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

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



# PZA recommends transmittal of Vilano hotel proposal Board of County Commissioners scheduled to hear matter at Sept. 20 meeting

The St. Johns County Planning & Zoning Agency board voted 5 to 1 last week in favor of recommending that the Board of County Commissioners approve transmittal of a comprehensive plan amendment that would allow the construction of a hotel resort complex on Coastal Highway.

At the Aug. 4 meeting – attended by hundreds of residents who came to voice their opposition to the project - board members Jeffrey Martin, Brad Nelson, David Rice, Archie Wainwright and Ion Woodard voted to recommend transmittal of the requested zoning change, citing the jobs and tax revenue that would be generated by the project. Dick Williams was the lone board member to vote against the project, saying the size and scope of the proposed Watermarke resort was not compatible with the surrounding area.

"I'm not going to say yes if I'm not convinced it really belongs there," said Williams, noting he had received hundreds of emails from Vilano Beach residents expressing their opposition to the project. "It's not compatible in

mv mind."

The Aug. 4 hearing on the issue began with a presentation by county Chief Planner Danielle Handy, who explained that a comprehensive plan amendment was necessary because the property in question – a 43-acre parcel located on Coastal Highway approximately 1.5 miles north of Vilano Town Center - is currently zoned residential C, which does not allow hotels or beach clubs. In order to build the proposed project, the property would have to be rezoned as residential D, which allows such facilities.

Handy detailed the county's review of the proposed project - which included a review of its environmental and traffic impacts – and noted that contrary to some residents' fears should the project be approved and later sold, the new owners would not be able to make any changes to the project without seeking further county approval. She concluded by saying county staff recommended transmittal.

#### Project changes

Following Handy's presentation, however, the developer introduced some last-minute changes to the project in the form of a text amendment. Working from a photocopied page upon which text had been crossed out and handwritten changes inserted, attorney Ellen Avery-Smith said that in response to community concerns about population density and traffic, the developers had decided to scale back the project. While the initial proposal called for construction of a hotel with 130 rooms, 70 beach villas,

a 39-slip marina and 80,000 square feet of ancillary resort facilities such as a spa, restaurant and fitness center, the revised proposal would call for 120 hotel rooms, 50 villas, and 70,000 square feet of ancillary resort facilities. The 39-slip marina would remain unchanged. In addition, the developers requested that in the event the resort wasn't built, they would retain

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# **Trump stumps in Jacksonville** Thousands flock to candidate's rally

Republican presidential nominee Donald J. Trump stumped for votes in Jacksonville Aug. 3, attracting a standing-room-only crowd for a rally and wide-ranging speech that outlined in broad strokes the businessman's key policy objectives amid jabs at President Barack Obama and Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton.

The 15,000-seat Veterans Memorial Arena was filled to capacity with a diverse crowd that waved Trump signs, sported "Make America Great Again" hats and at various times broke into chants ranging from "Trump! Trump! Trump!" to "Lock her up!" – a reference to Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton. Among the attendees – who ranged in age from small children to senior citizens – were four teens who traveled from Baker and Nassau counties to hear Trump speak.

"My parents were small business owners and all the regulations Obama put in really hurt them," said Bryce Donker, 17.

Sixteen-year-old Kyrie Holman, meanwhile, said that education was a key factor in her friends' support for Trump.

"We are very much against Common Core," she said. "It's ruining our education and our education system. Government just keeps trying to reach its tentacles into every area of our lives."

#### Firing up the base

Prior to Trump's remarks – which began approximately 45 minutes after the scheduled 7 p.m. starting time – a number of local and national Republican party leaders and public figures fired up the party base in support of Trump's candidacy, including Jacksonville Mayor Lenny Curry – who served as master of ceremonies – Republican National Committee Co-Chair Sharon Day, U.S. Rep. Ted Yoho, pastor Mark Burns, and retired Lt. Gen. Mike Flynn.

"Republicans are dependent upon the political might of Northeast Florida – a big win

here absolutely wipes out our liberal neighbors to the south," Duval County Republican Party Chairman Cindy Graves told the audience. "Our country is the greatest experiment in freedom the world has ever known and we will not let it end on our watch."

Former Lt. Gov. Jennifer Carroll told attendees, "I keep hearing pundits say that Mr. Trump has no blacks or women supporting him. Last time I checked, I was black and I'm still a woman, and I support Donald Trump!"

Attorney General Pam Bondi shared the Donald Trump she knows as a friend, recounting his devotion to his family and the genuine concern he showed for Bondi's mother. Blasting Obama for doubling the national debt to more than \$19 trillion – amassing as much debt in eight years as all 43 of his predecessors combined – Bondi said Trump was the man to fix the economy and keep America safe by protecting its borders.

"The amount of cocaine and heroin flowing into our state is ridiculous," Bondi said, "and Donald Trump is going to do everything he can to stop it."

#### **Trump talk**

By the time Trump took the stage, the crowd was eager to hear what they came for: the sort of free-wheeling, off-the-cuff stump speech that has earned Trump both loyal fans and harsh critics. In an hour-long address presented without a TelePrompTer – a fact Trump highlighted by impersonating Hillary Clinton turning woodenly back and forth to read from a script, drawing laughs from the audience – Trump touched on a number of key issues, including the economy.

"What we need is leadership," Trump said. "Our leaders are incompetent. Our debt has doubled under Barack Obama. He doesn't know what he's doing. We have a big, fat, horrible problem."

Noting that in recent years manufacturing jobs across the country had been shipped to other countries, Trump pledged that if he were elected, businesses that moved jobs

# Trump rally draws local candidates

Prior to Trump's Jacksonville speech, attendees milled about outside Veterans Memorial Arena, snapping up Trump t-shirts, buttons and signature "Make America Great Again" baseball caps. Joining the crowd were a number of candidates running for other offices, including former Jacksonville Sheriff John Rutherford – who is running for U.S. Congress in the 4th Congressional District – and two of his opponents, Democrat David Bruderly and write-in candidate Dan Murphy.

"I'm the reason he's in (the race)," Murphy said with a nod at Bruderly, who acknowledged he entered the race when he learned Democrats would not have a candidate from their party on the ballot.


"You knocked me out of my comfort zone," Bruderly replied, adding he went to the Trump rally hoping to score some support among undecideds. "I'm looking for persuadable voters – people who are not persuaded by either party," he said. "We have two candidates people don't like. My pitch is that I'm an independent Democrat and I can work across the aisle with anybody."

Accompanying Bruderly was his "significant other," Ingrid Prosser. "I'm an artist – I'm not really political," Prosser said. "I'm also a crossover Republican: My party left me and I feel I have much more in common with David's philosophy."

Murphy, meanwhile, said his campaign started as an April Fool's Joke.

"I sent a letter to the Times-Union, kind of like a Pat Paulson kind of thing," said Murphy, referring to the comedian who launched a facetious run for president in the 1960s. "Then (U.S. Rep.) Ander Crenshaw dropped out and I thought, 'Why not?"

Other candidates seeking the 4th congressional seat include Stephen Kaufman, Ed Malin, Bill McClure, Deborah Katz Pueschel, Lake Ray and Hans Tanzler.

# PVB MSD chairman presents audit results, FY17 budget at County Commission meeting

Traffic, roadway drainage, and parking woes at Mickler's Landing were among the challenges highlighted Aug. 2 when the Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District (MSD) presented its fiscal year 2017 budget to the Board of County Commissioners.

MSD Chairman Gary Jurenovich also presented results from the most recent audit of the MSD, which provides supplemental services to residents living within the district – including street lighting, street signs and additional garbage collection.

One of the biggest expenditures of the organization is the contract MSD developed with the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office for five deputies, who patrol the area and stay within the MSD unless they are called outside the area for service, according to Jurenovich.

"The residents do like that and we are going to continue that," Jurenovich said. "In fact, we just negotiated two weeks ago in extending that contract for four more years."

He also said the MSD made the decision to keep the millage rate the same at .375 mills.

Approximately 1,380 homes are included in the MSD, which encompasses the area from the Duval County line south to Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve, primarily east of State Road A1A.

The MSD was chartered with the

state approximately 34 years ago and recently celebrated a milestone 400th meeting.

"The goal, I've always said, for setting up the service district, is to maintain or increase property values... by maintaining or increasing property values every year in the service district, these are ad valorem tax dollars that flow down here to St. Augustine and it's considerable because ad valorem tax dollars, as we know, are based on property values," Jurenovich said.

The value of non-exempt property for the MSD for the taxing year 2016 was more than \$1.7 billion.

"The MSD is strong, the MSD is growing, and all of this channels money, tax dollars down here to the county," he said.

#### Challenges

Traffic continues to be a challenge for residents in the district, Jurenovich said, as well as standing water on Ponte Vedra Boulevard, which can lead to road damage and create potholes. He also noted that deputies have reported stepping out of their vehicles into standing water that, in some instances, has covered their shoes. The worst portion of the flooding, he reported, is a one and a half mile stretch of road between Corona Road and Miranda Road. Jurenovich told the commissioners that in order to maintain or increase property values, this is going to have to be addressed somehow.

Another challenge Jurenovich highlighted is parking at Mickler's Landing. MSD deputies patrol the area and Jurenovich said the MSD has surveyed the parking lot and consistently sees parking overflow on the weekends.

"I think we're going to have to go to paid parking," Jurenovich told the commissioners, adding that more people are parking at Mickler's Landing because of the parking fee Jacksonville Beach is charging. It's an issue, he said, that the MSD would like to further discuss with the county commissioners.

#### Projects

Jurenovich pointed to the recently finished sidewalk project on Ponte Vedra Boulevard as one of the service district's recent accomplishments. The formula used by the MSD every time they do a project is 60 percent of the funding is footed by residents, 20 percent by the MSD and 20 percent by the county, he said. The sidewalk project was long overdue, Jurenovich remarked.

"I see people on this sidewalk daily and with the amount of construction, the amount of new homes that are being built in the MSD, it wasn't done soon enough, getting people off Ponte Vedra Boulevard, because it's becoming quite a busy roadway," he said.

Currently, the MSD is in the process of purchasing new street signs, including new poles, new stop signs, street signs and speed limit signs. "This will give the neighborhood a much nicer look," he said. "Quite frankly, the old signs are 34 years old and when you're on the ocean, they don't last that long."

#### **New trustees**

MSD trustees are elected every two years; a total of seven trustees sit on the board. Three of those seats are up for election this year with a total of six candidates in the running.

The candidates are well qualified, according to Jurenovich. One, he said, is going to run for re-election, one was on the Zoning Adjustments Board one was on the Architectural Review Committee. All of the candidates reside within the MSD.

"There's apathy everywhere, but when people want to become involved in their community, that's a good thing," Jurenovich said. "I think what makes the MSD what it is, is because we're not paid. We live there and we want to see our community grow and be strong, but it's just community involvement."

outside the United States would face a 35 percent tax when they tried to import their products back into America for sale. He also blasted Clinton's husband, President Bill Clinton, for signing the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), which some contend sent jobs overseas, boosting unemployment and creating economic stagnation.

"(Bill Clinton) cleaned you out," Trump said. "He cleaned New England out and he cleaned New York state out. We're going to take care of the miners and steel workers."

#### **National security**

Pointing to the problems European countries such as the United Kingdom, France and Germany have experienced due to the influx of millions of Middle Eastern immigrants, Trump charged his opponent with wanting to create a similar problem here in America.

"Hillary Clinton wants to bring in

people by the tens of thousands," Trump said, shaking his head slowly. "Not gonna happen."

He also criticized Obama for refusing to use the term "radical Islamic extremism."

"If you're afraid to say what the problem is, if you're unwilling to talk about the problem, you're never going to solve the problem," Trump said. "We're going to make our country safe again and make America great again. We are going to have law and order."

Turning to domestic issues, Trump promised to reverse the wave of violence against law enforcement the nation has seen in recent months.

"Never has it been so dangerous to be a police officer," Trump said. "All the different places police have been killed....it's going to stop."

Trump also pledged to repeal Obamacare, eliminate Common Core and appoint Supreme Court justices who will respect the Constitution. So great, in fact, is the likelihood that the next president may appoint three, four or even five new Supreme Court justices, Trump said, that voters who are on the fence should elect him if only to prevent his opponent from shifting the court drastically to the left.

"If you dislike me intensely, if you'd never vote for me in a million years," Trump said, "you have to." When Michael Hannon first became involved as a parent volunteer in local education in the 1970s, Ponte Vedra had one school. Today, he finds himself once again at the helm of the public education foundation he led back then, and he remains committed to ensuring that Ponte Vedra schools are the best in the state. — **By Jennifer Logue** 

# Michael Hannon

#### How did you come to be involved initially with the Ponte Vedra Public Education Foundation?

In the late 1970s I was a single head of household with both a 2nd and 4th grade child enrolled at PVPV Elementary and occasionally I received a request for a meeting with one of my children's teachers. The teachers were very impressive, dedicated individuals, but the facilities left a great deal to be desired. After serving a year as president of the PTO, I felt there was a greater need for support for the quality of public education in our community.

### What was the state of public education when you first moved to Ponte Vedra?

In the late 1970s, we had one school in Ponte Vedra. The facility was very outdated. We were fortunate to have a great group of teachers, but the administration felt things were good enough. They were not.

#### What sort of programs and activities did the foundation support over the years?

The Public Education Foundation defined a focus on cultural enrichment through elevated programming in performing arts, teacher support and facility enhancement. The sponsors provided over \$150,000 the first three years. It was a very exciting experience for the students, teachers and our supporters. We were humbled as we read the students' observations of the performing arts programs provided by the teachers. We received several visits from state Secretary of Education Betty Castor and one visit from the governor. The school district informed us they received \$1.5 million to be used for facility enhancement. That was big.

### What brought you back to serve as president of the foundation once again?

Several years after forming the Public Education Foundation, I was transferred to Atlanta, Georgia, then Aspen, Colorado and eventually Northern Virginia. My passion for enriching public education remained and I was fortunate to be in a position to form The Carbondale, Colorado Public Education Foundation and The Spotsylvania, Virginia Education Foundation. When I retired, we moved back to St Johns County and I contacted Marilyn Hoener, president of the Ponte Vedra Education Foundation, letting her know I would like to help. At my first meeting I was asked to again assume the role as president.

#### Today, the St. Johns County schools are considered the best in the state. How do you see the foundation assisting local schools today?

Nothing remains the same. It remains important to let St. Johns County government know we want to continue to enrich the public education experience in Ponte Vedra. The Ponte Vedra Public Education Foundation continues to hold our original focus of cultural enrichment through elevated programming in performing arts, teacher support and facility enhancement. We would like to expand community financial support as a way of putting our money where our hearts are – for government awareness.



the right to build 79 residential units on the property.

Far from appeasing those in opposition, however, the last-minute changes prompted questions from PZA board members and criticism from attorney Jane West, who represents members of the Save Our Vilano group that opposes the project.

"This is just a procedural mess," West said. "We should not be changing the comprehensive plan based on a piece of paper we all just received 10 minutes ago."

West said the size and scope of the proposed resort is incompatible with the surrounding residential area, and noted that the only other similar commercial enterprise nearby was a small boutique hotel of fewer than 30 rooms. The owner of that property was the lone person to speak in favor of the project during public comment.

West also reiterated residents' concerns about how the resort would impact traffic as well as the negative impact it might have on efforts to revitalize the Vilano Town Center commercial district.

#### **Resident opposition**

Numerous residents spoke in opposition to the project, including several speakers who brought letters from their homeowners' and condo associations opposing the project. One resident, a former longtime traffic engineer and federal highway employee, disputed the projected traffic impacts of the project.

Another resident told board members it's hard enough trying to cross A1A with his four grandchildren, and fears that building the resort would make the traffic situation even worse.

"My biggest concern is a safety concern," David Vermeulen said. "Someone's going to get killed trying to cross A1A."

Pete Molinaro told the board he and his wife just moved to Vilano Beach to begin their retirement after 44 and 37 years of teaching, respectively. The proposed resort, he said, would be right outside his window.

"I worked hard and long to retire," he said. "We specifically moved to Vilano Beach because it was residential. I'm shocked this is even being considered."

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Resident Linda Doherty asked board members to consider the concerns of Vilano Beach residents.

"Developers have one goal in mind and that is to make as much money as possible," she said. "We truly have an idyllic paradise. If not for vigilant zoning, it may slip away and turn into everywhere else."

# St. Augustine Politics in St. Johns event draws 500 Rutherford, DeSantis, Shoar among winners of event's straw poll

Congressional candidates John Rutherford (District 4), Ron DeSantis (District 6) and Sheriff David Shoar were among the winners of a straw poll held last week at the St. Johns County Chamber of Commerce's "Politics in St. Johns" event.

Held Aug. 4 at the Solomon Calhoun Center in St. Augustine, the event attracted an estimated 500 peo-

ple, who had an opportunity to meet with nearly 40 candidates running for office across the county. Nearly 350 votes were cast in the straw poll, which included national as well as local races.

In the race for president, Republican Donald Trump bested Democrat Hillary Clinton 252 to 64, while Sen. Marco Rubio topped the ticket for U.S. Senate with 215 votes in a five-way race. His closest challenger, Carlos Beruff, received 54 votes.

In the race for the 4th Congressional District - the seat currently held by the retiring Rep. Ander Crenshaw - former Jacksonville Sheriff John Rutherford came in first with 121 votes, followed by County Commissioner Bill McClure with 84 votes and the remaining votes

split among their six challengers. In the 6th Congressional District race, incumbent Rep. Ron DeSantis garnered 182 votes in a seven-candidate field.

The St. Augustine "Politics in St. Johns" event followed a previous session held July 27 in Ponte Vedra Beach. The primary election will be held Aug. 30, with early voting beginning Aug. 20.

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# **Recorder exhibits works of First Coast Artists**

The painting depicts pinstripe legends Mickey Mantle, Yogi Berra and Roger Maris – an odd choice of subject for a Massachusetts native and later Maryland resident who rooted for the Yankees' arch rivals, the Red Sox and the Baltimore Orioles.

"I painted it for a good friend of mine who was a big Yankees fan," Nickerson recalls. "I was going to surprise him with it. But he became ill suddenly and passed away before he saw it."

Nickerson's painting is just one of the many works of art produced by members of his group, First Coast Artists, that adorns the Recorder offices. From seascapes and still lifes to a portrait of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the eclectic collection highlights the diverse

talents of the group's members. And like Nickerson's Yankees painting, each one has a story behind it.

#### **Artists and friends**

Nickerson credits local artist and teacher Gene Barber with the formation of First Coast Artists.

"Gene was an excellent teacher," he says, adding that a group of artists had been meeting weekly with Barber for 15 or 20 years. "We were all taking classes with him at the beach or wherever we could gather and we became very close."

Then about eight years ago, Barber was diagnosed with cancer and died. Far from being the end of the group, though, Barber's passing led to the more formal founding of First Coast Artists.

"Before he died, Gene made a point of saying he hoped we would stay together," Nickerson says. "Besides, we had all become such good friends!"


Since then, anywhere from 10 to 200

artists gather each Thursday at a church hall in Neptune Beach to paint and socialize. "The group was designed so we can paint together, share ideas and share the common knowledge of our background."

In addition to welcoming the public to its offices during regular business hours to view the group's works, the Recorder has exhibited the artworks at special events.

"The Recorder has been very, very nice to us," Nickerson said. "When they've had events or held exhibits, the cost has been borne by the newspaper, which is wonderful."

The group also has exhibited its works at community and church events, while individual members have shown their works in juried

exhibits and other art shows.

Nickeron is quick to note, however, that the primary goal of First Coast Artists members is sharing their works, not selling them.

"It was never designed to be a business," he says, "but to show the art of our members. If a member should happen to sell a painting, that's just icing on the cake."




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# **Benghazi memorial tribute Sept. 10** Friends of Ambassador Stevens to speak at tribute to Benghazi victims

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



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# Local doctors create Zika prevention kit, warn of scenarios that attract mosquitos

Local doctors with urgent care provider American Family Care have created a recommended "Zika prevention kit" in light of four people in Florida having recently been diagnosed with the virus.

To assemble your own kit, the doctors recommend keeping the following protective items on hand:

**Bug Spray:** Doctors recommend using an EPA registered insect repellent with DEET, picaridin or oil of eucalyptus.

**Clothing protection:** Consumer Reports found "treating" your clothing is more effective than buying mosquito repellent clothing. Just spray clothing with permethrin that kills mosquitoes on contact with no harmful side effects, treating shirts, pants and socks at least 24 hours before wearing outdoors. Permethrin is a medicine and chemical used as an insect repellent and it is sold at local drug stores.

**Yellow "bug light:"** A yellow outdoor bulb does not repel bugs, but the American Mosquito Control Association says it will not attract them like some other incandescent lights.

**Disinfectant wipes:** Keep a package of wet, disinfectant wipes handy for sweat while hiking, exercising or doing yardwork. The body produces lactic acid during exercise and mosquitoes are attracted to it. Cleaning skin off before reapplying bug

spray will help repel bugs.

According to physicians with American Family Care, these four scenarios can also attract mosquitos:

**Pregnancy:** A study published in the British Medical Journal found women who are pregnant exhale more carbon dioxide, which attracts mosquitoes.

**Perspiration:** The body produces lactic acid anytime it sweats, which attracts mosquitos. Those who spend a lot of time outdoors can reduce lactic acid by washing with soap and thoroughly drying their

skin after exercising.

**Type O blood:** A study in the Journal of Medical Entomology found people with type O blood were 83% more likely to get bitten by a mosquito. People with Type A were at the lowest risk.

Alcohol: Research published by the Journal of the American Mosquito Control Association suggests alcohol may raise the average body temperature a little, and that change in temperature may attract mosquitos.

Back to School with BEAM was the culmination of the organization's summer-long collection of donations at several drop-off locations throughout the community. According to Christina Epstein of BEAM's communications committee, the items are essential for a number of reasons, not the least of which is giving underserved families the help they need to send their kids to school.

"It's a common misconception that there aren't a lot of people in the community that need the service BEAM provides here but that's not the case," she said. "There are lots of people who need help – families who are just trying to make a dollar stretch. And there's nothing wrong with needing help."

Shoppers Shaquanda Robinson and Elnora Martin heralded those efforts as they prepared for the school year, expressing gratefulness for BEAM's commitment to making the back to school process run smoothly.

"It's such a good experience and it's so great that the community pitches in and helps out with this much-needed service," Robinson said.

Martin agreed.

"I've got four children to send back to school so it definitely helps a lot," she said. "This event is heartfelt, it's caring and I look forward to it every year because I can see that they care."

It's a sentiment that rang true Saturday as many community members and long-time BEAM volunteers took to the space offered by the church to help. Volunteers stacked a plethora of backpacks, organized racks of clothing and packaged bags stuffed with binders, paper and other supplies to hand out during the event, and Native Sun Natural Foods Market's Jacksonville Beach store provided nutritional shakes and snacks.

"Community support has been extraordinary, as it always is," said BEAM Executive Director Susan King, citing the help of the community and organizations such as Native Sun, Ponte Vedra Rotary, Oceanside Rotary and the Exchange Club as key players. 
# Fourth installment in 'Greyson Gray' series debuts, targeted at young males

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# Magic show teaches kids to take a 'STAND' against bullying

A sea of children, with their parents in tow, filed into the Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library Aug. 4 to learn how they can take a "stand" against bullying at Magician Mark Alan's magic show and have a little fun while they were at it.

Alan has more than 30 years' experience as a comic magician, and had developed school-tailored shows such as "character counts" and "reading is magic." Four years ago, however, at his wife Lorraine Stinson's insistence, the two developed an anti-bullying show called "Take a STAND Against Bullying." Stinson, who is the media specialist at R.J. Murray Middle School in St. Augustine and a teacher for 20 years prior to that, knew first-hand the importance of just such a show.

"It's gotten so popular with the schools and the libraries," Alan said, adding that he was surprised he hasn't received a lot of requests from middle schools for his bullying show.

Alan said he does about 50 such shows annually, and this year in particular, he's received a lot of requests from summer camps to come out and spread anti-bully awareness to campers.

For the past four years, the program has been a staple at the Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library, funded by the Friends of the Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library.

"We think it's so timely with school starting," said Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library Youth Services Librarian Anne Crawford, who spoke to the crowd of about 40 elementary schoolaged youth and their parents prior to the show's start. Crawford's own daughter Lucy, who will be starting Kindergarten this year, was also in attendance.

"I myself was someone who was bullied as a child, so this particular magic show is very near and dear to my heart," Crawford told attendees. "We want to give you the opportunity to learn ways to stand up for yourself as well as stand up for your friends."

She also gave the children permission to do something that is generally frowned upon at libraries – yell.

"When the time comes to yell 'stop' in the magic show, I want you to yell really loud!" she said.

Crawford then went on to introduce Alan, who confidently strutted out to the theme song from the movie "Rocky" and immediately started to engage the audience. He asked for several youth volunteers from the audience to assist with a few of his magic tricks – which were used as visual teaching tools – as he educated the children about bullying. In essence, he made the quite serious message of bullying light and easily understandable to the target age group. His performance also garnered a lot of giggles - and not just from the kids. Adults were laughing and seemed to be having a good time as well.

#### STAND

There are three types of bullying, Alan told the children: verbal, physical and cyber-bullying. Alan was himself a victim of bullying, an admission he shared with the kids.

The acronym STAND – the main component of the show – stands for "Stop, Tell, Ask, Nobody and Don't." That message was prominently displayed on the stage along with "say no to bullying" and "no bully zone" signs.

Alan told the children to put their hands out and yell "stop!" whenever a bully tries to approach them. The next steps are then to tell an adult and ask for help. Nobody deserves to be bullied, he said, so don't be a bystander.

That message resonated with 8-yearold Izze Munoz, who was one of the children chosen to participate on stage.

"I learned that if another person is being bullied, don't let that person be bullied again," she said.

Munoz attended the show with her grandmother, Joanne Lindsey, and her six-year-old sister.

Lindsey said that both she and the girls' mother wanted them to know about bullying.

"We tell them all the time, don't let anyone bully you; go tell somebody," Lindsey said.

Alan agreed. "Bullying is everywhere," he told the audience, "from elementary school through college."

The core message, he said, is unity. "We have to stand together because

there are way more of us than there are bullies," he said.

As the YMCA of Florida's First Coast, Inc. is part of an "Official National Coalition" with the YMCAs in South Africa the connection made the most sense and it facilitated an opportunity for campers in different parts of the globe to communicate.

Arduous as it was to work through connectivity issues and time differences, the connection finally came when the Cape Flats campers filed

onto the screen, bridging the gap between Ponte Vedra and Cape Town

The importance of the exchange, James said, couldn't be measured.

"I can't put into words how important it is for kids to be able to ... establish this connection with people from different cultures, different countries," he said. "The deeper an understanding you have about people who are different from you, the more you learn about yourself."

Ponte Vedra YMCA Member Experience Director Rick Hyman agreed. "When you have a program like

this you can look forward to being able to see how exposure to another culture and another world can help kids and see how many friends they make," he said. "It's been rewarding to see them learn and make this achievement throughout the summer.'

# Youth of the Beaches Art Guild reunites for ABET fundraiser

Champions of theatre arts in the Beaches community gathered recently for a reunion that was decades in the making.

Alumni and supporters of the Youth of the Beaches Art Guild (Y-BAG) reunited July 28 at a gala reception held at the Beaches Museum and History Park. Y-BAG was a Beaches-based nonprofit organization that offered a summer musical theatre program for youth ages 10-18. The program ran for 25 years, from 1980 to 2005.

"We actually came up with the idea in 1980 and there was really nothing for

the kids at the beach as far as theatre - you had to go to town to do everything," says Judy Hulett, who founded Y-BAG along with Jane Bull.

Hundreds of children had the opportunity to participate in summer theatre at rehearsals and productions that took place in the evening so the kids could enjoy the beach and outdoors during the day.

"We would have anywhere from 50 to 75 in each production and everybody had a role," Bull says. "It didn't cost them anything. Toward the end, we did start charging a \$25 audition fee and that gave them a t-shirt and an ad in the

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program."

Although Y-BAG eventually disbanded, it certainly wasn't the end of Beaches-based theatre arts. The Atlantic Beach Experimental Theatre will this year mount its 25th season. In honor of the milestone silver anniversary, ABET board members came up with the idea for an outreach program to reunite Y-BAG alumni – now grown adults scattered across the country - for a fundraiser and celebration.

The gala was followed by a Y-BAG Alumni Cabaret Show featuring the alumni themselves presented July 29 and 30 at The Foundation Academy. It was something that, as Bull pointed out, was a reversal of roles of sorts. where children of Y-BAG alumni got to see their parents performing in a show rather than the traditional role of parents watching their child's production.

#### ABET's 25th Season

Now president of ABET's board of directors, Hulett said she is eager for the upcoming season, which reflects the theatre's mission to bring the



excitement of live theatre to diverse audiences.

"We have an awesome 25th season," Hulett says. The 25th season of ABET kicks off Sept. 9 with "Merrily We Roll Along," followed by "Macbeth," "A Christmas Carol," "Celebration," "4,000 Miles," and "The Hallelujah Girls." Performances take place at the Adele Grage Cultural Center in Atlantic Beach.



# **REVIEW** Alhambra's 'Smokey Joe's Café' serves up one hit after another

If the names Leiber and Stoller don't ring a bell, chances are their songs will.

From "Hound Dog" and "Jailhouse Rock" to "Yakety Yak," "Stand by Me" and "Love Potion Number 9," lyricist Jerry Leiber and composer Mike Stoller were the creative team behind some of the most memorable songs of the 1950s and 1960s. Their rock and roll hits – infused with a heapin' helpin' of rhythm and blues – helped jumpstart the careers of everyone from Elvis Presley and The Coasters to Ben E. King, The Drifters and more.

In 1995, "Smokey Joe's Café" brought nearly 40 of the songwriting duo's hits to Broadway in a fast-paced musical revue that became the longest running revue in Broadway history. And the Alhambra Theatre & Dining's production, which opened last week, lives up to that record, offering a high-energy, fast-paced trip down memory lane in a show where every number is a hit.

The Alhambra's cast of five men and four women ably sings and dances its way through the Leiber and Stoller catalog, capturing both the innocence and optimism of the 1950s. Clad in



retro-style bowling shirts for the men and vintage pinup-style dresses for the women, the cast seems right at home singing such popular tunes as "Dance with Me," "On Broadway," "Young Blood" and "Kansas City." The men's voices blend together particularly well on such songs as "Searchin," "Yakety Yak" and "Charlie Brown," with Peter Jackson providing the basso profondo required for maximum effect. The show's doo wop-style choreography is punctuated with ample amounts of humor, as the cast brings the stories behind such songs as "Love Potion Number 9" and "Searchin" to life. The Alhambra production also features a good amount of cast-audience interaction, with guests being called upon to join in the fun. One such scene had the audience in stitches as a hapless male audience member found himself in the clutches of a song siren played to perfection by Dayna Richardson.

While the show's first act is more of

a straight revue – with the cast members singing and dancing to recorded music – Act II adopts a more theatrical feel, as the stage is transformed into Smokey Joe's Café, complete with a live band on stage and café tables where cast members act out the vignettes of the show's tunes. # **Murphy wins Olympic gold** Bolles graduate wins 100-meter backstroke, sets Olympic record

Bolles graduate Ryan Murphy won the Olympic Gold Medal in the 100-meter backstroke Monday, winning in an Olympic record-setting 51.97.

Murphy came from behind to win the medal, garnering the gold and ascending to the podium, where he was joined by silver medalist Xu Jiayu of China and USA teammate David Plummer, who captured the bronze. The 21-year-old University of California-Berkeley student was scheduled to compete in the 200 back and on Team USA's 4x100 medley relay squad later this week.

Murphy's win followed the Gold Medalwinning performance of Caeleb Dressel, who along with Murphy was a member of the Bolles Sharks club. Dressel captured the gold in the 4x100 free relay.

Murphy graduated from the Bolles School in 2013 after participating in his first Olympic Trials during 2012. A six-time NCAA champion, Murphy is also a 15-time Florida High School Class 1A State Champion who set the national high school record in the 100 back in November 2012. In 2013, he was named National High School Swimmer of the Year.

Last summer, the ceremony was staged the week of the 144th Open Championship in historic St. Andrews, Scotland, where Dame Laura Davies, David Graham, Mark O'Meara and the late A.W. Tillinghast were enshrined.

Located in World Golf Village in St. Augustine, the World Golf Hall of Fame & Museum features interactive storytelling and exhibitions featuring artifacts, works of art, audio, video and photography significant to the history of golf and its members.

# **Ponte Vedra's Furyk makes PGA Tour history by carding 58** Pro golfer named 2016 recipient of Payne Stewart Award

Ponte Vedra Beach's own Jim Furyk made PGA Tour history Sunday, becoming the first golfer in tour history to card a 58.

Furyk's record-setting achievement happened Aug. 7 during the final round of the Travelers Championship at TPC River Highlands in Cromwell, CT. After scoring a tournament recordsetting 27 on the front nine, all eyes were on Furyk as he completed the round, garnering 10 birdies, an eagle and no bogeys on his way into the record books.

Prior to Sunday, Furyk, 46, had been one of just six golfers to ever score 59, joining that exclusive group in 2013 during the second round of the BMW Championship.

#### **Payne Stewart Award**

Just two days after making PGA Tour history, the tour announced that Furyk had been selected as the recipient of the 2016 Payne Stewart Award. Created in 2000 – a year after the legendary Stewart died tragically during the week of the Tour Championship – the Payne Stewart Award is presented annually to a professional golfer who exemplifies Stewart's character, charity and sportsmanship.

Furyk was selected for the honor by a committee comprised primarily of past award recipients.

"I am incredibly honored to receive the Payne Stewart Award," Furyk said. "I was fortunate enough to know Payne as a colleague and friend, and I always admired the character and spirit he brought to the game of golf."

The award will be presented Sept. 20 in conjunction with the PGA Tour Championship in Atlanta. In addition to a sculpture by Bob Pack, the award includes an annual \$500,000 grant, with \$100,000 of that amount going to the Stewart Family Foundation and \$100,000 to The First Tee of the Ozarks (\$100,000). The remaining \$300,000 goes to a charity designated by that year's recipient.

Furyk has chosen to have the grant go to the Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation, the charity which he and his wife founded to aid children and families in need. Organizations that will benefit through the grant include Blessings in a Backpack, Community PedsCare, MaliVai Washington Youth Foundation,

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# Overcome cellphone, social media obsession, and win back the intimacy in your relationship

Couples often want opposing things. They want a close passionate relationship with their spouse or intimate partner – and they want the instant stimulation and feelings of

get from social media. And all too frequently, those two desires are in opposition to one another.

That is, in order to get the rush social media, texting, emails, phone calls or live streaming offers, people often spend too much time on their devices and thus trade-off the closeness and intimacy of their relationship. That, in a nutshell, is the dilemma facing an increasing number of couples. She wants to be with him, but he is focused on his Facebook connections. He wants to go to bed to be with her, but she wants the instant gratification she gets from her social media connections. She wants to talk, but he is streaming Netflix or Amazon Prime. He invites her for a hike, but she feels the need to frequently stop so she can check emails and the news cycle.

One of them increasingly feels they are playing second fiddle to their partners' device or social network. Add in the demands of work, family, children and everything else, and your partner may feel she or he simply isn't a terribly high priority to you. And frequently your devices distract your attention from each other, so that while you are together, you are elsewhere at the same time. This leads to scattered conversation with poor eye contact and a sense of disconnection, so an increasing number of couples are dissatisfied with the intimacy in their relationship.

Here's what you can do in order to take back that intimacy. First, have a clear and straightforward conversation with your partner about any cyber-related rules you would like enforced. Perhaps you would you like an agreement about when to shut off your devices, or a "no restaurant, no dinner table and no bedroom" rule. This would be the time to make such agreements with each other.

Second, increase the amount of quality one-on-one talks the two of you have with each other – with all devices off. A relationship needs time, attention and focus in order to deepen and feel close. Third, go out and do things with each other. A walk in the park, a weekend getaway, a game of cards. All of those give the two of you comfortable ways to reconnect. Fourth, challenge yourself to find new things you would like the two of you to do together that would be interesting or fun.

Finally, be willing to give your partner the passwords to all your devices. You'll hopefully reassure him or her that your social networks are not intended to replace the relationship, and that you're not hiding any social connection that could threaten the relationship.
