Pharis and Jason Romero: British Columbia



Pharis has been singing and playing music her whole life. An early student of classical and country, she grew up performing with her family's band and learning the songs and stories that made her want to dig deeper. These days she performs mostly

with her husband Jason, and is equally at home disappearing into an old-time jam as she is singing on stage or teaching the joy of song and sound. She's the Artistic Director for Voice Works, has won three Juno Awards for her recordings with Jason, and is a three-time Canadian Folk Music Awards Traditional Singer of the Year.

Linda McRae: Tennessee



Linda is perhaps best-known for her eight-year tenure as a member of the platinum-selling band Spirit of the West. Performing on banjo, guitar and accordion, her warm and world-weary voice, unforgettable melodies, and thought-provoking lyrics make McRae a captivating and sought-after

artist. Linda's enjoyed recording and performing with musical luminaries such as Bruce Cockburn, Neko Case, Alejandro Escovedo, Gurf Morlix, and Ray Waylie Hubbard.

Albanie Falletta: Louisiana



A native of Monroe, Louisiana, Albanie was in her formative years exposed to the local music of Louisiana: the sounds of Cajun, zydeco, blues and gospel musics at festivals and backyard parties. Shortly after relocating with her family to San Marcos, Texas at

the age of nine, Albanie began taking guitar lessons and developing an interest in acoustic-roots and electric blues, punk rock, and hair metal. Albanie began her love and study of early American Jazz as a freshman in high school in Wimberley, Texas, when she was exposed to the Parisian Romani guitarist Django Reinhardt.

Elizabeth LaPrelle and Brian Dolphin, Washington



Elizabeth LaPrelle is exceptional in her devotion to and mastery of the ancient and deep art of Appalachian unaccompanied singing. She performs the old mountain ballads and songs with a sense of conviction, honor, honesty,

and an emotional force that evokes the great Appalachian ballad singers of generations past. Raised in Rural Retreat, Virginia, she came from a home where there was always singing, and a community with many fine old-time musicians.

Cruz and Epi Martinez: Texas



Epi Martinez has been playing music with family and friends since he was 6 years old. His first musical influences could be credited to his parents Epifanio and Cruz Martinez. He grew up hearing and playing Tejano and Conjunto music, but his family also loved country

music. Epi is a self-taught musician who plays many instruments such as drums, bajo sexto, guitar, bass, congas, vihuela, and more. Epi is a 2017 inductee into the Tejano Roots Hall of Fame.

Cruz Martinez, Epi's mom (and "secret weapon"), began singing with Epifanio Sr. many years ago. She continues sharing her award-winning vocals, now with her son, as they continue to preserve South Texas Conjunto Music. Cruz was honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the South Texas Conjunto Association in 2017. She and the late Epifanio Martinez Sr. were also honored with the Tejano Roots Hall of Fame induction in 2017.

Tim Eriksen: Massachusetts



Tim Eriksen is acclaimed for transforming American tradition with his startling interpretations of old ballads, love songs, shape-note gospel and dance tunes from New England and Southern Appalachia. Eriksen's own compositions have been featured in films like the Billy

Bob Thornton vehicle Chrystal and the upcoming documentary Behold the Earth. Eriksen's other notable work has included extensive contributions to Anthony Minghella's 2004 Oscar-winning film Cold Mountain as well as duo work with Eliza Carthy and the 2010 Grammy-nominated album Across the Divide with Afro-Cuban world-jazz pianist Omar Sosa.

Ellie Hakanson: Tennessee



Ellie plays fiddle and sings with Missy Raines and her group Allegeny, after five years of working with Jeff Scroggins and Colorado. She has been singing bluegrass music since she was a toddler. As a child she performed with the Hakanson Family Band at bluegrass festivals throughout Oregon and Washington, and as a teenager she began sitting in with many local Oregon and Washington bluegrass bands. Ellie was nominated for the 2018 IBMA Momentum award for Vocalist of the year, and the 2017 Momentum award for Instrumentalist of the year.

Eva Salina: New York



Brooklyn-based Eva Salina is a groundbreaking interpreter of Balkan Romani songs. Raised in the US Balkan Diaspora, Eva's mentors are some of the greatest living Balkan musicians. Eva's rich, supple voice moves effortlessly

through the intricate and demanding expression of Romani songs, intertwining vintage pop songs with her singular interpretations. A passionate activist for dialogue and mutual understanding, and an advocate for women in traditional and traditionally-based music, Eva is committed to a life of collaboration and evolving musical traditions.

Jefferson Hamer: New York



Jefferson Hamer is a songwriter, guitarist, and traditional musician based in Brooklyn, NY. His new album of original songs, Alameda, was released in 2018. Murphy Beds, his traditional acoustic duo with Eamon O'Leary,

features harmony vocals backed by intricate guitar and bouzouki accompaniment. He currently plays electric guitar and sings (and moonlights as a Bostonian) with the six-piece roots rock ensemble Session Americana. In 2016 he recorded and coproduced their album "Great Shakes".

Mara Kaye: California, with Ernie Vega: New York



Mara Kaye is that rare crossspecies phenomenon, a Blues Amphibian. When others "sing the blues" as if offering an unusual small plate at the tapas bar, Mara has so immersed herself in the idiom that she goes down to the

bottom and doesn't need air until the show is over. She's a modernist rather than a museum piece: her creations can be darkly mournful, savagely vengeful, or gleefully erotic, but they are always leavened with Brooklyn spice.

Ernie Vega



Ernie Vega, a singer/songwriter, guitarist, and mandolin player born and raised in Queens NY. Ernie is a staple of the New York's traditional and contemporary music scene. He performs the blues in an original way, detailing the precise finger-picking styles by masters like

Mississippi Fred McDowell. Ernie harbors a plethora of stories and information to go along with the songs. He is an aficionado of the blues, and a lovely character.

Greg Blake: Kansas



Greg Blake grew up in the mountains of southwest West Virginia, and when he sings, you can hear a voice that connects to the great old generations of mountain singers, invested with a rich twang and rumbling drawl, and the kind of eerily powerful high tenor cry that first inspired

the high, lonesome sound. Growing up Greg was immersed in the sounds of old country, mountain bluegrass, and gospel harmonies from a young age.

Kathy Bullock: Kentucky



Dr. Bullock is a professor of music at Berea College in Kentucky. A performer, conductor, accompanist, arranger, and scholar, she specializes in gospel music, spirituals and classical music of the African diaspora, sharing the joy of this music-culture

everywhere she goes. Dr. Bullock's research in African and African-American music and culture and the African diaspora has afforded her the opportunity to provide presentations including Singing in the Spirit, African-American Sacred Music and African-American and Appalachian Musical Connections.

Eddie Bond with Erynn Marshall, and Carl Jones - the New Ballards Branch Bogtrotters - Virginia





Old-time fiddling thrives in Grayson County, Virginia, which many consider the musical



heart of Southwestern Virginia and Appalachian old-time music. It is from here that one of the greatest living old-time fiddlers, Eddie Bond, hails. Though he has played on stages worldwide, Bond continues to be a central figure at local music festivals and

at picking parties in parking lots.

Jackson Lynch and Jerron Paxton - New York



Jackson Lynch is a guitar, banjo, and fiddle player from New York. His grandfather was a traditional Irish fiddler and taught Jackson some of his first tunes. Since then, he's immersed himself in down home music from all over. He's played fiddle in the old-time string band The Down Hill

Strugglers for just about a decade, and otherwise plays a range of traditional American music, including old-time fiddle music, Mexican and calypso fiddle tunes, country blues, jazz and honky tonk.



Jerron Paxton hails from a Creole family in Watts, South Central LA, but his people come from Louisiana, and you can hear Louisiana in his music. His range of repertoire, quick wit and fast rhyming poetry delivered with unbridled musical

freedom make us think of him as a musical savant. In addition, he mesmerizes audiences with his humor and storytelling.

Beòlach - Wendy MacIsaac, Màiri Rankin, and Mac Morin - Cape Breton



This powerhouse trio of Cape Breton musicians form the core of the awardwinning band Beòlach. They came together over 20 years ago

at a late-night session during the Celtic Colours International Music Festival. Cape Breton music is largely descended from the Scottish Gaelic melodies brought over to Cape Breton Island in the late 18th and early 19th centuries with the arrival of settlers fleeing the forced evictions known as the Highland Clearances. Known for innovative arrangements of traditional tunes, Beòlach's energy on stage demonstrates their mastery of and passion for their musical inheritance.

FEATURED ARTISTS:

Kevin and Daniel Carr and friends from Spain to Quebec - Oregon



For many decades, dynamic fiddler-piper-storyteller Kevin Carr has honed his craft in smoky Irish pubs, remote cabins in Quebec, at Fort Worden, and in dance halls across America. He's played banjo in Latvia, the fiddle in Russia, and along the way became a collector of

bagpipes – up to 31 and counting. Uilleann pipes were his first love, with Galician Gaita and Scottish Highland pipes coming later, along with various French, Italian, Eastern European, Scandinavian, and other smaller pipes. He is also fascinated with diatonic button accordion.

Dale Russ, Washington



Dale Russ is a friendly, unassuming man who plays Irish traditional music with distinctive clarity, articulation, and soul. Born in the U.S., he picked up the fiddle as a young adult in Washington State, far from the

urban Irish enclaves. Dale also tours Japan regularly, where he helped spark the interest in Irish music in the mid-1990s. He has taught advanced fiddle at the Lark in the Morning music camp for many years, and has an instructional video produced by Lark. Subtle, inventive, and steeped in the tradition, his intense work ethic and concentration are matched only by the sheer joyfulness of his music.

Danny Levin and Dick Gimble - swing from Texas



Danny Levin was raised serious classical by a violist dad and a pianist (and dancer) mom. Starting at age 10, he studied cello with Philadelphia Orchestra cellist Francis dePasquale. Frequent string quartet jamming with dad and others started a couple years later. He started

writing string music when he was 15. He joined Asleep at the Wheel shortly after its start in West Virginia in 1970. He was their first piano player and, eventually, their first fiddler. He was there for two of their many Grammys. Danny has performed or recorded with many legendary country greats, including Willie Nelson, Charlie Pride, Tom T. Hall, Dolly Parton, and many more.



Dick Gimble is the son of the late Johnny Gimble, the legendary Western swing fiddle player who was inducted into both the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame, and as an individual performer in the Country Music Hall of Fame. Dick has become one of the most well-known

bassists in Austin, backing up numerous country musicians onstage and in the studio. He ended up as a session player in Nashville, then moved back to Austin, playing gigs around town before accepting a teaching job at McLennan Community College, where he taught guitar for nearly 40 years.

Bruce Daigrepont, Gina Forsyth, and David Doucet Cajun dance music - Louisiana



Bruce Daigrepont's parents were part of a post-World War II migration of Cajuns to New Orleans from the rural farming communities of Avoyelles Parish, the forgotten part of Cajun country. When Bruce turned five, his father presented him

with a guitar, and by the age of ten he was also bearing down on a five-string banjo. It was in 1978, after attending the annual Festival Acadiens in Lafayette, that Bruce was inspired to devote himself to the French accordion. By 1980 he had his own Cajun band, and was honing his skills at regular Thursday-night fais do do dances at the Maple Leaf Bar. Over the next six years, Bruce almost single-handedly popularized Cajun music and Cajun dancing in cosmopolitan New Orleans.



Gina Forsyth grew up on hymns, country songs, and old-time fiddle tunes. In the mid-1980s, she moved to New Orleans to study classical and jazz violin at Loyola University and quickly developed an irrevocable passion for Cajun music. She's

an award-winning singer/songwriter, who is known for her wizardry on fiddle and guitar. Considered one of the finest Cajun fiddlers in Louisiana (no small feat), Gina is in demand from other great Louisiana musicians to play club gigs and festivals, some of the same talent that backs her up when she plays as Gina Forsyth and Friends.



The acoustic guitar has been transformed into an important voice of southwest Louisiana's Cajun music by David Doucet. The younger brother of Cajun fiddler Michael Doucet, he has used his distinctive hybrid of folk-style fingerpicking

and bluegrass-like flatpicking to strengthen the performances of Beausoleil, the band he's shared with his brother for more than four decades. In addition to his solo album and recordings with Beausoleil, Doucet was featured on albums by Chuck Guillory (Grand Texas), Octa Clark & Hector Duhon (Ensemble Encore) and Michael Doucet (Dit Beausoleil).

John Haywood - Kentucky



John Haywood is a banjoplaying tattoo and folk artist in Whitesburg, Kentucky. He owns and operates the Parlor Room Tattoo and Art Gallery – a tattoo shop that draws visitors from all over the world to Letcher County into the far southeastern corner of Kentucky. John

attended the Old Regular Baptist Church with his papaw, where he heard him sing the old unaccompanied songs of Zion. He has studied with banjo master and historian George Gibson, played solo, and joined multiple bands.

Liette Remon and Paul Marchand - Quebec



Liette Remon grew up in the Gaspesie region of Quebec in a small municipality called Petit-Pabos. Music happened only at home, when her father's fiddler friends would drop in, and regularly at family gettogethers, once or twice a week, where music (along with

a glass of gin and food) was the focus. Daughter and granddaughter of Gaspé fiddlers, Liette has recorded two solo albums, South Gaspé County and A Little Family Air, which showcase her rich family musical heritage.



Paul Marchand is one of the premier guitarists and singers in the Québec folk scene. As a member of Trio Stéphanie Gagnon, Entourloupe, Manigance and other groups, Paul has performed all over North America and Europe and recorded many fine albums.

Gifted with a sure sense of rhythm and a clear, strong voice, he has collaborated with a huge number of traditional musicians from Québec and France. His two-year stay in Brittany gave him the chance to make contact with a song culture not so far removed from his own in Québec.

Hank Bradley with Bill Meyer, and Candy Goldman - Washington



Hank Bradley was Washington fiddle champion for 1974, thanks to his draft board who sent him to Fort Bragg N.C. in 1963. Hank's Southern style fiddling began with time spent with Otis Burris and the Mountain Ramblers of Galax, VA. He also plays Croatian tamburitza and

violin with Bonaca of Seattle, violin and bouzouki in the Greek communities of the U.S. and Canada with Yiannis Novakis and with Seattle bands El Fin del Mundo and Roscoe's Gone. Tess Gallagher




Dawn Pinchón Barron

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
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
