



## PZA recommends approval of development plans for Oak Bridge Club

The St. Johns County Planning and Zoning Agency (PZA) last Thursday unanimously recommended approval of zoning and land use changes that would allow Alta Mar Holdings LLC to sell six holes of the Oak Bridge Club golf course for development into an age restricted residential community (55+) up to 330 units and four acres of commercial uses with a maximum of 15,000 square feet.

The PZA specifically recommended approval of Alta Mar's requests for changes to the Caballos del Mar Development of Regional Impact (DRI) and Players Club at Sawgrass Planned Unit Development (PUD), which would allow the property owners to allocate existing, vested development rights to the golf course. Alta Mar's plans will go before the St. Johns County Board of County Commissioners for final deliberation on Jan. 16, 2018.


"A great result, not just for our team, but for the entire community," said David Miller of Alta Mar Holdings LLC, the owner of the Oak Bridge Club, following the Dec. 7 PZA hearing in St. Augustine. "A lot of people didn't give us a snowball's chance in you know where of getting this to this point."

David Miller and his partner and cousin Jeff Miller purchased the mortgage note for the Oak Bridge Club in 2014 after the club's former operator went into default. They initially believed a buyer would purchase the course but soon learned its condition would make that difficult. Couple that with the nosedive of the golf industry, said David Miller, and no buyer emerged. They foreclosed on the golf course in late 2015 and faced the reality that the club was losing

The Millers hired Jacksonville-based engineering firm Prosser to determine which parcels of the property were developable and set a plan in motion to raise capital.

The plan? Sell the course's back 40 acres, with 23 of those acres to be developed, and reduce the course's holes from 18 to 12. Two of the proposed parcels of land (A1 and A2) would be developed for an age restricted community (55+). Parcel A1 would be for single-story residences (maximum building height of 24 feet), while building on Parcel A2 would be capped at three stories (maximum height of 58 feet). David Miller has said Vicar's Landing is interested in that property to expand upon its senior living

According to the plan, a third parcel (Parcel B) along A1A would be developed for either 15,000 square feet of

commercial/civic space or additional residences. David Miller has noted that the Cultural Center at Ponte Vedra Beach is interested in this property.

The Oak Bridge owners said the property abutting Oak Bridge, Water Oak and Cypress Creek known as Parcel C would not be developed and would be used for retention ponds and green space. Parcel D, which abuts Bridgewater Island, would also be used for green space and would serve as a buffer, they added.

The Sawgrass Players Club Master HOA Board asked the Millers to invest in the club as an act of good faith. The property owners consequently redeveloped the clubhouse, tennis courts, driving range and more at the tune of \$2.5 million. The board then mandated that \$2 million from the potential sale of the property go into escrow and be deployed into the remaining 12 holes of the course.

This is the plan and agreement the HOA board ultimately agreed to, as well as the residents within the community encompassing 1,800 homes. In February 2017, these residents voted three-to-one to lift a restriction on the 23 developable acres of the course that required they remain a golf course until 2023. The vote allowed the land to be

sold, in exchange for a deed restriction that would guarantee the 100 other acres of the course remain a golf course until 2057.

"I think the crux of this project is it's a win, win, win situation for the vast majority of constituents," said David Miller. "The alternative is grim and dire. I think that's why we've had such an abundance of support."

#### Reaction at the PZA hearing

Sawgrass Players Club President Gerry Klingman kicked off public comment, expressing his support for the Oak Bridge plans. He said over 72 percent of the community responded to the vote in February, which is the largest turnout it's had for such an initiative. Of the 72 percent, he said 75 percent approved lifting the restriction.

"The whole community was involved," commented Klingman. "We definitely feel it is a win-win for the Sawgrass Players Club, and we feel it's going to enhance all of our property."

Much of the opposition, meanwhile, said the potential development will increase traffic.

Resident Michael Burns cited the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization's (TPO) recent study that revealed a rather gloomy forecast for traffic conditions in Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley and said this development will only make it worse. Burns also disputed Alta Mar's argument that residents of an age restricted or senior community will drive less; he said the older he gets, the more trips he takes and the more people that will visit him. Others expanded upon this argument and said staff of the community would also add to the traffic.

In response, Alta Mar attorney Ellen Avery-Smith said the master developer of the Caballos del Mar DRI has mitigation for traffic impact that dates to 1975.

"We are seeking to add 330 residential units and four acres of commercial from the existing, vested, mitigated development rights in the Caballos del Mar DRI," she explained. "That's the legal position we have."

David Miller added that because the community would be age restricted, residents in that demographic are not likely to be travelling at peak hours.

Linda Householder, whose property abuts the Oak Bridge golf course, said she's worried about access to and from the project.

"They're going to have to do a U-turn, either go south or do a U-turn to go north," she said.

Avery-Smith said there will be at least one access

## Ponte Vedra Beach residents encouraged to get informed, engaged in local development proposals

At a meeting of the Ponte Vedra Beaches Coalition Wednesday, Dec. 6, Ponte Vedra Beach residents were encouraged to be more civically engaged regarding proposed development projects in the area.

"You're really unique here in Ponte

Vedra, and I think it behooves all of you to get really familiar with the codes that govern you specifically, because they aren't the same rules that the rest of the county has to play by," said Jane West, managing partner of Jane West Law and chair of the City of St. Augustine Beach Planning and Zoning Board. "Getting to know those

district regulations is really important for, in my opinion, everyone who lives here in Ponte Vedra—especially since the growth is so exponential these days."

With a long list of development proposals currently in the works for the Ponte Vedra Beach area, West and St. Johns County Director of Growth Management

Suzanne Konchan were invited to give presentations regarding the ways in which residents could become more involved in the approval process. According to Konchan, one easy way to stay informed is by making use of the resources provided on

## MSD Board expects CTTF traffic survey results to be released soon

At this month's meeting of the Ponte Vedra Beach Municipal Service District (MSD) Board of Trustees, Chairman John Wegl said the Ponte Vedra/Palm Valley Citizens Traffic Task Force Board (CTTF) is planning to release the results of its recent traffic surveys following a meeting with county staff scheduled for next week.

The CTTF circulated the first of its two online traffic surveys in October, collecting input on short-term improvements that can be made to various intersections in Ponte Vedra Beach and Palm Valley that would improve traffic flow and safety. A second survey was circulated in mid-November asking for input on the widening of A1A and Mickler Road.

Both surveys were developed by the CTTF Board to solicit feedback from area residents and businesses as a result of recommendations proposed in a recent study commissioned by St. Johns County and the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (TPO).

Wegl said the CTTF Board will review the survey feedback with county staff next week and then release all pertinent information to the public. Wegl did not provide a specific date for exactly when or how that information will be made available.

In other news, Trustee Brad Wester said a contractor for JEA is currently replacing pods in MSD residents' yards that are part of the vacuum sewer system. He said it's an ongoing project with no end date.

"They're out there putting these protections in to reduce any potential backups in the homes and businesses," he said. "You'll see them. They're contractor trucks so they're not specific to JEA."

Wester also said pavers have been implemented at two beach access points in the district as part of the MSD's ongoing beautification efforts. One is just south of the Ponte Vedra Inn & Club, he said, and the other is across from San Diego Road.

Wester noted that these are the two most heavily used access points other than the one at Solana Road.

The MSD Board discussed code enforcement at the end of the meeting. Wegl kicked off the discussion by asking the board if they should help the county with prioritizing the PRIDE complaints (anonymous, online complaints sent by residents to the county) it receives from Ponte Vedra. Wegl said the county has grown impatient with the number of PRIDE complaints coming out of their area.

Trustee Kitty Switkes said she analyzed the Ponte Vedra PRIDE complaints and doesn't believe Ponte Vedra's number is any higher than other areas in the county. She also doesn't think the MSD has the right to prioritize complaints by citizens of the area.

"Ponte Vedra was the first zoning district that has rules," she said. "The reason why we have such good community appearance is because we have those rules. And if people are sending in PRIDES, and they're supposed to be anonymous, then I don't see how the MSD can prioritize complaints by citizens of our area. We have the rules, and people have the right to point them out. This is the system the county has set up."

Vice chairman Gary Jurenovich voiced his opposition to the PRIDE complaint process and said residents should instead approach such situations as educational opportunities.

"If somebody dumps their yard trimmings on the street, if somebody has garbage out two or three days in advance, I think it's an educational issue, and I think we'd be more suited to go talk to that resident instead of simply turning in yet another PRIDE complaint," he said.

The next MSD meeting is Jan. 6, 2018, at the Ponte Vedra Beach Branch Library, where the board will elect a new chairman, vice-chairman and treasurer.

driveway from A1A to the property. She also said the HOA Board is considering a perpetual easement over a portion of the site that would create a legal access to Sawgrass Village Drive. The attorney noted that the Millers are negotiating with the Sawgrass Village Association to do so.

A few other residents of adjacent communities such as Hidden Oaks also expressed concerns over their property

#### **Ponte Vedra Central Park**

Ponte Vedra resident and local realtor Cindey Nordman attended the hearing on behalf of the Ponte Vedra Central Park initiative, a grassroots fundraising campaign to purchase the 40 acres of the Oak Bridge Club and turn it into a public park.

Nordman said the organization was incorporated in May, received its tax-exempt status in June and has every intention to preserve the land.

In previous conversations with the Re-

corder, Nordman and fellow organization leader Jake Bestic said Ponte Vedra needs such a park.

"Our town is severely lacking in open green space, public playgrounds, ball fields, exercise paths, that kind of thing, and we're not lacking in population and we're not lacking in automobile traffic," said Bestic. "I just think it's up to us to decide, citizens of this community, what the best use of the land is. I cannot see or envision an instance where a 55+ community adds any benefits to our local community."

During the PZA hearing, David Miller said he will maintain a dialogue with the community park representatives, even with the zoning change, if they can raise the funds in the necessary timeframe to purchase the property.

Bestic and Nordman noted that their organization needs more funding to ultimately pay for the land. They said they also need more volunteers and help in spreading awareness about their campaign. #### **PZA Board deliberation**

PZA Board member Dr. David Rice first expressed his support of the project, saying he doesn't recall an applicant who has completed more due diligence than the Millers. He also reiterated Avery-Smith's argument that the traffic generated by the development has already been paid and mitigated for due to the vested development rights. As a result, he said the board doesn't have legal standing to vote the plan down due to traffic.

Board chair Jeffrey Martin also called the project a win-win.

"It's either residential units that are age restricted and therefore less impactful than traditional residential, or you get a piece of property that's falling into blithe, which is not going to be good for anyone, especially in Ponte Vedra," he said.

Board member Jon Woodard responded to the property value concerns of adjacent properties and said he understands it but without seeing a study that spells out that potential impact, he can't "put a lot of weight into" it.

After each board member expressed their support of the project and voted

accordingly, David Miller said it was a rewarding feeling to see his efforts pay off.

"It has nothing to do with monetary feeling," he said. "It's that government still works in America. It's that community government still works. HOAs still do what's best for that community. And you can get a result like this. That's encouraging for our country and our county."

#### Can you please briefly tell us about your background?

My wife Laura and I raised our son and daughter in Westchester County, New York. Both of our children are married, and we have two granddaughters, with a third on the way. Prior to moving to Ponte Vedra three years ago, I worked as an investment banker in New York City for more than 30 years at large firms such as Salomon Brothers, Lehman Brothers and JP Morgan Chase. After 2008, I developed an interest in notfor-profit work and "social justice." This led me first to work for Opportunity Finance Network in Philadelphia and then to the CEO position at Family Foundations here in Jacksonville.

## How would you describe Family Foundations to someone who is not familiar with the organization?

Family Foundations is a 60-year-old social services agency that focuses attention on people in need. Our demographic includes people at or near the poverty level, and our caring professionals provide mental health and financial counseling, often at no cost, to provide individuals with critical skills to navigate life's challenges. Our mission is to "grow strong, money-wise families," and our ultimate objective is to help families break the cycle of intergenerational poverty.

#### How can a family in need obtain your organization's assistance?

Family Foundations has its main office in the Jessie Ball duPont Center on East Adams Street in Jacksonville. People in need can access us in different ways. We accept walk-in traffic at our office; we also have partnerships with many other not-for-profits, including the United Way 2-1-1 emergency line.

#### What's the mission of 1000 in 1000?

Family Foundations administers this landmark program, which is unique to Jacksonville. 1000 in 1000 is a "theory of change" that employs a collective impact model of partners joining hands to contribute needed services that help individuals and families trapped in low-income status. Our research has taught us that families need certain pivotal assets to begin to build a living wage and increase self-sufficiency. The 1000 in 1000 leadership group includes philanthropic interests, social services, governmental and educational resources, legal and medical. Basic needs include affordable housing, quality child care, transportation solutions and job training. Additionally, there are medical and legal services, as well as financial education and mental health resources. Our current cohort includes 211 families with 405 children. Forty-six percent of the families in the group have scored average income gains of 20 percent and have achieved stable and aspirational job goals.

## Rodeheaver Foundation receives grant to build military-style obstacle course

Rodeheaver Foundation has received a grant to create a military-style obstacle course to benefit the boys at Rodeheaver Boys Ranch and honor fallen soldier Sgt. Timothy Officer. The organization also recently built a learning center with funds from a St. Johns County and Palatka Rotary Club Grant.

Children without a place to live due to parental death, desertion, divorce, disability or dysfunction can make Rodeheaver Boys Ranch their home. The ranch, which is located in Palatka, has been providing complete care for up to 50 disadvantaged boys over the last 68 years.

Sgt. Timothy A. Officer, a tactical air control party airman, stayed at the ranch as a child before serving 14 years in the Air Force during which he was deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan. He won the Bronze Star twice, once with the "V" device for valor, and over 20 medals and ribbons. Officer died in 2015 from a parachute-training incident during a military freefall training exercise at Elgin Air Force Base in Florida. The sergeant visited the ranch prior to the accident and showed interest in building a military-style obstacle course on the property.

The Rodeheaver Boys Ranch just completed his proposed obstacle course thanks to a grant from the Lastinger Family Foundation.

The ranch sits on 800 acres of land in

Palatka; it has its own boy scout camp, vehicle program, learning and tutoring center, equestrian program, garden and obstacle course.

Rodeheaver Foundation has also received a grant from the Quad Club Rotary Collaboration of St. Johns County and the Rotary Club of Palatka to build a learning center on the property. The center would replicate a modern library or student center and be used as a place for boys to be tutored with homework, SAT prep and other academics. The grants have allowed the foundation to build classrooms at the ranch with almost 20 new computers and laptops. Rodeheaver is currently fundraising for a part-time tutor to make use of the property's new learning center. Having a funded tutor in the past helped the ranch boys consistently maintain an overall grade point average of 3.00 or better. Rodeheaver Boys Ranch and Rodeheaver Foundation do not receive any government funding.

Rodeheaver Foundation is hosting its third annual fundraising tournament benefitting Rodeheaver Boys Ranch March 10, 2018, at the Palatka City Docks. This event draws registrants and boats from various cities in Northeast Florida, including St. Augustine, Palm Coast, Ponte Vedra, Palatka, Gainesville and Jacksonville. the St. Johns County website.

"There's a ton of information on there, and I want to encourage everyone to go visit it," Konchan said, singling out the website's "Development Tracker" – an interactive map that details all the current development projects throughout the county – as a particularly helpful tool

For those considering legal action, West emphasized that it is important to consider the ramifications, including legal fees and possible countersuits. She also advised that those who wish to challenge a specific development must be prepared to demonstrate a significant personal interest in the matter.

"If you challenge a local government's development order on the basis that it is inconsistent, you've got to have the standing, which means you have to allege an interest that exceeds the degree of just the general interest," she explained, stating that a person who lives directly adjacent to a proposed development — or one who regularly participates in activities near that development — would have a good case for standing.

As for increasing civic engagement, West proposed holding public meetings in which residents can speak one-on-one with developers as a good method not only for raising public awareness, but also for conflict resolution.

"If you know of a development, I would encourage you to ask the developer to come to meetings like this and educate you," she said. "It shows a level of transparency, and we don't always have the luxury for [discussion] in public hearings, because those are governed by a different set of rules."

West closed with a call to action, stating, "It's not easy engaging, but I really hope you do. I think it's our duty as citizens to make sure that we do for future generations."




### Landrum Middle School hosts annual science fair

In the life sciences category, seventh grade student Sai Prakash took first place with her study entitled "Neem vs. Chemi-





## Tips to avoid overspending during the holiday season

The chance to give gifts and spend time with loved ones makes the holiday season a special time of year. But for many people, the holiday season often leads to overspending.

A 2016 survey from the American Research Group found that American shoppers anticipated spending an average of \$930 on gifts that holiday season. Data from T. Rowe Price confirms that parents are spending between \$400 and \$500 per child each year. 





## Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation packs over 3,500 bags of food for local children in need at 'Hope for the Holidays' event

Last week's poor weather conditions may have forced the Jim & Tabitha Furyk Foundation to change venues for its annual "Hope for the Holidays" event, but it didn't stop the charitable organization from ultimately helping those in need once again.

For the sixth year in a row, the Ponte Vedra-based foundation organized a group of community volunteers to pack bags of food for underprivileged, First Coast children to ensure they don't go hungry over the holiday school break. With initial plans to hold the event in the TPC Sawgrass parking lot, Mother Nature had other plans, forcing the organization to relocate its efforts indoors to the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall within 48 hours of the packing initiative.

"I was driving here today in the rain and actually started crying because it's just amazing how many people have come into play to make this happen," said Tabitha Furvk before the Dec. 7 event. "The PGA Tour, their employees, the Ponte Vedra Concert Hall just to give us the facility. And then, just all day we've been receiving donations to help us pay for these bags."

The foundation ultimately packed over 3,500 bags filled with canned ham, green beans, mashed potatoes, stuffing, cornbread, special treats like hot cocoa and more. In 2011, the organization packed 500 bags of food when the inaugural event was held.


'There has been a lot of growth that's been due to a lot of support from our community," said PGA Tour golfer Jim Furyk. "It's been a real fun project."

The packing process at the holiday event began with volunteers grabbing a red bag and then moving down the line to fill it with one of each food item. After collecting each of the items, volunteers then ended the process by tying the bag and placing it with the others, which were soon lifted into the back of a truck. The Furyks emphasize that this experience provides families, especially local kids, with an opportunity to truly understand what it's like to give during the holidays.

schools in Duval and St. Johns counties in the First Coast Blessings in a Backpack Program, which is a nonprofit organization that provides consistent weekend nutrition for children on the federal free and reduced meal program. Since these students rely on the schools' subsidized meals, they usually don't have enough food at home to eat during the holiday break. Data provided by Feeding Northeast Florida reports there are 81,660 children in the area who are unsure of where the next meal will come from and the foundation said it has certainly seen the need increasing each year.



## Jaguars make statement with win over Seahawks

#### By Jon Blauvelt

As First Coast fans erupted in "Let's go Jaguars" and "DU-VAL" chants in the closing minutes of Jacksonville's victory last weekend over Seattle, one fact became apparent: The Jacksonville Jaguars are for real.

With both teams entering the contest 8-4, the Jaguars topped the Seahawks 30-24 and are now 9-4 on the season and in sole possession of the AFC South lead after the Tennessee Titans lost to the Arizona Cardinals. The win guarantees the Jaguars their first winning season since 2007.

"I was excited for our players," said Jaguars coach Doug Marrone. "I was excited for our fans to come out there today. I thought all three phases kind of complimented each other at times during the game, which I think you have to do to win games late in the season in December."

Jacksonville receiver Jaydon Mickens, who returned a punt in the third quarter 72 yards, said the game was a statement win for the Jaguars.

"This is a game that nobody picked us to win, and if they did pick us to win, it wasn't by

much," he said, adding that the win sent a message to the rest of the NFL. "The Jacksonville Jaguars are here. They're here, they're ready to play, they're focused, they're hungry and they're resilient."

Coming into the game, the question for Jacksonville was simple: Could the Jaguars con-

tain quarterback Russell Wilson? For three quarters of play, Jacksonville did just that, forcing three interceptions from Seattle's most potent weapon and limiting him to only 13 completions for 122 yards.

"We just had to strike fear in his heart," said defensive end Yannick Ngakoue, who finished with one of the defense's two sacks. "From the first plays we were just trying to get to him and hit him and keep him contained, and that's what we did. We did a great job of it, and the defense from the back seven and the DBs did a great job of locking down."

The Jaguars capitalized on the defensive's efforts with points on

the scoreboard, thanks in large part to the impressive efforts of quarterback Blake Bortles against a historically strong defense in Seattle. The Jacksonville signal caller finished 18 of 27 for 268 yards and two touchdowns.

"I felt as though I put our offense in a chance to score points," said Bortles. "Obviously not turning the ball over is a big part of that."

After coming out of halftime with a 3-0 lead due to a 38-yard field goal from Josh Lambo, the action picked up for Jackson-ville in the third quarter. On the Jaguars' first drive in the second half, quarterback Blake Bortles orchestrated a five play, 42-yard drive that was capped off by a beautiful 18-yard fade to rookie wide receiver Dede Westbrook.

Seattle responded with a 28-yard field goal from Blair Walsh and then a 26-yard touchdown pass from Wilson to Doug Baldwin after Jacksonville's Corey Grant fumbled a kick return. Jacksonville's response, however, was stronger. Bortles connected with receiver Keelan Cole on a 75-yard touchdown bomb, and a few minutes later,

running back Leonard Fournette pounded in a 1-yard rushing touchdown after the Mickens punt return. Fournette finished his strong day on the ground with 101 yards and a touchdown on 24 carries. Add in another Josh Lambo field goal at the beginning of the fourth quarter, and the Jaguars led 27-10 with 10 minutes remaining in the game.

"We knew we were going to have to score points," said Bortles. "I think guys did a really good job of when [Seattle] made big plays and scored touchdowns, no one got down or hung their head or anything. That's fine, we knew we could go back and score again so it was alright." The game wasn't over yet though. Wilson added 14 quick points off 61-yard and 74-yard touchdown passes to Paul Richardson and Tyler Lockett, respectively. Josh Lambo added his final field goal of the day between Seattle's two fourth quarter scores. With about four minutes to play, the Seahawks scratched and clawed their way within six points, but ultimately could not finish the comeback. After one

final stop, the Jaguars finished on top, 30-24


The game didn't end without its fair share of drama. Seahawks defensive linemen Sheldon Richardson and Quinton Jefferson were ejected following scuffles on consecutive plays as Bortles kneeled to end the game. On his way to the locker room, Jefferson ultimately got into a screaming match with a Jacksonville fan who threw a drink at him. The Seattle defensive lineman actually attempted to climb into the stands to retaliate, but EverBank Field security officials prevented him from doing so. Bortles had a simple response to the chippiness of the game.

"I think it's a little bit of people aren't used to getting beat like that by the Jaguars," the quarterback said. "We just beat the crap out of you for 60 minutes."

As for the next 60 minutes, the Jaguars will face the Houston Texans in the team's final home game of the season at 1 p.m. on Sunday. Following the win against the Seahawks, Marrone said there's still a lot of football left to be played.

"I also told the players, 'Hey listen, this is the first game of the fourth quarter. Let's not get distracted with any noise on the outside. Let's get ready," said Marrone. "We have a division opponent next week. You've got to get ready to play again, and obviously the season is not over. We're not going to get too high. We're not going to get too low. We're going to work our butts off and see if we can get ourselves ready for next week."
