
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

Birders, grab your binoculars! The Christmas count is coming

All are invited to participate in the Port Townsend Christmas Bird Count (CBC) on Saturday, Dec. 14.

The count is hosted by Rainshadow Bird Alliance, previously known as Admiralty Audubon Society. In addition, details of the count – and tips on bird identification – will be featured at the regular meeting at 7 p.m. Dec. 4 at the Port Townsend Community Center.

The Port Townsend CBC began in 1977. One of thousands nationwide, it is part of one of the largest field data collection efforts by volunteers. The first counts began in 1900. The data is used to track increasing and decreasing populations, to list and de-list species as threatened or endangered, and to track recent changes due to climate change.

Here's how it works.

Each count is a circle, 15 miles in diameter, which means 177 square miles. Our goal is to

count every bird!

In reality, we divide the circle into areas (as shown on the map at left), each with an Area Leader and one or more teams. Then we walk, drive, bike or boat certain routes to cover as much ground or water as we can on the designated day – no matter the weather.

Some teams are out all day; some less so. We are also looking for at-home feeder-watchers who simply report on the birds in their yard during a 30-minute window.

Our circle encompasses the Quimper Peninsula all the way down past Chimacum to south of Egg and I Road. It includes Marrowstone Island, Mats Mats and the mouth of Discovery Bay. The habitats range from residential areas to forest, grasslands, lakes, coastlines and open water. We average about 115 species.

We are looking for birders from beginner to experienced. If interested, come to the meeting listed above, or contact the count compiler, Steve Hampton, at stevechampton@gmail.com.

Give the gift of a good book this season

A Port Townsend bookseller shares his five top picks for holiday shoppers.

As the days grow shorter and the countdown to the holidays begins, local booksellers are gearing up for the most lucrative time of the year.

"I personally love the holidays, so having a little storefront like this, I could not be more excited," said John Blomgren, one of the owners at Imprint Bookshop.

"I do feel like right now, book sales are just generally pretty high and people are excited about literature and supporting local businesses. There is a renewed sentiment about not giving your money to some of the bigger players in the industry, so we are hoping to see some good sales."


Blomgren and his partner, Garrett Jones, assumed ownership of Imprint Bookshop on Nov. 1 and are hitting the ground running.

"Normally the store only stocks like one copy of anything unless it's a new release," Blomgren said. "But with the holiday season coming up, I am stocking up on things that I feel are going to be on people's shopping lists."

The Leader asked Blomgren to share his top five recommendations for the perfect gift.



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'The Wood at Midwinter' by Susanna Clarke

"This beautifully illustrated short story from the internationally bestselling and prize-winning author of Piranesi and Jonathan Strange and Mr. Norrell is set in the familiar Strange universe," Blomgren wrote. "Featuring an introduction by Susanna Clarke and gorgeous illustrations from Victoria Sawdon, this picture book for adults is a mesmerizing, must-have addition to any fantasy reader's bookshelf."

'The Serviceberry' by Robin Wall Kimmerer

"From the #1 New York Times bestselling author of Braiding Sweetgrass, a bold and inspiring vision for how to orient our lives around gratitude, reciprocity, and

community, based on the lessons of the natural world," Blomgren wrote. "An indigenous scientist, Kimmerer harvests serviceberries alongside the birds as she considers the ethic of reciprocity that lies at the heart of the gift economy. How, she asks, can we learn from indigenous wisdom and the plant world to reimagine what we value most? One of the most anticipated





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One market to serve the artists and their community

Karen Robinson has lent the name of her business, Timber Forest, to an artists market in Quilcene.

"People know Timber Forest Candles, but this is a collaborative. It's not my show, it's our show," she told The Leader.

The market, she said, is intended to showcase Brinnon and Quilcene crafters and artists in a place where the vendors can sell their wares without paying a commission.

"So we rent out the community center, kind of like a co-op, and we just split the costs."

Robinson said vendors often pay a 30% commission to put their work into a store.

"Or large fees when you go to a market. You have to pay \$30 to \$40 for a table, and you have to travel all over the place. It's time consuming and a lot of work. I wanted a place for shoppers to go and to have a unique experience."

Robinson said vendors at Timber Forest Artists Market offer one-of-a-kind gifts for holiday shoppers.

"Things you wouldn't normally see at a craft fair – they can hand-craft you something if you like. Everything at this market is non-toxic, organic with no carcinogens; our soaps are all pure.

"We have a woman doing up-cycled denim, and she knits to raise money for cancer. Everyone here, they give back to their community."

Robinson touted an artist's hand-made cards, calling them, "exquisite," and a baker who will be at the market in December.

"We have one painter who is just phenomenal – this young lady is going places – and another artist is joining us soon," she promised.

The Timber Forest Artists Market is located at the Quilcene Community Center, and the show dates are all on Sundays: Nov. 24, Dec. 8 and Dec. 15, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The market will continue after the holidays.

"We plan on every second Sunday we will be there because on the first Sunday they have a pancake breakfast, which is open to the community, and we do want to plug that," she said. "We love that center. We're getting big and it's gonna be crowded in there."

You may feel a tickle

Ellie Sather moved home in 1980 to help her widowed mother, Anne, run the Peninsula's Whitney Gardens.

Anne and Ellie's father, George, had purchased the sprawling gardens and nursery just 10 years earlier when William Whitney's health began to fail.

"My parents did a lot improvements here and we continue to do the same, that's what life, isn't it?" Sather told The Leader in a recent interview. She added that the Whitneys, who were farmers, founded Whitney Gardens and Nursery in 1955.

Bill and Faye bought seven acres of pasture land from the people who owned the original Brinnon Farm, which was here from the early 1900s. They rans cows and people would come and get their milk. You know, it was pretty remote."

That remoteness, Sather said, is a big part of the garden's charm. "Most people, when they come here, look around and say, 'how long has this been here?'"

That curiosity, she said, stems from the fact that few nurseries have their own gardens, where customers can get a sense of how large a plant or tree might get.

The people at Whitney, she said, take great care in insuring that what they sell, make it safely to their new home.

"People are sometimes surprised by such a big tree and that it will be lovingly put in a truck. If you want a tree that is 14-feet tall, you want to get that home. We do deliver, yes, but we can usually get that in your truck or van. Let's say you want a six-foot maple. We can get that into your van - you may have a little bit of a tickle but not much," she promised.

Whitney Gardens has evolved over the years, from a place that once specialized in rhododendrons, to what consumers demand in 2025. For a while, that meant perennials

but they can be a lot of work for an amateur gardener.

"People still use them but they're buying in lesser numbers and looking for something that is very unusual. And they're interested in having good products at a cheaper price," she said.

Sather said she sees Whitney Gardens as more than a nursery.

"We are a tourist attraction in some ways, because of who we are and where we are. People can run away from home and come and see us. It is a very nice way to get away from the traffic, have a nice lunch from one of our local establishments, and walk around the garden. People can walk around here with the carts and pick up what they like or we can dig them out and put them in their carts.

"They want to hike, maybe canoe, just kick off their shoes and relax. They come and just enjoy the gardens. Would I like to go into the city? No, do I do it? Very rarely," she said.

Despite its old world charm,

Sather recognizes the realities of the internet.

"People can't always drive, or have the resources to come here. But we reach out to the people who know where they can get a good price, a healthy plant and a nice place to go. Most places don't have a garden so we sort of enlighten people to help them understand what gardening is about, but most of the people who come here are pretty astute - we try to give out the most information as we can," Sather said, adding that a new website should go online in December, expediting their mail order business.

"I have hopefully found the next generation. They're not farmers, they're accountants and we hope that they will continue this," she said, noting that she isn't planning a move.

"I'm going to stay here. My bottom line is still good. People have to pay more for plants in the big city and so I make sure my prices are less." Whitney Gardens and Nursery is open daily 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
