mold and debris. A thorough clean will also serve to prep your deck for weatherproofing with a stain or sealant (another useful task to include on your fall checklist.)

### **Outdoor Surfaces**

Operate a pressure washer only outside, far away from windows, doors and vents to reduce the risk of carbon monoxide gas from accumulating and potentially being drawn towards occupied spaces.

Always wear goggles and closedtoe footwear when operating a pressure washer. Don't spray near children, pets, electrical wires, or power

After use, allow the unit to cool down before storing.

# Data shows home fires burn hotter, faster than ever: How you can reduce your risks

(BPT) — While the number of home fires occurring in the U.S. each year has fallen by more than 50 percent since 1977, the ratio of people who die in home fires has remained virtually unchanged, based on data from the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). In 1977, deaths occurred in .8 percent of home fires, and in 2013, that rate was .7 percent. One possible explanation for this discrepancy: home fires now burn hotter and faster than they did 40 years ago, meaning victims have less time to escape a burning house.

"In a series of experiments, UL demonstrated that the nature of residential fires has changed dramatically," says Eric Skare, a volunteer firefighter in Minnesota and product manager of fire safety systems for Uponor. "Flashover - the point when intense heat causes an entire room to become engulfed in flames - now occurs less than five minutes after a fire starts. It used to take 30 minutes or longer for flashover to occur. People now have less time to get out of a burning house, even if their smoke alarms



have alerted them to the fire."

The results of this evolution in home fires can turn tragic quickly, Skare notes. "A study

by the NFPA found that a third of those killed in home fires were trying to escape when they died," he says.

The UL study cites several factors as driving the changes in home residential fires, including:

- Modern home design is toward larger homes with more open floor plans, an arrangement that facilitates the spread of fire. Older homes were smaller overall and featured smaller room plans.
- Construction materials currently in use contribute to a faster burn time.
- Today's home furnishings are made from many synthetic materials that combust easily, meaning fires have more fuel.
- In UL testing, modern windows of all types failed faster than windows made from older — or "legacy" materials. In some cases, the time difference was significant. For example, legacy windows made of wood with a metal frame and nine single-glazed panes failed in about 12 to 16 minutes, while modern premium wooden frame windows with two panes of double-glazed glass failed in about four to six minutes. When windows fail, they admit more oxygen into a burning building to feed the fire.

All these factors contributed to UL test results that showed how much faster

modern homes burn, and how escape time is much less than in decades

Working smoke alarms in a home are proven to reduce the risk of injuries and fatalities. Virtually every construction code in the U.S. requires smoke alarms in new construction. Functioning smoke alarms reduce the risk of home fire fatalities by 50 percent, according to the NFPA. A residential sprinkler system slashes the risks even further — by 80 percent. The U.S. Fire Administration recommends that all homes should be equipped with both smoke alarms and sprinklers. And the International Residential Code also requires fire sprinklers for new-home construction.

In decades past, concerns over cost may have kept some homeowners from incorporating fire sprinklers in their new-home construction or major renovation projects, but residential fire sprinklers are now more affordable than ever. In fact, a typical system represents about 1 to 1.5 percent of the total cost of new-



home construction. For example, a \$200,000 new home would require an investment of about \$2,000 to install sprinklers — far less than the cost of other, less safety-oriented upgrades, such as premium appliances or floor-

# Origination and underwriting

Origination — The loan officer will review your financing options, work with you to complete the credit application and create the loan account.

Underwriting — An underwriter will review the application and determine the level of credit risk you represent based on your credit score, income, existing debt and down payment. You may be asked to provide additional information about your finances during this step.

# **Satisfying loan conditions** and full loan approval

In this step, you will receive a "conditions to approval" list from your lender, which outlines the tasks you must complete before the loan can be closed. For example, the lender may ask for additional documentation to verify income, savings or emergency funds or other proof that you can afford to repay the loan. At this point in the process the lender may offer a conditional loan approval and start the document verification process. If you accept the conditional loan approval offer, once all conditions have been met, the lender will issue a full loan approval.

### Processing

Once you've selected your dream

home, you'll sign a purchase agreement with the seller. The purchase agreement tells the lender how much you have agreed to pay to purchase the home. The lender may then have the home appraised and will provide you with a copy of the appraisal.

In the final step of the process, the lender works with a title company to obtain and review a title report and then finalize your title on the home. The titling company receives a closing package, which contains the documents that need to be signed, recorded and become part of your mortgage loan file. At the closing, you will sign all closing documents and pay any closing costs. The lender then receives all of this signed paperwork to complete the process.

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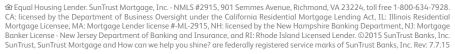

- · Go through the application, approval and closing process. If your lender determines you qualify for HARP, they will guide you through the process.

HARP has no appraisal requirements or loan-to-value limits, so you can apply regardless of how far your home may have fallen in value. Without this program, qualifying for refinancing can be virtually impossible for homeowners who are underwater.

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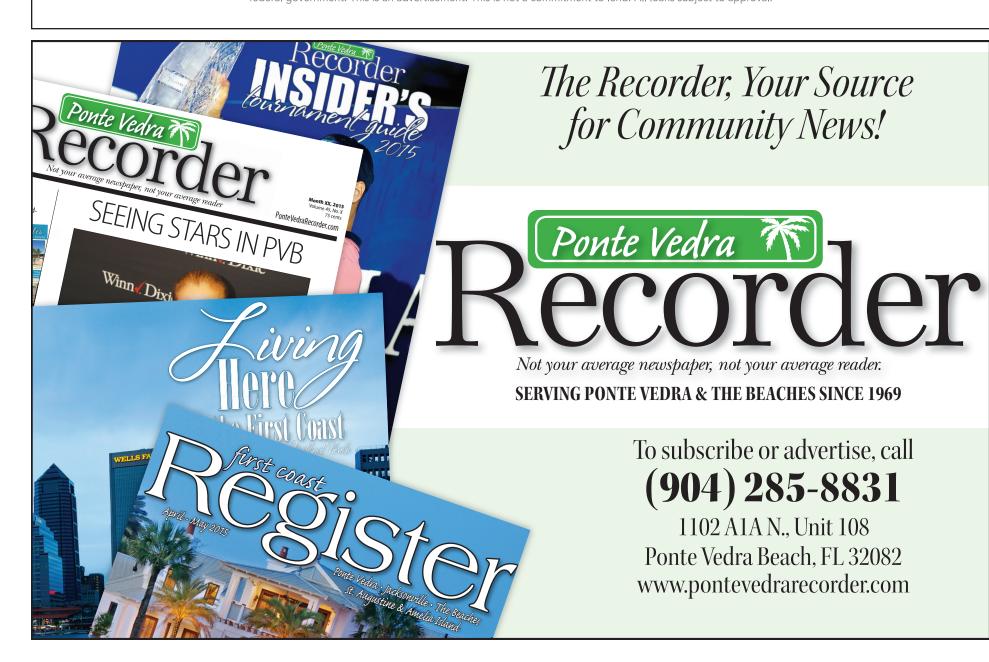

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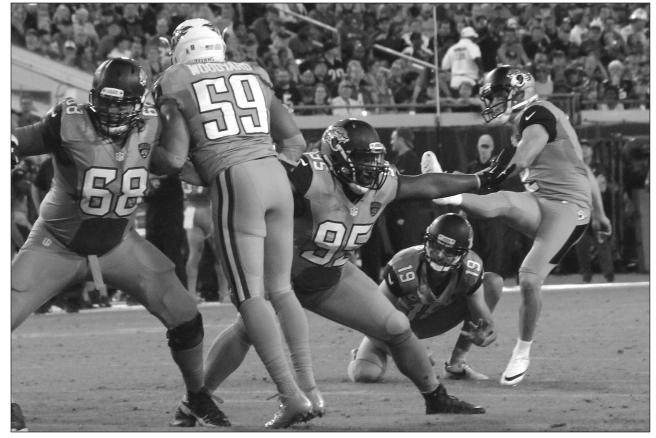
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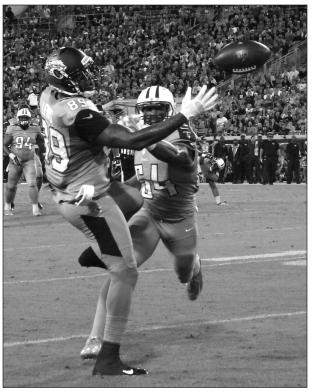

# Late TD pass gives Jaguars second straight win

# San Diego Chargers visit EverBank Field Sunday

The Jacksonville Jaguars scored late and held on for a 19-13 win over AFC South Division rival Tennessee Thursday night at EverBank Field. The Jaguars' have now surpassed last year's total of three victories and matched the four wins that coach Gus Bradley got in his first season.

Jacksonville (4-6) QB Blake Bortles was 21-of-30 for 242 yards, with a fumble, and interception and a touchdown to tight end Julius Thomas. Wide receiver Allen Robinson finished with a team high five receptions for 113 yards, including a 38-yarder.

"I thought that Blake, overall, had a good game. He completed 70 percent of his passes. He had that short-yardage fumble, the interception that I'm sure he wish he had back. They did a good job with coverage there," Bradley said.

Rookie Rashad Greene, coming off a thumb injury, returned a punt 63 yards, setting up the 5-yard scoring pass to Thomas with 3:30 to play.

"It was actually a look I hadn't seen in a long time. Having a linebacker in man coverage – particularly a rush linebacker – was pretty unique," said Thomas of his second TD catch of the season. "I just wanted to make sure I gave Blake threw a great pass, on time, in a place that only I could get it."

Following the Jaguars lone TD of the night, Tennessee receiver Phillip Supernaw fumbled after catching a pass. Jacksonville's Davon House recovered at the Titans' 29-yard line. That led to Jason

Myers fourth field goal of the game.

Bradley also had praise for the Jaguars' special teams.

"I do think it was really good. I thought we covered very well. I know in the punt return game, we won that battle. The kickoffs were good. Field goals and extra points, obviously, a big part of the game. It's great to see that consistency coming week-to-week now," he said.

Tennessee rookie QB Marcus Mariota was 22 of 35 for 231 yards. He also ran for a 23-yard score that put the Titans ahead 13-9 late in the third quarter. Tight end DeLanie Walker led Titans' receivers with eight catches for 109 yards.

Mariota moved Tennessee from their 20 to the Jaguars' 23-yard line with six seconds left. Jaguars' defensive end Andre Branch sacked Mariota on the game's final play.

"It's frustrating to lose a game like this," Walker said. "We just made too many mistakes and in a game like this, you can't do that. We still thought we could pull it off on that last drive but again, penalties, including one by me, and some sacks really hurt us."

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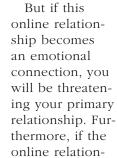

And it strokes my ego to know that others think I am hot.

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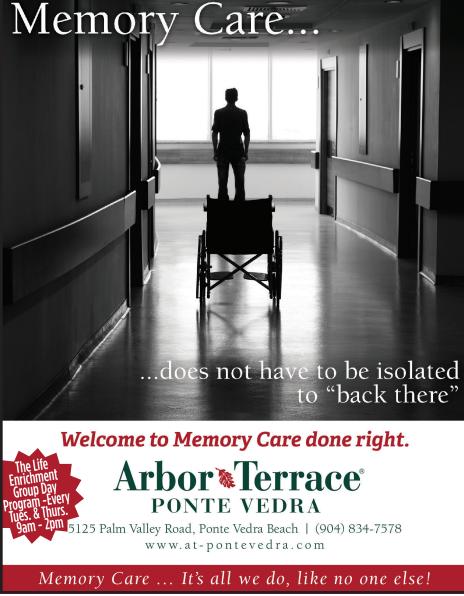
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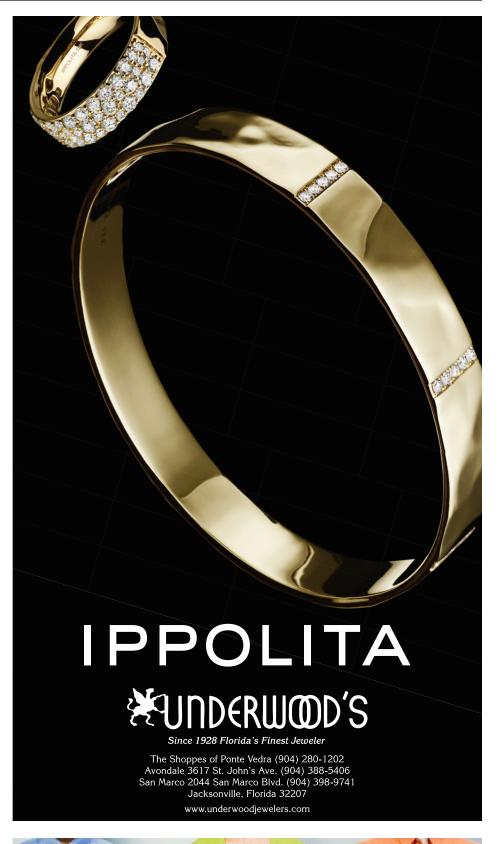
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# The Real Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve

PONTE VEDRA, FLORIDA — History shows that new neighborhoods in Ponte Vedra enjoy a special amount of scrutiny – that's because residents value their lifestyle and neighborhoods so much. Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve is no exception.

Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve will be developed in an environmentally sensitive manner resulting in a high quality, single-family community with homes that are compatible and complementary to the surrounding area. The developer, GreenPointe Communities and its leadership, has developed acclaimed communities across Florida for almost 30 years. GreenPointe has a reputation for creating spe-

cial neighborhoods while minimizing the impact on the environment and has incorporated those princi-

ples in the planning and design of Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve.

Over the past few weeks, there has been a considerable amount of misinformation circulating designed to inhibit the development of this new community located at 1044 Ponte Vedra Boulevard. The

records show that the misleading information stems from a property owner attempting to prevent future residents of Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve from using their lawfully existing beach access easement which runs through her oceanfront property along

its southern boundary. After a well-documented litigious history regarding the easement and having lost at every level in court, the property owner is now trying to convince the County Commission to help her restrict access to the beach through her opposition to Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve.

Based on the misleading information, it is incumbent for us to set the record straight.

# It is incumbent for us to set the record straight.

## The following is the **TRUTH** about Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve:

#### Did the developer increase the zoning to allow for 22 lots?

*No.* The property was zoned in 1974 for up to 30 home sites. The developer decided, responsibly and conservatively, to plan and develop only 22 lots, which represents 27% fewer lots than allowed on the property.

## Do the lots require filling the Guana marshlands in order to be buildable?

**No.** There is absolutely no fill for lot development in the Guana marshlands and, in fact, the developer's plans call for an upland buffer of 1.29 acres to further protect the jurisdictional wetlands. For the total project wetland impacts are 0.66 acres and impacts to man-made surface watering holes are 0.54 acres. Specific to lot development fill is limited to isolated wetlands that total 0.38 acres, and existing surface watering holes that total 0.33 acres. All impacts will be mitigated, resulting in no net loss of wetlands.

## Will development of Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve cause the surrounding areas to flood?

**No.** The development has been carefully planned to meet or exceed all existing regulations to ensure that all storm water will be stored, retained and properly treated and that development does not cause adverse floodplain impacts to adjacent properties. Additionally, the current flood insurance standing of adjacent properties will not be affected.

## Will the water quality of the surrounding marshlands be negatively affected?

**No.** In fact, water quality experts have determined that the water quality will actually improve after



the development is complete due to the state-ofthe-art-storm water management system to be installed, as well as the elimination of several existing structures, including wells and a septic tank. Runoff from the site is not being treated currently. Post development runoff will be treated at or above required levels and beyond the existing treatment provided by nearby communities.

## Will there be 5,000 truckloads of material brought onto the site to fill the lots?

*No.* Lot fill that will be placed during the 6 month infrastructure period is estimated at fewer than 220 truckloads. Lot fill that will be placed as each home is built over a two year period starting after the site infrastructure is complete, is estimated at fewer than 700 truckloads. Only a fraction of this lot fill is related to the variance as the average fill needed

over the entire development is 1.3 feet, simply 3.6 inches more than allowed without a variance from the Ponte Vedra Zoning District Regulations. The areas that will require the most fill are areas that the previous owner excavated for ponds used as animal watering holes.

# Was GreenPointe granted special privileges in the permitting of Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve?

**No.** GreenPointe designed Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve well within the limits set forth by all governing agencies including, St. Johns County, the St. Johns River Water Management District, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and FEMA. The community is designed to minimize impacts to and embrace the natural surroundings. In fact, the permitting agencies that have fully reviewed the plans and variance have recommended approval.

Conclusion: Each of the facts stated above are consistent with the testimony that was presented at previous hearing and are matters of public record. There has been a systematic effort to disseminate and spread inaccuracies, disguised as facts, about Ponte Vedra Beach Preserve, GreenPointe Communities, and its permitting, to create antagonism among neighbors and individuals. To ignore these facts and testimony is unfair.

The St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners will consider the variance at their December 1st meeting. The recent attempts to pressure the County Commission to overturn a properly granted variance that was, and is, supported by the County's own professional staff after their thorough and independent research is absurd. Ponte Vedra residents should be outraged that they have been misled in this manner and such tactics certainly should not persuade any one, especially not the members of the County Commission.

She found my gray, and by the time you read this, Tim will have painted the whole interior.

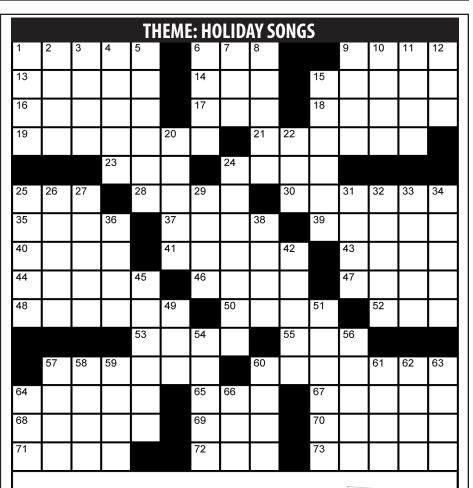
If you're interested, it's called Essentially Grav SH 6002. Imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, so go right ahead and use it if you like.

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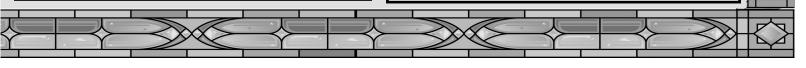
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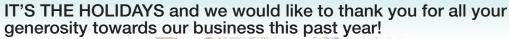












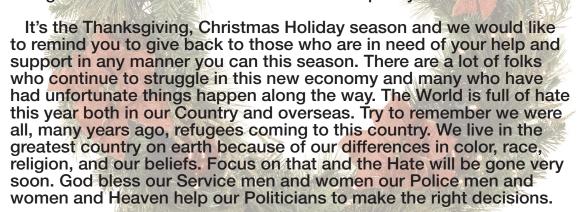
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
