At age 9, Alayna Arnold is already an Owner Amateur Country Pleasure World Grand Champion contender. That's actually big stuff in the walking horse industry.

"I try not to brag because I don't want to hurt anyone's feelings," she said.

As humble—and little—as she is, this Liberty Elementary student is making her way in the walking horse world. Trained by Kimberly Walden and her stepfather Bill Callaway, Alayna will be showing Designer Champagne—bred from Design To Love which she co-owns with Walden, at the Celebration.

"It's fun just to show and to be just around all the people," said Alayna.

She's been riding padded and country pleasure since she was 3 years old and even though she doesn't remember the first time she rode a horse, she loves it.

"It feels great to me... [Horses] are easy to get around with and just fun to watch."

She says she trains around 90 minutes every day. But with school having started Aug. 2, getting her schedule together is a little difficult. Still, she said so far, she's enjoying school, especially her science and social studies classes as well as getting to see her friends.

One day she'd like to become a veterinarian to help horses that are sick and do something about it. Now, as the Celebration carries on, Alayna is ready to take her trainers' advice to the arena: 'Try your best when you showing to have fun.'

And you can bet she'll be doing so while wearing her bling atop Designer Champagne.



The Celebration experienced much change in

2020, and Lisa Turner, one of the board's newest members, was one of those changes.

Now, she's hoping to help the Celebration get back to normal.

Born and raised in Shelbyville, Turner has been going to the Celebration since her childhood, saying she holds it "very near and dear to her heart."

"It's hard to explain, but when that white horse walks in with the flag and goes around...I don't know it just does something to my heart," she said.

And as a certified public accountant and former Shelbyville City Treasurer, Turner understands the economic benefit the Celebration brings to the area as visitors travel from across the country stay, shop, and eat locally. Not to mention the Celebration brings in job opportunities and income from visitors renting housing houses throughout July and August

"I don't think people realize what we've got here, what a gem it is. The fact that it brings just some wonderful people—people with lifelong friendships," she said.

With last year being different from the Celebration's now 83-year run, Turner has high expectations for the upcoming show, saying box seats are selling readily while the smaller shows leading up to the Celebration have been popular.

"There's been a lot of excitement in all of these little one-night shows around in the area. There's a lot of good horses. People are excited about it," she said.

She also said she's excited to work with the other board members.

"It's a good selection of people with different strengths...Not everybody knows how to do everything; it all kind of just works together to make everything work," Turner said.

But specifically, Turner said she and other members are hoping to get more of the community involved with the Celebration once again, especially within the younger crowd.

"I hate to not see the kids not be involved," she said. Growing up she remembers how common it was for her peers to work at the Celebration. And they weren't easy jobs—they taught hard work and how to give, Turner said.

Turner herself was selected to become a part of the board of directors after being with the Celebration Association. They nominated and selected her in January 2020 as the first female member and following in her father's footsteps, who was also on the board of directors.

Now on the hospitality committee, Turner will also work with sponsors, the new CEO Warren Wells, and with judges to talk about their expectations.





Judy Tillett Young's honor lives on

The word is tough. It's safe to say it's what most people in the Tennessee Walking Horse industry are and always have been.

And those who have been around long enough, may remember one of the toughest women of the industry—Judy Tillett

A former Amateur World Grand Champion, Young was the first amateur rider inducted into the Grand Celebration Hall of Fame in 1986, eventually earning 39 blue ribbons.

"She was very well-known, strongwilled, very good rider. She'd been riding all her life," said Beth Lawwell, daughter of Ronal Young and Judy's stepdaughter, who is also a rider within the Celebration. "She was an icon for the Walking Horse industry because people were always looking up to her, wanting to ride like her.'

But the industry lost its icon last spring when Young passed away on April 23, 2021 at the age of 67.

Background

"She was very easy-going but firm when she decided to need to be—and very plain spoken," said Joe Tillett, former Bedford County Commissioner and Judy's older brother.

She started riding at the age of 6, and from there, won 1964 Amateur Mare World Champion with her horse Untouchable at just 10 years old. For the next two decades, she would continue to win blues and championships along with her well-known horses Black Magic Woman and Mountain Man.

And she was quite a sight sitting straight in her saddle; her blonde hair was tied back with a black ribbon, and her head steady in view with the crowd. Her brother agreed one could see her personality in how she carried herself on her horses. "She was one-of-a-kind," he said.

"Strong-willed"


Incredibly, even though she faced a diagnosis of colon cancer in early 2000, becoming unable to ride a horse for over a year, she rode her horse, Hy-Tone Dancer, to another Amateur World Championship—despite first riding the horse only two days before she showed, according to the House Resolution which will forever commemorate Young.

In March 2001, the resolution was made to honor Young, stating "Judy Tillett Young is one such noteworthy individual who has attained the highest levels of achievement; a renowned equestrienne, Mrs. Young was recognized by her peers as Junior Rider of the Century in 1999..."

"I'm certainly very proud of my sister," her brother said.

Stepdaughter Lawwell said, "She just taught me that women could get out there and ride just as good as a man."

Margo Urad: First female TWHBEA president

One year later . . .

Former president of the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders and Exhibitors Association, Margo Urad now serves as the executive director all while owning an insurance business in Texas since 1992.

You might say she likes to stay busy.

Between the pandemic and serving as TWHBEA's first female president in its 85-year history, Urad says she's learned a lot and holds expectations for the future of the Tennessee Walking Horse industry.

"Overall, it was a good learning experience. I've learned something in every position there, it showed me the other side of things," she said.

Those things include just how much support and collaboration it takes to keep the breed front and center while providing services to the variety of members within the industry.

"The great thing with our horse is whether you trail ride, endurance ride, show performance or pleasure horse, or versatility, we have a program for you. And I think

that's something I really wanted to promote and get people more involved with as far as the membership..." she said.

Urad graduated from Louisiana State University in 1980 with a degree in accounting. She grew up showing saddlebreeds and was first introduced to the walking horse while living in Texas in the early 90s.

About 20 years ago, she became involved with TWHBEA, serving on the executive committee on and off in various positions.

Then in December 2019, she became the association's first female president.

"I don't want to say it's not a big deal because I think it's a very big deal for women, but at that time it didn't hit me that way. It was just being president, and I was thinking about all the stuff I wanted to accomplish and the things we did," she said.

While she was president during the pandemic, Urad worked on improvements to build and increase membership.

The association also offers rail to trail programs that are "outside the box." It's just some of the ways the organization is hoping to increase membership beyond just registering the breed.

TWHBEA is currently doing a world-wide trail riding video competition, which was started by international VP Brad Woodruff last year with its first competition taking place in Mexico. The competition for this year started in June and will go through

September.

Participating groups—of as few as 4 and as much as 25—can submit video segments of their trail riding that captures the excitement and authenticity of the ride—all while earning hours for trail riding.

Being one of the sponsors for the Celebration, there will also be a TWHBEA night on the last Thursday night of the Celebration.

But all the programs and time put into the industry is, in the end, all for the horse.

When people ask Urad, 'Why do you do this?' her answer is simple, "Because I love and believe in this animal and our association. Anything I can personally do to better the industry and support the animal and industry, that's what I'm doing."

As for her advice for women within the industry, she says, "I think number one, you've got to follow your heart. Have goals—and I think for women, if you're a goal-oriented woman—it's just a matter of sticking to the path to achievement. I mean, it's a bumpy path. But one well worth sticking with."





will be making his third trip to judge the world championships. Bonner previously judged the Celebration in 2013 and 2015


- Brent Grider, from Columbia, Ky., will be judging the Celebration for the second time with his first being in 2012.
