we'll go back to the drawing board.' We didn't sleep for about a day, redesigned everything and Phuoc came through like a hero and presented to them the next day, and they loved it."

The company delivered the hats the day before Strait's performance in Las Vegas.

"That was one of the most memorable we had," Whitaker said. "It was both challenging and gratifying at the same time. You remember the losses more than you remember the wins, but this is a win we'll never forget. It was a great day."

A lot of DOME's success is based on its quick turnaround and highquality product. DOME can deliver orders, which requires a minimum order of 18 hats, within 30 days. Whitaker says DOME is on pace to sell 400,000 hats in 2017, and

Players Café to be replaced by Mexican restaurant

Players Café on Solana Road will be replaced by Nacho Café this November.

Tom Corsano, the owner of the restaurant, took over the Players Café's lease Aug. 1. Since then, he has renovated the location, built a dividing wall and opened a second Two Dudes restaurant on one side of the building (The original Two Dudes is in Atlantic Beach.).

The original plan was to keep the Players Café open alongside Two Dudes, but the owner wants to repackage his business and go in a new direction.

"Two Dudes has been doing great," Corsano said. "It's very busy, and it's performing well. The Players Café is busy on Saturday and Sunday, but the weekdays are lackluster at most."

One reason the Players Cafe isn't drawing on weekdays, Corsano asserted, is that business declined under a previous owner, and it could not be recovered. The restaurant owner also suggested that the cafe never generated as much interest as Two Dudes because it wasn't new to the community.

"When we opened Two Dudes, there was a ton of excitement," Corsano said. "When we took over the café, it was already there so it never generated that excitement or that interest, which I underestimated."

Corsano tried to revive Players Cafe, but other than increased weekend traffic, the customers never came back.

"I think it ran its course," he said. "I think it's time for something new and time for change, so I'm changing it. We're moving on and, we're doing fun and exciting things."

Corsano plans on replacing the Players Café with a casual Mexican-based restaurant called Nacho Café sometime in November.

As for Two Dudes, Corsano is ecstatic about the restaurant's popularity and success, which he attributed to people spreading the word organically throughout the community.

"We've done no advertising," he said. "We just opened the door. I turned the open sign on in the window. When you live in Ponte Vedra, like you live in Atlantic Beach, people know each other. Word of mouth is key."

Corsano opened Two Dudes in Ponte Vedra because he lives in the area, and the restaurant location is five minutes from his home. He noted that "everything kinda fit in place," and Two Dudes has been well received by the community.

"We've developed so many regulars, and we've only been here since Aug. 1," he said.

Two Dudes is known for its fresh seafood, such as shrimp, scallops, oysters, crab and 10 to 15 different species of fish.

"People can expect a huge variety, the highest quality and freshness," Corsano added. "We have a full bar to compliment that, and we have one of the largest wine lists in Ponte Vedra."



Sharks fall out of first after loss to Trinity Christian

The Ponte Vedra Sharks suffered their first conference loss of the season after falling to Trinity Christian 21-3 on Friday evening at the Conquerors' field. The loss dropped the Sharks out of a first place conference tie and makes Ponte Vedra's final conference game against Bolles critically important from a playoff perspective.

Both the Sharks and the Conquerors own 3-1 conference records, while the Bulldogs of Bolles stand at 4-0. Trinity wraps up the regular season against Bishop Kenny on Friday. Should the Conquerors take care of Kenny and the Sharks stop Bolles, all three teams would finish with identical 4-1 records, and the FHSAA would be left with a postseason playoff nightmare.

However, if BK upsets the Conquerors and the Sharks defeat Bolles, the Bulldogs and the Sharks would share first place, and Ponte Vedra likely would be named conference champs, with Bolles named conference runner-up. In this scenario, Trinity would be left out in the cold.

On the other hand, Ponte Vedra would be eliminated from the playoffs if it loses to Bolles and Trinity defeats BK. The end result is the Sharks' playoff hopes come down to Friday night's game against the Bulldogs.

If Ponte Vedra is to be a playoff team, it will have to come up with considerably more offense than it was able to generate Friday against TC. The Sharks produced just 104 yards of total offense on 43 plays—38 rushes and just 5 passes. Collin Magill was the workhorse for Ponte Vedra with 16 carries for 47 yards, while Mark Calvin rushed eight times for 21 yards. Jarrett Stepp caught two balls for 18 yards. He also had a brilliant 53-yard kick return to give the Sharks a first down at the TC 34-yard line. Unfortunately, a fumble on the next play cost the Sharks a chance to tie the game before the



first half ended.

Defensively, Ponte Vedra played well in the first half, allowing the Conquerors a single touchdown and an unsuccessful field goal attempt. Riley Robbins converted a 17-yard, third quarter field goal to make the score 7-3, but that was the last scoring opportunity the Sharks would have. Trinity took advantage of an interception to move in front 14-3 with three minutes left in the third quarter. They added the final touchdown on a screen pass from the Sharks' 10-yard line with eight minutes left in the game.

Sam Barnhard and Connor McDonough each recovered fumbles for the Sharks. John Tyler led Ponte Vedra with eight tackles; Zach Sommers had seven; Chris James and Zack King had six and Tommy Zitiello had five.

Ponte Vedra travels to Bolles on Friday with the team's playoff hopes on the line. The Sharks finish the season the following week with a non-conference game at Creekside.

Nease's rally falls short against St. Augustine

Nease put on quite a performance in front of a packed house against undefeated St. Augustine last Friday night, but fell short of pulling off the upset.

The Yellow Jackets (7-0, 3-0) held off the Panthers for a 35-23 victory and secured the District 4-6A title, although Nease didn't make it easy. The Panthers trailed 21-10 at halftime, but their defense held St. Augustine to several three-and-outs, and Nease's Trey Ragin intercepted Austin Reed's pass on first-and-goal during St. Augustine's opening drive of the second half.

"I didn't get into this for moral victories," Nease coach Tim Krause said. "We're always working to try to win games. While I'm really, really proud of their effort, the kids played incredibly hard and fought the entire game, I'm disappointed in the way it turned out."

Nease (4-4, 2-1) staged a rally in the second half behind the legs of standout running back Jareem Westcott. St. Augustine, which had been holding opponents to an average of 10.5 points per game, struggled to contain Westcott, who rushed for 225 yards on 39 carries and two touchdowns. He also nearly set up another scoring drive in the fourth quarter, bulldozing his way and dragging defenders with him to St. Augustine's 15-yard line, but the play was overturned on a holding penalty.

"In any game, there's a handful of situations you want back, and a handful of situations that, if they went one way or another, things would have turned out different and that was obviously one of them," Krause said. "We had a lot of momentum and had the call go against us. But that's the game, that's the way it works."

Quarterback Preston Staples went 11 of 18 passing for 116 yards and rushed for a touchdown too. He also threw two interceptions, however, and was sacked on fourth-and-goal on Nease's final possession of the game.

The disappointment of not being able to pull off the upset showed in the players' faces as they left the field, but Krause said he was impressed with the toughness his team displayed.

"I think we take away from this that we're a really competitive football team, and that I think our kids can play with anybody," Krause said. "... I'm really proud to be their coach. I thought they played as hard as they could, and I know they fought and I wish we could have done more for them."

The Panthers, who still have a slim chance to make the playoffs, next face Englewood at home at 7 p.m. Friday, before closing out the regular season at Bartram Trail on Nov. 3.

Sprague came to Liberty National from Malone Golf Club, in his hometown of Malone, New York, where he was general manager/director of golf for 27 years and earned numerous awards. Since 1998, he has served in a number of leadership roles at the PGA section and national levels, including his two-year term as the 39th PGA of America president (ending in 2016). Sprague is now the honorary president of the PGA of America.

Prior to Sprague's election as the PGA's

president in November 2014, he served 23 months as PGA vice president. He also served as PGA secretary for two years. Sprague turned professional in 1989, beginning his career at Malone Golf Club. He was elected to PGA membership in 1993.

His awards include being named Northeastern New York PGA Golf Professional of the Year in 2005 and 2008; receiving his PGA Section's Bill Strausbaugh Award four times (2000-03) for his leadership, serving the PGA and mentoring fellow PGA professionals; being named Section Merchandiser of the Year for Public Facilities in 1998-99; and winning the 2006 Section President's Plaque for outstanding contributions to player development.

Alana Swain is the latest addition to the PGA Tour's team of instructors at the Performance Center at TPC Sawgrass.

With an NCAA Championship and plenty of teaching experience on her resume, Swain applied for an instructor position at TPC Sawgrass shortly after finding out that the PGA Tour would be opening a new facility run by Todd Anderson. Swain connected with him at the behest of her friend and came for a visit to see the facility.

She thought it was unbelievable.

"It's a dream for a teacher and player," Swain said. "Everything you need to get better at is right here. I've seen a lot of golf facilities. It's just really well done. We have every piece of technology that you'd need. The putting studio is incredible, and the team of instructors we have here is also really special."

Swain fell in love with golf as a 14-year-old high school student. She knew right away that she wanted to play the sport competitively because it spoke to her, and every facet of the game is measurable.

"You can see how your hard work pays off based on scores," Swain said. "You kind of get almost addicted to getting better."

Swain accrued only a few years of experience before joining the golf team

have a program called PGM where you can get your PGA card along with your business degree all at the same time," she said. "So, when you go through that program, you do internships in the summer ... And it was through the internships that I saw that being a teacher was my passion."

Swain noticed the significance of coaching during her time as a collegiate golfer. As a result, she utilized years of studying and knowledge of the game to become one of the best young instructors in the country, according to Golf Digest Magazine.

Since 2010, Swain has worked as an instructor in New York and Miami at the Atlantic Golf Club, the Scarsdale Golf Club and the Jim McLean Golf School. In 2017, the PGA Tour's Performance Center at TPC Sawgrass offered her a new challenge.

"It's very different," Swain said. "I'm coming in from working at country clubs, I have also worked at a golf school, but it's definitely different than where I've worked previously. Because it's a performance center and not a golf school, we're creating programs to really get people better and come up with plans for people and assessments to measure their improvement.

"We're just hoping to create an amazing golf experience for people," Swain added.

The Chicago native describes herself as a "whole game teacher" who coaches everything, but mostly full swing. She has worked with a vast array of clientele over the years and is trained to teach all skill levels, from amateurs to pros. One of the most satisfying aspects of coaching, Swain said, is watching her clients accomplish their sought-after goals.

"I like taking any level player and creating an individual, specific plan for people to get better," she said. "I like watching a beginner hit the ball in the air for the first time and then want to do that over and over again. I like watching a high school kid make the high school team."

Swain's advice for new players is pair up with a friend and find an instructor that can simplify the game and teach the basics.

"If you're starting, it's fun to do it with a friend," she said. "Pair up with someone and learn together, find an instructor and learn those basics. It's tough to do it on your own."
