Judge tosses civil rights claims made by former deputy prosecutor

After nearly two years of litigation in federal court, former Jefferson County **Deputy Prosecuting Attorney** Julian St. Marie has lost on all her claims, according to court documents filed in late August.

St. Marie filed a 55-page lawsuit in U.S. District Court-Western District on Nov. 16, 2022, alleging sexual harassment, a hostile workplace environment, sex and age discrimination, and libel, as well as that her civil rights under the First, Fifth, and Fourteenth Amendments had been violated.

"Having considered Plaintiff Julian St. Marie's response, Defendants' reply, and the remaining record, the Court grants summary judgment dismissal of all of Plaintiff's claims," United Stated District Court Judge the David Estudillo wrote in his Aug. 29 order.

Big spending, small spending from governor to District 1 to I-2117

It's election season, and the spending is big. Mostly.

The race for the Jefferson County Commissioner District 1 seat has the two Democratic candidates on the ballot reporting significantly differing amounts on campaign contributions. Meanwhile, statewide, the governor's race and "No on 2117," hold the top two spots when it comes to campaign spending, with gubernatorial races as of Oct. 21 nearing \$24 million and spending on "No on 2117" broaching \$12 million, according to the state Public Disclosure Commission (PDC).

The biggest gap in spending is between Heather Dudley-Nollette and Ben Thomas, who are vying for the District 1 seat. Dudley-Nollette has raised \$15,353 as of Oct. 21, with \$14,849 spent.

donors — one for \$100 and another for \$25. In 2021, during Thomas' campaign for a city council seat, Thomas reported zero dollars in campaign contributions.

In regard to the commissioner's race, Thomas said in an email the figure was higher. "I raised a total of \$1,135 (mostly from family) but decided to stop fundraising because I only wanted to do the campaign events, interviews and any other 'earned media' that made sense."

Dudley-Nollette's contributions include \$500 in donations from a political action committee (PAC), \$2,220 in party contributions and \$10,632 in individual

contributions. Beyond Democratic Party and the PAC, Dudley-Nollette's largest contributors also include \$2,400 from Deborah Jahnke, \$2,400 from Richard Jahnke, \$500 from Duncan Kellogg, \$500 from Mary Kellogg, \$500 from former Port

GOVERNOR'S RACE

Total spending for the governor's seat topped \$25 million in 2008 and \$26 million in 2012. With this year's spending approaching previous records, the race has boiled down to two candidates: Democrat Bob Ferguson and Republican Dave Reichert. PDC data shows that Ferguson has raised \$13.3 million and spent \$12.8 million with Reichert having raised \$6.01 million and spent \$5.4 million. The total raised for all gubernatorial candidates is \$26.1 million.

Washington's last Republican governor was John Spellman. He was elected in 1980 but lost re-election. Since then, Democrats have won 10 straight gubernatorial contests. With Gov. Jay Inslee retiring, Washington will get a new governor for the first time in 12

Recent history shows battles for open seats are close. In 2004, Democrat Christine Gregoire defeated

Jill Silver wins Eleanor Stopps environmental leadership award

Jill Silver was presented with the 2024 Eleanor Stopps Environmental Leadership Award by the Port Townsend Marine Science Center on Oct. 17 for her career spent leading successful conservation efforts throughout the West End of the Olympic Peninsula.

The award recognizes significant contributions to protecting and conserving the peninsula's natural environment. Eleanor Stopps was an active Pacific Northwest conservation community member the 1990s. She founded the Admiralty Audubon Chapter and was a catalyst behind establishing the Protection Island National Wildlife Refuge in 1982. Stopps died in 2012 at 92.

"[Silver] is a shining example of who the Eleanor Stopps Environmental Leadership Award was designed for," said Diane Quinn, the marine center's executive director. "[Silver] approaches conservation with a handson educational approach. She shares her knowledge of ecosystem health with local communities so that they may thrive through restoration efforts and be more resilient in the face of climate change."

Institute, a non-profit organization working to develop sustainable approaches to resource use by integrating the natural and human history of the earth's ecosystems, has worked to protect several peninsula waterways, including the Hoh, Queets, and Quinault

"The millions of people who drive up to the Hoh Rainforest get to view largely intact native plant communities in great measure due to [Silver]," said the person who nominated her for the award.

Silver helped initiate the from the 1960s through Natural Resources certification program at Peninsula College and is working to create a Climate Corps to address land stewardship and the need for young adult employment opportunities in Washington state. She is a citizen representative of the North Olympic Peninsula Lead Entity for Salmon Recovery and the North Pacific Coast Marine Resources Committee.

COLLEGE REPORTS GROWTH

A new report pegs the direct economic impact of Peninsula College to Jefferson and Clallam counties in fiscal 2023-2024 at \$44 million, a 15% increase over the year before. 
BIRD FLU SUSPECTED WITHIN WASHINGTON

Washington state health officials are investigating after four agricultural workers tested presumptively positive for bird flu in Franklin County, marking the first presumed human cases in the state, the Washington State Department of Health announced

The four worked with infected birds at an egg farm where 800,000 chickens were euthanized after testing positive Oct. 15. The workers had mild symptoms and received antiviral medication.



Library Week highlights new services such as 'Zenbooth'

Fresh off another successful book sale, the Friends of the Port Townsend Library is trumpeting the host of other programs and features they support in conjunction with National Friends of the Libraries Week, which runs Oct. 20-26.

Statement of need (scope of work). The Jefferson County Marine Resources Committee (MRC) seeks qualified bidder to transport bagged oyster shell to Discovery Bay. Over the past ten years the MRC has been spreading oyster shell substrate as part of a longterm restoration project seeking to reestablish a native Olympia oyster bed. Oyster shell provides substrate for Olympia oyster larvae to settle and mature. The current restoration area contains approximately 120,000 oysters over half an acre, and there is additional area ready for substrate spread. The restoration area is in Southern Discovery Bay (47.005043, -122.878226). Kilmer, the 'texting Congressman,' soon to join Rockefeller Foundation

The only thing I knew about U.S. Rep. Derek Kilmer in my early weeks in Port Townsend was that he decided not to seek reelection to Congress. That was a defining characteristic in my mind because I spent a lot of years in Washington, D.C., and there weren't/aren't a lot of successful politicians who retire, without encouragement, as relatively young men.

"Successful" being the operative word, by which I mean, "effective." More on that in a minute.

I met Kilmer briefly at the jetty celebration on April 24, marking the completion of the beautiful new seawall. The approximately \$12 million replacement of the jetty had been needed for a decade or more. I attended the celebration, which was billed as being "on time and under budget." I went with the requisite inside-thebeltway skepticism and by the time the story of the jetty had been told in a series of speeches, all cynicism had dispersed. The jetty rebuild

Board Continues to Serve and Anticipate Growing Need in Our Community

The Jefferson County Food Bank Association (JCFBA) Board serves people experiencing food insecurity in Jefferson County today, while also delivering on longer-term plans to meet the growing needs of our community in the future. Planning for the future is a critical aspect of a Food Bank Board member's job. At the heart of our work is our commitment and responsibility to provide food to

people who need it. We are modernizing the operation to both source local foods and ensure our shopping locations, times, and days are more accessible for our clients. We strive to make both the quality of the shopping experience and the work environment of volunteers consistently high. These improvements require a systemic approach of goal setting, measuring against those goals, and refining the strategy as needed, as

well as updates to long-held beliefs and behaviors. Recent allegations by a faction of former volunteers have made it clear that more information is needed about recent activities within the JCFBA. Read on for details on what decisions have been made, by whom, and for what reasons regarding changes in Food Bank operations.

Structural changes enacted by prior board

The prior Board of Directors kicked off these changes. In their 2022 strategic planning, they determined a new organizational structure and focus were needed in order to meet the expanding needs of the community. This planning included input from and discussion with the volunteer managers at each of the area Food Banks who were also voting Board members.

Note: this process included the board member and

former volunteer managers currently agitating to discredit these plans and the JCFBA operation. Together, they identified and agreed on the issues ahead, and decided to undertake the following changes:

• A new organizational structure led by a paid Executive Director to run and expand the organization. The job description for this salaried role was discussed with all leadership and approved by the board in December of 2022.

• A new focus on breaking down silos and coordinating functions across facilities. Better recordkeeping and more efficient operations give us access to more opportunities to secure funding and food for our clients across eastern Jefferson county. Nearly a year later, in October of 2023, that same board of directors unanimously voted to hire our Executive Director, Patricia Hennessy.

Over the subsequent four months, due to term limit regulations in the organizational bylaws, the Board's Executive Team (the Board President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary) all left their positions as their terms ended, and new board members were added and elected to these roles by the remaining board members.

What we've been doing since then

To make sure that these changes do in fact help us further our core mandate - providing food to those in need-we worked with our Executive Director to identify priorities for the short and long term, and are monitoring progress against those plans.

The most pressing priorities on the list are to ensure the functionality and construction of a flagship food bank in Quilcene, and to increase efficiencies across the organization so that we can eventually

expand existing days of operation and services for each location to better serve our clients. To date we have made the following progress:

• We have defined the additional role of Operations/Logistics Coordinator (to further centralize and standardize Food Bank operations for greater efficiency), posted the job, and are now reviewing

• We have restarted the Quilcene Food Bank building project with better processes and oversight, allowing us to secure outside funds for construction. We have renewed our permits, and will be winterizing the building and kicking off the rework later this fall

• We are continuing our formal financial audit back through the last 4 years to get context for the data we are collecting so we can confirm we are moving forward as an organization.

• We have updated the organizational bylaws to reflect the current organizational structure.

• We have added new volunteers and are always seeking more which would allow us to expand our hours. If you have a passion for helping your friends and neighbors, your community, please join us: https://jcfba.org/volunteer

We as a Board are actively working on governance and support of this organization during this period of change. We are monitoring progress on these plans, and are committed to giving our Executive Director the support, coaching and direction needed to deliver what is needed to feed those in need in our community. We look forward to continued partnership with her in the years to come.



And then all hell broke loose. Less than a minute after an extremely sensitive father began to speak, malicious hackers disrupted the Zoom by broadcasting pornographic footage and blaming the dad for showing the footage. As the poor man attempted to defend himself and various people expressed dismay, the school's mortified technical support person shut down the Zoom.

Thanks to dedicated Quilcene community member Anne Bessey, whom Hodgson defeated in the last school board election, and Cortney Beck, Quilcene Teacher's Union president and teacher, we know what happened next. Beck's husband, Keith, stood up and said that if Hodgson and some other members of the school board hadn't put so much focus on LGBTQ+ repression, the hackers would not have felt the need to disrupt the Zoom.

"Most of you need to step down from your positions," he said, before asking the Quilcene high school freshman who served as the student body representative on the school board if he was okay. When board members tried to shut Beck down, he responded, "He's a child, and not one of you stopped to see if he's okay!"

As Hodgson stuck to his guns, the one liberal on the five-person school board, Vivien Kuehl, declared that it wasn't the board's job to ban books. When Hodgson claimed that his proposed book ban was not a book ban, Kuehl corrected him and expressed dismay at having to repeatedly deal with the other members' personal agendas.

Kuehl also countered assertions by board members Shona Davis and Ron Frantz that the books Hodgson wanted to remove contained pornographic material. Undeterred, Hodgson elicited gasps from meeting attendees when he muttered something about people who wish to be called "they" are people who want to neuter themselves,

continued from page A15 and that the school staff works for the school board. Needless to say, he was corrected... again.

Finally, Superintendent Ron Moag declared that the board needs to trust librarians and staff to make the best decisions for Quilcene students. He, librarian Carrie Thompson, and Kuehl all affirmed that students under age 13 cannot read young adult books without written parental permission. Hodgson, it seems, was unaware of that school regulation. After Kuehl declared that drawing so much attention to the library's LGBTQ+ books would only make students more eager to read them, and Moag requested that the district lawyer attend the next meeting, Hodgson tabled the resolution.

"Quilcene teachers are so supportive," Beck told me after the meeting. "Every teacher, regardless of religious belief, want to make sure that they call their students by their correct pronouns, and make them feel accepted at school.

"Our students are the most accepting, inclusive, loving group of children that I've ever been around. If they can learn to love and accept each other's differences and quirks, then the adults in our community can follow suit."


Yes, they can. As much as this 79-year-old knows how difficult it can be to remember everyone's pronouns with horror and regret, I have discovered myself inadvertently misgendering people on more than one occasion — I know that all who care, regardless of age, can find ways to accept, accommodate, and grow. Hodgson and some of his fellow school board members may not choose to do so, but you and I can.

Here's to election results that allow us to keep learning, growing, thriving, and loving in our gloriously diverse and endearingly quirky community.

Tux and gown alert: Washington will have an inaugural ball after all

The state's Inaugural Ball is back on.

The Thurston County Chamber announced Thursday it will throw the bash on Jan. 15, 2025 at the state Capitol.

"We're endeavoring to have a real nice party to celebrate Washington's transition in the governor's office, the Legislature and the [Supreme Court] justices," said David Schaffert, the chamber's chief executive officer.

This will be the first ball in eight years as the 2021 fete got drew thousands of

canceled due to COVID pandemic.

As of a few weeks ago, there wasn't going to be one in 2025 either because volunteer directors of the nonprofit Inaugural Ball Committee decided in the summer to cancel it and disband.

The committee, operating independently of public funds, government officials and campaigns, had planned and conducted the ball honoring the governor, other statewide elected officials, state lawmakers and members of the state Supreme Court since 1957. The event

Republican Dino Rossi by 129 votes following a hand recount. Eight years later, Inslee collected 51.5% of the vote, beating Republican Rob McKenna.

Concerns about public safety, cost of living and education appear at the forefront of voter issues for 2024. Citizen initiatives targeting climate and tax policies, and a long-term care insurance program, remain wild cards. Republicans are banking these measures will boost turnout of moderate and conservative voters who will help the GOP in Washington end its losing streak. Should Reichert lose, successful passage of the measures, such as I-2117, would be a rebuke of policies pushed through by Inslee and Democrat lawmakers, leaving the next Democratic governor with significant challenges.

'NO ON 2117'

Initiative 2117, if passed, would repeal the state's Climate Commitment Act (CCA), which requires the largest polluters to pay into a fund to compensate for carbon emissions. Opponents of I-2117 say that repealing the climate act will harm the state, resulting in more pollution and a cut in funding for environmental and transportation programs.

Supporters of I-2117 blame the CCA for higher gas prices and allege the money from the program isn't being spent

The Climate Commitment Act was signed into law in 2021. It created a "cap-and-invest" program, placing limits on greenhouse gas pollution and requiring businesses to purchase allowances if they go over that amount. Funding collected is meant to be allocated toward climate-related projects.

The cap-and-invest program applies to certain large emitters of greenhouse gas pollution, including large facilities, fuel suppliers, natural gas and electric utilities, waste-to-energy facilities (starting in 2027), and railroads (starting in 2031). Generally, entities with annual emissions below 25,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent are not required to obtain allowances to cover their emissions.

According to state documents, The Department of Ecology is required to provide an annual report to the Legislature summarizing how the auction proceeds have been used and whether each project produced verifiable emissions reductions. In 2023, cap-andinvest auctions raised \$1.8 billion.

Let's Go Washington was fined \$20,000 by the PDA on Oct. 9 for failing to report spending by companies hired to gather signatures for its six statewide initiatives and for slow-walking delivery of documents to investigators.

Clean & Prosperous Institute, a group trying to defeat I-2117, reports that the proposed initiative to repeal the CCA does not include specific language to repeal the state gas tax and therefore would not deliver on one of its basic promises delivering lower gas prices to its supporters.

The Institute works with government agencies and the private sector on behalf of measures meant to address climate change and launched an interactive map to detail projects paid for by the legislation. According to the map, projects in Jefferson County include electric vehicle charging stations, special needs transit grants, geothermal heating for the former Fort Worden Public Development Authority, fish barrier removal, among other



Sounds of communal joy to fill Palindrome

Ukrainian band touring to raise money for countrymen

BY KIRK BOXLEITNER

The Ukrainian folk band Kommuna Lux has made Port Townsend one of the stops on its fall charity tour of the United States and Canada, and the band hopes attendees of its concert at the Palindrome won't forget to bring their dancing shoes.

Kommuna Lux, whose band name roughly translates to "communal joy," was formed in 2014 in the streets of Odesa on the Black Sea. It has already done summer tours through the East Coast and Midwest, but this fall is the band's first time visiting North America's West Coast.

Since the band has made its way up from California, through Oregon, into Washington state and Canada, Volodymyr Gitin has felt overwhelmed by the experiences and friendships he's accumulated since the start of Kommuna Lux's 2024 tour, which has raised more than \$11,000 in donations since July, enough to fund one of the Rotary Club's hospital beds for burn victims on the front lines.

Through its 501(c)(3) nonprofit KMLX, funds raised by Kommuna Lux will go directly to the Rotary Club's Hospital Beds for Kramatorsk project.

The band's journey has been so hectic that Gitin said he likely wouldn't be able to make sense of it all until he'd had a chance to sit still for a moment. He found California "amazing," and observed that "the waters were more clear" starting in Oregon, which reminded him of the vibrant culture of his home city on the Black Sea,

diverse since Kommuna Lux's founding.

"We have met a lot of kind people who are very supportive of Ukraine," said Gitin, who noted the band is continuing to work with partners and supporters to provide medicine and protective equipment to organizations throughout Ukraine. "Everyone asks how they can help, so we share that with them. We also get to share our culture, through our music."

The band consists of conservatory-trained musicians Bagrat Tsurkan on vocals, Oleg Vasianovich on accordion, Andrei Okhramovich on trumpet, Yaroslav Besh on trombone, Viktor Kirilov on acoustic guitar, Sergei Poltorak on percussion and Volodymyr Gitin on clarinet, the latter of whom spoke to

"Ten years ago, our songs were largely Russian, but Odesa has gained a mixture of other nationalities, and we've also explored more traditional Ukrainian music," Gitin said. "Add to that the experiences we have gained since then, and it has given our band a unique style, that includes everything from Jewish to newer waves of influence."

Among Kommuna Lux's more popular songs is "7:40," a tune from the late 1800s whose driving, rhythmic pulse evokes the propulsive forward motion of the trains that chugged into the Odesa station at 7:40 a.m. every day, from the Moldovan city of Bendery.

Kommuna Lux's bohemian folk-derived repertoire includes a number of such songs, that seek to impart

the history and spirit of the historic port town of Odesa, that's been the target of shelling and air strikes by Russian forces on multiple occasions since the invasion of Ukraine started in February of 2022.

"Our music is high-energy, but close to the street and the people," Gitin said. "It makes people want to get on their feet, even in places that might not be perfect for that. So if you come to see us, don't forget your dancing shoes."

The band sat in for a live radio interview with Buzzy Donahue at KPTZ 91.9 FM on Wednesday, Oct. 16, to help promote the 7 p.m. concert on Saturday, Oct. 26, at the Palindrome at Eaglemount Winery.Doors open at 6 p.m. and tickets are available on eventbrite.com.

Singer-songwriter promotes poetry, aspires to 'grace'

Midwest singer-songwriter Peter Mulvey is returning to Port Townsend, where he has developed a number of close connections to the community.

He is set to perform at the Palindrome, at Eaglemount Winery and Cidery, his third such collaboration with Rainshadow Concerts, previously at the Rainshadow Recording Studios at Fort Worden State Park.

Mulvey's other Fort Worden connection comes from his associations with the editorial staff of Copper Canyon Press, where he ordered a couple of hundred copies of "Braided Creek: A Conversation in Poetry," by Jim Harrison and Ted Kooser, to pass on to his own fan base.

Mulvey said his working-class background, from his Catholic upbringing in Milwaukee to his busking tours through Dublin and Boston, has made him sympathetic to those working in low-income but creatively rich professions. He includes his fellow traveling musicians along with schoolteachers and poets in that group.

Mulvey said he seeks to support poets in part because their work has provided examples for him to

emulate in his own songwriting.

"I've always tended toward that confessional direction in my writing, of distilling as much as you can into as few words as you can, and hopefully doing it with some beauty," he said. "But for those who might find poetry intimidating, I promise my songs won't leave you feeling like you have to write essays about them afterward, and they go well with beer."

Mulvey lamented how poetry is too often taught in ways that can "throw kids under the bus, because they're presented with these poems that it took those poets years to learn how to write, and then, those kids are tasked with understanding them on the spot."



Fiber arts display is a window into Beatlemania

The Peninsula Fiber Artists' "Fiber Habit" display window will continue to showcase "Beatlemania" at 675 Tyler St. in Uptown Port Townsend through the month of November.

Port Angeles Beatles fan and textile artist Merrie Jo Schroeder has curated the 24/7 walk-by exhibit of British Invasion-themed textile art and memorabilia from 1960s beat group events, in honor of the 60th anniversary of the first appearance of The Beatles in the United States, on display since Oct. 6.

"Here Comes the Sun" and "Yellow Submarine" were among The Beatles' hit songs that inspired art quilts and other textile pieces by a collection of artists. The group who currently share space with 1960s concert tickets. posters and other memorabilia includes fellow Port Angeles resident Evette Allerdings. Sequim's Liisa Fagerlund. and a Port Townsend contingent comprised of Sue Gale. Pat Herkal, Kindy Kemp and Debra E. Olson,

Schroeder's Beatles fandom nearly predates the British Invasion, as she attended the band's concert in Detroit in September, 1964, "during which I was among the enthusiastic fans, expressing my dedication with fervent screams and tears."

To commemorate this anniversary, Schroeder proposed the Beatlemania theme for the Fiber Habit window, which she said was "warmly received" by the rest of the Peninsula Fiber Artists.

Although Olson had previously planned for "Home Sweet Home" to be the Peninsula Fiber Artists' theme for the Fiber Habit display window from December through January, she's instead opted for a bagrelated theme, "to give our members a smaller, less timeconsuming piece during such a busy time of the year."

The theme will be bags of any kind, and the working titles currently being considered include "Bagging Brilliance," "The Art of Bagging" and "Discover Your Bag Story," although Olson is encouraging input from her fellow Peninsula Fiber

Linda Carlson, who handles publicity for the Peninsula Fiber Artists, noted that bags have been part of the group's projects for years.

"Many members make crossbody bags, often of unusual fabrics," Carlson said. "Most of us have made tote bags to haul our materials to meetings. We even had an exhibit based on UFOs — in that case, unfinished objects - that had been hidden in large brown paper bags and exchanged anonymously, with each recipient of a bag using the bag contents for a new project."

The Peninsula Fiber meeting is set for 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 13, at the Gardiner Community Center, with Carlson and Terri Wolf providing an informational presentation.




