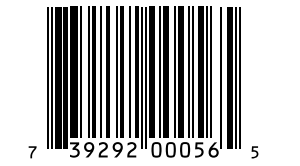

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## Housing shortage hits; town homes to be built

This county is growing, perhaps not by huge leaps and bounds, but as a county official recently said, it's no doubt, growing.

A new set of town homes is being built off Madison Street, just before the intersection with Wartrace Pike on Highway 64, by developers Smith Douglas Homes, homebuilders based in Georgia. The Smith Douglas properties is probably to be the first of more to come as Shelbyville faces a housing shortage, especially in residences with mid-range prices according to Shane Hooper, Economic Developer and chief executive officer of Shelbyville-Bedford Partnership.

Hooper added, "Bedford will experience tremendous growth in the next decade. Our focus is on creating the

most positive environment for economic growth. Judicious management for the desired growth is imperative."

**Housing shortage**

According to the 2020 U.S. Census, Bedford's population is now at 50,000. The county is growing at 1.1 percent each year, which yields about 550 new residents each year, Hooper said. Taking this number and dividing it by the average household in Bedford of 2.8 people computes to 220 housing units.

"The 220 new housing units only account for the new need," Hooper said. However, "Several additional factors will generate a need for even more new housing units."

The new town homes off Madison,

## Flood-ravaged Waverly braces for Ida remnants

NASHVILLE — Emergency workers and volunteers in rural Tennessee pushed to clean up as much debris as possible from recent deadly flooding Monday as the remnants of Hurricane Ida threatened to interrupt recovery efforts with another dousing expected overnight through Tuesday.

The Humphreys County Emergency Management Agency noted the possibility of localized flooding in Waverly and other areas hit hard by the Aug. 21 flooding but said it's "not expected to be the magnitude of last week's flooding," citing the National Weather Service.

Authorities are encouraging people to pick up tarps so they can cover their damaged homes and other property. They also said they are watching the forecast and preparing in case the situation becomes dangerous.

"Waverly Department of Public Safety is monitoring the weather and will go into affected neighborhoods to announce should evacuations become necessary," an emergency agency flood recovery report said Monday.

The flooding killed 20 people as it took out houses, roads, cellphone towers and telephone lines, with rain totals that more than tripled forecasts and shattered the state record for one-day rainfall. More than 270 homes were destroyed and 160 took major damage, according to the Humphreys County Emergency Management Agency.

Much of that destruction centered on Waverly, a small city about 60 miles (95 kilometers) west of Nashville. The town of McEwen near Waverly was pummeled with 17 inches (43 centimeters) of rain, according to the National Weather Service.

Jeani Rice-Cranford helped shelter about 15 people at her house, which sits on a hill, during the floods and said she has anxiety about the prospect of another significant drenching for her community.

She said she is concerned about people potentially getting trapped again and whether she has enough supplies if she needs to help once more. She also worries about how much more people could handle on the heels of a tragedy.

"It's been a week now, so some of the numbness has worn off, and some of the processing is beginning," she said. "I think our officials have done a great job with coordinating with mental health experts and getting people in."

The National Weather Service forecast has issued a flash flood watch for central Tennessee from Monday evening through early Wednesday, saying rainfall amounts from what remains of Ida will range from 2 to 5 inches (5 to 13 centimeters).

So far, more than 800 loads of debris have been hauled to a landfill from the floods that centered on Humphreys County, which has a population of about 18,000.

called "The Landing at Townsend," will offer 97 units starting in the mid-\$200s and are slated to open for sale in October with move-ins occurring in the spring, according to the Smith Douglas sales and listing coordinator.

## Zoning

The five or so acres the town homes will sit on, behind the Circle K convenience store, is split between commercial and high-density residential, according to Planning Commission chairman Warren Landers. The planning commission's job is to take recommendations to ensure the city grows

according to the land map criteria.

"The City of Shelbyville can easily be sold to industry, but the people who work and run those industries, where are they going to live? Landers asked. "They're working in Shelbyville, but buying in Murfreesboro. We do have a shortage of housing; any realtor will tell you that."

There is also a shortage

in average-income rentals, places designed for people moving to Shelbyville for a job that may not be long-term, Landers said. And this shortage in housing and average-income rentals is not unique to Bedford.

Elaine Middleton, economic developer for Fayetteville, said their city is going "through the exact same thing," with a shortage in average-income places to rent.

## Viking offense fired up at Lookout Valley

CHATTANOOGA — The Community Vikings spotted the Lookout Valley Yellow Jackets the opening touchdown of the game, but it was all Vikings the rest of the way as the big-play Community offense scored the next 60 points en route to a 60-7 win in a non-region football contest Friday night.

The Viking offense scored at will against the Yellow Jackets, despite three possessions not yielding scores after three touchdowns were called back due to penalties.

It was an inauspicious start for the Vikings as Jaxon Quails of the Yellow Jackets was stopped at the line of scrimmage, but broke away for 42-yard touchdown run just 11 seconds into the game to give Lookout Valley a 7-0 lead.

Community (1-1) bounced back quickly as Maki Fleming raced 34 yards to pay dirt after taking a forward pass from Dallas Grooms. Grooms ran for the conversion as the Vikings took an 8-7 lead with 10:39 left.

The Vikings recovered the ensuing onside kick, but were their own worst enemy as a touchdown and two other first downs were called back due to penalties.

A fumble halted the drive at the Yellow Jacket 38-yard line.

After a Viking defensive stop, Fleming came up big again with a 51-yard punt return to give Community possession at the Lookout Valley 11-yard line. Riker Reid raced 11 yards to score with Grooms providing the two-point conversion as the Vikings increased their

advantage to 16-7.

After a 53-yard TD pass from Grooms to Fleming was negated due to a penalty, the duo teamed up on a 24-yard pass play for the score with 10:26 left in the second quarter.

Jay Dabbs ran for two to put the Vikings up 24-7.

The Vikings recovered their second onside kick of the night to set up their next score.

Grooms ran 25 yards for the touchdown and John Stanley ran for the conversion to put Community up 32-7.

"That's our game. We're pretty good at it," Viking coach Chris Grooms said, referring to the recovery of the onside kicks. "We got two, but there's another two we almost had."

The Vikings had a touchdown called back on their next possession, but the defense came up big in the final seconds of the half.

After the Yellow Jackets had a first-and-goal at the Community seven-yard line, the Vikings drove Lookout Valley back on the next three downs.

On fourth down, Dabbs put an exclamation point to the Community defensive stand with a sack of the quarterback as the Vikings took their big lead to the intermission.

"The defense came together and had a good game plan," Grooms said.

Stanley scored from 20 yards out just over a minute into the second half as the Vikings increased their lead to 38-7.

Community failed to score on its next possession after an interception return of 78 yards by Grooms was

## Defense, run game shine for Champs

WOODBURY— For the first time since 2013, the Cascade Champions are off to a 2-0 start following Friday night's 25-0 shutout win at Cannon County.

For years, Cascade has hung its hat on playing solid defense and a complementary run game — and that seems to be the winning recipe so far in 2021.

Although the defense played lights out from start till finish, the Cascade offense was spotty at times, but looked to be in prime form through the second quarter and with a strong finish in the fourth.

"The defense played great. We shut them out. We won 25-0, but I'm not satisfied and they're not satisfied, which is good. We have to come out and play from the start, regardless of the opponent. Once we get to that point, we can be a pretty good ball team," Champion coach Jake Tyre said.

Defensively, Cascade looked as dominant as it has in the past several seasons, allowing just 66 total yards of offense to the Lions.

Cascade had two possessions in the first quarter, the second of which pushed to the Cannon County 28-yard line before the drive stalled on fourth down.

After the turnover on downs, Cascade forced a

punt, but a botched snap on fourth down during the following Cannon County drive set up the Champs up with prime real estate for the first drive of the second quarter.

Utilizing the two-quarterback system, Ryan Inmon orchestrated a drive to the Lions' red zone, but an interception on the one-yard line gave Cannon County (0-2) a breath of life.

Two plays later, the Cascade defense broke through the Lions' line and Sawyer Lovvorn made the tackle in the end zone for the safety with just over nine minutes left in the quarter.

With the defense putting the first points of the game on the board, Cascade took the following possession and made quick work of the Cannon County defense.

A healthy dose of offense by Conner Huie pushed Cascade to the one-yard line, where he was able to finish the drive on a one-yard touchdown run.

Drake Hodge's successful point after put Cascade up 9-0 with 5:50 left in the half.

After the offense answered, Cascade's defense once again came through and forced a three and out on the following Lion drive, setting up another scoring drive by the Champions.

With 3:27 left in the

half, Cascade was able to capitalize off the successful run game, led by Inmon.

Of his total 60 yards Inmon rushed five times on the drive for 41 yards on the drive, which was finished off on a five-yard scamper by Dylan Crouch.

Hodge converted his second successful point after, giving the Champs a 16-0 lead at the half.

While the offense

churned out 108 yards in the second quarter, both Cascade and Cannon County struggled to find their offensive footing in the third quarter, totaling a combined 23 yards of offense.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Cascade punted from its own 12-yard line, but a muffed return by the Lions allowed Cascade to recover and return the

ball to the Cannon County 36.

A personal foul, however, pushed Cascade back to its own 41-yard line.

Even with the penalty backing up Cascade, Cascade was able to once again press into the Lions' red zone.

A pair of incompletions prompted Tyre to opt for a 41-yard field goal by Hodge, which he in turn

split the uprights on with seven minutes left.

Hodge took the following kickoff and recorded his second touchback of the night, giving the Lions the ball on the 20.

The very next play, Cascade's defense came through again with an interception by Taylor Dowell, which gave Cascade the

# Slow start hurts Eagles in loss to Tigers

LEWISBURG — Shelbyville Central is still searching for that first win of the season after a 21-14 loss at Marshall County in a non-region matchup on Friday night.

For the second week in a row, the Shelbyville Central offense got off to a slow start while the Eagle defense continued to make plays to keep the team in the game.

“Our offense hasn’t played well early yet and I don’t exactly know why that is. It is frustrating because I know how good we can be,” Shelbyville Central coach Josh Puckett said.

“Overall, our defense played well again tonight. Our defense is playing well enough for us to be winning games and our offense has got to find a way to get into the end zone.”

Talented Marshall County

senior quarterback Bryson Hammons suffered a season-ending knee injury in the season opener at Columbia and is scheduled for surgery this week.

“Losing Bryson is a huge loss to this team. He’s had such a great high school career and he was going to have a big year this year,” Marshall County coach Thomas Osteen said. “I think he would have been the best quarterback in our region no doubt and one of the best in the mid-state.”

Tiger backup quarterback Devonte Davis provided the spark on offense the Tigers needed, rushing for three touchdowns.

“Devonte Davis is just a football player. He contributes in all three phases of the game,” Osteen said. “He’s got some good tools to work with. He’s one of the best football players in the mid-state that not many people know about. I’m really glad he’s

on our team.”

Marshall County scored first off a Davis three-yard run midway through the opening quarter. Wyatt Joyce connected on his first of three extra points for the 7-0 lead.

After a failed fourth and long by the Eagles, the Tigers took over on downs and Davis added a 26-yard TD. The kick after increased the lead to 14-0 with 4:48 left in the half.

Shelbyville Central followed with an impressive drive capped off by a three-yard touchdown run by senior Laquan Young in the closing seconds of the half. The run on the conversion attempt was no good leaving the halftime score 14-6.

Ida leaves mark on Louisiana

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Rescuers set out in hundreds of boats and helicopters to reach people trapped by floodwaters Monday, and utility repair crews rushed in, after a furious Hurricane Ida swamped the Louisiana coast and ravaged the electrical grid in the stifling, late-summer heat.

Residents living amid the maze of rivers and bayous along the state's Gulf Coast retreated desperately to their attics or roofs and posted their addresses on social media with instructions for search-and-rescue teams on where to find them.

More than 1 million customers in Louisiana and Mississippi — including all of New Orleans — were left without power as Ida, one of the most powerful hurricanes ever to hit the U.S. mainland, pushed through on Sunday and early Monday before weakening into a tropical storm.

Officials warned it could be weeks before the power grid is repaired.
