


### St. Johns County Pet Center

### **Detectives investigating Ponte Vedra Beach home** invasion and robbery

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit is investigating an alleged home invasion and robbery that occurred in Ponte Vedra Beach Monday night.

Shortly before midnight Jan. 9, deputies responded to call from the 100 block of Great Harbor Way, where a couple reported answering a knock on their door, and being confronted by two black males armed with handguns. The suspects, described as wearing camouflage clothing, forcibly entered the residence and ordered the couple to stay in a certain part of the home while the suspects gathered property.

Sometime later, the victims told detectives, a third black male suspect arrived holding another person at gunpoint. That person was later identified as Marcus Anthony Hatch, 16, of Jacksonville. The couples' roommate then arrived home and was also held at gunpoint.

As the suspects prepared to leave, they allegedly bound the three residents and left in the couple's car – a 2009 Subaru

Authorities issued an Amber Alert for Hatch and the Subaru Legacy Tuesday morning. Later that day, the sheriff's office reported that Hatch had been located in good health in Jacksonville and that investigators were working with him to gather more information on the alleged home invasion and robbery.

The sheriff's office has also released a photo of a person of interest believed to be driving a white Jeep Cherokee. The individual, seen on video surveillance footage, used one of the victims' credit cards at two separate gas stations in Ponte Vedra after the incident.

### MSD elects new officers, delegates committee assignments

The Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District board elected new officers and delegated areas of responsibility at its meeting Jan. 9 at the Ponte Vedra Beach Library.

"This is always a big deal," said Gary Jurenovich, who has served as chairman the past two years.

To start the appointment process, Jurenovich nominated John Wegl to replace him as chairman, and all trustees concurred. Wegl, who most recently served as vice chairman, will lead the board for the second time in his MSD tenure. His goal for the position over the next two years is straightforward.

"Keep the MSD as a premier community," he said.

The board appointed Jurenovich as vice chairman and Murle Harrison again as

The board then agreed upon areas of responsibility, which Jurenovich said trustees hold for the duration of their time in office. Jurenovich will again manage the MSD's relationship with the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office and oversee roads and bridges and street signs and poles. Trustee Greg Wong will continue to lead communications, including the MSD website and a new newsletter, and will now lead emergency services, which is a new committee assignment for the board.

New trustees Kitty Switkes, Brad Wester and John Cellucci all accepted committee assignments. Switkes will oversee landscaping and beach renourishment projects, while Wester will be responsible for the MSD's beach accesses and relationship with Jacksonville Electric Authority (JEA). Cellucci will manage the MSD's relationships with Beaches Energy and Republic Services. The three new trustees were elected to the board in

August and sworn into office at the Dec. 12 MSD meeting.

### **Rumble stripe removal**

In other MSD business, Wegl reported that the Florida Department of Transportation will soon contract with a company to remove the rumble stripes that stretch from Mickler's Landing Beach to Vilano on State Road A1A. Once the contract is awarded, said Wegl, the contractor will have 30 to 60 days to gather materials and then 20 additional days to complete the project. The project is estimated to conclude in February or early March. Since FDOT installed the rumble stripes during summer 2016, several residents have complained about the noise they cause, as well as they safety concern they present for cyclists.

The MSD board also voted to extend its contract with Republic Services until 2024. Under the terms of the new contract, the MSD will pay the waste disposal

company \$11 per house per month for its services instead of its previous rate of \$8.61. Last year, the rate increased to \$8.61 from \$7. Wegl said the MSD has no choice but to sign the contract because St. Johns County has a franchise agreement with Republic Services.

"We either go with Republic or do without," Wegl said.

Jurenovich said the increase in cost is due to an increase in drivers' salaries at Republic Services. It's a small increase per week that is worth it for the services, he said.

Residents who live in the MSD receive side door pickup and second day pickup services.

"Next to the sheriff, I think that's the most important reason people choose to live in the MSD," he said. "I don't want to lose the services over 55 cents a week."

Wester provided an update on the MSD's beach accesses. He said the county plans to repair all beach accesses dam-

aged by Hurricane Matthew by April 1 with help from FEMA. New beach access signs, said Wester, will be installed over the next few weeks.

Wester also said three proposals have been submitted to the county to install pavers at the beach accesses located at 311 Ponte Vedra Blvd., 351 Ponte Vedra Blvd. and 401 Ponte Vedra Blvd. Wester said these projects, which each cost between \$8,000 and \$10,000, are privately funded by residents. The county doesn't want to move forward with these projects, said Wester, without the blessing of the MSD.

Switkes concluded the meeting with an update on the dune restoration project at Mickler's Landing Beach. As of Jan. 5, she said, only a few residents had committed to a contract with AJ Johns, the construction firm hired by the county to manage the voluntary dune restoration project.

"The reason why the residents are balking is because the price of sand has come in at close to \$1,200 a truck," said Switkes. "There are a lot of unhappy residents down there."

Switkes also attributed the disdain to the complexities related to the permissive use agreement with the county and the contingency fee that was added to the cost of the project.

Switkes also noted that the Florida Department of Environmental Protection has yet to approve the project's desired sand source, which is causing additional frustration and increasing the cost of the current truckloads of sand.

Consequently, Switkes said, some residents are still attempting to bring in sand, but they're not using A.J. Johns or the staging area at Mickler's because they're frustrated with the way in which that project was organized.

The next MSD meeting will be Feb. 13 at the Ponte Vedra Beach Library.

### Stevenson to file hurricane tax relief legislation

State Rep. Cyndi Stevenson plans to file legislation this week that will provide tax relief for individuals whose homes were made uninhabitable in 2016 due to a hurricane.

According to Stevenson's office, the proposed bill would allow individuals with a homestead exemption whose homes sustained major damage to apply for a partial property tax reimbursement of up to \$1,500. For those individuals who have purchased

a mobile home as a replacement to a prior home, the legislation permits the homeowner to apply for a partial sales tax reimbursement of up to \$1,500.

In order to qualify for the reimbursement, the impacted home must have been uninhabitable for more than 60 days within the 2016 calendar year. The bill also creates an appeals process to review applications to ensure the claims of eligible individuals are properly evaluated and reimbursements are accurately calculated, and includes crimi-

nal penalties for those who submit false or misleading applications.

In an interview with the Ponte Vedra Recorder, Stevenson said she has been working on the proposed legislation since October, when St. Johns County Tax Collector Dennis Hollingsworth notified her that county homeowners – including those who had just sustained major damage from Hurricane Matthew – would soon be receiving their property tax bills in the mail, and there was nothing that could be done under current statue to assist impacted homeowners.

"One week after Hurricane Matthew raked the First Coast, many whose homes were destroyed received their property tax bill," Stevenson said. "This legislation provides relief from the sting of those taxes, returning to them some of their resources to help them in their recovery."

Stevenson noted that her legislation is informed by the data collected regarding property damage within the county following hurricanes Hermine and Matthew.

"We went out to assess the damage, we have good numbers on that," she said, adding that her proposed bill offers a workable approach to aiding impacted country residents.

And while cautioning that the bill must first win approval from both the legislature and the governor during what is expected to be a tight budget year, Stevenson said she is ready to wage the legislative battle required to win its passage.

"It's fair, it's just and the people who had a lot of damage could use the relief."

# SJSO: vehicle burglaries most frequently reported crime in Ponte Vedra

Sheriff's office increases patrols, offers tips to avoid them

Vehicle burglaries were the most frequently reported crime in Ponte Vedra last year, the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office said, with 133 reported auto burglaries in 2016.

"That's the biggest thing we deal with," said Commander Brian Harrington, who leads SJSO's northeast district ranging from Ponte Vedra to St. Augustine. "I refer to it as a 'transient crime' because it's people that come in a lot of the times."

Recent residential development in Ponte Vedra has increased traffic coming in and out of the area, Harrington said, and encouraged less desirable visitors to commit vehicle burglaries, compared to past years when locals were mostly responsible.

"Because the coming and going is becoming so busy with the new roads and new communities, you're seeing a lot of different people coming in," said Harrington. "That's why I use the term 'transient crime,' because they're people that commute through or commute in that do it. They don't stay in their home area and do these things."

Most of the time, Harrington said, the culprits are capitalizing on unlocked cars in subdivisions.

"Probably 80 to 90 percent of the time, the trend now is for them to find an unlocked car," he said. "Very rarely do we have windows smashed in."

When that does occur, he added, it's likely because the suspect is seizing upon a "target of opportunity," such as a purse or wallet sitting in plain view in the car. Of the 13 stolen vehicles reported in Ponte Vedra in 2016, every one that was recovered was taken with the keys in the car. Many of those recovered were found in other locations, including Jacksonville's Northside, Atlantic Beach and even south into parts of Flagler County.

Ponte Vedra resident Donna Ritch can attest to these trends: Someone broke into her unlocked car on Christmas Eve morning and stole a number of holiday gifts. Her advice for others in Ponte Vedra is simple.

"Always make sure your car is locked before you go to bed," said Ritch, who was surprised the crime happened in the first place due to the general safety of Ponte Vedra

Nearly the same situation happened to Ponte Vedra resident Dennis Berkholtz during the holidays. He woke up one morning to find his car ransacked and his items strewn along the front seats. He said this incident can happen anywhere, and he's just thankful it wasn't any worse.

"I think it's naïve of myself not to lock the car door," said Berkholtz. "I just suggest people take the proper precautions of locking up their houses and cars."

In addition, Harrington advises residents to report every incident to the authorities, even if a similar incident occurred within that respective neighborhood and was already reported.

"It is crucial that people let us know

what's going on in their area so we can combat it," he said.

### **Increased patrols**

In response to recently reported car burglaries, Harrington organized a task force that increased the number of nighttime patrols from Dec. 27 to Jan. 4, focused on targeting potential culprits of these crimes. The effort helped in identifying a few suspects, he said.

SJSO also recommends that residents be aware of their surroundings. Harrington said the use of home video surveillance is already helping people be more vigilant.

"A lot of people are getting video cameras and putting them in their house and videoing the front of their house or cars," he said. "That's giving us a lot of good information."

In addition to video surveillance footage, the sheriff's office is receiving

helpful information from the public via social media. Harrington said this overall exchange of information is proof of the healthy relationship that exists between the sheriff's office and public, and aids in tracking down the suspects responsible for these car burglaries.

"We get so much help now from the public," he said. "People are more open to giving us information. People call us more when they see people walking in the neighborhoods, and that helps. I like to think locally we have a very good relationship with the community."


### Temple Bet Yam to hold annual Deli Nite fundraiser Feb. 16

### The top 5 daily habits for lifelong health

The habits you perform each day have a cumulative effect on your immediate and long-term health. The choices you make – the type of food you eat, how often you participate in exercise, etc. – play a significant role in determining your health status and quality of life, especially in your later years.

Developing constructive health habits as early as possible may help you avoid chronic disease, maximize your longevity and enable you to live independently well into old age. Discussed below are five key habits you can cultivate each day to realize excellent lifelong health. To be sure, this is just an abbreviated list of beneficial health habits designed to be a starting point that you can build upon over time.




### Eat a whole foods diet

The food you put into your body – or don't put into your body – is one of the most important daily health decisions you make. It is true that there are an overwhelming number of dietary ideologies but if you are not sure what to do or what dietary strategies are most appropriate for you and your health goals, talk with your

health care provider.

In the meantime, consider eating whole foods – food that is not packaged, processed, polished or refined – as often as possible. Whole foods contain fiber, antioxidants and many other phytochemicals that can improve your health. Studies have shown that a diet abundant in whole and unrefined foods may help protect you from chronic disease, improve your cholesterol profile and enable optimal colon function. Examples of nutrient-dense whole foods include dark green-, yellowand orange-fleshed fruits and vegetables, nuts, seeds, legumes and whole grains.



### Move your body & joints

Some amount of physical activity every day is extremely important in keeping you healthy and pain-free. It is important to understand that you do not have to run a marathon to get the many health benefits exercise offers; any exercise that gets your heart pumping and your muscles working can yield important health gains, including improved cardiovascular fitness, improved weight control and enhanced mood and energy levels.

Introducing variety into your daily exercise routine is also important for strength-

ening your heart, toning your muscles and preserving your joints' range of motion. Consider mixing in some strength training, endurance training and movement-based activities to experience the full array of health benefits possible through physical activity. If you are not sure how or where to start, consult an expert who can counsel you on the finer details of an exercise plan that will be both sustainable and enjoyable for you.



### Drink a sufficient amount of good water

Drinking plenty of good water is an important health action you can take every day to achieve and maintain optimal health. Every system in your body relies on water. Water helps flush toxins from your organs, transports nutrients to your cells, and keeps sensitive environments (ear, nose, throat) moist. Without sufficient water, you may become dehydrated, causing fatigue and making your body struggle to perform normal functions. So, just how much water should you drink each day? The answer depends on climatic conditions, activity level and gender, but

hard numbers for total daily water intake do exist for average, healthy adults living in temperate climates. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 3 liters (about 13 cups) of water for men and 2.2 liters (about 9 cups) of water for women is an adequate daily intake to prevent the harmful effects of dehydration.



#### Remember to breathe!

It is important to take time out of your day – even just a few minutes each day – to focus on your breathing. Breathing awareness (also known as full conscious breathing) is a potent stress neutralizer and an effective restorative health technique. Studies have shown that relaxed breathing is a basic technique to control or manage stress. Slow diaphragmatic breathing, breath meditation, nasal breathing and yogic abdominal breathing are all unique breathing techniques that can help keep your stress levels in check.

### **Build your community**

Building and maintaining healthy, positive relationships with family and friends is an important habit you can work on almost every day. Strong and consistent social bonds may help you live longer by encouraging good health behaviors, improving your cognition and providing you with a sense of place or belonging in the world, a fundamental human need.







### A new definition of optimal health for the new year

Renewal. The beginning of the year marks a shift and a time for change. A time to focus on establishing new behaviors that will help meet goals in the year ahead. When it comes to our health, the new year is a great time for renewal and reflection.

What is health? If you are free from a medical illness or have no new injuries, then you are "healthy," correct? Perhaps, if all of your medical screening tests and annual physical are normal, then you can be assured you are healthy. Or maybe, if you also eat right and are fit and trim, then you can say you are truly healthy. Are these definitions accurate or does it limit our true potential?

For most integrative medicine physicians, these definitions fall short. Defining health based solely on the absence disease falls short of optimal wellness. For an integrative medicine physician, it is the definition of health that includes physical, mental, emotional and spiritual factors which make an individual whole and lead to optimal health. It is this approach that is at the core of what an integrative medicine physician does. To paraphrase the National Institutes of Health, the definition of integrative medicine is a physician who incorporates complementary and alternative approaches into mainstream health care. With a focus on all aspects of care from prevention to treatment and recovery, the integrative medicine physician offers a unique view of health across a full spectrum of care.

Just as a financial planner can provide a broad-ranging perspective on your financial portfolio, seeking the perspective from an integrative medicine provider can provide this same perspective on optimal health. When it comes to complementary approaches, most fall into two sub groups: either natural dietary approaches or mind-body practices. All of them can help to nurture your health, provide an alternative option to prescription medication, or play a supportive role to the medications that are necessary for you to maintain your health.

Natural dietary approaches include special dietary patterns and the use of herbs and supplements. A wide variety of diets are available, and each diet has its own advantages. Dr. Andrew Weil advocates eating an "anti-inflammatory" diet for optimal health, but maintains there are times when other diets can be beneficial. Eliminating certain foods from your diet, in particular dairy or gluten, can be beneficial for certain diseases such as eczema or irritable bowel.

There also may be some benefit from fasting. Supplements and botanical medications can provide support to your health as well. There is a growing body of medical evidence showing that certain herbs can help a variety of conditions.

Supplements, however, are not regulated by the FDA. Therefore, they are not always required to adhere to exactly what is printed on the label. Often dosages of ingredients are not clearly printed either, making finding the correct dosage difficult. Furthermore, individual supplements can be sourced from places where contamination can occur Guidance from a qualified practitioner can provide a lot of direction.

Mind-body practices are a very powerful way to engage your body's own healing capabilities without taking prescription medications or herbs. Beyond massage, chiropractic and osteopathic manipulation – with which most of us are familiar – there is acupuncture, healing touch therapy, yoga, and tai chi to name a few. All of these have emerging medical evidence showing a direct impact in improving various medical problems.

In addition to these practices, meditation, mindfulness and progressive relaxation practices have been shown to help enrich personal states of wellness and satisfaction. Connection to spirit has also been shown to be important in health; in fact, there is evidence that spiritual practice can have a direct positive impact on health and longevity.

For the new year, consider asking yourself, is there a new way I can nurture my health beyond waiting for the next medical problem to emerge? Take a long and broad view of your well-being. Is it possible that one of these complementary modalities might be beneficial to engage in as a regular part of your own wellness routine? Maybe making a change in your

diet might be best. Perhaps focusing on a new practice such as yoga, meditation, or personal prayer might be the best way to cultivate your health. Whatever catches

Make sure to do your homework and learn as much as you can, look for good credentials in those from whom you seek care and perhaps even consider visiting an integrative medicine physician to chat about what seems to be the best fit for you. Knowing that many chronic diseases take 10 to 20 years to fully develop, ask yourself, is there something I can do today that can greatly improve my health for years to come? One small change in 2017 is all it takes.







### Alhambra kicks off 50th anniversary season with Neil Simon's 'Come Blow Your Horn'

The Alhambra Theatre & Dining kicked off its 50th anniversary season last week by presenting the first show ever to grace its storied stage.

"Come Blow Your Horn" debuted Jan. 4 at the Alhambra, and just as it did back in 1967, the Neil Simon comedy had local audiences laughing and applauding the madcap tale of two brothers trying to live the swinging bachelor life while fending off marriage-minded girlfriends and overprotective parents.

"Fifty years ago, this old gal opened," Managing Partner Craig Smith told the audience on opening night, "and we thought, 'what a great way to kick off our 50th season than to do the first show to appear here."

With this new production, Smith noted, "Come Blow Your Horn" achieves another first, marking the first time that former Alhambra owner and longtime director Tod Booth, wife Lisa Valdini and daughter Jessica Booth have all performed on stage

"They are the royal family of the Jacksonville theater," Smith quipped.

#### Turning back the clock

"Come Blow Your Horn's" 1960s setting seems particularly appropriate for the Alhambra's 50th anniversary kickoff, harkening back as it does to the decade when the dinner theatre began. Set designers Dave Dionne and Ian Black deserve special mention for creating a set that instantly evokes the "Mad Men" era of 1960s Manhattan, when Neil Simon's first Broadway play debuted. That's right: Long before Simon shared his "Brighton Beach Memoirs" of his New York childhood, his wartime experiences in "Biloxi Blues" or subsequent autobiographical outings, he focused his comedic lens on his early days as a naïve aspiring writer desperately seeking to escape from his parents' control and emulate the playboy

lifestyle of his older brother.

In "Come Blow Your Horn." Simon's alter ego, Buddy Baker, flees his childhood home the day after his 21st birthday and appears on the doorstep of brother Alan's Manhattan bachelor pad.

While at first concerned that virginal, straitlaced Buddy will cramp his swinging style, Alan ultimately embraces the chance to usher his younger brother into manhood by fixing him up with Peggy, one of his many casual - and accommodating girlfriends.

The brothers' plans are complicated, however, by repeated visits from their parents – who want both boys to settle down and work for the family's wax fruit manufacturing business – and Connie, an aspiring singer no longer content to be one of Alan's occasional flings.

In true Simon style, hilarity ensues as Alan's apartment becomes busier than Grand Central Station and the brothers try to keep Connie, Peggy and their parents from colliding during one hectic night.

As the charming yet irresponsible Alan, Adam Kaster is suave yet sympathetic, winning over the audience as he begins to ponder whether there might be more to life than merely bedding a different girl every night. He shares good chemistry with Vincent Hannam (Buddy), whose near-constant state of panic complements Alan's debonair demeanor. As love interests Peggy and Connie, meanwhile, Abby Jaros and Jessica Booth are two sides of the same coin. As Peggy, Jaros provides comic relief as the good-natured goodtime girl, while Booth's Connie conveys the heartache of one who yearns to be more than just the girl du jour.

Yet it's the roles of Alan and Buddy's parents that unquestionably steal the show in "Come Blow Your Horn." As Mr. and Mrs. Baker, real-life husband and wife Tod Booth and Lisa Valdini had

the audience in stitches each time they appeared on stage. As Mrs. Baker, Valdini wields guilt like a baseball bat, wearing her wayward sons down with her maternal martyrdom. Booth is equally appealing, deftly executing his comic turn as the gruff, overbearing father who is both angered and hurt by his sons' rejection of all he holds dear.

"Come Blow Your Horn's" humorous take on the age-old quest to stop being a child and embrace the responsibilities of adulthood is still timely today, proving that institutions like marriage, a job – and a dinner theatre – remain as relevant today as they were in the 1960s.

"Come Blow Your Horn" runs through Jan. 22 at the Alhambra Theatre & Dining. For tickets or more information, visit www.alhambrajax.com.



### First Coast Opera presents 'Madama Butterfly'

### Local company aims to make opera accessible to all ages

### By Jennifer Logue

Curtis Tucker has heard all the misconceptions people have about opera.

"There are all those old opera myths," said Tucker, the artistic director for First Coast Opera. "There's 'Oh, there's gonna be a fat lady' or 'I can't understand what's going on' or 'I don't know what to wear."

Tucker and his ensemble did their best to dispel those myths last weekend, when First Coast Opera presented a fullystaged production of Puccini's "Madama Butterfly." Presented Jan. 6 and Jan. 8 at Flagler College's Lewis Auditorium in St. Augustine, the production featured a professional cast of 20 performers accompanied by a live orchestra.

As English subtitles were projected above the stage, the performers brought to life the classic tale of a young Japanese geisha who welcomes the chance to wed a brash American naval officer stationed in Nagasaki. The American, however, fails to recognize the legal or cultural significance of their traditional Japanese union and returns home to take a "real" American bride, resulting in tragedy.

Focusing as it does on themes of

cultural misunderstandings and the ways in which Americans are perceived by citizens of other nations, "Madama Butterfly" seems as timely today as when it debuted in 1904. It is that type of universal experience, Tucker said, at which opera excels in communicating.

"Opera is all about emotion," he said. "It combines all art forms, with the music really heightening the emotions. If we do our jobs on stage, the audience has really felt something."

Now in its 17th season, First Coast Opera recently was awarded a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to support its next production: a double bill featuring two courtroom comedies. On March 16 and 18, First Coast Opera will present Gilbert and Sullivan's "Trial by Jury" alongside "The Trial of B.B. Wolf." Composed by Tucker and written by Nelson Sheeley, the family-friendly opera puts the Big Bad Wolf on trial for his notorious exploits

It's a reflection, Tucker said, of First Coast Opera's goal of making opera accessible to all ages and all audiences.

"We're trying to grow the company," he said, "and bring opera back to what it originally was – an art form for the people."







# Minimally invasive heart valve replacement procedure has patient home in a day

Vernon Camp misses playing the drums. The Mandarin resident has been playing professionally since the early 1960s: In addition to playing with the U.S. Army Band in Germany, he was part of a big band and many quartets and jazz groups while holding down a day job for 39 years as a clinical and research technologist for the Emory University School of Medicine's Department of Radiology and Imaging Sciences.

But heart valve problems have slowed him down in recent years, and at 78, he wondered whether he'd have to put down his drumsticks for good.

After experiencing shortness of breath in 2014, Camp was diagnosed with aortic stenosis, a condition that occurs when the aortic valve narrows and doesn't open properly, restricting blood flow and forcing the heart to work harder to pump blood throughout the body. He has also had an irregular heartbeat, known as atrial fibrillation, for 10 years.

Camp had two options: open heart surgery to replace the damaged valve, or

a minimally invasive procedure known as Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement, or TAVR. Given his age and other chronic conditions, the heart valve team decided Camp would be better served with TAVR. The procedure is designed for people with severe aortic stenosis who are considered to be high- and intermediate-risk candidates for open heart surgery.

Performed through the femoral artery in the groin, TAVR allows physicians to replace the aortic valve without opening the chest and without using a heart-lung machine

Drawing on his years as a clinical technologist, Camp researched where he wanted to have the surgery and turned to Baptist Heart Specialists. He saw cardiologist Dr. Edward Bisher, who referred him to Dr. Ruby Satpathy, an interventional cardiologist and medical director of Baptist's Structural Heart Program. Satpathy and her multidisciplinary team of interventional cardiologists and cardiothoracic surgeons specialize in minimally invasive techniques.

Camp said he was comforted by having his TAVR procedure performed by Satpathy, "one of the pioneers in the field." He was one of the several patients in November at Baptist Medical Center Jacksonville to have TAVR performed without general anesthesia. Satpathy uses conscious sedation similar to what is used for colonoscopies, endoscopies and heart catheterization procedures.

Satpathy said conscious sedation allows patients to recover more quickly as opposed to general anesthesia, where patients are intubated and on a breathing machine.

"Patients are very comfortable – it's just like going to sleep and waking up," she said. "Patients don't have the side effects of anesthesia and are not sleepy afterwards and they are walking four to five hours after surgery."

Satpathy and her team also use what she calls a "magic stitch," an instrument that makes no incision or requires no stitches in the groin. According to Satpathy, Baptist Jacksonville is the only hospital in Jacksonville doing TAVR with conscious sedation and no groin incision. Most important, the procedure reduces a patient's hospital stay to one or two days.

"This is a major step forward in the care for TAVR patients," said Dr. Robert Still, a cardiothoracic surgeon at Baptist Jacksonville. "By using conscious sedation and the new procedure to close the arterial puncture sites, patients are able to recover, walk and be discharged sooner and with fewer complications."

Camp is glad to be back on the mend. He takes his teenage granddaughters shopping for clothes and even can be found babysitting their hamster.

"I told Dr. Satpathy after surgery that she was my guardian angel," he said.

And he's looking forward to getting back to his drums.

"Music is important to me and one of the main reasons in improving my health," Camp said. "I'd like to be strong enough to resurrect my music. That was God's gift to me to play music."



### ...with the bluntness of a Brooklyn cabby

Being verbally blunt can be a good thing or a bad thing, and saying what we believe can get us liked or disliked. Some folks, who are often blunt by speaking their mind, are unfortunately perceived, at times, as being rude and

or disrespectful. On the other hand, many people consider candid-speaking folks like Warren Buffett as forthright and truthful. It is my desire that you distinguish my straight talk as not being impolite or condescending, but instead honest and caring.

Before I initiate my tirade, I want to be clear: Any time I address investors or financial advisors, I am speaking first to myself. There is no arrogance or judgment here, just a call for something better. Are you ready to put on the gloves and head into the octagon for some in-your- face constructive criticism? Okay, let's get it on!

Please listen up, as the following narrative could save us thousands of dollars and a boatload of embarrassment. If we are one of those crybabies who enjoys pointing our finger and blaming the economy, corporate America, or any of the other usual suspects for our financial woes, we need to stop right now and point the finger right at ourselves. Perhaps Mark Twain said it best: "There are a thousand excuses for failure, but never a good reason." This ain't grandma's house, and I am not going to bake you cookies and pamper you. The fact of the matter is that we cause most of our financial problems!

What we do not know does not hurt us. Instead, our wounds arise by what we know and do not do. I can hear some of you saying, "Careful now, Preacher, don't get carried away with your finger-wagging money judge." With all respect, perhaps I am a finger-wagging money critic, but when one repeatedly witnesses irrational investor behavior for as long as I have, I cannot help but voice my concern, frustration and possible solutions to avoid making future foolish investment choices.

I have become incredibly, indescribably and excruciatingly nauseated watching investors make a poor decision solely based on what they hear from the pounding pundits of pessimism or "head-for-the-hills" doomsayers masquerading as sophisticated investment analysts. I get physically ill observing irrational investor behavior. Of course, only with time does one recognize their absurdity because of the foolish decision, because at the time, one's assessment appeared to make tremendous sense

The primary reason why most adults have financial problems is not one's low relative salary. Instead, the critical cause is a lack of self-discipline and inability to delay gratification. It comes down to the pain of discipline or the pain of regret. We all have the choice. Obviously, there are exceptions to most things in life, and I understand that some peeps got into financial trouble when it had nothing to do with lack of discipline. However, I suggest in most cases financial problems are a lack of self-control. For example, for a variety of reasons, many of us enjoy keeping up with the Joneses, but in the end, we often become as impoverished as the Joneses. Instead of coveting the Jones family, why don't we invest our money first, pay our bills second and buy our luxuries last? Sounds simple, doesn't it? Sadly, most investors do the opposite: buy luxuries first,

pay bills second and invest whatever is

Investing should be simple, boring, and straightforward enough that we should yawn. Yaaaaaawwwwwwn! Far too many investors, however, seek complexity and ignore simplicity. This phenomenon has been around for years and has led financial advisors and clients alike to ignore the greatest value added by a financial professional, such as myself: behavioral coach!

Moreover, when it comes to investing, three emotions – fear, greed and regret – control our decision making process, which often destroys our portfolios.

Greed: How much money I will make if I am right

Fear: How much money I will lose if I am wrong

Regret: How much money I could have

If our goldfish is sick, we do not to treat the fish; we treat the water. In other words, the environment is everything, which is why we should pay attention to what we expose ourselves. For example, I encourage you to do as I do: ignore market volatility, headlines, CNBC, The Wall Street Journal, Mad Money with Jim Cramer, as well as any investment advice that our colleagues, family or friends might want to share. That is correct. Ignore all the noise and get rich quick ideas. Too many "investors" buy and sell too often, as they think that they can work some magic by listening to the market forecasters, who presumably know something that nobody else does. Fuhgettaboutit!

The stock market is not a Steven Spielberg movie. We do not need gypsies with crystal balls, soothsayers wearing wizard hats, palm readers and stock market pundits with sketchy records of accomplishment.

Just eliminate the racket and nonsense and yawn. Yaaaaaawwwwwwn!

I put forth that managing our behavior is the foundation of being a successful investor. Without question, I believe psychology trumps financial education every time. Often in the real world, it is not the smart people that get ahead, but the bold. Said differently, being whip-smart will not save us from the demons of destructions: greed and fear. The investment graveyards are full of investors who learned this lesson the hard way. In the end, we must use our emotions to think instead of thinking with our emotions. If you do not conduct your financial decision making process with this methodology, I suggest that you make an appointment with the Hokey Pokey Clinic: a place to turn yourself around! Now take a deep breath and turn the

As the recipient of the 2016 Florida Dairy Farmers Mr. Football award, Nick Tronti is recognized as the state's top high school football player, but many of those closest to him say he's the complete opposite of your stereotypical jock.

"He's an extremely humble, thoughtful and caring human being," said Aaron Avery, quarterbacks coach at Ponte Vedra High School. "Every achievement he's ever had, he's tried to deflect and give credit to other people."

The senior quarterback led the Sharks on a magical playoff run that ended in a heartbreaking 35-33 loss to American Heritage High School in Ponte Vedra's first ever-state championship appearance. He passed for 3,333 yards and 34 touchdowns and rushed for 662 yards and 19 touchdowns throughout the season, which ultimately resulted in him being crowned Mr. Football in December by a statewide panel of high school football coaches and media representatives. Tronti won the award in convincing fashion, with 12 of the 23 first-place votes. He joins Nease's Tim Tebow (2005) as just the second athlete from St. Johns County to earn the award, and the sixth Jacksonville area athlete to do so

"It's a tremendous honor," said Tron-

ti, who is currently committed to play college football at University of North Carolina-Charlotte. "It means more to our team than anything, though. Those were the guys that got it for me."

Known for his competitiveness on the field, Tronti brings that same determination off the field to be the best person he can be.

He is an active member of Ponte Vedra High School's Best Buddies organization, which pairs students with special needs students to help them develop life skills. Tronti is paired with a special needs student, and the two eat lunch together every day. Along with others from the organization, Tronti also takes her out to dinner and to fun activities outside of school. Tronti said he also teaches her basic manners and skills, such as how to tip at a restaurant.

"I have fun hanging out with her," he said. "I don't do it just to do it. We have an awesome time. It's fun to give back to them because they love it, and it makes me feel good inside to give back to people like that."

Gordie Rolison, Ponte Vedra's defensive line coach and a special needs teacher at the high school, said Tronti impresses him with something every day.

"People look at Nick as the athlete he is," said Rolison. "He wants to beat you even if it's ping pong. I think he also wants to be a better person than you. He wants to go that extra mile to help people."

Rolison said his students have severe, profound or high functioning autism. Of the 150 kids in the school's Best Buddies club, he said 15 are actively involved in helping these students. Tronti and three of his teammates, said Rolison, are part of that group

"Those guys come through our room every day," Rolison said. "They come in, sit down and talk with the kids. Nick eats lunch with a group of them every day. He's a leader on the field and off the field."

Tronti's compassion doesn't stop there. He demonstrates streaks of it throughout his life.

He lives in a neighborhood full of elementary and middle school kids who play flag football. Tronti said he regularly plays with them as the neighborhood's all-time quarterback.

"I try to do things that when I was that age would have been cool for other people to do for me," he said.

### Sharks end holiday break with five straight wins

One would be hard pressed to pen a better script for the Ponte Vedra varsity basketball team than for their efforts during the long holiday break.

Winners of five straight games, all on the road, the Sharks had highlights galore during their streak. On Wednesday, Jan. 4, the team earned their beloved Head Coach Bud Beech his 500th career win with a 53-48 victory over Westside at Ribault High School. Only a slim turnout of Shark faithful were in attendance to witness Beech's milestone accomplishment on win number 500, but that was certainly not the case for win number 501 at Nease High

Before another packed and spirited throng of rooters for both teams on Friday, Jan. 6, the Sharks concluded their holiday journey with a thrilling 55-53 comeback victory against arch rival Nease.

The Sharks were a mediocre 2-3 to begin this season while waiting on the return to

their roster of a pair of starters who were instrumental in the huge success of the PVHS football state runner-ups. Since senior JD Pirris and sophomore Reese Russi returned to the starting lineup, the Sharks have won seven of their last eight games to improve their season record to an impressive 9-4.

The only blip during that streak was their opening round defeat at the hands of Flagler Palm Coast when the Sharks had an uncharacteristically poor shooting night. It took the 'Beech Boys' less than 24 hours, however, to regain their shooting touch as four PVHS players reached double figures in their 65-56 win over Savannah (GA) Windsor Forest.

The following day showed why the Sharks had missed the services of Pirris and Russi when the back court pair teamed up for a combined 28 points in a 74-64 victory over Crescent City.

A pair of Nassau County opponents were the next to fall at the hands of the Sharks, who romped to a convincing 68-44 win over Baldwin High with Pirris (18) Eston Hensley (13) and Mike Nicandri

(11) all in double figures. The Baldwin victory pushed Beech's career win total to 499 heading into the next afternoon's game vs. Westside. Playing hard for their veteran mentor, the Sharks took a commanding 46-29 lead into the final quarter before outlasting a belated Westside charge to prevail 53-48.

Although win number 500 had to be very satisfying for Beech, win number 501 against arch rival Nease was even better. As per any PVHS-Nease basketball game, the win didn't come easy. The Sharks trailed by five points with less than two minutes remaining in the contest before embarking on their closing rally.

Trailing 53-48 with 1:36 left in the contest, and the Panthers in possession of the ball, the Sharks fought back. Hensley drilled a two pointer to cut the Panther lead to three. After forcing a Panther turnover, Ponte Vedra's Pirris connected to trim the deficit to a single point.

Nease, however, was still in charge and attempted to run out the clock. Yet another Nease turnover gave the Sharks a chance

to take the lead with but 0:16 showing on the clock.

Pirris then took charge and began one of his patented drives to the basket. The veteran senior guard, after drawing a double team, dished a pass under the hoop to a cutting Chris Tomacewski.

The 'Panther Killer' Tomacewski made the reverse layup to give the Sharks the lead, and then made it a two-point margin when he made the free throw after being fouled. Nease was unable to answer and the Shark's stormed the court in celebrating the victory.

Pirris had a monster game for the victors. Pirris led Shark scorers with 20 points, but even more important than his scoring was his work elsewhere. Although listed as a point guard, Pirris led the team in rebounds with nine and in assists with eight.

Hensley continued his great play with 13 points, six of those coming in the clutch in the game's final quarter while Tomacewski came off the bench to score



Born in Gainesville, Baugh grew up in Long Beach, California. At



### Lady sharks stumble as soccer playoffs approach

The Christmas break did not serve the Lady Sharks soccer team very well. Since the holidays, the Ponte Vedra girls lost two games - one to district foe Pedro Menendez and the second to non-district opponent Creekside. They now stand at 7-4-6 overall and 4-1-1 in their district.

It is unusual to see Coach Dave Silverberg's team lose two straight at any time, but to lose two straight and score just a single goal in the two games is practically unheard of. The 1-0 loss to Menendez had to be disappointing, not only because Menendez is the team to beat in District 3A-4 but also because the Sharks saw three of their best shots on goal bounce off the goal posts or the crossbar. 




