



### Nease NJROTC victorious at Terry Parker Drill Meet

### Team takes 1st in 6 of 13 events

Nease NJROTC's varsity drill team extended its winning streak of Jacksonville area drill competitions, winning the Terry Parker Drill Meet on December 12 in Jacksonville. Nease has now won six straight Navy northern Florida drill meets covering the past three years.

Nease won the Mandarin NJROTC Drill Meet earlier this fall. In 2013 & 2014, Nease swept both the Mandarin and Terry Parker drill meet championships beating out 11 other NJROTC challengers from northern Florida, southern and central Georgia in each competition.

Nease is currently the #1 ranked NJROTC unit in the nation.

"We needed the entire 40 cadet team's best effort today," said Cadet Battalion Commander Zach Yearwood. "We feel a bit like the New England Patriots – each week our competition takes their best shot at knocking us off, but we're still standing."

In addition to claiming the top overall trophy, Nease picked up first place trophies for Personnel Inspection, Academics, Athletics, Unarmed Exhibition Drill, Push Ups, and Sit Ups.

With its earlier victory at Mandarin, Nease has already secured a spot in the 16-team Navy Area 12 Drill Championships to be held on March 6 in central Georgia. Before that, the team will travel to Tallahassee next month to compete at the Florida A&M University NJROTC Drill Meet.

Several Nease cadets received individual medals during the competition. Cadets Dane Barber and Zach Yearwood received recognition for Academics; cadets Christopher Babcock, Brian Swicegood and Marcus Sanders for Push Ups; and cadets Lily Short, Erin Sass, Cali Vaughn, Jerry Xiang and Mac Davis for Sit Ups. .

"I've been doing this a long time (13 years)," said Nease's Naval Science Instructor Master Chief John Duffy. "These young men and women always seem to step up to the challenge."

Other top schools in the competition were Middleburg HS 2nd place, Cross Creek HS 3rd place, Coffee County HS 4th place, and Mandarin HS 5th place.

ROPY DIAMONA is the Executive Director for K9s For Warriors, an organization headquartered in Ponte Vedra Beach that pairs service dogs with military veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder, traumatic brain injury and/or military sexual assault. Diamond was working as a lawyer at a law firm in downtown Jacksonville prior to becoming the K9s For Warriors executive director a little over a year ago, but he has been involved with the organization for several years. When the brand new K9s For Warriors headquarters opened in May, quadrupling the amount of military men and women the organization could assist, K9s For Warriors Founder and President, Shari Duval, asked Diamond if he would be interested in serving as the executive director to head up the growing operation.

### Where are you from originally?

I grew up in Reno, Nevada. I moved to Jacksonville by choice. I literally opened up a map and went through cities and states and drove up A1A after a job interview and I said this is where I'm moving. I love Neptune Beach. I moved to Neptune Beach about three years ago.

### What drew you to the area?

I love the beach — I love the small town community of Neptune Beach, and I needed a place where I could move my mom and my sister and her kids and my brother-in-law too, so we all moved to Neptune Beach together. We're all about a bike ride away from each other.

### What do you enjoy doing in your free time?

I love to surf and I'm big into anti-crime programs. That's how I spend my extra time when I'm not here — working on the Jackson-ville Journey program, after school programs and stuff like that. I have a rescue dog, a Doberman named Barron. We run on the beach every day.

### Do you belong to any organizations?

I'm on the board of Beaches Watch and I served on the Jacksonville Journey, and I then pretty much spend all my time at K9s For Warriors. I used to be a lawyer and I thought that was busy, but K9s For Warriors is 24/7, it's all the time. It's awesome.

### How did you get involved with K9s For Warriors?

I was a lawyer at a big law firm in downtown Jacksonville and I wanted to find a pro-bono project were I could do something good with my spare time. I Googled and I saw K9s For Warriors was brand new and down the road, so I sent an email to Shari Duval and asked her if she needed a free lawyer, and she emailed me right back in about two seconds, "Yes, God bless you."

So, I've been the lawyer for the organization all along, and I've been on the board. About a year and a month ago Shari asked whether or not because we were getting so big, so fast, whether or not I would come run it. I had just made partner at a law firm and I said, I could be a partner at a law firm or I could run K9s For Warriors — easy decision. Every day is different. Every day you're helping either someone on two legs or four legs, so it's fun.

### Tell me a little about your prior work experience.

I worked in politics. I worked for George W. Bush in the White House for two years. I was there for 9/11 and that kind of got me more geared towards public service and being someone who contributes to the country. And then I went to work for Governor Schwarzenegger in California for a year as his briefing director. That was spectacular. But then it was time to put the silliness aside and go be a lawyer. I went to law school. I was a federal prosecutor for a while which I really loved doing — putting bad guys in jail is a good day.


### First right whales of the season sighted

Despite the warmer temperatures, right whales have begun to appear in local calving grounds. This week, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission aerial survey team discovered two mother/calf pairs, one, Catalog #3317, close to shore in Ponte

Right whale Catalog #3317 and her 2015 calf were sighted approximately 1.5 NM off Ponte Vedra Beach, FL on December 10, 2015. They are the first right whales seen off Florida this winter.

"Dust off those binoculars and get ready! The season is upon us and itis time to start looking seaward for those telltale signs," said Joy Hampp, program coordinator for the Marineland Right Whale Project, in an email this week. Hampp said the program expects to begin flying aerial surveys next week.

### **Nocatee Happenings:** Spotlight on Del Webb Emergency Response Team

### Volunteers save lives, lower response time

Despite planning and good health, it's a nightmare scenario that can unfold for anyone: a fall in your own kitchen. An accident while exercising outdoors. Chest pain on the way to your car. Whether it's a stroke, heart attack or major accident, health issues can strike anyone at any time— and minutes can mean heart damage, brain damage or even the difference between life and death.

One group of volunteers at the Del Webb Ponte Vedra community is working together to make safety a priority, and to respond to emergencies as soon as possible. The Del Webb Emergency Response Team (ERT) is a group of residents trained and certified in basic first aid, CPR and automated electronic defibrillator (AED) use.

"In an emergency, we want the first call to be to 911," said ERT president Susan Schjelderup. "The second call should be to us."

There are currently 68 members in the organization, with more waiting on training in order to join. Each member signs up to volunteer for at least one 24-hour period a month in teams of two. During their shift, the volunteers have supplies such as the club's AED as well as one of two cell phones. When a resident dials the ERT hotline, a volunteer is always there to answer.

The team's mission statement is "to train, equip and maintain a team of volunteers who can respond to medical and injury-related emergencies within the community of Del Webb Ponte Vedra after 911 has been called, or provide first aid if the ill or injured person declines 911 assistance."

Volunteers respond to any call for assistance within Del Webb borders, whether it's responding to an emergency in someone's home or an accident on the community's pickleball courts.

"The Del Webb ERT provides a valuable service to their community," said St. Johns County Fire Chief Carl Shank. Shank and the county have supported the ERT's efforts through free training for volunteers. The support points to the fact that despite the community's proximity to the new Nocatee fire station, there is no guarantee that the staff will be available to respond immediately to calls from Del Webb.

"Emergencies don't happen one at a time," Shank said.

Volunteer Ned Billings explained that the team was founded about two years ago when one of the founders of the ERT had a heart attack while playing pickleball. He had to wait 35 minutes before 911 arrived, and another 25 minutes before he got to the hospital. Response times have improved with the new fire station — but there is never a total guarantee of safety.

"The Fire Station paramedics are highly professional and absolutely committed to getting to us as quickly as possible," said Schjelderup. "One of the challenges that we have is that people think that because we now have the fire station here, they assume that help will be there in under two or three minutes. But there are times when they are at the furthest end of the county or even perhaps in Duval County because they have reciprocal relationships."

That is when the ERT's role is most critical. Billings and Schjelderup said that other neighborhoods could benefit from a similar volunteer group.

"As far as we know, we are the only ones in Nocatee that have done this," Schjelderup said. To join the Del Webb ERT or for guidance on founding a response team in your own neighborhood, contact Susan Schjelerup at s.schjelderup@comcast.net

### Palatka rally prevents Shark sweep

With just one quarter of play left in last week's final contest, it appeared the Sharks were well on their way to a week's sweep and a perfect 3-0 record in district play.

However, the Palatka Panthers spoiled that idea by unleashing a furious fourth quarter rally against a Sharks team that ran out of gas in the game's final moments in downing the Sharks 62-55.

Ponte Vedra, in the opening moments of the fourth quarter, enjoyed a whopping 16 point lead, only to see the Panthers tally 31 fourth quarter points while holding the Sharks to but

It was a disappointing ending to what had all the earmarks of a nice bounce back week after the Sharks pummeled Menendez last Tuesday in a district contest 73-43.

The convincing 30 point victory over Menendez helped atone somewhat for the Panther's upset victory over the Sharks in last season's opening playoff game that prevented the Sharks from advancing into the regionals

The Shark busted out to a big 10 point lead at the end of the first stop and were never challenged by the Menendez team that was coming off a big win against arch rival St. Augustine.

Coach Bud Beech was able to substitute freely throughout the game and even his second five was able to outscore the Falcons in the second period to double the score over the visitors 32-16 at the halftime break.

The Sharks high scoring duo of Matt Johnson and JD Pirris then led PVHS to a convincing 26-11 edge in the third period by combining for 17 of the Sharks tallies.

Matt Johnson led all scorers with 20 points with his teammate Pirris close behind with 18 markers. Mike Nicandri was also in double figures for the winners by adding 10 points as ten Ponte Vedra cagers dented the scoring column.

The Friday night loss to the Panthers, in a game where the venue was changed from the high school to nearby St. Johns River College, the Sharks were doomed by poor free throw shooting and numerous turnovers.

After turning the ball over but seven times in Tuesday's win over Menendez, the Sharks tripled that figure with a whopping 21 giveaways to the relentless Panthers. Shooting a woeful 6 of 17 from the charity stripe also contributed to the Shark collapse.

Although he failed to score during the contest, the Sharks were also hurt

when their 6'7" sophomore shot blocking machine, Jack Johnson, had his minutes limited in the game when he got into early foul trouble. Johnson's 5th, and final foul, was converted into a Panther free throw with 2:49 left in regulation that gave the hosts their first lead of the game at 53-52.

The Sharks were held scoreless for the final four minutes of the final quarter, until they made a meaningless last second shot at the buzzer to make the final score 62-55.

JD Pirris led the Sharks in scoring with 14 points with Matt Johnson the other Shark in double figures with 10. Matt Johnson, although far off form from the field, did contribute eight assists and five steals in a losing cause while committing but 2 of the PVHS 21 turnovers.

The Sharks will have a full week's of practice this week before hosting Bartram Trail tomorrow night (Friday Dec. 18). Coach Beech is hoping that the Sharks can improve their shooting before they face the always tough Bartram Trail five. As a team the Sharks are shooting a poor 55% from the free throw line and an equally woeful 25% from behind the three-point arc, well below shooting percentages from the previous two seasons.

It should be duly noted that this is a squad dominated with underclassmen, with Matt Johnson the only senior in Beech's current eight-man rotation. Matt is averaging 16 points a game with a very efficient 63% on two point attempts.

In addition to the scoring of JD Pirris (17 ppg), Beech is confident that he will continue to see improvement from his sophomore center Jack Johnson, especially in the scoring department. Junior front court performer Eston Hensley has gone from a back-up performer on last year's junior varsity to a solid contributor to this year's varsity five with his rebounding and court presence, committing only four turnovers on the season.

Rounding out the Shark starting five, diminutive guard Mike Nicandri has given the Sharks some solid play after the first nine games of the season. Nicandri chipped in with eight points on 3 for 3 shooting from the field and committed but two turnovers against the tenacious Panther press

Following the Bartram Trail contest the Sharks will take part in the St. Augustine Christmas classic that will run from Monday Dec 21 through Wednesday Dec 23 at St. Augustine High School. Ponte Vedra begins their busy skein of tough contests when they tip it off Monday at 6:00 p.m. against John I. Leonard High School.



### Season honors for Penn State's Nassib keep coming

Senior defensive end will play in TaxSlayer Bowl Jan. 2

Penn State defensive end Carl Nassib claimed another pair of All-America honors this week as he was named to the 2015 AutoNation Football Writers Association of America All-America first team and the ESPN.com All-America first team.

The selections are the sixth and seventh All-America honors for Nassib who will play in against Georgia in the TaxSlayer Bowl on Saturday, Jan. 2 at noon at Ever-Bank Field

On Tuesday he continued to grow his list of All-America accolades with a berth on the Sporting News All-America first team.

He previously earned Walter Camp first team All-America, Associated Press first team All-America, SI.com first team All-America, CBS Sports first team All-America and USA Today second team All-America accolades.

Despite playing only four snaps in the last two games due to injury, Nassib leads FBS in sacks (15.5) and forced fumbles (6) and is second in FBS and first in the Big Ten in tackles for loss (19.5).

With one sack at Northwestern, Nassib broke the Nittany Lions' single-season sacks record by upping his total to 15.5. He surpassed the mark of 15 set by Larry Kubin in 1979 and Michael Haynes in 2002.

Nassib's six forced fumbles this season are the most by a Penn State player since Haynes had a school-record seven in the 2002. He is the first Penn State player to force two fumbles in two games in a season since Maurice Evans in 2007.

He was also finalist for the Burlsworth Trophy, the top player that started his career as a walk-on, and the Nagurski Trophy and Bednarik Award for the nation's top defensive player.

# Club record set for points scored in regular season game

Playing the Andrew Luck-less Colts, Jackson-ville routed AFC South rival Indianapolis 51-16 at EverBank Field Sunday. The loss ended the Colts' 16-game winning streak in the division.

The fourth home win of the season set a club regular season record for most points scored as the offense, defense and special teams all got on the scoreboard. The Jaguars' all-time scoring record is 62 points against Miami in a playoff game in 1999.

Luck, the Colts starting QB, is out with abdominal injuries suffered in a win over Denver. That left it up to veteran backup Matt Hasselbeck who led the Colts to a 16-13 OT win over the Jaguars in October. The Jaguars kept their playoff hopes alive with Rashad Greene's 73-yard punt return that competed a 10-point swing and gave Jacksonville a lead they never relinquished.

Trailing 16-13 entering the second half, Jaguars' QB Blake Bortles threw an 80-yard TD pass to Allen Hurns. Hurns finished with three receptions for 105 yards.

Bortles had a record setting day with 250 yards in air and three TD passes including a four yard score to Allen Robinson and tight end Julius Thomas' fifth of the season. Bortles even scored on a one-yard run. Adam Vinatiera's 32-yard field goal was the most points the Colts could muster in the second half.

A close first half ended on two miscues. The Colts' Robert Mathis recovered a bad snap in the Jaguars' end zone to give the visitors a 13-3 lead. But Andre Branch stripped Hasselbeck

13-3 lead. But Andre Branch stripped Hasselbeck on the next possession and returned the ball 49 yards to cut the lead at the half. Branch was credited with four tackles and two sacks to go along with the fumble return.

Indianapolis (6-7) already led Jacksonville (5-

8) on Vinatiera's second field goal of the game, a 21-yarder with 13:47 to play in the second quarter.

Earlier the Colts tied the contest on a 25-yard Vinatieri kick with 7:47 to play in the opening quarter. Hasselbeck's 57-yard pass to T.Y. Hilton set up the score.

Hilton caught three passes for 112 yards in the first half and finished with one more catch and 132 yards. Hasselbeck was 18 of 35 for 252 yards with no touchdowns or interceptions.

Jacksonville jumped out to a 3-0 lead. Jason Myers' kicked a 46-yard field goal with 11:17 to play in the first quarter. T.J. Yeldon ran for 28 yards and Bortles completed a 17-yard pass to Clay Harbor for the longest gain of the drive.

YELDON AILING - Rookie T.J. Yeldon sprained his left knee Sunday. The former Alabama running back had 11 carries for 62 yards. He left the stadium on crutches. He is also dealing with a sprained right ankle and a groin injury. Yeldon's status will be updated after further tests. Denard Robinson would start if Yeldon can't play in Sunday's home finale. Robinson scored his first TD of the season on a one-yard run against the Colts and finished the game with 14 carries for 75 yards.

**COLTS GAME NOTES:** The Jaguars had lost six in a row in the series...Jaguars were 0-6 on third downs in the first half and finished 2 of 9... Blake Bortles had two fumbles in the first half... Jason Myers missed the extra point on Branch's TD, his seventh of the year and an NFL high...

**UP NEXT:** The Jaguars close out the home regular season against Atlanta Sunday at 1 p.m. The Falcons (6-7) were shutout by Carolina 38-0 in their last game. Jacksonville's final two games are on the road. If the New York Jacksonville at New Orleans on Dec. 27 has been moved from 1 p.m. ET to 4:05.

#### **OUTBACK BOUND JONES GETS**

GAME'S SUDDEN IMPACT – According to the City of Jacksonville this year's Georgia-Florida game, hosted Oct. 31, generated an economic impact of \$35 million – a more than \$2 million increase from 2014. Nearly 140,000 tourists spent the weekend in Jacksonville hotels further enhancing city bed-tax revenue. There were 37,270 booked room nights and approximately \$3.6 million was generated in total room revenue, an increase of nearly \$200,000 from the previous year.

Look for cookbooks that focus on recipes low in salt and fat and high in vitamins and fiber. Stocking stuffers are meant to be small and quirky, so consider putting in a few dietary supplements like fish oil, vitamin D and fiber. Fish oil cuts down on bad fat in the blood and replaces it with omega-3 fatty acids that are essential to heart health, especially for someone who already has heart issues. Vitamin D helps regulate blood pressure and sugar and can be used if someone doesn't already get the daily recommendation through food and sunlight. Fiber supplements lower bad cholesterol levels and help increase good cholesterol.

#### **Travel and Fitness Packages**

If you're looking for a gift for the traveler in your life, choose a trip package that incorporates moderate physical activity. A trip to a national park or resort with hiking and biking trails, a cruise with fitness classes or rock climbing are great options. For those who crave more relaxing vacations, a rejuvenating week at the beach is certainly beneficial – just make sure to incorporate yoga on the beach or daily walks.

A gym membership is also a great

gift to give a family member or friend, especially if he or she is having trouble incorporating exercise into the routine at home. Pick up two passes so you can motivate each other in making exercise part of your weekly routine. The American Heart Association recommends at least 30 minutes of moderate activity five days per week for adults, but working up to that goal slowly is recommended. Walking or running on a treadmill or elliptical can help lower cholesterol and blood pressure, while resistance and strength training help improve muscle mass.

Although heart issues are a serious matter, getting heart-healthy can be fun – especially when gifts are involved.



# Clearing the fog on life insurance cash value

Unlike term life insurance, which pays a death benefit if you die sometime within the policy's term, permanent life insurance, such as whole life insures you no matter when you die, as long as you make the necessary premiums payments. Permanent life insurance features a "cash account" that builds value. The cash value is nothing more than a feature of a permanent policy in which your premium covers your death benefit, but the excess amount builds up cash to potentially be used for some things, including paying your premiums. Keep in mind that your cash value will be minimal in the first few years as most of your money is eaten up after the company deducts expenses, commissions to the agent, etc.

Let's Assume that Lucy died and she was the owner and insured of a \$500,000 life insurance policy that had a cash value of \$75,000. Lucy named Harry and Vickie as the beneficiaries of the policy. Do Harry and Vickie receive just the face amount of \$500,000 or do they receive the face amount plus the cash value (\$575,000)? Contrary to what many policy owners and beneficiaries understand, the cash value in any life insurance policy normally does not belong to the owner of the policy. Instead, it is an asset of the insurance company, which they use to pay the death claim. However, if Lucy's policy is cancelled, the cash value in the policy belongs to Lucy under the terms of the policy's "non-forfeiture" clause. Thus, in the above example, the beneficiaries forfeit the cash value and only receive the \$500,000 death benefit. If you buy a permanent life insurance policy, and your agent tells you that your benefi-

ciaries receive both the death benefit and cash value, they had better inform you that you would pay an additional fee for this privilege. Said another way; there is no free lunch.

As you might suspect it is normally a complete waste of

money to accumulate a lot of cash value, only to have it go to the life insurance company when you die. You are 100% correct, which leads me to this sarcastic comment that I explain to permanent policy holders; "If you let me know when you will die, I will design your cash value life insurance policy to have one dollar of cash value on the day you pass away, thus saving you potentially thousands of dollars." All kidding aside, dying with a large cash value is one of the biggest mistakes policy owners make, but nobody tells them any different. Of course, since nobody knows when one will die, it can be quite tricky to effectively manage the cash value. It is a bit of a balancing act.

If you are older, and you have a large amount of cash value that you probably will not touch, it could behoove you to consider using the cash value to purchase a paid-up policy with a higher death benefit. This way, you will provide your beneficiary with a larger death benefit, and your cash value will not go to waste. Other than not managing your cash value properly, there

are four additional ways to cause havoc with your life insurance policy:

Not telling your beneficiaries that you have a life insurance policy(s).

Not raming the appropriate beneficia-

Not naming the appropriate beneficiaries.

Not asking for an annual inforce illustration (see below.)

Repeatedly withdrawing money from the cash value of your life insurance policy.

## How healthy is your life insurance policy? Cancelled

A permanent life insurance policy should never be purchased and shoved into a filing cabinet never to be looked at again. Quite the contrary, your policy should be monitored and managed on a regular basis. I recommend that one review their cash value policies annually by taking advantage of a complimentary "inforce illustration", which is a snapshot of your insurance policy in its current position. Moreover, you will learn what you might expect in the future from your policy, both from a guaranteed and projected vantage point. Inforce illustrations are enormously essential tools for evaluating the performance of your policy over time.

Many policy owners are sitting on a ticking time bomb, and they do not know it. For various reasons, one's policy may not be performing as expected. The concern is not so much the creditworthiness of the insurance company, but rather the annual premiums may not be sufficient to maintain the policy given the current economic environment. There are plenty of unfortunate and very sad stories where longtime

policyholders receive an unexpected letter from their insurance company informing them that they must send in additional money to keep their policy in force. Regrettably, many of these unhappy policy owners have to cancel the policy (lose the death benefit) because they cannot afford the additional premium.

As you might expect, insurance companies defend themselves by saying that the terms of policy are "clearly" spelled out in the initial policy contract. In addition, they remind their policy owners that they mail a yearly statement that includes the premiums and the account value. According to results from many surveys policy owners do not read life insurance contracts. While it is certainly no justification or even a good excuse, policy owners buy life insurance, whether term or permanent, put it in a drawer and never hear from their agent again. It is paramount that you give your permanent life insurance policy (cash value) an annual check-up. The best way to accomplish this is with an in force illustration. Do not be afraid to call your agent and pepper them with questions. Moreover, do not quit until you are satisfied with the answers. You can always go directly to the service center of the insurance company. Bottom line; you must know the health of your life insurance policy.
