Join salmon conservationists planting 10,000 trees

Tree planting, weed pulling and more

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The best way to battle the winter blues is to get outside and get your hands dirty.

It also happens that the best time to plant trees is in the winter.

That's why the North Olympic Salmon Coalition is hosting a series of planting parties in February and March.

"We plant in the winter so young trees and shrubs that go in the ground can spend their energy establishing root systems and prepare for spring growth," wrote Rian Plastow, NOSC Education and Outreach Associate, in an email response to questions from The Leader. "The winter time is also the wet season and so the plants have access to more water than they would in the dry months."

January has been one of the wettest winters on record. Seattle experienced a full month of rain—with no dry days in January except for New Year's Day. Cities like Olympia, Hoquiam and Forks had record-setting amounts of rain in January, according to the National Weather Service. In Olympia, the rain broke an all-time record of 29 days set in 1953.

It might seem like a gloomy winter for humans, but for trees it's perfect. Not

only that, but a greater snowpack in the Olympics means there will be full streams in the summertime.

The North Olympic Salmon Coalition has a goal of planting 10,000 stems in the ground this winter.

"All of these will be native trees and shrubs," Plastow said. "Our Americorps Washington Conservation Crew is a huge help—planting thousands of trees in Jefferson and Clallam counties with state agencies, the tribes and willing landowners."

Volunteers can join in the planting fun by going to the coalition's website and registering for one of its planting parties. Volunteers will need to dress in warm clothing and prepare to plant in muddy areas, but warm drinks are provided at each planting party. To learn more, go to nosc.org/events.

The Jefferson Land Trust is also hosting a series of stewardship work parties this spring. These work parties typically focus on removing non-native species from the Land Trust's preserved land in Jefferson County.

The first one coming up is at the Chai-yahk-Wh Preserve on Marrowstone Island on Feb. 25, where volunteers will help remove non-native blackberry, ivy, holly and spurge laurel to allow a diversity of trees, shrubs, and understory to thrive. They will plant conifers in openings below the red alder understory to help restore the conifer forest. To RSVP for a work party with the Land Trust, go to saveland.org.

Local soccer players form new league, tryouts March 8

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Tryouts for the Northern Peninsula's newest soccer league will be held on March 8 at Sequim's Albert Haller Playfields.

The new league, called the Northern Peninsula Football League, is a new semi-pro soccer club started by soccer enthusiasts from Jefferson County.

Joost Besjin, who has been involved in Jefferson County's recreational soccer teams, is leading the new team as manager.

"There's been a few pick-up soccer groups in Jefferson County over the years," he said. "I know the one in Port Townsend has been around for 30 years. But we wanted to take the next step."

So Besjin and a few other rec soccer players applied to join the Western Washington Premier League, an elite amateur men's soccer competition with teams from all over the western part of the state, including Seattle, Lacey, Bremerton and others.

"If you're an adult and you want to play at a higher level,

there are few options out there," Besjin said.

This team is an opportunity for soccer players of all ages and from across the Peninsula to flex their skills.

However, while most rec soccer teams are co-ed, the new club is only for men.

"I wanted it to be co-ed," Besjin said. "But currently the Western Washington Premier League is only a men's league."

Still, the new club is looking to fill an entire roster, including starting line-up, bench and reserve positions. There are many spots to be filled, and Besjin hopes to see a lot of people show up for tryouts.

"I really want it to be an inclusive club," Besjin said. "We wanted to make it as low-cost for players as possible."

The tryouts will be held at 1 p.m. on March 8 at the Albert Haller Playfields in Sequim. It costs \$30 to try out and another \$35 to join the team.

The league's home base will be Memorial Field in Sequim, where they will have five home games during the 2020 season, which kicks off on April 25 and goes through July 11.

The rest of the league's costs will be covered by sponsors. So far, they already have one team sponsor, Henery

Hardware, but are on the search for more. They are also doing some online fundraising with a GoFundMe page. Those who want to learn more can visit the league's website, at northernpeninsulaafc.com.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

Recreational soccer isn't just for adults. Jefferson County Parks and Recreation offers spring youth soccer for kids Pre-K to sixth grade each spring.

"This is our biggest youth spring program," said Chris Macklin, director of the county's recreation programs. "We get teams from Port Hadlock, Quilcene, Port Townsend and even down in Brinnon sometimes."

In rain or shine, each division will practice their soccer skills starting April 13 and concluding at the end of May. Children on teams will have the chance to play against other rec-league teams. Games and practices will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays at 4:30 p.m. for Pre-K to second grade, and 5:30 p.m. for third through sixth grade. Registration for spring soccer ends on March 6. Learn to sail from experts in PT classes, programs

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There's no bad weather. Only bad gear.

So says last year's winner of the Shipwrights Regatta, Spencer Snapp, who wore his wetsuit while sailing the small vessel Zaya in the windy race.

The Shipwrights Regatta is the annual race that kicks off the sailing season in Port Townsend. Every year, despite the cold, windy and rainy February weather, the heartiest sailors and boat builders in Port Townsend form their crews and head out into the bay to race against one another.

This year, the race is set to take place on Feb. 29. It is the first of many opportunities to sharpen your sailing skills in preparation for summer.

For those who need to brush up on sailing, rigging or self-sufficiency skills, Port Townsend can be a place to learn from masters.

The Northwest Maritime Center offers classes and programs each month on navigation, tides and prepping your boat.

The classes can help mariners prepare for the summer, or people interested in marine activities. People who don't have a boat or have never sailed before are welcome.

Beyond the Maritime Center, classes from local businesses such as the Artful Sailor, who teach sail-sewing and knife-sharpening skills, and from schools such as the Northwest School of Wooden Boat Building offer opportunities to learn self-sufficiency when you're out on the water.

SHE TELLS SEA TALES

Get inspired to sail at the Northwest Maritime Center's annual She Tells Sea Tales event, an evening of sea stories told by female mariners.

The evening raises funds for the Girls Boat Project, a program of the NW Maritime Center for girls aged 12-18.

The Girls Boat Project students gain skills and have fun in the maritime trades, both on and off the water. They learn woodworking and boat building techniques in the fall and winter and receive longboat training in the spring.

The program is led by female role models skilled in boatbuilding, woodworking and sailing from the Northwest Maritime Center staff.

She Tells Sea Tales takes place at 6 p.m. on March 14 at the Northwest Maritime Center, 431 Water St. in Port Townsend.

RIG YOUR BOAT WORKSHOP

Brion Toss offers three days of rigging workshops, March 27-29, at his shop, Brion Toss Yacht Riggers, located at Point Hudson.

Students will learn design, sizing and layout of rigging for their own boat, basic splicing, and get hands-on experience with drills, taps, rivets, tuning gauges, deck hardware and other tools.

They will also hear a few tips and tricks on how to work aloft safely and productively.

BLADE-SHARPENING WORKSHOP

Since every sailor and stitchmate needs a good knife and shears, The Artful Sailor will offer a workshop on blade sharpening March 7.

Port Townsend's Alex Moro, the "King of Cutlery," has been using and sharpening blades since childhood. Owner of Al's Blade Service, Moro will impart some tricks of the blade-sharpening trade for students.

HAND SEWING SKILLS WORKSHOP

The Artful Sailor will offer a workshop on basic palm and needle canvas work on March 28.

Students will learn how to make a sailor's "ditty bag," using all-natural materials, such as canvas, twine and beeswax. Along the way, they will learn a variety of stitches and sewing skills that might be useful for any sail repair when out on the water.

HEAVING LINE WORKSHOP

The Artful Sailor is offering a six-hour workshop on making heaving lines by hand on April 18. The class will feature hands-on making as well as instruction on throwing a heaving line. The workshop includes a light lunch, all materials and tools for making a monkey's fist heaving line, and plenty of guided instruction.

TIDES AND CURRENTS

The Northwest Maritime Center offers classes on tides and currents—an important skill for kayakers, rowers, sailors and boaters, especially when taking on difficult areas like the Admiralty Inlet and the Strait of Juan de Fuca. The class, which typically takes place from 9 a.m. to noon, will teach students about the nature of Puget Sound waters and how tides can affect daily life and water activities.

WEATHER CLASSES

The Northwest Maritime Center

offers a monthly class on weather each spring.

Taught by meteorology professor David Wilkinson, the course will have different themes each month, including learning how to use a barometer, how to keep a weather log and understanding how to navigate strong weather events.

Learning how land affects wind speed and direction over coastal and inland waters will help sailors use basic weather principles to predict winds and sea states for their next cruise.

OUTBOARD MAINTENANCE

The Northwest Maritime Center's outboard maintenance classes will help boaters get ready for the summer season.

Students will learn the basics of simple and routine small outboard-motor maintenance, including changing the oil, fuel, lubrication, electrical inspection and diagnosis of common problems.

No dates for these last three classes have been set yet, but the Northwest Maritime Center will have its 2020 program schedule on its website by the end of February.

Outdoor fun, from camping to beach-walking to growing plants

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In between the periods of dark and gloomy rain, seize a chance to get out in the sun as the weather starts to warm up and the flowers begin to bloom.

Here are a few outdoor (and indoor) activities being offered around the Olympic Peninsula this spring.

BIRDING

Washington State and the Pacific Northwest are unique from other regions in that they boast year-round birding opportunities with a mild climate and a large host of year-round species.

Local birding clubs such as the Admiralty Audubon Society are always hosting bird walks and other events, such as lectures and trash clean-ups, which anyone can attend.

Join them March 3 and April 7 for the regular first Tuesday of the month walks at 9 a.m. at Point Hudson. The similar first Saturday walks at

Fort Flagler will be held at 9 a.m. on March 7 and April 4. There is also the opportunity to participate in a special walk on the Cape George section of the Larry Scott Trail Saturday April 25 at 9 a.m. Learn more at admiralty-audubon.org.

The Quimper Universalist Unitarian Fellowship will also offer a special birding opportunity in April through their Adult Learning Programs.

The field trip is led by Rod Mitchell, Dave Rugh and Dave Covert and will take birders to Bowerman Basin on April 23 to view one of the largest concentrations of shore birds in North America.

Attendees can either return to town or continue on the trip to Tokeland to stay the night at the historic hotel and travel the next morning, April 24, to the Willapa National Wildlife Refuge and the Johns River Wildlife Area for more shore bird viewing. QUUF will host several other outdoor trips in the spring including a day trip April 15 to Bloedel Garden Reserve on Bainbridge Island for a 2-mile hike and a day trip to the Dungeness Forest for a 7-mile hike.

The Port Townsend Marine Science Center will also host its yearly birding cruise to Protection Island at 1 p.m. on April 18 and 25.

Cost is \$80 per person (\$60 with a PTMSC membership) and the tour is approximately three hours.

Participants will get to go by boat to nearby Protection Island Aquatic Reserve to observe seabirds and marine life and learn about the history of the island and bird migrations.

CAMPGROUNDS OPENING

Jefferson County campgrounds in Quilcene, at Lake Leland and on Oak Bay, will open April 1 for the start of their regular season.

The upper Oak Bay campground,

at 290 Cleveland St. in Port Ludlow, has 20 available spaces costing \$25 per night with electrical hookups and \$20 per night without.

This long-term database is the nation's richest source of information on avian reproductive biology.
