



Tax notices in the mail

The St. Johns County 2016 property tax rolls are now open for collection. Notices were sent to customers via email and mail Oct. 31. Payment may be made effective immediately.

Questions regarding homestead exemptions and property assessment may be addressed to the St. Johns County Property Appraiser, who is responsible for providing the St. Johns County Tax Collector with the tax roll.

Questions regarding the individual

taxing authorities' millage rates, CDD rates, assessments and exemptions listed on a tax notice should be addressed to those individual authorities provided on the insert in the tax notice.

Total taxes to be collected by the St. Johns County Tax Collector are \$411,764,143 – an increase of \$25,776,722 -and includes notices for real estate, tangible personal property, railroad, and non ad valorem assess-

"For the past 26 years, your Tax Collector's office has maintained a 99.3 percent or greater collection rate, with this year's collection rate standing at 99.74 percent," said St. Johns County Tax Collector Dennis W. Hollingsworth. "Ultimately, this assists all local taxing authorities to finance services for the citizens' needs."

Although all tax notices become due Nov. 1, 2016, they are payable through March 31, 2017, without incurring a

Residents who opt to pay their taxes in November will receive a 4 percent discount, with the discount decreasing by 1 percent each month until March 2017 when taxes must be paid and no discount is applied.

Residents may pay their taxes in a number of ways.

The shifting winds of political discourse

The first time I voted was in the 2008 presidential election, the year I took the Oath of Allegiance to the United States of America. I remember the 20-minute walk to the polling station.

Heck, I even remember what I was wearing. I also recall 2000, when daughter Rachael, a first-year student at University of Michigan, took a daybreak train home where her father rushed her to the polling station, then right back to the train. Neither party are early morning risers.

Like other Icelanders, politics is in my DNA. My parents' views rested on opposite sides of the political see-saw, Independence to Social Democratic Alliance. It's how I learned that business and integrity were my father's big issues and for mother it was women's rights and child welfare.

Teaching sixth grade at election time, I incorporated local proposals into

my social studies, language and math lessons, presenting both sides of the issues. After explaining that raising property taxes meant less money in the household budget, and passing of the proposal could mean that their grandparents living on fixed incomes might have to move out of their home to one with lower taxes, the kids voted "no."

Confidence and solidarity reigned among them until the next day when I explained what the taxes would be used for – a new high school with state-of-the-art technology, a community center with a ping-pong table and bike paths.

All traces of confidence erased; one girl said to me, "Ms. Andersen, you are confusing us."

Yes, indeed, democracy is a messy business, but we have yet to come up with anything better.

Through my years of teaching, I tried

to impress upon my students their responsibility to be informed of the issues and participate in the political process.

"I'm voting for Clinton to keep Trump out of the White House." Another friend said, "Hillary is crooked and corrupt, so I'm voting for Trump."

When I ask if they've looked into alternatives, the Green Party and the Libertarian Party, people dismiss it. "That's just throwing your vote away."

Iceland has seven political parties represented in parliament. Of 63 seats, 40 percent are women. In 2015, Iceland held second place on the Democracy Index of 67 countries in the world.

The Democracy Index, compiled by the Economist Intelligence Unit, measures the state of democracy in 167 countries: full democracies, flawed democracies, hybrid regimes and authoritarian regimes.

The Netherlands' parliament has 225 seats, with 39 percent women and 12 parties. It's ranked number 10 on the Democracy Index. http://www.althingi.is/english/members-of-parliament/political-parties/.

The U.S. Congress has a combined 535 seats. The Senate has two parties represented, Republicans (majority) and Democrats, and two members who got there as Independents.

In American politics, an independent or non-party politician is an individual not affiliated with any political party. Republicans hold 234 seats in the House of Representatives, Democrats 201.

That's it. Out of 435 seats, not a single seat for any other party. Women are 51 percent of the U.S. population. They occupy 19 percent of the seats in Congress. http://www.cawp.rutgers.edu/current-numbers

Last week, I wrote about a business monopoly. In the United States Congress we have an oligopoly-like structure.

I wrote that to end a business monopoly, you take your dollars to their competitors.

To end an oligopoly, we must vote

in new parties that will serve as competitors on how our money is spent and what laws are passed.

By just repeating what we hear on the news or posting on Facebook something another person said, the result will remain the same – a two-party system that appears not to be serving a large number of Americans and, in this election, parties that most seem fed up with.

The privilege of living in a democracy requires that we do our part, learn what the different parties and candidates stand for and vote for one that matches our beliefs. That's not throwing your vote away. It is voting your conscience, instead of giving into fear of what might happen.

Eleanor Roosevelt said, "Do one thing every day that scares you." Nov. 8 is just around the corner.

Now, as cooler air sweeps in from the Atlantic Ocean, I can feel the winds of political discord shifting. Today, Millennials outnumber Baby Boomers as the country's largest generation and they are not affiliating themselves with either of the two parties as they have in past elections

After announcing to my family of 72 members on Facebook that I was conducting an Andersen/Watts survey of the U.S. political election, the first three to respond were my college granddaughters

"Millennials tend not to be motivated by any single unifying issue," writes Jeremy W. Peters from the Wall Street

"They are declaring themselves unaffiliated with either party at a rate faster than any other generation. They say the political process and the two-party system are unresponsive to their concerns."

More than a third of voters between the ages of 18 and 29 back Johnson or Stein, the New York Times/CBS reports. (Oct. 2016)

It may not be the Greatest Generation or the Baby Boomers who shift the winds of political discord, but the Millennials who are now wise enough to think for themselves.

the SJTC website at www.sjctax.us. Online payments can be made via echeck for \$1.30, or by credit card for a 2.5 percent transaction fee paid to the financial institution.

Payment can also be made by mailing a check or visiting one of the tax collector's four offices.

In addition to the 68,344 tax notices sent to property owners, 43,016 tax no-

tices were sent to mortgage companies with escrow accounts.

Property owners with escrow accounts should receive an "information only" notice detailing their tax status and stating that it is not a bill.

Those who are unable to pay their homestead property taxes should contact the St. Johns County Tax Collector as early as possible to determine eligibility for the Homestead Tax Deferral

As chief executive officer of Infinity Design Builders, Michael Bruce oversees a full-service design/build company. He currently serves as president of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach.

What range of services does Infinity Design Builders provide?

Infinity Design Builders developed from an architectural/engineering practice in the 1980s into a full-service Design/Build company in 1993. Since then, we've ranked as the 6th and 3rd fastest growing privately held company in Jacksonville (years 2000 and 2001). Infinity steers projects from their earliest inception, from due diligence through certificate of occupancy. Services include: land planning, regulatory agency permitting, feasibility studies, programming, space and facility design, technical documents and specifications, value engineering, construction management and turn-key construction

What types of buildings has your company designed?

Infinity has five areas of core competency, with decades of experience and dozens of projects in each category. These best-practice areas are Commercial & Office, Healthcare, Food Service & Retail, Multi-Family Residential and Educational. The budgets and scope of our buildings range from \$100,000 to more than \$15

How did you become interested in architecture and construction?

My personal interest began in the 7th grade, when we were assigned to assess our skill sets and discuss these on "Career-Day" at school. I was intrinsically artistic (my family has professionals in commercial art and marketing) but I also enjoyed mathematics and rational problem solving. I considered what career might blend those skills, and the word "Architecture" popped into my head. I opened our World Book Encyclopedia to learn more. There was a two-page photograph of Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater house in rural Pennsylvania, and a vision of my future unfolded before me at that exact moment.

Does building in Florida present any unique architectural/construction challenges?

Florida is the home of big skies, flat lands, blinding sunlight, gale force winds and hard rains. Buildings in Florida shrink and expand through our daily cycle like an accordion.

The result is that designing and building facilities in Florida is ultimately a series of waterproofing, temperature and humidity control challenges unique to our environment.

What was your favorite design/build project on which you've worked? The most challenging?

Infinity Design Builders recently completed a world headquarters for a company based in Jacksonville, encompassing 45,000 square feet of corporate offices and 315,000 square feet of warehousing (an area of nearly seven football fields). The owners required a world-class state-of-the-art facility, both technically and aesthetically, to reflect their history and project their company into the future. It was both the most challenging and rewarding design/build project of my 30-plus vear career.

You're currently serving as president of the Rotary Club of Ponte Vedra Beach. How did you become involved in Rotary and what do you think the organization contributes to the community?



We are passionate about our Rotary in Ponte Vedra Beach!

What do you enjoy most about living on the First

I'm a native Floridian, born and raised in Miami and educated at the University of Florida. Since moving to Jacksonville in 1982 to begin our careers, my wife Rebecca and I have enjoyed everything on the First Coast. Raising two children (Rachael and Will) within walking distance of the Atlantic Ocean has been a dream. 





THE PLAYERS Stadium Course to reopen Nov. 15

Multimillion-dollar upgrade transforms popular course

THE PLAYERS Stadium Course will reopen for play Nov. 15, capping a multimillion-dollar renovation that officials say will benefit both players and spectators alike.

So dramatic are the changes, officials say, that longtime fans may not recognize the venerable course.

"To say that it's a transformation is an understatement," said Matt Rapp, executive director of THE PLAYERS Championship. "It's really hard to describe how different it is from what it was at the last (PLAYERS) tournament in May to what it is now. There have been changes to many aspects of the course and it's all for the benefit of the players and the fans."

In addition to rebuilding and resurfacing the course's greens with TifEagle bermudagrass, crews rebuilt all the bunkers and regrassed the bunker surrounds with Celebration bermudagrass. The practice facility has also been upgraded significantly, said Steve Wenzloff, vice president of design services for the PGA Tour.

"The goal was to create a world-class practice facility for our members and guests," Wenzloff said, "and offer a more realistic experience similar to what they'll find out on the golf course."

Significant changes have been made to several holes and tees, he added.

"The biggest change is the redesign of the 12th hole, which has been transformed into a drivable par-four," Wenzloff said. "Our goal was to add some additional drama and excitement to the back nine holes"

Players and spectators will also find a much more open course, Rapp said, thanks to the removal of mounds that obscured

some of the vantage points. Mounds that were initially created to enable spectators to see were "a little too severe," he said.

"We've been able to reshape these mounds and make them much easier for people to walk on," Rapp said.

In addition, a large land mass between the 6th and 7th holes has been removed and a lake added.

"Pete Dve called the 6th hole the most beautiful hole, but we didn't have much traffic out there the way it was situated," Rapp said. "Now it's so wide open and the hole itself hasn't changed one centimeter. I think we're going to see people wanting to go out there.'

All of the changes to the course, Wenzloff said, will serve the goal of improving the overall PLAYERS Championship experience.

"From a player's standpoint, a spectator standpoint and a member/guest standpoint, the PGA Tour is always striving to improve THE PLAYERS Championship," Wenzloff said, "and this was a big step in that direction."

In addition to the modifications to the course, renovations are still underway to the entrance to TPC Sawgrass.

"It's going to be a complete transformation," Rapp said. "I liken the change on the entry experience...as similar to the difference between the old clubhouse and the new clubhouse. It's that big of a difference.

"The changes are really true to the ethos that this course was created upon: to create an incredible experience for golf fans and make this a bigger and better experience than you can have at any other attended golf event," Rapp continued. "It is a testament to golf fans, a shrine to golf fans, and it's going to be that much better moving forward."

Talk with a Doc: Dr. Jennifer Crozier encourages a healthier lifestyle to reduce risk of breast cancer

The Ponte Vedra YMCA's Healthy Living Center hosted another in its series of "Talk with a Doc" events Oct. 20, this time covering lifestyle links to breast

Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center's Jennifer Crozier, MD, a hematologist oncologist, presented a slideshow detailing breast health information ranging from risks to prevention and lifestyle changes.

Dr. Crozier said that although breast cancer rates have been declining since 1989, it remains the number one cancer among women.

"Unfortunately, there's no sure way to prevent breast cancer," she said. "But there are some things that all women can do to try and reduce their risk. Our goal is to be finding these cancers at an earlier stage when they're more treatable and more curable."

Identifying four major steps to bettering breast health, she stressed the importance of screening, weight control, physical activity and healthy dietary choices to reduce the risk of breast cancer.

Screening

"Screening helps find cancers usually at an earlier stage, before they've spread and when they're usually more curable with surgery, possibly chemotherapy and radiation therapy," Crozier said, noting that the earlier the cancer is found the better.

Though the American Cancer Society recommends discussing when screening may be right for the patient once they turn 40 with yearly mammograms beginning at age 45, she recommends sooner, more frequent checks.

"(At Anderson), we think that's a little

on the conservative side," she said. "We start at age 40. That's typically our recommendation: starting at age 40 and continuing annually from there."

Weight control

More than two in three American adults are overweight, and more than one in three are obese.

Among children and teens aged 2 to 19, nearly one in six are obese. Crozier said that it's important to consider body mass index (BMI) because studies have shown that as BMI increases, the risk of getting breast cancer increases as well.

Getting to a healthy weight as young as possible and maintaining it as long as possible is key, she said, but it's never too late to try and reach a healthy weight.

Studies have shown that incorporating

physical activity into the day and choosing healthier diet options, in addition to assisting with weight loss, can reduce the risk of breast cancer as well.

Physical activity

Crozier says that studies have shown that breast cancer is reduced among physically active women compared to less active women.

"We recommend that you get at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity or 75 minutes of vigorous activity each week, or an equivalent combination throughout the week," Crozier said, noting that personal responsibilities might make it difficult to get continuous exercise.

"Even doing them in different intervals is usually about the same. Perhaps not for weight loss, but the health benefits in

terms of cancer, diabetes and the heart – is likely equivalent in 15 to 20 minute sets."

Healthy dietary choices

"What we really want to do is rearrange the plate by promoting a plant-based diet where fruits and vegetables are the center and the side items are protein, meats and whole grains," Crozier said. "Choosing foods and beverages in the right amounts can help achieve a healthy weight."

Likewise, women who consume more servings of vegetables see lowered risk of breast cancer compared to women who consume too few. According to Crozier, meta-analysis of several studies has shown a link between high consumption of vegetables and reduction of risk. The increased intake of fruits and vegetables is linked to total health benefits and reduced risk with all cancers, in heart health and diabetes and stroke - not only breast cancer.

She suggested limiting the intake of sugary beverages like soda and sports drinks so as not to negate the effects of a healthy diet and physical activity. More importantly, Crozier strongly suggested limiting alcohol to one drink per day for women and two for men (where either 12 ounces of beer, one and a half ounces of spirits or five ounces of wine constitutes

Overall, Crozier urged attendees to take charge by maintaining a healthy, balanced lifestyle and managing risks where pos-

"These are the things you can do – being active, maintaining a healthy weight and being aware of our breasts and any changes," she said. "Limit your risks and get screened every year."



Cultural Center exhibition spotlights works by Dottie Dorion, Ed Malesky

"Splashes of a Colorful Life" – featuring abstract paintings by Dottie Dorion – and "Shadows," turned wood works by Ed Malesky, will be on display at the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach through Nov. 11.

An opening reception for the artists' works was held Oct. 21 and featured live music, appetizers, cocktails and a chance to be among the first to view the Cultural Center's newest exhibition and meet the artists.

Coming from an artistic family and taking art studies elective courses in undergraduate

and graduate school, Dorion displays a body of work that includes abstracts, landscapes and what she refers to as "alternative visions" where she employs the use of non-traditional paint. One such work, "Goldfish," which is part of the CCPVB exhibition, uses oil and glass beads to create depth and texture.

Her primary mediums are acrylic and oil. Dorion utilizes bold color and sweeping textures combined with delicate strokes to convey the mood and tone of her paintings. The curator for Dorion's exhibition, Paul Ladnier, has been her instructor for the past 10 years, but they've known each other about

three decades.





South Korean artists demonstrate tapestry techniques at Cutter & Cutter gallery

Jeong and Choon Yun demonstrated their unique process for creating paper tapestries for local residents recently, when the South Korean artists visited Ponte Vedra's newly opened Cutter & Cutter Fine Art gallery in Sawgrass Village.

The artists traveled from their Pennsylvania home studio to demonstrate their technique for gallery visitors Oct. 14 and 15 during a special exhibition of their work. It's a technique the couple has perfected over the past quarter century, Jeong Yun said.

"If I do say so, it's an unprecedented process," he said. "It's a totally new technique."

Far from merely creating tapestries out of paper, Yun explained, he and his wife actually harvest the bark of trees and create the paper and cellulose fibers themselves. The papers are then dried and dyed using a myriad of vibrant, all-natural organic dyes.


"These fibers are so strong," Yun said, dipping his hand into a container of saffron-hued dye and pulling out the strings of fibers. "And yet these are so soft," he said, gesturing to some colored fibers that appeared to have the texture of cotton balls.

Gallery co-owner Sonya Cutter praised the Yuns' natural technique and the couple's collaborative artistic process.

"They both know what they're trying to present," she said, "and they are so skilled in how they balance their art.'

Cutter & Cutter unveiled more than 50 of the couple's works ranging in size from 16 inches by 16 inches to 72 inches by 72 inches. Prices range from \$1,500 to \$24,000.




"A Day Without Violence" is the focus of a new art exhibit currently on display in the Rotunda Gallery of the St. Johns County Administration Building.

Women's Board of Wolfson Children's Hospital celebrates legacy of caring for children

Dr. Ben Carson believes God has a sense of humor.

The acclaimed pediatric neurosurgeon – famed for being the first doctor to successfully separate twins conjoined at the head – told attendees at his Florida Forum presentation Oct. 25 that as a youth he struggled both academically and with a temper that threatened to send his life down a dark and troubled path. After praying that God would grant him wisdom, Carson found his perspective transformed by reading from the book of Proverbs, which was written by King Solomon.

"My middle name is Solomon," Carson noted. "So God knew that I was going to have an affinity for the book of Proverbs and Solomon."

The connection went even further. "Solomon was famous for his wisdom and for telling the two women who fought over a baby to divide it in half," he continued. "And that's how I became very well known – for dividing a baby. So, I think God has a sense of humor!"

Carson's story held particular significance for members of The Women's Board of Wolf-

son Children's Hospital, which was founded in the 1970s after twin girls Annie and Abbie Martin were born prematurely and the hospital lacked the equipment needed to care for both infants. As a result, Abbie lived just eight

days. Since that time, The Women's Board has raised more than \$28 million to support the hospital's program and equipment needs through fundraising events such as the Florida Forum speaker series.

Thanks in part to that support, in 2015 Wolfson Children's Hospital was the facility at which conjoined twins Conner and Carter Mirabal were successfully separated. Now at home with their parents, the twins were backstage briefly at Carson's Florida Forum presentation – an experience that organizers said felt like The Women's Board had "come full circle"

"What a poignant evening this is for us," said Grace Sarber, president of The

Women's Board and the older sister of Annie and Abbie Martin. "To have this renowned pediatric neurosurgeon visit our hospital and to hear about his life and his perspective on medicine, it was really just the perfect way to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Florida Forum."

Robin Albaneze, who co-chairs the Florida Forum series with Judy D'Antignac, agreed. "To have Dr. Carson here and to see how far we've come," she said, "it just makes your heart sing."

Harnessing potential

Carson said the most rewarding part of his recent presidential campaign was having an opportunity to meet some of the 15,000 patients on whom he operated during his 29-year career as a pediatric neurosurgeon. At an appearance in Kentucky, for example, Carson was approached by a family who pointed to a young man in his 20s and said, "Do you recognize this young man?... You operated on his brain when he was a year old and he just graduated from college, number one in his class."

At another event, a young woman told Carson, "You operated on me when I was still in my mother's womb."

"That's why no one will ever convince me that what's in a woman's womb is a meaning-less bunch of cells." he said.

Carson also addressed the nation's current political climate and stressed that Americans must be unified if our country and its people are to realize their full potential.

"We the American people are not each other's enemies," he said. "Because there really are people out there who want to destroy us."

America is unique on the world stage, Carson said, because our founding documents are based on Judeo-Christian values and an inherent belief in right and wrong that is currently being sacrificed at the altar of political correctness

"The secular progressive movement, they don't care if you disagree with them as long as you sit down and shut up," he said. "If America is to remain 'One Nation Under God,' then it's time for people who believe that to stand up and shout out."

In order for America to remain competitive with other countries, Carson said, it is imperative for all Americans to have the opportunity to climb out of poverty and become part of the fabric of society.

"When we look at the myriad young people wasting time, we begin to understand how important it is for us to cultivate that talent," he said. "And isn't that what real success is – using the talent God has given you to elevate other people?"

The 25th anniversary season of the Florida Forum continues on Jan. 30, 2017 with a presentation by FOX News Anchor Megyn Kelly. The series will conclude March 13, 2017 with an evening with Tim Tebow.



Beaches Museum celebrates International Archaeology Day

The Beaches Museum's History Park once again played host to an educational day of play with its third annual International Archaeology Day celebration, held Oct. 15.

Braving winds and the threat of rain were families, educators and museum members browsing booths displaying archaeological lessons and activities, all aimed at bringing the past and the future together.

"Our goal today is to help people learn what archaeology really is and what it's about," said Brendan Burke, a maritime historian from the St. Augustine Lighthouse archaeological maritime program. "People don't realize how important archaeology is to modern culture. By teaching others about it, we're essentially blending two cultures: the past and the present."

That lesson was heard loud and clear through events and attractions illustrating often overlooked aspects of archaeology beyond dinosaur bones. Throughout the park, children were encouraged to participate in archaeological activities and create their own "ancient" finds. Stations replete with arts and crafts, containers filled with layers of "aged" sand and prop foods and instruments beckoned visitors.

Young archaeologists enjoyed a day of creating their own pottery, painting their own masks and participating in mock digs, wherein they were given spoon "shovels," paint brushes and logs with which to clean and record their findings. Visitors were also treated to a lecture by Charles R. Cobb of the Florida Museum

of Natural History and local artifact identification by Dr. Keith Ashley, research coordinator of sociology and anthropology at the University of North Florida.

According to Museum Master Gardner Lee McDonald, the day was meant to inform kids of more than just the typical teachings of archaeology; in keeping with the curriculum the museum is establishing, the day's schedule also included lessons on the evolution of food staples, gardening practices and artifacts of Floridian Native Americans from the Ice Age through the Renewal era.

"One of the most important things we can teach children today about the past is how to take care of the environment," he said.

"Our hope is that they'll learn more about the environment, about food, the history of local cultures and artifacts and how to sustain them. Those practices will last them a lifetime and preserve (our history) for generations."

Parents agreed.

Stacy Hale, who brought her daughter Graciele to the event, participated in the pottery and mask making activities in the park. She said by doing so, she hoped the experience would encourage her daughter to treasure the unique history in the community.

"I would really like for her to learn more about the history of where we live and to help her understand the cultures of its past a little better," she said. "Having her work with her hands and seeing what that history looks like is a great way to do that."

Throughout the day, the theme of preserving knowledge of the past while looking toward the future prevailed – and McDonald is hopeful that the annual celebration will spawn new generations eager to learn more.

"The people and cultures we're studying today lived very resourceful, healthy and sustainable lives and we could all stand to learn from them," he said. "Our ultimate hope is that we can teach kids that discoveries are constant and never ending. There will always be new things and new discoveries about these time periods to learn that will help us in the future"

St. Augustine reenacts changing of the guard

Visitors to St. Augustine Oct. 22 had an opportunity to witness the historic reenactment of the changing of the guard.

Historical interpreters marched down St. George Street from the Colonial Quarter to Government House, where they were met by a second squad of soldiers – or "soldados."

The relief troops then exchanged places with the soldados already stationed on guard duty, firing their

muskets.

The ceremony reenacts the daily ritual instituted in 1740 by the Spanish colonial governor of St. Augustine, who ordered the patrol of soldados to march through the city each evening to ensure residents were safe within its walls.

Once the city was secure, the soldados would march to the governor's mansion, where a relief squad would assume watch.



Klezmer concert coming to Temple Bet Yam

Klezmer, a musical tradition of the Ashkenazi Jews of Eastern Europe, will be performed at 7 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5 at Temple Bet Yam.

Klezmer originated in the shtetls and ghettos of Eastern Europe where it was performed at weddings and holiday celebrations. Today's klezmer, influenced early on by its Eastern European roots, gypsy, and Balkan music, now also reflects American jazz and Israeli sounds and uses a variety of musical instruments. The music continues to not only elicit a whole gamut of emotions but reminds many of their Jewish history.

The concert will be performed by four

klezmorim: Joseph and Lynn Goldovitz, Jacob Goldberger, and Ray Guiser. The Goldovitzes – who say their greatest influence has been the music and teachings of Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach – have played at Klezmer festivals in Safed, Israel and the Jewish Renaissance Foundation in Princeton, New Jersey, as well as locally and around the United States. Their repertoire includes numerous traditional klezmer pieces, and its fusion with other forms of music. While continuing as performers, they are also cantorial soloists for Congregation Sinai in Clermont/Minneola, Florida.

Goldberger has been a musician since

his early years in Israel. He has performed in New York with the Gulf Coast Symphony and with a quartet at the International Klezmer Festival in Safed, Israel. Guiser, a renowned saxophonist, reflects the influence of American jazz on klezmer. He began his professional life performing with elite jazz ensembles and other bands of note in Washington, D.C. In addition to teaching woodwinds, he has recorded with many top jazz, classical, pop and blues performers.

Healing hands: Ponte Vedra doctor looks to transform healthcare system

Ponte Vedra based physician Dr. Eva Nasi has her sights set on shaking up the health care system with the opening of PremierCare MD, a direct primary care service providing a viable alternative to the frustrations of traditional medical practices

The premise of the direct primary care model (DPC), a movement Nasi says is fronted by Atlas MD in Wichita, Kansas, gives individuals and families an alternative to traditional doctor's office visits. The concierge model works by forgoing the fee for service arrangements typically made through insurance companies. Patients instead pay fees periodically that cover most services – things like checkups, labs and simple consultative services – that could otherwise be made difficult or unaffordable.

Uneasy with how little attention she could afford each patient while seeing upwards of 20 per day, and frustrated by time-consuming paperwork and patients blindsided by insurance fees, Nasi began looking to the model after growing unsatisfied with the traditional healthcare system.

"I just thought to myself ... this is not

should work," Nasi recalled. "I felt rushed, my patients felt rushed ... there's no time to give them proper care. It didn't sit well with me."

Making the change

Having become impatient with a traditional system she believed was "broken," Nasi decided to open a new medical practice of her own by turning to the growing field of DPC healthcare that she had been considering for years.

"After doing the research and talking to other doctors who'd embraced the model, I decided to take that leap," she said of founding PremierCare MD almost three months ago. "I think it's the best decision I've ever made."

The difference, she says, was astonishing.

According to Nasi, doctors at traditional fee-for-service practices must see between 2,500 and 3,000 patients, which can make it difficult to get an appointment at all. That frustration is compounded for both doctor and patient when patients are required to

attend appointments needlessly – to review lab work that returned with normal results, for example – when a simple call or email might have sufficed.

At PremierCare MD, the doctor is limited to 400 to 500 patients and is accessible by phone, email and even "virtual visits." Priced between \$19 and \$69 per month, Nasi says patients are afforded the flexibility of home and office visits, discounted lab work, affordable prescriptions and a doctor they can contact directly. And though Nasi still recommends that patients continue to have catastrophic health insurance for major hospital visits and surgeries, she feels a DPC membership could save them money in premium health care costs.

It's a model of considerable growth, one that Nasi says is projected to grow 25 percent in the coming years. The alternative gives the patient the power to make their own decisions regarding their health at a cost that doesn't make them hesitant to seek the care they need. Better still, Nasi said, it gives her the opportunity to form more meaningful relationships with her patients and to give their concerns, questions and care the time they warrant.

"With this model I'm able to practice

medicine the way I was dreaming of," she said. "I don't feel like I'm a 'third party' with my patients. I don't feel as if I'm working for anyone other than them. I can sit with them, talk with them, address their concerns."

Nasi also said she feels she can offer things to her patients with PremierCare MD that were of scarcity in a traditional setting: things like time and, by extension, better quality of care, accessibility and affordability. And it's a system she feels everyone can benefit from.

"Anyone and everyone who wants a tailored health plan could benefit from practice like this," she said. "People with and without insurance, people who want to be able to reach their doctor anytime and people who want ... care they can more easily afford."

Nasi's ultimate hope is that the DPC model will catch on in the Jacksonville area so that she and other physicians can change the system.

"I'm very passionate about this," she said. "A little change goes a long way. This model just makes more sense, and with it I can show my patients that I'm here — they can count on their doctor."



3rd quarter market report indicates a strong 'seller's market'

Residential market activity is a bench-

mark commonly used by real estate economists to measure supply/demand as they influence pricing, growth potential and residential real estate opportunity.

One indicator used to assess the current market is known as the "rate of absorption," which is calculated by dividing the number of units currently available by the current month's sales.

It's generally assumed that any number above six months of inventory suggests downward pressure on sales price, or a "Buyer's Market." Any number below six months of inventory suggests upward pressure on home prices or a "Seller's Market."

Using this measurement, residential real estate activity in Ponte Vedra during the third quarter of 2016 demonstrated

impressive performance, with a listing absorption rate at an average of 5.21 months. Condominiums under \$400,000 and single family homes under \$400,000 were the two most active sectors, at a combined average of a sizzling 2.67 months of inventory based on current local market demand

Quarterly Residential Summary Single Family Homes under \$400,000

Monthly inventory absorption averaged 2.7 months of inventory and ended at 2.55, which is cause for strong upward pressure on price for a strong "Seller's Market" position.

Sales price against list price averaged a strong 98.9 percent. The quarter ended

with 143 homes available at a price range of \$150,000 to \$399,900.

Single Family Homes over \$400,000

Monthly inventory absorption averaged 7.9 and ended at 5.15 of inventory at current rate of absorption, which is cause for upward pressure on price, gently moving this category into a "Seller's Market" position.

Sales price against list price averaged a strong 96.9 percent. The quarter ended with 412 homes available at a price range of \$400,000 to \$10,200,000.



Scaring up a good time

Pie in the Sky and Simple Gestures host the 2016 Great American Scarecrow Festival

Pie in the Sky and Simple Gestures partnered again this year for The Great American Scarecrow Festival held Saturday, Oct. 22.

Billed as an old-fashioned gathering and held at Simple Gestures in St. Augustine, the fall festival featured apple bobbing, face painting, pumpkin painting and live music by Lonesome Bert & the Skinny Lizards.

Festival-goers had the opportunity to bring with them old clothes, a hat and a pillow case or t-shirt to learn how to make scarecrows, with hay provided for the scarecrow stuffing.

A raffle and silent auction were also part of the day's festivities. Pork sandwiches, bean burgers and Pie in the Sky pies were for sale at the event.

Proceeds from the annual event benefited Pie in the Sky, an organization that provides fresh produce, healthy foods and other resources to low-income residents in the Hastings area. Specifically, proceeds from this year's festival were earmarked for Pie in the Sky's new senior program.

Pie in the Sky partnered with the Council on Aging to identify seniors on the COA's Meals on Wheels waiting list who were interested in getting fresh produce delivered to their home. When the senior program began, there were 12 names on the list; now there are 85.

"There are over 4,000 low-income senior citizens in St. Johns County that are food insecure, so 85 is a drop in a bucket," Pie in the Sky Director Malea Guiriba said.

The organization hopes to grow the all-volunteer program because there's simply a lot of need,she said. The program provides food to low-income senior citizens throughout St. Johns County, but the vast majority of the seniors live in St. Augustine. It costs the organization about \$30 a month, or \$1 a day, to provide produce to a low-income senior

"We try to give things that are healthy, that have a lot of vitamins and nutri-

ents that a low-income senior needs," she said. "We've gotten a tremendous response from the seniors we deliver to, saying they wouldn't be able to buy this at the store because it's too expensive."

The Great American Scarecrow Festival has been held annually at Simple Gestures since Pie in the Sky was founded in 2009. A second fundraiser, "It's for the Birds," is held in the spring. Local artists decorate bird houses with proceeds from the sales going to Pie in the Sky.

"We're small, but we do a lot and we get a lot done with a little, and Simple Gestures has just been the best partner we could ever hope for because they have such deep ties to the community of artists and musicians," Guiriba said.

"Lonesome Bert & the Skinny Lizards have volunteered their time every year, twice a year for us – they're always there to play music," she continued. "It's a great support network of folks in St. Augustine that allows us to be able to do this."



Sharks top Parker 33-14 on Senior Night, capture district title

The Ponte Vedra Sharks extended their season unbeaten streak to eight games, with a 33-14 district win over the Terry Parker Braves on Senior Night at the Shark Tank last Friday.

While it was not the Sharks' best performance of the year, it served to clinch the District 5A Class 4 title. As a result, the Sharks will open the post-season at home against an opponent still to be determined. Perhaps the lackluster performance was simply a let down following an emotionally draining 48-45 win over Bartram Trail the week before on a 42-yard field goal in the game's final seconds.

Whatever the reason, Ponte Vedra missed a pair of chip shot field goals in the first quarter but Duncan Van Kouteren was able to block the Parker punt on the visitor's second possession to earn a safety and a 2-0 lead for Ponte Vedra at the sixminute mark.

Following the safety, the Sharks controlled the ball for 12 plays and a first and goal from the Parker six before settling for their second field goal attempt of the game, this from 34 yards. Like the previous miss, this one sailed wide right.

The Shark defense kept the Braves bottled up in their end of the field and the ensuing short Parker punt gave Ponte Vedra the ball and a short field to work with. Once again, Ponte Vedra had to settle for another field goal attempt. Chris Howard's kick was true and the Sharks took a 5-0

lead as the first quarter ended.

Things got back to normal after Ponte Vedra took over on downs. Nick Tronti and Hal Swan collaborated on a successful 20-yard pass, Swan ran for eight then bulled over from the five to put the Sharks on top 12-0. The half ended with the teams trading unsuccessful possessions.

Parker used the long ball and a two-point conversion to close the gap to 12-8. But the Sharks answered with a 15-play drive. The most exciting in the series – an 80-yard run from scrimmage by Swan for an apparent touchdown – was all for naught when Ponte Vedra was flagged for holding. Still the drive continued. On a third and 18 from midfield, Swan ripped off a 40-yard run to the Parker 10. The next play, Tronti hit his tight end Kit Connelly in the end zone for a touchdown, making the score a little more respectable for the Sharks at 19-8.

Ponte Vedra's defense continued to make matters difficult for the Braves. After quarterback sacks by Van Kouteren and Peter Merlini, JB Shepherd picked off a pass and Tronti turned the possession into a 19-yard touchdown to JD Pirris, bumping the Shark lead to 26-8.

Ponte Vedra got burned on yet another long pass play for the other Brave score but Andrew O'Dare intercepted their two-point attempt. O'Dare has made a habit this season of picking off two-point conversion passes.

After Ponte Vedra's Noah Solaun recovered the Braves' not surprising on-sides

kick-off, Tronti led his team to its final touchdown. It came on a 15-yard pass to Jake Maguire and made the final score 33-14.

Halftime was devoted to the crowning of the Homecoming King and Queen, Molly Voytecek and Davis Massey.

The Sharks host Creekside in the final regular season game on Friday, Nov. 4 at 7 p.m. The Knights, who play in District 7A, have been struggling all season; they stand at 0-8 for the year, having scored just 80 points while allowing 346.

Jaguars lose to a former head coach for second straight game

Team fires offensive coordinator Olson, promotes Hackett

The Jaguars came out of Music City singing a sad country song, as Jacksonville lost an uninspired but important AFC South game to Tennessee 36-22.

The Jaguars now have back-to back losses this season to former coaches: Mike Mularkey of Tennessee and Oakland's Jack Del Rio.

The Jaguars' lackluster performance on national TV Thursday night included a glaring 27-0 halftime deficit as the Titans had 354 yards of offense after two quarters compared to Jacksonville's 60. It could have been much worse if Tennessee gone to a prevent defense, playing soft in the secondary for the entire second half

"Well, I've been in a lot of games in my career, and I don't know if there's any cushion," Mularkey said. "When we came out at the half, it was the full game plan. Nothing was going to change because I've been around long enough to know: Don't get comfortable."

Tennessee (4-4) scored on its last five possessions of the first half.

Titans QB Marcus Mariota passed for 270 yards, and DeMarco Murray rushed for 123 yards and a TD. Mariota completed 18 of 22 passes with two touchdowns and no interceptions as the Titans outgained the Jaguars 494 yards to 370.

"I think today was probably the first time all three phases played a complete game, and you know what, that's all you can really ask for," Mariota said. "Those guys deserve a lot of credit, and we've just got to continue to roll."

Jacksonville (2-5) QB Blake Bortles was 33 of 54 for 337 yards and three TDs

Bortles admitted to being frustrated by the team's performance.

"Confidence isn't an issue," Bortles said. "I believe in myself and this team 100 percent."

Bortles threw a 10-yard TD pass to tight end Julius Thomas to open the second half. He ran in the two-point conversion, cutting the deficit to 27-8. Bortles threw a 5-yard TD to Allen

Abry Jones replaced Miller in the starting lineup and made three tackles...defensive end Tyson Alualu took Jared Odrick's starting position and recorded three tackles.


