



Ponte Vedra woman gets an early birthday present from Florida Lottery

Ponte Vedra resident Linda Danish recently got a million-dollar birthday surprise.

Danish, 67, claimed a \$1 million prize in the Florida Lottery's \$10,000,000 World Class Cash scratch-off at the lottery headquarters in Tallahassee in early November, three days before her birthday. Danish chose to receive her winnings as a one-time, lump-sum payment of \$748,000. Danish purchased her winning ticket from the Publix at 120 Marketside Avenue in Ponte Vedra. Publix received a \$2,000 bonus commission for selling the winning ticket.

The \$25 game, launched in February, features more than \$549 million in total cash prizes, including two top prizes of \$10 million and 46 prizes of \$1 million. Overall odds of winning are one-in-2.89.

Poll: Ponte Vedra Beach residents overwhelmingly support beach renourishment project

A survey being circulated by the organization Save Ponte Vedra Beach has revealed that 93 percent of the respondents would support a self-funded and state-funded beach renourishment project to save Ponte Vedra's beaches from damage caused by recent hurricanes.

The survey, which will be available at savepontevedrabeach.com until the end of December, has garnered 400 responses from individual property owners, according to Ponte Vedra resident and Save Ponte Vedra Beach leader Dr. Shyam Paryani. The survey has also received positive responses from communities like The Plantation at Ponte Vedra Beach and Sawgrass Country Club. In total, Paryani said about 700 people back the project, which group representatives say will span from the Ponte Vedra county line to the Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve.

Those who support the measure are voting to self-fund a coastal "assessment" and ultimate beach renourishment project, potentially via a Municipal Service Taxing Unit (MSTU).

"It's not a tax per say," clarified Paryani. "Our goal would be to do an assessment based on the utility of the beach. This is not related to a property tax. It's a separate assessment only done to property owners who will decide to participate. They would agree to an assessment based on an economic study from a third-party to determine what economic benefits arise from the actual renourishment of the beach."

Save Ponte Vedra Beach also plans to lobby the state for matching funds to set the plan in motion. The group has engaged Jacksonville-based engineering firm Olsen Associates to initiate a study of the beaches and determine which renourishment program would be best. The residents also plan to hire an economic consultant who can determine what is fair for each homeowner to pay for the proj-

ect. Paryani said Save Ponte Vedra Beach members plan to meet with St. Johns County officials next week to further discuss the project and get plans formalized. The exact cost of the Ponte Vedra group's proposed renourishment project is to be determined.

According to Paryani, similar efforts were executed successfully in Amelia Island where locals formed a self-funded project that eventually received federal and state funding.

in Amelia Island, they started that process in 1995, and they now have a sustainable project that they renourish every few years whenever damage is done," he said.

If nothing is done to renourish the coastline, Ponte Vedra residents within the organization are concerned that the beaches will soon be unusable, and homes could be threatened due to significant erosion triggered by hurricanes, nor'easters and high tides. "You can't even walk on Ponte Vedra Beach at high tide," said Paryani. "There's very little beach to walk on, so that shows significant erosion. On top of that, there's coastal erosion with the dunes significant on many of the homes to the point where the homes have actually been threatened."

Reviewing regulations to prevent property damage

Another local resident who is concerned with beach erosion is Dr. John Scott Boggs, who lives on Ponte Vedra Boulevard. He attended the first Save PVB meeting, but has since been collecting facts on his own with a coastal engineer and reviewing the coastline to determine how to avert damage from severe weather events in the future.

Boggs thinks it's possible to do so by tightening regulations on a home's proximity to the water. The Ponte Vedra Beach resident said homeowners are disregarding the dunes by building too close to them.

"It appears to me that the structures that are significantly threatened are the ones that have been built too close to the coast," Boggs asserted. "Certainly, they should not be built in any way seaward of the coastal construction line. The thing about that is, the coastal construction line has not been changed even though we've lost somewhere between 30 and 60 feet of beach."

Boggs explained that the Coastal Construction Control Line (CCCL) program regulates properties built on the coast that can harm the beach environment, destabilize dunes or cause erosion. Boggs believes the line should be changed because he said the shape of the coast has been warped over the years due to erosion, but he also believes redefining the line would be difficult.

According to David Krieger of the CCCL program, the coastal construction line was last changed in St. Johns County in January 1988.

To protect property along the coast, Boggs believes beachfront owners and the rest of the Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District should be raising awareness and pushing for a more stringent permitting process. Although tightening regulations is not an easy task, Boggs believes it can and must be done.

Can you please briefly tell us about your background?




PVB students round up support for book fair to benefit Florida Keys library



Boggs said current regulations allow a building to be built along the coast as long as it does not adversely impact the dunes or its neighbors, and it is located landward of the 30-year erosion projection. Krieger confirmed this to be true but said a few exceptions apply to these rules. For instance, he said a continuous frontal dune must be established, and the building must have been platted prior to 1985.

Regardless of the exceptions, Boggs believes the regulations, in general, are



Down South Barbecue and the UPS Store on A1A North in Ponte Vedra Beach are recovering this week after a regular customer of both businesses accidentally plowed into their stores with her red Cadillac Tuesday, Nov. 21.

According to Deputy Nate Datsko, who was dispatched to the scene by the St. Johns County Sheriff's Office, the driver of the car was an older woman whose foot had slipped off the brake pedal and onto the accelerator, causing the car to crash into the stores. Although the businesses' front windows and the wall that separates them were damaged, no one was injured by the incident-a fact for which staff of both stores are grateful.

"Luckily nobody was hurt," said Wally Monnig, owner of Down South Barbecue. "We had one lady out front that was waiting on a 'to-go' order. She wasn't 8 feet from where it happened, and she went running for her life. It was just an interesting experience that



got a little scary."

According to Monnig, glass was blown about 30 feet into his restaurant, and it was a mere twist of fate that removed him from the path of the car, which crashed right into his usual spot at the cash register.

"I was walking back to the kitchen to take dishes back, and just heard a big boom," he said. "I'm lucky I wasn't standing there."

UPS Store Manager Erica Vona echoed Monnig's sentiments, stating

she was shocked, but thankful that no one was harmed.

"We're just chalking it up to a Tuesday," Vona laughed.

New contribution limits for retirement plans in 2018 released by federal governement

The federal government has recently released the new contribution limits for all retirement plans for 2018. As you will note,

the limits haven't in-

creased much; for example, the maximum employee contribution to a 401(k) plan increased from \$18,000 (where it has been for several years) to \$18,500, while the additional contribution amount for those 50 and older remains at \$6,000.

Similar small changes in limits were made to a number of other plans, but several did not change, such as IRA contributions. Remember that the penalty for excess contributions to a retirement plan is 50 percent of the excess contribution, so be sure you know the applicable limit for your situation before you go charging ahead.

Another item in the news involving retirement plans is a proposal being tossed about in Congress that would do one of

First, the proposal would require all contributions to plans going forward to be Roth contributions, i.e., no longer permit pre-tax contributions to be made but force everyone to use Roth plans (pay tax now, withdraw tax free later) only. The second idea is a variation of this, allowing some level of pre-tax contributions with all contributions above that level to be Roth (after tax) contributions.

Obviously, these proposals are being considered as a way of increasing government tax revenues in the near-term, albeit at the expense of greater tax revenues that could be realized in the future. By basing the system substantially or completely on the Roth approach of paying taxes on the money going in but not the money coming out (subject to certain rules), the government is essentially giving up the right to tax the growth of the retirement plan balances over time. This may help finance a tax reform plan now but at a cost to the government in the future that cannot be estimated.

That said, who would be most affected by these changes if they come to pass? I regularly recommend to younger folks (those in their 40s or younger) that they contribute to Roth plans versus traditional plans because the earnings on and appreciation of their funds over time will not be federally taxed in the future, and the tax bracket they are in now is low enough that paying the tax now is not a big impediment to contributing. Those 50 and above may be more adversely affected since they are typically in a higher tax bracket (thus losing a deduction that is worth more to them) and have a shorter period of appreciation and growth before beginning to withdraw funds.

If you are currently contributing to a pre-tax retirement plan, you may want to consider maxing out your contributions this tax year both to take advantage of the current rules and limits and to gain a greater tax advantage if, by some chance, rates are lower next year. If all your contributions are after-tax, then contributing more next year when rates may be lower might make more sense than accelerating contributions you had planned to make next year into this year. As always, seek the opinion of your tax professional who can best advise you in the context of your specific situation.



By knowing what to do and who to call, business owners, managers and employees can assist the Commission in its goal to shine a light on sexual harassment and other forms of discrimination in the workplace.



Jacksonville Symphony to present concert of 'German Giants'

The Jacksonville Symphony will present a concert with three of the largest names in classical music — Schoenberg, Mendelssohn and Beethoven — Dec. 1, 2 and 3 at Jacoby Symphony Hall in the Times-Union Center for the Performing Arts.

"This fourth Masterworks concert, 'German Giants,' is one I'm especially looking forward to," said Music Director Courtney Lewis, who is in his third season as music director of the Symphony. "I can't wait to share it with our audiences in Jacksonville."

To be held at 8 p.m. on Dec. 1 and 2 and at 3 p.m. on Dec. 3, the concert is book-ended by two pieces that were considered to be modern for their time period: Schoenberg's "Five Pieces for Orchestra" and Beethoven's Symphony No. 3.

The Schoenberg is presented in five movements and will be paired with visual projections of artwork by Egon Schiele, an Austrian 20th century painter. Mendelssohn's Violin Concerto, featuring guest artist Tai Murray, will provide a haven of repose between the two iconic pieces it is paired with.

A former BBC young generation artist, member of the Marlboro Festival and of Lincoln Center's Chamber Music Society, Murray gave her London Proms debut during the summer of 2016 with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales. Living between New York and Berlin, Murray has been heard on stages such as the Barbican and London Royal Albert Hall, and aside orchestras such as Chicago Symphony, Atlanta Symphony, BBC Symphony Orchestra, BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra and Royal Liverpool Philharmonic.

At the time of its creation,

Beethoven's Third Symphony was the largest to date. It is more commonly known by the name "Eroica" and is widely considered to have ushered in the Romantic era. Originally to be dedicated to Napoleon Bonaparte, the piece was to be called "Bonaparte." When Napoleon decided to declare himself emperor, Beethoven was so disappointed in the supposed hero that he was said to have ripped up the first page and scribed "Sinfonia eroica" on the front.

During the extensive search for a new concertmaster, the Jacksonville Symphony will be bringing in seven candidates to perform with the Symphony during the season. For this concert, Vivek Jayaraman will take the stage with Courtney and the Symphony. Previously, Jayaraman performed with the Symphony Nov. 25 for "Home Alone."

Jayaraman is a member of The Florida Orchestra in St. Petersburg, and has played with several major orchestras in the United States, including The Cleveland Orchestra, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic. Jayaraman was concertmaster of the Canton Symphony Orchestra (OH) from 2015-2017 and has performed as concertmaster with the New World Symphony.

The Symphony will host a pre-concert conversation begin-

G. Love certainly has come a long way in the 20 years since drummer Jeffrey "The Houseman" Clemens discovered him performing in a Boston pub. The two started playing together and, after Clemens brought in upright bassist James "Jimi Jazz" Prescott, G. Love & Special Sauce was born. Their self-titled debut, featuring the hit "Cold Beverage," wound up going gold. The band became known for their live shows and performed around the world. G. Love has played with and without Special Sauce over the years, but now the trio is back together. G. Love believes the current manifestation of the band is stronger than ever and is riding a creative high, adding "and we didn't want to kill each other."

"When you get the spark, you got to ride that energy," says G. Love, and that spark certainly ignites on his 10th studio full-length "Love Saves The Day.



The band was excited to reteam with Sugar engineer and producer Robert Carranza (Jack Johnson, Beastie Boys, Mars Volta). They recorded live with few edits to capture the immediacy of the music: G. Love making his guitar snarl and his harmonica moan, bassist Prescott bringing nimble funk to

the bottom end and Clemens' drum work cracling with power.

The new album completes the trilogy for G. Love that started with 2011's "Fixin To Die." That disc stripped his music down to its roots and saw him record with The



Avett Brothers, while Sugar, in G. Love's words, "reconnected the blues with the electric side" and reunited the original trio to create the band's signature style of blending John Lee Hooker blues with "Golden Era" hip-hop beats. On "Love Saves The Day," the group dives even deeper, making the grooves heavier, the music rawer and the performances

more authentic.

G. Love proudly describes himself as a road dog who "will be touring until I fall off the earth" and plans to keep on pushing with Special Sauce from stage to stage. Whether "Love Saves The Day" makes one dollar or a million isn't a big concern to him. It stands as a huge success because he made the gritty, honest album that he intended by "keeping it raw, keeping it immediate, keeping it real." It's an approach that he has honed over the years: "be original and be true to what you do."






